GRAND DUKE SERGIUS.

ST. PETERSBURG, Jan. 30, 12.25 p. m.-Evidence is accumulating that Emperor Nicholas throughout the present crisis has acted largely upon the advice of Grand Duke Sergius, who is the most reactionary member of the imperial family, the head of what is denominated the war party, and whom the liberals stigmatize as Russia's evil genius. With the first appearance of Father Gopon in the movement, Sergius urged the necessity of putting down the demonstrations in the most energetic manner. The Ontario election should have no effect on the federal government policy in this matter. The conservative success in the provincial campaign should not make the federal government unjust to that one province, if no other was concerned. Much less should it lead to injustice to six other provinces which were not concerned in the Ontario contest. Therefore, if the Lau rier government had concluded that it was right to make the readjustment demanded, the policy should be carried through in spite of the Ontario incident, Mr. Whitney will not refuse the increase, and there is no reason to suppose that he will make worse use of it than Mr. Ross would. We shall be able to judge by the event whether the government has taken up the question in the interest of the country at large or was merely making a campaign use of the agitation.

## MORE FIGHTING.

The official reports to St. Petersburg and Tokio from the armies in Manchuria show that heavy fighting has taken place. It would appear that both armies were engaged in considerable force, one report stating that eight corps of Russians were in the fight. Allowing for the fact that these corps, comprising altogether thirty to forty regiments of artillery, and perhaps ten of cavalry, would now be a good deal under strength, this would mean that no less than 75,000 Russian troops were engaged.

Both sides claim the victory, which is not a new thing in reports from the battle fields. Nor will it be easy for the reader to determine which claim is the stronger, except by recailing the reports of previous engagements concerning which conflicting reports were sent to the respective capitals. ter favors Tokio, for the Japanese commanders have not hitherto been over sanguine in their reports. Moreover, the Russian despatch admits that the army has been obliged to withdraw from one position which had been captured.

The Japanese and Russian officers do not have the same war maps. They do not give the places the same names, and as it appears that most Chinese geographical positions offer a large choice of names, the result to the cursory reader is confusing.

But one thing is clear. Work has been resumed in the firing line, in spite of the cold and blustering weather, which seems to be somewhat the same in Manchuria as it is here.





A circular issued yesterday by the labor department gives an interesting account of the general condition of industry in Canada during the past year, showing that on the whole industrial activity was lower, though the west showed marked advance. The wages

movement was practically stationary, though farm and unskilled labor received a higher remuneration than ever before. Prices of staple commodities were higher than in 1903. In the number of strikes and lockouts the year showed a great improvement, the total number of disputes in existence being only 103 as compared with 160 in the preceding year and 123 in 1902. The number of workingmen involved in strikes during 1904 was 15,655, and the loss of time in working days approximately 278,956. An interesting feature is the report of industrial accidents in Canada during the past

A very interesting review of the issue





"I believe the meeting just held will be a historical one, and consequently was much pleased to accept the invitake part in the proceedings," said Mr. McNeill to the Sun.

"The society has an important work before it, and should be of great value to the fruit growing interests of the

province." Mr. McNeill believes that there is a reasonably good prospect of a great fruit growing industry being developed in this province. Although comparatively little attention has been

given in the past to apple culture, there are at present in the province over four hundred thousand bearing trees. This, of course, is much smaller than should be the case, and falls into insignificance when it is remembered that Kings county alone in Nova Sco-

tia has two-thirds that number. Mr. McNeill said he had not the slightest hesitation in saying that there are districts in this province quite as large as the county mentioned which are equally well adapted for the growth of apples, although perhaps not of the same varieties. A recently issued volume of statistics which Mr. MoNeill had in his possession showed that for every three acres of occupied land Ontarie had one ap-

ple tree. Nova Scotla has a tree for every five acres, while New Brunswick




