Hydro Versus Cataract Fight Carried Into the Churches of This City

Desperate Battle For Business is Now Being Waged -All Kinds of Reductions Offered at Eleventh Hour by Cataract.

The Cataract and Hydro fight has been carried into the local hurches. There was a lively competitive affair last night. At a neeting of the board of managers of the Congregational Church the contract for the lighting of the church for the coming year was awarded to the Western Counties Electric Co. at a cost of 21/2c per kilowatt. Representatives were present from both companies and submitted their prices to the board. There was only one member who opposed Western Counties, and he did so on the grounds that the church was setting an example to the people, and that as the Western Counties could not make a better price in previous years, before Hydro appeared on the scene, then he was of the opinion that the people were being robbed, and he thought the church was setting a very bad example for the people. However, the Western Counties bid was accepted and a contract was signed.

That the competition between the private electric company, formerly a monopoly here, and the people's own power project has become stiff was frankly admitted by a member of the Hydro-Electric Commission this morning. "They are offering any old rate at all," said the commissioner, "providing they get a contract, and preferably one on which the consumer is tied up for several years. Naturally we believe it no more than right that where Hydro prices are even with the others—and they are decidedly less in most instances and will continue to grow less as the consumption increasesthe ratepayers should favor their own enterprise. WHY AMERICANS ARE UNEMPLOYED.

Prof. Robert Ellis Thompson, for twenty five years professor of economics at the University of Pennsylvania, and recognized as one of the foremonst authorities on the tariff in America, recently prophesied that the coming year will be marked by great industrial disturbances in the United States.

Prof. Thompson bases his belief upon the recent reductions in the customs duties under the Simmons-Underwood tariff. In part he says:-

"That the year of 1914 will be one of great disturbance between employers and their workmen is very generally indicated. What is gently called the readjustment of business to the conditions created by the new tariff law cannot but involve much friction in the readjustment of Acaericul wages to the European and Asiatic level, Even the friends of the new tariff betray their expectation of this by their threats tot investigate the firms and corporations which say they must reduce wages. 

Sanitarium Will Have **Two New Pavilions**

Follownig a meeting of the Brant Medical Association, at which co-operation of the doctors was promised in the work of the Brant Sanitarium, the recommendation will be made to the board of governors that the plans for increased accommodation at the institution be gone on with. These plans include the erection of two pavilions outside the hospital proper, one for men and one for women, with recent bereavement, and for flowers an accommodation of from six to eight each. They are for the stands, springs, mattresses, carpets, incipient cases. There are at present nine patients at the hospital, which has an accommodation for 12 or 14. The pavilions would increase the capacity by 12 or 16 cots. Dr. Ashton expressed himself to-day as satisfied that the community would be more than recompensed for the extra expenditure, and the usefulness of the sanitarium would be greatly enhanced.
