MEETING AT THE CENTRE INN.—Mr. Armstrong's friends held a meeting at the Centre Inn, Eramosa, last night, Mr. Robert Royce in the chair. It was well attended. Mr. R. Taylor, of Elora, made a long speech in favor of Mr. Armstrong. Mr. Hood, of Erin, replied on behalf of Mr. Loghrin. Mr. L. Parkinson, Mr. Milroy and other gentlemen spoke. No vote was taken, and a good deal of feeling was displayed by parties on both sides.

CENTRE RIDING.—A meeting of the friends of Mr. J. S. Armstrong was held at Hirst's Hotel on Wednesday night, the turn out being about one hundred. Mr. D. Wallace was in the chair; Mr. C. Nicklin, secretary. Speeches were made by Messrs. Shaw, Wilkinson, Nicklin and Telfer. The speaker strongly represented that Mr. Loghrin had divided the Reform cause. What gave the meeting a little more interest was the fact that Mr. Grain, of Fergus, who was present, admitted that the Conservatives got up Mr. Loghrin's requisition, although he did not sign it himself. A vote of confidence in Mr. Armstrong was called for, and was nearly unanimous. At the close three cheers were given for the Queen and Mr. Armstrong.—Com.

The Holman Troupe last Night.

This Troupe gave their first performance in the Town Hall last night to a large and delighted audience. La Sonnambula was well put on the stage and well performed. Miss Sallie Holman was in excellent voice, and her rendition of the music, conjoined with her acting, shows that her vocal powers are of the highest order, and that she has in full command all the qualities of a first class actress. Some of the scenes, such as in the sleep walking, were very effective, and elicited great applause. Mr. Drew, as Elvino, was very effective, and Mr. Holman as Count Rudolph, sustained the character creditably. The rest of the characters were well sustained.

The eccentric song and dance mentioned in the programme were sung and performed admirably by Master C. Burton, a very small but very comical boy. Two encores proved how he was appreciated by the audience. The farce "1,000 Millionaires Wanted," was well fitted to put the audience in good humor before dispersing. It was what is generally termed a "roaring farce," and in it Mr. Davidge, who had played comedy in La Sonnambula proved his possession of talent. It was his part to assume the guise and mien of an elderly lady, and so well did he act his part, that some who had seen him leave the stage to don his habit could not believe that it was not really and truly a lady who returned. The delusion was rendered stronger by his power to imitate a female voice—a power not possessed by the gentleman who was playing a similar part. At the conclusion of this play "God Save the Queen" was rendered in a beautiful and thrilling manner, and the audience then dispersed. To-night will be given the comic opera. "The Child of the Regiment" and the "Minstrel Scene." Admission same as last night, and performance to commence at the same time.

Dr. Howitt the Politician.

SIR,—A good deal of importance being attached by the Coalitionists to the fact that Dr. Howitt and they entertain similar views respecting the question which now agitates the country, it may not be improper to examine the opinions of the doctor as set forth in some of his late speeches. Though differing from him politically, we do not the less admire his zeal, candor and loyalty—those qualities which shine so conspicuously in, and constitute the chief staple of, his oratory. From those vehement bursts of patriotism he parades so earnestly before the elector, one is apt to infer that the doctor thinks himself suspected of leaning towards annexation principles. Is it because he and the Coalitionists happen to be on the same side that we are bored with these patriotic effusions? Neither Mr. Saxon nor "Our George," nor yet Mr. Knowles, though no doubt as loyal as the doctor, can at all approach the latter in ranting about the patriotism we would display in subduiting ourselves to the mercies of the Coalition Government. The doctor laments and deprecates the existence of so much "faction" and opposition to the members composing our Privy Council. But why in pointing out the disease did he not direct us to the proper remedy? Is not the present Government itself the real cause of all the evil he so pathetically desires to see removed? If we have reason to believe that more good must accrue to the Dominion from the existing Administration than will neutralize all the ills arising from "faction," then by all means let ministers keep their seats; if not, the sooner they resign the better. A great deal of "rubbish and nonsense," observes the doctor, has been said against Coalitionists. This is very true, but it is equally true that a great deal of "rubbish and nonsense" has been advanced in their favor, and by none in a higher degree than the doctor himself. Mr. Stirton stated very truly a great evil in the formation of our Government, and one to which no vindication has yet been given. We have thirteen Ministers to do the work of six. Have any of the Coalitionists shown why so many are necessary to form the Privy Council, when across the lines with a population nearly eight times larger than ours, there are less than half that number? What signify, says the doctor, a few thousand dollars in comparison with the benefits we will derive from us all joining and giving the ministry a unanimous support. What benefits we ask? The doctor takes delight in exalting the creations of his imagination and pouring them forth in the shape of vague generalities, which may mean anything or nothing, just as his auditors please. If it be right to spend a few thousand dollars without any real cause, ground or reason, why not spend as many millions in the same way? If it be right to create seven or eight unnecessary offices to accommodate a few political sharpers, and pay them five, six or perhaps eight thousand dollars a year, and that this is to be a benefit to the Dominion, then the more needless offices created and the more money squandered the better for the country. A calculated writer exclaims, "Let me exhort and conjure you, never to suffer an invasion of your political constitution, however minute the instance may appear, to pass by without a determined persevering resistance. One precedent creates another. They soon accumulate and constitute law. What yesterday was fact, to-day is doctrine. Examples are supposed to justify the most dangerous measures, and where they do not suit exactly the defect is supplied by analogy. Be assured that the laws which protect us in our civil rights, grow out of the constitution, and they must fall or flourish with it. This is not the case of faction, or of party, or of any individual, but the common interest of every man in the Dominion." The doctor is in favor of a Government which at the present crisis should unite in itself the strength and influence of all parties. This is very desirable, but we cannot shut our eyes to the fact that the present Administration is not that one. It is in our civil rights, grow out of the constitution, and they must fall or flourish with it. GENEVA, Sept. 12 (eve.)—A radical congress which met on the 9th inst., is still in session. Proceedings attract much interest. During the sitting this morning a sharp attack was made by the Unionists of the United States, in reference to an excited discussion on ill-feeling was created between the close of the session, and withdrew from the Congress.

is merely a whim. He complains bitterly of the denunciation of our public men but are not those who differ from the men denounced as severely, and probably with far less reason, by the press on the opposite side? The Dr. would have the rule to work only one way. But why indulge in these peevish exclamations against the abuses of the freedom of the press? It is only exaggerating the evils of which he complains. Swift has said somewhere—"Censure is the tax a man pays to the public for being eminent. Addison observes—"It is a folly in an eminent man to think of escaping it, as a weakness to be affected by it." Further remarks, if public men are to receive more than they deserve, they are entitled to, and hence we may conclude the Dr's. whining is altogether gratuitous. It is certainly a new doctrine the nineteenth century that public men and their acts ought not to be criticised. But it is contended that denunciations will incite them to do what is wrong. That depends to a very great extent upon their character. If our ministers be good as their friends insist they are, as determined on principle to do what is right and most conducive to the welfare of the country, no amount of censure will deter them from fulfilling the duty, and demonstrating even to the enemies that they have been most fully mis-represented. By such means they will make all good men of both parties their supporters, and may justly remain indifferent to the petty cavils of a newspaper critic. We readily admit that abuse, whether merited or unmerited will make bad men worse, but on the Dr's. supposition our ministers are the best that could be selected, therefore objections do not apply. He is surprised at so much agitation when there is a question before the country to contest about. But if this be true, all the Dr's. patriotic eloquence is thrown away. It is certainly very strange for people have so much contention about nothing. The importance of a question does not depend upon our notions regarding it, abstractly considered, but on the view which the people take of it; and the fact that each party is putting forth its best strength to secure the election, candidates most favorable to its own peculiar opinions proves incontrovertibly that the present question is one of no ordinary magnitude. Whether we shall have an economical or extravagant government, what no sane man can overlook. We might go on further to show the unbalance of all the Dr's. positions, but enough has been pointed out to convince the electors that nature never designed him for a guide or observer in political affairs. THE ELECTIONS YESTERDAY.

REFORM VICTORIES. In Prince Edward, at the close of the first days polling, Ross was 470 ahead of McCuaig.

In the South Riding of Perth, at the close of the first day's polling, Macfarlane was 328 ahead of Guest. The total vote for Macfarlane is 1065, and for Guest 737.

The vote stood thus—Waterloo Village for Springer 66, for Zieger 29; Berlin, Springer 33, Zieger 137; Waterloo Township Springer 111, Zieger 137; Woolwich Springer 193, Zieger 137; Wellesley majority for Zieger 41, for Springer 403, for Zieger 339.

From North Ontario, the returns are not full enough to warrant any confident predictions as to the result of the contest between Mr. Thompson and Mr. M. C. Cameron for the House of Commons. As far as they are they are very favourable to Mr. Thompson.

The Quebec Daily News says:—In probability we shall have a tolerable good fall fleet—good as compared with our mercantile men expected. However, any large number of vessels here, it is not because our business just now requires many cargoes, it is simply because there is no chance for vessels to be sent to the other side of the world.

The amount of logs got out, and the prospect of getting them down stream to the mills is as anxiously watched and canvassed here, as the growing wheat crop ever is in Canada.
