Beat the whites of three eggs very stiff, then add two-thirds cup of sugar, one teaspoon vanilla, a little nutmeg and beat all well together. Hastily stir in one pint of thin cream. Make pies with the one crust, same as a custard and bake thirty minutes in quick oven.



A SCHOOL FOR THE **CUSTOMS RECRUITS**

Collector Loeb of New York Training Men to Apprehend Wealthy Smugglers -Huge Loss Each Year

Special Correspondence of The Times.Star

New York, Oct. 17-To familiarize new wealthy smugglers and those who make profession of evading the port regulations a profession of evaling the port regulations regarding the payment of duty on imported goods, Collector Loob is conducting on of the most interesting schools in the country. There are now 1,000 customs inspectknown restauranteurs in the metropoins, and Mrs. J. P. Adriance and Eugene Higgins. In addition half a hundred prominent men and women, equally well known though of less wealth, have run afoul of the customs officials, indicating that predisposition to cheat Uncle Sam of his tax. The discovery that some of the largest of the fashionable French milliners of the continent now make hats containing secret receptacles for the storage of jeweiry in headgen sold to Americana, as recently exposed in the arrest of Mrs. Adviance, has directed the attention of the collector to the need of a more minute examination of the personnel of returning travelers. Several hours a day are being devoted to enlightening the new inspectors upon the devious ways of smugglers and the ends to which they have recourse in the attempt to get by the officials assigned to inspect their belongings. As a result of the schooling, which is supervised by some of the oldest men in the service, Collector Loeb looks for greater activity among his men in the future and a notable depreciation of the annual amount of smuggling through this port. Through the lose methods heretofore prevailing in this branch of the government service, it is estimated of the government service, it is estimated that \$5,000,000 in uncollected duties got from Uncle Sam each year.

This kind of freight is called time

freight. Ordinary freight is dead freight. Time freight consists only of certain materials. These materials run alphabetically all the way from asbestos, through cranberries, egg-case fillers, ink, peanuts and varnish down to zinc. All cars in time freight down to zinc. All cars in time freight trains are reported by telegraph from all division points. You can stand in front of a big board on the wall—it is like the board in a stock broker's office, except that it has little holes in it—and watch the progress of the cars in a time freight train from point to point.

The graft scandals, the bank defalcations, etc., are simply symptoms of internal disorders. They are the eruptions of the disease.

Pittsburg might be called the typical getrich-quick community. Its great wealth

Pittaburg might be called the typical getrich-quick community. Its great wealth is based on the abundant coal and iron with which the Creator loaded its environment. Down on those deposits fasten thousands of Americans seized with the mania of money-making. They coin the coal and iron into millions. They work feverishly; they work their men furious-fly. It's a mad, frenzied scramble for success and sensation. To get rich quicker. ly. It's a mad, frenzied scramble for success and sensation. To get rich quicker, they exact excessive protection from congress—first to prop up infant industries, then to consolidate abnormal profits. If the government undertakes to deny their demands, they bluster first, then intrigue, then intimidate. Mills are closed down; the "prosperity" of the country is threatened, lobbies are organized, corruption funds subscribed, until congress succumbs and new "jokers" are written into steel tariffs.

In the meantime a huge city is upreared. But this city is run for the benefit of its industries, not for the comfort of its inhabitants. In the are frenzied with the gold fever? In the absence of communal patriotism, graft becomes an incident. Graft and greed are the minor watchwords of success. Get money, anyway—but get it. Is it surprising that cashiers graft, that aldermen graft, that city officials graft, that there's a very pandemonium of graft? Isn't it the way the other fellows get rich?

All of a sudden the poison clogs the pores, and the infection blotches the surface—and every one is satisfied. The great manufacturers, the great merchants, the great lawyers—high priests of the Power God — throw up their hands. Can such things be? Dreadful, horrible!—blindly oblivious of their own responsibility for the epidemic.

More startling still to the conquerors were the pitiless revelations of the Survey exhibiting in mathematical terms the cost to the human, factor of this monstrous material success. Taxation of Land Values

It is apparent from exchanges arriving from points all over the Dominion that the cause of single tax is making great progress in Canada, and also that no other reform which has ever been introduced in Vancouver has done more to advertise the city than the abolition of taxes upon improvements of landed property. Thus the Ottawa Citizen, quoting from a Calgary contemporary: "That the revenue necessary for carrying on the business of the city should be raised exclusively by a land value tax was the doctrine preached by Rev. Herbert S. Biger low to a good sized audience at the Y. M. C. A. says the Calgary News.

"This, he pointed out, would make the municipality adopting it a city living on its own income. A. city, like a man, should be self-supporting. 'If private citizens did not filch land value from the city,' said the speaker, 'the city would not have to filch taxes from private citizens.' Taxing land values only, and accumulating the city's revenue from annual ground rents, he argued, would force the people who live by the fruits of land population to go to work and become useful citizens instead of gamblers. Not only would it lift the present burden of taxation from the shoulders of the honest wealth producers, but it would reduce the cost of living to the extent of the indirect as well as the direct taxes. The land value tax would add to the cost of nothing, and would merely have the effect of cheapening the cost of land. It would put a premium on improvements, and would penalize the speculator for hanging on, and standing in the way of the city's growth.

"The speaker compared Calgary with Vancouver, and pointed out that the coast city had been wise and had got the 'no tax' sign up as an inducement first. Vancouver was able to put up the sign: 'If you stop off at Calgary you'll be taxed on the house you build. Come to Vancouver where the land speculator pays your taxes.'
