Our answer to the Am-erican's request must be "No!" He erican's request must be "No!" He said when we agreed over a year ago o allow two cargoes of dye stuffs to bass through from Germany to America it was stipulated by America and Germany that these cargoes were go in exchange for a cargo of coton from America to Germany which ad been contracted for before March. matter was allowed to run g by Germany and America undiffinally the American shipments for Germany came over and we permitted them, to go through to Germany, presuming they were intended in exchange for dyestuffs, but it developed later that Germany paid for cotton cargoes in cash while not shipping dyestuffs. On April 2nd, nearly a ear later, the American Govern allow the dyestuff cargoes to go out ere informed that American industries were suffering from want of dye stuffs, which same argument was used a year ago when we gave permission for the exchange of cargoes. Our attitude is that if American industries are able to get along a whole year without German dyestuffs cargoes, some way must be found to overcome the difficulty that might be applied ow. In other words we don't feel an argent necessity to exist that ought to cause us to allow the dyestuffs to pass

The moral effect has been and is incalulable. England is our friend, and ingland is always loyal to her friends. We cannot compute in figures what it has been worth to Japan.

low News and Relief are Carried to the Keepers of the Tower. . . .

The shores of England are plentiully studded with lighthouses, not a ew of which were built upon small islands, or else isolated rocks, situ-

Stress of weather often cuts off hese lonely watch-towers from the is then that what is known to watchful shore-dwellers as lightouse post comes into play, by means of which communication is establish

ed through even the roughest sea. The head lightkeeper encloses a etter, or letters, in a bottle, and fixes the bottle securely in a wooden case. A leaden keel is attached to serve as ballast, and a small tin sail is added to catch the breeze. This tiny craft is then launched upon the waves, the keepers watch it out of sight, and then go back to their lonely waiting for the

relief-boat. Skerryvore Lighthouse last year had been isolated since December 21. when, on January 10th the head lightkeeper resolved to resort to lighthouse post, and sent off one of these messages by bottle. Favorable winds carried the frail craft to the small island of Eraid, on the southwest side of Mull, which it reached on January 15th. Four days later a similar tiny boat from Erraid carried the message to Bunessan, in Mull, a distance al-

together of thirty miles. Although it is near to the shore. the lighthouse at the Needles can only be approached from the sea in fine weather. So, even there, lighthouse post has sometimes been resorted to, hough nowadays the coastguards, in their station on the cliff above, talk to the keepers and read them extracts from the newspapers over the tele-

The Wolf and Smalls Lighthouses are situated on lonely rocks far out at sea, and their lighthouse post, when resorted to, is very uncertain. The Wolf Rock stands eight miles off Land's End; the Smalls light is erected on one of a group of islands twenty miles south-west of St. David's Head,

n Pembrokeshire. Wolf Rock, the most isolated station in the British Isles, is not connected with the mainland by wire; but the Smalls, which is also an impertant Lloyd's Signaling Station, has a submarine-cable for communications. For all that the keepers like o cheer their wives with a letter per lighthouse post when, owing to heavy weather, relief does not arrive.

Lighthouses have a crew of six men three of whom are on duty for a month while the other three are

Lighthouse relief in rough weather is effected by means of a boat having strong booms projecting from its sides which support stout nets. In most instances the sea is too violent to allow of a landing actually upon the rock itself, and the men have to be hauled up and lowered down into the The nets around the boat have saved many a keeper from being drowned in the boiling surf that beats


