





IN MANCHURIA

Russians and Japanese Battle at Close Quarters to Advantage of Former.

Mukden, Nov. 29.-The activity of the Japanese against Gen. Rennenkampff's front continued Nov. 28, culminating before noon, in one of the severest fights in recent weeks. The Japanese retired only about 600 yards, out after the fight the Russians collected 230 Japanese corpses, all from the Seventh and Ninth Reserve brigades. The Russians also captured a arge quantity of rifles, entrenching ools and Red Cross stores. Night sorties continue. scouts prove very adaptable to this

sort of work and can go all around the Japanese in woodcraft. On the night Nov. 25 a party of Siberian sharpshooters went out and captured every one of the guards in front of a Japan ese party cutting firewood without arousing the suspicions of the Japanese that anything had happened. On the evening of Nov. 27 a party of Russian volunteers practically wiped out the village of Nanganza, situated at the foot of the double-humped hill opposite Poutiloff (Lone Tree Hill). The Japanese had been occuping a ouilding in this village every night, hampering the Russian sharpshooters. Attacking the village in the rear the Russian volunteers drove out the Japanese from the village early in the evening, mined the building and retired. The Japanese subsequently re-occupied the building, which was blown up, and almost the whole village destroyed. The Russian losses during the whole affair were three men killed

and fifteen wounded. The Chinese report that the main Japanese force is located at Shitkhe. on the railway ten miles south of Shakhe, but it is impossible to estimate its number. The Japanese at close quarters, espe-

With the Russian forces at Shenking, Nov. 29.—The fight of the Japanese with Gen. Rennenkampff's Cossacks, which began Nov. 24, ended at 6 p.m. on Nov. 28. The Japanese, who were repulsed, never approached nearer than 600 yards. During a snowstorm at midday on the 28th, the Japanese tried to outflank the Russian right, but the rifles and four guns forced them to retire. The Russian were small. On Nov. 27 Russian scouts captured Nangentze village, and held it 20 minutes, while sappers blew upon when buying medicine, up a large stone house which had served as a fortress from which the Japanese sniped Russian outposts.

> Tokio, Nov. 29.—The imperial headquarters today summarized the Manchurian situation in the following statement: "On the evening of Nov. ?7 the enemy made a dull bombardment against Santaokuntzu, and the nemy's infantry from 6:20 o'clock attempted a night attack which was repulsed at 8:30. During the attack, the enemy's mortars in the neighborhood of Weichialoutzu bombarded Santaokuntzu, Kuchiatzu and their vicinities, but did not injure us. From sunset Nov. 27 the enemy's mortars and field guns west of the railroad bombarded incessantly the neighborhood of Kuchiatzu. Simultaneously the enemy's infantry occupied a village northwest of Nankuantzu and fired in the direcn of Siaochisfu, which is north of Kuchiatzu. The firing quieted at 8:30. The same evening at 10:30 the enemy's infantry west of the railroad on the right flank of the Shakhe River, northward of Sinchimpu, fired at us desultorily and ceased firing at 11:30. There have been several skirmishes between scouting parties. In other respects the situation is unchanged."



Election of Late Bishop.

The election of the late Bishop Baldin was made on Oct. 18, 1883. The synod was called on the preceding day, vith 108 clergy and 142 laymen prese nd on the first ballot it elected Rev. E. Sullivan, then Bishop of Algoma, Bishop Sullivan was in England at the time, and a cable message was sent him notifying him of the action of the synod. The following morning a reply was received stating that he felt it his luty to decline and remain with the work in Algoma. The synod again settled down to vote, and on the third ballot that day elected the late bishop, who was dean at Montreal.
