The Policy-holders and Guarantors of the North American Life Assurance Company held their Annual Meeting at the Head Office in this city on the 28th ult. The meeting was a large and full attendance.

During the year 1891 policies were issued amounting to \$1,363,025, exceeding both in number and amount of insurance the business of 1890. The Directors advise that the same rate of interest as was recommended last year be continued on the paid-up portion of the Guarantor Fund.

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
