As Allied trops begin offensive movements on the Picardy battlefield, the German assaults show signs of slackening, both in numbers and intensity, and the Germans are digging themselves in feverishly around Lassigny, on the southern line of the salient, where French pressure has been heavy. Peace Drive Failure.

The German peace drive toward Amiens, Paris and the channel ports, is reast becoming a battle of the nations. The conflict opened with British and German soldiers, the adversaries. Since then the French and American armies have joined with Field Marshal Haig's forces, while Austrian and Bulgarian troops are aiding the enemy. Canadian cavairy and Australian Infantry have been doing much of the fighting under the British flag in the past two days.

Fighting is intense.

The most intense fighting is progressing south of the Somme, where attempt after attempt is being made by the Germans to break the indomitable Franco-British defence and reach the Paris-Amiens railway line or Amiens itself. Unable to make gains astride the Somme, the enemy has made heavy attacks at other points, but with no success, Moreuii, the centre of the fighting south of the Somme, is reported to have changed bands four times, and is now held by British, Canadian and French troops.

CANADIAN ARMORED CARS IN IT. British Army Headquarters in France, April 1.—Canadian armored motor cars, with rapid firers, have played an important part in checking the German rush. Up to the time of the present battle they were used but little, but in the last ten days these cars have performed valuable work. Frequently they have held up large bodies of ferman troops on being rushed to threatened parts of the front. Their presence has



Throughout the disturbances on Saturday night the soldiers acted with the greatest moderation. The leaders of the rioting hurled insulting epithets at them, but they were ignored. The military forces here consist of local militia, and their behavior during the episodes of Friday and Saturday nights was exemplary.

Soldiers Are Attacked.

The prospect was that Sunday would pass off without further disturbance. However, at 8:35 o'clock this evening te military fell foul of a mob of young men. The soldiers were engaged in removing the firearms and cartridges from a St. Roch hardware store to prevent a repetition of the raid on Sunday morning. The weapons were being removed to the citadel. The soldiers were showered with chunks of ice and stones by men hiding in alleyways.

Strong reinforcements were rushed to the scene, each company commander being supplied with a copy of the rlot act and being invested with the necessary authority to enforce it with the utmost rigor.





Only a week or two ago he aunched a tirade against Britain in which he declared that the British wished to secure Belgium, and that was the only reason the British were in the war. Bourassa has a large following in Quebec. His paper exists and has a large circulation because of its radical character and the cleverness of the man who conducts it.

Until Bourassaism became a force in Quebec there was little talk in that province of separation or sedition. Bourassa did not gain recognition for many years, but a short time ago he demonstrated his ability to command a large political following and wrested from the Liberals twentysix seats. His influence, fostered by a political party, became instantly the most vital in Canadian politics. His chief lieutenants and friends were made cabinet ministers, and when war commenced he adopted a policy of non-participation, designed to cast suspicion upon the motives of the British and to win Quebec from the whole-hearted loyalty to which she gave enthusiastic expression early in the war. Without being once curbed, he has pursued this policy, immune from the punishment which would have been meted out to an Ontario for service in the new battalion Canada will orpublisher, and acquiring a following of intoler- ganize to operate tanks on the western front. ants who were also inflamed by the attacks of their counterparts in Ontario.

Bourassa has done everything in his power to alienate Quebec from British allegiance. It has been suggested that to close his newspaper would be to confer upon him a most acceptable martyrdom, but patience has long ceased to be a virtue and a large portion of the Quebec population, has been won away from the moderate policies of Laurier. The malcontents have had Bourassa for their leader; they saw with what audacity this leader sneered at Britain and Canada's part in the war. They expressed themselves freely against those of their own countrymen who urged them to obey the law. 
