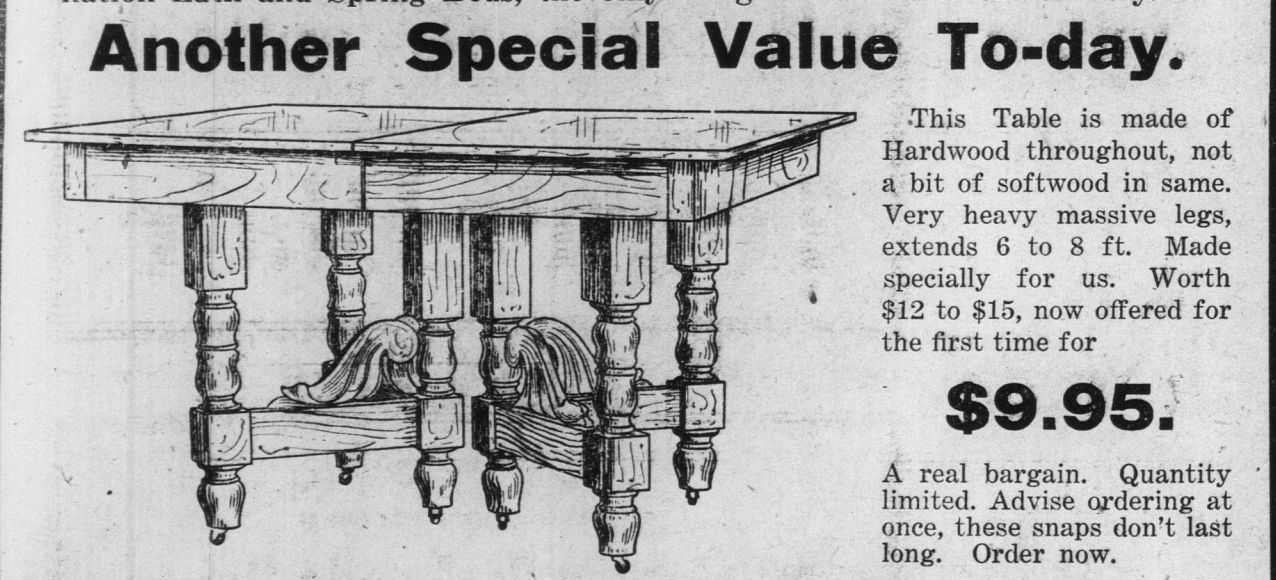

413th Day of the War Latest From the Front.

Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.

OFFICIAL.
LONDON, Sept. 20.
 The Governor, Newfoundland:
 General French reports no change in mining and artillery activity. The French reports are similar.
 German reports announce the capture of Vilna.
 Russian reports enemy advanced in the Vilna region, and further successes near Rovno and in Galicia, where numerous prisoners have been captured.

BONAR LAW.
ST. PIERRE BULLETIN.
PARIS, via St. Pierre, Sept. 20.
 Official. The British fleet having bombarded the German organizations of the Belgian coast, our heavy artillery in Nieuport district co-operating with our Allies fleet, cannonaded the German shore batteries which were shelling the warships. On the Artois front the enemy's artillery fire slackened. Our batteries kept up their bombardment on the German batteries and rather an energetic bombardment and bomb struggles in the Roye district. On the canal running from the Aisne to the Marne we maintained our bombardment at Sappignoul in spite of three hostile attacks. In Champagne the enemy replied faintly to our bombardment, but shell- ed fiercely the district situated between the Aisne and Argonne, also on the Meuse heights. In Lorraine and Vosges our shelling appears to have been particularly efficient. During the day we blew up four German munition depots. Near St. Mihiel a German aeroplane was attacked by the quick fire of our aeroplanes and our batteries, and dropped in the German lines.
 Belgian Bulletin.—A quiet night. The morning was characterized by a great activity on the part of the enemy's artillery especially directed against Groot Oostkerke and Ren- inghe. During the evening was inter- mittent firing on several points of our front and rather an bombardment of Pypegand. Our artillery replied most vigorously and dispersed the German sappers working in the direc- tion of St. Hoore and east of Knoeloc fort.

FRENCH OFFICIAL.
PARIS, Sept. 20.
 An official statement given out by the French War Office this afternoon: In the Artois district our artillery last night delivered violent bombard- ment against works of the enemy and interfered with their provision trains in the environs of Arras and on the front along the Orinchon River, where cannonading was accompanied by a spirited rifle fire and outbursts from the machine guns. In the Champagne district our artillery replied to a bom- bardment of our positions to the north of Camp de Chalons and check- ed the fire of the German heavy ar- tillery. To the north of Perth a depot of munitions within the enemy's lines was blown up. Between the Aisne and Argonne district the artillery of the enemy maintained its activity during all that night. This fire was answered with energy. In Lorraine our batteries continued the destruc- tive fire upon the works of the enemy and brought into their field certain routes by which the enemy has been securing provisions. In the vicinity of Ban de Sapt French field artillery dispersed a detachment of German prisoners.

SITUATION SERIOUS IN THE EAST.
LONDON, Sept. 20.
 The Russian army, menaced since the fall of Vilna by a German encir- cling movement, is estimated vari- ously at 250,000 to 500,000. The con- ditions under which the Russians are attempting to extricate themselves furnishes a striking parallel to those which followed the capture of War- saw. They may precipitate one of the greatest, if not the greatest, battles which has been fought on the eastern front. Although no official confirma- tion has been received in London from Petrograd, this morning of the fall of Vilna, the British press has accepted the German claim.

SIGNIFICANT CHANGE OF SPIRIT.
LONDON, Sept. 20.
 The Daily Telegraph says that of late there is apparent, in connection with submarine crews, which had lately left Germany, a significant change of spirit. It almost appears for the first time since the beginning of the war that the only active section of the German navy has lost faith. It may be that the grim succession of failures to report has, at length, had its inevitable effect in sapping the nerves of the men entrusted with "U" boats on hopeless missions. Most significant evidence of dry rot having set in among the German sailors has been reported this week. The details may not be given, but it is sufficient that the evidence is of a nature not hitherto experienced in the war, ab-

ject in its chief feature and astonish- ing in the hopelessness of the outlook for return.

THE SUPER-DREADNOUGHT BAR- HAM.
NEW YORK, Sept. 20.
 The super-dreadnought *Barham*, of the British Navy, whose keel was laid in 1913, a sister ship of the *Queen Elizabeth* and the *Warspite*, the most powerful battleship afloat, is about ready to be commissioned, according to word brought to New York to-day by the passengers of the steamer *Or- duna*. The *Barham* is now fitting out at Liverpool, and probably will be in service within six weeks.

THE DUMBA CASE.
WASHINGTON, Sept. 20.
 Whatever Government action to- ward James J. Archibald, the Ameri- can correspondent involved in the case of Dr. Dumba, the Austrian Am- bassador, it will not be taken for sev- eral days, not until Archibald has had an opportunity to make explanations to officials here. No further word of the Austrian Government's intention to recall Dumba has been received at the State Department to-day. The only action that the Department will take on Dumba's letter published yes- terday, will be to formally acknowl- edge its receipt.

RESCUED CREW ON THEIR WAY TO NEW YORK.

NEW YORK, Sept. 20.
 The Anchor Line steamer *Tuscania* is on her way to New York to-day, bringing the passengers and crew of the Greek steamer *Athina*, which was on fire and abandoned at sea, accord- ing to a wireless message received from Captain McLean of the *Tuscania*. The *Athina* left New York last Thurs- day for Piraeus, Greece, carrying a few passengers, a large general car- go and many bags of mail. The *Tus- cania*'s latest message came from a point 428 miles from the Ambrose Channel Lightship, and was dated at noon. The passengers aboard number 341 and the crew 68. On the *Ruman- ia*, Piraeus and 67 other surviv- ers. Everyone was saved. The *Tus- cania* sailed from Glasgow on Sunday week, and is due here late to-day, but is expected to arrive before to- morrow.

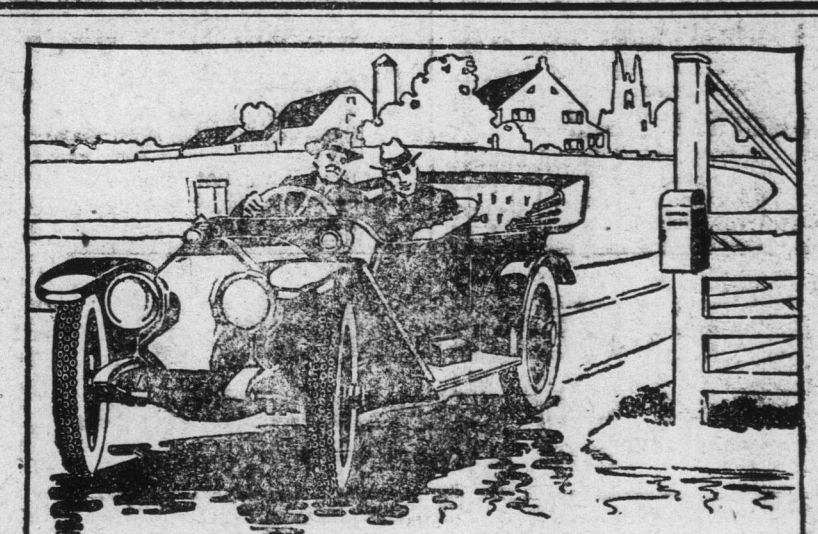

Man Swept Overboard and Drowned.

BANKER NITA M. CONRAD PUTS INTO PORT DAMAGED.

With flag flying at half-mast, the Burin banking schooner Nita M. Conrad, Capt. Rob. Hollett, entered port last evening and reported the loss of one of her crew during a storm in which the vessel got a severe drubbing and sustained damage. The name of the victim is Heber Knight, aged 23 years, unmarried, belonging to Garnish, Fortune Bay. He was a dory hand.

En Route to Labrador.

Capt. Bob, who is a cousin of Skipper Tom and Bill Hollett and equally as noted a fish killer as they, spoke regretfully of the drowning accident as he told of his trip to the Telegram. Having landed the last of the summer's catch which was taken on the Grand Banks, aggregating 3,500 qds., the Nita M. Conrad obtained a full squid baiting and left the home port a week ago, bound for the Labrador coast.

Met Heavy Weather.

The vessel made good headway going north, although quite a deal of fog and rain showers were experienced. On Saturday last when off the Fink Islands a black northeaster sprung up. The storm increased in violence. The wind blew with terrific force, accompanied by mountainous seas and the vessel was badly buffeted. Her foremast was carried away and her deck was constantly swept by the huge seas. One 'comber' was shipped, smashing the galley and doing minor damage about deck and poor Knight lost his life.

Swept Overboard.

The mate and White were engaged "reeving" the mainmast when the vessel was being tossed about roughly and mate Walsh secured himself with rope lashings, but, unfortunately, his assistant did not. The latter was holding on a tackle in one hand for the mate and holding on for his own safety with the other hand. Suddenly a heavy sea boarded the vessel, which gave a lurch, causing Knight to lose his hold and he was carried overboard. Although able to swim, he was instantly buried by the waves. Despite the fury of the elements, however, a dory was launched in an attempt to rescue the drowning man, but the attempt was futile, for as soon as the dory struck the water it was turned turtle. The vessel then bore up for St. John's. The tragic event cast a gloom on board, as deceased was popular and well liked by his fellow shipmates. A particularly sad circumstance in connection with the tragedy is that a brother of the deceased was on deck and witnessed the tragedy, but was powerless to render assistance. The District of Fortune Bay has paid heavily to the toll of the sea this year and the present victim adds another to the list. The Nita M. Conrad will resume the voyage as soon as repairs are effected.

Back From Labrador.

Yesterday's arrivals from the Labrador were: King's Cove—Cecilia and Nettie M. Prince, from Belle Isle with 400 and 450 qds. of codfish respectively. Wesleyville—Speed, Cold Storage, Elena, Goldfinch and Tulip from Labrador with 500, 550, 150, 300, and 350 qds. Trinity—Oriental, Star, Mary Kate and Maggie M., with 750, 320, 300 and 120 qds.

Fishery Report.

Sept. 18th. From T. Hogan, (Carbonar to Western Bay)—There is no bait of any kind and no codfish was caught since last report. The catch to date is 275 qds.

Sept. 18th. From W. R. Andrews, (Great Jarvis Head to Pass Island)—Prospects are fair but bait is scarce though there is plenty squid in Bay d'Espoir. The total catch is 3500 qds. with 200 for last week and 180 dories and skiffs are fishing. It is now settling up time in this Bay and the catch is not quite so good as last year's.

Sept. 18th. From W. White, (Trouty to Port Rexton)—Sixty boats are still fishing but practically no fish was taken this week. The total catch is 6900 qds. Nine vessels have returned from the Labrador with 2570 qds., the Bright Water having 550 not 150 as erroneously reported. The supply of squid is limited and very uncertain and the reports from Labrador are not very encouraging.

Sept. 19th. From T. McCarthy, (Renews to Seal Cove)—The catch to date is 4220 qds. with 20 for last week. Prospects are poor and operations are hindered by stormy weather. Seven boats, 26 dories and 23 skiffs are fishing.

Here and There.

STEPHANO COMING.—The s.s. Stephano leaves Halifax this afternoon for this port.

AT HERRING NECK.—Yesterday the schr. Vera G. reached Herring Neck from the Labrador with 300 qds. of codfish.



MORE DIPHTHERIA.—A new case of diphtheria was reported from Monroe Street last night. The sufferer, a boy, was removed to hospital.
