Mr. Chamberlain, then Secretary for the Colonies, presided, and introduced the question in a frank and manly way, detailing the vast burden which this defence, and salling the Pacific waters. this defence entailed, showing that it was borne almost entirely by the Mother Country, and, whilst neither beg ging for help nor dictating in any manner to the Colonies, he asked their careful consideration, and would welcome any part they might decide to take in sharing the burden with Great Britain.
