# **BISHOP CASEY ON**

A Sun reporter interviewed his lordship Bishop Casey last night with reference to the relation between the Vatican and the French government.

"At such a distance as this," said his lordship, "and with what appear to me as very biased despatches, I freely admit that it is quite impossible to form a very satisfactory idea as to the outcome of the present unhappy conditions in France. The law itself—styled the Law of Separation—carries with it a stamp of misrepresentation.

"Separation by no means withdraws the right of existence. Church and state are separated in this country as well as in the United States; but with this separation the church is allowed true liberty. She can possess her church buildings, her asylums, her orphanages, clerical residences, like any other citizen or corporation. In France, by present interpretation, 'separation' means confiscation, spoliation, robbery of the millions of dollars' worth of property which arose from the gratuitous offerings of the faithful for many centuries. The outrages implied by these words would not be so acceptable to the outside world, at least to those who have due sense of honesty, virtue and justice. Therefore a more pleasant word has been adopted, and the said outrages are concealed under the guise of the Law of Separation.

"The priests, too," Bishop Casey pointed out, "are to be sentenced to certain disabilities. They will have no legal status. Very much worse measures are threatened that will render them powerless for the functions of their sacred office. Such things as these might pass without comment in ages of persecution. In modern times those ages and those persecutions have been mercilessly scored. It seems to me the these modern times should not

It seeems to me that any reasonable mind must admit that no one can accept with firm faith the teachings of a church which must formulate its doctrines according to the dictation of those not of the fold."

Their general synod did not meet until 1908, and until then mo action could be taken. No discussion was heard on the subject, the matter being entirely left to the committee.

The sub-committee on church polity reported no important alterations. The secretary, Walter Murray, of Dalhousie University, Halifax, read the report.

Dr. J. R. Inch, superintendent of education for New Brunswick,says the people of that province are mostly in favor of union. He is a strong advocate of it, and believes progress is being made towards that end. The Baptists and Anglicans, he thinks, may join later.

C. Bell of Halifax states the general feeling in Nova Scotia is favorable to union. He expects the province a being the unanimous feeling for union in the west. There would be no forcing of the matter, he said, but the outlook was very hopeful, as things seemed all to be favorable.

Rev. Principal Gordon of Queens University, Kiugston, said there seemed to him to be an opportunity in Canada today for the union of the various sections of the Protestant church such as had not been afforded in any country for a hundred years, perhaps not since the reformation.




