When the temperance question was first mooted, he looked lightly upon it, and stood aleef. Now he went heart and hand in the movement, and if he could not do much good, he could render his humble testimony. He had convictions on the subject, that he dared not resist. He regarded the temperance cause as a great field of Christian usefulness. The temperance movement should be supported, as promotive of the intellectual happiness of man. The Speaker dilated upon the grandeur of the intellectof man, He narrated an ancodote of a young Scotch law student, in London, Canada West, with a view of showing the degrading effects of intemperance on the intellect. This young man was of a weak constitution and nervous temperament, and considered it necessary young man was of a weak constitution and nervous temperament, and considered it necessary that he should drink wine for the benefit of his health; he did so, and by degrees found it necessary to increase the quantity; he went on drinking and giving oyster suppers, until he was turned out of his office, and upon the streets, the most degrading and miserable object that he (Rev. Mr. L.) ever beheld. The young man would have literally starved had he not been put in prison by the Mayor for his support; he was abandoned by all even by those to whom he had been in the habit of giving oyster suppers. He (Rev. Mr. L.) had gone through the Lunatic Asylum at Toronto, and on asking his attendant the principal causes of the lunacy which he saw, received for answer that it was religion and intemperance. But the former

young man in that assembly whose heart did not leap at the mention of his mother; but intemperance had caused young men to forget their mothers, of which he marted an instance; as well as some others, illustrative of the direful effects of intemperance on social life. He pleaded, then, for the Temperance cause as promotive of the social happiness of men. He threw back the charge of those who told them that they sought to place temperance in the stead of religion. The words "Colonial News" have long been synonymous with "Colonial grievances," and "Colonial discontent." The last intelligence from the Cape of Good Hope is quite of the established character, but it is remarkable for the steps which at announces the Cape Colonists to have taken, in order to enforce attention here. in

steps which it announces the Cape Colonists to have taken, in order to enforce attention here, in England, to their discontent, and to procure rediess for their grievances.

They have chosen two Representatives of the Colony, and are sending them here with a draft of the Constitution which the Colonists have prepared for themselves, and under which they of the Constitution which the Colonists have prepared for themselves, and under which they wish to live. The Colonial Office had sent them out a Constitution, but the Colonists respectfully but firmly decline it. They think (and we think with the Colonists) but firmly decline it. They thick (and we think with them) that they can judge what will suit them, better than Lord Grey can, though he has the experience of trying to govern forty-nine other Colonies, besides this, from his Seat of Empire in Downing Street. This is the Clolony that has la ely beaten the Home Government, by its determined resistance to the project of sending convicts there. We incline to think that it will beat the Home Government again, and that the Colonial Minister in England will not be permitted to nominate a majority of the Upper House at Colonial Minister in England will not be permitted to nominate a majority of the Upper House at Cape Town. But these contests are unpleasant. If the Home Government repeatedly advances pretensions, from which it recedes when they are resolately opposed, it must fall into contempt, and, in fact, will eventually hold out a premium for fartious opposition. If the Home Government is obstinate, it infallibly produces hatred against England, probably insurrection, and the expense of attempts at re-conquest, which may not suvariably prove successful.


