

Potato Diseases

EARLY BLIGHT.

While quite destructive, this disease is not to be compared with late blight and its damaging effects. It is easily distinguished from the latter by its different appearance. It is really a leaf blight, attacking the leaves and green stems. The first indication of its presence is the appearance on the leaves of rather light brown spots. which soon become hard and brittle. The disease progresses rather slowly, the spots gradually becoming larger, particularly near the edges of the \$2,000,000 per annum, but that the time the plants soon die for lack of value of our fisheries have increased nourishment. 
