Norwegian Government Asks Lloyd George Receives Hun-Indemnity for Sinking of Tank Steamer by German

London, April 7.—A Christiania despatch to Reuter's Telegram Company says that the report of a committee of experts submitted to the government confirms the fact that the Norwegian tank steamer Belridge, the first Norwegian ship to be damaged in the war zone around the British Isles, was torpedoed. The damage to the ship is estimated at approximately \$67,000, and, the despatch adds, the government will now present to Germany a demand for indemnification.

M. HAYTER REED, manager of the C. P. R. hotel system, has had a more varied and picturesque experience than falls to the lot of most. On the list of April he retires from active service. Mr. Reed was in the Northwest when that vast region was given over to wild Indians who were in a state of nature except for a breech clout; when the buffalo were in millions; when Fort Garry (now Winnipeg) was a trading post and held a few people; when there was neither town nor city but vast wilderness. Mr. Reed was acting brigade-major of the 6th military district in 1870; he was transferred to the Northwest force and stationed at Fort Garry, and he acted as its adjutant until its disbandment. Transferred to Indian Department, he rose, successively, to be Indian agent, assistant manager, commissioner, and deputy superintendent of indian affairs for the Dominion, and retired in 1897. He was a member of the Northwest Council, and, for a time, acted as lieuteant covernor for the Territories. Fifteen years ago he entered the service of the Canadian Pacific, as manager of the Chateau Frontenac at Quebec, and became, in time, manager of the entire hotel system of the company.

In the course of some fugitive talk about his early days Mr. Reed said, "They could not keep the Indians on the reservation so long as the buffalo would come north. I have seen them in millions on the plains. The Indians would stalk the buffalo on horseback, and then shoot what they wanted—throwing a knife or blanket beside the carcass to indicate ownership. Then the squaw, or squaws, for a good hunter always had more than one—would come in carts, which held their lares and penates—and skin the buffalo disappeared a little *more quickly, at least on the American side, on account of the bounty offered for killing them."

Mr. Reed was a volunteer in 1870 under Lord Wolseley in connection with the Fenian Raids. He was on duty at Cornwall and the west in that connection; but his early experiences in the West, when that territory was a sort of No Man's Land, were



MACHINERY HALL AS SHELL FACTORY

Part of Exhibition Building will be utilized as foundry for shells.

The machinery hall at the exhibition building is to be fitted up for the manufacture of shell cases for the Allied armies. Arrangements for the lease of the hall has been underway for several days and at the meeting of the city commissioners yesterday afternoon, T. McAvity & Sons Ltd. were granted a lease of the hall with the boiler and engine at the rate of \$500 a year.

The matter came before the meeting as a resolution from Commissioner or McLellan as follows:

That the machinery hall on the exhibition grounds be rented to T. Mc-Avity & Sons Ltd. for the term of one year or portion thereof as may be year or portion thereof as may be recursing shells, such tenancy to be terminated at any time by one month's notice on either side. Rental will be at the rate of \$500 per annum, payable or and engine at their own expense and to pay any extra insurance premium which may be required.

Commissioner McLellan announced that machinery for the shaping up and smoothing of the shells would be placed in position and the plant would be operated night and day. It was the intention to employ 160 hands at first. Afterward it was likely that the number of men would be increased to 300. It has the armies of the Empire needed shell and the plan to utilize the machinery hall in this way should commend itself to all. It is understood that the machines will be installed at once.


