The Shamrock crossed in second place but had more than forfeited her time allowance from the Westward. The Westward held her advantage and finished the race in first place taking the prize of £60 stg. The Shamrock won second prize of £20 stg. The

Shamrock finished 14 minutes astern of the Westward which had steadily drawn away from the others during the entire race. The other yachts were miles behind at the finish.


