

EIGHTH YEAR
IRELAND AT FEVER HEAT.

THE MICHELSON OCCURRENCE.

A Great Demonstration Will be Made at the Funeral of the Victims—Remembrance of All the Victims—Remained in Their Beds.

DUNLOP, Sept. 12.—In the House of Commons this afternoon, on a motion that the House go into committee on the Appropriation bill, Sir William Watson, Ireland, had called attention to the general policy of the Government in Ireland, especially to the injury of the rights of the tenants by the holding of public meetings.
