RUSSIANS PIERCE FOE'S LINE--CAPTURE 1,000 SCENE OF LIGHTNING TRAGEDY WHICH COST FOUR LIVES RUSSIA HITS

SEVERE LOSSES FOR HUNS BY HEAVY FIGHTING IN AFRICA:

Allied Forces by Squeezing Operations Compel Germans To Evacuate Many Strong Positions After a Stubborn Defence.

London, July 23.—German troops in German East Africa attempted to make a stand last week against the Allied forces, which are gradually closing in on them. An official statement issued here today says heavy fighting fered large losses. The announcement follows:

'Germans Hard Pressed.

'On July 17 the enemy evacuated Mount Shakama. A portion of his forces retreated southwest toward Tikawage and the main body fell back on Narongombe. Throughout the 17th and 18th our columns pressed the retiring enemy in a most difficult country, capturing a few prisoners and occupying a ridge two miles north of Narongombe by hightfall of the 18th.

Severe fighting ensued, the enemy offering most stubborn resistance and making numerous countrates, in the course of which, it is ascertained from prisoners, he sustained heavy losses. KERENSKY GOES TO FRONT. London, July 22-(Delayed)--Premier

Kerensky has again started for the front at the instance of the central commit-tee of soldiers' and workmen's dele-gates, according to a Reuter dispatch Dispatches from Galicia state that the breach in the Russian line is 8 miles wide and 10 miles deep. The Bourse Gazette says that at a meeting of delegates from regiments at the front it was resolved that it had become imperative to turn over all authority to M. Kerensky.

A Berlin dispatch says Emperor William has departed for the eastern front. DISARMING THE WORKMEN. Petrograd, July 23.—The disarming of workmen, including the so-called red guards, is proceeding systematically in the Vassily Island and Viborg quarters. More than 1,200 rifles and revolvers and some machine guns have been recovered. The majority of revolvers were obtained at the fortress of St. Peter and St. Paul, where cases just arrived from America had been broken open. According to the Russkia Volia, about a third of the arms stolen since the outbreak have been accounted for. Several carts with shells were stopped on the banks of the Neva. The military authorities knew nothing about them. The drivers were arrested and the carts taken to the arsenal.



WHOLE DOMINION **GETTING TOGETHER** TO TACKLE WAR FOOD PROBLEMS

Government Announces Creation of Six Departments To Deal With Various Phases of Food Distribution, Consumption and Conservation.

Ottawa, July 23 .- The collective food experience of the Dominion is to be employed to solve the food problem and secure essential food supplies for Great Britain and the allied armies and nations, according to official announcement today. There is to be the closest possible co-operation between the food controller's office, the Federal and Provincial Government, and national and local organizations of a public character.

The basis of organization of the food controller's office provides for the creation of six departments to deal with various phases of the food problem.

Control Advisory Committee. There will be a central advisory committee, composed of representalives of the Government, the churches, the labor organizations, educational departments and insti-tutions, urban interests, farmers, rural municipalities and men's and women's organizations. This cen-tral body will advise the departments through the food controller.

Provincial machinery is to be established through the creation of on plans prepared by the partments and approved by the food nittee will include in its personnel representatives of the Government, churches schools, farmers,





MEATLESS MENUS FOR CANADIANS, HANNA'S SCHEME

Food Controller Would Restrict Bread and Dinner Courses Likewise.

TORONTO, July 22.—Hon. W. J. Hanna, food controller, yesterday issued a statement, the most important item of which is the suggestion that no meat be served in hotels or restaurants on Tuesdays or Fridays and that no bacon be served on those days, either, and on other days only at breakfast. Also he suggests that at every meal there shall be supplied some substitute for white bread and that no more than two courses may be served for breakfast and luncheon or three courses for dinner with courses to be defined. Printed cards will be distributed setting forth the necessities of the situation and asking every citizen to sign a form of pledge to reduce considerably consumption of bread, beef, and bacon.

A terrific crash of lightning came just as they had reached the bank, and four corpses lay on the edge of the water.

A couple of hours later, Wesley Baker, who owned the farm, went to look for his cows. He saw two boys lying stark and dead on the bank of Dingman's Creek, and he immediately telephoned Dr. George A. Routledge, the coroner.

When the doctor arrived to make an investigation, he found the four boys, dead under the bridge. He immediately took charge of the remains, and had them removed to their homes. It was a terrible sight, and one that he, after a practice of considerable duration, could scarcely speak of.

Seven Questions Asked and Answered On the Ajax Agreement

QUESTION 1.

If the Ajax Company erects a plant here which costs less than \$450,000 for site, buildings and machinery, does the city give its indorsement for the full amount of \$450,000?

ANSWER

No. The city, under clause two of the agreement, gives indorsement for only such an amount as the company expends on site, plant and manufacturing accessories.

OUESTION 2.

Are bonds guaranteed for the purchase of crude rubber?

ANSWER

QUESTION 3.

How is the amount of the company's expenditure arrived at? Can the city go behind the company's vouched statement?

ANSWER

The last paragraph of clause one provides that the city has the right at all times to inspect and peruse all vouchers, agreements and documents showing the expenditure of moneys by the company on site, buildings, machinery, plant and manufacturing

QUESTION 4.

Does the passing of the bylaw have the effect of immediately guaranteeing the company's bonds?

ANSWER

No. The city's indosement is not given until the company has its plant in operation, has paid for the same in full, has given

a first mortgage on the plant for the full amount to be indorsed for, and has deposited with a trust company, approved by the city (and which shall act as trustee for all parties) trust securities approved by the Ontario Government in sufficient amount to pay the full amount of the bonds at their respective maturities. The agreement provides (clause eight) that the city indorses only for an actual plant in operation—not for one in prospect.

QUESTION 5.

How many men will the company employ, and what will it pay them?

ANSWER

The company (clause three) shall employ not less than 250 employees (of whom 60 per cent shall be adult males) residing in the city of London, and shall pay them at least \$250,000 in wages yearly for a period of twenty years. This is exclusive of directors salaries and fees.

OUESTION 6.

Does the city pay the expenses of submitting the bylaw to the ratepayers?

ANSWER

No. The company pays the cost (clause six).

QUESTION 7.

Does the guaranteeing of the company's bonds affect the city's borrowing power?

ANSWER
