

Spiders That Make Fly-Papers STRANGE HABITS OF WONDERFUL

No creature has more curious or ineresting habits than the spider. The Queensland spider has been called "The Magnificent," because the female has gorgeous colouring. One of the most interesting features of the Queensland spider is its method of catching the moths upon which it feeds. It does this in the same way

in which we capture flies on a fly-pa-

The spider hangs down from a web and spins a thread of about an inch and a half in length. At the end of this thread, which is held out by one of its hind legs, is a drop of some very sticky substance, about the size of a pin's head. When a moth comes near, the spider swings its thread round and round at an amazing speed. Once the moth has been touched by the drop on the end, it becomes held fast. Then it is pulled up by the spider and killed and eaten.

Preparing For Dinner. Rather similar is the behaviour of another spider which may be said to be a relation of the Queensland insect. It is found in South Africa and is as large as its relative.

H. J. WATTS, H.M.C. (H. F. SHORTIS.)

By the death of H. J. Watts of H M. Customs, which occurred on Saturday evening, St. John's has lost a most respected citizen, and the Public Service a most efficient and popular

H. J. Watts was born in Harbon Grace 76 years ago, and was the eldest son of the late Claudius Watts, who at the time of his demise had nearly rounded off the century. He received his education at the famous Grammar School in that town, and after leaving that institution, he was employed for a short time in the employ of W. H. Thompson, Anglo Telegraph operator and druggist. About 1870, Mr. Watts left his native town and travelled extensively in the United Thanksgiving the hunger of the masses for good States and Canada. He went as far west as the Rocky Mountains, and was engaged in various employments in towns of both countries. LONDON, Oct. 29 (A.P.)-The record of Miss Margaret J. Williams, a Richmond school teacher, who has caned only one pupil during a teaching career of 40 years, is rather unique in this country where pedagogue still accept the old adage, "spare the rod and spoil the child."

"I hardly ever do punish them," she said, "but when I do I make it a rule to hear their side of the question first, I recognize that they have a sense of justice as a child. And I always wait till my temper cools

Inland Waterways

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30-(By Canadian Press)-Indications are not lacking that the movement for inland waterways may soon receive strong backing from some of the big business interests in this country. Shippers of heavy products are showing increasing restiveness under the freight rates which the railroads impose and increasing disposition to turn toward he waterways. Not only are the farmers and

handlers of grain and other agricultural products becoming more and more converted to the need of greater use of the waterways, but so are such interests as the coal interests. Coal men in the United States are finding their markets restricted by lack of ample facilities for shipment of coal by boat and barge. Decline of Canadian coal purchases from the United States, especially soft coal, is leading to consideration of railroad freight rates and how far the condition could be improved by more use of water routes, including development of the St. Lawrence waterway.

Progress of the present campaign. discloses that the waterway question is getting much attention, especially in the agricultural regions of the Mississippi Valley. La Follette is urging waterway development, including the St. Lawrence project Moreover, many of the candidates for ongress without regard to party are pledging themselves to waterway de-

The result of this, in the opinion of advocates of internal waterway development in this country, will be that the newly elected Congress, which was chosen a few days ago, will strongly favor liberal waterway


