

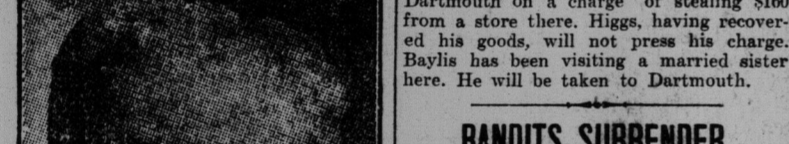

CRIPPEN SAYS "NOT GUILTY"
London Fashion Crowd

POINTED QUERIES

Crown Counsel Opens Case Against Doctor for Wife Murder—A Plain Practical Address to Jury—Millar Kissed Mrs. Crippen and Wrote Letters to Her.

London, Oct. 18.—Every seat in the chief court of the Old Bailey was filled this morning when the chief justice took his seat on the bench. Court officials, barristers and pressmen occupied most of the

limited space in the gallery and behind the dock. A fortunate few of the general public had seats. The only man in court who had eyebrows was Dr. Crippen in the spacious dock.

When the judge was seated, Crippen was summoned and stepped briskly to the front of the dock. The charge was read and Crippen answered quietly, but firmly, "Not guilty, my Lord." The jury watched closely as he stood with clasped hands leaning in the front of the dock.

Mr. Mair, referring to the dinner party in Hilldrop Crescent and the visit of the Martinetis, said witnesses were available to prove that Crippen and his wife were then on the best of terms but from the moment of their departure Mrs. Crippen passed out of the world of her friends and from that day Crippen acted as if she would never return.

Mr. Mair passed rapidly over Dew's chase and arrest, he dealt with the prosecution's theory of poisoning by lycetane and emphasized the purchase of five grains some months before Crippen.

Concluding Mr. Mair asked the jury to keep in mind these questions and it would enable them to come to a true verdict.—What had become of Belle Elmore?

Mr. Mair spoke for two hours and none seemed to be more interested in his recital than was Crippen.

The first witness, Crippen's landlady, said that Crippen was his tenant for five years leaving owing to the death of his wife.

Dr. Burroughs said that Crippen showed great grief. On cross-examination, he said that Crippen was exceedingly kind-hearted towards his wife and solicited for her comfort.

STORM IS RAGING
Jacksonville Reports Hurricane Will Likely Pass to Atlantic South of There—Practically Every Wire in South Florida is Down

St. Augustine, Fla., Oct. 18.—The entire business section of St. Augustine is flooded with in-rushing sea water today while the wind and waves are still rising with no indication of when their height will be reached. The water is pouring over the sea wall from the highest storm tide in sixteen years.

St. Augustine, Fla., Oct. 18.—With a snibbing barometer and wind slightly more violent than it was last night, it is evident that the West Indian hurricane will pass to the Atlantic south of Jacksonville. The wind has changed from northeast to east, indicating that the center of the storm is somewhere off the middle peninsula.

No loss of life has been reported. The strong northwest winds last night have increased and caused tides on the east coast higher than in years. At St. Augustine the ocean was making a clean sweep of the sea walls and the houses near are in danger, according to the last message from there.

At 4:30 this morning the Associated Press wire from Jacksonville to Tampa, the last thread of communication with any point in the storm-swept territory south of this place, was severed. Local officials of the Western Union reported that the prospects of re-establishing communication this morning were slight.

Damage to Bananas
Kingston, Ja., Oct. 18.—News from the interior of the island shows that a large area of banana fields were devastated by the severe rain and wind storm last week. The spring crop of bananas, however, has not been very seriously affected.

Savannah, Oct. 18.—At 7 o'clock this morning the wind reached 33 miles an hour and was apparently increasing steadily. The barometer at 9 o'clock read 29.75, having steadily declined since yesterday. Shipping in the harbor is preparing for the expected low and the local wireless station is trying to warn vessels at sea.

METHODIST MISSIONS

Proceedings at Meeting of Board in Toronto—Work in the Peace River District

(Toronto Mail & Empire). The opening session of the General Board of Missions of the Methodist Church in Canada was held at the Elm street Methodist Church yesterday, Dr. Chown, president.

The report of foreign missions was presented by Rev. T. E. E. Shore, general secretary. What he described as one of the most important Christian educational movements in the whole world was the proposed establishment of an inter-denominational university at Chengtu, West China.

Mr. Shore recommended the appointment of a commission to investigate the question of the readjustment of missionaries' salaries in Japan. He believes that four or five missionaries should be appointed to Japan this year, and a standard of 15 new missionaries to the foreign fields each year eventually.

Home Mission Field The report of Rev. Dr. James Allen, general secretary of Home Missions, had a glowing account of the advances of Methodist missionaries in the great Peace River country.

An outline of the legislation of the General Conference providing for local autonomy in missions in Northwestern Canada, was given, and the details of the scheme, which provides for the appointment of some of the administrative offices to Western Canada, and a partial control of the expeditions in the West.

Women's Work Groups Remarkable progress in all departments was reflected by the report of the Women's Missionary Society, which was presented by Mrs. E. W. Ross, of Hamilton.

The treasurer's report indicated a total revenue for the past year of \$620,000, a net increase of \$61,021.86. The total expenditure, including \$45,204.80, representing unused appropriations from the purchase of land from the London Missionary Society and for buildings which are in course of erection in China, and elsewhere, amounted to \$558,978.27, an increase of \$75,220.90 over last year.

From an oration on the occasion of the unveiling of the monument to the regular army officers who fell in the civil war, at West Point, N. Y., May 31, 1897.

WE stand today in the presence of a stately column, erected by soldiers and officers of the regular army of the United States, to commemorate the heroism and sacrifice of those of their number who, during the civil war, gave their lives for their country and in order that "liberty and union might remain one and inseparable, now and forever."

The greatest need of praise which can be bestowed upon the army of the United States is that it makes certain to every citizen the blessings of peace and order and law. Doubtless, as you look toward the bright fields of the future, you see dazzling before you visions of military glory.

The other voice which comes from this stately column witness is that these men died in order that there might be preserved in our country the equal rights and equal opportunities for all.

MR. CHARLES M. HAYS

In a gossip article in the Trail magazine for October is found an interesting sketch of the career of Mr. Charles M. He required a second time before the clerk who was busy at work noticed his presence. The clerk answered the question, and the manager strolled out. The young clerk was Charles M. Hays, and shortly afterwards when the manager wanted a private secretary and confidential clerk he chose the young man who had seemed more anxious to finish his work in hand than to rush off to his dinner.

JULIA WARD HOWE The death of Mrs. Julia Ward Howe recalls to the readers of New England the memories of the names of a famous group of women, who, prior to the abolition of slavery and for many years after the war exercised a remarkable influence upon the thought and action of their time. Mrs. Howe was one of the most brilliant minds in that distinguished coterie. Her mental endowment was large, her courage great, and she had withal a most gracious presence which endeared her to all. Those great women of New England of the period when Mrs. Howe was in the thick of events included such names as Mrs. Lucy Stone, Susan B. Anthony, Mary A. Livermore, Mrs. Elizabeth Cady Stanton, Alice Phoebe Cary, Dorothea Dix, Louisa M. Alcott, Francis Willard, Elizabeth Stewart Phelps, Lucretia Mott, Anna Dickinson, Clara Barton, Mrs. Ednah D. Cheney, Elizabeth Peabody and others.

duced Abraham Lincoln, William Lloyd Garrison, Wendell Phillips, Horace Greely, Henry Ward Beecher, Emerson, Holmes, Longfellow, Lowell, Whittier, Bayard Taylor and other distinguished men whose names are so familiar to readers of that period of American history. Moving in that atmosphere she won a place of such great distinction as a speaker, a writer and an advocate of the advancement of women, and of the temperance cause and moral and social reform in general, that now at her death the Mayor of Boston is able truly to say that her death removes one of the great historic figures of Boston of the past two generations.

EAST AND WEST

The manager of the C. P. R. lands department tells of a party of Americans who recently came into the Canadian west and purchased \$200,000 worth of real estate. He adds that another large party is expected before the end of this month to take up real estate to the value of between \$300,000 and \$400,000. One of the reasons that Canada is prosperous is the influx of immigrants with money to spend. Very many millions of dollars have been added to the money in circulation in the country from this source during the present year. The effect of the increase in population in the west is felt even in New Brunswick. A letter from Sackville yesterday stated that all the industries in that town are extremely busy on orders and that two of them are shipping goods in car loads to the west. Factories in St. John have also largely increased their western business, and this will continue from year to year with the growth of western population. The wide awake manufacturer who produces an article that the people need, and who is able by clever methods of publicity to convince them that his brand is the brand they should have, will find a growing market throughout the west, for many years to come. The fact is not only worth noting, but should be emphasized, that New Brunswick manufacturers are able to compete in the markets of the far west. The people of this province are becoming more and more wide-awake to their opportunities, but it is doubtful if they yet realize the advantage to them of establishing business relations with the west during the period of early growth and development in that territory. The western people will not come down here to purchase goods. The goods must be taken up to them. A number of our more enterprising manufacturers have realized this fact and have not only sent travellers to the west but have established branches in various western centres. They are rewarded by a steadily increasing demand for their products.

There are many rumors these days about real estate deals in St. John. There is just a suggestion of the boom spirit which in western towns are so well acquainted. St. John appears to be lifting its head and looking about with a more lively consciousness of its position and the development which must come to it because of that position. One of the best things that can happen to any community is to have the spirit of confidence in its own future thoroughly aroused.

The news that comes from Campbellton is of such a nature that public sympathy should once more take a substantial form. Many people are yet living in tents, and among them are women and children. The severe northern winter is at hand. These people should all be housed at the very earliest possible moment. The relief committee finds itself hampered by lack of funds. The people of other towns in Canada can hardly enjoy the comforts of their own homes to the fullest extent while they realize that in Campbellton women and children are subsisting in tents. It would appear to be necessary to organize relief committees in other centres to cooperate with that in Campbellton.

AN "EXTRA" IN THE FAMILY. (Kansas City Star). Walter Williams tells this newspaper story: When the first child arrived in the family of an editor friend of mine he and his wife named it Alpha. When the fourth came years later they decided that it was enough and called it Omega. But a year or two later No. 6 came along anyway. 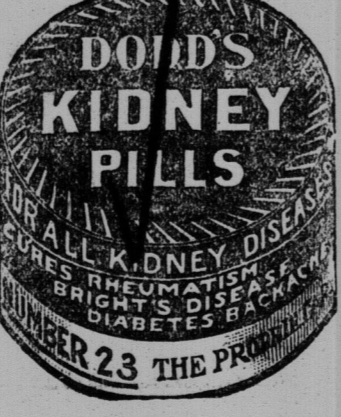

## SEE HOLD-UP IN MOVING PICTURES; BOYS Imitate

New York, Oct. 17.—Inspired by a hold-up scene on a moving picture screen, a gang of small boys in West Twenty-third street imitated the plot with such realism that James O'Keefe, aged thirteen, may lose the use of his right hand. John Breen, the eleven-year-old leader of the amateur desperadoes, as a result faces a charge against him in the children's court of having wielded a ten-inch carving knife.

O'Keefe, who is the eldest son of a widow mother, was walking along Twenty-third street in search of his dog when he was surrounded by about twenty boys. He says:

"One of the boys ordered me to halt and then the others closed around me. Before I could defend myself the boy I afterward identified as Breen pulled a carving knife from his belt and struck at my heart. I put up my right hand and caught the edge of the knife blade just above the wrist.

"When the blood poured from my arm the boys threatened to knock me down, so I ran until I met a policeman. He told me to run home, but I had walked only a block when I fainted.

"Some people who saw me fall took me to a drug store, where a man helped me to the home of Dr. F. W. Whitney. He bandaged my arm and sent me home, where I fainted a second time. That night my mother took me to the police station, where the man behind the desk told me to go back to the policeman in West Twenty-third street."

With the big carving knife as an exhibit, Breen told Assistant Clerk Le Mon of the children's court that he had no motive for the stabbing, but the boys were playing "hold-up" as they had seen it in the moving picture shows. They say O'Keefe, who was at once selected as the victim of the plot. After the stabbing several members of the gang attempted to flee from the children's court, but were ejected from the platform by the conductor.

Breen was remanded to the Children's Society, where he told that he had spent much time in picture shows while his father and two brothers were at work. Mrs. Breen, his mother is an invalid, and the authorities, believing that the boy had been thrown into the county jail, ordered him held for trial as a child under improper guardianship.

"Have you been reading dime novels?" asked Mr. Le Mon, when Breen was arrested.

"Now, the moving pictures for mine," replied the boy.

Moving pictures are blamed for the arrest of William Hooch, 12 years old, who was charged in the Children's Court by his aunt, Mrs. Helena Kroesen, with having entered her apartments and stolen \$88 which she had placed in a closet.

Mrs. Kroesen said her nephew had the moving picture habit so firmly that he spent all the change he could gather to see the shows. The boy was paroled in the custody of his parents for further examination.

## MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES

Bishop Casey confirmed sixty-five persons at Stanley, York county, yesterday. Today he was to go to Kingsclear and Cork Settlement to administer confirmation.

The deadlock in the committee of four appointed by the Democratic convention of eleven votes for Eugene N. Foss, over Charles S. Hamlin, the committee adjourned last night without reaching a decision.

Sam. Ponsessa, an Italian quarryman in Hagersville, Ont., was arrested yesterday on a charge of having caused the death of his eight months old child by whipping it severely when it cried.

Two firms—Charles Minzesheimer & Co. and Thomas G. Gaylard, doing business under the firm name of Latham, Alexander & Co.,—of New York, stock brokers, assigned yesterday for the benefit of their creditors. Their liabilities aggregate nearly \$2,000,000. It is expected that an arrangement will be made for the former to continue as their assets are almost sufficient to meet the liabilities.

Returns from the New South Wales elections show that the Labor party has carried the state by a majority of two. The Wade government lost nine seats, including the premier and two colleagues. MacGown, who will be premier, was formerly a boiler maker in the government railway workshop.

The city council of Montreal yesterday passed a resolution censuring Mayor Nathan of Rome, on behalf of the Catholic population of Montreal, for his "disparaging insults," to the Pope. Five aldermen protested against the action and the Municipal Association of the city also filed a strong protest against the council dealing with the matter.

The new Michigan Central Railway tunnel under the Detroit river was opened to passenger traffic yesterday.

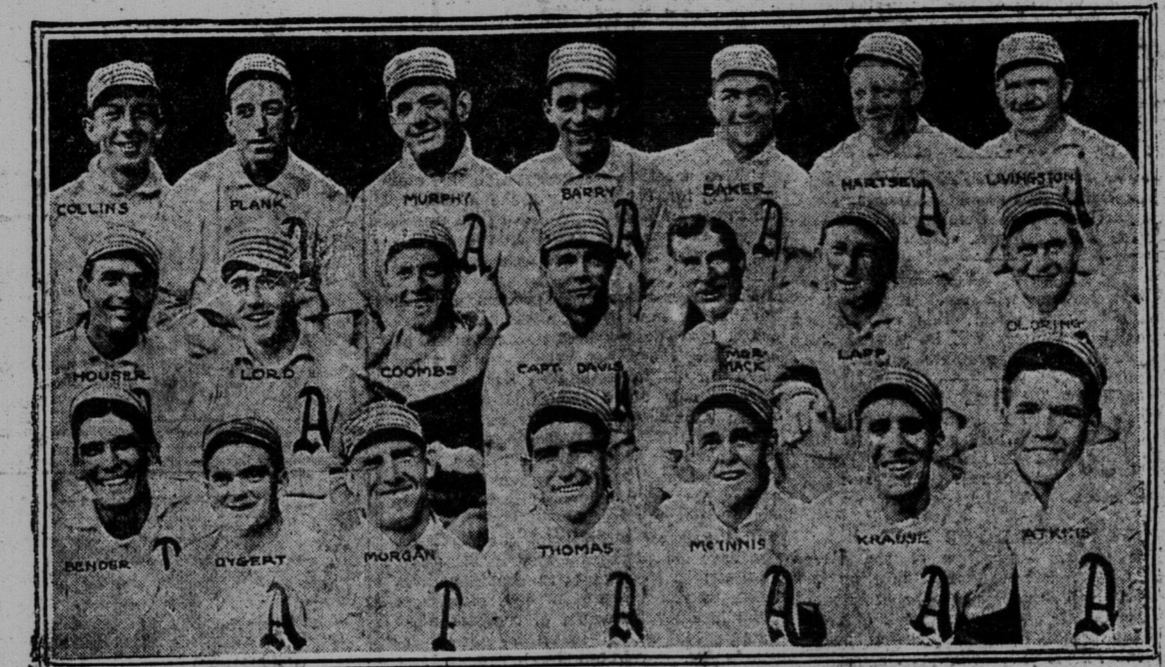

**ATHLETICS DOWN THE CUBS IN FIRST WORLD'S SERIES GAME**

Chicago Beaten 4 to 1 Chiefly By the Great Work of Bender, the Philadelphias' Pitcher—Overall Out of the Box After the Third Inning



Philadelphia, Oct. 17.—In a clean and sharply played game the Philadelphia American League base ball champions defeated the Chicago Cubs, the premier team of the National League, at Shibe Park this afternoon by the score of 4 to 1 in the first contest of the series to decide the world's championship. Nearly 30,000 persons saw the game.  
 To Charles Albert Bender, the Chipewas Indian pitcher, and to Frank Baker, the third baseman, the Philadelphia team largely owes its victory. The "Chief" never showed better form than he did when he faced the Chicago men this afternoon. Baker's valuable contribution was his hard and timely hitting.  
 On the other hand, the American champions found Overall rather easy, and after completing to retire the star pitcher and send McIntyre into the box. The latter promptly stopped the Athletics and held them without hit until the eighth inning, when Baker landed on one of his curves for a terrific smash to the right field for two bases.  
 Bender, who won the only game the Athletics took from the New York Nationals in the world series 1905, allowed the Chicago men but three hits, one in the first inning by Schulte, two in the ninth and not until the final inning. If it had not been for the muffing of Tinker's foul fly by Thomas in the eighth, the Philadelphia would have been disposed of with but two hits, as the little stopper hit the next ball for a clean single and Baker, who was as steady as a clock and appeared to be the master at every stage of the game. Besides getting only three hits, the National League were able to work him for only two bases on balls, one by Schulte and one by Thomas in the fourth inning and the other in the ninth.  
 Overall, who was elected by Captain Chance to win the first game, got away with the first inning in fine shape, though Collins, the star second-baseman of the Athletics, hit a single, but he got deep trouble in the second when the home team batted him for three hits, one a single and two doubles.  
 The crowd that saw this game was not the largest that ever attended a base ball game in this city. The official count of the attendance is 26,801 and the total receipts \$37,424.93. Of this amount the players will receive \$20,300.28, the club owners \$13,472.82, and the National Commission \$3,724.65.  
 The failure of a record crowd to attend was due partly to the inability of thousands to obtain reserved seat tickets and to the fact that the police department would not permit any one to stand in the aisles of the grandstand. The National Commission had arranged to sell several thousand standing room tickets in the grandstand, but after eighty-eight of them had been disposed of the police shut down on the sale.  
 The ninth inning was the most exciting of the entire game. As Bender walked out to the field the crowd, which had started to leave, called on him to skip out the Nationalists, but it was deemed to be a disappointment. Tinker, the first man up, hit to center field for a single and took second when Strunk fumbled the ball. Kling singled and Tinker scored. With one run in and one man on base, and no one out, the crowd became anxious, but the Indian did not waver. Beaumont went in to bat for McIntyre and sent a weak grounder to Collins, who tossed a tremendous chering. Shulte drew his second base on balls, then up came Hofman, always a dangerous man at bat. With two on the bases, a home run over the fence would tie the score, but Bender lightened up and the fast center fielder grounded to Baker, who stepped on third, and Kane, who was running for

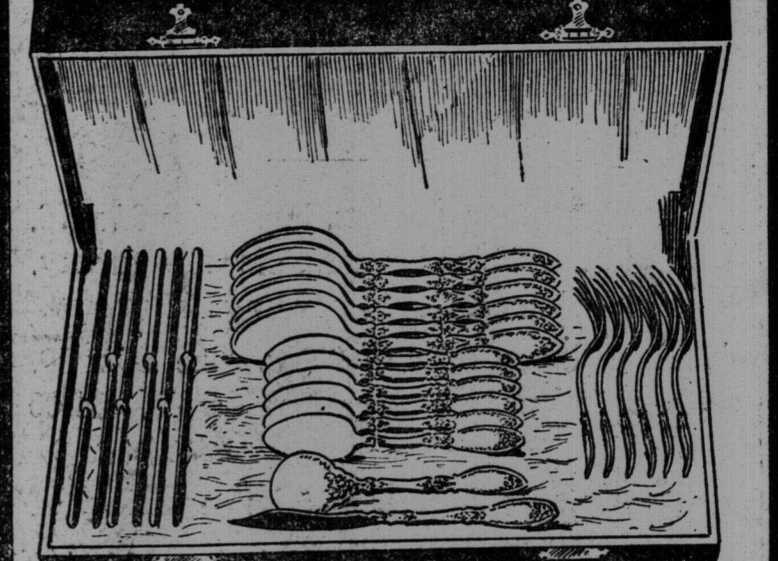

**THE TRAPPIST IN CANADA**

**The Silent Monks and their Work At the Monastery of Oka**  
 Not many people know that in Canada the Silent Monks, that strange medieval order of the Cistercians known as Trappists have settled at half-a-dozen different points, and farmed the soil of the Dominion with excellent success. Mrs. Georgina Newhall, in October Canadian Monthly (formerly Canada-West), gives an account of them that is novel and interesting.  
 "As early as 1881," says Mrs. Newhall, "a party of Trappist monks had established a house at Two Mountains—a little four-roomed cottage, three of the rooms being bedrooms or a sacristy, as necessity demanded, and the fourth—kitchen, dining-room—laboratory—lecture room, etc. By 1888 three hundred acres of ground had been cleared and a dairy had been established from which the surrounding country benefited, not only by the sale of milk, but by lessons learned from the scientific methods of the Brotherhood.  
 "In time a fine edifice displaced the four-roomed cottage, and in 1893 a school of agriculture in connection with the abbey was subsidized by the government of Quebec province. On the twenty-third of July, 1902, this fine building was destroyed by fire. Today a magnificent structure, beautiful but austere in style, the embodiment of all that is ideal in the traditions of the Cistercians, nestles between the hills—a picturesque incident in a panorama which rivals the scenery of the famed Hudson.  
 "The community itself has increased to more than one hundred, apart from the juvenets, who are studying here, and preparing themselves to join when they are of age.
