THE annual meeting of the National Chapter of the Imperial Order of Daughters of the Empire in progress in Vancouver, is epoch making in the history of the order in Canada, from the fact that the revision of the constitution is the outstanding business.

According to the report of Mrs. McDougall of Montreal, convener of the committee on constitution, here are some points in which the new constitution differs from the old that will be of interest to mem-

bers of the order in Western Ontario: It embodies incorporation of chapters.

Refrains from further mention of granting of charters to other national chapters than authorized in the act of incorporation. Provides for a full use of chapters' powers to make bylaws for

management of their own business. Provides representations to all provinces of the national execu-

Preserves to the national chapter its right to elect, but under a system of proportional representation to all provinces.

Alters system of nomination for the national executive by giving provincial chapters the privilege of electing nominees on a propor-

tional basis. Grants full measure of autonomy to provincial chapters in approaching provincial governments.

Places a check upon enactment of hasty legislation by requiring a year's notice of motion to the national chapter for amendments to the constitution.

STILL HOPES FOR CHAIR.

Dear Miss Grey,-I am very grateful to you for putting my letter and request for wheel chair in your corner. Please find in-closed 10c for Sick Children's Hospital fund; I wish it were more. The first time I wrote to you was many months ago, asking the Boxites if any of them were leaving city and wanted a good home for a singing canary. I would be glad of the gift of one in my lonely existence. But my need now for chair is greater. The world, what I can see of it, and the lovely blossoms look, beautiful to me. How much we have to thank God for, have we not? I will send you some hints that may be useful to boxites.

Keep a bottle of liquid glue and a bottle of cheap yellow vaseline in the house. If, as often happens, the tag comes off a new shoe lace, take needle and coarse, black sewing thread, insert needle at bottom of impression where tag came off, wind tightly round, push needle through top, make a knot, then immerse in glue, only takes a moment. Will outlast shoe lace. If the walls of a room will not hold a nail, insert a smaller nail than you need, push, or a smart knock with hammer; put heavy nail into glue, push into hole, let dry for some hours; then you can hang picture of heavy weight or whatever you wanted nail for. If door hinge squeaks, apply vaseline, open

and shut door a few times, then

wipe any vaseline off outside of hinges. To find a nail or hook easily in obscure light, paint with white enamel. The use of a wisp of broom to try if cake or loaf is done is a dirty habit. Take 3 or 4 steel knitting needles, put end in fire, get red hot, make a loop, plunge into cold water, place a nail or hook convenient to oven, hang needles on hook. They can be washed and hung up as soon as used, anl ast a lifetime. I sincerely hope that you are for-

mate enough to obtain a wheel chair, for the summer months, as you would be able to stand the hot weather better if you got out, vouldn't you? Maybe someone would lend you one for a while, if they feel they cannot afford to give it to you. Thank you for the household hints. which are very useful. I am quite sure your first letter never reached the Mail-Box, as I do not remember as used, and last a lifetime.



THUGS IN WOOD

Two Bank Bandits Shot To Death by Posse of 500 Farmers.

Fugitives Trapped in Woods Wage Desperate Battle For Liberty.

ORTONVILLE, Mich., June 1.— Two of four bandits who this morning robbed the States Savings Bank at Metamora of \$6,500 were shot to death, and the two others captured this afternoon by a posse of 500

All the stolen money was recovered. More than a thousand shots-from evolver, rifle and shotgun-were exhanged in the battle that followed the trapping of the bandits in a 1,000cre wood, known as Coleman's Woods, near Davison Lake, a few miles southeast of Metamora. One of the captured bandits and one of the posse were wounded, the latter probably fatally.

The robbery of the bank occurred shortly after 9 a.m. The four ban-dits, looking like farmers in their broad-rimmed straw hats and faded blue overalls, drove up to the bank in a green touring car. Two remained outside, while two entered the bank. Only two employees, the cashier and the assistant cashier, were in the bank.

Pour Money Into Bag. Neither bandit uttered a word, but one slipped a paper toward the "Do not speak or you will die.

When the bank official looked up e was confronted with a revolver. ie and his assistant were driven into he vault and locked in. The robbers gathered up all the money in sight, which they poured into a grain bag, and fled to their automobile. As they drove away they were shot at by several citizens whose suspicions had been aroused by the conduct of the men who waited in the car. Local officers commandeered an automobile and gave chase to the robbers, while citizens began organiz-

ing a posse. Farmers all over countryside responded eagerly to the alarm, and the posse soon numbered 500 determined men, all of them armed. So closely pressed were the bandits that they abandoned their car a few

miles from Metamora and took to the thick woods at Davidson Lake. Here two farmers, working in their fields, saw the bandits running in pairs each pair carrying a big bag. leading pair abandoned their bag, which was found filled with cartridges, and fled into the thicket. One Bandit Surrenders.

The second pair were carrying the bag containing the loot when the posse spread through the woods all directions. Leo Cummings, cashier of a bank at Goderich, and George Whitley, also of Goderich, at the head of the posse fired on the pair and were fired on in turn. A second volley from the pursuers brought down one of the bandits and caused the other to surrender.

The wounded man gave the name of Mike Kolski, 30 years old, of Flint. He had been shot through the right leg. His companion gave the name of Jerry Skopendy, 35, of Detroit. Both were turned over to a guard while the search continued for the other two bandits.

Fight To The Death.
This led the posse into the very heart of the woods. Here the two bandits, both armed with automatic rifles, exchanged volley after volley heir pursuers, who from behind the cover of trees and brush. The battle raged almost an hour-then a silence from the bandits that signified the end.

In a pool of blood lay their bodies. Each riddled by bullets. Beside them were their guns and a large quantity of empty shells.

been identified. In the pocket of one, however, a scrap of paper was found bearing the name "A. Ams-



Warmth of Hearst's Welcome In Britain Wouldn't Melt Snowball

LONDON, June 1.-William Randolph Hearst, millionaire American newspaper owner, whose publications never fail to seize an opportunity to propagate anti-British feeling, has received the shock of his life in the icy coldness of the reception he has received since he reached London a few days ago.

Hearst has been displaying unusual reticence posing as a man who hates press interviews, and apart from an obviously carefully prepared statement, which he gave out soon after landing and which masquerades as an interview, he has lain low since arrival.

Probably never before in the history of British journalism, which

has a long tradition of hospitality, has any visiting newspaperman been treated with such open dislike from his confreres. One of the London papers suggests Hearst's experience with victims of his own fake interviews have made him afraid to open

his mouth. British publishers as a whole are absolutely ignoring him and it is believed they have no intention of extending the usual hospitality shown to American newspapermen. Indeed Hearst's welcome is probably the iciest of any prominent
