REPUBLICANS RETAIN CONTROL.
HALIFAX, Nov. 9. A bulletin sent from Winnipeg by the Canadian Press this morning announced that the Republicans had gained control of Congress. No details were given and with the telegraph wires west of St. John out of commission due to severe storms, no particulars are available.

FINAL RESULTS IN U.S. ELECTIONS.

NEW YORK, Nov. 9. The sixty-eighth House of Representatives will be composed of 223 Republicans, more than a majority. Democrats, 1 Socialist.

LAWS WELCOMES LLOYD GEORGE.

LONDON, Nov. 9. David Lloyd George started a triumphal progress through Wales today, people leaving farms and benches to greet the train in which he travelled. At Cardiff Station the platform was crowded with fervent admirers who shouted, cheered and sang. Elsewhere similar scenes took place.

FRANCE SENDS ANOTHER WARSHIP.

PARIS, Nov. 9. The French Government has decided to send another battleship to Turkish waters.

SERIOUS FIRE IN SYDNEY.

SYDNEY, N.S., Nov. 9. Fire early this morning destroyed the Fortune block, a wooden structure, 149 Prince Street, and caused a loss of fifteen to twenty thousand dollars. William Poaz, with his wife and four children, living on the second floor, narrowly escaped death, and were forced to flee in their night clothes. Two upstairs lodgers also escaped. The fire was fanned by a strong wind and threatened the adjoining large wooden district. The conflagration started in the Prince Gate, on the ground floor, and from there made its way upstairs and down-

stairs, spreading into the wholesale store of the National Drug and Chemical Company, destroying the stock there.

Work on Humber Commenced.



The frenzied writings of the Advocate in defense of the fishermen is not defense by any means, but a plea for their preservation. I beg to say that it now deceives itself in its own pious fashion if it wills to see on the theory—for such it is—that the fishermen of Bonavista are not disgusted with predatory rule or that they believe in the justness of nominal taxation. The petition against oppressive taxation carried by the Advocate's supporters, and the number of signatures it will make is small total. Even here at Flat where its people are ever ready to sign a petition, and the cry of a man, and the cry of a man's lips is, "It is high time to do something if we hope to exist at all."

Try to prop a dead mule may be a time but finally it degrades and leaves nothing but a skeleton; one would most surely think that the proprietors of such a game would apologize humbly and instantly make amends.

The fishermen well know that the Advocate has more than served its purpose at the game of bluff, and the result of insult is added by sheer obstinacy of insistence of still rubbing salt in the wound. Nameless scribes of the Advocate, however, be unnoticeable but the fact that they amuse one, on these subjects, almost beyond belief. I have no doubt but that as a matter of choice they would, rather than their own inkpots than those which they themselves use. 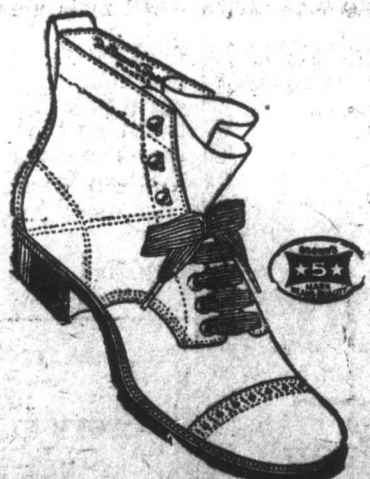

TO-DAY'S MESSAGES

SCHOONER SUNK.
PORTLAND, Maine, Nov. 10. The tern schooner Samuel Hart of New York, was sunk in collision with the sea going tug, Wyoming, five miles east of Small Point at the entrance to Casco Bay late yesterday. The crew were taken off safely and are with the Wyoming.

JUDGMENT ON MONDAY.
MONTREAL, Nov. 10. Judgment in the case of Sir Montagu Allan is to be handed down by Chief Justice DeCarie on Monday next, it was announced to-day, when the decision, due yesterday, was postponed until Monday.

SLENDER MAJORITIES.
CHICAGO, Nov. 10. There will be a continuation of Republican control in Congress, but the majority of one sixty five is cut to fifteen, and the Senate majority cut in half it was assured last night by practically complete, but unofficial reports of Tuesday's elections. While Republicans retained only seven above a House majority of two hundred and eighteen, and five above a Senate majority of forty eight, they will have in the next Congress a plurality of eighteen over Democrats in the House and eleven over Democrats in the Senate.

CHINESE MARINE CASUALTY.
SHANGHAI, Nov. 10. Two hundred persons are reported to have perished in a fire on the river boat Ta Shing, carrying passengers and produce between Shanghai and T'ung-Ming Island, off the Yangtze River.

ISMET HAS A PIPE DREAM.
CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 10. Ismet Pasha, Turkish Nationalist Foreign Minister, left here yesterday afternoon for Lausanne to attend the Peace Conference scheduled to begin there on Monday. He told the Associated Press he was sincerely for peace, and confident of achieving it, if the Allies adopted a reasonable attitude.

MYSTERIOUS SITUATION.
LONDON, Nov. 10. No one in England seems to know whether the Near East situation is better or worse. Since the Turks cut the cable near Chanak, news has been of a vague nature, and the air is full of disquieting rumors.

HAS A WAR OF ITS OWN.
DUBLIN, Nov. 10. There was heavy firing throughout the night in various parts of the city, when irregulars renewed their attack upon Wellington barracks, and also fired upon Portobello barracks. Early morning hours were made hideous by the rattle of machine guns. Two civilians were found dead in the suburbs, and two soldiers were wounded in the city.

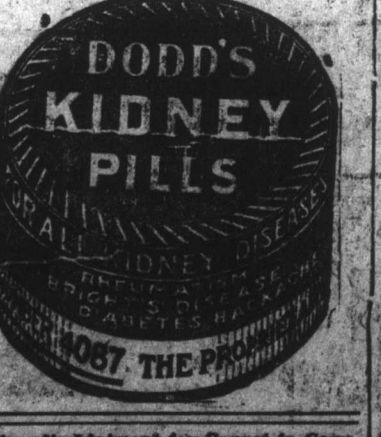
THE STRICT LETTER.

The presents they received were many and costly, testifying to the high esteem in which they were held.

Pavements of Skulls and Precious Stones.

Have you ever heard of anyone constructing their roads of human skulls and precious stones? What claimed to be the queerest pavement in the world was that at Gwanda, in Africa, this queer road being made of human skulls.

The town being small and oval in shape, a palisade of tree poles surrounded it for protection, and the top of each pole was crowned with a grinning skull.

At regular distances along this palisade six gates were built leading to and from the city, the pavement of each gate also being made of human skulls. Of course only the tops of these bony objects could be seen, for the lower parts were buried or set in earth, to keep them rigid.

More than two thousand skulls were used in the pavement leading to each gate, and the road was kept snowy-white, and polished to the smoothness of ivory by the daily passage of hundreds of naked feet.

Another queer and costly pavement was that once constructed at Kimberley, South Africa, and there are few boys who wouldn't have liked to set foot on such a road as this. Through some misunderstanding men who were constructing this road used some of the earth brought up from the diamond mines, and when the work was completed the road was found to be so thickly studded with diamonds that anyone walking along and knowing the worth of the stones, could pick up millions of dollars' worth of the precious gems.

Pavements made of horses' teeth set in cement, granulated cork, shavings, compressed grass, molasses and sand, have been tried in different parts of the world, while such materials as steel, glass and india rubber, for the same roads are familiar to all.

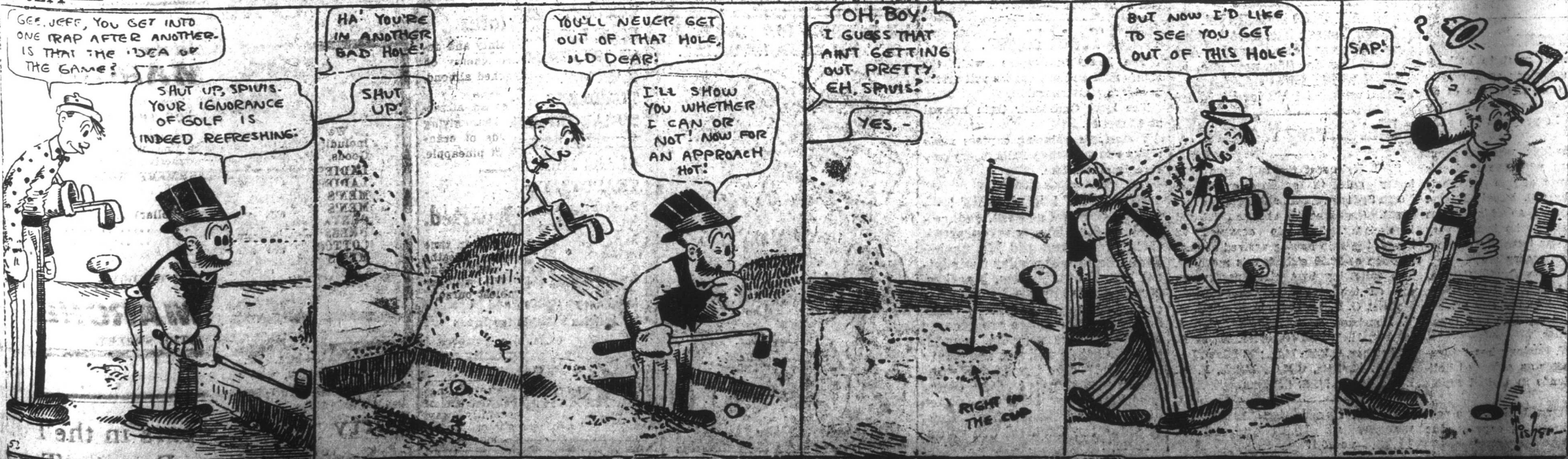

"Hold Fast!"

That is the advice which the fishermen of the North, who have been delayed from getting along by adverse winds and unfavorable weather, send to those already in St. John's. This does not look as though there were any backing down on the part of the men who organized the United Fishermen's movement. Rather, if we are to judge from messages exchanged, they are more determined than ever to support and carry out the spirit of the resolutions already endorsed. These are not the quality of men to be treated with contempt, but it has been left to the Advocate to hurl insults and opprobrious epithets at a class of citizen-producer whose shoe latches the writers in that apart are unworthy to unloose. From the indecency of attacking these men, the Advocate but emphasises its own hypocrisy, when it injudiciously permits itself to go out of its way in an effort to discover material upon which to base its assaults on as fine a body of men as any country can produce. Years ago, and not so many at that, the organ was slandering over these same gentlemen, and the best words of praise in its vocabulary were not sufficient to eulogise them. But a change has come over the spirit of the "suum cuique" dream. The cuique is still there, but the suum has been eliminated. The reason is not far to seek. So long as the men of the North obeyed all the commands of the dictator, and were submissive to his wishes, they were great fellows. Now that they have refused allegiance, and no longer accept as gospel all that is being preached from headquarters at Port Union, and disseminated through the Advocate, they are anathema, and a crusade has been ordered against them, in which all the scribes that can be hired are given a free hand and unlimited space. But what advantage? The fishermen are no more to be turned from their purpose than are the steady currents of the Gulf Stream. They have united in a common cause—the greatest common cause of all, viz, the right to live. They are tolerant too of the right of others, but they will not stand for the quality of abuse thrown at them by a newspaper, which at one time declared that they were the chosen people, and that the man who at that time led, or professed to lead, them was a modern Moses or Joshua, a deliverer, combined. Our evening contemporary is peeved because the fishermen of the hour have not danced to its piping, hence the men who have broken away from the trammels of other days are not to be considered by the faithful as deserving of either support or sympathy. They get neither from their quondam friend, which has now become their enemy. The fishermen, however, reck not of this change of front. The fight which they are waging, plan of campaign for which will be mapped out at their meeting to-night, is not for any particular section of the country, but for the whole country at large, and whatever benefits may accrue from the present movement all will participate in them. Endeavoring

to divert attention from the forward movement of the producers and incidentally the maintainers of the whole island, by an endeavor to turn the popular mind toward the Humber Deal will not materialize. What the fishermen want to-day is a fair and equitable price for their fish, with a future reduction of overburdening taxation. After they have received these concessions, they may turn their thoughts toward the agreement about which no person knows anything yet, but any kudos for which, Mr. Coaker has promptly arrogated to himself, putting the Prime Minister in the background. It is not the Prime Minister and Mr. Coaker, it is "Mr. Coaker and Sir Richard Squires"—vide Advocate of Wednesday. Another case of "Ego et Rex meus."

Advocate Denounced.

FISHERMEN OF BONAVISTA BAY STAND BY A. B. MORINE—WILL NOT TOLERATE ABUSE OF HIM OR DELEGATES.

Another public meeting was held here last night in Glover Hall to arrange for sending delegates to St. John's by S. S. Susu, as requested by our adviser, Mr. A. B. Morine. A message of greeting from Mr. Morine was read by the Chairman, after which P. Carter, Fox, N.R.N., rose and asked if this was the same Morine the Advocate was abusing, with Bragg, Carter and Wornell. The Chairman said yes. "Well, then," said Fox, "this is the man that helped us in the sealers' strike and he is the man that will help us now." Then followed three rousing cheers for A. B. Morine, K.C., which made the building shake. There followed the speakers, Messrs. Frank Green, S. W. Hoddnott, George Oakly, Aaron Barry, William Hunt, E. J. Wornell, E. J. Crummy, K. Oakly and Uriah Hoskins. True British spirit was manifested right through the meeting. A resolution was moved and carried unanimously denouncing the Advocate and its editor for the abusive language contained therein against Morine, Bragg, Carter and Wornell, and the sentiment of the people here is that if this thing goes on red-handed, the Advocate and its management will be held responsible. The people here also determined not to allow the Advocate or any other paper to abuse Bragg, Carter and Wornell, and the quicker this is stopped the better for all concerned. Delegates are leaving this morning by S.S. Susu. Reinforcements are ready when needed.

An Interesting Case.

ACTION BY BRAZILIAN FIRM.
Argument in the matter of Mendez, Lima & Co., vs. The Union Trading Co., occupied the attention of Mr. Justice Kent in the Supreme Court this forenoon. Mr. P. A. Mews appeared for the Trading Co. and Mr. H. A. Winter for the plaintiff. The Brazilian firm is claiming \$2,000 damages on a contract in which Mr. G. M. Barr was named as shipper. The fish was shipped by the schooner Freedom in the fall of 1920 and turned out bad. G. M. Barr's brand was put on the packages. The Union Trading Co. as owners of the fish and G. M. Barr were named in a previous action. Mr. G. M. Barr has since been excluded from the only the word "shipper" and the identification marks, would prove that the fish belonged to G. M. Barr. Last Night's Fire.

DESTRUCTION OF CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH NARROWLY AVERTED.
A still alarm brought the Central and East End fire companies to the Congregational Church at 8.50 last evening, where they found a blaze in progress at the extreme eastern end of the building, which was caused by defective wiring lighting the transformer which was attached to the church. The flames for some minutes spread in an upward direction and a fire that threatened to destroy the sacred edifice looked very serious for some minutes. The fire truck which arrived speedily to the scene extinguished the blaze with the use of the chemical, while a stream of water from a nearby hydrant relieved all danger of any further recurrence. The usual week of prayer service was being held in the basement of the church at the time, and the congregation, when informed of the fire, by Mr. Parsons, who lives on the opposite side of the street, made a hurried exit. Very little damage was done, but it was fortunate for the church and the city that the transformer when first placed in position at the eastern end of the building was fastened to the concrete wall and not the woodwork, otherwise a very serious conflagration might have ensued.

Published by Authority.

His Excellency the Administrator has received a cablegram from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for the Colonies, intimating that His Majesty the King has expressed the wish that on Armistice Day, Nov. 11th, there shall be a complete suspension of all normal business throughout the British Empire during the two minutes silence, commencing at 11 a.m.

His Excellency and Ministers, feeling sure that the people of this ancient and loyal Colony desire to perpetuate the memory of our great deliverance and of those who laid down their lives to achieve it, direct that such observance shall take place throughout this Colony, and that at 11 a.m. on Saturday next, the 11th instant, all normal activities shall be suspended for the space of two minutes, during which time all thoughts will be concentrated in reverent remembrance of the Glorious Dead.

In St. John's the Gun at Cabot Tower will be fired at the hour above named. For the two minutes as above trains will be stopped on the railways, traffic on the streets, ships at sea (as far as possible) and work suspended everywhere, in schools, shops, mines, factories, etc. During the two minutes there should be complete silence.

His Excellency the Administrator and Ministers believe that all will gladly interrupt their business and pleasure, whatever it may be, and unite in this simple service of silence and remembrance.

Engineering Wonders at Wembley.

Wide Range of Inventions For The Empire Exhibition—Press-the-Button Era.

The most up-to-date and representative assembly of machinery that the world has ever seen will be shown at the British Empire Exhibition in 1924. Hundreds of thousands of pounds worth of 20th century inventions and craftsmanship will be on view. At the invitation of the Executive Council of the Exhibition, the British Engineers' Association and the British electrical and Allied Manufacturers' Association have consented to organize and arrange all the exhibits of electrical, general, and marine engineering, and the ablest men in these industries are now applying their minds assiduously to this stupendous task. Shipbuilding improvements are sure to play a part worthy of an Empire of great mariners. Latest developments in ship-construction and marine engineering will be displayed. Vis-

itors will be able to see how the oil in modern oil-burning ships is distributed from the tanks to the burners beneath the boilers. You press a button and you get your boots cleaned. Perhaps the general public, and particularly the rising generation, will be most interested in the exhibits of aircraft and aeronautics generally, and in the wireless section. Transmitting sets, aeriads and power units for long-distance communication will astonish visitors who have not yet realized the enormous progress that is continually being made in the commercial application of wireless transmission. Every kind of receiving set, from the simple "crystal" unit to a complete multi-valve equipment, will be explained. In addition there will be, at frequent intervals, practical demonstrations of wireless transmission and reception of messages, speeches and musical items. Visitors will be able to get into touch with the best musical and theatrical entertainments of the West End, and with the big political demonstrations, if any, are held during the run of the Exhibition. Engineering, however, is only one of the sections of this vast Empire trade-

fair. It has been decided to divide the exhibits into ten sections, 45 groups and 150 classes. Thirty-five classes and group committees have been formed, and the organization of the exhibits of each industry is in the hands of its own acknowledged experts.—B.E.E. News Service.

Municipal Council
WEEKLY MEETING.

The weekly meeting of the Municipal Council was held yesterday afternoon. Mayor Cook presided and Councillors Martin, Oxtarbridge, Vintcombe, Ryan and Dowden were present. After the minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed the following matters received consideration.

Communications were read from the proprietors of Queen, Majestic, Star and Casino Theatres, asking a reduction in the Tax on local Moving Pictures and Theatrical entertainments, as the present percentage of 3 1/2 per cent on the gross earnings is excessive. They pointed out that this tax was first imposed with a view to the city receiving a revenue on many thousands of dollars which have been taken out of the country by outside performers. They further stated that in running these theatres they employ quite a number of citizens, and that to tax them on the salaries paid these people is hardly just. The matter was thoroughly discussed by the Council, and deferred for further consideration.

Mr. F. C. Stacey called attention to the inadequate lighting of Warbury Street and asked that arrangements be made for the placing of additional lights at the locality or at least the rearrangement of present conditions. The Lighting Committee will visit the site and see what can be done.

Mr. J. Dempsey applied for permission to install an electric motor on his premises, Flower Hill was referred to the City Engineer.

The following plans were passed, subject to the approval of the City Engineer:—Eda Burke (extension) Forest Road; A. Stapleton (outhouse) Merrymeeting Road; A. W. Bourne (dwelling) Mayor Avenue; and A. Dawe (dwelling) Alexander Street, provided they pay their proportion of cost according to frontage for water and sewerage extension.

The City Engineer reported that a small bridge on the Southside Road needed repairs. This was ordered to be given attention.

Tenders are to be called for the repairing of retaining wall, Henry Street (rear of Gover Street.)

Orders were given to have posts placed on the Promenade, so as to prevent it being further used by vehicular traffic.

The report on the health of the city for week showed five new cases of Diphtheria; four of Typhoid and three Scarlet Fever.

Repts of the City Engineer, Sanitary Supervisor, etc. were tabled; accounts presented ordered paid, after which the meeting adjourned.

ROMANCE OF MOOT HALL.

The ancient Courts of Northumberland were held in the great Tower of Moot Hall until the reign of Queen Elizabeth. The Moot Hall was for a time used for the keeping of assizes, and gaol delivery for

the County of Northumberland, but the prison in the Castle had so frequently been condemned for its inconvenience and unhealthiness, that on November 10, 1808, the gentlemen of the Grand Jury proposed the erection of a new building which might do honour to the liberality and hu-

manity of the county. Accordingly an Act of Parliament was obtained by the exertions of the Right Honourable Earl Percy "to enable his majesty to grant the Moot Hall grand jury room." When extensive alterations were decided upon, it was found to be a gigantic undertaking. Before

even the foundation was dug it was necessary to remove an enormous mound, surrounded by what was called the Half-moon battery. This was a vast accumulation of ashes, etc., about 32 feet high, 100 feet in length, and of great width. After its removal the digging of the foundation took place when several antiquities were discovered, which clearly proved that it was the "settle" of the Roman station before it was occupied by the Saxons. About 14 feet from the surface two copper coins of the Emperor Antoninus and two Roman altars were found. The workmen also discovered two sets of stags' horns, a bone or ivory pin by which the Romans fastened their mantles, a small matchet, and a number of oak beams and posts of frame-work. When at a depth of 5 feet from the surface a well was found (filled up) which was walled with excellent hewn stonework to the depth of 9 feet. At the bottom were two buckets, with their iron chains and several other things as they had been left in early days.

Hairpin Research

BACK TO PREHISTORIC TIMES.

What in the world would we women do without hairpins? Even with bobbed hair it is necessary to have some kind of a fastening to keep that long front lock from forever sliding down into one's eyes. And yet they just won't stay in. They just naturally scatter all over the place. A man with an especially investigating mind once decided to pick up every hairpin he saw within the short distance that he was walking up a business street. By the time he had gone four blocks he had over 100 hairpins of assorted colors and sizes in his coat pocket. He finally became panic-stricken and dumped the lot in the next trash box.

It doesn't seem to matter whether they have humps or merely wiggles in their wavy sides—they just won't stay in.

Yet the very earliest kind of pin was used as a hair ornament to keep a woman's long hair out of her way and decorate it at the same time. These earliest hairpins were really spikes made of the bones of small fish. Among the remains found on the sites of the prehistoric lake dwellings of Europe are several such bone pins, some of which are carved very elaborately. Most of the pins found in the ruins, however, are made of bronze. In certain parts of Switzerland 10,000 such pins have been collected from ruins. The patterns of these hairpins, many of which have

the double stem of the modern variety, are extremely curious and beautiful. Pompeian ruins have yielded up some very interesting Roman hairpins.

Spoilt by Speed.

There are many people who hate gramophones. Why? Simply because they've never heard them played properly. Correctly handled, the modern gramophone is a "thing of joy." Incorrect handling not only offends the ear, but spoils the records as well. There are many types of gramophone records, all calling for different handling.

The first rule, to get the best possible result, is to see that the turntable is revolving correctly. The revolutions of the turntable vary from seventy-four to ninety-one per minute. But the American-made record has a standard speed of seventy-eight revolutions to the minute. This is a great advantage, for it obviates the necessity of altering the speed-control mechanism.

It will be found that seventy-eight revolutions per minute is a good average speed for tone. To have the turntable revolving at eighty-six revolutions for a hard record is fatal. The loud parts in the music become harsh blare, and the needle grinds into the delicate surface of the record, which soon results in severely damaging it.

Take Care of Your Records. To mellow the tone of orchestral and band records, many players insert the needle about one-eighth of an inch only. This is sufficient for the needle to be gripped by the sound-box screw, and the good results are apparent, even on records that have been well worn.

ten neglect to denote the speeds at which their records should be played. Experiment will put the player on the right track. He will soon get to know the different speeds necessary and adjust his speed-control accordingly. Altogether there is far too much carelessness in handling a gramophone. Records are delicate things. They are sent out in flimsy paper wrappers, and soon get scratched. Cabinets are expensive items, but a box could easily be fitted with partitions to hold the records, each partition being lined with felt or some other soft material that would not scratch the records when they are slid in or out. Open Letter

TO GAME AND INLAND FISHERIES BOARD.

Game and Inland Fisheries Board, Gentlemen:—I desire to publicly call your attention to the need for some special measures if this country would preserve from the fate of the Great Auk, the remnant of our caribou herd. Even should the interior remain as wild as it is to-day, there is grave fear that the deer are doomed to extinction unless we take some special means to preserve them, such as the providing of a suitable sanctuary. There are some in our midst who think we have herds whose retreat has not yet been invaded, and one genius suggests that we try to discover this hiding place in order to preserve the deer. For my part I do not believe in the existence of such a spot or such a herd. The possibility of forest exploitation on the Humber and adjacent territory and the development of yet another forest project on the South Coast should make us pause to seriously consider the effect of such development on our game and fish resources. Such development means, of course, the driving of the remaining deer into more and more restricted territory and this means to the deer I need not labor as every one who thinks at all must serve able to guess. We have other game threatened with extermination too if we fail to take the necessary means in time to preserve them. Are you gentlemen of the Game Board considering this matter? I presume you are. Years ago a study of this question of the preservation of our game should have been taken up, and a survey of the whole situation made, so that you might be prepared for such a contingency as now confronts you. Because of your lack of alert interest you now find yourselves face to face with a problem you are totally unprepared to meet, and the country must suffer as a consequence. I take this liberty of speaking thus plainly to you because I have made that question of game preservation a life obsession. I believe I was the first one ever to have raised a voice on behalf of our deer. As far back as 1894 I publicly protested against the wanton slaughter then going on among the caribou and called for restrictive measures. This, I think, gives me a right to demand now that you gentlemen get busy. Yesterday I wrote regarding the growing scarcity of water fowl on Labrador. Men will say that foxes are the cause when as a matter of fact shooting and nest robbing have been the real cause. Birds have been diminishing in numbers for some years past, as is well known to all who have taken the trouble to observe. The Northern Elder, was once swarming on Labrador, it is now becoming rare. Even from no lighter ideal than the purely mercenary this is regrettable for the down from the nests of those birds should be providing a substantial sum to those who are so fortunate as to be in touch with the breeding places of those birds. In Scandinavia and Iceland the Elders are semi-domesticated and the down derived from their nests is an important source of revenue. Why are we so lacking in a spirit of economy as to go on heedlessly destroying and never giving a thought to what folly we are committing. Our legislators, our public men are strangely inert and unhelpful in such matters as these, it is time that we turn over a new leaf and begin to give some attention to conservation.

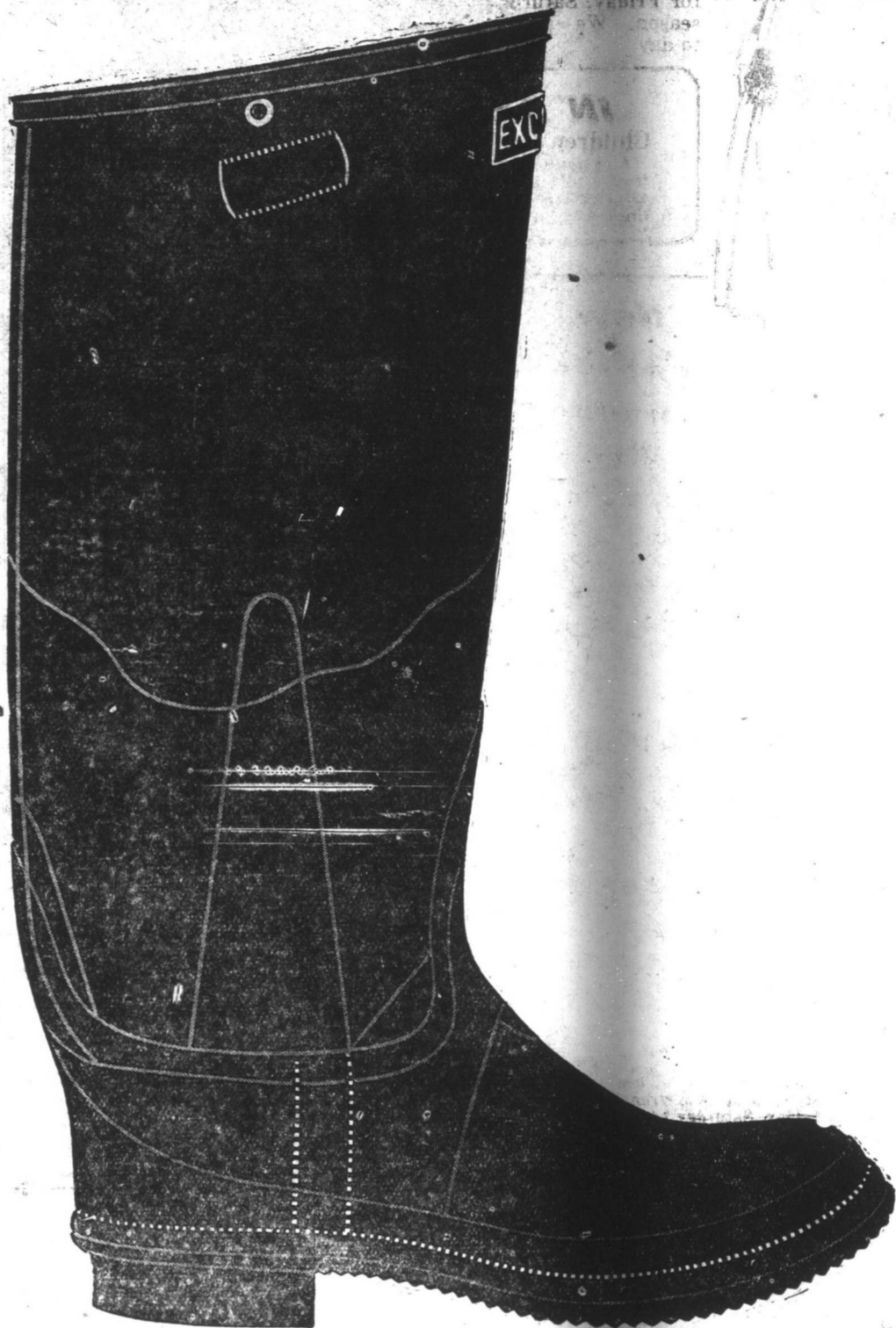

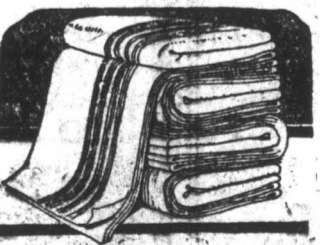
