To the Editor of the Tribune. Sir: I observe in your paper of the 5th inst. an editorial paragraph on the present position of affairs with regard to the 2nd Band, which is headed with the title of the '2nd Band—Who Purchased the Instruments An Officer's View.' The tone of this paragraph is fair and reasonable, and a just subject for future consideration.

In another column, however, is a paragraph which presents the ideas of the men who were formerly bandmen, which ideas it is needless to say are totally at variance with those contained in your editorial comment.

The leading officers who subscribed to the Band fund all did so with the distinct proviso and understanding that the officer who presented the subscription list would be exclusively a military one and under military control, and that the officer commanding the 2nd Battalion should be deemed to hold the property in trust for the officers who subscribed to the Band fund, and after a short time had heard of the further of Band or Instruments, that they would no longer be victimized in this way and must require that guarantee of a strict military control.

The unexpected manner in which Newfoundland has been excluded from participating in the benefits, such as they are, of the Treaty of Washington, is another example of the American sharp practice, bad faith, harshness, or whatever you like. It was taken for granted that Newfoundland was to come under the operation of the treaty just as soon as it was ratified by the high contracting parties, and its provisions applied to that part of the coast.

It never entered into the imaginations of people that the treaty could be interpreted so as to exclude Newfoundland; yet she stands excluded. The British High Commissioner, as they left the exclusion of the consequential claims, to be inferred from an honest interpretation of the treaty, instead of having them expressed plainly in black and white, had the right to that out from the markets of the United States to the great surprise both of her fishermen and of the United States importers of fish and oils.

The latest phase of the matter is given in the following from the Boston Post: despatch says the following telegram was received at the State Department a few days ago, a copy of which has been transmitted to the Treasury Department: 'Consul Molloy, at St. John, N. B., states that he has good reason to believe that parties at that port have shipped and are about shipping to Halifax, per Allan line steamers, codfish and other products of Newfoundland with the intention of re-shipping the same to the United States as products of Canada, thus evading the duties under the Washington Treaty. He has to request that you will please issue a proper order to your subordinate to prevent the perpetration of such frauds on the revenue.' Instructions have, in accordance with the requests of the State Department, been issued to Collectors of the ports of New York, Boston, Eastport, Portsmouth, Providence, Gloucester, New Bedford, Portland and Newburyport. The Government of Newfoundland disclaims the authority of the State Department of Washington to pass upon the language of the Treaty of Washington. By the terms of Article 18 of the Treaty, it is provided that Newfoundland is included under Article 18 of the treaty, and as Newfoundland was in every way conformable to the requirements of the treaty, it is entitled to all the privileges granted to the Dominion. It is the intention therefore of the parties to enter the products of Newfoundland into the United States under protest, applying to the Supreme Court of the United States as the only authority to interpret the treaty.

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We should not be surprised to find, as the result of the proposed appeal, that the United States Government had been even too sharp in its practice for the United States Courts. Newfoundland, land, however, instead of trusting to this relief, should enter the Dominion, and thus obtain the coveted privileges.

The betrothal of Prince Arthur, of England, to Princess Thyra, of Denmark, is announced, and one may expect that the question of increasing his allowance will be forcibly agitated. It may possibly, enter into the next general election.

The potter business carried on at Crouville by Messrs. A. & J. W. They have also recently commenced to make stone jugs and the stock already produced compares very favorably with the imported article. Their domestic ware is turned out in immense quantities, and finds a very ready market in the Maritime Provinces. In tobacco pipes they produce the Woodstock, miter, T. D. and short patterns. Their pipes are now in general use, and we presume the importation of this important appendage to the tobacco trade is almost ceased. Considering the very low prices at which these pipes are sold, and the various processes which they undergo in the manufacture, the successful and profitable pursuit of this branch is certainly marvellous.
