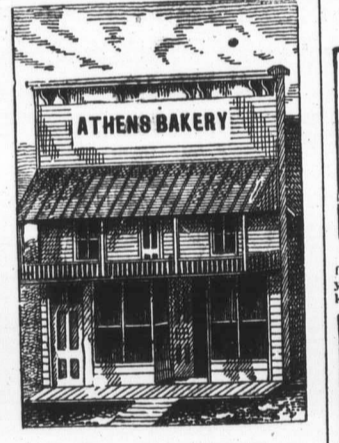

Unionville Fair. The managers of the Unionville Fair met on June 9th at 10 a.m., on special call of the president. The following officers and members were present: N. H. Boecher, Pres.; R. Barlow, 1st Vice; C. J. Gilroy, 2nd Vice; B. Lovrin, Sec.; E. Davis, Treas.; and F. L. Moore, Jas. P. Horton, Wm. Neilson, Geo. Taplin, Directors. The minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed. A motion was carried to move the sheep pens over to the east side of the grounds, extending from the north east corner of the grounds to the carriage building, which motion was subsequently rescinded.
