

### SALARIES RAISED

Winnipeg Teachers To Get as Much Did Good Work on the Hospital Irust as Any Otheds on Continent.

Winnipeg, Man., Feb. 9.—The salaries of all teachers, with the exception of the principals, in the public schools of Winnipeg have been voluntarily raised. The new schedule places the schools of this city on a basis as high as that in any other city in America. The minimum for inexperienced teachers has been raised from \$450 to \$500. Regular teachers will be paid \$650 to \$500 for the first year, instead of \$575 to \$725. The maximum is to be reached at the end of the eighth year instead of the ninth as before, and it will range from \$500 to \$1,000 instead of from \$800 to \$950.
