> DISSOLVING BONES FOR FER-TILIZER

Following is in substance what Prof. W. C. Stubbe, of the Louis-

iana Experiment station, has to say about dissolving bones to be used as The following method of the treatnent of bones has been successful in my hands, and is so easy to perform nd the chemicals needed are accessible to every one, that I recommend its use to every farmer who has a tew hundred pounds of bones on hand. Break 100 pounds of ones into small fragments and pack in a light cask, with 100 goords of good wood ashes which have been previously mixed with twenty-five pounds of dry water slacked lime and twelve pounds o powdered 'sal soda' (washing soda) revenues, without going further in Twenty gallons of water will sathe direction of breeding than the usual force of farm teams will justify urate the mass, and more may be added as required. In two or three weeks the bones will be soft enough to be turned out on a floor and mixed with two bushels of good soil.
