CHAPTER XXXV. It was all true enough, incredible as the change seemed at first.





"After All, It's Only Money."

By RUTH CAMERON



"Nay, let me tell you, there be many that have forty times our estates that would give the greatest part of it to be healthful and cheerful like us; who, with the expense of a little money, have ate and drank, and laughed, and sung, and slept securely and rose next day and cast away care, and sung and laughed, and angled again; which are blessings rich men cannot purchase with all their money," Isaac Walton. Eliminate the unhappiness which comes from various forms of anxiety about money and by how much do you imagine you would reduce the sum of the world's woe? By one-half possibly more. Then set aside the money worries of those who fear actual want and deprivation; and by how much do you think you would reduce that sum total? Probably about ninety-nine one hundredths, possibly more. The L. a. d. y. Who-Always-Knows Somehow looked a bit disturbed the other day about a letter. "Anything wrong?" I ventured to ask. "Another investment has passed its dividend," she said. "That's the third thing this year that's failed us. It will worry Richard. I'm so sorry." "I am too," I answered. "The thought that she was letting her trouble sadden another seemed to arouse the Lady. "Oh, well," she said, "they say better times are coming. And anyhow (with a sudden brightening of her sweet face) it's only money after all."

I am ashamed to worry over that. "It's only money, after all"—do you ever remember to say that when you find yourself fretting over money affairs. Try it sometime.

It isn't blindness for you or yours. It isn't disgrace—cruel, unforgettable life-long disgrace for you or anyone you love. It isn't the loss of your power to enjoy fresh air and sunshine and books and congenial friends and love and humor and all the simple, worth while wonderful things that can be had without money and without price. It isn't the loss of that most precious of all birthrights, the power to work.

Of a time of most pressing and painful poverty Mary Antin writes in "The Promised Land," "I was not unhappy on Dover St. Quite the contrary. Everything of consequence was well with me. Poverty was a superficial, temporary matter; it would vanish at the touch of money."

Of all the bits of philosophy in that remarkable human document, that left the deepest impression on my mind. "But it's easy to feel that way when it's all over," you tell me. Yes, my friend, I realize that. But even at the very moment, if you will but try, you can lay hold of the great and helpful fact, "after all, it's only money."

For these reasons the comparison between steamer work and ordinary office or shop work which you so feelingly deal with is, as you surely must realize, simply absurd. I feel it necessary also, after perusing your letter, to point out that employers have not, as you apparently suggest, the power to permanently raise wages to an unlimited extent at their own sole will and pleasure, and that they are not endeavoring to keep labor starved. Surely you do not seriously think so?

Again you say that "Employers have adopted a belligerent attitude, etc." This is not correct. The facts are: This trouble arose from the action of the Longshoremen's Protective Union, who, without consultation with employers of any kind whatever, served them with a notice that on and after the 6th May, certain unreasonable rates of wages must be paid.

If belligerency there is, it has not been the making of the Employers' Protective Association, but rather has it come from the Longshoremen's Protective Union, not I am happy to know, from the testimony of many of the men themselves, from the men, but from others who should not lay the blame of their own mistakes in this matter upon the Employers' Protective Association.

Again, you must be aware from my previous letters to you, that the Employers' Protective Association did not refuse to receive a delegation from the Longshoremen's Protective Union, but to my regret for particulars of the subjects you wished to discuss, I received no reply.

I am authorized to say that the Executive Committee of the Employers' Protective Association will be pleased to receive the delegation which you now suggest, at the Board of Trade Rooms on Tuesday evening next at 8 p.m.

I am also instructed to say, that as the Executive Committee consists of twelve members, they would be glad if you could find it convenient to arrange for your delegation to consist of as large or greater number. Yours truly, G. C. FEARN, Secretary Employers' Protective Association.

Employers Will Meet Delegates.

St. John's, Nfld., 1st June, 1914. M. P. Gibbs, Esq., Solicitor L.S.P.U., St. John's.

Dear Sir—I am in receipt of your favor of the 23rd inst., which I have placed before the Employers' Protective Association. I scarcely know the object you have in writing as you have written, unless you are endeavoring to reach a far larger audience than that obtainable through me as Secretary of the above Association, and it seems to me as if you would have been better advised had you addressed your plattitudes directly to the audience, for which they seem to be intended, instead of attempting to foist them upon a number of business men.

I shall not therefore reply at length to this aspect of your letter. I, however, must protest against your misrepresentation of facts. It is not necessary for me to traverse the whole of your misstatements. It is sufficient that I quote one or two instances. You state on page 3 of your epistle as follows: "We hear of no protest in relation to the advertisement of the Furness Withy Company, that during the summer months their offices will open at 8.30 a.m. and close at 5 p.m., excepting Saturdays, when 'business shall cease at 1 p.m.' and then you ask:—

"Does the Association concede the right of one class to limit the hours of work and deny it to another, and that one the more numerous and important?"

Now had you quoted the notices of the Furness Withy Company in this matter accurately you would have added the words:—

"Except when a steamer is in port, but this would not suit your argument. It may perhaps have escaped your notice that the Furness Withy Company have stipulated that when a steamer is in port their employees must work after the hours mentioned. In reference to this I call your attention to the following paragraph from my letter to you of 19th May:—

"Whether they (the L.S.P.U.) decide to continue the present rules of refusing to work after 6 p.m., or whether they will return to the 'old method of loading and discharging steamers during the evening whenever it is necessary to do so in order to despatch the steamers according to the demands of the trade.'"

(I insert the black type.) You will observe that the Furness Withy Company do not make any different arrangement for working after hours

for their own employees than they ask of the Longshoremen's Protective Union men—your contention being based on the omission on your part, to consider the important part of their regulation expressed in the words "Except when a steamer is in port."

Again the whole of your letter in reference to working after 6 p.m., is of such a character as to unfairly represent the true position of affairs. You must be well aware that some of our largest employers of labor have more than once protested against the continuous employment of men in discharging steamers, whereby they have become physically exhausted on the ground that it was as much to the men's own hurt as to their employers' loss, and yet you state the case in such a way as to intimate that the system of working men to exhaustion was being forced upon the Union men by the employers, whereas the fact is that the Union rule itself is alone responsible and necessitates the evil. The union has, in the face of repeated applications refused to alter this harmful rule, and has forced the system upon the employers.

It will, I fancy, be evident to you, after a little more thought that the keeping open of an ordinary local business establishment after a fixed hour, (unless necessary), would do no good, and would be unjust to the employees, while with steamer work, and more occasionally in other lines of business, the very contrary is the case. Our food supply, for one thing, depends upon the prompt discharge of steamers, which could not be run economically if they did not receive prompt despatch and satisfactory communication with the outside world depends upon it. The whole community suffers through any derangement of the service when steamers are in port, those who undertake this special class of work, whether laborers or clerks or employers must work overtime.

For these reasons the comparison between steamer work and ordinary office or shop work which you so feelingly deal with is, as you surely must realize, simply absurd. I feel it necessary also, after perusing your letter, to point out that employers have not, as you apparently suggest, the power to permanently raise wages to an unlimited extent at their own sole will and pleasure, and that they are not endeavoring to keep labor starved. 

"Save Thou Our King."

To-morrow is the King's Birthday, and provision has been made for a suitable observance of it. The day on which His Majesty reaches his 49th birthday will be kept as a general holiday. His Excellency the Governor will hold a levee at noon, and in the afternoon from 4 to 6.30 His Excellency and Mrs. Davidson will hold a reception. Year after year it is becoming more and more desirable that every opportunity shall be taken advantage of to build up a sentiment of loyalty to the King and devotion to the Empire over which he reigns. We do not mean that the tendency towards loyalty to the King and devotion to the Empire is lessening. On the contrary, we believe the tendency is growing in a marked manner. But other bonds are weakening and the whole bond of Empire is being thrown more and more on these golden strands. Each of the great Dominions of the Empire is growing more and more independent of the British Parliament as a matter of fact even if not in constitutional theory and in strict matter of law. Yearly, it is becoming more and more apparent that the King is the chief outward and visible link which binds the Empire together, and that link is strengthened by loyalty to him and a devotion to the Empire which is fostered by intercourse and common counsels for the benefit of the Empire in which all the Dominions take pride. Mr. John S. Ewart, last month, in summing up the present position of Canada, does so as follows:

"We negotiate trade arrangements with foreign countries as we please. We can implement our agreements by legislation. We can frame a treaty. But we cannot sign it. We are in control of our diplomatics with the United States. Our and their commissioners are constantly engaged upon them. The British For-

ign Office has ordinarily nothing to do with them. Our other diplomaties are in care of the Foreign Office. With rare exceptions, there are none. We sign our own agreements with the United States. There are none with any other country to sign.

"When the United Kingdom is at war, Canada, technically, is also at war. Whether (apart from being attacked) she will or will not participate in any war, is for herself to say. Canada is not an adjunct of the British Empire."

"Canada has attended various international congresses. One of her delegates has carried the King's commission to act for Canada; and, as such delegate, has signed an international convention on behalf of Canada. Another, in making Canada a party to a convention, has acted under a purely Canadian commission. We have not, as yet, sent a delegate to the Hague Conference. But we have been offered an opportunity of being a party to the instructions to be given to the British delegates."

Mr. Ewart is a strong advocate of the tendency, we have under reference, he declares: "I proposed our elevation to a status of equality with the United Kingdom—that we should be sister-states under allegiance to the same Sovereign."

If that is the actual tendency, and it seems to us idle to blind ourselves to it, then there is all the more reason for all of us to do all that in us lies to foster the feelings of loyalty to the King and to do everything possible to promote such intercourse as will bind us together as real sister-states.

It is in this spirit that we honor the King and rejoice with our fellow lieges that the King is reaching another birthday in what is proving a glorious reign.

FISHERMEN

OTTAWA. To-day.
The warship Essex has been placed at the disposal of the authorities for the recovery of bodies on the Empress.

PALEHMO, SICILY. To-day.
The strike at the Sulphur Mines reached a climax yesterday when a mob at Porto Empedocle destroyed half the town. The rioters set fire to the Sulphur stores, destroyed depots and tore up railway tracks, telephone and telegraph wires. The flames could be seen at Girgenti seven miles distant. Detachments of troops and police were despatched to re-establish order.

LONDON. To-day.
The fact that the Marquis of Lansdowne and Carson from Ireland, and Birrell, Lloyd George and Asquith are expected to arrive this week, gives rise to another rumor of renewed conversations between the party leaders on the Home Rule question, though in each case a holiday is given as the excuse for the visit. A deputation composed of a group of Liberals who have just returned from a tour of Ireland profess they have undergone a change of opinion since seeing things for themselves. They found the administration of Nationalists would compare most unfavorably with that of Unionists. They agreed that the Land Act resulted in great improvements. Their conclusion is that if forcing the bill is to involve civil war, people

should be afforded an opportunity of expressing their views by the way of referendum or by a general election. Sir William Nussy, for many years a Liberal member of Commons also arrived at the same conclusion after a visit through Ireland.

LONDON. June 1.
Dealing in Sunday's "Freeman" of Dublin, with the Nationalist Volunteer movement, T. P. O'Connor says: "These men have been drilled at their own expense. This is the essential difference between them and those taking part in the Orange movement. The latter is largely the creation of boundless money sent to Ireland by the rich Tories of England, but the Irish movement has been financed by itself." The fever is now spreading into the ranks of higher officers of the British army who are retired from actual work, but are ready to stand by their own people if lawless Tory officers embarrass the law. Names are mentioned of men of European reputation, who have signified they are willing to take their share in organizing the Irish volunteers and give the benefit of their military experience. The movement owes much to Col. Moore, brother of George Moore, the celebrated Irish novelist.


MONTREAL. To-day.
Now that the first burst of excitement and grief at the loss of life thro' the sinking of the Empress of Ireland have partially spent itself, the general public is settling down to await the Government inquiry before giving judgment as to the responsibility for the frightful accident. An unhappy controversy between the commanders of the two vessels involved is looming large on the horizon, and at present seems to be a case of "Blaming the other fellow," and shifting the blame as far as possible. Captain Kendall of the Empress tells the Coroner at Rimouski that the Captain of Stordstad, in an interview says he did try life if he had kept the Stordstad's nose in the gap she made in the Empress' side. Captain Anderson of the Stordstad, in an interview says he did try to do this, but the Empress was going a good speed ahead and drew away in such a manner that the bow of the Stordstad was forced out of the hole. Kendall's evidence is to the effect that Capt. Stordstad is at fault, first, in proceeding ahead when the Empress had signalled that she was not under way, but stopped and there was no way on her; second, in backing out from the gap she had made in the Empress' side. Capt. Anderson takes quite different view that the Empress' action just prior to the fatal crash by the Stordstad. He says the Empress was going fast ahead. It was impossible after the collision to keep his vessel's bow in the rent she had made, because the Empress was going fast. The truth, it is hoped will be drawn from the official inquiry which will open on the 8th or 9th, in Quebec or Montreal. The Board to be composed of two Judges of the Canadian Admiralty Court, Sir Adolphe Beaulieu, Judge of the Court of the Admiralty, Quebec, Hon. E. McLeod, Chief Justice and Judge of the Admiralty Court, New Brunswick, appointed by the Dominion Government, and Sir George Vaux representing the British Board of Trade and probably a representative of the British Admiralty.

FURTHER REMANDED.—The prisoner White, charged with a series of larcenies along the railway line, including the stealing of letters from H. M. mails, is further remanded pending such time as the Crown is ready to begin the prosecution.

Killed by Wind of Projectiles.

Paris, May 23.—Curious confirmation of the belief that men can be killed and wounded by the wind of passing projectiles was given in a paper by Professor Laurent, of Brussels read recently before the French Academy of Science.

M. Laurent declared that several cases had come under his notice during the Balkan wars of soldiers who showed symptoms of cerebro-spinal disturbance, though they had no wound of any kind. The symptoms were fainting, a tingling sensation and even partial paralysis. In the more serious cases the victims became cataleptic. Sometimes death resulted. In the latter cases autopsies were performed which failed to show any nervous lesions. It then appeared to Professor Laurent that the vibrations of air produced by the passage of a ball and the sudden variations of atmospheric pressure affected the nerve cells and caused the phenomena of inhibition. Professor Laurent recalled that during the war in Manchuria Dr. Matignon had also observed nervous inhibition produced by cannon balls. Since the speed of modern projectiles has been increased and they have become more important to warfare.

Baseball.

In a message to the Baseball League the Bay Roberts team have announced their intention of not taking part in the Inter-town competition this season, owing to insufficient practice. In view of this decision only three teams will contest, same as last year, namely: Grand Falls, Bell Island and the City.

STARS AT THE COLLEGE HALL. We are bereft of so many good things in music in St. John's, that we must be grateful to some extent to Mr. Hesser for bringing us concert parties. It is a pity that the pleasure can come to such a limited number of people because of the high-priced seats, and we should anticipate a greater audience and no monetary loss if the admission fee were reduced to fit more moderate incomes. However, a good audience listened to the "All-English" programme last night at the College Hall, and were evidently well pleased with the items.

Mme Scotney has developed her high notes in a remarkable manner. They are pure, clear, and for the most part, without "vibrato." She can give points, to speak vulgarly, to many a bird, and indeed her top register is so unmistakably superior that we wished she would trill and chirp altogether, and let mere words alone. Consequently in her solo from "Traviata" and the "Cuckoo Song" and "The Fairy Pipers," she was at her best and the clearness of her runs was delightful. A certain lack of uniformity and thinness of tone was noticeable but otherwise Mme Scotney possesses a voice of remarkable capability.

M. Ramella, the tenor soloist, sang the well-known "Ah! So Pure" from "Martha," which we have heard so many times, and while he took his high notes in perfect tune, yet there was a strainedness about them which took from their purity. Mme Sapin, the contralto soloist, sang "The Cry of Rachel" and several English songs with varying success.

But we must confess that the most satisfactory items of all were given by Mr. Howard White, who unites a "robusto" yet tender basso voice with a personality in conformity. He has good enunciation and his songs consequently were enjoyed to the full, and he was equally at home in the Scotch "Loch Lomond" as in "Off to Philadelphia," the former being sung as well as we have heard it for many years.

The four singers appeared in the second act of "Martha" which concluded the programme, and the somewhat familiar music was enjoyed, especially the verse of "The Last Rose of Summer," which is sung in this act.

On the whole the concert party is an improvement on last year's performers at the Casino, and as we pointed out last year, Mr. Hesser will find that St. John's will appreciate the best he can bring, and the more he appreciates the good taste of the City, the greater support he will give in his undertakings.

Tuesday and Wednesday are "Grand Operatic Nights" and doubtless will bring good houses.

Will Endeavour to Float Fogota.

The Fogota still lies on the rocks at Musgrave, and the Sagona which sailed for there to-day, with a powerful pump will endeavour to refloat her. Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.
WASHINGTON, June 1.
Pending a full investigation into the Empress disaster which has been promised by the Marine Department, and which will be held in Montreal commencing probably June 9th, little can be learned to throw light on the tragedy of the Gulf. The tribunal which will inquire into the disaster, will, it is announced to-night be composed of Sir Adolphe Routhier, Judge of the Court of Admiralty, Quebec, Hon. Ezekiel McLeod, Chief Justice and Judge of the Admiralty Court of New Brunswick, and a third representing the British Empire. Captain Kendall's statement at the inquest has been flatly contradicted in several essential points by Capt. Anderson and members of the crew of the Storstad, and until further evidence is given on both sides before competent authorities it will be impossible to say which ship was at fault. This morning the preliminary steps will be taken to conduct the investigation, but it is likely several days will elapse before actual evidence taking begins. Meantime the grim work of identifying the bodies being carried on at Quebec. So far in the neighborhood of one hundred of these have been recognized and sent to their respective cities for burial. There still remain at Quebec, however, over two hundred corpses. Of these likely the greater number will go unknown to their graves. Many of them belonged to the steerage as they came from every large centre in America even as far as Los Angeles. Altogether it is unlikely their relatives, mostly foreigners, will make efforts to claim remains. So far it has been impossible to secure any definite information as to how many are lost and saved. The figures hitherto published differ anywhere from ten to fifty. It is doubtful if more accurate information can be given out. The C.P.R. admits to-day they were not in a position to give definitely the number of living or dead. All told, the survivors who have been accounted for leaves the death list at 955.

Here and There.



"That for divorce statistics!" muttered she, as the wad of paper hit its mark. "What do I care if every marriage winds up in the divorce court? These busybodies make me tired," she added mentally.

She dropped into her rocking chair, and reached for the evening paper. Lidly she scanned the pages; the day's tale of murder, street fights, disappearances, arrests, and the like did not impress her. Suddenly however her attention was arrested. These were the headlines: "Drastic Attack Upon Easy Divorce."

"Good Heavens," she groaned, "can't I ever get away from the subject! Divorce, divorce, divorce! Everyone's having his say! Well, let's see what's the latest," she mused beginning to scan the article.

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
