Huron and Ontario Ship Canal.

Toronto is very much agitated about the Huron and Ontario Ship Canal, It was to be expected that Toronto, the metropolis of selfishness, as well as of Ontario, would be. We spoke in favour of allowing the Provincial literary institutions in her midst to remain in statu quo, but we can by no means sympathise with her in her half crazy efforts to become one of the termini of a canal which has been projected, but which will never be cut. On Thursday night last, a pilot engine standing on the G. W. R. track, at Komoka, was run into by the night mail train coming east, and was considerably broken up. The mail does not stop at Komoka station, but rushes by usually at the rate of about 20 miles an hour. The pilot had no business on the main line at the time of the collision, and as yet the reason of its being there is not satisfactorily accounted for. It is said, however, that the engineer and fireman, being over fatigued by the exertions of the week, had fallen asleep. The engine was not observed by the engineer of the night mail until too near to avert a collision, which resulted with a great shock. 
