Paris, May 17 .- The romantic and un expected discovery of Victor Hugo's "Journal de l'Exile," in Paris is the abournal de l'Exile," in Paris is the absorbing topic in literary circles. It is said that the papers were hid in a chest of drawers and sold by some servant unknown to Hugo's sister-in-law, Mme. Chenay, who occupied Hauteville House for some years after Hugo's death. The journal includes about a thousand letters, sent to Hugo by prominent men in various countries, and for this and other reasons is very valuable. Messrs. Vacquerie and Maurice, the literary executors of Victor Hugo, were ignorant of the existence of these manuscripts, and will probably take these manuscripts, and will probably take steps to recover them.

London, May 17.—Another big river in Africa now has a steamboat on its waters for the first time. The mysterious river Juba empties into the Indian Ocean a little south of the Equator. Its upper course a unknown, though many explorers have tried to follow it through the dangerous country of the Somalis. Its mouth has just been entered by the stern-wheel eleanment Kenia, and the purpose is to ascend the river, if the natives permit, as far as it is navigable. In 1882-83 the French explorer Revoil ascended along the banks of the river from its mouth about 150 miles up stream. He is the only explorer who has told much about the fiver, and it is not known at all for at least two-thirds of its extent. Railway to Damascus.

LONDON, May 17.—While the railroad between the Mediterranean and Jerusalem between the Mediterranean and overage is still building, a more ambitious project is about to be inaugurated in Palestine. English capitalists have secured a concession giving them the right to build a rail-band term. tion giving them the right to build a railtoad from Acre, on the coast, to Damascus.
The Bay of Acre is eight miles across, and
penetrates the coast for three miles. On
the north side is the famous town of Acre,
the last stronghold of the Christians in
Palestine in the time of the Crusaders. On
the south side of the bay is the walled town of
Haifa. The railroad is to commence at these
two places. It will unite after a few miles
and then proceed along the eastern foot of
Mount Carmel, past Nazareth to the River
Jordan, along the eastern shore of the Sea
of Galilee, and thence across the plain of
Damascus to the big city. Damascus will
be the terminus of the line for awhile, but
it may be indefinitely extended at some
future time, as it is believed this route will
be the beginning of a trunk railroad to connect the Mediterranean and the Persian
Gulf. The railroad te Damascus will be
about 120 miles in length, 110 of which
will ran over plains, leaving only ten miles

The Plot Against the Czar.

BERLIN, May 17 .- Details of the plot to kill the Czar have reached here. A week ago two French detectives arrived at the Gatchina and began a careful investiga-tion of the place, one in the disguise of a coachman and the other in that of an as-sistant cook. Two days after their areistant cook. Two days after their arrival they reported that the whole palace had been found to be undermined, that the underground chamber beneath the Czar's sleeping room was already half filled with appleatives, and that the Nikilists back of the plot would have started the explosion doubtlessly the next time the Czar slept at the palace had they not been frightened away by the signs of discovery of their

away by the signs of discovery of their plot.

The undermining had been done by means of a tunnel which led to a hill not 300 yards from the palace, and which must have been the work of many months. Spades, picks, and boring tools were found near the entrance in the side of the hill. This entrance was concealed by a large rock, around which the sod was laid so carefully as not to betray its frequent disturbance. The plotters must have worked at night and have left before daybreak, as all the surrounding country was carefully watched. The plot was known in a general way to exist, yet the Czar's police were unable todiscover its details, or even to fix its location definitely. The cellars and grounds of the Gatchina Palace were carefully examined and upon finding nothing the detectives decided that the conspirators had not begun to act. The Paris detectives were then summoned.

AWFUL FLOODS.

Four Hundred Square Miles Inundated -15,000 Families Homeless.

ST. Louis, Mo., May 18 .- Instead of in proving the flood situation feels more serious each hour. The water is still rising, with no immediate prospects of a fall. Rains during the past few a fall. Rains during the past few days have greatly swollen the river. It has been estimated that the area under It has been estimated that the area under water in the section immediately surrounding St. Louis on both sides of the river is 400 square miles of fertile lands, the depth being from two to twenty feet. Fully 15,000 families have left their homes, with 15,000 families have left their homes, with little prospect of an early return. The main suffering is in the American Botton and Missouri Point. As an instance of suffering in the former locality there are nearly 500 people gathered on the bluff, for whom St. Ciair county, Ill., has asked to supply food and shelter. Missouri Point, the land lying between the Missouri and Mississippi triangle of land—27 miles of land or iver side by 12 at the Missisuri and Mississippi triangle of land— 27 miles of land on river side by 12 at the base—is covered with water, and everyone has been driven to higher ground. Boschert, a town three miles north of St. Charles, is all under water. Ten miles above a strip of land under condemnation proceeding for the benefit of the new Missouri, Kansas and Texas inlet to St. Louis, has been washed away. An immense amount of damage has been done to farming land in St. Louis county, west of this city.

FACTORIES AND THEIR SURROUNDINGS.

1. The present is the best time to see that all the drainage facilities of the factory are adequate and in good order.

2. Whey runs, spouts and tanks should be put into such order that leaking will be prevented.

3. If there be a leakage anywhere from floors, spouts or tanks, which is not immediately preventible, provision should be made at once for the drainage of the waste,

made at once for the drainage of the waste, if only by shallow open trenches. A liberal supply of lime and gypsum should be spread around such places.

4. If the factory buildings are not painted, and will not be painted, get them whitewashed this month. A whitewashed curing-room of imperfect construction, can be kept 10 degrees cooler in summer than one not whitewashed.

5. Make and keep the surroundings of the factory neat and tidy.

6. Give every part of the factory a thorough cleaning and keep it in a sweet state all summer.

7. Before the curing-room contains any cheese, tuminate it by hurning some

cheese, tumigate it by burning some sulphur mixed in alcohol. That will help

suppur mixed in alcohol. That will help to prevent the growth of mould on the outside of the cheese.

S. The leisure hours of May, before the large flow of milk is received, should be employed putting all the apparatus, appliances, utensils and machinery into the best of working order.

9. Be sure that the making room, floor is 9. Be sure that the making-room floor is so well constructed and supported that it will not shake or vibrate during the coagulation of the milk.

MILK AND MAKING.

1. Procure a copy of "Milk for Cheese Factories," for each of your patrons by applying to the Dairy Commissioner, Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa, stating, the number required and the address to which they are to be sent. They will be furnished free in French or English.

2. Don't put "leeky" milk into the vat with that of the other patrons. If you have time, make it up by itself, and send the cheese from it to the patron who supplied that milk for his private use.

3. Make provision for keeping a short record of each day's work, of the exceptional treatment of every vat, and of the comparative quality of the cheese made from every vat.

4. Milk sours readily and rapidly for a number of weeks after the period of lactation in the cows begins. Hence milk seldom requires to be ripened for setting during May.

5. Use enough remet to congulate the

5. Use enough rennet to coagulate the curd into a state fit for cutting, in from 15 to 20 minutes, at from 88° to 82° Fahr.

6. Cut it rather early, slowly and very

8. Afterwards allow the curd to settle until whey comes over nearly the whole

surface.
9. Then begin to cut with the perpen-

29. Provide strong, smooth boxes of the exact size.

30. Stencil the weight of the cheese in neat figures on the side of every box.

eaders on so important a subject. CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION. The Dominion Civil Service Commission f which Mr. J. H. Flock, of this city, was secretary, has made a long report to Parliament. A number of valuable suggestions are made, but that is no new experience. The question is, will the Government of the day have the courage to carry out the reforms? At present the Civil Service law is continually broken to serve party ends or the ends of members of Parliament who desire to promote the welfare of their favorites. Chief among the suggestions is a proposition that the income of deputy heads should begin at \$3,200 a year and rise to \$5,000, while that of a first-class clerk be \$1,600 instead of \$1,800 as at present; of a second-class clerk \$1,200, instead of \$1,400, and of a third-class \$800, in place of \$1,000. This is in the service at Ottawa. No such pay comes to the harder-worked clerks in the "outside service. The commissioners recommend the appointment of a permanent salaried Civil Service Commission, with a secretary and an accountant to do the work for them. Thus it is contended that a number of new offices shall be created. The proposal to establish open competition for Government offices, after the British plan, is a good one, but we doubt if the men in power will have enough courage to carry it out. CANADIAN MILLERS' UNION. Incorporation of an Association In-dorsed in Parliamentary Committee.

OTTAWA, May 18.—The act to incorporate the Dominion Millers' Association was the Dominion Millers' Association was reported by the Banking and Commerce Committee this morning, with one important amendment. The annual value of property to be held by the association in Toronto is reduced from \$10,000 to \$5,000. The objects of the association are to promote, extend and improve the manufacture of flour and meal. The business of flour milling in Canada, and the shipping and sale to foreign markets, as well as to the markets of this country, of grain, flour and meal, and to assist the members of the associations with regard to the matters aforesaid as provided by law, and to adjust settlement and determine controversies and misunderstandings mine controversies and misunderstandings between persons engaged in the said trades, or submitted to arbitration as hereafter provided. The association will appoint agents in various points to secure rapid transit of grain and flour shipped by its members.


