ONLY THREE OF THE NINE PRESIDENTS OF FRANCE HAVE COMPLETED TERM OF OFFICE

One Was Assassinated While in Office, and a Second Died from Natural Causes-Four Others Were Forced to Resign Because of Opposition to Presidential Policies— Only One Was Re-elected—Precedent Qreated Favoring the Elevation of Presiding Officer of Two Legislative Bodies to Presidency.

Parts, Jan. 13.—Approach of the Presidential election in France, January 17th, recalls the fact that of the nine Presidents who have eccupied the Elysee Palace since the advent of the third republic, in 1870, only three—Emil Loubet, Armand Fallieres and Raymond Poincare—have completed their terms of office. President Adolphe Thiers, the first chief executive after the Franco-Prussian war, resigned after a little more than two years of his seven in office-specause of hostilly on the part of the president to his conservative palier, which he ity on the part of the majority to his conservative policy, which he believed necessary to prevent friction and dissolution of the young

the Monarchist Majority as successor to M. Thiers, and a hero of the war of the Second Empire, served five years and seven morths. He then qui his post, forced out by the Republicans who, meanwhile, had been able to vrest the majority from the Me

Jules Grevy followed Marshal Mc Mahon, acquiring power by his energetic fight against the latter's admin istration. He alone of all the nine Presidents was re-elected. After serving two years of his Second term however, he was compelled to retire because he refused to abandon his sori-n-law, Danfel Wilson, a prominend eputy, who was accused of trafficking in decorations of the Legion of Honor and using Elysse Palace as an agency for his corrupt practices.

An assassin's bullet took off the next of the presidents of France after he had gon near to the end of his term.

M. Sadi Carnot, while attending the exposition at Lyons in 1894, was struck down by the Italian enarchist Santo Casenio. Three days after the trugic death of President Carnot, Perier was elected to fill the vacancy. After three months he resigned charging the Republicans in Parliament with lack of support against the defamatory attacks of the Socialists. Felix Faure died at the Birssee of Cerebral hemorrhage in the fifth year of his administration.

The fact that Presidents Grevy, Carnot, Perier, and Faure served as presidents of the Chamber of Deputies, and that President Loubet and Fallieres were precidents of the Senate has created a precedent favoring the elevation of the presiding officers of the two hodies to the chief magistracy. President Poincare, broke this precedent seven years ago, but established another which would favor taking the president from the cabinet, of which he was a member, and would redound to the profit of Premier Clemenceau, who was one of the strongest opponents of M. Poincare's candidacy.

The occupation of Balaistation, about fifty miles east of Krasnoyarsk, is also reported.

The communication says that in the Reval region fighting continues with alternating success, and in the direction of Jacobstadt the Bolsheviki retired about six and a half miles east of the River Dubna.

The United States, it was said, had not waived its claim to a percentage of the additional tonnage to be delivered by Germany under the terms of the Peace Treaty.

The United States Government has refused to accept any part of indemnity to be paid by Germany for the destruction of the German feet in Scapa Flow because it objects in principle to the settlement made by the Supreme Council, it was stated today at the State Department.

Germany, in compensation for the destruction of the surrendered warships, is required to deliver to the Allies certain inland steamers and harpor facilities such as floating docks and tugs, and the Council had decided to allocate two per cent, of this material to the United States. Ambassador Wallace informed the Council that if its decision with respect to the award was final, the United States would was final, the United States would waive its claim to any part of the Indemnity.





WELLINGTON LEAGUE.

A description of the disorder which courred at Lahore last April was gives to Lord Hunter's Commission on November 24 by Lieut.-Colonel Frank Johnson, who was in charge of Lahore civil area, which included a population of 240,000 people, from April 15 to May 29. Referring to a graph which he had prepared, showing the rise and fall of the disturbance, Cobonel Johnson explained that the fall occurred after the shooting at Amritisar. During the period of martial law in Lahore, witness proceeded, not a shot was fired with the exception of three rounds which exploded accidentally.

Replying to Lord Hunter as to what was his opinion of the necessity of otherwise of martial law, Colonel Johnson said that he thought then, as he did now, that it undoubtedly saved Lahore from much worse trouble than that which occurred in Amritear. Its effects had been instantaneous.


