ANOTHER BAD SLUMP IN THE STOCK MARKETS TODAY

Bank of England Increases BURYING VICTIMS the Discount Rate—Effect is Felt on the Different

LONDON, Aug. 15.—The directors of the Bank of England after a prolonged discussion today raised the bank's discount rate from four to four and a half per cent. owing to the monetary situation on the continent and in New York, and the anxiety of American York, and the anxiety of American houses to place finance bills and notes which is taken to indicate possible gold shipments to New York in the near future.

The recent foreign competition for the gold arrivals evidently helped the directors to arrive at their decision, and the usual demands for Egypt as well as South Africa must be met be-fore the year end. The reserve will be sufficiently depleted without such

discount rate.

The stock market experienced a renewed depression this morning, chiefly owing to yesterday's break in New York, and although not much stock changed hands, prices weakened in all directions, the depression being accentuated by the advance in the bank rate. Consols declined 5 1-6 to 8 1-8. Americans started 1 to 5 points below yesterday's prices and fell quickly when the high bank rate was announced, but

NEW YORK, Aug. 15.—Another sharp break in the prices of stocks characterized the opening of the stock market today following the lead set by Lontoday following the lead set by London, where the prices of American's tocks slumped today on the announcement of the increase in the Bank of England's rate of discount. Amalgamated Copper which has been in the storm centre of price depression lately, again was the leader of the downward movement at today's opening here. scoring an initial drop of 3% points from yesterday's closing prices of 69%. Childless Marriages a Cause—Rate High
Among Germanic Nations.

Among 1,000,000 suicides of all classes, it has been found that 205 married men with children destroyed their lives; 470 married men without children.

With respect to the women, 45 married women with, and 158 without, children committed suicide, while 104 widows with, and 238 without off-spring, completed the list.

On the face of things, says the Illustrated London News, it would appear that in childless marriages the number of men suicides is doubled and in women trebled. Leaving the case of actual insane persons out of the count, it would also appear that in males suicide is more frequent than in females. Equally interesting is that phase of the subject which deals with the causes. One table dealing with 6,723 cases shows one-seventh caused by misery, ope twenty-first part by loss of fortune, one forty-third by gambling, one-nineteenth by love affairs, one ninth by domestic troubles, one-skty-sizth by fanaticism, and by foiled ambitton and remorse one-seventh and one twenty-seventh respectively.

The geography of suicide is also of high interest. Westcott says the highest proportion in Europe is shown by the Germanic races, Saxxory having "the largest suicide rate of any country." In Norway the rate was very large for a time, its decrease being at Miss Lea Hebert left on the steamer.






