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A POPULAR APPOINTMENT

The New School Inspector for Cumberland County is a St Croix Cove Boy

Mr. Bradford R. Hall, B. A., who succeeds Mr. F. G. Morehouse, B. Sc., as inspector of schools for Cumberland Co., was born in St. Croix Cove, Annapolis Co.

After receiving a common and high school education he attended the provincial Normal school, Truro, N. S., receiving the E. license.

The two years following he was principal of the school at Weymouth North, Digby Co., resigning there to accept the principalship at the schools in Canning.

After a year's successful teaching in Canning, Mr. Hall entered Acadia University, which institution he attended for two years. In 1915 he took charge of the Joggin schools and after remaining there two years returned to Acadia, graduating in 1919, with the degree of B. A. In the same year he received his A. license.

At the beginning of the present year Mr. Hall accepted the principalship of the Parrsboro school, to which position he will resign in a few days much to the regret of pupils, teachers and citizens to accept his new appointment.

In August of the present year Mr. Hall married Miss Evelyn Smith of Clarence, Annapolis Co., also one of our popular provincial teachers.

GERMAN CANNON FOUND AT ANNAPOLIS

Premier Murray made a very felicitous address congratulating Mr. Clarke upon the many privileges of life which he was enjoying, and expressing appreciation for his services to the business and public life of the country.

The dinner was given by Mr. MacIntyre, the son in law of Mr. Clarke. Not least among the features of the event was the presence of Mr. Estes of New York, who is in Halifax in connection with a case with Clarke Brothers Limited, now being tried in Court. Mr. Estes made a peculiarly appropriate speech for the occasion, and the incident was accepted as evidence that Mr. Clarke's personal relations are not affected by business misunderstandings.

THE ANNAPOLIS VALLEY

As Described by a Party of Tourists from the United States in an Automobile

Mr. and Mrs. Daniel C. Watson, of Woodford street and Mr. and Mrs. Claude E. Kittredge, of Milford have just returned from a delightful three weeks' automobile tour through the picturesque Annapolis Valley—the Land of Evangeline—famed in poetry, song and story.

The party started from Milford carrying along a camping outfit, and made stop over trips to Calais, St. John, Moncton, Pictou, Truro and Halifax, N. S., thence through the Annapolis Valley and through the more than 160 miles of continuous apple country. Mr. Chute, the famous "Apple King" of that section informed the party that last season's crop yielded a profit of \$2,000,000 but that the Kings County apple yield this year would fall about 30 per cent short of that.

The party selected beauty spots along the route and pitched their tent over night, having first stopped at the general stores in the nearby village for supper of their tender, juicy moose steak, and readers, stop look and listen! All those considerable dealers charged for their delectable and nourishing venison steak 25 cents per pound—get that 25 cents per pound—and to still further harass us Mr. Watson vouches for the information that breakfast made out H. C. L. "take the count" for fair as they hooked that from the speckled trout brook accommodatingly close by.

At the outskirts of the quaint little Evangeline village the party dropped alongside the stone wall with its old time pole sweep just as it was in the then happy—but later hapless—days of the little gathering of French settlers.

The surrounding country is a great beef section as all of the farmers own hundreds of head of cattle and round them up in west Western style, and handle, dress and cure them in much the same wholesale and modern manner.

They have some wonderful pictures of their delightful trip as their camera was found to be a very necessary and interesting part of their outfit. They reached Digby, N. S., at the time of one of the remarkably high tides for which the place is world famous, and also at Digby saw hundreds of bales of air cured and salted fish, each bale containing about four tons, besides acres of racks containing fish in the drying process.

The 12 mile trip up the side of Mount Lookout in their machine was one of the features of the trip as they found the view from the summit (which overlooks the entire Annapolis Valley) to beggar description in wealth of landscape beauty and coloring. Particularly overwhelming in richness of coloring was the ride at the base of the mountains from Sussex to Moncton. The trip will long linger in the memories of the party, and they consider it one well worthy the consideration of every automobile owner in search of a beautiful scenic trip. Mr. Watson is the proprietor of the Watson Clothes Shop, this City, and Mr. Kittredge is agent and electrical superintendent, east of Bangor, for the Bangor Railway and Electric Co.

NEWS FROM MARINE CIRCLES

The Whereabouts of Our Merchant and Fishing Fleets Along The Coast

Scallops are being raked in Annapolis Basin. They are of splendid size and meet with a ready sale. The Wedgeport schr. Charles Edward, Capt Bert Payzant has left that place to engage in the winter fisheries out of Liverpool.

Stmr Margaretville, Capt Walsh, was in Halifax last week with 700 qts dry fish from the Maritime Fish Corporation's Canoe Basin.

The Maritime Fish Corporation at Digby recently received a carload of shooks from the Canadian Wood Working Company, Yarmouth.

Customs Officer, W. J. McMahon, of Weymouth, was called on Monday to Yarmouth to assist at the Customs Office of that Port, for an indefinite period.

The Canadian government patrol steamer Arleux, in command of Captain William Milne, has returned to St. John after patrolling the mackerel grounds.

Capt Ansel Snow and the crew of the Dorothy M. Smart, arrived in Digby on Wednesday, while their vessel was tied up in Yarmouth owing to the storm.

Large shipments of oysters being made from several points in New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, hundreds of barrels leaving different points for the Montreal market.

Fishing schooner Loran B. Snow was in Shelburne last week for repairs to her foresail. She purchased dories while there from Mr. John Williams and obtained water from the Shelburne Shipbuilders, Ltd.

The Yarmouth schooner Grace & Ruby, Capt Wiley Ross, has made a good start in the fall and winter haddock. She was the first of the Yarmouth fleet to sail and left about a fortnight ago. On Friday night the Grace & Ruby arrived in Boston, and on Saturday she weighed out a fare of 70,000 lbs of fresh haddock, which owing to the strong condition of the market at that time, gave her excellent stock for the trip. While on the vessel apparently encountered some heavy weather as Capt Ross reports the loss of some sails and also that the schooner's main boom is broken. She was expected in Yarmouth Tuesday to effect repairs and will also be fitted out with complete new dories.

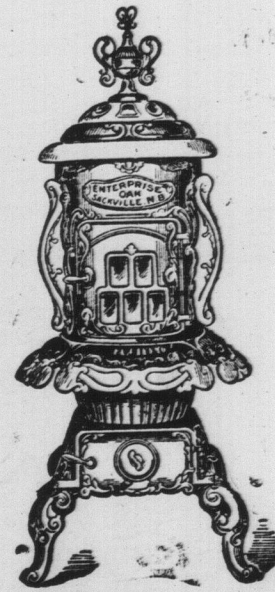

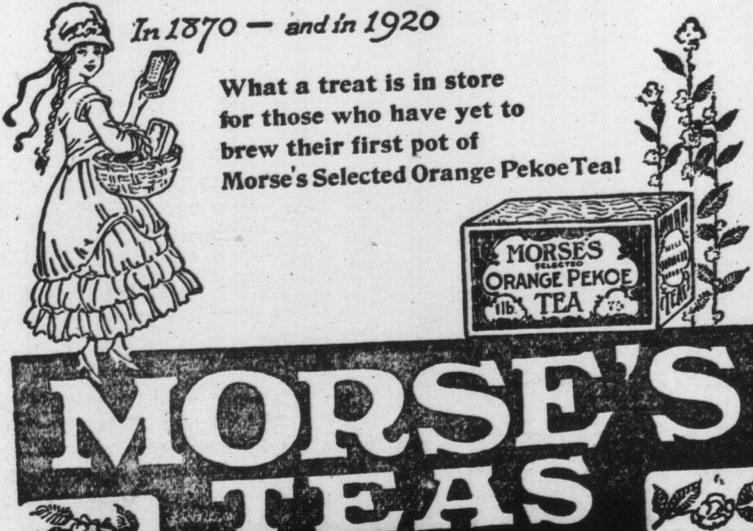

THE RIVERSIDE CEMETERY

These later led in the care of Riverside Cemetery should be well pleased during the past season, the place has never been better cared for and is becoming more beautiful each year. There are still however, many improvements to be made some of which may be undertaken as soon as the necessary funds are available. The avenue along the south side of the cemetery must be completed and gravelled down past the Ingleswood section to the eastern boundary. Then there are places in the hedge where trees have died, leaving unsightly gaps to be filled. The late Mrs. I. B. Some 50 or 100 small trees will be needed and the caretaker, Mr. Slaunwhite, has agreed to secure and let out these trees in the early spring at a reasonable cost. It should be unnecessary to remind lot owners of their taxes, but there are many still in arrears with their dues. With the increased cost of labor, etc. it is evident that our lot can be cared for at \$2 per annum as lots are being cared for in Riverside Cemetery at present. It is probable therefore that taxes must be increased at an early date.

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BURIAL OF AN UNKNOWN SOLDIER

The Sunday Evening Service in St. James Church of Special Character

The service in St. James Church on Sunday evening was of a special character; having particular reference to the unique events which took place in London last Thursday.

There are fifty-seven chapters, and hundreds of illustrations. Every Nova Scotia Battalion is given a chapter to itself, and there are special chapters devoted to the activities of the Red Cross, the Patriotic Fund, the various Militia Units which did yeoman work on the service, as well as records of the work accomplished by Nova Scotians in munitions, recruiting, troop transport, and other incidental activities.

There is an interesting frontispiece in the shape of a reproduction of the ancient Nova Scotia coat of arms, granted to the colony by King Charles the First. The book has been warmly praised and endorsed by His Honor the Lieutenant Governor, Premier Murray, as well as by leading military men of the province.

It is a matter of congratulation that Nova Scotia should be the first province in Canada to complete such a record of its war effort. The Province owes Captain Hunt and his collaborators a debt of gratitude. As for the book it is hardly conceivable that so excellent and authentic a record should fail to meet a ready sale. Certainly this volume should find an honored place in the home of every loyal Nova Scotian. It is an historical chronicle which will be of great value in years to come.

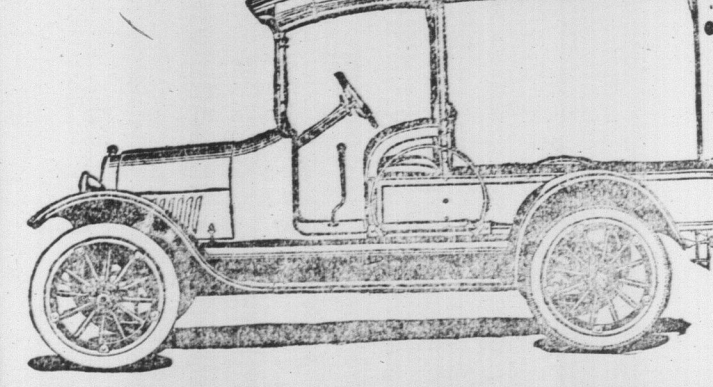

UNITED BAPTIST DISTRICT MEETING

A Successful Session Held At Nictaux, Annapolis County.

The Annapolis United Baptist District Meeting held its Semi-annual Session at Nictaux Nov 7th and 8th. The attendance was fair and the hospitality of Pastor Sweetman and his people unbounded.

The topics, "Religious Education" by Dr. W. N. Hutchins, "Evangelism" by Rev. M. W. Brown, and "Convention Echoes" by Rev. J. H. Puddington were ably presented and called forth most helpful discussions. An encouraging report of the work of the W. M. A. Societies was presented by Miss M. C. Foster, of Bridgetown.

Considerable time was spent in revising the list of allotments to the churches for denominational work to meet the increased needs of the new Convention year, resulting as follows: Annapolis \$100 (no increase); Bridgeport \$5.85 (increase \$2.53); Clementsvalle \$175 (increase \$50); Deep Brook \$30 (increase \$20); Delhouise East \$25 (increase \$5); Delhouise West \$20; Granville Centre \$55 (increase \$5); Granville Perry \$25 (no increase); Granville Lower \$125 (increase \$10); Hampton \$125 (increase \$10); Lawrencetown \$315 (increase \$15); Margaretville \$125 (no increase); Melvern Square \$35 (increase \$10); Middleton \$55 (increase \$25); Mount Hanley \$165 (increase \$15); Milford and Greywood \$25 (no increase); Albany \$55 (increase \$5); Nictaux \$555 (increase \$35); Paradise and Clarence \$450 (increase \$35); Parker's Cove and Litchfield \$35 (increase \$5); Springfield \$240 (increase \$15); Port Lorne \$135 (increase \$10).

By far the most significant item on the whole program was the report of the executive respecting the work of Rev. C. P. Wilson, Pastor Evangelist. The appointment had been made at the April meeting and the committee were able to report for the year: sermons 189; visits 282; decisions 125; received by baptism 89; received on experience 14; collected on Salary \$576.84. It was felt that these figures eloquent as they were did not represent all of the blessing of this wonderful mission. At Clementsvalle, where the cause was crippled, thirteen were baptized and a pastor settled. At Hampton and Port Lorne seventeen were added and the cause so strengthened that the field is offering \$1200 to the incoming pastor. HALIFAX, Nov 15—Nova Scotia is in danger of losing an important industry to New Brunswick if the water power developments at Bear River is not proceeded with in a short time. It had been the intention of the company to establish at Bear River, in addition to the pulp mills, a paper mill and they were promised hydro development by the provincial government. This has been delayed, however, and the company is considering the erection of the mill near St. John, along with the box mill which they have built there.

The proposed paper mill will be the only one in the Maritime provinces.
