College opened on Wednesday with splendid prospects for a successful year. Up to last night the registered attendance was 220 and this will be considerably increased.

On the words of Mr. J. Octave Mousseau, Canada does not want an Imperial Prime Minister like Mr. Borden. Mr. J. O. Mousseau is the Liberal member for Soulanges in the Quebec legislature.

The potato crop of Nova Scotia this year is fully up to the average and the farmers will receive good prices for their stocks during the next few weeks.

It is reported that Hon. G. E. Foster, who is now on his way to England for another two months' stay on imperial business, will next year have his headquarters established permanently there and become Canada's diplomatic agent and general representative in London with a salary of \$15,000 per year.

'Nova Scotia is all right,' has been heard and said often enough. And it is quite true. Our own province is all right, as far as natural resources, situation, climate, advantages, and so forth are concerned.

Town Council.

At the regular meeting of the Council on Wednesday evening the Mayor and Couns. Hales, Regad, Haycock, Harris and Bishop were present.

The Streets Committee reported that about 6000 square yards of street had been completed, a sample specimen of which cost fifty cents per yard, and 664 feet of curbing at a cost of twenty-two cents a running foot.

The Finance Committee laid before the Council a balance as at Sept. 30th, 1912, showing receipts \$9,907.78, expenditures, \$16,781.67, and a debit balance on Sept. 30th, of \$6607.89.

The following accounts were read and ordered to be paid: Austin Bros. \$4.34, Davidson Bros. 66.85, Carrette Bros. 599.79, Wm. Steiner, 5.25, Lloyd Mfg. Co. 13.10, Valley Telephone Co. 7.63, Watsons Engine Works 14.00.

A communication was read from the Natural Resources Department of the C. P. R. asking for a list of unoccupied farms which are for sale in this vicinity with other data that might be useful for intending purchasers or tenants.

After a free discussion of the project of forming an area in which pigs will not be allowed to be kept within the town, it was resolved that the Council give notice of its intention to amend the by-laws referring to the keeping of pigs within the town limits, and to authorize a closed area in the more settled portion of the town.

The question of moving the lock-up from its present position to the new fire-building was discussed, and the chairman of the Public Properties Committee was instructed to have the change made.

The Town Council was instructed to have a light placed on the view from the mill race.

Trade-Tariff-People.

BY REVIEWER.

Mr. Woodrow Wilson, the Democratic candidate for the Presidency of the United States, when speaking at New Haven, Conn., Sept. 28th, made a most remarkable statement in acknowledging that the reciprocity agreement as agreed upon by the Laurier government and President Taft, would have been injurious to Canada. He said:

'I was very much interested in some of the reasons given by our friends across the Canadian border for being very shy about the reciprocity arrangements.' They said, 'We are not sure where this will lead, and we don't care to associate too closely with the economic conditions of the United States until these conditions are as modern as ours.'

In April President Taft made public a letter to Mr. Roosevelt in which he stated that the trade arrangement would make Canada only an adjunct of the United States. He says 'I would transfer all their important business to Chicago and New York, with their bank credits and everything else, and it would increase greatly the demand of Canada for our manufactures.'

Canada was saved from this great betrayal of herself by the common sense and patriotism of her farmers, artisans, citizens. The would-be bunco-steres were first buncoed themselves by President Taft and then blown into atoms when they turned their borrowed tricks upon the sober intelligence of the Canadian people.

When this investigation begins we will venture to predict that the blocking brigade, the 'dark lantern' outfit of the late parliament, will be out of business, and every facility given to provide every detail of the most minute expenditure since Sept. 21st, 1911.

As a matter of fact the Liberal party to-day is absolutely without a policy and without leaders, either sound on the trade question or upon the question of national defence. Canada can't and won't trust them on the latter decision. A party that was so easily deceived by Washington, for the latter's personal and national benefit, cannot expect Canadians ever to trust them at the polls again until they purge themselves of their leaders and get solid upon such a platform as means Canadian individuality and development upon Canadian and Imperial lines.

The Free Testing of Farm Seeds.

During the season 1912-13, the Seed Branch of the Federal Department of Agriculture will test free of charge samples of seeds of grasses, clovers and cereal crops. This has been the policy of this branch since the passing of the Seed Control Act. As a guide to growers, dealers and others who desire to have samples tested for purity, grading and germination, a leaflet of instructions has been prepared. Under twenty-three numbered paragraphs there are described, among other things, how to prepare, pack and address samples of seeds of various kinds. Useful notes are given on qualities affecting the value of seed. It is pointed out that injury to wheat from frost or dampness is usually apparent in the color and abnormal condition of the grain.

A New Departure.

General interest has been aroused over the launching of the new C. P. R. steamer 'The Empress of Russia.' She is the first private vessel to have what is called the cruiser stern, and at a day's notice can be turned into an armoured cruiser sailing under orders from the Admiralty. Meanwhile she will be on the Canadian Pacific's service between Vancouver and Hong Kong. Her length is five hundred feet, her breadth is sixty-eight feet and she has got to build over half a million dollars.

The Experimental Farm.

Matters are booming at the Experimental Farm near Kentville—clearing, building and preparing for future experimental work. Some fifty men are employed in the various services under the supervision of Superintendent Professor Blair, and the department of agriculture, Ottawa. It is amusing to hear of the things certain angry politicians around Kentville, as a center, propose doing as soon as parliament is in session.

Even the navy question is to be side-tracked for a time, in order that a thorough investigation shall be held as to the expenditures at the Experimental Farm, Kentville. The fact that politics is eliminated there, and professional and expert supervision is conducted by Dominion officials, counts for nothing. The prices paid for material, such as cement, nails, lumber, and the wages paid to the several departments, is to be gone into rigidly. All other public business must stand aside at the behest of these jealous, avareicious, self-seeking politicians. Mr. Foster, M.P., is to be impeached. Prof. Blair is to be impeached. Mr. Bishop is to be impeached. Mr. Barbeau is to be impeached, and the deuce only knows what is to happen to the workmen, carpenters, masons, painters, farm hands, but the worst possibility is to happen to all these criminals.

When this investigation begins we will venture to predict that the blocking brigade, the 'dark lantern' outfit of the late parliament, will be out of business, and every facility given to provide every detail of the most minute expenditure since Sept. 21st, 1911.

What took place previous to that late will also come under the search light of an unhampered public accounts committee. And if the various expenditures of the Dominion government during the past fifteen years is gone into as well, we prophesy that some startling facts will be revealed. When once the lid is off, a book can be written, and there will be no blocking brigade to prevent the facts coming out. We imagine the public are quite as much interested in a thorough examination of all expenditures as are those politicians who have mulched at the public trough for so many years. 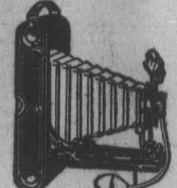
