We are quite willing to concede that occasions will arise when executive sessions of the Council must be held, from which it is but right and proper that the press and public alike should be excluded. We do not believe that any objection would arise they were not allowed to be represented at such meetings. But resented at such meetings, But
for ordinary sessions, when the por ordinary sessions, when the ordinances and the passage of ordinances and the ness is in of other routine business is in progress, the press should by all means be admitted. We are unable to see how the
Council can fly in the face of public opinion in this matter Just so long as it continues to hold its sessions behind closed
doors and maintains its present doors and maintains its present given out by the clerk, just so long will it fail to receive the confidence of the public. Secrecy always begets suspicion, whether there be good ground for it or not.
In this particular instance we have not found a legitimate reason adyanced in support of the position taken by the Couneil The Council room is small, bu we not believe that the public woulided it should be generanly provided it should be generally known that full reports of all proceedings would appear in the
newspapers. In justice to itself, newspapers. In justice to itself,
the Council should throw open the Council should throw ope and establish itself in the con fidence of the community.

## REPRESENTATION

The sentiment of the people o the territory, regardless of na tionality or political affiliations, is in favor of popular representa tion in the Yukon Council.- As Commissioner Ogilvie stated in his interview, which appeared in Saturday's Nugget, the Council as at present constituted, is no responsible to the people of the community which it governs, but has to answer only to Ottawa.
From long and bitter experience, we are perfeetly aware that Ottawa's interest in this country amounts to very little after the revenue question has been disposed of. The Yukon Territory is considered "good" for so many dollars of revenue each year, and so long as expectations are realized our statesmen at Ottawa are satisfied.
Naturally, the local Council seeks to please the powers by virtue of whose pleasure it, has existence, rather than endeavor to meet the desires of the people of the territory. We don't attach any particular blame to the Council on this account. The councilmen are appointed to do certain things, and, if they consider the behests of the appoint ing power, they are merely fol affairs.

What we should do is to avail change the present conditions The council should be responsibe to the qualified electors of the erritory, and not to Ottawa or In fact, to any appointing power They are a legislative body, and is such should derive their powers from the community di-
rectly affected by fheir legislarectly affe
The right of electing two mem bers, while of itself it will not necessarily alter the status of af fairs, will yet be a step in the direetion of attaining what must ultimately be granted us, viz. legislative assembly, with powers such as are exercised by the par laments of the various prov popular vote
In the vote. In wever, the slice that is offere areve, the sice that is is far better than none at all This first step will be the enter ng wedge which will in the end give us all we ask. The move
ment is right, and should be pushed to an early conclusion.
