



London, April 29. - Two German aeronauts have accomplished the feat of traveling from Leipsic, in Germany, to Leicester, in England, a distance of

550 miles. They alighted at Enderby, near Leicester, at a quarter past 3 on Thursday afternoon, and came to London yesterday to narrate their experiences. 




