THE SPOILS SYSTEM.

SENATE REFORM.

A resolution was moved by Mr. Mc-Intyre, a Government supporter, seconded by another Liberal in the Dominion Parliament, in favor of Senate reform. They advocated the abolition of life senatorships and appointment for three Parliaments, or fifteen years, with an age limit of eighty. The most interesting part, of their address were quotations from the Liberal platform and certain Ottawa convention speeches from Sir Richard Cartwright, Sir Oliver Mowat and other leading Liberals, in favor of Senate reform. After they were heard, the Premier spoke vaguely on the subject, asking his friends to kindly withdraw their resolution, and promising to lay the matter before a conference of provincial ministers at the close of the session. 

The dog would eat as much as a full grown man, and still the woman would not part with him, and wanted the city to feed the whole lot. The boy was in the habit of going down to the river, and having a good time, all at the city's expense. I told her that the help from the city would have to stop, and that the city was dumbfounded at this and you would think that she was dumbfounded at this and you would think that she was was going to starve. The help from the city was cut off, but the woman hid not starve. did not starve. She got along just as well as ever.

'Another case was that of a middle aged man who was counted a

dle aged man who was counted a city pauper. There was nothing wrong with him, but he claimed that le coule not find any work to do. He was told to get aut and work, or starve, and he worked. He is to-day one of our steadiest citizens.

BATHING AT HOME.

A Medical Recipe For Obtaining the Best Results.

The finest method of bathing at home

by which one can attain the best re-sults in keeping the body in a clean, healthful condition, can be taken in the following manner: First, it is necessary to facilitate the thorough cleansing of the thousands of small pores in the body to open those pores by means of heat (sweating). If one has the ad-vantage of one of the small cabinet baths that are on the market it will supply the best means of producing perspiration; otherwise lying in a tub of warm water and gradually getting it as hot as can be borne and lying in that for a period of from five to ten minutes will produce the same result, Have a five pound bag of ordinary ta-ble salt, and, after placing the salt in a pitcher of suitable size, moisten the salt with hot water, enough to wet it through. Stand in tub and give the body a thorough rubbing with the salt.

This operation should take not less than twenty minutes to rub the entire body. The salt removes the dead cuti-cle that is being constantly pushed off from the body by the new cuticle form-ing and which cannot be removed by soap. It also produces an active circulation of blood throughout the entire body. The salt is also a fine thing for the scalp and should be rubbed into the hair and scalp at least once a week. After giving the body a thorough rub-bing it is necessary to cool off properly, thereby closing the pores and eliminat-ing all possibility of taking cold after the bath. Lie in the tub and turn the


cold water on gradually, and let the water in the tub get as cold as possible, then dry off with a rough towel.

For the month of April the revenue of \$6,792,786 represented an improve-

ment of \$1.093.053 over the correspond ing month of last year. The expenditure of \$3.642.118 on consolidated fund ing month of last year. The expendi-ture of \$3,642,118 on consolidated fund was an increase of \$34,577 and the capi-tal outlay of \$1,285,432 was \$579,534 larger than last year, chiefly on account of railway subsidy payments. Every revenue producing branch of the public service contributed toward the improved showing.



Clause 17 authorized the Government to raise funds to carry out the project. There was also a rate regulating clause. Subject of Treaty.

Mr. Beck added that the bill did not refer to the Niagara district alone. The action of the deep waterways commission made it necessary to proceed at once. It was apparent that the waterways were to be the subject of a treaty and that the users of the water at Niagara Falls on the Canadian side would be limited to 36,000 cubic feet a second. That would mean that the present companies would absorb the whole of the present supply. Under the existing agreements the companies were permitted to export one-half of the power supply, so that there would be only 18,000 cubic feet a second available for Canadian consumers. Two of the companies were controlled by American capital and the Canadian company had made contracts to export power, and if one-half the power were exported this would give the Americans 36,000 cubic feet and the Canadians 18,000. He hoped that the whole of the 36,000 feet would be available for Canada when required. He was sure that the leader of the opposition would see the wisdom of canceling the contract made by the old government with the Electrical Development.
