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

NAVIGATION MONTH LATE

Port Arthur, Ont., April 1—Indications are that the opening of navigation at this port will be at least a month later than last year. At this time a year ago open water was visible and the ice in the bay broken up and floating, though the wind occassionally drove it back. The Easton arrived from Dulth on April 3. Now there is nothing in sight but solid ice about three feet thick.

The ice-breaker "Whalen," which has been in dry dock for some time, came out last week and broke forty-two inches of ice in the inner harbor to get to her dock. She will commence to break up the field ice on Thunder Bay, but even if this bay could be opened as early as usual there is so much more ice on the lake to flow into and block the Soo river that navigation is size to be late. The first week in May is the earliest that can be hoped boats will be running.
