Railway News.

Mr. W. D. Reid, who had been out to the end of the branch railway, accompanied by Mr. Pilsboll and Mr. T. A. Hall, Government Engineer, returned by the accommodation train to-day at 12.30. Interviewed by a Telegram reporter, Mr. Reid said that there were 37 1/2 miles of the road graded to within 5 miles of Trinity. Mr. Burton will move his headquarters to Trinity ten-days hence. The ballasting is completed to Southern Bay and the masonry work is done to Goose Bay. The country between Seal Cove and Trinity is very hilly and in several places heavy work is required, so that the progress will be slow for a few weeks. There are about 2,000 men employed and everything is progressing well. No accidents have occurred of any consequence.

Castaway Fishermen.

Samuel Cole, of Conception Harbor, and his cousin, Nicholas Cole, of Collier's, fishermen of the American salt halibut catcher Essex, of Gloucester, arrived here by the s.s. Susu to-day. While fishing off the Labrador coast on July 23rd in 55.38 N. latitude they went to haul their trawls, and after doing so a thick fog set in and a big tide took them off the bank, so that by sundown they realized that they had strayed from their vessel. They rowed about aimlessly for hours in the fog, doing this to keep themselves warm, as it was very cold. Without an ounce of food in their dory and only half gallon of water in a jar, the unfortunate men were astray in the fog and suffered terribly from hunger. With the true grit of the Newfoundland fisherman in a tight place they did not despair, but kept rowing and sailing alternately and took alternate watches while either slept, and made Iron Bound Islands on the Labrador coast on the 27th July. Here they boarded the schr. Bessie R., of Green Head, Wren, master, and the men of the crew shared what they had with the castaways for 2 days, when they boarded the Susu and came here. They could not have lived many days longer if still adrift. Nicholas has been fishing out of Gloucester for 7 years and Samuel 15.

Two American fishermen, Charles Mulanburg, of Gloucester, and Alexander Kerrigan, of Arichat, N.S., of the halibut Remona, Capt. Fred Uppshall, arrived here to-day by the Susu from Hopedale, Labrador. On June 29th, when their vessel was fishing off the Labrador in 56.47 N. latitude, they went out to pick up their trawls but found they had drifted away, and a thick fog set in both men soon found themselves adrift in those tempestuous waters. The cold was piercing from the start and the fog so dense that they could not see a yard on either side of their boat. For four days and nights these men drifted about the ocean in their frail craft and suffered intensely. They had a few ounces of bread and a gallon jar of water and for the last two days and nights at sea it rained continuously with a storm of N. E. wind. Saturated with water and shivering with cold the men made Double Islands, Labrador, but here there were on Hivers and only a few tins of food. The Eskimos with neither doors nor windows, so that their dory was preferable to them. Though the gale was increasing they decided to go further south, when, as they were about to leave a boat with wood from Hopedale arrived, manned by three Eskimos, and they told the men to go to Hopedale where the Moravian Missionaries were. The Eskimos accompanied them and as they rowed in they found the Beothic there, and boarding her were given the best of treatment. Dr. Johnson administering the nourishment they so badly needed. Mr. Johnson of the ship, who came up with them on the Susu, gave them every assistance and saw that they were changed to dry clothing. They were greatly exhausted also and could not have endured the hardship they experienced much longer.

The M. G. B. crew was to-day withdrawn, Rev. Dr. Cowperthwaite having given a formal and satisfactory certificate of the birth of the young carmine.

ROBBERY ON BONAVISTA.—A barefaced robbery took place on board the s.s. Bonavista at Harvey's wharf Saturday night last, of which the second cook of the ship was the victim. His whole month's wages of \$40 was stolen. The affair was reported to the police and a detective is now on the job.

Latest Labrador Fishery News.

Capt. Moses Bartlett and others arrived by the s.s. Susu to-day from the Farnyards, Labrador. From those who accompanied the captain we learn that the fish struck in there on the 8th July, and one schooner, the Celerity, Clarke, master, caught 300 qts. Shortly after the fish appeared a big sea ran in and beat the cod from the shore. It struck in again on the 23rd July and Capt. Clarke got 12 qts. that morning. Six schooners then got the fish and began to set their traps. The other reports are:

Windy Tickle—Just a sign.

Hopedale—Just a sign.

Stump Island, Winsor Harbor, Hare Tickle—A few schooners doing a little; the remainder doing nothing.

East and West Turnavick—Little doing.

Ilak—The same.

Strawberry, Long Tickle and Jigger Tickle—Nothing.

Iron Bound Islands—Forty schooners there. They had a short spurt but the fish is now slackened off.

Cape Harrison—Doing well; Legrow has 200, and 20 schooners not long there are doing well. From that to Indian Harbor it is a blank for traps. There is fish off shore for hook and line but there is no sign.

Same holds good for the rest of the coast to Battle Harbor. Grady and Domingo are both blanks. North of Cape Harrison there is a good sign of fish. All the boats in the Straits of Belle Isle have gone north with an average of 50 to 100 qts.

Emperor of the British.

The Daily Express of London has suggested that His Majesty King George should, on the day of his Coronation, proclaim himself Emperor of the British, and that after that time he and his descendants should hold the title, rank and dignity of Emperor of the British.

It is stated that the King will not do it if he thinks such an action on his part will be contrary to the wishes of the people.

We think the suggestion an excellent one. The title would be much simpler and more conspicuous than the stately phraseology of the title at present in vogue, viz: "King of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas."

Even this does not include the whole title. Since 1880 the British Sovereign has been styled "Emperor of India." This addition was made at the instance of Lord Beaconsfield and was well received at the time.

Now that the British at home as well as those beyond the seas are alive to the responsibilities of Empire and that King George by visits and naval training has been so intimately associated with the Empire at large a title which succinctly reminds King and subject of the bond of union is worthy of commendation.

He is in college and had gone down to Spsex to spend his vacation. He is about 21 years old, and his father and mother both reside at Musgrave Harbor, while a brother, Rev. John Wheeler, is pastor of an extensive parish of the Methodist Church in Boston, Mass. His father is the oldest civil servant in this colony, and a man well known and much respected all over the country. The message seems to be carefully worded, and the fear is expressed by Mr. Whiteway that he is dangerously hurt, and that the accident may have a fatal termination. He is a nephew of Mr. Whiteway's, and that gentleman yesterday telegraphed Rev. E. French, of Musgrave Harbor, giving him the facts and asking him to break the sad news to the aged parents. A brilliant future lay before the hapless young man whose many friends will pray that the accident may not be as serious as anticipated, and that with skillful treatment his life may be spared. It is thought that he was attached to some volunteer association, and that while at revolver practise he was accidentally shot. If the worst should happen it will be a serious blow to his parents.

Final Regatta Meeting.

The final meeting of the Regatta Committee was held in the Armory at the T. A. Hall last night, President Hon. Jno. Harvey presiding. There attended with the President the following members of the Committee: V. Pres. Hiscock, Secretary Noonan, Treasurer Crotty, Mayor Ellis, Dr. Scully, Messrs. W. J. Higgins, J. R. Bennett, B. Wood, P. Laracy, W. J. Martin, R. Dowden, A. G. Williams, T. McNeil, T. J. Foran, J. W. Morris, J. L. Slattery, P. F. Moore, W. Duggan and T. D. Carew.

The minutes of the previous meeting having been read and adopted, Mr. Moore intimated that the great pole was in readiness for Regatta Day. President then brought under the notice of the Committee the fact that Lord Brassey, who is visiting here in his yacht Sunbeam, had donated the sum of \$25 as a special prize to be competed for at our Derby. The President regretted that Lord Brassey could not be here to witness the Regatta. He had called to thank him for his generous act, but as he was engaged on his vessel he could not see him. His Lordship wished the money to be spent in purchasing a cup to be competed for, the trophy to be known as Lord Warden's prize. Lord Brassey had succeeded the late King Edward VII. as Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, and he would wish the cup to commemorate this. The President, through a gentleman who would see him before he left, conveyed the thanks of the Committee to His Lordship, suggesting, however, that instead of a cup, medals be struck and presented to any crew which would lessen the record time of 9.13 2-5 sec. There was a proposal to honor or later of this record being reduced, and the holding of medals for such a purpose would tend to perpetuate interest, not alone in our great aquatic sports day, but in the reduction of the time referred to. Mr. Higgins agreed entirely with this and held if these medals were won by any crew this season that next year others should be put up to still further reduce record time and thereby improve—what such an innovation should—the standard of rowing. It was therefore decided to adopt the President's idea and the medals made and suitably inscribed because of the distinguished donor, to be presented to the crew breaking the local record.

A hearty vote of thanks proposed by V. Pres. Hiscock was then accorded Lord Brassey.

On motion of Mr. Hiscock it was resolved unanimously that Hon. R. Watson, in the absence of the Premier, be invited to be the guest of the Committee during the day.

Mr. Higgins impressed upon the Committee the necessity of warning coxswains of boats to come inside of the stakes in the case of close contests, and they were asked by the President to govern themselves accordingly.

Special to Evening Telegram: MONTREAL, Aug. 1. Dr. Crippen appeared before Magistrate Angers in private chambers this morning for formal arraignment, and was remanded to jail for 15 days. The questions put to him were the usual ones in such cases, and the prisoner declared that he would not fight extradition. The probability is that he will be deported under the undesirable clause of the Immigration Act together with Miss Le Neve, at the end of the period fixed by Judge Angers, by which time another detective will have arrived from Scotland Yard to assist Inspector Dew in taking the couple back to England to stand their trial.

Eucharist Congress.

LARGEST GATHERING OF ROMAN CATHOLICS EVER HELD ON AMERICAN CONTINENT.

Special to Evening Telegram. NEW YORK, Aug. 1. The Roman Catholics of this city are already preparing to send delegations to the Eucharistic Congress which is to be held at Montreal early in September. Word has reached here that the Congress will be the largest gathering of Roman Catholics ever held on the American Continent. The principal speakers will be Cardinal Gibbons, Mgr. Heylan, Archbishop Bruchesi, of Montreal, Archbishop O'Connell, of Boston, and Father Vaughan, of London, and one of the most impressive scenes of the Congress will be the Midnight Mass for men in the Church of Notre Dame; another one will be an open air Mass at the foot of Mount Royal. The Cardinal Legate, Vincent Vannuttelli will carry the Host in the procession through 4 miles of streets. Protestants as well as Catholics in Montreal will entertain the visitors. Lord Strathcona has placed his town house at the disposal of Archbishop Bruchesi and several American Bishops will be housed there. The Cardinal Legate will be the guest of Sir Thomas Shaughnessy. After the Congress Cardinal Vannuttelli will visit the Catholic summer school on Lake Champlain. He will then go to Washington where he will be received by President Taft.

**Spanish Ambassador
Has Left Rome.**

Special to Evening Telegram. ROME, Aug. 1.

One hour after presenting the note of Premier Canalejas to the Vatican officially announcing that Marquis de Ojeda had been called to Madrid by a communication from the Government, the Spanish Ambassador to the Vatican left Rome. This was early this morning, and as yet no retaliatory measures have been taken by the Church, and Monsignor Vico still remains in Madrid as Papal Nuncio. The statement issued by Premier Canalejas yesterday bearing on the controversy between the Church and the State has been carefully perused by the Vatican officials, who wish it to be clearly understood that the part of the statement in which it is declared that the Holy See intended to concede to the Spanish Government less than what was agreed to in 1904 is without foundation. In fact it is Canalejas they declare who now wants greater concessions than those of 1904, on the plea that they would have been granted by them to Premier Maura, and that Canalejas believed them to be at that time insufficient. In answer to this the Holy See retorts that it deals with the Spanish Government not with parties in the Cortes.

Cowes Regatta.

Special to Evening Telegram. COWES, England, Aug. 1.

The Great Annual Regatta of the Royal Yacht Squadron opened to-day in good sailing weather but its social features robbed of much by the death of King Edward. The chief race of the day was the handicap event for big yachts. There were six starters: the Meteor, owned by the Kaiser, the Germania, the Shamrock, the Cleely, the Susanne, and the American schooner Westward. The course covered 50 miles, the Shamrock got away with a good start, but the Westward soon overhauled her and took the lead. At the end of the first round the Westward which had a handicap of six minutes, 56 seconds led the Germania by 17 and the Meteor by 21 minutes. The Shamrock crossed in second place but had more than forfeited her time allowance from the Westward. The Westward held her advantage and finished the race in first place taking the prize of £600 stg. The Shamrock won second prize of £200 stg. The Shamrock finished 14 minutes astern of the Westward which had steadily drawn away from the others during the entire race. The other yachts were miles behind at the finish.

It Was Dysentery.
