That "Criticism."

The editor of our paradoxical contemporary, the Acadian Orchardist, of Kentville, in his issue of Tuesday last published on Wednesday, at Wolfville, charges us with misrepresenting certain statements in his leading editorial of a week ago. We are sorry if this is the case. Far were we from intending to do so. "If our exact words had been quoted," he says, "they would have explained themselves." We confess that we did not reprint the whole article in question. More important matter precluded the possibility of doing such. However we selected a passage of it, which we quoted in his exact words. On that passage alone was our criticism based. True, from reading the sentences quoted we could not assuredly know what the editor thought. He says, "The ACADIAN has no way of discovering what we think." We grant that. However we supposed that he thought something, and nothing was more natural than to suppose that he thought what he said. But we confess that in strictness we were not warranted in affirming what he thought. The idea which we intended to convey was that he appeared to think in the manner outlined. Another instance of the Kentville editor's fine distinctions is brought out when he affirms that being "unanimously returned" is a "form of election." We do not object to granting that too. But—and we are willing to leave it to any fair-thinking man—when a paper criticizes a town, after that town has shown by a public vote that its citizens were pretty equally divided in their choice of six candidates for councillorship, when, in view of this, a paper criticizes a town for not having elected three of that number unanimously, is it not equivalent to criticizing the citizens for holding and expressing independent views at the ballot box, and is not this logically equivalent to criticizing the principle of democratic elections? This is the ground we took last week and we do not recant that the Kentville editor can logically object to our interpretation of the passage quoted from his article. We do not wish to again criticize our contemporary, but we can not but express our regret at seeing in print the unfair and unkind remarks concerning the recent civic election contest in Wolfville—for we can not understand the words as intended to convey any other meaning. The Orchardist says: "In this connection we may say that suspicion always attaches to the motives of an individual who, unless generally supported by the people, strives to force his way into a public position." Now the editor of that paper must have known, if he had read his own columns for the past few weeks, that all the candidates for the office of Mayor, were, there being but a difference of seventeen votes between the number polled by the candidate receiving the greatest and that one receiving the lowest number of votes. To insinuate that any of the candidates strove to force their way into office is contemptible. The labor and time spent by the councillors on behalf of the town is gratuitous. None of them, we trust, would be seriously grieved on being relieved of their duty at any time. The successful candidates were elected in accordance with democratic principles and are bound as members of a democratic society to perform the duties devolving upon them. It strikes us that it would have been much better had our contemporary refrained from speaking as it has both in its last issue and that previous, since the election had already occurred. Previously to the election the remarks might have had some influence upon its result, as it thus been in a measure justifiable. What is the gain in giving vent to petty spleen when it can do nothing but provoke ill-feeling? Better a thousand times unsaid. Would it not be well for the Kentville editor to confine his criticisms to his own town?

Disreputable Party Tactics.

Party spirit has in the past often run high in Kings county. Too often the people have been ruled by prejudice and party spite rather than by honest argument. In an intelligent county such as Kings, this ought not to be. The coming contest bids fair to eclipse all previous political campaigns in this respect. Both parties are at work leaving traps, they have resorted to doggerel verse and with the vilest personalities have begun to attack each other. This speaks not very highly for Kings county politics, or, for that matter, for Kings county intelligence. We can not think that this course has been suggested by party leaders, but the effusions referred to have appeared in print and been published and therefore both parties are looked upon as responsible. Is it not about time that some change was made in the party tactics of both sides? Let us, if we are men, put away childish things. Let each party vie with the other, not in abuse, but in convincing argument. That party which will practice only honorable tactics, which will despise low insults and buffoonery, which will appeal not to the prejudices but to the intelligence of the people will command respect, will find support, will eventually carry the day. It is the duty of Kings county men to insist on reputable means in conducting their political campaigns.

The New Poor Asylum.

The Poor Asylum lately erected by the overseers of the Poor for the township of Horton occupies a position three miles distant from Wolfville and four miles from Kentville. It would be difficult to find a spot offering more natural facilities for a Poor Asylum than this does. It is on the main street leading through the township and about one mile from a railroad station. A never-failing brook flows within a few feet of the building giving an abundant supply of water, and the buildings are completely sheltered by trees and hills from the winds of winter. The building contains two flats thoroughly finished and an attic not yet finished. The lower flat contains the culinary department, mess-room, general sitting-room, bath-room, hall, closets, etc. On this flat there has been a room set apart and fitted up as a chapel in which religious services are held every Sunday. The upper flat contains the sleeping apartments of the inmates and the keeper's private room. Each room is furnished with an iron bedstead; some of them having two. At present there are about twenty-two inmates in the building, embracing all classes and conditions of destitute, poor, idiotic, insane, sick, lame, blind, deformed and infirm. Heterogeneous as this mass of humanity is, under the management of the present keeper the utmost cleanliness and decorum are observed throughout the premises.

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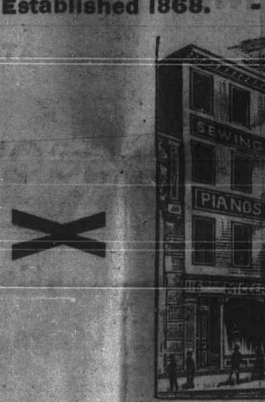
