

ENORMOUS AMOUNT OF PROPERTY DAMAGED ALONG BLAIR'S CREEK, NEAR TAZEWELL. TENN - COMMUNICATION CUT OFF.

Middlesboro, Kentucky, Aug. 3.—Between fifteen and twenty-five persons were drowned and enormous property damage sustained by a cloud burst on Blair's Creek, near Tazewell, Tenn., last night, according to a report which reached here today.

Telephone messages from there said about one hundred persons lived along the creek, and of these only a few have been accounted for. Nine bodies have been recovered.

Communication, which normally is not of the best, has been practically cut off. Two bridges on the Southern Railroad, between Middlesboro and Knoxville, are washed away, and train service is at a standstill.

SIX MACHINES TOOK PART IN THE FIASCO

German Airmen Took No Chances in Inland Towns -Berlin Report of Raid Typical Piece of German Fiction.

London, Aug. 3—Six German air-ships took part in the raid on the eastern counties of England, this morning, according to an official announcement issued this afternoon, which says eighty bombs are reported to have been dropped. Nine horses were killed and three horses were injured, the statement adds.

The text of the official statement follows:

"Seygral hostile airships attacked.

"Several hostile airships attacked the eastern and southeastern counties last night. The first reports were received about midnight. From these, it seems that not less than six airships were attacking the counties of Norfolk, Suffolk and Essex, more or less simultaneously. The raid lasted about an hour and a half.

"Except at one point, the raiders did not penetrate very far inland, but contented themselves with dropping a few bombs at a time on widely distant localities, mainly near the sea. Several bombs, are reported to have fallen into the sea.

"Anti-aircraft guns came into action in one locality, but the raiders there attacked made good their escape.






