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MATTERS TO WHICH THE ATTENTION OF THE
PRESBYTERIES IS DIRECTED BY THE
GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

1. To report to the Committee on the Distribution of Probationers, vacant congregations prepared to call a minister; also all Licentiates and Ministers without charges within their bounds desirous of employment, and to look after vacant pulpits within their bounds. (See appendices, pages 250, 251).

2. Presbyteries are asked to arrange meetings for conferring with the Moderator of the General Assembly, Dr. Campbell, regarding the Century Fund. (See page 64).

3. Presbyteries are asked to carry out recommendations of the Committee on the Life and Work of the Church. (See appendices, page 274).

4. Presbyteries are requested to consider tables for deferred annuities, and to support the effort for securing the balance of the endowment of the Aged and Infirm Ministers Fund. (See pages 56 and 57).

5. Presbyteries are asked to take the oversight of Sabbath Schools. (See page 66).

6. Remit *re* mode of electing the Moderator of the General Assembly. (See page 65). The following is the Overture :

Inasmuch as the present mode of electing the Moderator of the General Assembly has been found to be inseparable from certain results which tend to detract from the dignity of the Court ;

And inasmuch as there are happily still living quite a number of those who have occupied the Moderator's chair since the union of 1875 ;

And inasmuch as these ex-Moderators, from the very fact of their election, manifestly enjoy the confidence of the Church, and on the grounds of age and experience may be trusted to know the fitness of brethren throughout the Dominion to occupy efficiently the Moderator's chair ;

It is now humbly overtured by those persons whose names are herewith subscribed, that this Supreme Court order that in future the nomination of the Moderator of the

7. Remit *re* Powers to be vested in Synods. (See page 78). The following is the Overture on the subject :

Whereas experience has shown that much of the time of the General Assembly is taken up in dealing with matters of detail, which could fully and more conveniently be dealt with at the meetings of our several Synods :

And *whereas*, according to the procedure hitherto followed, cases are permitted to come by way of appeal to the General Assembly which might well be issued in one of the inferior judicatories, and with which the General Assembly cannot satisfactorily deal without unduly extending the sittings of that Court, and also involving the parties concerned in much needless expense.

Therefore, the Venerable, the General Assembly, is hereby humbly overtured by the Synod of Toronto and Kingston.

That the power of the Synods of the Church shall be extended by conferring upon them the right of exercising final jurisdiction in all matters of petition, reference, complaint or appeal coming from Presbyteries within their own bounds, which do not involve matters of administration or of doctrine affecting the Church as a whole, or matters of discipline affecting the ecclesiastical status of any member or office-bearer of the Church.

FIRST SEDERUNT.

*At the City of Hamilton, and within Central Church there, the Fourteenth day of June,
One thousand, eight hundred and ninety-nine, at eight o'clock in the evening:*

Which time and place ministers and ruling elders, commissioners from the several Presbyteries of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, convened pursuant to appointment by the General Assembly held in the City of Montreal, on the seventeenth day of June last year.

The Rev. Robert Torrance, D.D., of Guelph, Moderator of the last General Assembly, conducted public worship, and preached a sermon from the words contained in Zechariah, second chapter, fifth verse: "I, saith the Lord . . . will be the glory in the midst of her," and then by prayer constituted the General Assembly in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ, the only King and Head of the Church.

The names of the Commissioners having been presented in a printed list, the Assembly on motion duly seconded, in accordance with the recommendation of the Business Committee, agreed to accept the same as the roll of Assembly, subject to any corrections, subsequently to be made when it came to be scrutinized. *Hamilton Cassels.

Dr. Torrance, having addressed the Assembly reviewing the events of the past year affecting the Church, and referring to the deaths in the ranks of the ministry, especially mentioning Dr. Cochrane, Principal King, Dr. Chiniquy and Dr. Ormiston, formerly minister of the church in which the Assembly is meeting, intimated that the time had come for the election of a Moderator for this Assembly, and asked for nominations for the office.

Mr. R. G. McBeth, of Winnipeg, moved that Rev. Professor George Bryce, LL.D., of Manitoba College, be elected Moderator. The motion was seconded by President Forrest.

Principal Grant moved in amendment that Rev. Robert Campbell, Sc.D., minister of Renfrew, be elected Moderator. This was seconded by Mr. A. H. Scott.

Mr. L. H. Jordan moved in amendment to the amendment that Rev. George M. Milligan, D.D., of Toronto, be elected Moderator. This motion was seconded by Mr. Alexander MacGillivray.

A vote being taken between the first and second amendments, the latter was declared lost. The vote was then taken between the amendment and the motion, when the amendment carried, and Dr. Campbell was declared elected. Having been introduced and welcomed, he took the chair and delivered a suitable address.

THANKS TO DR. TORRANCE.

It was moved by Dr. Thompson, seconded by Rev. Kenneth MacLennan, that the thanks of the General Assembly be tendered to Dr. Torrance for the able, courteous, and impartial manner in which he had filled the chair, and specially for the able

sermon which he had preached at the opening of the Assembly. The motion was carried, and the Moderator accordingly tendered the Assembly's thanks to Dr. Torrance, which he briefly acknowledged.

REPORT OF THE MODERATOR FOR 1898.

Dr. Torrance reported that the Loyal Addresses had been forwarded as directed by the last General Assembly, and the replies received were laid upon the table. He reported having, in company with Principal Caven, visited the Quadrennial Conference of the Methodist Church of Canada, which action was approved by the Assembly. He also communicated the contents of a letter received from Dr. Mathews, Secretary of the Alliance of Reformed Churches, asking him to sign on behalf of this Church, an address to the Queen of Holland, the only Presbyterian Sovereign in the world, on the occasion of her accession to the throne, all the other churches of the Reformed Church having already agreed to do so. He had complied with the request, and in this matter also his action was approved by the Assembly.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON BUSINESS.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on Business, which was given in and read by Dr. Warden, Clerk of the Committee, and is as follows:—

The Business Committee met this afternoon and adopted the following recommendations:—

(1) That the Roll of Assembly which has been printed be held as read.

(2) That, with a view to having the attendance accurately recorded, each member be requested to write upon the card which has been provided for the purpose, his name, address, and the Presbytery which he represents, and to hand those in at the clerk's office, receiving in return therefor a copy of the stitched reports to be submitted to this Assembly.

(3) That the Sederunts of the Assembly be from ten in the morning to half-past twelve, and from half-past two to a quarter to six in the afternoon, and from a quarter to eight to ten in the evening, and that the first hour to-morrow morning be spent in devotional exercises.

(4) That the Committee on Bills and Overtures be composed as follows:—The Clerks of Assembly, the Clerks of Synods and Presbyteries who are members of Assembly, together with the following:—Rev. Dr. Warden moved that the Report be received and its recommendations adopted. The motion was seconded and agreed to.

SYNOD ROLLS.

Dr. Warden submitted the Rolls of Synods, along with the changes that have taken

The Assembly adjourned to meet in this place to-morrow morning at ten o'clock, whereof public intimation having been made, this Sederunt was closed with the benediction by the Moderator.

SECOND SEDERUNT.

At the City of Hamilton, and within Central Church there, Thursday, the Fifteenth day of June, One thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine, at ten o'clock in the forenoon:

The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada met, pursuant to adjournment, and, as agreed upon last night, the first hour was occupied with devotional exercises, conducted by the Moderator, Dr. Thompson, Dr. Duval, Mr. Walter Paul, Mr. Hugh A. Macpherson, Mr. R. Murray and Mr. John Hay.

The minutes of the First Sederunt were read and approved.

He concluded with moving the reception and adoption of the Report. The motion was seconded by Dr. Thompson, and agreed to. Mr. R. D. Fraser, whom the Committee had appointed Editor and Business Manager, was asked to address the Assembly regarding the work under the charge of the Committee.

It was then moved by Dr. Thompson, seconded by Principal Grant :—

The General Assembly expresses its full satisfaction with the Committee in their appointment of Mr. Douglas Fraser, M.A., as Editor of our Sabbath School publications, and has heard with great pleasure the Report now submitted anent the success and increased circulation during the past year, and the assurance of still further usefulness in the future. The General Assembly desires to draw the attention of our people to the complete series of Sabbath School Helps now provided, and commend them for use in school and home, and expresses the hope that the illustrated paper for the primary classes may receive a wide and generous welcome.

The motion was adopted.

The Assembly adjourned to meet in this place this afternoon, at half-past two o'clock ; whereof public intimation having been made, this sederunt was closed with the benediction by the Moderator.

He concluded with moving the reception and adoption of the Report. The motion was seconded by Mr. H. Currie, and adopted.

THE CENTURY FUND.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on a Century Fund, appointed by last General Assembly, which was given in by Dr. Warden, *Convener*,

and which, being printed and in the hands of members, he referred to in discussing the contents thereof. He concluded with moving, seconded by Mr. R. Murray,—

That the Report of the Committee appointed by last Assembly on the Twentieth Century Fund be received.

The General Assembly does now resolve, in dependence upon Divine blessing, to raise a fund of one million dollars during the ensuing two years, for the purpose of aiding such parts of the Church's work as the General Assembly shall deem entitled to be aided, and that the report of the Assembly's Committee be referred to the following Committee:—

HOME MISSION REPORT, EASTERN SECTION.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Home Mission Committee, Eastern Section, which was given in by Dr. McMillan, *Convener*, and which, being printed and in the hands of members, he called attention to in his address. He concluded with moving, seconded by Mr. J. M. Robinson.

The General Assembly receives and adopts the Report of the Home Mission Committee, Eastern Section. It expresses satisfaction with the work done in the Maritime Synod, during the past year, and its gratitude to God for manifold tokens of His favor. It regrets that a small debt has had to be incurred, and trusts that such a measure of liberality will be shown in future as will enable the Committee to meet the growing demands of the work in the East, and to increase the aid now given to the North-West.

The motion was agreed to.

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WESTERN SECTION.

The Assembly next called for the Report of the Home Mission Committee, Western Section, which was presented by Dr. Warden, who had acted as *Convener* since the death of Dr. Cochrane, appointed *Convener* by last Assembly, and who had been *Convener* for no fewer than twenty-six years. Dr. Warden made feeling reference to the loss sustained by the Church in Dr. Cochrane's sudden removal. He further called attention to the progress made in Home Missions since the year eighteen hundred and seventy-five, as described in the Report, printed and in the hands of ministers. He concluded with moving, seconded by Dr. Robertson:—

That the Report be received and adopted, with the exception of that part of it relating to the resignation of the Secretary and the recommendation bearing upon the work of Rev. Dr. Robertson. That these matters be referred to a Committee consisting of Principal Caven, *Convener*, Professor Ross, D.D., Dr. Somerville, Dr. Armstrong, Dr. Fletcher, Dr. Thompson, Dr. Herridge, Dr. T. G. Smith, Messrs. R. G. McBeth, J. H. Ratcliffe and Messrs. George Gillies, A. G. Farrell, W. E. Roxborough, J. A. Macdonald, C. H. Campbell, Robert Kilgour, and George Keith, to report at an early Sederunt of the Assembly.

The General Assembly places on record its sense of the loss sustained by the death in October last of the late Rev. Dr. Cochrane, who, for twenty-six years was the honored *Convener* of the Committee, and to whose untiring zeal and wise administration much of the success of the work, under God, is attributable. The Assembly tenders its heartfelt sympathy to the widow and family of their brother, commending them to "The Father of mercies, and the God of all comfort, who comforteth us in all our afflictions."

The Assembly records its gratitude to God for the measure of success vouchsafed during the year, and expresses its gratification at the largely increased contributions upon behalf of the work; the growing number of graduates of our Colleges offering their services for the Northwest; the opening up of so many new fields; the continuous supply—summer and winter—which the Committee have been able to give to the mission fields in all sections of the country, and the large accessions made to the membership of the mission fields in the Western section of the Church.

The General Assembly expresses its appreciation of the service rendered to religion and morals by the faithful and self-denying labors of the missionaries, and assures them of its sympathy with them in their earnest endeavors to establish the cause of Christ.

The Assembly cordially thanks the Colonial Committees, as well as the congregations and friends in Great Britain and Ireland, for their unabated interest and their continued generous gifts; expresses appreciation of the hearty support given by the Maritime Province section of the Church and by congregations, Sabbath Schools and Young People's Societies of the Western Section, to our Home Mission Fund, and warmly commends the scheme anew to the sympathy and liberality of our people, in the confident hope that if much prayer be made upon behalf of the workers and the work, the increased funds necessary for its efficient conduct will, without doubt, be secured.

After stirring addresses by Messieurs McQueen and Gandier on Home Mission work in British Columbia and the North-West Territories, the motion was adopted.

COLLEGES.

The Assembly called for the reports of the several Colleges of the Church.

MANITOBA COLLEGE.

The first of the reports called for was that of Manitoba College, which was presented by Sir Thomas W. Taylor, Chairman of the Board, and which, being printed and in the hands of members, he referred to in his remarks thereon, making special reference to the great loss sustained by the College and the Church in the removal of Principal King.

It was then moved by Dr. Torrance, seconded by Dr. Lyle, as follows :

That the Assembly receive the Report and record its gratitude to God for the continued success with which He has blessed the College during the past year, as shown in the number of students that have been attending the classes both in Theology and Arts, there being thirty-nine of the former, of whom thirteen were of the third year, twelve in the second, and twelve in the third, with two special, and one hundred and fifty-five in the latter, making an aggregate of one hundred and ninety-four, a larger number of regular students than on any previous occasion ; as shown further, in the healthy state of its finances, composed of gifts from transcontinental sources, namely, one hundred pounds from the Presbyterian Church in Ireland, fifty pounds from the Church of Scotland, and twenty pounds to the Scholarship Fund from Mrs. Barbour, of Bonskeid, Scotland ; of contributions from the Churches in the Maritime Provinces, in the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec, and those of Manitoba and the North-West Territories, and the Synod of British Columbia and other sources.

The Assembly would note the success of the Summer Session, and record its satisfaction with the provision that has been made for the prosecution of their studies by those taking advantage of the opportunities it affords to prepare for the work of the ministry to which they are looking forward.

It would also note with pleasure the increase that has been made in the Library, and express the hope that whether in the way of purchase or of gift, that valuable part of the Institution may be still further increased, thus furnishing much needed facilities for study and mental equipment by those in attendance on its classes from year to year.

The Assembly would record its sense of the heavy loss that has been sustained in the death of the late Principal, the Rev. Dr. King, who, for nearly sixteen years, devoted himself with self-sacrificing faithfulness and energy to the promotion of its interests ; who was eminently qualified for the place to which he had been called by the Church, by his literary taste, scholarly attainments and the gifts and graces with which he had been endowed from on high, and who had the satisfaction of seeing his efforts blessed with such success in all respects before he was called to rest from his labors ; and its trust that

his place may soon be filled by one who shall take up the work where he has left it and carry it forward.

The motion was agreed to.

It was further moved by Dr. Bryce, seconded by Professor Hart :

That the General Assembly appoint, and hereby does appoint, the Rev. Thomas B. Kilpatrick, D.D., of Aberdeen, Scotland, to be Professor of Systematic Theology and Apologetics, and joint Lecturer in Philosophy in Manitoba College, to receive the salary of \$2,250 per annum, and that the Presbytery of Winnipeg be instructed to induct Dr. Kilpatrick to the position of Professor in Manitoba College.

The motion was approved.

COST OF SUMMER SESSION OF MANITOBA COLLEGE.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee to provide funds for the Summer Session in Manitoba College, Winnipeg, which was given in and read by Dr. Robertson and is as follows :

To the Venerable the General Assembly :

The General Assembly of eighteen hundred and ninety-six appointed a Committee to secure special contributions for the maintenance of the Summer Session in Manitoba College for the three years following. The Convener begs to report that in eighteen hundred and ninety-six—ninety-seven, there was remitted to the Treasurer of Manitoba College, fifteen hundred and forty dollars; in eighteen hundred and ninety-seven—ninety-eight, fifteen hundred and seventy-five dollars; and in eighteen hundred and ninety-eight—ninety-nine, fifteen hundred and twenty-five dollars, or a total of \$4,640 in the three years.

That the Report of the Committee ament receiving subscriptions for the Summer Session of Manitoba College be received. The General Assembly recognises the great and efficient services rendered by that Committee during the three years of its existence, but feeling the need of such work in the future, the General Assembly would hereby re-appoint the same Committee, with instructions to continue their labor.

KNOX COLLEGE.

The Assembly next called for the Report of Knox College, which, in the absence of the Chairman of the Board, Mr. W. Mortimer Clark, was presented by Principal Caven, and which, being printed and in the hands of members, he drew attention to. He pointed out specially the need of dividing the subjects which Professor Ballantyne was appointed by the Assembly to teach, as also the advisability of extending the session. He concluded with moving, seconded by Mr. J. Charlton, M.P. :

The General Assembly receives the report of Knox College.

The Assembly favors the lengthening of the Theological Session as therein proposed, if this can be effected with due regard to all the interests involved, and it is prepared to give careful consideration to the matter.

The General Assembly trusts that the financial position of the College will very soon permit the separation of the important subjects of Apologetics and Church History,

and the appointment of an additional Professor, to whose care one or other of these departments of study may be committed.

The motion was adopted.

QUEEN'S COLLEGE.

The Report of Queen's College, printed and in the hands of members, was presented by Principal Grant in the absence of the Chairman, Hon. Justice MacLennan.

It was moved by Dr. Bayne, seconded by Mr. Matthew Leggat :

That the General Assembly have heard with gratification the report of the Trustees of Queen's University and College, indicating, as it does, a steady and substantial progress, as well as able and careful administration ; that the Report be received and adopted and that the College be commended to the special interest and liberality of the Church, in view of the necessity for an addition to the Theological staff, which the General Assembly has repeatedly urged ;

And, further, that the Assembly approve of the appointment by the Trustees of the Rev. Dr. W. G. Jordan, as assistant and successor to Dr. Mowat, Professor of Oriental Languages and Old Testament exegesis ; and instruct the Presbytery of Sarnia to release him from his charge, and the Presbytery of Kingston to induct him as Professor, at such dates as may be found suitable.

The motion was carried.

MONTREAL COLLEGE.

The Assembly called next for the Report of the Presbyterian College, Montreal, which was presented, in the absence of the Chairman, Mr. David Morrice, by Principal Macvicar.

The hour of adjournment having arrived, the consideration of the report had to be deferred.

Y.M.C.A. COURTESY.

Dr. Warden read a communication from the General Secretary of the Young Men's Christian Association of Hamilton, tendering the privileges of that Institution to the members of the Assembly during their stay in the city. The Clerk was instructed to acknowledge receipt of the communication and thank the officers of the Association for their courtesy.

Principal Grant gave notice that he would, after the adjournment, move a reconsideration of the order of business fixed for the afternoon, so as to admit of the Assembly's finishing the business relating to the Colleges.

At the same place, and on the same day at half-past two o'clock in the afternoon :

The General Assembly met, pursuant to adjournment, and was constituted with devotional exercises, Principal Grant leading in prayer at the request of the Moderator.

The minutes of last sederunt were read and sustained.

Principal Grant now made the motion of which he gave notice at the forenoon sederunt, that the order of business be reconsidered, to this extent that the unfinished business of the forenoon be taken up after the first item on the docket for the afternoon has been disposed of.

The motion was seconded by Dr. Warden, and agreed to.

OVERTURE *re* ELDER MODERATORSHIP.

There was presented and read an Overture from the Presbytery of Toronto, asking the General Assembly, as the Supreme Court of the Church, to reach and declare some definite decision touching the eligibility of the Ruling Elder to fill the office of Moderator in any Presbyterian Church Court. Mr. L. H. Jordan was heard in support of the Overture.

It was moved by Dr. Laing, seconded by Dr. R. Campbell (Clerk),—

That the Assembly appoint a Committee to consider the matter of the Overture of the Presbytery of Toronto—to report to next Assembly.

The motion was adopted.

PRESBYTERIAN COLLEGE, MONTREAL.

The Assembly resumed consideration of the Report of the Presbyterian College, Montreal.

Dr. Herridge moved, seconded by Dr. Robertson :

That the Reports of the Board and Senate of the Presbyterian College, Montreal, be received and adopted, except the answer to the question as to the preparatory course, and that the Assembly express gratification at the continued prosperity of the College, encourage the efforts to increase the Endowment Fund, and commend the Institution to the sympathy and practical support of the Church.

The motion was agreed to.

MORRIN COLLEGE.

The Assembly called for the Report of Morrin College, which was given in, in the absence of the Chairman, by Principal Macrae, who, not a member of the Assembly, craved leave to make a brief statement regarding the report, which is printed and in the hands of members.

It was moved by President Forrest, seconded by Mr. Walter Paul,—

That the Report now submitted be received, and that the General Assembly appoint a Committee to consider the situation of Morrin College, and frame such a resolution

bearing thereupon, as may, in their wisdom, appear suitable, and report the same at a future sederunt.

The motion was adopted.

The Moderator named the following a Committee, in accordance with the request of Principal Macrae :

HALIFAX COLLEGE.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Halifax College, which was given in by Professor Falconer, on behalf of the College authorities, and which, being printed and in the hands of members, he drew attention to.

It was moved by Dr. Milligan, seconded by Mr. L. H. Jordan :

The General Assembly adopts the reports of the Board and Senate of the Presbyterian College, Halifax, and rejoices in the prosperity of the past academic year, as shown by the number and quality of the students, and the satisfactory financial standing of the College. The Assembly is especially gratified by the erection of the new College building, for better library facility and increased class-room accommodation, rendered necessary by the growth of the College ; and also by the fact that of the twenty-one thousand dollars required for the completion of the building, thirteen thousand dollars of the seventeen thousand dollars already subscribed has been paid, and would express the hope that the amount still needed for the entire removal of the debt on the new building will soon be received.

The motion was agreed to.

PREPARATORY COURSE IN COLLEGES.

Mr. J. A. Macdonald moved :

That the answers from the Colleges on the Preparatory course, and the recommendation from Knox College re the lengthening of the term, be referred to a Committee who shall report at an early sederunt.

MEMORIAL ON A TEMPERANCE SABBATH.

There was received and read a communication, signed by the superintendent of the Sabbath School Department of the Women's Christian Temperance Union, suggesting the observance of the fourth Sabbath in November as Temperance Day. The Clerk was instructed to acknowledge receipt of this communication, and it was handed over to the Committee on Church Life and Work for consideration.

COUNCIL OF THE DOMINION ALLIANCE.

There was received and read a communication from the Council of the Dominion Alliance asking the influence and co-operation of the Assembly on behalf of the work carried on by the Alliance. The Clerk was instructed to acknowledge receipt of the communication, and it was handed for consideration to the Committee on the Life and Work of the Church.

Mr. W. J. Clark asked leave of the Assembly for the Committee on the Century Fund to sit this evening during the sitting of the Assembly, in view of the magnitude of the interests concerned, and the length of time that will be required for their consideration.

That the Report be received and adopted, and that the General Assembly .—

1. Express their thankfulness to God for the measure of health granted to the Missionaries in the different fields in which they labor, and the encouragements given to them in their work.

2. Record satisfaction that the receipts have been sufficient to meet the expenditure for the year, and also to enable the Western Section of the Committee to lay the foundation of a working balance, in order to avoid the necessity of making annual loans for carrying on the work.

3. Approve of the recommendation of the Foreign Missionary Committee, Western Section, that the Rev. Donald MacGillivray be allowed to accept the call extended to him by the Society for the Diffusion of General and Christian Knowledge in China, and to remove to Shanghai for the better prosecution of literary work; that Mr. MacGillivray continue to be a member of the Presbytery of Honan. his salary to be paid by the Presbyterian Church in Canada, as in the past.

4. Express satisfaction that the missionary staff has been strengthened by the appointment of one Missionary to Demerara, one to Honan, and three to Central India.

5. That permission be given to the Committee, Eastern Section, to strengthen itself by the addition of three members, and that the Committee for striking the Standing Committees be instructed accordingly.

6. Commend to the prayers and liberality of the Church this work that lies so near to the heart of Christ, and upon which His blessing has so signally rested in recent years.

That the recommendation of the Foreign Mission Committee, namely--that the General Assembly vest the financial and general management of the High School and College in the Foreign Mission Committee, and that the Committee be instructed to make a grant in aid of the same of a sum not exceeding four hundred rupees per month, exclusive of fees and government grants—be received and adopted.

On motion of Dr. Campbell, seconded by Mr. A. H. Scott, Mr. J. Wilkie, of Indore, was invited to address the Assembly on the subject of the Reference.

It was moved by President Forrest, seconded by Mr. Walter Paul, in amendment to Dr. Moore's motion :—

That the General Assembly send a Committee next autumn to Central India, to report to the next General Assembly, and in the meantime that no change be made so far as the College at Indore is concerned.

Mr. Scott gave notice that, when the consideration of this question was resumed by the Assembly, he would move in amendment to the amendment :

That the Assembly records its full and hearty confidence in the zeal and devotion to their great work of all its missionaries in India, its sympathy with them in their difficulties and trials of whatever sort in that work ; further, that inasmuch as two members of Presbytery, Messieurs Wilson and Frank Russell, are to be home next year on furlough, and Mr. Wilkie will also be in Canada, the Assembly resolves that at the present there be no change in the policy of the mission, and that the Reference lie on the table till next Assembly.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Young Ladies' College, Brantford, which was given in by Dr. Laing, and which, being printed and in the hands of members, he called attention to. He concluded with moving, seconded by Principal Caven :

That the report be received and adopted, and that Messrs. William Watt, Sr., Robert Henry, M. Nichol, M.D., Thomas McLean, C. B. Heyd, J. Sutherland, William Grant, A. Turner, W. Watt, Jr., S. W. McMichael, A. J. Wilkes, George Foster, and George H. Wilkes be nominated as Directors of the College.

The motion was agreed to.

MORRIN COLLEGE.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Special Committee on Morrin College, which was given in and read by Dr. Herridge, *Convener*, who moved its reception and adoption. The motion was seconded by Mr. George Grant, and agreed to. The report is as follows :

The Committee beg to report that they have carefully considered the report of Morrin College submitted to the General Assembly, and fully realize the position of the Governors in the present critical state of the College. They feel themselves unable at present to advise as to what course should be pursued to meet the wishes of the Governors as contained in their report, but would recommend that the Assembly appoint two or three commissioners to visit Quebec and confer with the Governors, with a view of ascertaining what should be done in the interest of the Church and College—to report to the next General Assembly.

Dr. Herridge, Dr. Thompson, and Mr. W. B. McMurrich were appointed Commissioners, as suggested in the report.

PETITIONS OF MRS. ROBERTSON AND MRS. WEBBER.

As recommended by the Committee on Bills and Overtures, the petitions of Mrs. Margery Robertson and Mrs. Mary Webber were handed over to a Special Committee without being read in the House.

The Moderator named the following such Committee :

Dr. Bryce, *Convener*, Dr. Laing, Principal Macvicar, Messieurs Heine, A. A. Scott, J. Cumberland, J. Rennie, P. F. Langill, A. MacGillivray, Professor Hart, *Ministers*; Messrs J. G. Farrell, D. McCormick, Q.C., John A. Paterson, John McIntyre, Q.C., *Elders*.

The nomination was approved.

DISTRIBUTION OF PROBATIONERS.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on the Distribution of Probationers, which was given in by Dr. Torrance, *Convener*, and which, being printed and in the hands of members, he called attention to in his remarks thereon.

Dr. Milligan moved, seconded by Principal Caven :

That the report of the Committee on the Distribution of Probationers be adopted, and that the scheme proposed by the Committee for the supply of vacancies be sent to a special Committee to be appointed by the Moderator, to report at a later sederunt.

The motion was agreed to.

The Moderator named the following such Committee, the nomination being accepted by the Assembly, namely :

MEMORIAL *re* NISBET ACADEMY.

There was presented and read a Memorial from the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West regarding Nisbet Academy.

Mr. C. H. Campbell was heard in support of the Memorial.

He moved, seconded by Dr. Robertson :

That the Memorial be received, and that the Treasurer of the Church be authorized to pay over the moneys on hand, in accordance with the Act of the Parliament of Canada.

To this it was moved in amendment by Dr. Warden, seconded by Dr. McTavish :

That the Memorial be referred to a Committee, to report at a later sederunt of Assembly.

The amendment prevailed over the motion, and became the judgment of the House.

AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS' FUND.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund, which was given in by Mr. J. K. Macdonald, *Convener*, and which, being printed and in the hands of members, he referred to, in addressing the Assembly.

Mr. A. H. Scott moved, seconded by Mr. J. McIntyre, Q.C., and it was agreed to :

That the report now presented by the Convener of the Committee on the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund, Western Section, be received ;

That further action upon it be deferred meanwhile ;

That the Report now before the Assembly, along with the matter of rates referred to by the Convener, be referred to a Committee composed of members of the Assembly's Standing Committee on the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund, Eastern and Western Divisions, present in this Assembly, to report at a subsequent sederunt, Mr. J. K. Macdonald, *Convener* of said Committee.

TIME AND PLACE OF NEXT MEETING OF ASSEMBLY.

The order of the day, fixing the time and place of next meeting of Assembly being reached, an invitation was extended by the pastors of the churches in the City of Halifax, inviting the Assembly to meet there next year.

Whereupon it was moved by Dr. McMillan, seconded by Mr. H. H. McPherson, that the Assembly meet in the City of Halifax and in St. Matthew's Church there, on the

second Wednesday in June, Nineteen hundred, at half past seven o'clock in the evening. The motion was carried.

CHANGE IN ASSEMBLY ROLL.

On motion of Dr. Moore, seconded by Dr. Campbell (Clerk), it was agreed to substitute the name of Mr. Neil McKinnon for that of Mr. J. McNichol as commissioner from the Presbytery of Ottawa, in accordance with the appointment duly made by the Presbytery of Ottawa, report of which had not reached the Clerks of Assembly.

The Assembly adjourned to meet in this place, this afternoon, at half past two o'clock, whereof public intimation having been given, this sederunt was closed with the benediction by the Moderator.

TENTH SEDERUNT.

At the same place, on the same day, at half past two o'clock in the afternoon:

The General Assembly met, as per adjournment, and was constituted with devotional exercises, conducted by Dr. Torrance, acting Moderator.

The minutes of last sederunt were read and sustained.

Mr. J. K. Macdonald drew attention to the fact that only one member of the Eastern Section of the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund is present in the Assembly, and requested the Assembly to add some names to the Committee appointed at the morning sederunt. In accordance with this request, the following were added to the Committee: Messieurs E. D. Millar, J. W. Falconer, A. Campbell, D. Henderson, A. Bowman and E. D. Rankin.

PAMPHLET ON HYMNAL TUNES.

Mr. G. Colborne Heine, on behalf of the Musical Section of the Hymnal Committee, requested the Assembly to allow Mr. A. MacMillan to make a statement as to what had been done in the matter of furnishing a directory for the time in which the music of the Book of Praise should be sung. The request was granted and Mr. MacMillan was heard on the subject, explaining that a pamphlet had been issued under the direction of the Committee which it was hoped would be helpful in the matter of rendering most effectively the music both of the psalter and of the hymnal, so far as the time in which the tunes should be sung is concerned.

COMMITTEE TO STRIKE STANDING COMMITTEES.

The Assembly called for the report of the Committee to strike Standing Committees, so far as it related to the Hymnal Committee, which was given in and read by Dr. James Ross, *Convenor*, who moved its reception and adoption.

The motion was seconded and agreed to.

REFERENCE FROM INDORE.

The Assembly resumed consideration of the Reference from the Presbytery of Indore, when Mr. E. Scott offered the amendment of which he had given notice on Saturday. The amendment was seconded by Mr. J. H. Benth.

After discussion, a vote was taken between the first and second amendments, when the latter was carried.

It was then moved, in amendment to the amendment, by Dr. R. N. Grant, seconded by Dr. Herridge:

That a commission of three be appointed to visit our Mission fields in India, Honan and Formosa, examine into methods of working, the progress being made, and all matters connected therewith, and report to next General Assembly.

A vote being taken between this amendment and the amendment already carried, the latter again prevailed.

The amendment was then put against the motion of Dr. Moore, when the latter was carried by a large majority, and was affirmed as the judgment of the House.

Dr. Moore further moved, seconded by Dr. Bayne :

That the General Assembly, in reply to the representations of the Presbytery which accompany the Reference, relating to the College at Inlore, expresses the hope that the Presbytery will loyally accept this decision, and assures them of its deep interest in them, and its confidence in the fidelity with which they have sought to execute their commission.

The motion was adopted.

SABBATH SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

The Assembly called for the report of the Sabbath School Committee, which was given in by Mr. T. F. Fotheringham, *Convener*, and which, being printed and in the hands of members, he called the attention of the House to.

He moved, seconded by Dr. J. Campbell :

That the Assembly receive the report of the Sabbath School Committee, and consider its recommendations seriatim.

The hour of the adjournment having arrived, the further discussion of the motion had to be deferred.

NOTICE OF MOTION.

Mr. R. Murray gave notice of the following motion which he intended to offer at a subsequent sederunt of the Assembly:

The General Assembly, learning that Rev. Thomas Fowler, M.A., of St. Matthew's Church, Halifax, had intimated his expectation of visiting Scotland next May, authorize the Moderator to commission Mr. Fowler to convey to the General Assemblies of the Scottish Churches the greetings of this General Assembly.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON YOUNG PEOPLE'S SOCIETIES.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on Young People's Societies, which was given in by Mr. R. D. Fraser, *Convener*, and which, being printed and in the hands of members, he drew attention to.

It was moved by Mr. G. Tower Fergusson, seconded by Dr. Bruce, and agreed to, that the Report be received and its recommendations adopted.

It was then moved by Mr. W. S. McTavish, seconded by Dr. Laing :

That the thanks of the Assembly be tendered to the Rev. R. D. Fraser, M.A., *Convener* of the Committee on Young People's Societies, for the energy, zeal and tact with which for four years he has conducted the affairs pertaining to his office, and for the kindly consideration he has shown to those with whom he has been associated in the work of these Societies.

The motion was agreed to.

AUGMENTATION REPORT, EASTERN SECTION.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Augmentation Committee, Eastern Section, which was given in, in the absence of the Convener, by Mr. J. S. Sutherland, and which, being printed and in the hands of members, he called attention to. He concluded with moving, seconded by Mr. E. D. Millar, as follows :

The General Assembly having heard the report of the Augmentation Committee, Eastern Section, agrees to receive the same, confirms the action of the Committee in making the special grants referred to therein, and gives the desired permission to deal with deferred applications for aid from the Augmentation Fund.

The Assembly, while regretting that the receipts for the year did not warrant the payment in full of the grants made by the Committee, would express its gratification at the increased support given to this important Scheme of the Church, and would recommend it anew to the prayerful sympathy and liberal-hearted giving of the people.

The motion was agreed to.

AUGMENTATION REPORT, WESTERN SECTION.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Augmentation Committee, Western Section, which was given in by the Moderator, Convener, who called Dr. Torrance to the Chair while he presented the report. He pointed out the hopeful features of the work and the loud call upon the Church to sustain it.

It was moved by Mr. J. A. Macdonald, seconded by Mr. J. W. Macmillan, as follows :

The General Assembly receives the report; recognizes that the Divine blessing has rested on the labors of the Committee and rejoices in the signs of progress, as shown in the number of congregations moving on to self-support, and in the gratifying increase in contributions to the scheme.

The General Assembly, being evermore convinced that the scheme is a most efficient agency in consolidating the Church's work, commends it anew to the generous support of all our people, and especially urges Sabbath Schools and Young People's Societies to aim at providing the two thousand dollars, required for the work in British Columbia during the current year.

The General Assembly sanctions the "sliding scale" regulation and the change of the annual meeting from October to March; thanks Rev. Dr. Kellock for his efficient services, and authorizes the Committee to make further trial of so hopeful a means of deepening interest in the operations of the scheme, and further authorizes the Committee to expend an amount not exceeding twenty-eight thousand dollars during the current year.

The General Assembly, realizing the importance of the announcement made as to Doctors Warden and Robertson, whose services to the scheme have been so abundant, refers these announcements to a special Committee, who shall suggest such action and deliverances as are suitable in each case.

The motion was adopted.

DRS. ROBERTSON AND WARDEN.

The matter relating to Dr. Warden and Dr. Robertson was referred to the same Committee that was appointed to consider the relations of these gentlemen to the Home Mission Committee.

SYNOD RECORDS.

The Assembly called for the Reports of the several Committees on Synod Records. They were given in by their respective Conveners.

On motion, duly seconded, it was agreed to receive them.

Those of the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa, of Toronto and Kingston, of London and Hamilton, of British Columbia, and of the Presbyteries of Indore and Honan (with Synodical powers) were reported as carefully and correctly kept, and on motion of Dr. Warden, duly seconded, they were ordered to be attested accordingly.

The Assembly adjourned, to meet in this place to-morrow morning at ten o'clock, whereof public intimation having been made, this sederunt was closed with the benediction by the Moderator.

TWELFTH SEDERUNT.

At Harvilton, and within Central Church there, the Twentieth day of June, One thousand, eight hundred and ninety-nine, at ten o'clock in the morning:

The General Assembly met, as per adjournment, and was constituted with devotional exercises, led by Dr. McMillan, at the request of the Moderator.

REPORT *re* DR. ROBERTSON'S POSITION AND DUTIES.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Special Committee, appointed to define the future position and duties of Drs. Robertson and Warden, in relation to the Home Mission and Augmentation Committees,—which was given in and read by Principal Caven, *Convener*.

The Convener intimated that the Committee were only to report at present on matters relating to Dr. Robertson. The report was received, and it was agreed to consider its recommendations seriatim. They were adopted as a whole, and are as follows :

1. In accordance with the recommendation of the Home Mission Committee, Western Section, and of the Augmentation Committee, Western Section, your Committee recommends to the General Assembly that Dr. Robertson retain his office of Superintendent of Missions in the North-West, and that he be appointed Field Secretary of the Home Mission Committee and of the Augmentation Committee.

2. Your Committee further recommend that Dr. Robertson be relieved of a great part of his present duties as Superintendent, in order that he may devote his time largely to visiting congregations, and thus deepening interest throughout the Church in the work of Home Missions and Augmentation.

3. It is recommended that Dr. Robertson shall prosecute his labors in co-operation with the Committees on Home Missions and Augmentation, and, in his capacity as Superintendent, in co-operation with the Presbyteries within whose bounds his labors shall chiefly lie.

4. In view of the reduction of Dr. Robertson's labors, as Superintendent of Missions, the Synods of Manitoba and British Columbia shall be instructed to consider

whether any additional work of superintendence would be indispensable or advantageous in the development of their Home Mission fields; and to report to next General Assembly.

The Committee were continued and were instructed also to consider and recommend such action as it would be advisable for the Assembly to take in relation to Dr. Warden's resignation of the Secretaryship of the Committees, and report at an early sederunt.

Moved by Dr. Warden, duly seconded and agreed to:—

That the question of increasing the salary of Rev. Dr. Robertson be referred to the Committee.

Mr. D. M. Gandier gave notice that at a future sederunt of this Assembly he would move for a reconsideration of the part of the Home Mission Committee's report, dealing with salaries of missionaries in the Synods of British Columbia and Manitoba and the North-West Territories.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON NISBET ACADEMY MEMORIAL.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee appointed to consider the memorial of the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West, regarding the Nisbet Academy matter which was given in and read by Principal MacVicar, *Convener*, who moved the reception and adoption of the Report. The motion was seconded by Mr. R. G. MacBeth, and carried.

The Report is as follows:—

The Committee appointed to consider the Memorial of the Trustees of Nisbet Academy and the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West, report as follows:—

That the Treasurer of the Church be authorized to pay over the moneys on hand in accordance with the terms of the Act of Parliament.

That inasmuch as the lands given by the Foreign Mission Committee to the Academy, and the money collected for the erection of the building was given and collected for the purpose, among others, of establishing some permanent memorial of the Rev. James Nisbet, the first Presbyterian missionary to the Indians of the North-West; and, inasmuch as it is now proposed to distribute the assets pursuant to the memorial, and it is desirable to in some way perpetuate the memory of Mr. Nisbet in this connection,—

The Committee recommend the Assembly to authorize and direct the Board of Management of the Church and Manse Building Fund to receive the moneys, and out of them pay over to Manitoba College, one thousand dollars, to found a scholarship to be known as the Nisbet Memorial Scholarship.

AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS' FUND.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund, Eastern Section, which was given in by Mr. A. Bowman, in the absence of the Convener, and which, being printed and in the hands of members, he called attention to in his remarks to the Assembly.

It was moved by Mr. A. H. Scott, seconded by Mr. R. Murray:—

That the report of the Committee on the Fund for Aged and Infirm Ministers, (Eastern Section), now presented, be received.

That further action be delayed in the meantime.

That said report be remitted to the Joint Committee appointed at a previous

sederunt to deal with the report from the Western Division, with instructions to report thereon at a subsequent sederunt.

The motion was agreed to.

It was further moved by Mr. A. Campbell, seconded by Mr. R. Murray, and agreed to:—

That the recommendation of the Committee on the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund, Eastern Section, anent granting the full annuity to Rev. Allan Simpson, of Halifax, from January, eighteen hundred and ninety-nine, and Rev. Duncan McKinnon, of Lunenburg, from May, eighteen hundred and ninety-nine, be granted.

OVERTURE *re* AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS' FUND.

There was presented and read an Overture from the Presbytery of Victoria, craving that there should be one Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund for the whole Church, and that changes should be made in the terms of admission to the Fund.

On motion of Dr. Warden, duly seconded, the Overture was received.

Dr. J. Campbell was heard in support of the Overture.

It was moved by Mr. A. H. Scott, seconded by Dr. D. L. McCrae:—

That the Overture be referred for consideration to the Joint Committee already appointed to confer upon matters relating to the Fund.

The motion was agreed to.

OVERTURE *re* NEW PRESBYTERY.

There was presented and read an Overture from the Presbytery of Kamloops, which had been transmitted by the Synod of British Columbia with its endorsement, craving a division of the Presbytery of Kamloops, in view of the extent of territory embraced in that Presbytery, and the increase of Ministers and Missionaries within its bounds.

It was agreed to receive the Overture.

Mr. D. G. McQueen was heard in support of the Overture.

It was moved by Mr. D. M. Gandier, seconded by Dr. Robertson, and resolved as follows:—

1. The General Assembly grants the prayer of the Overture of the Presbytery of Kamloops, and hereby resolves to erect a Presbytery, to be designated and known as the Presbytery of Kootenay.

2. The said Presbytery of Kootenay shall be limited and bounded as follows, that is to say: That the southern boundary of the said Presbytery be the international boundary line; the eastern boundary, the boundary between British Columbia and Alberta; the northern boundary, a line stretching westward from a point on the eastern boundary of British Columbia, about fifty degrees and one-half degree north of the equator, to the Upper Arrow Lake, thence southwestward, crossing Okanagan Lake midway between Peachland and Penticton, to the eastern boundary of the Presbytery of Westminster; and that the western boundary be the eastern boundary of the Presbytery of Westminster.

3. The following congregations and missions, together with their ministers and representative elders, and such congregations and missions as may hereafter be organized within the bounds of the said Presbytery, together with their ministers and representative elders, shall form and constitute the said Presbytery of Kootenay, that is to say:—

During the consideration of the report, the Moderator vacated the chair and called Dr. Moore to it.

The first nine sections of the report were considered, amended and adopted, but the hour of adjournment having arrived, the further consideration of the report had to be deferred. It was moved by the Clerk, seconded, and agreed to, that the continuation of the consideration of the report be the first business of the afternoon, after the sustaining of the minutes.

The Assembly adjourned to meet in this place, this afternoon, at half past two o'clock, whereof public intimation having been made, this sederunt was closed with the benediction by the Moderator.

THIRTEENTH SEDERUNT.

At the same place, on the same day, at half-past two o'clock in the afternoon:

The General Assembly met, as per adjournment, and was constituted with devotional exercises, Mr. E. Gillies leading in prayer at the request of the Moderator.

The minutes of last sederunt were read and sustained.

THE CENTURY FUND.

The Assembly continued its consideration of the Report of the Committee on the Century Fund, and agreed on the names to be placed on the Advisory Committee; when, on motion of Mr. W. J. Clark, duly seconded, the report as a whole was adopted.

Your Committee appointed in connection with the proposed Twentieth Century Fund, with instructions to consider carefully the different departments of the work of the Church that should benefit by the Fund, and the proportion of it which shall be devoted to each, as also the practical steps that should be taken for the purpose of raising such Fund, beg to offer the following recommendations:

1. The total amount aimed at for the said Century Fund shall be one million dollars. It shall consist of two parts, one of six hundred thousand dollars, to be known as the Common Fund, for the Missionary, Educational and Benevolent work of the Church, as specified under sections 2 and 3, and the other of four hundred thousand dollars for discharging of debts on Church property.

2. There shall be no endowment asked for the ordinary missionary expenditure of the Church, but in order to obviate borrowing from the banks, the following working balances be aimed at:

4. Members and adherents are expected to contribute to the Common Fund, as a whole, yet any desiring to designate their contribution to a particular object embraced in it, shall be at liberty to do so.

5. Nothing shall be paid out of the Common Fund, except for the objects specified above, but congregations and individual contributors are encouraged to reduce or liquidate debts on Churches, Manses or other Church property, with the understanding that the amounts thus paid, if reported, shall be included in the Century Fund. Such congregations and individuals are expected to designate a certain portion of their contributions to the Common Fund, the proportion to be determined by themselves.

6. The Century Fund is special and extraordinary, therefore, contributions made in connection with it ought not to interfere with ordinary givings to congregational objects, or to the Schemes of the Church.

7. All moneys paid to the Common Fund, after this date and up to May 1st, 1901, or reported by the latter date as having been paid to debts on Church property, shall be included in the Century Fund.

8. For the successful carrying out of the Scheme, a General Agent shall be set apart for this work, for a term of two years, whose duties shall be to secure thorough organization in Synods, Presbyteries and congregations in connection with it, to present the Scheme wherever possible, and to do all else in his power to further it. The Committee recommend that Dr. Robert Campbell, Moderator of the Assembly, be appointed to this office.

9. A large Advisory Committee, consisting of six sections, corresponding to the six Synods of the Church, shall be appointed as an Executive by the General Assembly, for the purpose of carrying out the scheme of a Century Fund authorized by the Assembly, with instructions to co-operate with the General Agent in every part of his work, and to lend him all the assistance and support in their power. This Committee is instructed to meet at once with the General Agent and consider what procedure should be adopted to bring the subject before the whole Church, and to report to the Assembly on this and other matters they may deem necessary. It is also recommended that each of the six sections shall meet as soon as possible, at a convenient local centre, convened by a sub-Convener, and that each section have power to add to its numbers, or to subdivide.

THE GENERAL AGENT OF THE CENTURY FUND.

A Committee, consisting of Mr. W. J. Clark, Principal Grant and Mr. George Rutherford, was appointed to confer with the Moderator, Dr. Campbell, regarding the resolution of the Century Fund Committee, asking him to undertake the office of General Agent of that Fund.

The Committee, having briefly conferred with Dr. Campbell on the subject, reported that he, while deeply sensible of the greatness of the task the Assembly desired to impose upon him, signified his willingness to accept the office, provided a satisfactory understanding can be had with his congregation, over which he has presided for twenty-eight years.

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It was then moved by Mr. W. J. Clark, seconded by Dr. Warden :
That the Assembly appoint its Moderator, Rev. R. Campbell, Sc.D., General Agent for the oversight of the Century Fund, and that Rev. Principal Grant be delegated to visit Dr. Campbell's congregation and present the desire of the Assembly, in order that their pastor may be set free for this work.

The motion was adopted.

The Moderator, having addressed the Assembly, thanking the brethren for the confidence reposed in him, in asking him to assume the office of General Agent of the Century Fund undertaking, concluded with soliciting their best help in the event of his entering upon the great task.

Principal Caven moved, seconded by Principal MacVicar, as follows :

The General Assembly has heard with sincere pleasure the Moderator's acceptance of the office of General Agent for the Century Fund, promises to give him its hearty support in the onerous labors on which he will enter, and prays that the Divine blessing may crown with success the effort to which the Assembly has pledged itself.

The motion was put to the House by Principal MacVicar, and was unanimously adopted by a standing vote.

REPORT ON SABBATH SCHOOLS.

The Assembly resumed consideration of the Sabbath School Report, and the motion to receive the report and consider its recommendations was adopted.

It was then moved by Mr. J. A. Paterson, seconded by Mr. J. K. Munnis :

That the Assembly "restore to the Committee the control of the Sabbath School publications, so that their responsibilities over this important branch of the Church's work be no longer impaired."

To this it was moved in amendment by Dr. Thompson, seconded by Mr. H. Cassels:

The General Assembly has heard with great interest the report of the Sabbath School Committee, and is gratified to learn of the success and progress of that important part of the Church's work. The Assembly would hereby tender its thanks to the Committee for their labors, and especially to the Convener for his long, patient and successful labors in connection with all the parts of Sabbath School work. But this Assembly does not see any reason for interfering with the arrangements now entered into, or for changing its policy so seriously adopted two years ago, after due deliberation, and still further confirmed and enlarged at last Assembly.

At this point, Principal Grant moved, seconded by Mr. J. K. Macdonald : To let the resolution and amendment lie on the table in the meantime, and that a Committee be appointed to consider the whole matter and report a deliverance on the subject, which will harmonize as far as possible the various views which have been expressed, the Committee to consist of Dr. Thompson, Convener, Dr. Moore, Dr. T. G. Smith, Messrs. D. D. MacLeod, W. W. Peck, J. Rollins, E. Scott, Ministers: and Messrs. Paterson, Cassels, C. Campbell, R. Murray and Professor Dyde, Elders.

This motion was agreed to.

APPLICATIONS TO BE PLACED ON PRESBYTERY ROLLS.

The Assembly proceeded to hear and consider the requests of Presbyteries for leave to place upon their rolls the names of ministers whose membership of said Presbyteries is not provided for by the rules of the Church.

The first request was from the Presbytery of Halifax, to be allowed to retain upon

their roll the name of Mr. Allan Simpson, formerly minister of one of the charges of the Presbytery, who is no longer capacitated for ministerial work.

Mr. T. Fowler was heard in support of the application of the Presbytery, and moved, seconded by Mr. H. H. Macpherson :

That the name of Mr. Allan Simpson be allowed to remain on the roll of the Presbytery of Halifax, as a constituent member.

The motion was agreed to.

The further consideration of these applications had to be postponed, as the Committee on Bills and Overtures had fixed other business to be taken up at the time now arrived.

CHURCH AND MANSE BUILDING FUND.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Board on the Church and Manse Building Fund, which was given in by Sir Thomas W. Taylor, *Convener*, and which, being printed and in the hands of the Convener, he called attention to.

Dr. Robertson moved as follows, seconded by Dr. Thompson :

The General Assembly receives and adopts the Report, records its satisfaction with the work done during the year, thanks those who have aided the Fund by their contributions, commends the Fund anew to the liberality of the Church, as an important agency in the work of Church extension in Western Canada, and thanks the Chairman and Secretary-Treasurer for their valuable services in connection with the work of the Board.

The motion was carried.

The Assembly adjourned to meet in this place, at a quarter to eight o'clock this evening, of which public intimation was given, and this sederunt was closed with the benediction by the Moderator.

FOURTEENTH SEDERUNT.

At the same place, on the same day, at a quarter to eight o'clock in the evening :

The General Assembly met, as per adjournment, and was constituted with devotional exercises, Dr. Moore leading in prayer at the request of the Moderator.

The minutes of last sederunt were read and approved.

REV. JAMES M'LEOD.

It coming to the knowledge of the Assembly that Rev. James McLeod, Minister of Munlochie, Free Church, Inverness, Scotland, was in the House, he was introduced to the Moderator, and on motion, duly seconded, it was agreed to invite him to a seat on the platform.

BOARD OF FRENCH EVANGELIZATION.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Board of French Evangelization which was given in by Principal MacVicar, *Chairman*, and which, being printed and in the hands of members, he directed the attention of the Assembly to. He concluded with moving, seconded by Dr. Coussirat, that the Report be received and adopted : That the

Assembly express gratitude to the Great Head of the Church for the manifest tokens of progress in the work of the Board, as indicated by the Report now submitted; regard with satisfaction and approval the policy and methods hitherto pursued, and commend the work in all its departments to the confidence and continued hearty support of the entire Church.

Mr. S. A. Carriere, Minister of Grand Bend, Mr. J. L. Campbell, Missionary at Chicoutimi, and Mr. E. D. Pelletier, Missionary at Chelmsford, were invited to address the Assembly in relation to the work of French Evangelization. The motion was then adopted.

REPORT ON THE LIFE AND WORK OF THE CHURCH.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on Church Life and Work, which was given in by Mr. D. D. McLeod, *Convener*, and which being printed and in the hands of members, he directed attention to in addressing the House. He concluded with moving, seconded by Mr. J. Charlton, M.P., that the Report be received and its recommendations considered *seriatim*.

The motion was carried.

The hour of adjournment having arrived, further action on the report had to be deferred.

It was agreed, on motion of Dr. Moore, duly seconded, to continue the consideration of this Report as the first business to-morrow forenoon, after the reading of the minutes.

The Assembly adjourned to meet in this place to-morrow forenoon, at eleven o'clock, of which public intimation was given, and this sederunt was closed with the benediction by the Moderator.

FIFTEENTH SEDERUNT.

At Hamilton, and within Central Church there, the Twenty-first day of June, One thousand, eight hundred and ninety-nine, at eleven o'clock in the forenoon:

The General Assembly met, as per adjournment, and was constituted with devotional exercises, Dr. McMullen leading in prayer at the request of the Moderator.

The minutes of last sederunt were read and approved.

REPORT ON LIFE AND WORK OF THE CHURCH.

In terms of the resolution of last sederunt, the Assembly continued consideration of the Report of the Committee on Church Life and Work.

Mr. D. D. McLeod moved the adoption of the first recommendation.

The motion was seconded and agreed to.

Mr. D. D. McLeod also moved the adoption of the second recommendation. The motion was seconded and agreed to.

On motion of Mr. J. A. Paterson, seconded by Principal Caven, the following addition was made to the third recommendation of the Committee, and the recommendation thus enlarged was adopted, namely:

The General Assembly views with concern the influences which are at work to impair the observance of the Lord's Day, and which threaten to change the day of holy rest into

a day partly of toil and partly of secular pleasure. Forms of Sabbath desecration which were wont to be rare are now seen in many quarters, and a weakening of the sentiment of reverence with which the day was generally regarded is at present, it may be feared, very extensively taking place. Avarice and the love of amusement unite in making ominous inroads upon the rest and quiet of the Sabbath.

Recent decisions of our Civil Courts, regarding certain important provisions of the Ontario Lord's Day Act, have greatly strengthened in that Province the forces which are adverse to Sabbath observance, for as the Act is at present interpreted, it is powerless to repress, to any considerable extent, the unnecessary labor done on the Lord's day.

Believing it to be of the utmost importance to the interests of religion and the well-being of society, that the Lord's Day should be honored and observed, the General Assembly is anxious to do everything in its power to assist in keeping back the tide of Sabbath desecration. To this end, the Assembly earnestly exhorts all who are under its care faithfully to use the Lord's Day for the holy and benevolent purposes for which it is appointed; and also, in the discharge of their duties as citizens, zealously to bear their part in procuring such legislation as shall adequately protect the Lord's Day as a day of rest for the whole community.

The Assembly gladly recognizes the wise and helpful labors of the Ontario Lord's Day Alliance during the year, and recommends that congregations, when they shall find it convenient, shall make some remittance to the Alliance to assist in its important labor.

On motion of Mr. D. D. McLeod, duly seconded, the fourth recommendation was adopted.

Mr. R. Murray moved, seconded by Dr. W. A. McKay, that the following recommendation be added to the report:

The General Assembly recognizes with gratitude to God the growth of temperance principles in the Church and in the community; also that this does not arise from increased stringency in the laws which deal with the traffic in intoxicating liquor, but from the enlightened Christian sentiment in the people on this subject. The General Assembly reaffirms the declaration of former Assemblies, regarding the great evils arising from the liquor traffic. The Assembly records its satisfaction with the response of our people to the counsel tendered by the General Assembly in respect to the plebiscite of September 29th last, also that the vote on that occasion demands from the legislature at least some definite action in the direction of public prohibition, as the final issue, and urges upon all within its jurisdiction the proper enforcement of existing legislation, restricting the liquor traffic, and of working constantly and diligently toward prohibition, as the only adequate solution of this important moral and economical question. Recognizing the importance of educating the people, and especially the children and youth, in the principles and practice of total abstinence, the General Assembly recommends anew the plan of work sanctioned in former years.

The hour of adjournment having arrived, the consideration of the question had to be deferred, and it was resolved to continue its discussion as the first item of business after the sustaining of the minutes, at the afternoon sederunt.

Mr. Charlton gave notice that when the consideration of this subject is resumed, he will offer the following amendment:

The General Assembly reaffirms the declarations of former Assemblies upon the temperance question, and recommends to Sessions and Presbyteries the faithful performance of the duty of dealing with the question; and to ministers in the Presbyterian

Church, teachers in Sabbath Schools and officers of Young People's Societies, the duty of faithfully imparting instruction and advice upon the evils of intemperance, from a religious and moral, as well as from a material standpoint; and generally the active use of all proper means for promoting the temperance cause, and exerting influence in the direction of temperance reform.

The General Assembly gladly recognizes that abundant evidence indicates that the evils of intemperance are rapidly decreasing within the bounds of our Church; and it expresses the ardent hope that the growth of temperance sentiment in Canada may soon create an overwhelming popular demand for such legislative action, as may properly be applied for the purpose of destroying the liquor traffic.

MORRIN COLLEGE.

Dr. Herridge gave notice that at a future sederunt he would move the reconsideration of the Report *re* Morrin College.

The Assembly adjourned, to meet in this place, this afternoon at half-past two o'clock, whereof public intimation having been given, this sederunt was closed with the benediction by the Moderator.

SIXTEENTH SEDERUNT.

At the same place, on the same day, at half-past two o'clock in the afternoon:

The Assembly met, as per adjournment, and was constituted with devotional exercises, Mr. Charles McKillop leading in prayer, at the request of the Moderator.

The minutes of last sederunt were read and sustained.

Principal Caven also moved the adoption of the part of the report relating to Dr. Warden's resignation. This motion was likewise seconded by Dr. Laing and agreed to.

The Report as a whole was therefore adopted. It is as follows:—

1. The Committee recommends that the salary of the Rev. Dr. Robertson as Superintendent of Missions in the North-West, and Field Secretary of Home Missions, and Augmentation, Western Section, shall be twenty-four hundred dollars per annum.

2. In regard to the resignation of the Rev. Dr. Warden, of the office of Secretary of the Home Mission Committee and the Augmentation Committee, the Committee recommends the adoption by the General Assembly of the following minute:

The General Assembly accepts the resignation of the Rev. Dr. Warden of the office of Secretary of the Home Mission Committee, and of the Augmentation Committee, (Western Section); and in so doing expresses its deep sense of the ability and faithfulness with which, for twenty-eight years, he has discharged the duties of Secretary, and of the great obligation under which he has laid the Church by his long continued and most valuable services in the office which he now resigns.

The Assembly entrusts to the Home Mission and the Augmentation Committees the appointment of their own Minute Secretaries.

The Assembly trusts that the departments of Home Missions and Augmentation will still continue to enjoy the benefit of Dr. Warden's special counsel and assistance, under other relations.

CHURCH LIFE AND WORK.

Mr. Charlton now moved the amendment of which he had given notice. The motion was seconded by Dr. Lyle.

To this, it was moved in amendment by Mr. D. D. McLeod, seconded by Dr. Laing:

That the General Assembly recognizes with gratitude to God the growth of temperance principles in the Church and in the community; also that this does not arise only, or mainly from increased stringency in the laws which deal with the traffic in intoxicating liquor, but from the enlightened Christian sentiment of the people on this subject; recommends that Sessions and Presbyteries continue to use every means in their power to educate the people on this question, and to seek the expression of their sentiments in such laws as will adequately protect our country from the evils which flow from this traffic.

Mr. Charlton, with the leave of his seconder and the House, withdrew his amendment in favor of that offered by Mr. D. D. McLeod.

A vote being taken, the motion was carried over the amendment, and was affirmed as the judgment of the Assembly, and the numbers voting were recorded at the request of two members, ninety-five voting for the motion and eighty-four against it.

Dr. McTavish moved a further recommendation to be added to the report as follows:

In view of the fact that we are soon to enter upon a new Century, and that the General Assembly have taken definite action towards the raising of a Century Fund in order suitably to mark the occasion, in connection with the work of our Church, the Assembly definitely recognize the supreme importance of an advance in spiritual life and to that end invite to special prayer and co-operation the entire membership, and especially the ministers and office-bearers of our Church, throughout the coming year, that a Committee be appointed, whose duty it will be to take such action as they may deem desirable to stimulate, direct and secure unanimity in such effort.

Mr. D. D. McLeod declared his willingness to accept this resolution and seconded it. It was adopted by the Assembly.

Mr. McLeod then moved the adoption of the report as a whole, with the additions made to the recommendations. The motion was seconded by Mr. George Grant and agreed to.

The following were appointed a sub-committee of the Committee on Church Life and Work to carry out the last recommendation of the Report of that Committee:

D. D. McLeod, *Convener*, Dr. E. W. Waits, E. H. Sawers, James Murray (Toronto) E. A. McKenzie, John Neil, Dr. McTavish, D. R. Drummond, *Ministers*; and G. M. Roger, Peterboro', *Elder*, with power to invite in any others who may assist in the work.

COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

Mr. J. Charlton offered the following motion, seconded by Mr. H. H. Macpherson :
That, in view of the unusual inroads being made on the sanctity and integrity of the Lord's Day in Canada, and in view of the desirability of having the convictions of the Presbyterian Church adequately and effectively represented before the Government of the Dominion and Provinces, in co-operation with similar committees of other Churches and organizations, working for the preservation of the Lord's Day, it is resolved that a special Standing Committee be appointed to act as, in their judgment, occasion may require, in presenting the views of the Presbyterian Church, as expressed in this Assembly before those in authority in the land.

AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS' FUND.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Joint Committee on the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund, which was given in and read by Mr. J. K. Macdonald, *Convener*, who moved the reception of the report, and the consideration of its recommendations *seriatim*. The motion was seconded and agreed to.

After discussion, the recommendations were adopted, as follows :—

1. With regard to the Report of the Special Committee presented to the Assembly of eighteen hundred and ninety-eight, and referred to both sections for reply, your Committee beg to state that, with the exceptions of Sections three and five of the Special Report, the two Committees are in substantial agreement.

2. With regard to Section three, which refers to Rule ten, the Western Section Committee recommends a return to the rule as in force prior to the Assembly of eighteen hundred and ninety-five, under which non-ratepaying ministers would receive half benefit ; while the Committee of the Eastern Section reports in favor of the rule as it now stands, namely, that a minister who has not paid the annual rate into the Fund shall forfeit all benefit from the Fund. Your Committee gave careful consideration to this, and now report unanimously in favor of leaving the rule as it now stands.

3. With regard to Section five which refers to Rule fourteen, whereby it is recommended that the age for retiring be changed from seventy to sixty-seven, your Committee beg to state that in their judgment it would be inadvisable, in view of the present state of the Funds, to make the change. But, while expressing their judgment in this way, your Committee are hopeful that the time is approaching when the age may be reduced from seventy to sixty-five.

Your Committee had also under consideration tables for deferred annuities, referred to by the Convener of the Western Section Committee when presenting his report to the Assembly, payable half yearly on attaining the age of seventy, the first payment to be made six months after attaining the age, for twenty-five to fifty-five inclusive, based on a rate of four per cent. interest.

After full consideration by your Committee of the proposals indicated in these tables, they were favorably impressed, and it is now recommended that these tables, together with full explanations, be prepared by the Convener of the Western Section Committee, and sent down to Presbyteries for consideration, with instructions to report upon the same, through the Western Section Committee, to next General Assembly.

Your Committee had under consideration a third matter, an Overture from the Presbytery of Victoria which was referred to it by your honorable Court.

The Committee recommends that the prayer of the Overture be not granted.

It was moved by Mr. A. H. Scott, seconded by Dr. Fletcher :

That the Assembly, in disposing of the Report of the Committee on the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund, Western Section, thank the Committee, and especially the Convener, for services rendered during the year.

While it is noted with pleasure that there is improvement in congregational contributions, the Assembly would press upon ministers and congregations the need for increased liberality in the hope that in the near future, it may be possible for the annuities to be paid in full, as provided for under the rules.

That the Assembly strongly urge the desirability of a connection with the Fund on the part of all ministers, whose age will not exclude them, and of a more active co-operation on the part of ministers both in regard to the ordinary and to the Endowment Funds.

That Presbyteries are urged to give a hearty support to the Committee in the effort now being made for securing the balance of the endowment, and that, as far as possible, the hands of the agent within the Presbytery be strengthened by co-operation and by giving him the use of the pulpits, it being understood that the prosecution of the proposed canvass shall be in conjunction with the Committee on the new Century Fund.

That the recommendation in regard to ministers applying for leave to retire and go on the Fund for benefit be approved.

And that the recommendation in regard to ministers wishing to connect with the Fund be also approved, subject to the age limit.

The resolution was carried.

RECEPTION OF MINISTERS.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on the applications of Presbyteries to be allowed to receive ministers of other Churches into the ministry of this Church, which was given in and read by Dr. McMullen, *Convener*, who moved its reception and the consideration of its recommendations. The motion was seconded and agreed to.

They were considered and adopted as a whole, on motion of Dr. McMullen, duly seconded, as follows :—

1. The Application of Presbytery of Winnipeg on behalf of Mr. D. H. Jacobs, a minister of the Congregational Church in Canada.

Recommendation : That the leave asked for be granted, on Mr. Jacobs presenting a satisfactory certificate of dismissal from the Congregational Church.

2. The application of the Presbytery of Portage la Prairie, on behalf of Mr. George Clark, a minister of the Presbyterian Church in the United States.

Recommendation : That the application of the Presbytery of Portage la Prairie on behalf of Mr. George Clark be not granted.

3. The application of the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island on behalf of Mr. R. A. Finlayson, a minister of the Presbyterian Church in the United States.

Recommendation : That the leave be granted.

4. The application of the Presbytery of Victoria on behalf of Mr. Alexander Fraser, a minister of the Presbyterian Church in the United States.

Recommendation : That the leave be granted.

5. The application of the Presbytery of Maitland, on behalf of Mr. H. W. Reid, a minister of the Reformed Presbyterian Church.

Recommendation : That the leave be granted.

6. The application of the Presbytery of Hamilton for leave to receive Mr. Archibald McLaren, from the Presbyterian Church in the United States.

Recommendation : That the leave be granted. .

7. The application of the Presbytery of Glengarry for leave to receive as a minister of this Church, Mr. J. H. Paradis, from the Methodist Episcopal Church in the United States.

Recommendation : That the leave be granted.

8. The application of the Presbytery of Toronto on behalf of M^r. Matthew White, a minister of the Free Church of Scotland.

Recommendation : That the leave be granted.

9. The Presbytery of Toronto were allowed to withdraw their application for leave to receive as a minister of this Church, Mr. E. M. C. Botterill from the Presbyterian Church in the United States.

10. The application of the Presbytery of Barrie, on behalf of Mr. W. A. Edington, of the Presbyterian Church in the United States.

Recommendation : That the leave be granted.

Principal Caven gave notice of a motion as an addendum to the recommendations of the Report on the reception of Ministers.

MORRIN COLLEGE.

Dr. Herridge now offered the motion for reconsideration of the Report relating to Morrin College, of which he had given notice. It was seconded and agreed to. He then moved that the report be amended to the extent of adding the name of the Moderator, Dr. Campbell, to the Committee appointed to confer with the authorities of Morrin College. The motion was seconded by Dr. Campbell (Clerk) and agreed to.

The Assembly adjourned to meet in this place, this evening at a quarter to eight o'clock ; whereof public intimation having been given, this sederunt was closed with the benediction by the Moderator.

SEVENTEENTH SEDERUNT.

At the same place, on the same day, at a quarter to eight o'clock in the evening:

The General Assembly met, as per adjournment, and was constituted with devotional exercises, Dr. Robertson leading in prayer, at the request of the Moderator.

The minutes of last sederunt were read and sustained.

ADDENDUM TO REPORT ON RECEPTION OF MINISTERS.

Principal Caven now offered the motion of which he had given notice, as follows :

It was moved by Principal Caven, seconded by Dr. Bryce, that the following addition shall be made to the motion in adoption of the Report of the Committee on the Reception of Ministers ;

That Mr. Clark shall have permission to attend the College of Manitoba, in order to complete such parts of the course in Arts, prescribed by the Church, as have not been embraced in his previous studies, and when the College shall certify to the Presbytery that Mr. Clark has passed on these supplementary studies, the Presbytery shall so report to the General Assembly, with a view to his reception as a minister of the Church.

The motion was agreed to.

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ADDRESS TO THE QUEEN.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on the address to Her Majesty, the Queen, which was given in and read by Dr. Herridge, *Convener*, who moved the reception and adoption of the report. The motion was seconded and agreed to.

ADDRESS TO THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on the Address to His Excellency, the Governor-General, which was given in and read by Dr. Herridge, *Convener*, who moved the reception and adoption of the report. The motion was seconded and agreed to.

APPLICATIONS ON BEHALF OF STUDENTS.

The Assembly called for the report of the Committee on the Applications of Students, which was given in and read by Dr. J. McMillan, *Convener*, who moved its reception and the consideration of its recommendations. The motion was seconded and agreed to.

They were considered and adopted, as a whole, as follows :

I. The Presbytery of Winnipeg makes application on behalf of Mr. T. W. Taylor who is taking the current session in Theology at Manitoba College as a first year student, that he be permitted to take his second session next winter in Knox College. In view of the fact that Dr. Taylor does not seek to lessen the number of sessions in his course, that he has had so thorough a training (being a B.A. and M.A. of Manitoba University, a Ph. D. of Cornell, where he studied three sessions, and a barrister-at-law), and also that he has already rendered service to the Church equal to a year's work in the Mission Field, by lecturing in Philosophy in Manitoba College for three sessions, the Committee recommends the General Assembly to grant the application.

II. The Presbytery of Winnipeg makes application on behalf of Mr. John A. Beattie, B.A., that he be permitted to finish his Theological course in two intra-mural sessions at Manitoba College, and one extra-mural session taken in conjunction with his work in the Mission Field. It was decided that in view of Mr. Beattie's qualifications, as a Graduate in Arts of Queen's University and as an experienced teacher, the General Assembly grant the application, on condition that at the examination held at the close of the first session, he attain the standing required by Manitoba College of a first year student in Theology.

III. The Presbytery of Montreal makes application on behalf of Mr. J. T. Reid, M.D., who has completed his second year in Theology, that next winter he be permitted to substitute scientific work for the regulation work required in the study of the Hebrew text. It was agreed to recommend the General Assembly to grant the application on the grounds that Dr. Reid is a man of mature mind and good education, that he has a sufficient knowledge of Hebrew to enable him to get the full benefit of Old Testament exegesis which he undertakes to study, and that his training renders the discipline of learning the Hebrew more thoroughly unnecessary, especially in view of the fact that he intends to labor as a medical missionary.

IV. The Presbytery of Edmonton makes application on behalf of Mr. T. A. Patterson, who attended Albert College, Belleville, for three years, completed his course for the Methodist ministry in two years at Victoria University and spent four years as a Probationer. Mr. Patterson having joined the Presbyterian Church and wishing to enter the Presbyterian ministry, the Presbytery asks that he be permitted to finish his Theological training in two sessions at Manitoba College.

It was agreed to recommend to the General Assembly that as Mr. Patterson's literary training is incomplete, he be referred by the Presbytery of Edmonton to the Senate of Manitoba College to undergo an examination there with the view of obtaining an Arts' standing.

AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS' FUND, EASTERN SECTION.

It was moved by Mr. E. D. Millar, seconded by Mr. R. Murray, that the Report of the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund, Eastern Section, which had been received at a former sederunt, be disposed of by the adoption of the following motion :

That the Assembly, in disposing of the Report of the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund, Eastern Section, thank the Committee, and especially the Convener, for services rendered during the year ; note with pleasure the growing interest in the Fund indicated by the larger number of ministers connecting themselves therewith ; and commend this scheme to the increased interest and liberality of the ministers and congregations of the Church.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MANITOBA COLLEGE.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on Manitoba College, which was given in and read by Dr. McMillan, *Convener*, who moved its reception and the consideration of its recommendations. The motion was seconded and agreed to.

He moved the adoption of the report, seconded by Dr. Bryce.

The order of the day being reached, the further consideration of the Report had to be deferred.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE TO STRIKE STANDING COMMITTEES.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee to strike Standing Committees, which was given in and read by Dr. James Ross, *Convener*, who moved its reception and the consideration of its recommendations. The motion was seconded and agreed to. The nominations for the several Committees and Boards were considered, amended, and adopted, except those relating to Augmentation, Foreign Missions, Statistics and Sabbath Observance.

REPORT ON MANITOBA COLLEGE.

The Assembly resumed consideration of the Report of the Committee on Manitoba College. After discussion, the motion of Dr. McMillan, adopting the Report, was carried.

The Report is as follows :

The Committee on the appointment of a Principal for Manitoba College beg to report that the Committee consulted with the members of the Board, but the Board still finds it impossible to make a nomination at present. In consequence, the Committee and Board unite in recommending the appointment of a Special Commission of Assembly to appoint a Principal and Professor, on the nomination of the Board.

The Committee suggest that the following members of Assembly constitute the proposed Commission, viz. :

Principal Caven, *Chairman* ; Dr. Laing, Dr. Warden, Dr. Herridge, Dr. Fletcher, Dr. McTavish, Messrs. W. J. Clark, J. A. Macdonald, D. Currie, J. W. MacMillan, Neil McPherson, *Ministers* ; and Messrs. John Charlton, M.P., John A. Paterson, J. K. Macdonald and Hamilton Cassels, *Elders*.

REPORT ON RECORDS.

The Assembly called for the Reports on the Assembly Records, and on the Records of the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West Territories, which were given in by the respective Conveners, bearing that the Records in both cases were carefully and correctly kept. The Reports were received and adopted, and the Records were ordered to be attested in terms of the recommendations of the Reports.

The Assembly adjourned to meet in this place, to-morrow morning, at ten o'clock; whereof public intimation having been given, this sederunt was closed with the benediction by the Moderator.

EIGHTEENTH SEDERUNT.

At Hamilton, and within Central Church there, June twenty-second, One thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine, at ten o'clock in the forenoon:

The Assembly met, as per adjournment, and was constituted with devotional exercises, Mr. Roderick McKay leading in prayer, at the request of the Moderator.

The minutes of last sederunt were read and sustained.

COMMISSION TO REV. T. FOWLER.

Mr. R. Murray offered the motion, of which he had given notice at a former sederunt, authorizing the Moderator to grant a commission to Mr. T. Fowler, who purposes visiting Great Britain next May.

The motion was seconded and agreed to.

REPORT ON PREPARATORY COURSE.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on the Preparatory College course, which was given in and read by Dr. Bryce, *Convenor*, who moved its reception and the consideration of its recommendations. The motion was seconded and agreed to.

The recommendations were considered and adopted as a whole, as follows:

1. The Committee reports that the following answers were given to the remits sent to the several College Boards, as to the Preparatory Course in the Colleges.

(a) Knox College, Toronto.

This College expresses its satisfaction with the modified Arts' course proposed in the remit, trusts that it will be accepted by all the Colleges, and suggests that all students who take this course should have the supervision of their Presbyteries and report to the Theological Colleges from year to year,

Knox College has nine students who will be in the final year of the Preparatory course next year, and six students who will be in their second year. The College will admit no one to the first year in the Preparatory course during the coming year.

(b) Manitoba College, Winnipeg.

This College heartily approves of the course for Preparatory students outlined by the Assembly, but suggests the substitution of New Testament Greek for classical Greek in the third year.

Manitoba College did not allow any new students to enter the Preparatory course this year, and will have no such students next year.

(c) Queen's College, Kingston.

The Theological Faculty of this College expresses pleasure at the step taken by the Assembly. It proposes what it considers is virtually an equivalent course—differing only in one or two minor subjects.

This College expresses its preference for a full three years' course in Arts, and hopes that this may become general throughout the Colleges of the Church.

(d) Presbyterian College, Halifax.

This College makes no return to the remit, though it is understood to be favorable to the remit.

(e) Presbyterian College, Montreal.

This College, in view of the difficulty of training French students for matriculation, and of the transition state of McGill University at the present time, does not recommend the abolition of the Preparatory course. It is willing, however, to appoint associate examiners with the tutors in Classics and Mathematics, and to require a pass standard of fifty per cent.

This College will have seven students in the third year of the literary course during next year, three of whom are French; and in the second year five students, one of whom is French.

The Committee are strongly of opinion that the modified Arts' course should be adopted, but in view of the representations from Montreal College, recommend:—

(1) That special provision for French-speaking students be made by the continuation of the Preparatory course for such students.

(2) That it be remitted to the Boards of the several Colleges to further consider the great importance and desirability of all the Colleges adopting this course, as providing a uniform standard throughout the whole Church.

II. As to the proposal to lengthen the course of study in Theology in each year, from six months to seven, in the different Colleges, the Committee recommends that it be remitted to the College Boards and to the two sections of the Home Mission Committee to consider,

(1) Whether the session should be lengthened in each year from six months to seven; or, as an alternative,

(2) Whether the Theological course shall consist of four years of six months each.

III. The question having arisen as to the desirability of making the Theological session from November to April inclusive, it is recommended that this also be remitted to College Boards, to report upon to the next meeting of the General Assembly.

PETITION OF MRS. MARGERY ROBERTSON.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on the Petition of Mrs. Margery Robertson, which was given in and read by Dr. Bryce, *Convener*, who moved its reception and the consideration of its recommendations. The motion was seconded and agreed to. The recommendations being considered, they were adopted, on motion of Dr. Bryce, seconded by Dr. McMullen, and are as follows :—

The Committee finds that Mrs. Robertson has no legal ground for appeal ; indeed she now comes by petition to the Assembly. Mrs. Robertson asks :

1. To have a minute of the Kirk session of Vankleek Hill deleted.

2. To have certificate of Church membership issued, giving her her standing in March, Eighteen hundred and seventy-two.

The Committee recommend :

1. That, under the circumstances, no steps be taken looking to the deleting of the minutes referred to.

2. That it be referred to the Presbytery of Glengarry to examine the session records relating to this matter, and, should it be thought wise to grant a certificate to Mrs. Robertson up to Eighteen hundred and seventy-two, that it be encouraged to do so.

PETITION OF MRS. MARY WEBBER.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on the Petition of Mrs. Mary Webber, which was given in and read by Dr. Bryce, *Convener*, who moved its reception and the consideration of its recommendations. The motion was seconded and agreed to.

It was agreed, on motion of Dr. Warden, seconded by Dr. R. Campbell, to refer the Petition to the Committee on the Protection of Church Property.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RELIGIOUS EDUCATION.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on Religious Education in schools, which was given in and read by Principal Caven, *Convener*, who moved its reception and the consideration of its recommendations. This was seconded and agreed to.

He then moved, seconded by Principal Grant, as follows :—

The Assembly expresses general approval of the views indicated by its Committee on Religious Instruction in Schools, and reappoints its Committee, with instructions to co-operate with similar Committees of other Churches in the important business entrusted to it.

The motion was adopted.

COMMITTEE ON UNION.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on Union with other Churches, which was given in and read by Principal Caven, *Convener*, who moved its reception and the consideration of its recommendations. The motion was seconded and agreed to.

He further moved, seconded by Principal Grant, that the Report be adopted. The motion was carried.

APPLICATIONS TO PUT NAMES ON PRESBYTERY ROLLS.

There was presented and read an application from the Presbytery of Toronto, asking leave to put the name of Mr. R. C. Tibb, Clerk of the Presbytery, on the roll of the Presbytery of Toronto, though he is not in a pastoral charge.

Mr. W. G. Wallace was heard in support of the application, and moved the reception of the application. The motion was seconded.

A vote being taken, the motion was lost.

There was presented and read an application from the Presbytery of Kamloops, asking to be allowed to place the name of Mr. Thomas Muir, now resident within their bounds, but not occupying the position of a pastor or missionary, on their roll.

It was moved by Principal Grant, seconded by Dr. McMullen :—

That the Presbytery be authorized to place Mr. Muir's name on the appendix to their roll. The motion was adopted.

SUPPLEMENTARY REPORT ON CENTURY FUND.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Century Fund Committee, which they were instructed to make at the time of their appointment, which was given in and read by Dr. Warden, *Convener*, who moved the reception and adoption of the Report. The motion was seconded and agreed to.

It is as follows :—

The Advisory Committee in connection with the Century Fund beg to report to the General Assembly the following recommendations :—

(1) That the sub-Conveners of the Synodical sections of the Committee be as follows :

Maritime Provinces—Mr. R. Murray.

Montreal and Ottawa—Dr. Barclay.

Toronto and Kingston—Sir Thomas W. Taylor.

Hamilton and London—George Rutherford.

Manitoba and North-West—Dr. Duval ; Vice-Convener, Mr. R. G. McBeth.

British Columbia—Mr. E. D. McLaren ; Vice-Convener, Mr. W. L. Clay.

(2) That, seeing that it is important for the success of the Century Fund that the General Agent should meet the Presbyteries of the Church as soon as possible, and, as their meetings may conflict, the Executive be clothed with the power of arranging with Presbyteries the time of meeting for consultation.

(3) That the Moderator of Assembly be requested to prepare for publication and issue a pastoral letter, including a statement regarding the Century Fund and an appeal to the Church on its behalf, and that a day be set apart in September or October next, on which it shall be read to the congregations of the Church, the particular day to be decided by the Executive.

(4) That the General Assembly request the cordial co-operation of the W.F.M.S., the Young People's Societies, the Sabbath Schools and all similar bodies, both through their central organizations and in congregations, in furthering the interests of the Century Fund and in assisting the General Agent in the prosecution of his work.

(5) The Advisory Committee appointed the following as its Executive :—

1. The General Agent, the Moderator of the General Assembly.

2. The Convener of the Committee, Dr. Warden.

3. The sub-Conveners of the Synodical Sections, whose travelling expenses to and from the meetings of the Executive, it is understood, shall be paid, and, in addition :

The Convener of the Advisory Committee to be Convener of the Executive, and Mr. W. G. Wallace its Secretary.

(6) The following Literature Committee was appointed, with power to add to its

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numbers : Principal Grant, *Convener*, Dr. Herridge, Dr. W. G. Jordan, Messrs. C. W. Gordon, J. A. Macdonald, R. Murray, E. Scott and R. D. Fraser.

(7) That authority be given the Executive to appoint such other agent or agents as in their judgment may be thought desirable in the interest of the Fund.

With regard to methods of work, it was understood that personal contributions might be sought even before congregations are approached, but with the distinct understanding that all such amounts shall be credited to the congregations to which the donors belong.

COUNCIL OF MODERATORS.

There was presented and read an Overture signed by certain members of the Assembly, craving the Assembly to take into consideration whether it would not be a more satisfactory way to provide for the election of the Moderator of Assembly that a nomination should proceed from the surviving ex-Moderators, to be called a Council of Moderators.

Mr. L. H. Jordan was heard in support of the Overture.

It was moved by Mr. W. T. Wilkins, seconded by Dr. Moore :

The Assembly grants the prayer of the Overture and asks the Moderator to appoint a small Committee to draft and submit a motion, to be passed by the Assembly, regulating the matter.

It was moved in amendment by Dr. McMillan, seconded by Dr. D. L. McCrae : That the Overture be remitted to Presbyteries to consider and report their views thereupon to next Assembly.

A vote being taken, the amendment carried over the motion, and was affirmed as the judgment of the House.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SABBATH SCHOOL REPORT.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Special Committee on the Sabbath School Report, which was given in and read by Dr. Thompson, *Convener*, who moved the reception of the Report and the consideration of its recommendations seriatim. The motion was seconded and agreed to.

The recommendations were considered and approved, and Dr. Thompson moved the adoption of the Report as a whole. This was seconded and agreed to. It is as follows :

1. That the Committee on publication of Sabbath School periodicals be continued as last year ; that the Convener of the Sabbath School Committee be an *ex officio* member, and two others to be named by the Sabbath School Committee be also members of the Periodicals' Committee ; also that the editor of "Children's Record," and the editor of Sabbath School periodicals be *ex officio* members of the Sabbath School Committee.

2. The Committee recommend, further, that in view of the long-continued labors of Rev. T. F. Fotheringham, M.A., in connection with the Sabbath School Committee, and his retirement from the position of Convener of said Committee, the General Assembly thank Mr. Fotheringham for his very valuable services and request his acceptance of the sum of seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$750), five hundred dollars, (\$500) of which to be taken from the Assembly Fund, and two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250), from the balance to the credit of the Sabbath School Publication Fund. This includes the grant made two years ago at Winnipeg.

3. That the contribution from "Children's Day" be given for the next two years to "The Century Fund," except what is necessary for the ordinary expenses of carrying on the work of the Committee, not including anything for Higher Religious Instruction.

4. Your Committee also incorporate, as part of their report, the recommendations already made to the Assembly by Lieut.-Col. Fraser, viz :

(1) That the attention of teachers and parents be called by the Sessions to the great privilege of memorizing the Scriptures and the Shorter Catechism.

(2) Commend to all Synods and Presbyteries the personal oversight of their schools by personal visitation in session.

(3) Commend the principle of consultation by Synod Conveners in regard to their fields, especially on enrolment, conduct and contributions.

Rev. Dr. Warden was appointed Treasurer of the Sabbath School Fund.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE TO STRIKE STANDING COMMITTEES.

NINETEENTH SEDERUNT.

At the same place, on the same day, at half-past two o'clock in the afternoon:

The Assembly met, as per adjournment, and was constituted with devotional exercises, Dr. Torrance leading in prayer, at the request of the Moderator.

The minutes of last sederunt were read and sustained.

REPLIES TO COMMUNICATIONS.

The Assembly called for the report of the Committee on Life and Work, to which certain communications had been referred—which was given in and read by Mr. D. D. McLeod, *Convener*, who moved its reception and the adoption of its recommendations. The motion was seconded and agreed to.

The recommendations are as follows:

In regard to the communication from the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, which deals with the sale of liquor in the militia camp, your Committee recommends that the Clerk of Assembly inform the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, from which the communication comes, that the General Assembly sympathises with them in

their efforts in this matter, and agrees that the sale of liquor in the militia camp should be prohibited, and remits to the Committee to take such action as may seem wise to secure this end.

In regard to the communication from the Anti-narcotic department of the same Society, craving the sympathy and influence of the Assembly in their endeavors, your Committee recommends that the Clerk inform the Woman's Union of its sympathy in their efforts to prevent cigarette smoking by the youth of the country, which it regards as a habit highly injurious, from a moral and also from a physical standpoint.

In regard to the communication requesting the Assembly to appoint a certain Sabbath, as a Sabbath on which the subject of temperance shall be dealt with in the pulpits of the Church, instruct the Clerk to acknowledge the communication.

In regard to the communication from the Council of the Dominion Alliance, asking the influence and co-operation of the Assembly in behalf of the work carried on by the Alliance, recommend that the Clerk inform the Alliance that as far as their work commends itself to the Assembly, the Assembly sympathises with them in their efforts on behalf of temperance, and nominates as below, delegates to the Alliance from the Assembly:—Dr. W. A. McKay and G. T. Fergusson.

On motion of Dr. Warden, duly seconded, it was

Resolved to place at the disposal of the Convener of the Committee on Church Life and Work the sum of fifty dollars (\$50), to meet expenses in connection with the work during the past year.

FOREIGN MISSION ESTIMATES.

The Assembly called for the estimates of amounts needed for maintaining Foreign Mission work during the next year, which was given in and read by Dr. Warden, who moved its reception and adoption. The motion was seconded and agreed to.

SALARIES OF MISSIONARIES IN BRITISH COLUMBIA.

Mr. Gandier, in accordance with the notice of motion given at a previous sederunt, moved that that part of the Home Mission Committee's report, dealing with salaries of missionaries in the Synod of British Columbia, be reconsidered. The motion was seconded by Mr. C. McKillop and carried.

He then moved, seconded by Mr. J. Chisholm :

That the General Assembly substitute the following scale of salaries for the one recommended by the Home Mission Committee for ordained missionaries in the Synod of British Columbia, with the understanding that the expenditure in that Synod, during the current year, shall not exceed the sum voted at the recent meeting of the Home Mission Committee, namely, twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000.00) :

Where neither horse nor house is required.....	Seven hundred and fifty dollars	(\$750.00).
Where horse but not house is required.....	Eight hundred dollars	(\$800.00).
Where house but not horse is required.....	Eight hundred and twenty-five dollars	(\$825.00).
Where both horse and house are required.....	Eight hundred and seventy-five dollars	(\$875.00).

REPORT ON STATISTICS.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on Statistics, which was given in by Dr. Torrance, *Convener*, and which, being printed and in the hands of members, he referred to in addressing the Assembly thereanent. He moved the reception and adoption of the Report.

The motion was seconded by Mr. L. H. Jordan and agreed to.

AIDS FOR SOCIAL WORSHIP.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on Aids for Social Worship, which was given in and read by Principal Grant, the *Convener* of the Committee being in the Chair. He moved the reception of the report and the consideration of its recommendation. The motion was seconded and agreed to.

Principal Grant moved the adoption of the first recommendation of the Report. The motion was seconded and agreed to, and on motion, duly seconded, the Report as a whole as amended was adopted.

UNIFORMITY IN PUBLIC WORSHIP.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on Uniformity in Public Worship, which was given in and read by Dr. James Ross, *Convener*. He explained that it was merely a report of progress. He moved the reception of the Report. The motion was seconded and agreed to.

At this point it was agreed to read the Overture of Mr. Angus McKay regarding Worship, and the memorial of certain members of the Church at Starbuck, Manitoba, regarding the use of a Liturgy.

Mr. McKay was heard in support of the Overture and Memorial.

Dr. Ross moved, seconded by Mr. J. A. Macdonald, that the Overture lie on the table. The motion was carried.

It was moved by Dr. Laing, seconded by Mr. J. Hay, —

That the memorial from Starbuck also lie on the table.

The motion was adopted.

The Assembly resumed consideration of the Report of the Committee on Uniformity of Worship, when Dr. Ross moved the consideration of the recommendations of the report *seriatim*. The motion was seconded and agreed to.

They were amended and agreed to, and on motion of Dr. Ross, duly seconded, the Report was adopted as a whole. It is as follows :

Your Committee would make the following recommendations :

1. That the Assembly re-appoint the Committee and renew the instructions of last year, *viz.*, that they be directed to continue their labors in the preparation of a Directory for Public Worship, and report to next Assembly.

2. That, in view of the general desire to have a brief manual of Family Prayers, which may be recommended by ministers and others to those who through lack of early training or constitutional limitations, deem themselves incompetent to begin *extempore* prayer in their households, this Committee be instructed to prepare such a book and submit a draft of it to next Assembly, it being understood that this is to be done without cost to the Assembly.

Dr. Ross also moved the addition of the following names to the Committee :

Dr. Laing, Dr. Herridge, Dr. Johnston, Mr. C. W. Gordon, Dr. J. B. Fraser, Principal Grant, Mr. R. E. Knowles, Mr. John A. Logan, Mr. T. F. Fotheringham, *Ministers*; and Messrs. James B. Halkett and William Mortimer Clark, *Elders*.

The motion was seconded and agreed to.

The Assembly adjourned, to meet in this place this evening, at a quarter to eight o'clock, whereof public intimation having been given, this sederunt was closed with the benediction by the Moderator.

TWENTIETH SEDERUNT.

At the same place, on the same day, at a quarter to eight o'clock in the evening :

The General Assembly met, as per adjournment, and was constituted with devotional exercises, Dr. R. Campbell leading in prayer, at the request of the Moderator.

The minutes of last sederunt were read and approved.

COMMITTEE ON REVISING MANUAL.

Dr. Moore moved the reappointment of the Committee to consult with Sir Sandford Fleming regarding the manual of "Short Sunday Services for Travellers," with the addition of the name of Dr. Herridge—Dr. Herridge to be Convener of the Committee.

The motion was seconded and adopted.

REPORT OF REMITS.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on Remits, which was given in by Mr. L. H. Jordan, *Convener*, who moved its reception, and the consideration of its several items. The motion was seconded and agreed to.

I. Remit *re* Synodical Home Mission Committee.

The returns regarding this Remit show that nineteen Presbyteries approve of it, nine disapprove, and eight express no opinion.

It was moved by Dr. Warden, seconded and agreed,—That no further action be taken in the matter.

II. Remit *re* examination of students for license.

The returns regarding this Remit show that twenty-seven Presbyteries approve of it, six disapprove, and six express no opinion.

It was moved, seconded and agreed:—

To approve of the Remit, and appoint a Committee to whom the various schemes suggested by Presbyteries shall be remitted, to frame from among them a scheme, to report to next Assembly.

The following were appointed said Committee:—Mr. L. H. Jordan, *Convener*; Dr. Moore, Dr. Lyle, Dr. A. B. McKay, Mr. W. G. Wallace, Mr. G. Colborne Heine, Mr. Roderick McKay, Mr. A. H. Scott, *Ministers*; Messrs. J. A. Paterson, George Ruth-erford and J. A. Macdonald, *Elders*.

III. Remit *re* Constitution of Assembly and expenses of Commissioners.

The returns to this Remit show:—

(a) Regarding the matter of reduction in the number of Commissioners, that thirty-one Presbyteries approve of the reduction to one-sixth, eleven disapprove, and two express no opinion;

(b) Regarding the matter of paying travelling expenses of Commissioners, nineteen approve of it, twelve disapprove, while eleven express no opinion.

It was resolved to let the returns to this Remit lie on the table, to be dealt with by next Assembly.

IV. Remit *re* Supply of Vacancies.

The returns to this Remit show:—

That thirteen Presbyteries approve of it, three approve of it in part, while eight disapprove.

It was resolved that no action be taken thereon.

On motion of Mr. L. H. Jordan, duly seconded, the Report was adopted.

INCORPORATION OF THE CHURCH.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on Legislation, which was given in by Dr. Warden, and which being printed and in the hands of members, he referred to in his remarks to the House.

He moved the reception and adoption of the Report. The motion was seconded and agreed to. He moved, further, and it was duly seconded and carried :

That the following Committee on Legislation be appointed : —

OVERTURE RE EXECUTIVE FOR THE WHOLE CHURCH.

There was presented and read an Overture from the Presbytery of Ottawa, which had been transmitted by the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa with its endorsement, craving the Assembly to take into consideration the need there is for some Executive authority, during the intervals of Assembly. Dr. Moore was heard in support of the Overture, and moved that it be received, and that a Committee be appointed to consider it and report to next General Assembly.

The motion was seconded by Dr. R. Campbell, and adopted.

The following were named such Committee by the Moderator, the nomination being approved by the Assembly, namely : Dr. Moore, *Convener*, Dr. Laing, Dr. R. Torrance, Dr. Armstrong, Mr. J. H. Ratcliffe, Dr. R. Campbell (Clerk) and Dr. Herridge.

REPORT ON STATISTICAL FORMS.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on Statistical Forms, which was given in by Mr. L. H. Jordan, *Convener*, and which, being printed and in the hands of members, he referred to in his remarks thereon. He moved the reception of the Report and the consideration of its recommendations. The motion was seconded and agreed to.

After consideration, the recommendations, with slight alterations were adopted, on motion of Mr. Jordan, duly seconded.

REPORT ON THE PRESBYTERIAN RECORD.

The Assembly called for the Report on The Record, which was given in by Dr. Warden, *Convener*, and which, being printed and in the hands of members, he referred to in addressing the House.

He moved the reception of the Report. The motion was seconded and agreed to.

Rev. E. Scott moved as follows, seconded by Dr. Robertson :

That the Assembly receive and adopt the Report of the Record Committee, direct that so far as is possible, congregations have the Presbyterian Record, the organ of our Church, placed in every family, and that those who have special knowledge of the different schemes of work, Conveners, Secretaries and Missionaries, home and foreign, use, as far as possible, this, our own medium, with its wide circulation, in giving information to the Church concerning their work.

The Assembly expresses its satisfaction at the circulation and finances of the Sabbath School Helps for 1898.

With regard to the Children's Record and the desirability of increasing the supply of papers for the young, the Assembly authorizes the Record Committee and the Committee on the Publication of the Sabbath School Helps to confer and to take such steps as may seem best fitted to the attainment of that end.

REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEES.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Finance Committees :—

Eastern Section.

The Report from the Eastern Section was given in by Mr. J. S. Sutherland. It being printed and in the hands of members, he merely called attention to it, and moved that it be received and adopted.

The motion was seconded by Mr. J. M. Robinson, and agreed to.

Western Section.

The Report of the Western Section was given in by Dr. Warden, *Convener*. It being printed and in the hands of members, he contented himself with merely calling attention to it, and moved that it be received and its recommendations adopted. The motion was seconded and agreed to.

OVERTURE re POWERS OF SYNODS.

There was presented and read an Overture from the Synod of Toronto and Kingston, defined by a committee of the Assembly of eighteen hundred and ninety-seven. Mr. W. T. Wilkins was heard in support of the Overture, and moved that it be received and sent down to Presbyteries in terms of the Barrier Act.

The motion was seconded and carried.

MINISTERS' WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUNDS.

The Assembly called for the Reports of the Committees on the Ministers' Widows' and Orphans' Funds of the Church.

Eastern Section.

The Report for the Eastern Section was given in by Mr. J. W. Falconer, and being printed and in the hands of members, he referred to it in presenting it. He moved, seconded by Mr. George Miller, the reception and adoption of the Report. The motion was carried.

CHURCH OF SCOTLAND SECTION.

The Report for this Section was given in by Dr. R. Campbell, Chairman of the Board, and being printed and in the hands of members, he contented himself with merely calling attention to it. He concluded with moving the reception and adoption of the report.

The motion was seconded and agreed to.

Western Section.

The Report for this Section was given in by Dr. Warden, and seeing that it was printed and in the hands of members, he merely called attention to it. He moved the reception and adoption of the report. The motion was seconded by Mr. A. H. Scott and carried.

THE CASE OF MRS. SIMON M'DONALD.

Mr. J. W. Macmillan called attention to the fact that the Committee of the Western Section had declined to make a grant to Mrs. Simon McDonald, because her husband in his lifetime had not paid his rates to the Fund, and moved, seconded by Dr. D. L. McCrae:

That the Assembly instruct the Committee on the Widows' and Orphans' Fund (Western Section) to add to the list of annuitants the name of Mrs. Simon McDonald, on condition that all past dues with interest be paid in to the Fund.

The motion, on being put to the vote, was lost.

FOREIGN MISSION COMMITTEE ON B.C. OVERTURE.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Foreign Mission Committee on the Overture of the Synod of British Columbia, presented to last Assembly, and sent to that Committee for consideration and report, which was read by Dr. Warden, on behalf of the Foreign Mission Committee. On motion, duly seconded, it was agreed to receive the report and consider its recommendations.

Dr. Moore moved that the recommendation of the Committee be adopted. The motion was seconded and agreed to.

The following is the recommendation :

Recognizing fully the importance to the success of the work among the Chinese and Indians that it should have the hearty sympathy and co-operation of the Presbyteries within whose bounds it is conducted, and that the Foreign Mission Committee should not be deprived of the wisdom and local knowledge of the Presbyteries in the conduct of their work, recommend the brethren within the Synod of British Columbia to co-operate with the Foreign Mission Committee, and recommend the Foreign Mission Committee to continue to confer with the Synod's Committee as occasion arises, on matters pertaining to the work within their bounds, as they have been accustomed to do, whilst still retaining the control and responsibility of the work in their own hands.

OVERTURE *re* CLERKS OF ASSEMBLY.

There was presented and read an Overture from the Presbytery of Toronto, craving the Assembly to make the Clerks of Assembly permanent constituent members thereof. Mr. L. H. Jordan was heard in support of the Overture.

It was moved, seconded and agreed :

That the Overture lie on the table, to be considered at next Assembly.

OVERTURE ON EDUCATION OF INDIANS.

There was presented and read an overture from the Synod of British Columbia regarding the education of the Indians of the North-West.

Dr. J. Campbell was heard in support of the Overture.

It was moved, seconded and agreed :

That the Overture be remitted to the Foreign Mission Committee, with instructions to take such steps as they may deem best, to secure the prayer of the Overture.

OVERTURE *re* EXPENSES OF COMMISSIONERS.

There was presented and read an Overture from the Synod of British Columbia, regarding the expenses of Commissioners to the General Assembly. It was agreed to receive the Overture. Dr. J. Campbell was heard in support of the Overture, and on motion, duly seconded, it was resolved to lay it on the table, with the understanding that it be taken up by next General Assembly, along with the returns to the Remit on the same subject.

MONTREAL WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

There was read an extract minute of the Presbytery of Montreal, forwarding an abstract of the annual report of the Montreal Woman's Missionary Society, for submission to the Assembly.

On motion of Dr. Moore, —

It was agreed to record the appreciation of the Assembly of the zeal and energy with which the Woman's Missionary Society of Montreal is prosecuting its work ; and the Assembly prays that continued prosperity may attend the Society in all its operations.

OVERTURE *re* SERIES OF CHILDREN'S PAPERS.

There was presented and read an Overture from the Synod of British Columbia, advocating the publication, under authority of the Assembly, of a series of children's papers. In view of the report made to this Assembly by the Committee on Sabbath School Periodicals, the promoters of the Overture agreed to withdraw it.

SABBATH SCHOOL LIABILITIES.

There was brought to the notice of the Assembly that there were certain liabilities incurred by the Sabbath School Committee which would require to be met. The following were appointed a Committee to ascertain the precise amount of these liabilities and to collect the money necessary to pay them :—Mr. John Young, *Convener*, [Dr. M. Fraser and Mr. John Hay.

ECUMENICAL CONFERENCE.

There was read a communication from Dr. Judson Smith, Chairman of the General Committee on an Ecumenical Conference on Foreign Missions, to be held in New York in the year Nineteen hundred, inviting the Assembly to appoint two or more delegates to attend it.

On motion of Dr. Warden, duly seconded, the letter was referred to the Foreign Mission Committee for consideration and action.

ALLIANCE OF REFORMED CHURCHES.

There was read a communication, signed by the Chairman and Secretary of the Western Section of the Alliance of Reformed Churches, appointing Dr. Warden to present the greetings of the Alliance to the Assembly.

Having heard Dr. Warden, it was moved, seconded and agreed,—

That the Assembly cordially reciprocate the good wishes of the Alliance, and joins the Council of the Alliance in its expression of interest in the Peace Conference at present in session at the Hague, and its hope that great good will result from it.

The Clerk was instructed to furnish commissions to alternates, in case the delegates to the meeting of the Alliance at Washington, appointed at last General Assembly, are unable to attend, so as to make the number up to twenty-four, and, when elders are unable to go, to appoint ministers in their stead.

GREETING OF REFORMED CHURCH.

There was read a communication from the Reformed Church in America, sending greetings to this Church, and wishing it all success in its work; and the Clerk was instructed to acknowledge receipt thereof, and return the expression of good will.

STATED COLLECTIONS.

The Assembly ordered that the Stated Collections for the Schemes of the Church, in congregations in which there are no Missionary Associations, be made as follows :

1. French Evangelization, on the fourth Sabbath of July.
2. Home Missions, on the fourth Sabbath of August.
3. Colleges, on the fourth Sabbath of September.
4. Ministers', Widows' and Orphans' Fund, on the third Sabbath of October.
5. Assembly Fund, on the third Sabbath of November.
6. Manitoba College, on the third Sabbath of December.
7. Augmentation Fund, on the third Sabbath of January, 1900.
8. Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund, on the third Sabbath of February, 1900.
9. Foreign Missions, on the second Sabbath of March, 1900.

Ordered also, that all congregations and Mission Stations be enjoined to contribute to the Schemes of the Church.

Further, that contributions be sent to the Treasurer of the Church as soon as possible after the collections are made.

OVERTURE *re* MISSION TO LEPERS.

There was presented and read an Overture signed by Mr. John Neil, Principal Caverly and Dr. Fletcher, asking the Assembly to give countenance to the association known as "Mission to Lepers in India and the East," with its Canadian branches, in their endeavor to enlist the interest of the Dominion Government in the lepers living in Canada.

Dr. Moore moved that the Overture be referred to the Foreign Mission Committee. The motion was seconded and agreed to.

The Moderator then asked the Assembly to join in singing the 122nd Psalm, verses six to nine, which having been sung, he said :

In the name of the Lord Jesus Christ, only King and Head of the Church, and by the authority of this Assembly, I now dissolve this Assembly, and order another General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, to meet in the City of Halifax, and within St. Matthew's Church there, at half-past seven o'clock in the evening on the second Wednesday in June in the year of our Lord One thousand nine hundred.

The Moderator then closed the Session with the apostolic benediction.

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REPORT OF THE HOME MISSION COMMITTEE, WESTERN SECTION, 1898-99.

To the Venerable the General Assembly:

Since the union of the Churches in 1875, every Home Mission report presented to the General Assembly was prepared by the Rev. Dr. Cochrane, who for twenty-eight years occupied the position of Convener of your Committee. In October last, Dr. Cochrane presided with his usual ability and vigor at the regular meeting of the Executive. A fortnight later "He was not, for God took him."

At the meeting of the Committee in March, loving testimony was borne to Dr. Cochrane's character and service, and the following minute adopted:

"The Home Mission Committee would hereby place upon record its sense of the loss sustained in the death of the Rev. Wm. Cochrane, D.D., for twenty-eight years its honored Convener.

"During all those years his interest never flagged and his energy never tired. Advancing years neither dulled the edge of his enthusiasm nor weakened his courage in facing an ever-enlarging field for work. The success which has attended our work of Church extension owed not a little to his large outlook, his wise guidance and his hopeful advocacy of the claims of the newer districts. As its head, he won, and kept to the end, the love and confidence of the members of the Committee. By his death we have lost a co-laborer beloved, the Home Mission fields and missionaries a sympathetic friend, and the whole Church an enthusiastic advocate, her Home Mission work one whose eloquent appeals bore fruit not only at home, but awakened interest and called forth help from the sister churches in the Motherland.

"It was characteristic of his whole life that his last public work should be that of planning enlarged spiritual help to the miners in the mountains. May his removal in the very midst of his efforts for more effective work in the distant parts of our land be an incentive, not only to every member of the Home Mission Committee, but also to every member of our Church.

"The Committee tenders its heartfelt sympathy to Mrs. Cochrane and the family in the sore affliction which has befallen them and commends them to 'The Father of mercies and the God of all comfort, who comforteth us in all our affliction.'"

It seems appropriate, in connection with the death of Dr. Cochrane, that your Committee should briefly review the state of the Home Mission work of the Church during the twenty-eight years in which it was guided by him. As the data is not sufficiently definite for the years prior to 1875, the comparison is made from that year—the year of the union of the Churches. There were then twenty-two Presbyteries in the Western Section of the Church, twenty-one of which were in the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec, and one west of Lake Superior. There were then under the care of the Committee 132 mission fields, including 267 preaching stations, with 127 missionaries, as also 86 supplemented congregations. The total revenue of the Fund in the year 1875-76, including not only Home Mission work but also the work of Augmentation, was \$24,518.

Now there are 41 Presbyteries in the Western Section of the Church—27 in the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec, and 14 west of Lake Superior. The number of mission fields at present reported is 384, with 1,116 preaching stations, and 468 missionaries, and the number of augmented congregations in the Western Section of the Church is 146. The revenue last year for both departments of the work amounted to \$116,841, viz., \$91,683 for Home Mission work proper, and \$25,158 for Augmentation. The number of families connected with the missions and augmented congregations in 1875 was 7,243, now it exceeds 20,400.

This statement, however, gives but a faint idea of the progress made in Home

Mission work during these twenty-four years. Of the 132 mission fields that were connected with the Church in 1875, 59 have become self-supporting congregations, two have been merged into other fields, 34 have been raised to the status of augmented charges, 35 are still on the mission list, and two have ceased to exist.

Since 1875, 590 new mission fields have been organized. Of this number 93 have been merged into others; 297 are still on the mission list; 58 have been raised to the status of augmented congregations; and 142 have become self-supporting congregations, so that there are to-day 201 self-supporting congregations and 92 augmented charges, which in 1875 were either on the mission list or had no existence. In other words, during these twenty-four years the Home Mission Committee has fostered and helped to self-support 201 congregations and raised to the status of augmented charges 92 mission fields,—all of whom are in their turn giving liberal support, not only to the Home Mission work of the Church but to every department of its work.

REVIEW OF LAST YEAR'S WORK.

Your Committee are gratified in being able to report that the progress made during the past year has been most encouraging, as will be seen from the reports of the several Presbyteries, (1) in the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec, (2) in North-Western Canada and (3) in the Yukon (Klondike) District.

ONTARIO AND QUEBEC PROVINCES.

Another year of quiet steady work has been accomplished in the Quebec Home Mission fields of the Presbytery of Quebec, and while many of our missionaries labor under certain disadvantages in this Province, it is very encouraging to note the hopeful tone of the reports received from the brethren in these outposts. All the Stations in the Presbytery have been fully supplied during the year, and the work is now well consolidated. A larger number of fields than usual have been under the supervision of ordained men with excellent results, and the general outlook is brighter to-day than for some years past. Divine services have been on the whole well and regularly attended, and many have been admitted to the Church on profession of faith.

We have eleven groups of missions comprising some twenty-six stations. To work these during the past year we have had a staff of seven ordained men, one approved catechist, and three students, located as follows:—Valcartier, etc.—Rev. C. E. Dobbs. The people turn out in goodly numbers to all the services, many have professed their faith in Christ. Our missionary now occupies a new manse free of debt. Marlow and Kennebec.—Rev. John Turnbull. Services much appreciated. Liberal to Schemes of Church. Metis, etc.—Rev. John M. Callan. Interior of church building renovated and manse made more comfortable. People in good heart. Lake Megantic.—Rev. G. F. Kinnear. A grateful people for having an ordained missionary in their midst, there is growth here. New Rockland.—Rev. D. Pugh. This mission was organized a few years ago to minister to some twenty-five or thirty Welsh families, giving them the Gospel in their own tongue. Now all speak English and purpose uniting with the neighboring congregation of Kingsbury. Grande Mere.—Rev. Geo. Campbell. A new town on the line of the Great Northern Railway. Large pulp and paper mill recently erected. Outlook hopeful. Chicoutimi.—Rev. J. L. Campbell. Important outpost. Church and day school doing well. Scotstown, etc.—Rev. E. G. Walker. Difficulties being overcome and prospects encouraging. Services at Gould railway station increasing in interest and attendance. Massawippi, etc.—Mr. E. L. Pidgeon. Work encouraging. North Coaticook station growing. Hope to have an

ordained man next year. Portneuf, etc.—Mr. W. O. Rothney. Just holding our own, which means much here. Ditchfield, etc.—Mr. M. Byron. Mixed field. Services conducted in French and English. Reports very encouraging, signs of earnest Christian life. Thetford Mines.—On the line of the Quebec Central Railway, half way between Quebec and Sherbrooke. A new mission opened this spring with very favorable prospects. Expended by congregations direct to mission fields within the bounds of the Presbytery, \$300.

Two new mission fields have been organized this year. Kensington **Montreal** has been separated from Montreal West for the present and connected with Verdun, an entirely new station in a new and growing portion of the city. A building to serve as Church and Sabbath School room has been erected here at a cost of about \$1,000, most of which has been contributed. The other new field consists of St. Anne's and Valois, to which a student has been sent. Occasional services have been held here during the summer but it is now proposed to give them continuous supply. The people of Montreal Annex are erecting a new church this summer to cost about \$2,000, of which \$1,200 has been subscribed. The older fields remain in very much the same condition. The tide of emigration westward is telling upon the ability of some fields to support ordinances. Although, in a number of instances, the missionary has succeeded in stimulating the liberality of the people in a commendable degree, yet the increase has been more than offset by the amounts lost through withdrawals. An ordained missionary has once more been appointed over Farnham, which was very necessary as it is our only field in several counties. The following congregations have expended the sums opposite their names on the mission fields within the bounds or on other missions of their own, in addition to their regular contributions for Home Mission work:

There are now two mission fields under care of Home Mission Committee, viz., (1) E. Lancaster, and (2) Hephzibah, Williamstown. Besides these, Vankleek Hill congregation carries on and supports work at The Ridge, etc. At E. Lancaster the year now closed has been most encouraging. The new church at Curry Hill was opened free of debt. Sheds for horses have also been built there and all expenses were met by the people. Hephzibah Church, Williamstown, was formerly connected with Burns Church, Martintown, thus constituting a united charge. At the urgent request of Hephzibah, the Presbytery separated it from Martintown, and thereafter made it a mission station, securing for two years from October 1, 1898, the appointment of Rev. Kenneth McDonald as ordained missionary. The Ridge, etc., is worked by student missionary under oversight of the Session of Vankleek Hill congregation, and has been a most encouraging field.

The mission fields of this Presbytery are many of them in the midst of mixed populations—were it not for the support of the Home Mission funds they must perish. As it is they are centres of light and liberty, and not only maintain the spiritual life among our own people but exert a missionary influence upon the French Roman Catholics. We have at present six ordained missionaries, and at least one field ready to come upon the Augmented list.

By the formation of the North Bay Presbytery, our mission field has been somewhat curtailed. We have still, however, a large field remaining, which has been operated with energy and a fair measure of success during the year. Dalhousie, etc., has been advanced to the Augmentation status. Rockliffe, etc.—Never very strong in its Protestant citizenship; has been so much reduced that it has been concluded to operate it along

with Chalk River for the present. Chalk River, etc.—This field also has suffered by the removal of a number of our families. An ordained missionary is maintained here, and the people themselves do their part most liberally to maintain ordinances amongst themselves, as also contributing to the schemes of the Church. At Point Alexander Station there was a debt of \$44 on the church, which the Presbytery has paid, thus leaving the people free-handed. This is a very wide field and most difficult to overtake. Alice, etc.—There is very little opportunity for growth here. The people are putting forth an effort to increase their contributions so that the missionary, with the Home Mission grant, may receive a salary of \$600 and a manse. Stafford, etc.—This field has made progress to such an extent that the Presbytery, with the approval of the Home Mission Committee, has sent in an ordained man, and we hope that even greater progress may be made towards self-support. There are three churches in the field but no manse. Killaloe, etc.—Is still in a primitive state, but we hope in time to establish a cause here. Calabogie, etc.—Has suffered in a measure by the termination, to a large extent, of the lumbering business, and yet the people maintain their contributions with commendable faithfulness. Bathurst, etc.—Here the work under an ordained man has become consolidated and well organized. They have good churches, and the Bathurst section is putting forth an effort to clear theirs of debt this season, when it is hoped the Home Mission grant may be somewhat reduced.

Stone's Corners, North Augusta and Fairfield—On this field excellent Brockville work was done by Mr. Kannaione during the summer. The attendance at services increased and there was manifested a spirit of greater interest and heartiness in the work. During the winter months the field was very fully supplied by students of Queen's College. Prospects are brightening. Morton, Lyndhurst and Ellisville—This field is in a prosperous condition. The people are working harmoniously. A very comfortable little brick church was dedicated at Lyndhurst shortly after New Year. It is a credit to the place, and there is but a small debt remaining on it. The various stations did nobly in both contributions and work, and were helped by several congregations in the Presbytery. It is thought that this church building will consolidate the cause there and greatly increase the interest. It is the desire of the field to have, as soon as possible, an ordained missionary settled there.

We have in all 17 mission fields in this Presbytery. Two have only one preaching station each; five have two each; eight have three; one has four; and one has six. All told, we have 46 preaching stations in our mission group. There are 24 churches, 2 of them Union churches. Services are held where we have no churches in school houses or halls. Seven fields are under the care of ordained men, who are doing excellent work. These fields are greatly benefitted by having services all the year round, and having among them men who can discharge all the duties of the ministerial office. Consecow, etc.—Has been for two years under the charge of Dr. Begg, but he, having accepted in January (1899) a call to a congregation in New York State, the people have asked to return to student supply, as they cannot raise the money needed for an ordained man. L'Amable—Has been for two years or more under student supply, but in January of this year the Rev. W. A. Stewart, M.A., was appointed ordained missionary for two years, the field promising \$300 and a manse. St. John's, Pittsburg—Has been for many years on the Augmentation list, but when the Rev. J. Gallaher, their late pastor, resigned, they asked to be put upon the Home Mission list. This was done, and the Rev. J. A. McDonald was placed there for two years. There is good prospect of improvement in the condition of this congregation. Ten fields are under the care of student missionaries, mostly for the summer months only. Some of our fields have had continuous supply. Deseronto West End Mission—Has always had continuous supply, and other fields when we could secure a student for the winter months. Demorestville is our only self-sustaining field, but all contribute with considerable liberality. It is not easy, however to find out just how much is given, as the people have irregular methods of raising money. But a good deal must be raised, as we seldom hear of unpaid arrears. Four Societies of Christian Endeavor are reported, and 36 Sunday Schools, most of which are kept open throughout the year. A new church was built in 1898 at Coe Hill, and full provision made for the cost of it. Another was opened last August on the Indian Reserve near Deseronto, costing over \$800 and not a dollar of debt on it. A new church has also been opened on one of the Marmora fields, and steps are now being taken to erect a church in Marmora village where our people have worshipped in a hall. The Marmora field has been for two years under the care of Rev. Geo. L. Johnston,

M.A., but he left in January of this year and is now settled in North Bay. Since Mr. Johnston left it has been under the care of a student of Knox. They expect to have an ordained man again in September. During the winter months supply was given to fields within reach by the Queen's Students' Missionary Association, and the more distant fields were supplied for three Sundays during the Christmas holidays by the same society. Each field is visited once a year at least by some member of the Presbytery, when the Sacraments are dispensed. As to moneys expended by congregations direct to mission fields, it may be mentioned that most of the money expended in the erection of the church on the Indian Reserve was raised within the bounds of the Presbytery. The people of Coe Hill were also assisted with their church, the people for whom these buildings were erected not being able to pay for them without help from without.

Chandos and Burleigh—This field has been supplied during the whole Peterborough year. The congregation at Clydesdale is strong, but Apsley has suffered by the removal of several families. Mr. Sharp has done excellent work during the winter months. Harvey—Rev. R. McKnight has been in charge of this field during the past year. A new station has been taken up in Cavendish where there has never been a Missionary, and it is proposed to prosecute this work vigorously during the summer months. It is possible that we may be able to purchase the Methodist Church at Taylor's Settlement, in which case we shall have much better facilities for carrying on the work there. Several of the congregations in this Presbytery have contributed toward the reduction of the debt on the Lakehurst Church.

There are no Mission Stations within the bounds of this Whitby Presbytery and all of the regular charges are self-supporting, with the exception of one, Ashburn and Utica, which receives aid from the Augmentation Fund.

There are three Mission fields in this Presbytery, two of whom have Lindsay made good progress during the past year. Sebright and Uphill, in charge successively of Mr. J. J. Hastie and Mr. P. W. Currie, has paid off all arrears, opened two new Stations, and faces the future more buoyantly than had been dreamed possible two years ago. In Minden and Haliburton a vast and unwieldy parish has been efficiently worked by Rev. Jacob Steele, B.D. This field is applying to be raised to the status of an augmented charge. The third field, Coboconk and Kinmount, has suffered from removals, but has met its payments promptly, and with the increased trade activity in the north country, will no doubt improve.

Work was carried on in the following fields during the past year :

Orangeville Four fields have been regularly supplied in this Presbytery during the year, one of these by means of an ordained Missionary. Full supply has been given for the winter as well as during the summer.

Barrie The Mission field in this Presbytery has been largely reduced by the formation of a new Presbytery, that of North Bay, last July, and there are now only twelve Mission fields within our bounds, all of which have been supplied regularly during the past year, and with encouraging results. In the report of the Rev. A. Findlay, Superintendent of Missions, particulars regarding the work will be found.

North Bay It is not a year since the North Bay Presbytery was organized. It is formed from parts of the Presbyteries of Lanark and Renfrew, Barrie and Algoma. It contains within its bounds the Districts of Parry Sound

and Nipissing and parts of the Districts of Muskoka and Algoma. When the Presbytery was organized it contained three self-sustaining congregations, two aid-receiving congregations, and 25 mission fields. Six of these fields were supplied by ordained missionaries and the other 19 were supplied by students. While all the fields were fully manned during the summer months there was great difficulty in procuring supply for the winter season. Notwithstanding this, all of the fields, with one or two exceptions, were supplied during the greater part of the winter, and most of them during all the winter. All the missionaries carried on their work with commendable zeal and energy. It was made very laborious and trying by the severity of the past winter. It is pleasing to note that in several fields considerable progress has been made, while in other fields, owing to the character of the country, growth is not possible, even though equally good work has been done in them. The changes which have taken place in the following fields are worthy of note. Byng Inlet has risen with a bound from a mission field to a self-sustaining congregation. This is mainly due to the Holland Emery Lumber Company, who have large sawmills at this point. They are mindful of their employees and have contributed liberally to the maintenance of Gospel ordinances among them. Rev. Thos. Davidson has been called and will be inducted into the charge at an early date. Burk's Falls has also taken a step forward, having become an augmented charge. Rev. R. J. Sturgeon has been called and inducted. He is already making his influence felt. The people are hopeful and the prospects for the future are bright. Magnetewan became vacant by the translation of Mr. Davidson to Byng Inlet. A rearrangement of the stations connected with this field and the Dunchurch field was then effected, by which an ordained missionary, with the assistance of a student, is able to supply both fields. This will mean a considerable saving of the funds, and it is confidently expected that the whole district will be more thoroughly worked than it could be hitherto. The field is fortunate in having Rev. J. Becket as ordained missionary. Sundridge has again asked for an ordained missionary, and Rev. D. Johnston has been appointed. There is good reason to expect that under Mr. Johnston's care this field will more than hold its own and in the near future be transferred to the list of augmented charges. Temiscamingue is a new but very important district which is fast being opened up. Great numbers of settlers are moving into it and taking up land. Rev. F. E. Pitts was ordained last October and appointed missionary in the district. He is doing grand pioneer work. Sprucedale, owing to removal of families to the North-West and the intrusion of other Churches, has not been able to continue the support of an ordained missionary and has asked for student supply. Sturgeon Falls is likely to become an important manufacturing place, and it is hoped that the people here will soon ask for an ordained missionary. Depot Harbor—the terminus of the Canada Atlantic Railway—though only two years old is already a great shipping port. Here also it is expected that the services of an ordained missionary will soon be needed. No changes of note have taken place in the other fields of the Presbytery. In all of them good and deserving work has been done by the missionaries.

In the mission work of the Presbytery there is little change to report
Owen Sound Sheds have been erected in the Lion's Head field, churches have been improved and the grant has been reduced by \$26. We look for an annual reduction. The grant has also been reduced by a like amount in Crawford and Williamsford, and the Presbytery hopes for a gradual reduction. Considerable improvement has been made on the buildings in the Indian Peninsula. The Young People's Societies during the past year have more than met their promise to pay the students' grant, and it is expected that at their annual meeting they will undertake to contribute a sufficient amount to warrant the Presbytery in appointing an ordained missionary.

Mildmay and Ayton had the services of the Rev. John Davidson up to January 1st, but owing to removal from Mildmay the field is again supplied for the summer by a student. Cedarville and Esplin has now Rev. N. A. McDonald, B. A., who is appointed to that field for two years. The Esplin congregation lost their church by fire, but with commendable zeal and liberality another was soon erected which was opened on January 15th, and the missionary was ordained in it on the following day. Bethel and E. Normandy are now removed from the list of mission stations and erected into a pastoral charge. The Rev. J. Gray Reid was ordained and inducted into said charge on December 8, 1898. There are nineteen Christian

Endeavor Societies and three Young People's Societies in the Presbytery, and they contributed this year to the schemes \$230.

In the Presbytery of Guelph there are the following Mission Stations :
Guelph Eden Mills ; Gale Church, Elmira ; Knox Church, Dracon and Metz, and Livingston Church, Baden. Of these the first two are supplied, and

have been for a number of years, in connection with settled charges, the minister at Rockwood looking after the interests of the former, and Mr. Hamilton, of Chalmers' Church, Winterbourne, after the latter. Knox Church, Dracon and Metz, lie in an interesting district, and it was anticipated when they were formed that they would soon attain the status of a regular charge, but this anticipation has not been fulfilled, and they are still on the list of Missions. Their supply is by students from Knox College during the winter, and by one resident among them during the summer. They contribute in full for supply received. Knox Church, Dracon has a comfortable church edifice, but such has not yet been provided for Metz. Livingston Church, Baden, a village on the main line west of the Grand Trunk Railway, only a few miles from Berlin, was organized under the auspices of the Paris Presbytery, but being locally in the bounds of the Presbytery of Guelph, it was, at the request of the former, taken over by the latter and is supplied under their care. A very neat church has been built, which is altogether free from debt. Hitherto services have been conducted during the summer months by students, but this summer it is supplied by a retired minister. It receives a grant of \$2 per Sabbath from the Home Mission Committee. Efforts have been made to find another station with which to connect it, that there might be less demand upon the funds of the Church, but so far these have been unavailing.

The Rev. A. Findlay, Superintendent of Missions for Algoma, etc., will report us to the work generally in our bounds, but there is one thing which the Presbytery desires strongly to emphasize as being essential to the more successful working of the field, and that is the employment of a larger number of ordained men who will remain for a term of years and give continuous supply. Experience on many of our fields has proved that the frequent changing of missionaries is not a satisfactory method of supply and often does little or nothing to advance the cause. When a student supplies only for the summer, and is followed by a catechist, who supplies only for the winter, and this goes on perhaps for years, it is found as a rule, that however excellent the men are, they are too short a time on the field to do much to advance the growth of the Church. And this evil is in many instances further aggravated by the fact that no missionary at all can be had for the winter. In this Presbytery during the winter just ended, four important fields, comprising fifteen preaching stations, had to be left without missionaries. During last summer they had been well supplied by students, but for the winter neither catechist nor student nor ordained minister could be found for any of them. Some of the missionaries stationed near these fields did indeed, by doing extra work, give what supply they could, but it was far from being all that was needed. Some of the more remote stations did not have a service during the whole winter. On fields that are served in this way it is difficult to make progress. It is very hard in many such cases for the Presbyterian Church even to hold her own, especially when on the same fields, or near them, other denominations have ministers giving regular supply all the year round. The fact, too, that students and catechists of the Presbyterian Church are not authorized to administer ordinances, is found on many remote and scattered fields to be a serious drawback to success, and forms another plea for the employment of ordained ministers in larger numbers. If as a Church we are to hold our own on fields which we now occupy, if we are to go forward and not backward with our Home Mission work, we must have more ordained men on our fields, even if the burden should be greater on the Fund. The need exists, and when the needs are sufficiently known the necessary funds will doubtless come.

In carrying on the work in these northern regions during the past winter, greater difficulties have been experienced than for many years past. Severely cold weather, accompanied with heavy storms, and these falling most frequently on Sabbath, have done much to interrupt the work. As a consequence sickness to a greater extent than in former years has been experienced by the missionaries on the field, the result of exposure to the severity of the weather. Roads blocked so that travel upon them was an impossibility, preventing both missionary and people from meeting for worship, have been among the results experienced. Yet notwithstanding these serious drawbacks, the work has been

carried on with considerable vigor, advance being made in nearly every department. The most important event in the early part of the term was the meeting of the Presbytery of North Bay at Mattawa, for the ordination of Mr. F. E. Pitts, and his settlement, as ordained missionary, in Temiscamingue. We learn from letters received from the field from time to time, that the work is progressing very satisfactorily under Mr. Pitts. The two churches which have been erected on this field are practically free from debt. So far they have done well. They require a manse, however, if the work is to be carried on with comfort or satisfaction. Their resources have been exhausted in the work already accomplished in the erection of the churches, so that assistance must be given them, if the manse is to be built. Considering the circumstances of the case, no more deserving cause can well be thought of than this. We have secured an important footing in this new country. Townships await settlers. Nor will they wait long, as every season witnesses an advance in the number of settlers going in to find or make homes for themselves. It is important, surely, that we be prepared to serve those with gospel ordinances who come in, as we have done from the beginning of the settlement. But to do this we must hold what we have already gained. A rented house is not to be had, so that the manse must be provided, in part, at least, or we must step down. The fact that the country is new ought to commend it to the consideration of those more fortunately situated. Work done in these newer regions always tells on the welfare of the future. This district lies in what we proudly speak of, in these days, as New Ontario. Can we do anything better, in the best interests of this important part of our Province, than to see to it that gospel ordinances and gospel influences are enjoyed by those who are our fellow-citizens in these newer regions.

During the past term four settlements have taken place. Mr. T. Davidson at Byng Inlet; Mr. W. J. McBean at Sudbury; Mr. A. Y. Hartley at Tarbutt, and Mr. G. L. Johnston, at North Bay. The first and last mentioned are self-supporting charges, the other two are under Augmentation.

Two resignations have occurred, the late Prof. Macadam from the congregation of North Bay, and the Rev. G. E. Loughheed from the congregation of Webbwood, having been called to another charge.

Forty-five fields, comprising one hundred and forty-eight preaching stations, were supplied during the winter. Some of our fields were left vacant during the entire season because it was impossible to secure supply for them; others, through the extra exertions of neighboring ordained missionaries, received partial supply. This question of winter supply is a larger and more important one than may at first sight be supposed. It will not be satisfactorily settled till the General Assembly takes it up and deals with it in a manner becoming the importance of the subject. To throw away the results of hard labor in our fields during the summer months simply because we have no proper methods of conserving these results, should stir us up to discover how the work may be better done. To pursue the subject no further, working as we are is simply not business.

As to the fields visited during the winter, and the work accomplished, I may note the following:—

In October I dispensed ordinances at Whitney, and arranged the difficulty regarding the church property there, as well as it was possible under the circumstances. Our people there are very desirous of having service as frequently as possible. Once in four weeks does seem somewhat infrequent, though it is the best that can be done under the present condition of affairs. I was very glad to be able to keep up the service, even at this rate, in connection with Algonquin Park.

The territory opened up by the O., A. & P. S. R.R., forms a very important addition to our work in this part of the Presbytery of North Bay. During the coming summer we expect to have service held regularly at every station along this line, with two exceptions, from Madawaska to Depot Harbor, which constitutes the western division of the railroad.

As I had been compelled, through press of business elsewhere on the field, to pass over the fields in the Presbytery of Barrie during the past term, I gave them what attention they required during the early part of this term. In turn the following fields were visited for communion, missionary and general business meetings:—The Kilworthy field, which, for lack of men, was supplied only partially during the term. The Franklin field, including four stations.—This field I required to visit the second time, as, owing to a storm of unusual severity on my first visit, I was unable to reach more than one station. However, during this visit I was able to organize a station at a point known as the Portage, where service had been held for some years, but where they did not seem to have

reached the stage for organization until the present. It was further resolved by the new congregation to proceed, during the coming summer, with the erection of a church building. It is a pleasure to note a decided advance in this field during the past winter. The earnest efforts of Mr. S. McKinney, missionary on this field, have been blessed in the deepening of spiritual life among many of our people, as well as an increased interest taken in the welfare of the Church by the community at large. Eighteen names have been added to the communion roll on this field during the past winter. The Muskoka Falls field, including four stations, was also visited for communion, etc. Two of the stations on this field were allowed to lie dormant during the winter, on account of our inability to supply them. For the summer two fields will be formed, the one to be occupied by Mr. W. B. Hutton, who has been here during the winter, and the other by a student from the Missionary Society of Knox College. The Baysville group was also visited for congregational and missionary meetings. The arrangement come to last year, of uniting Dorset with part of the old Baysville group seems to be working very well. We hope soon to see an ordained missionary on this important field. Mr. McCorkindale, approved catechist, who has been with them during the winter, will remain for the summer also, this being the request of the people so far as heard from.

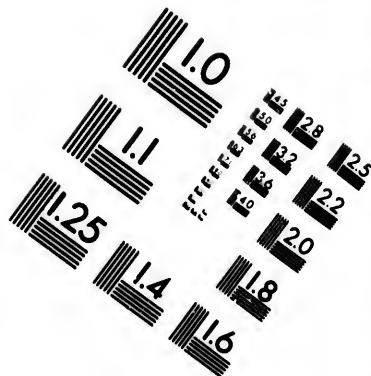
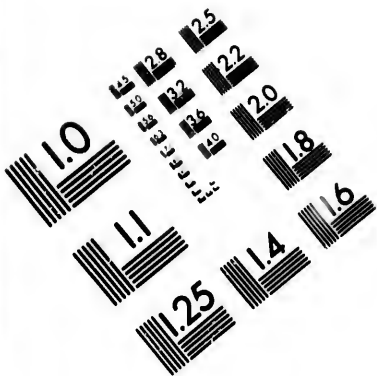
The Bala and Port Carling fields were visited during the winter by Mr. Dow of Gravenhurst, and the Port Sydney field by Mr. Leith of Bracebridge. This completes the list for this Presbytery, all the fields within the bounds, receiving supply, having been visited.

As many things required to be set in order within the bounds of the Presbytery of North Bay, a good deal of my time, during the term, was spent in dealing with these matters. The Sprucefield field first received attention. For a few years this important field was a settled charge, under Augmentation. When it became vacant it returned to the old position, under the care of student missionaries. Lately, however, it has revived somewhat and asks for an ordained missionary. This request the Presbytery has been able to comply with, sending them, at their request, Mr. D. Johnston, who for the past year has been at Sprucedale. On my visit to Hartfell, one of the stations connected with this field, they resolved to build this summer. Ground sufficient for the church, sited, and cemetery has been offered them by Mr. John Duke, one of their number. It is to be hoped that our cause here will move forward when the congregation gets into the new church, as for years they have been reaching after the impossible - growth in a school-house. This field, like many others in these districts, will suffer severely this year from the emigration of many of our best people to Manitoba and the North-West. In bidding them God speed in their new venture, we feel that the loss of the Church in these parts will be the gain of the Church in the west, as many of these people we know will be found most earnest and zealous workers in the church wherever their lot may be cast.

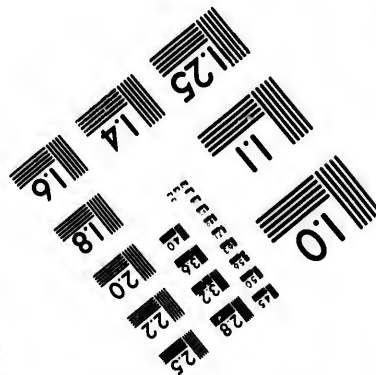
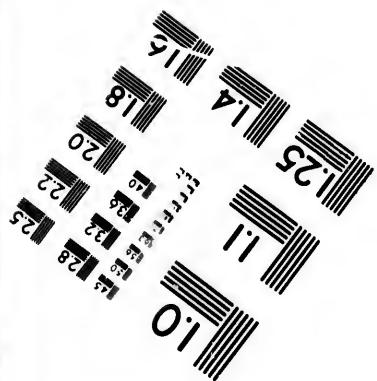
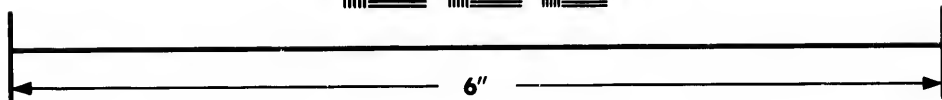
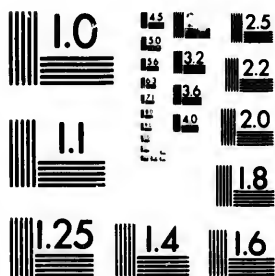
My next move was along the line of the O., A. & P. S. R.R., west of Scotia Junction, taking in a missionary meeting at Emsdale. At Orrville, the point on the railroad visited, there is not much to note in the way of improvement. Things are very quiet here in the winter time, as elsewhere in these parts, this being the harvest time for many of them in the woods, usually at some distance from home. At Rosedale, which for convenience is supplied along with Orrville during the winter, I found the condition of our cause much better than for many years. Everyone was hopeful, and as a result cheerful. Mr. Bell, who has been with them during the past six months, has evidently accomplished a good work. The Sabbath School, which was practically defunct when he came on the field, is now the largest in the village. Since my last visit the church has been put in thorough repair. It is now an iron clad, being lined inside with metal sheeting, which gives it a very neat appearance. Outside it has been painted afresh. But better still, all this is paid for, thanks to the Ladies' Aid, while from the annual report we learn that they closed the year with a small balance to their credit. We hope soon to see an ordained missionary here again.

I called at Sprucedale on my way out, to assist Mr. Johnson at his first missionary meeting. It is a matter of regret to all who are interested in this field, that they have not enjoyed the prosperity which they hoped for. This field, composed chiefly of a farming community, suffered severely from the frost which visited so many parts of the country last July. They had hoped to survive the loss entailed by the destruction of much of their field crops, but finally were compelled to give up, finding themselves unable to meet the payments due to their missionary. They part regretfully with Mr. Johnson, who won a high place in their esteem during his brief year with them and will content themselves meanwhile with the services of a student.





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Powassan and South River were next visited in order. We had difficulty in supplying this latter field, as it was found impossible to procure supply of such a kind as suited their tastes. With the exception of a few weeks at the beginning of the term and four weeks during the holidays, they were without supply.

A most important change has been made in the united fields of Magnetawan and Dunchurch. On the retirement of Mr. Davidson to accept the pastorate of the congregation at Byng Inlet, the session and managers of Magnetawan offered to secure supply for that station from among themselves, thus saving the fund to that extent. Dunchurch has enjoyed the services of Mr. J. Becket, late of Thamesville, since the first of January. As both these fields desired to enjoy the services of an ordained missionary, and each could not afford one for themselves, they resolved to unite for this purpose. By this arrangement the three strong stations of Dunchurch, Ahmic Harbor and Magnetawan become responsible for the salary of the ordained missionary, while the other four but weaker stations will be responsible for the salary of a student who has been secured to assist in working the united field, the whole field being visited by both missionaries fortnightly. This arrangement, it is hoped, will work satisfactorily, as it is the very best that could possibly be made for the successful working of this large field, and might, if successful, be tried in other fields.

I next visited the field lying east of North Bay, along the line of the C.P.R., and which will hereafter be known as Bonfield. Here for the first time our people have enjoyed service during the winter season, for which they are profoundly thankful, their gratitude taking the practical form of a contribution to the schemes of \$25. Our cause here is somewhat weak at present, but there is no room for discouragement in this fact, as the country is but partially settled as yet, so that there is room for development. In the three stations constituting this field, there are two church buildings, one in the township of Calvin, completed some time ago, and the other in Bonfield, still under way, but which we hope to see completed at an early date.

Sturgeon Falls and Cache Bay, to the west of North Bay were next visited. At Sturgeon the annual meeting was held at the close of the missionary meeting, when plans were adopted for the more thorough working of the field. With the prospects of development before this place, the time is not far distant when an ordained missionary will be required, let us hope, a settled pastor. Whispers are meantime heard regarding a new church, which may take shape ere long. A Ladies' Aid has been recently established, which may be expected to help on this work when once undertaken. At Cache Bay we have lost considerably in point of numbers through removals, still the few who are left are faithful and steadfast. The last field visited in this Presbytery was Warren. From a report received since my visit they have enjoyed a very successful winter. Here, too, they are talking of building a church. We hope to see it erected this summer. It has long been required by our people.

Here I crossed the boundary into the Presbytery of Algoma, having time before the March meetings of the Presbyteries to visit two or three fields. I went over the Chelmsford field to inquire how the arrangement come to last fall for the increase of the salary by the people was working. I found things in a very satisfactory condition under Mr. Pelletier. The people expressed a very strong desire for the return of Mr. MacDonald, under the Missionary Society of Queen's College, as assistant to Mr. Pelletier this summer, a request I am glad the Society has complied with. I then visited the congregations of Webbwood and Massey, which had united for the time being under Mr. Loughheed. I met with the congregations in both cases and talked over matters with them very fully. While they are somewhat discouraged by their changed circumstances, yet all were hopeful for the future. It was finally arranged that the Presbytery be asked to confirm the arrangement entered into last fall, viz., that these congregations be united as one pastoral charge, and that they be ranked meantime as a vacant congregation under Augmentation. This, on the whole, seems to be the best arrangement that can at present be made in the interest of our cause in these congregations.

New fields will be opened this season at Michipicoten on the north shore of Lake Superior, and at Brule Lake on the line of the O., A. & P. S. R.R.

During the coming summer we shall occupy fifty-nine fields in these three Presbyteries—eleven ordained missionaries and forty-eight students and catechists. Of the students twenty-three will be from the Missionary Associations of the different Colleges.

Nearly \$1,000 has been contributed this year to the schemes of the church, which considering all circumstances, is quite as good as in previous years. Among the contributions received may be mentioned one of \$50 given by two members in one of our

stations for the Miners' Mission. This is a tithe of a salary of \$500, and I mention it to show what may be done, if there "be first the willing mind."

Hamilton The only mission field at present in this Presbytery is Port Robinson, formerly connected with Merritton. It has been regularly supplied during the whole of the year with encouraging success.

Paris Owing to certain changes in the city of Brantford, St. Andrew's Church is now removed from the mission list and will, it is expected, soon become a self supporting Charge. Onondaga has been regularly supplied during the year by the Rev. A. Hudson.

London The only mission station in the Presbytery is North Ekfrid, with which there is connected thirty-five families and sixty-eight members. It is hoped by a re-arrangement of congregations it may, with some other station, ere long form a pastoral charge.

Chatham There are at present three mission fields in our bounds, two of which, Price and Renaud Line, and Harrow and Kingsville, are supplied by means of ordained missionaries. The progress, on the whole, has been satisfactory.

Sarnia Only one mission field was worked in this Presbytery during the past year, viz., Sombra and Duthil. Service was held continuously throughout the year, with the exception of the month of October. The services of the student who carried on the work successfully during the winter have been retained for the summer months, and it is expected that the good effects of a year's steady work under the same hand will be apparent. Sombra is a small village on the St. Clair river. Although there are not a great many Presbyterians in the neighborhood, ours is the only denomination which holds an evening service and the work is of importance, especially in the winter time when a number of sailors and other young men are at home. Duthil, the other part of this field, should yet furnish a good congregation to the Church. The country is new, and the people are still comparatively poor; but the land is good and there is a large territory within which we have the work to ourselves. Some erratic and extravagant sects from the American side of the river make an occasional invasion and produce a maximum of excitement and disturbance with a minimum of good; but no Church of any other Christian body stands within a radius of several miles. A Christian Endeavor Society was organized at each of these stations last summer, and they are reported as being of assistance in the work. Seven persons were received into full communion during the year, four on profession and three on certificate. On petition of a number of residents of the Township of Enniskillen, a new mission field was formed by the Presbytery. A suitable building has been obtained for a church and has been paid for, and a balance remains on hand for necessary improvements. With the approval of Presbytery, the Students' Missionary Society of Montreal College will occupy the field for the summer, the people undertaking to contribute \$100. The Petrolia Session has been given the oversight of the new mission. The church is to be known as St. John's Church, Enniskillen. A movement has been initiated by the United Young People's Societies of this Presbytery looking towards the support of a Home Missionary in the North-West for a term of five years.

Stratford, Huron and Maitland There are no mission fields in these Presbyteries, the country being long settled. With a few exceptions, which derive assistance from the Augmentation Fund, the congregations are self-supporting and prosperous.

Bruce The only mission field now within our bounds is that of Salem, Doddington and Gillies Hill, which is supplied by an ordained missionary, and which it is hoped may ere long become a self-sustaining charge.

NORTH-WESTERN CANADA.

The Rev. Dr. Robertson, Superintendent of Missions for Manitoba, the North-West Territories and British Columbia, reports as follows:—

During the year 1898-9 there has been a decided advance made in Home Missions in Western Canada. In the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West Territories, Breadalbane, Elva, Cypress River, Binscarth, Yorkton, Basswood, Newdale and

Lumsden were placed on the Augmented list, and Schreiber, Tarbolton, Beulah and Pipestone, are supporting their own pastors. In the Synod of British Columbia, South Edmonton, Innisfail, Trail and Delta, became augmented charges. Shoal Lake and Oxbow are also calling and will likely have settled pastors ere this report is in type. At least forty more Missions are prepared to qualify under the regulations of the Augmentation Committee, and are anxious to call pastors of their own, but the Committee is not financially in a position to receive them. This is to be regretted, inasmuch as the development of congregations is arrested by such delay.

The strength of the Church in the West to-day may with profit be compared to her standing there at the time of the Union in 1875; the comparison may help to show the wisdom of prosecuting with vigor the work of the Church in new districts, in her own interests and in the interest of the large enterprises she has in hand. For Church schemes, North-Western Canada gave \$22,920 last year.

The following new Missions were placed on the Home Mission list this spring, viz., Mine Centre, Finland Mission, Boucherville, Norman, P.A. and D. Ry., Plum Coulee, Mountain City, Mather, Bates, Mayne, Broomhill, Glenmorris, Aberdeen, Argyle, Orrwold, Esterhaz, Weyburn, Sunnylynn, Summerside, Greendyke, Highview—twenty-one in all—in the Synod of Manitoba, and the North-West Territories; and Porcupine Hills, Cochrane, Belmont and Homewood, Stony Plain and Goshen, Lamerton, Fernie, Cranbrook, Moyie, Cascade City, Camp McKinney, North Bend, Rossland Mines, Nelson Mines, Whitewater Mines, Summit and Extension Mine—sixteen in all—in the Synod of British Columbia. The Fairview Mission formerly connected with St. Andrew's, Vancouver, was strengthened by the addition of Port Moody and Central Park, and the three formed into a charge. By the first of June, a Missionary should be stationed in the Lardeau mining district, and another with headquarters at Robson. The advance made during the year may be more readily appreciated in tabulated form.

It may be added that the statistics for 1899 are incomplete and that the figures given are below, rather than up to, the actual facts.

Regrouping Stations In the Presbyteries of Melita, Minnedosa and Regina extensive changes have been made in the regrouping of stations, rendering missions more compact, reducing the number of stations, diminishing travel, and preparing the missions for the congregational stage. Changes of this nature are inevitable from year to year as the vacant lands are occupied by incoming settlers or new centres of population spring up by the construction of railways.

Churches Built Churches were built at Nepigon, the Finland Mission, Ogilvie, Plumas, Breadalbane, Griswold, North Portal, Fairmount, Solgirth, Beulah, Caron and a manse at Oxbow—all in the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West Territory. In the Synod of British Columbia churches were built at Clearwater, Leduc, Homewood, Goshen, Red Deer, Willowbank, Mountain View, Ft. Steele, Fernie, Salmon Arm, Cranbrook, Kelowna, New Denver, Nakusp, Fairview, Colwood, Sooke, and at Pincher Creek and Maple Creek manses were bought. A number of missions recently removed from the Home Mission to the Augmented list have also been busy in building operations. Churches were built at Silver Plains, Springhill, Olive, and manses at Austin, Thornhill, Rosedale, Holland, Lumsden, in the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West Territories; and in the Synod of British Columbia a comfortable and commodious manse at Armstrong.

Church Debts Reports indicate that a number of congregations are freeing themselves from debts contracted in the erection of churches and manses. In one Presbytery four congregations have wiped out their debts entirely, while in other instances substantial reductions have been effected. It is to be hoped that this movement may gather volume and momentum, so that missions and congregations may enter on the new century unhampered by an incubus that seriously interferes with the work of the congregation and the generous support of the Schemes of the Church. The prospects are that extensive building operations will be carried on this season. The Church and Manse Building Fund continues to give large help in building operations. It has helped already to build about 400 churches and manses worth half a million.

Conditions Improving The circumstances of the people are gradually improving, and the average contribution for the support of ordinances rising. In 1897-8 the average rate of giving for stipend in missions was about \$6.68 per communicant, while in 1898-9 it rose to nearly \$8.00 per communicant. With more mature and acceptable supply, \$10 could easily be reached and maintained. The people of the missions on an average contribute about two-thirds of the salary of the missionary, and the Home Mission Committee one-third.

Ordinances Dispensed Presbyteries arrange for dispensing the sacraments of the Church in missions under the care of students or catechists, the sacrament of baptism as circumstances may render advisable, and the sacrament of the Lord's Supper half-yearly or yearly.

Communicants Few While attendance on the services of the sanctuary is general, and satisfactory on the whole, yet a large proportion of adults are not in full communion with the Church. That there are only 6,344 communicants reported, and that 6,159 families, and 6,288 single men not connected with these families, are on the returns, will serve to show a low spiritual state. Nor is this state of things confined to missions. Without taking the single persons into the reckoning at all—counting only families—the one-half of the augmented charges in the west give only nine communicants to eight families, and the reasons that prevent the Highland Scotchmen from approaching the communion table do not obtain here. Last year six self-supporting congregations reported for 1897 no additions on profession of faith, six reported one each, eight two each, three three each. The additions to the communion roll on profession of faith are few and unsatisfactory, and Presbyteries and pastors are anxiously asking why this barrenness and how can it be ended. The frequent changes in the supply of missions, owing to the large number of students employed, and the consequent lower measure of responsibility resting on individual men is a hindrance, though only in a minor degree. It might serve a good purpose to publish from year to year a list of the *dead churches*.

Sabbath Schools Sabbath Schools are steadily increasing in number and efficiency, and they are encouraged to use the literature prepared by our own Church. Many of them can be kept open for only six or seven months of the year, because the stations are closed for the winter—the accommodation is not suitable or the weather is too severe. In country districts many of the schools are

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union ; missionaries and people prefer Presbyterian schools, because better opportunities are presented for teaching the doctrines held by the Church. The number of pupils enrolled is about 24,000. The absence of family worship in the homes of so many of our people makes it imperative that the Church should adopt the best means of feeding the lambs of the flock ; without this the strength and spirituality of the Church are threatened, and her efficiency is sure to be impaired.

Winter Supply. The number of missionaries available for winter supply was not adequate, and hence about twenty-three missions were, some without any, and some with very partial, supply. The prospects for fuller supply, however, are brightening. Twenty-two ordained ministers and graduates accepted appointments this spring. The West requires young men—pioneer work demands youth and physical vigor. In many places it is difficult to get a house, and facilities for education are often absent. The students of the summer session are increasing, and they continue to fill an important place. Accustomed to the country, well advanced in their studies, possessed of considerable experience and aptitude for teaching, they afford Presbyteries large relief when the students of eastern colleges leave their missions in October. The importance of Western Canada to the Dominion is better understood now ; Eastern Canada can no longer absorb the growing girth of graduates from spring to spring, and we may confidently expect a larger number of volunteers for the west.

Hindrances. The hindrances to the progress of true religion are many and potent. Everywhere worldliness and the love of pleasure are met ; nor is the social degeneracy met in older communities unfelt. In mining districts Sabbath desecration, gambling, drinking, and lewdness are the prevailing vices. Horse races, picnics and games in western districts are occasionally held, but Canadian sentiment is against them. The strong arm of the law is invoked to put down gambling in its more pronounced forms, but yet it is very prevalent, even increasing, it is to be feared. Frequently prostitution is winked at as a necessary evil ; sometimes periodic " raiding " takes place, which can scarcely be distinguished from a mode of licensure. Not unfrequently shops are open in mining camps on Sabbath, bar rooms and saloons doing a large business, and the breakers of the law unmolested. The absence of family life and suitable boarding houses greatly increases the danger of the saloon and the brothel. Under the influence of the Gospel, however, a change is taking place, and sobriety, honesty, and purity are sure to prevail in the end, for these are of God.

Mining Districts. To lode mining in East and West Kootenay, the building of the Crow's Nest Pass Railway, bringing in cheap supplies and fuel, has given a great impetus. The population may be expected to grow, and the Church must not only seize pivotal points, but be prepared to follow the miners and prospectors to their haunts. The proportion of Canadians among miners, traders and capitalists is increasing ; a considerable number of them adhere, or are friendly, to the Presbyterian Church ; and the interests of religion and social order demand that picked men be sent to minister to them. Were more of our sons to qualify as mining engineers, instead of studying law, medicine, or even theology, it might be better for themselves and for the country.

Mormons The Mormon Settlement in S. W. Alberta is growing. The soil is fertile, and insufficient rainfall is supplemented by irrigation. A company has been organized with a capital of half a million dollars, a canal sixty miles long is under construction, and on both sides of it hundreds of Mormon families are to be settled this season. These people are rapidly acquiring wealth, and are to be a strong and well organized community. Whether they practice their peculiar views or not they have not abjured them—but rather justify them publicly—and a steady stream of so-called apostles, prophets and priests from Utah and Montana do their utmost to keep them obedient to the faith. With the increase in numbers has come boldness, and they have sent out about twenty missionaries to different parts to propagate and defend their views. By many the tyranny of the system is being felt, and they are becoming restless. The schools conducted among them, intercourse in fuller measure with others, the preaching of the gospel within their reach and the restrictions of the law it is felt will effect a change. A belief contrary to modern thought and tendency, contrary to the spirit and letter of the New Testament, placed under the ban of the law, however firmly held, is sure to decay and become an unpleasant memory. The missionaries laboring among the Protestant ranchers and farmers in the district are doing efficient service. Since the Mormon settlement is confined within certain limits

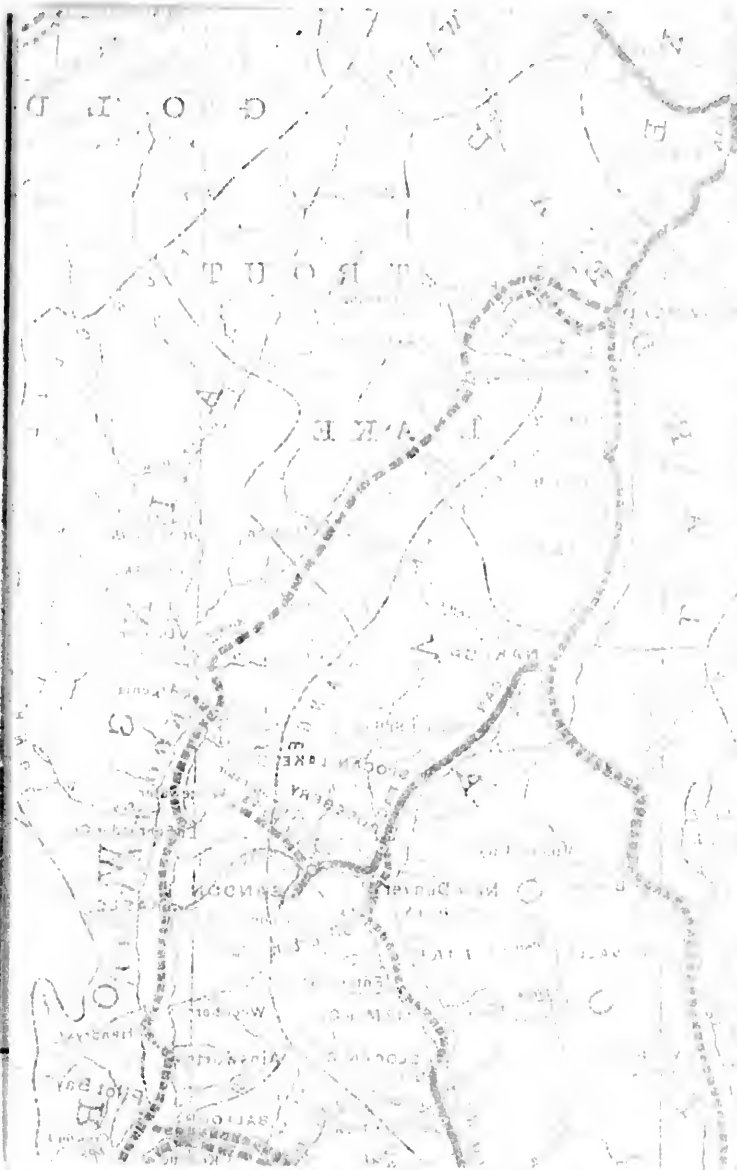
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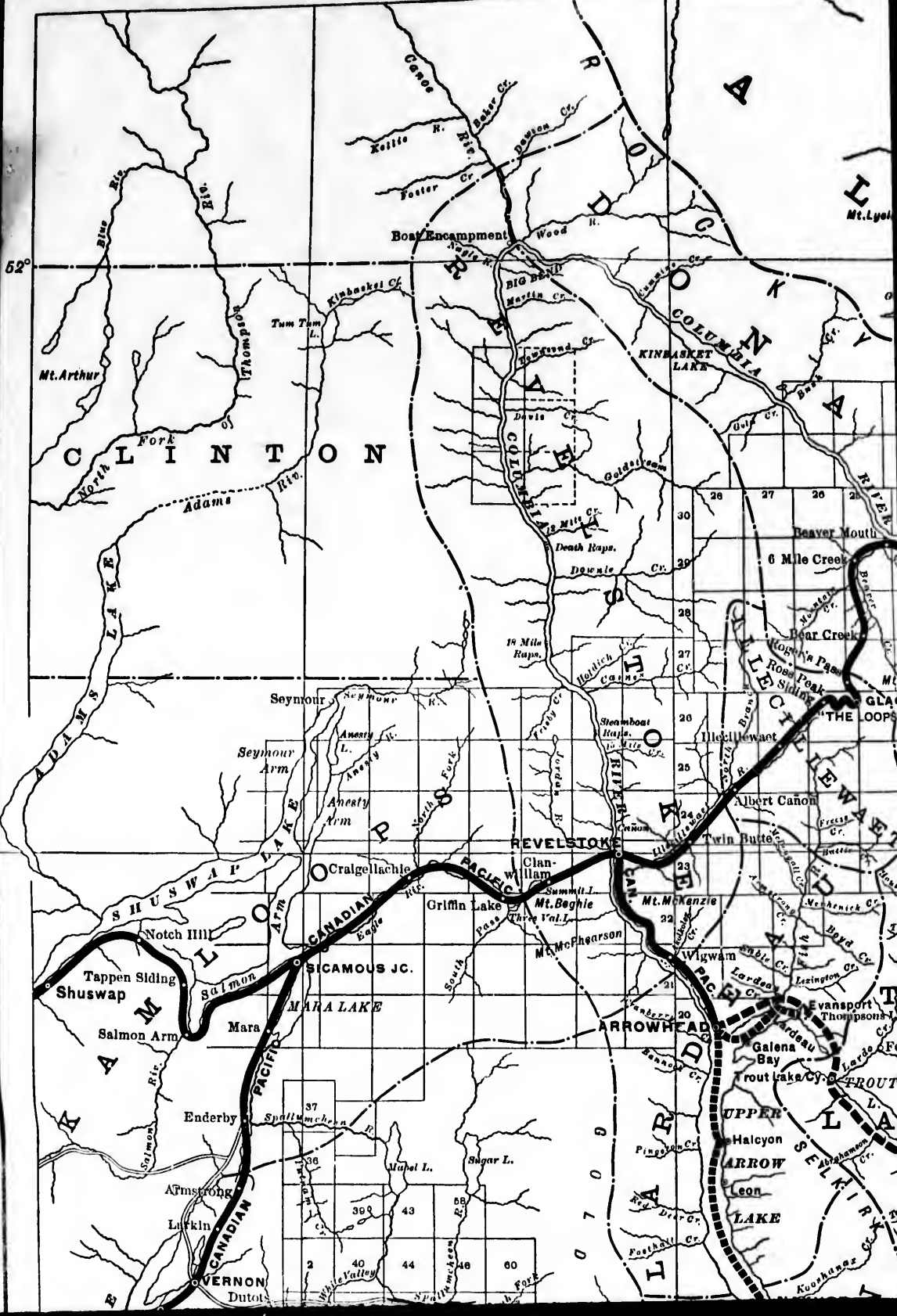
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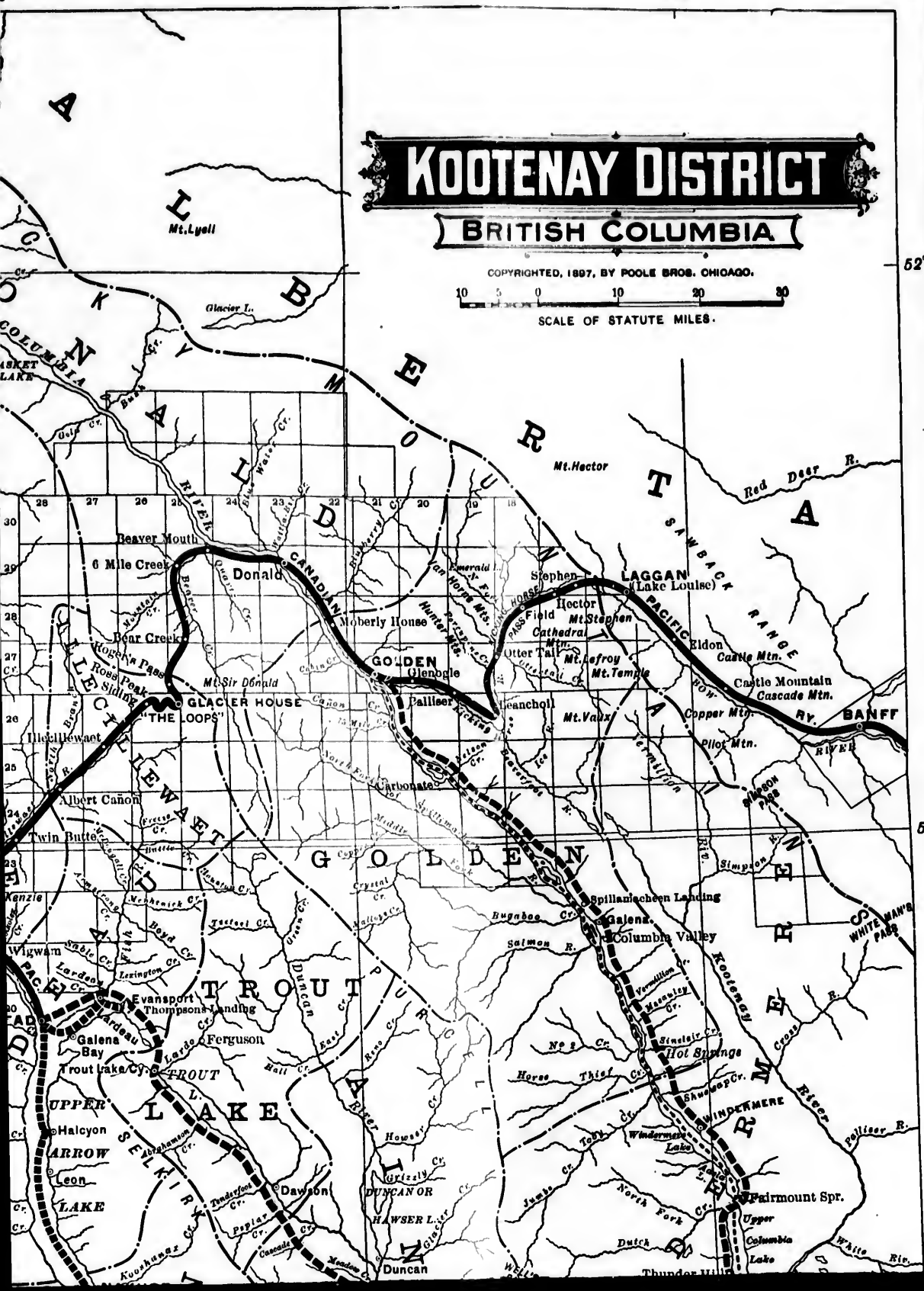
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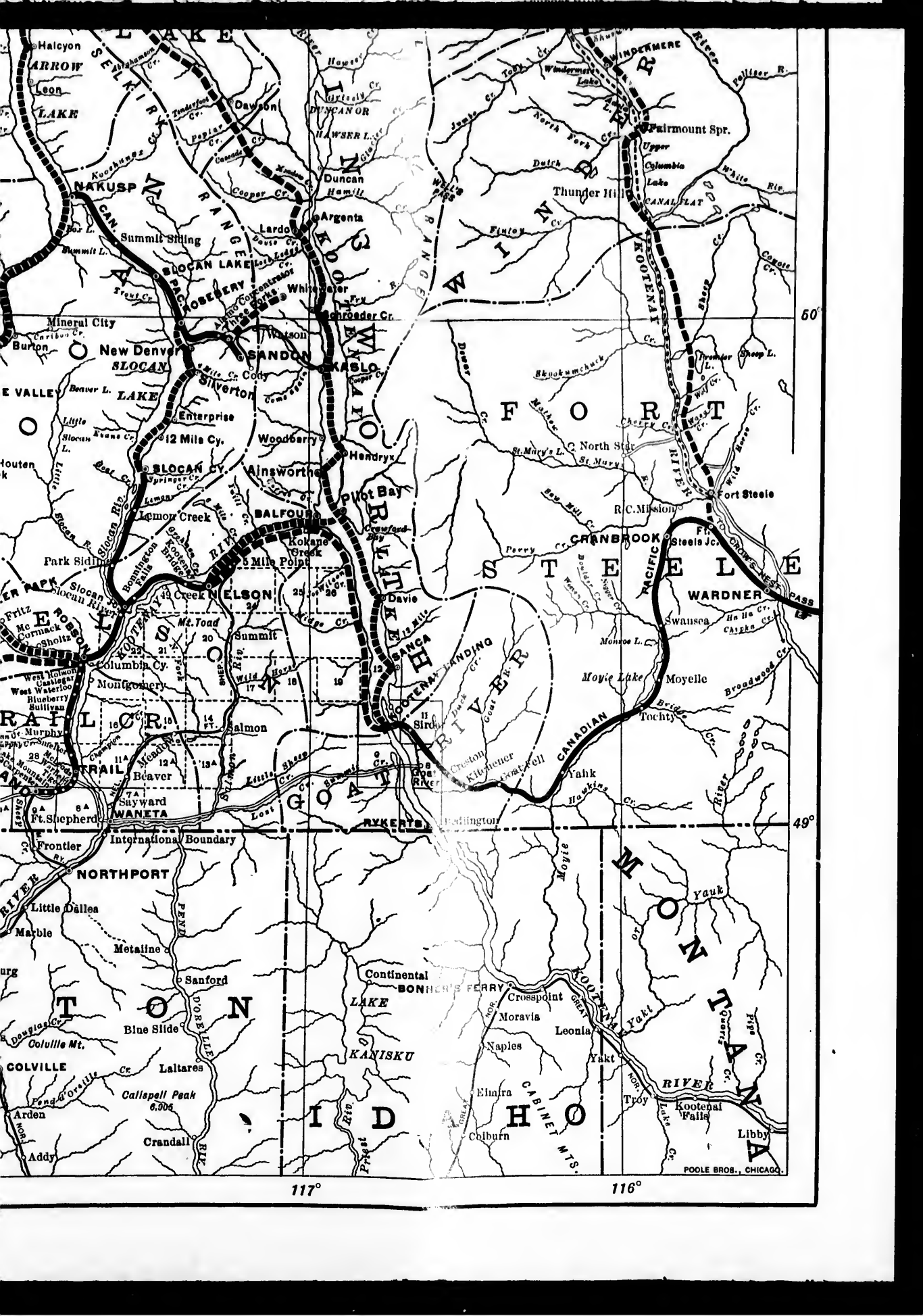




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and extensive arrears of irrigated lands are to be found outside Mormon boundaries a larger population will be apt to locate in the district. In an article on the "Revival of the Mormon Problem" in the April number of *The North American Review* the following sentences occur: "There are 1,500 Mormon Missionaries now in the foreign work of the Church, the brightest of its young men, the future leaders in all matters. They are compelled to sacrifice everything and to labor for two or three years far from home in the interest of their religion. . . . They have 300,000 members now. They gained 63,000 in membership last year, exceeding all other Churches in their success in missionary work. Aggressive, devoted, determined, they present again a problem that will merit the attention of our wisest statesmen."

The inflow of foreigners from Europe presents a problem somewhat difficult of solution. The children in the Winnipeg schools speak 17 different languages, and synopses of the ordinances of North-West Legislature require to be published in 13 different languages. And the beliefs of these people differ as well as their languages. Many of them are poor, having been assisted to the country by the Government. They are thrifty, industrious, saving, and likely to get on. They are settled for the most part in Manitoba, Assiniboia, and Alberta in colonies of from 200 to 1,000 families, and in consequence are likely to preserve their manner, customs and traditions all the longer. Uncontaminated with views, and innocent of practices, that check the growth of population elsewhere, their rate of increase will be much higher than that of ordinary Canadians, hence the necessity in the interests of sincere patriotism, good government, public morality and true religion that they should be evangelized and assimilated as speedily as may be. Except the Doukhobors, of whom only 4 per cent. can read and write, the most of them have received a fair education. The Doukhobors profess a species of the Quaker faith. The most of the rest belong to the Greek, Roman Catholic, Lutheran or Reformed Churches. There are over 50,000 foreigners, or 20 per cent. of the total population, in Manitoba now. Deputations have waited on representatives of our own Church, and petitions have been sent requesting that missionaries might be appointed to labor among some of these colonies. Some of their young men have, after examination, been admitted to Manitoba College as students for the ministry. Correspondence has been also opened up with Dr. Moody, the veteran Missionary of the Free Church of Scotland, at Budapest, Hungary, with the view of getting a few suitable men at once to begin work among the more recent arrivals, and he has made recommendations which are under consideration. The Home Mission Committee has already made a small grant for this work.

Already services are conducted in five languages among these people by eight missionaries, and at other points some work is being done through Foreigners interpreters. Five foreign nationalities are represented in our theological classes. At the observance of the Lord's Supper at one of our missions, hymns were sung in four different languages, and all sang "Rock of Ages," each in his own language, but all to the same tune. Whatever the resultant of this mixture of blood and belief, the duty of the Church is clear, viz., to leaven the minds of these strangers residing within our gates with the Gospel of Christ.

A few features deserve special notice. When the Crow's Nest Pass Railway was under construction between four and five thousand men were employed, and yet the Presbyterian Church alone appointed a missionary to labor among these men. By all classes he was made welcome, the superintendent of construction, in belief a Roman Catholic, becoming interested in his work and contributing \$500 towards its advancement. From this work sprang the three promising missions organized at Fernie, Cranbrook and Moyie Lake. Frame churches have been built at the former two, and both missions will be prepared to call pastors in the autumn.

While the railway along the Columbia was under construction last autumn, a town of 1,400 people sprang up, and a missionary was appointed—here again the Presbyterian Church represented Protestantism. The place had only two communicants and yet the people contributed \$10 per Sabbath. At Cascade City another town sprang up and an ordained missionary was promptly appointed. At Grand Forks—now Columbia—and at Greenwood, missionaries have been laboring for years, no other Churches having visited these places until last year. At Texada, Alberni, Denman, Quesnelle, Horsefly, Barkerville, Upper Columbia and many other places in British Columbia, the Presbyterian Church is alone in caring for the

souls of men. In one district occupied are 3,500 men, but among them all only one communicant.

Character of the Missionaries

In this whole western country the frontier missionaries are serving the Church with distinction and fidelity. In so large a staff there are differences in ability and adaptability, but, with safety it may be affirmed that no equal number of men anywhere maintain a higher character or render more faithful service to religion. Very rarely has a missionary in the West been brought before a Court of the Church for unworthy conduct, or even dereliction of duty—they exemplify the doctrines they preach. They are not only total abstainers, but are active in advancing the cause of temperance; and people always know where to find them. They are jealous for the good name and moral standing of the places in which they reside, and have spoken and labored for the extirpation of vice and the purification of social and public life; and this with good sense and courage, but without noise. To the unfortunate they are friendly, and to the sick and stranded helpful. Last winter was the coldest in twenty-five years, and yet Sabbath services were kept up with unflinching regularity, when thirty or thirty-five miles had to be travelled in the discharge of duty, and three services to be held. One missionary, without better outfit than a horse and saddle, with long distances to cover, in a thinly settled district, declined the offer of an easier mission, because the people were strangers in the country, because there was much sickness among them, and because they would be deprived of the means of grace were he to leave. He missed his appointments only one Sabbath, and one could forgive him when he knew that the thermometer dropped to fifty-seven degrees below zero that day! Another, the first man of his year at graduation, learning that it was difficult to get a missionary for a poor but important field, volunteered to supply, surrendering his own promising field cheerfully. Another wrote, "The winter was somewhat cold, but I enjoyed my work very much; the attendance at all points was good, even the coldest days, and the people were kind and appreciative. It is true our house was cold—whenever our kitchen was scrubbed a sheet of ice formed on the floor—but, when you knew that other people were no better off, you thought but little about the matter." Nor are these men deficient in scholarship; in proportion to numbers there are more graduates in the Synod of British Columbia than in that of Hamilton and London; and yet the salaries of these missionaries are the lowest in the Church, and they never get a furlough, and the expense prevents them from even coming to the Assembly.

It is befitting that the important service rendered to the Home Mission work of the Church by the Conveners of Presbytery Committees should receive recognition. Without fee, or even a vote of thanks these men give time, labor and mental effort to build up weak missions and congregations. In the course of a year they travel thousands of miles, carry on an extensive correspondence, settle disputes, unravel tangles; and for their pains they pay their own postage, meet railway and livery expenses, and must be prepared to be misunderstood and criticised; but they go right on, knowing that the earnest men—clerics and laics—are with them, and because they are anxious to serve the Church, and advance the cause of righteousness and truth. Mr McLaren, as Convener of the Synod of Home Mission and Augmentation in British Columbia, Mr. Farquharson as Secretary of the Synod's Home Mission Committee, Manitoba and the Northwest Territories, and Mr. C. W. Gordon, the British Canadian Secretary place the Church under great obligation for valuable service most unostentatiously performed. For referring to these services one must be prepared for protest and reproof as soon as the sentences come under the eyes of the gentlemen to whom they refer. But this recognition should be made by one who will ever be grateful for the assistance given him.

A few statements of a more general character must close the report.

General Remarks The crop of last season was rather below the average, and its value was considerably depreciated in several localities by early autumn frosts and unusually heavy and prolonged autumn rains. The circumstances of the people are steadily improving, however, and the West shares in the general prosperity of the Dominion. The mining operations in the Kootenay and Klondike have given a great impulse to trade, and Coast cities, and trading cities generally, have been gainers. New Westminster has risen Phoenix-like from its ashes after the destructive fire of last autumn. Victoria and Vancouver are said to have passed the 25,000 population notch, the latter began to be built only in 1883. Winnipeg had a population of 241 in 1871, to-day it is estimated at 45,000 while the population of the province is

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computed to have increased from 25,228 in 1871, to 260,000 in 1899, a gain of 930 per cent. in twenty-seven years. In the other provinces in the West a similar growth is perceptible.

Last year, from thirty-five to forty thousand immigrants are said to **Immigration** have settled in the country, about one-half of whom were foreigners.

A much larger number is expected this year. Except on the Pacific Coast and in the mining districts, Bluenoses are not numerous. The facts disclosed in the vital statistics report of the Government of Ontario preclude the hope of any large accessions from that Province. Her young women seem reluctant to move West, and hence her sons are taking to themselves wives from among foreign settlers. The inflow from Britain, and especially the United States is increasing, many of the latter are Canadians returning home.

Last season eight different lines of railway were under construction in **Development of Country** Northwestern Ontario, Manitoba, Assiniboia, and British Columbia, opening up large tracts of farming and mineral lands. An equal number are under construction this season. The Canadian Pacific Company is the most active agent in this work, but the Government of Manitoba is most energetic, and the Northern Pacific is also bestirring itself again and reaching out. Along the lines under survey and construction land is being rapidly taken up. Centres of trade are forming and Christian missionaries are in demand.

The area of land under cultivation is increasing year by year; more **Farming** attention is being paid to stock-raising and dairying; and variety of industries is imparting steadiness and safety to trade, and freeing us from the precariousness incident to dependence on a single industry.

Lode mining in British Columbia is steadily developing. The mineral **Mining** output of 1897 was estimated at ten and one-half millions of dollars, and of 1898 nearly fifteen millions. The fish and seal catch was estimated at \$6,000,000. The value of the Yukon gold for 1898 was said to be about \$10,000,000, and for 1899 it is variously estimated at from \$12,000,000 to \$20,000,000. The excitement of two years ago has cooled off, means of transportation are being improved, lowering freight rates, and the exploration of this northern land, and the digging, thawing and washing of sand and gravel are settling down to the conditions of a regular industry.

The spiritual condition of this western community is somewhat difficult to appraise—spiritual processes are silent, secret, and elude analysis. **Spiritual Condition** To the credit side of the account one must place the fact that, even in the busiest harvest season, there is a complete cessation of work on the Sabbath from the Red River to the Rocky Mountains. But the conditions are different where railway construction is proceeding or mining operations conducted. In the farming and ranching districts in Manitoba and North-West Territories liquor hinders the advance of Christian work but little. The satisfactory vote polled when the plebiscite was taken, very fairly represents public opinion. The liquor laws in British Columbia need to be made more stringent, and they should be better enforced. Nor is it to the credit of the Government that so many saloon licenses are issued. The treasury may gain, but the province loses by the present method. The liquor traffic in mining districts is an unmixed evil, and calls loudly for restriction and suppression. But the temperance sentiment in British Columbia on the whole, however, is steadily improving. Gambling is multiform and universal. The red man, the yellow man, and the white man are alike under its curse; its most numerous victims are in the mines and in the towns. The primitive domestic conditions in mining, and sometimes in other districts, are inimical to social purity. These are ugly open sores that need to be cauterised and cured. There is hope in the fact that a healthy public opinion is being created, and that vice in grosser forms is being suppressed. It is to be feared that the family altar in some homes has never been reared, and that in others it is in ruins. Not one-half of our people maintain family worship. The attendance on the services of the sanctuary is general, and increasing with the improved circumstances of the people, and Sabbath schools are encouraged and supported. A large number of people of mature years, even heads of families, are unpledged to the living of a Christian life. There is little scepticism, and less infidelity, but much indifference—deadness. And yet people are generous in their support of Christian work, the general average being higher than in Ontario. Crimes against person or property are rare, and such is the confidence in the courts of

the country and their executive officers, that lynching is unknown. In proportion to numbers fewer adherents of the Presbyterian Church are convicted of crime than of any denomination in Canada.

THE YUKON TERRITORY.

The Yukon is a special field. The four men appointed to this distant and laborious field are still our only representatives. A fifth, however, Rev. D. G. Cock, a graduate of Halifax College, is now on his way there.

Dawson City Mr. A. S. Grant is at Dawson, ministering to the spiritual needs of the congregation organized by him there, and superintending the General Hospital. The congregation built a church last season, at a cost of about \$8,000, and it is expected to be free from debt after the "washup" of this spring. The congregation resolved to become self-supporting from the 1st. of January, 1899, to call a pastor of its own and to pay him a stipend of \$200 a month. Mr. Grant deserves great credit for the splendid service rendered to the Church and to the community, not only at Dawson but all along the way to his destination.

Elorado Elorado is supplied by Mr. R. M. Dickey. The place is a base of supplies for miners; a town with a future is slowly rising; a building for a church was bought and fitted up at a cost of \$1,500, and our congregation there is gaining in numbers and cohesion. Mr. Dickey, in addition to his work at Elorado, has itinerated among the miners scattered along the creeks and streams tributary to the Klondike; and his self-denying labors have yielded rich fruit. His arduous duties have somewhat impaired his health.

Atlin Atlin Lake district is distant less than one hundred miles from Skaguay, and comparatively easy of access; it lies within the boundaries of British Columbia, and the laws of that province exclude aliens from mining, hence the miners are Canadians. Mr. Pringle, who labored last summer and winter with such signal success between Glenora and Teslin, informed the Committee that the people in his former "parish" were leaving for Atlin, and wished him to accompany them. To this field he was subsequently appointed, and he drove in with his dogs in the month of March. A site for a church and a building partially erected were bought for \$232, and a tent 20x50 with a wall eight feet, to be floored with sawdust was secured for a temporary church. The building bought is to be fitted up for the use of trained nurses who are to be appointed by the women of the Church. At present Pine City and Atlin city—seven miles apart—are the two centres of population. Mr. Pringle was the first minister of any denomination to reach the new district. Present population 3,000, increasing fast.

Bennett Bennett is situated on the Canadian side of the provisional boundary between the Yukon and Alaska. The railway from Skaguay to Bennett will soon be finished, making Bennett a sort of entrepot for passengers and freight going to Atlin or the Yukon. There is a custom house, mounted police station, and a town is springing up. Mr. J. A. Sinclair is in charge there now. There is a temporary church, part wood and part canvas, and a primitive manse.

Skaguay Last winter Mr. Sinclair supplied Skaguay, and rendered valuable service, not only in ministering to the spiritual needs of men, but in maintaining law and order. Since Skaguay promises to be the gateway through which our people have to pass, in going to the far north, the question arises whether a representative of the Church should not be permanently located there.

Glenora, Teslin The farming settlement at Dease Lake, the miners at Cassiar and people scattered between the Stikine River and Teslin may make it advisable to resume work in the district formerly supplied by Mr. Pringle. On the Stewart River, some mining is going on, but the number of miners is not large. The Methodist Church has sent a missionary there. To Fort Selkirk, at the confluence of the Lewis and Pelly rivers, the Anglican Church

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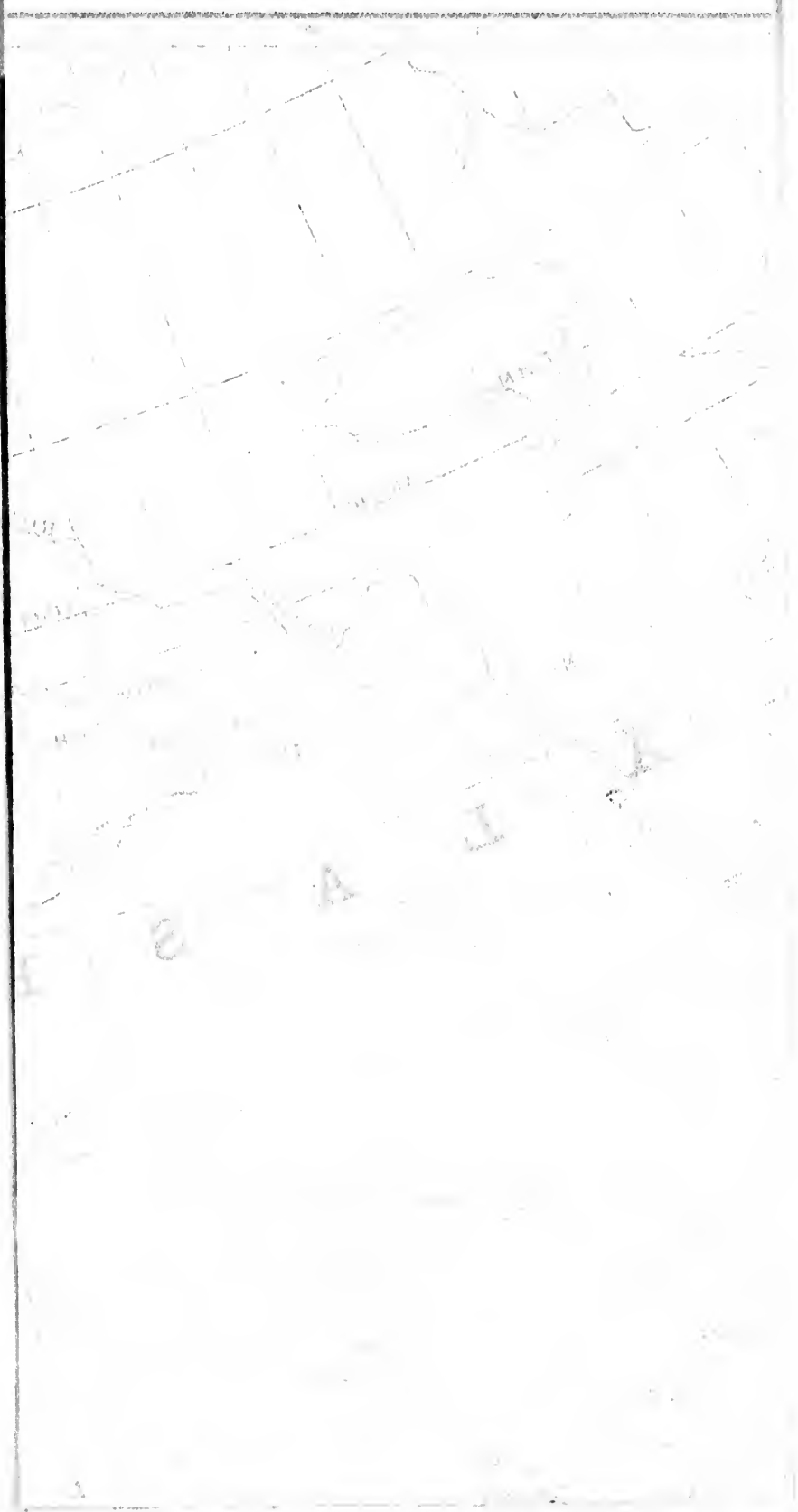
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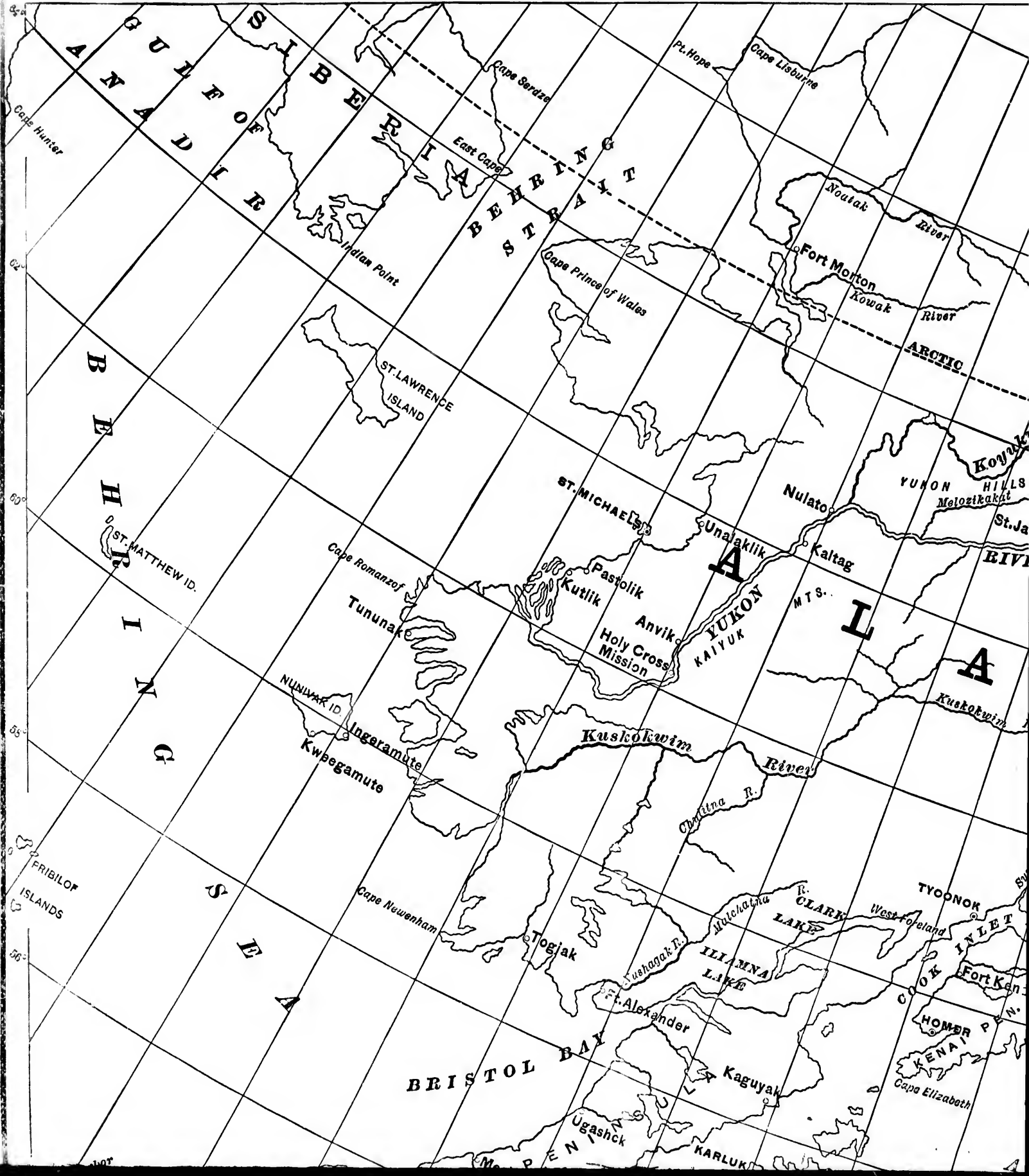
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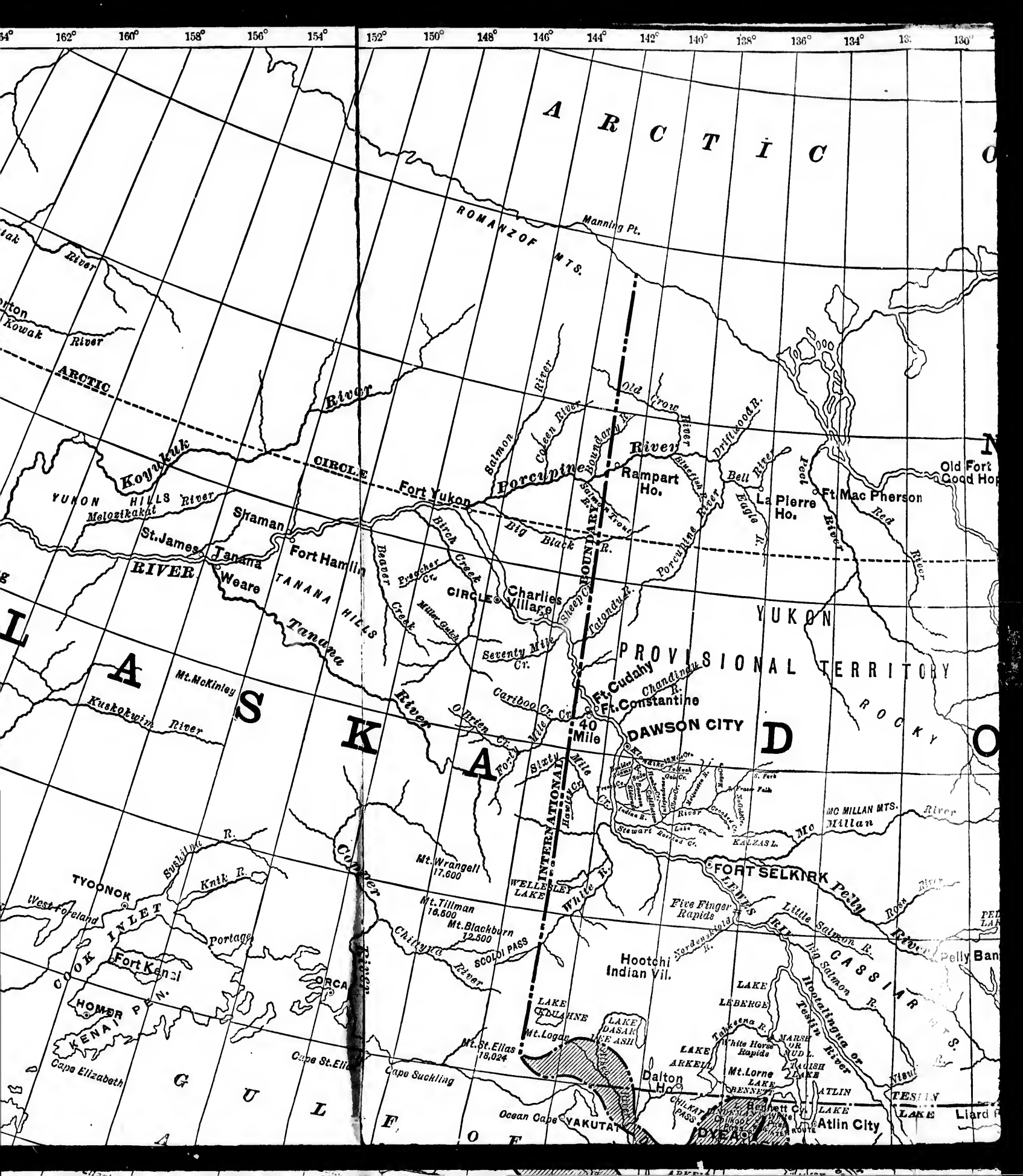

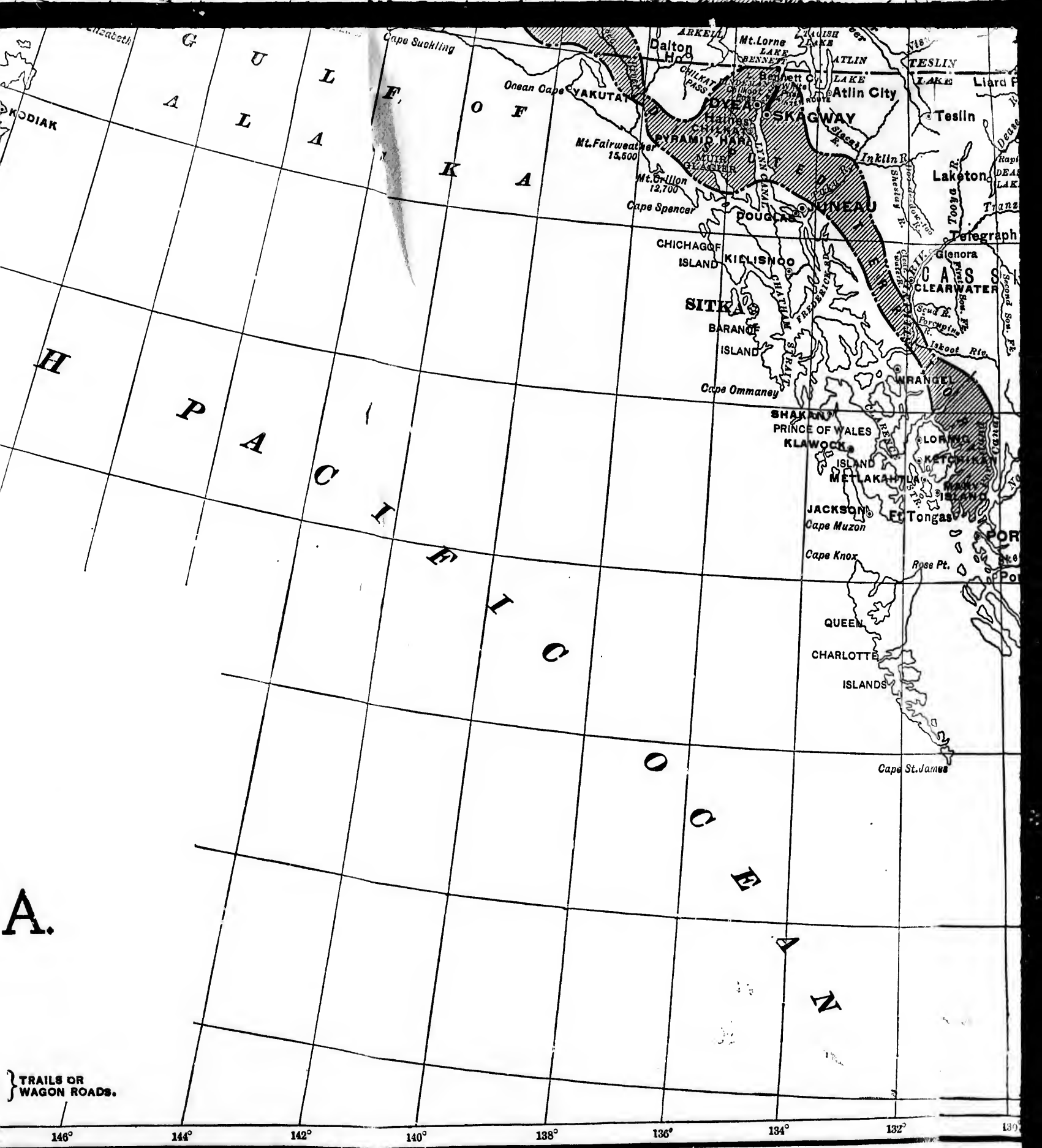


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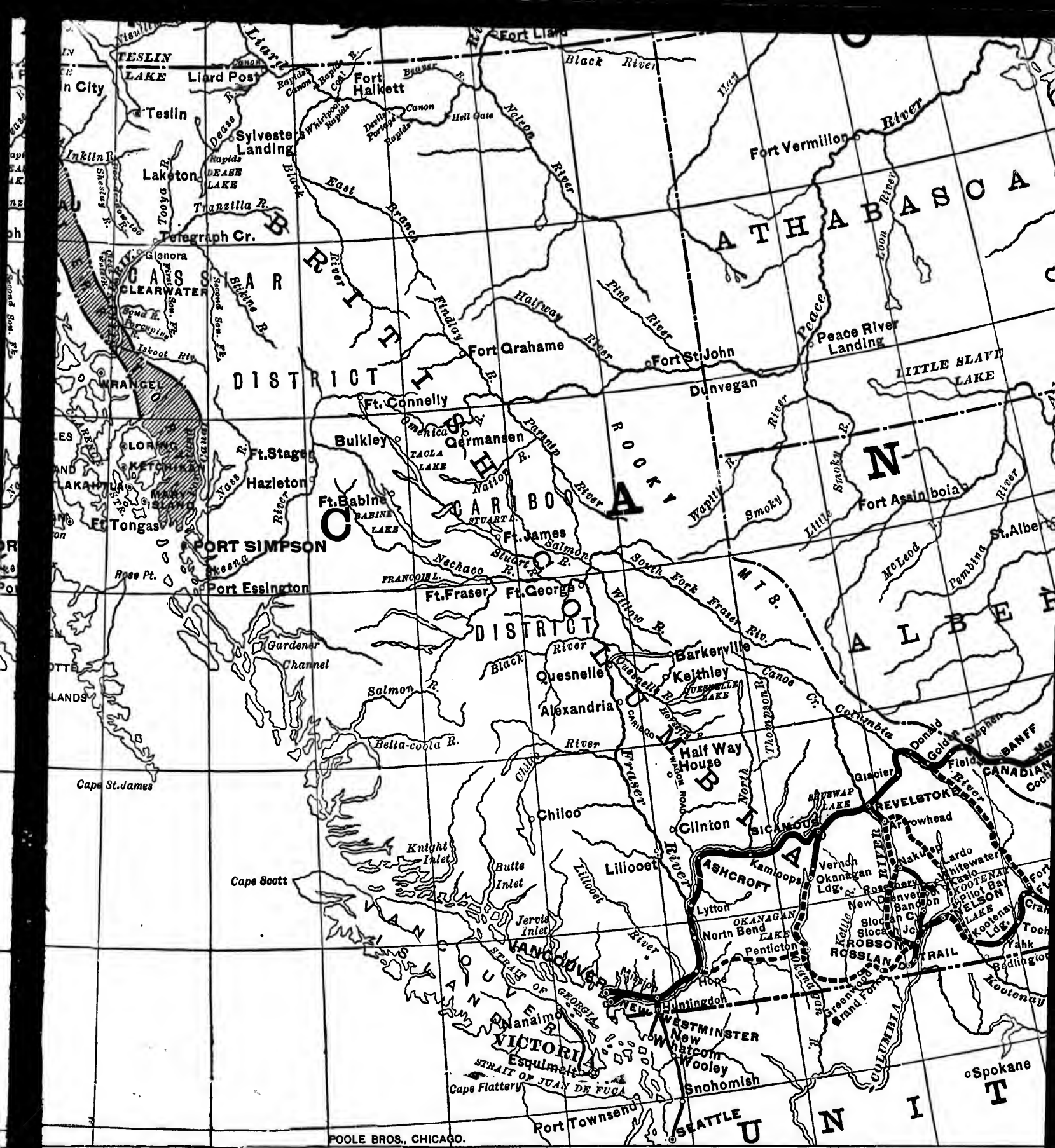
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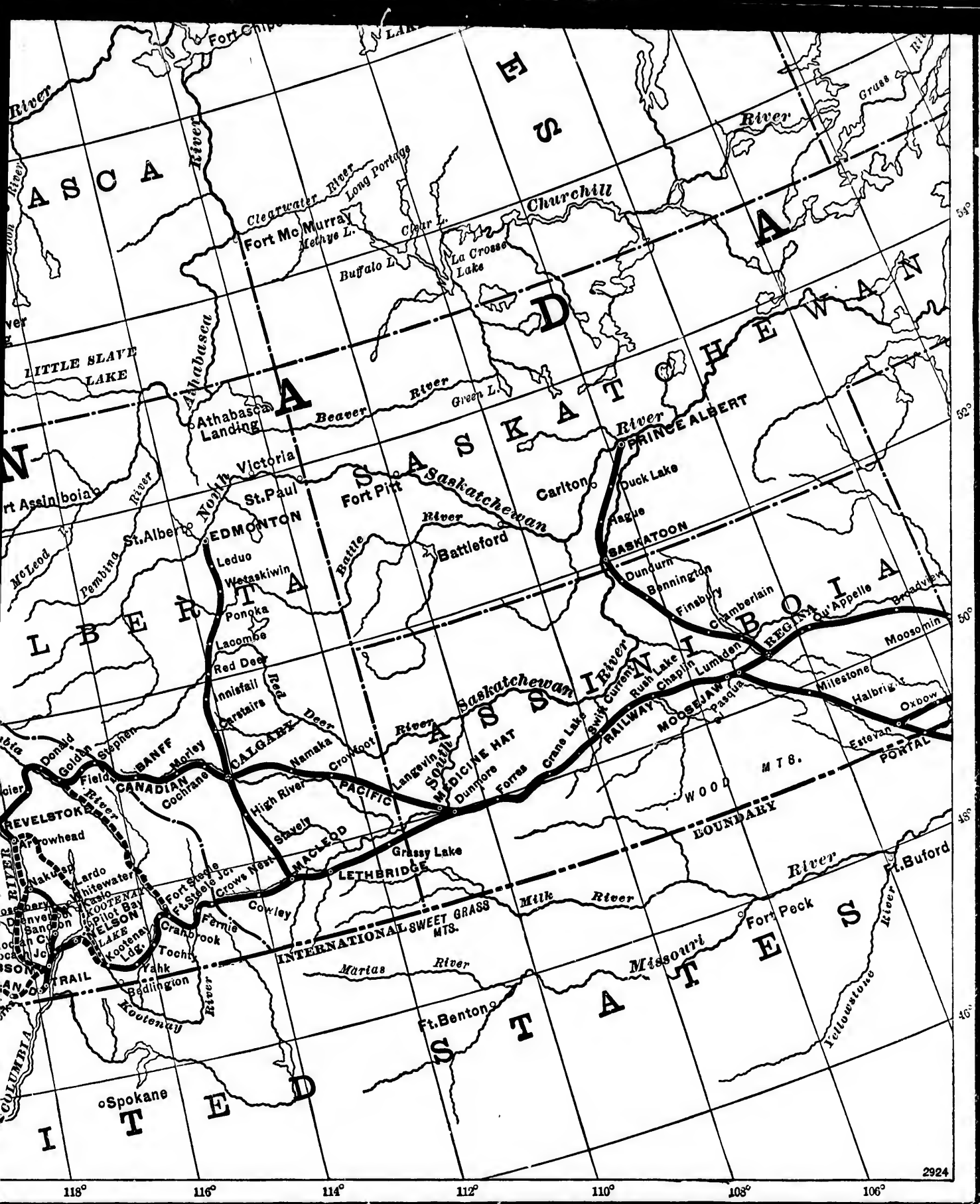
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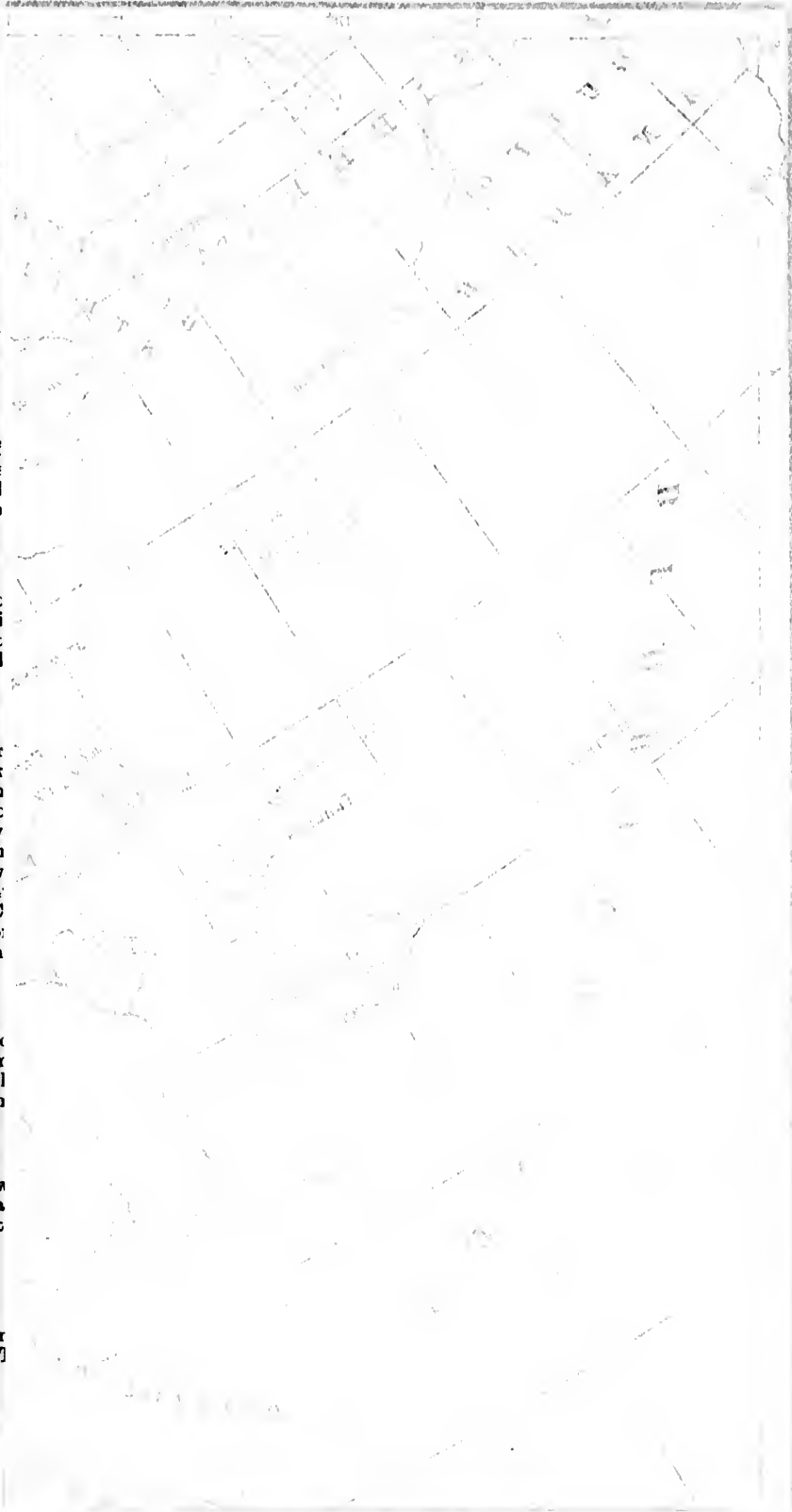
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has sent a missionary. These missionaries fully supply the needs at these points in the meantime. But a second missionary is urgently needed for Atlin, and one must be appointed to minister to the miners scattered along the gold-bearing streams flowing into the Yukon.

Permanence of Yukon Mining There seems a general consensus of opinion on the part of those better informed that the placer mining of the Yukon may last at least 100 years. There are said to be 1,000 square miles of gold-bearing gravel and sand, and it is confidently expected that long ere that is "washed out" the mother lode, from which this vast wealth has come, will be discovered. Wherever gold is found men are sure to flock, and the Church must follow the people and be prepared to make the sacrifices needed to meet their religious wants. The salvation of men's souls is first, the building up of congregations subordinate.

Class of Missionaries It should be a matter of thankfulness to God that, from all sources, the testimony is uniform as to the suitability of our missionaries for the arduous work in that trying climate, their efficiency as ministers, and the large service rendered by them to religion and humanity. Resolutions passed by congregations, lengthy notices by press correspondents, private letters, editorials in local papers, are all unanimous and unstinted in their praise.

STUDENTS' MISSIONARY SOCIETIES.

There is a Missionary Association in connection with each of the Theological Colleges in the Western section of the Church. These Associations have rendered good service to the cause of Home Missions, not only in fostering the missionary spirit among the students, but in conducting mission work in forty-three of the needier Home Mission fields, as will be seen by the following brief summary :

Montreal The society in connection with the Presbyterian College, Montreal, had missionaries employed last year in the following fields:—Commanda, etc., Rutherglen, Killaloe and Tramore, Rockliffe, all in the Province of Ontario; Lochaber, Bay and Cacouna, in the Province of Quebec. In the last named field the work was chiefly French. The receipts of the Society amounted to \$1,191.18. During the present summer the Society employed eight student missionaries and occupy the same fields as last year, with the addition of Kensington and Verdun, in the immediate vicinity of Montreal.

Queen's Under the auspices of this Association the following fields were supplied last summer:—Chelmsford, Hilton, St. Joseph's Island, Canoe Lake and Whitney in the Province of Ontario; Fairlight in the District of Assiniboia; Moyie City, and Union Bay, both in the Province of British Columbia. The receipts of the Association amounted to \$1,376. In addition, this Association contributed a portion of the salary of the Rev. Dr. J. Fraser Smith, Mhow, India. The Association, this summer, are employing eight missionaries, five in Ontario and three west of Lake Superior.

Knox This Society last summer sent out twenty-eight missionaries, five to British Columbia and the North-West, one to the Temiscamingue District and twenty-two to Rainy River, Algoma, Parry Sound, Muskoka and other districts in Ontario. The receipts amounted to \$3,111.29. During the present summer twenty-nine students are laboring under the auspices of the Society, chiefly in the fields occupied last year.

Manitoba Three fields were worked by this Association last season, one in Manitoba at Umatilla or Gilbert Plains, another at Maryfield, Assiniboia, and the third at Beaver Lake, Alberta. The total receipts for last year were \$1,219, including the amount received from the three fields supplied by the Association.

MISCELLANEOUS.

Klondike Nurses In last year's report, reference was made to an effort to secure Christian trained nurses to be sent to the Klondike, under the auspices of a committee of ladies in Toronto, in conjunction with the Home Mission Committee, and the General Assembly expressed satisfaction with the effort. Owing to a variety of circumstances, it was not deemed advisable to carry out the plan until recently. A letter was received in April from the Rev. J. Pringle, now in the Atlin district, strongly urging that two trained nurses of approved Christian character be sent to that new district, and that he had secured a suitable building for a home for these nurses. A meeting of the Executive was called, to which the Toronto committee of ladies was invited, when it was unanimously agreed to respond to Mr. Pringle's urgent request, and steps were immediately taken to secure two nurses. It is hoped that before the Assembly meets, two suitable ladies may be on their way to Atlin to undertake this work. To aid in meeting the expenses of these nurses, upwards of \$1,000 has already been collected by the ladies' committee. While the committee become responsible for the salary, outfit, etc., of the nurses, it is expected that they will receive liberal remuneration from those who may enjoy their services, so that this work may not entail a heavy financial responsibility upon the Church.

Unification of Work At last Assembly a committee was appointed consisting of representatives from both Eastern and Western sections of the Church, with instructions to consider the question of the unification of Home Mission work. This Committee of Assembly met in February last and submitted to your Committee a scheme whereby the whole Home Mission work of the Church could be carried on by one central committee, while continuing two Funds as heretofore, one for the Eastern and the other for the Western section. After full consideration, your Committee, at its meeting in March last, adopted the following resolution:—That without entering into details of the proposed scheme of unifying the Home Mission work of the Church, the Home Mission Committee of the Western section is in favor of unification in the full sense of the term as the logical sequence of the oneness of the Church from the Atlantic to the Pacific. At the same time the members of this Committee do not see their way to approve of a scheme of unification which provides for the continuance of two separate Home Mission Funds.

Klondike Missionaries At its meeting in March, the Committee resolved to place upon record its unqualified admiration of the self-denying spirit displayed by its missionaries to the Yukon, and its hearty appreciation of the admirable manner in which they have represented the Committee and the Church at large, in positions of great importance and no little difficulty; its grateful recognition of the value of the services they have rendered to the country as well as to the Church, and its thankfulness to God for all the physical and spiritual comfort they have been enabled to minister to those on whose behalf they have labored so assiduously; its deep sympathy with them in the hardships and privations they have so cheerfully undergone in the discharge of their multifarious and onerous duties, and its earnest prayer that the blessing of God may crown with a still richer measure of success the efforts they are putting forth in the same and for the cause of Christ.

A communication was received from the Home Mission Committee of British Columbia, suggesting a modification in the salaries of missionaries. After full consideration it was agreed to adopt the following scale of salaries, to take effect from April 1, 1899:—

1. *Ordained Missionaries:*

British Columbia.

Where neither house nor horse is required.....	\$725 00
Where horse, but not house is required.....	775 00

These sums to be each reduced by \$25, from the first of April, 1900.

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Manitoba and North-West.

Where house is required but not provided.....	800 00

Ontario and Quebec.

Where house is not required.....	\$650 00
Where house is provided.....	700 00
Where house is required but not provided.....	750 00

2. Students:

Six dollars and board, per week, with travelling expenses to the field, for the summer half year. \$7; with board per week, and travelling expenses to the field, for the winter half year, provided the student labors during the whole winter; this sum is to be increased to \$7.50 for Theological students.

3. Catechists:

Five dollars and board, per week, for summer; \$5.50 and board, per week, for winter; \$500 per annum for one year or term of years.

It was resolved to ask the General Assembly to appoint a small **Overlapping** committee to act in conjunction with a similar committee that may be appointed by the Supreme Courts of other Evangelical bodies, in determining the proper course to be pursued in any alleged case of overlapping in Home Mission work.

The Rev. Dr. Warden, who has been Secretary of the Committee **Resignation of Secretary** for twenty-eight years, announced that, owing to the pressing duties of his office as Agent of the Church, he would be compelled to resign the Secretaryship of the Committee to the General Assembly. He further stated that in his judgment, the time had come when some one should be set apart to do the work of General Secretary who would give a large portion of his time to the visitation of congregations in the interest of both Home Missions and Augmentation. In this connection your Committee unanimously adopted the following recommendation:

In view of the removal of the late Dr. Cochrane, the prospective **Recommendation re Dr. Robertson** retirement of the Secretary and the need of keeping the Home Mission work prominently before the whole Church the Home Mission Committee believe the present time to be opportune for making a change in the direction and oversight of the work. The Committee would therefore recommend that Dr. Robertson be relieved of the greater portion of his present duties in the superintending of individual fields, and that he be appointed Superintendent and General Secretary, to devote his time largely to the deepening of the interest in the work of Home Missions throughout the Church generally.

Your Committee desire to place upon record their cordial thanks for **British Contributions** the very generous assistance, upon behalf of the work in the North-West, received from the Colonial Committee of the churches in Great Britain and Ireland, amounting during the past year to \$2,170.45, and to many congregations and individual friends in Britain for generous assistance to the extent of \$9,740.90. The term for which contributions were promised by many congregations, etc., having expired, your Committee have been notified, in not a few cases, that these will not be renewed, so that largely increased contributions will be required from the congregations of our own Church in Canada.

The following resolutions were adopted:—(1.) That for the year beginning 1st of April, 1899, a sum not exceeding \$19,500 be granted to the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West, and a sum not exceeding \$20,000 to the Synod of British Columbia—these sums to cover the entire expenditure from the funds of the Committee (including special work among the Galicians), excepting the salary and expenses of Dr. Robertson, and the

travelling expenses of missionaries to and from their fields of labor. (2.) That these Synods, through their Home Mission Committees, be required to submit to this Committee, at its semi-annual meetings in March and October, a financial statement for the six months then ending; and accompanying this a report, on the schedules prepared by this Committee, of the work done during the half-year in the respective mission fields, with the names of the missionaries, the amounts contributed by the people, and the appropriations made by the Synods' Committees to the several fields. (3) That these Synods, through their Home Mission Committees, be instructed to submit to this Committee, on or before the 25th of April annually, a financial statement of the receipts and expenditure for the year ending 31st March, together with the annual report of the several fields, on the schedules furnished by this Committee.

The grants thus made for work west of Lake Superior are \$4,500 in excess of the grants for the preceding year. The estimated requirements for the current year are as follows:—

The following are recommended as the Executive for the ensuing Executive year:—Revs. Dr. Warden, Dr. Somerville, Dr. Robertson, Dr. Armstrong, Rev. Messrs. M. W. McLean, A. A. Scott, A. Findlay, A. Gilray and Messrs. R. Kilgour, John Penman, and Colonel McCrae.

Your Committee are gratified in being able to submit a report so full of encouragement and desire gratefully to acknowledge the good hand of God in the measure of success attained during the year. Without His blessing all else would be in vain. The receipts have been the largest in the history of the Church, amounting to \$91,683 received direct by the Treasurer, enabling the Committee to set apart in a special fund for a working balance the sum of \$20,000. It is not intended that this should be a reserve to be drawn upon in subsequent years should the necessity arise, but to be retained permanently and added to, from year to year, as a special fund, so as to render unnecessary the discounting of notes at the bank and the payment of large sums of interest annually. The great bulk of the annual contributions do not come in until the three or four closing months of the year, while the expenditure is continually going on. It is a matter, therefore, of great importance that this working balance should be added to until it reaches at least one-half of a year's revenue. Your Committee believe that the Home Mission work in the western section of the Church was never before in so hopeful and satisfactory a condition as now. This is mainly owing to increased contributions on the part of our people, and also to the much greater number of ordained missionaries engaged in the work, enabling the Committee to give *continuous* supply to a large number of mission fields which, when worked by student missionaries, were often left without service during the winter months.

At its meeting in March, applications were received from many new fields. The Committee, after full consideration, resolved to grant every one of these, thereby increasing the expenditure by \$5,500 over that of last year. This they did in the confident expectation that the Church would cordially approve and co-operate with them in providing the necessary funds.

There need be no fear that liberal contributions to this or any of the Church's schemes will cramp stipends or injuriously interfere with local work. All experience teaches us that the very opposite is the truth. Giving is a habit, and, like a child learning to walk, the more it is practised, the stronger it becomes, the easier it is to give.

Giving is a grace, and as Dr. Duff, the veteran Missionary, used often to say it is one of the grandest means connected with the process of carrying forward the sanctification of the soul.

Had we more of the Spirit's power, more faithful preaching of "Christ and Him crucified," "in demonstration of the Spirit and of power," there would be little difficulty in obtaining ample money for the Church's work. The life and growth of all our schemes depend upon the life and growth of spirituality in our congregations. The true secret of abiding success for any system of Church finance, however wisely planned, will be found chiefly and ultimately to depend upon the Church's own practical efficiency in sustaining and cultivating the moral and spiritual life of its members. If we had but a fresh baptism of the Holy Ghost, how soon would the Lord's treasury be filled to the brim. Overflowing grace would produce overflowing liberality and our people would be made to feel that in giving to God they never lose. Scattering for Him is always an increasing; giving brings a giving again.

"Is thy cruse of comfort wasting? Rise and share it with another,
And through all the years of famine it shall serve thee and thy brother;
Love Divine will fill thy storehouse, or thy handful still renew;
Scanty fare for one will often make a royal feast for two.

For the heart grows rich in giving; all its wealth is living grain,
Seeds, which mildew in the garner, scattered, fill with gold the plain.
Is thy burden hard and heavy? Do thy steps drag wearily?
Help to bear thy brother's burden; God will bear both it and thee."

All of which is respectfully submitted.

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REPORT OF THE HOME MISSION COMMITTEE, EASTERN SECTION, 1898-99.

To the Venerable the General Assembly:

The work of your Committee has been carried on in the same manner as during previous years.

In the supply of vacant charges, the Presbyteries have not drawn largely on the Committee. The roll of preachers contained several names of men left without work a large part of the time.

Of the six reported last year as on the roll, two have accepted calls and been settled, two have withdrawn, and two are still on the roll. Ten were taken on during the year, of whom one has been settled, three appointed for a time to mission charges, and six remain on the roll. These six, with the two of the previous year, make eight now ready for monthly appointments to Presbyteries, to supply their vacant congregations.

The number of missionaries placed for a year or more in mission fields, or scattered congregations that have become vacant, was large, being thirty-one, of whom twenty-four were engaged the whole year, and seven a part of the year, completing old terms or beginning new ones. These seven have all accepted calls and are now settled as pastors, five of them in the fields which they had occupied as missionaries, and two in other congregations.

Catechists employed during the summer were forty-two in number, and in the winter two. Of the former, three labored in vacant charges and four acted as assistants of settled pastors. Thirty-five groups of stations were served by these zealous and faithful young men, who are preparing for the ministry of the Gospel. Were they not available, many of our people would be left without the means of grace.

The fields in which the last two classes of laborers worked embrace over 3,000 families and more than 4,000 communicants. The additions to the communion roll during the year were large enough to make a net increase of more than seven hundred. God has honored the sowing and watering of the good seed of His word by a goodly increase. These fields paid their preachers \$19,019.10 and raised for the schemes of the Church \$2,721.24.

During the winter, Presbyteries gave some supply to their stations, from which the College Sessions called the student catechists in the fall. The Committee keep this matter before the Presbyteries, and, at their semi-annual meeting in the autumn, endeavor to secure from each Presbytery a promise that the stations shall not be left vacant. The best that can be done, however, is utterly inadequate, and the Committee will hail with joy the coming of the time when a sufficient number of ordained men can be had to supply all the groups of stations, and sufficient funds will be provided by the Church to give them a comfortable maintenance.

For the liberality of the people to this scheme the Committee are devoutly thankful. Many congregations give handsomely year by year. The Committee are solicitous that they abound in this grace more and more. There is much need.

There are some of our congregations that, in reference to this work, cannot be called *liberal*. They are niggardly—perhaps through ignorance or inconsideration—not through poverty. The Committee ask the attention of Presbyteries to the matter, and hope that repeated visitation of the negligent parties will cure the evil.

Last year the Committee reported a small balance in fund, \$12.67. This year a debt of \$627.99 rests on the work. Our receipts, which were \$13,486.33, fell short of expenditure, which was \$14,126.19, by \$640.66. This ought not to have been—would not have been, had not many neglected to consider the claims and need of money which this scheme presents.

The Committee are under obligations for the current year on account of grants made to fields having ordained missionaries, to the amount of about \$7,000. For preachers and

catechists there cannot be much less needed than last year. For removal of debt and expenses of administration \$1,100 will be required, so that the Church should furnish at least \$12,000 to leave us free from debt March 31st, 1900. Besides which, we ought to help the work in the great North-West much more largely than in the past. That new land is the common heritage of all Canadians, east and west. It is being settled at many points, and by various classes of people. These must have the Gospel or they will be a source of weakness to the country both in Church and State. Let us leaven them with the truth and save them for God and the Church, and our beloved Canada shall rise to true greatness among the nations.

Attention is asked to the information in the tables appended. They will enable the reader to answer many questions that may arise in his mind.

On the whole, the year has been one of progress, and the Committee are cheerful over the past and hopeful with regard to the future. They have a cause to care for and present to the Church, second to none in importance, and which should awaken the warm sympathy and generous support of every Christian patriot. May "God bless us and cause His face to shine upon us, that His way may be known upon earth and His saving health among all nations."

REPORT OF AUGMENTATION COMMITTEE. (WESTERN SECTION).

To the Venerable the General Assembly:

Your Committee bring you the report of the year's work with glad and grateful hearts. A year ago the prospects were somewhat dark, as our revenue had been steadily decreasing whilst the work lying to our hands was steadily increasing. Yet, trusting that the way would be opened before us, we faced a large increase in expenditure and God has honored the faith of His Church and has put it into the hearts of His people to make provision for the increase of the work. We might have known that it would be so, but, as we know, it is always hard to walk by faith and not by sight.

Now that we have seen how He has prospered us, prospered us more than for years that are past, let us thank God for this good year and let us take courage and trust Him as we look out into the coming years.

FINANCIAL RESULTS.

The revenue for the year was \$25,158.31, of which amount our own people contributed \$24,158.31, whilst \$1,000 came to us unexpectedly from British grants. The Canadian contribution was \$2,251.03 in excess of last year's, and it is gratifying that the increase has been reached by an advance in many Presbyteries of the Church and is the less likely, therefore, to be a mere spasmodic effort.

The expenditure was \$25,132.93, being considerably less than was anticipated, because Presbyteries have been more than usually diligent in visiting aid-receiving congregations and inciting them to do their utmost towards self-support. There was a favorable balance on the year's operations of \$25.38, which increases our modest reserve fund to \$3,025.54.

YOUNG PEOPLE'S FUND.

The Sabbath Schools contributed \$575.93 and the Christian Endeavor and other Young People's Societies \$416.97, in all \$992.90. The aim set before the young people has been that they should provide for the work of Augmentation in British Columbia. Next year about \$2,000 will be required in that Province and the Assembly will no doubt recommend the young people to make a vigorous effort to provide for that amount.

THE POSITION IN THE EAST.

The time has come when few changes may be expected in the older districts. The Synod of Montreal and Ottawa has many congregations that must stay with the Fund, if the Lamp of Truth is to be kept alight and there are few Missions reaching forward. The Synod of Toronto and Kingston will furnish more self-sustaining charges from the older districts. But, in the New Ontario there must be additions to our list, which will probably cause an increase rather than a decrease of our obligations in this Synod. In Hamilton and London Synod, where Home Mission work is practically completed, there will, no doubt, be a gradual decrease, as augmented congregations become stronger, and eventually self-sustaining. Let us remember that, since 1883, 232 self-supporting congregations have been passed on from the Augmented lists in these older Provinces, and it will be easily understood that the time for rapid changes has passed, and that the time when the Church may rejoice at the bringing in of so many sheaves is with us.

THE POSITION IN THE WEST.

In 1883 the West was the preserve of the Home Missions. So it has continued to be almost to the present hour. Always, your Committee looked to the day when effective help might be rendered by the Augmentation Scheme. But always poverty made the help offered small. Yet, there are nearly 60 self-sustaining congregations in the Western Synods that have been on the Augmented list, and there are 33 on our list to-day with more, very many more, if the Church will only help, ready to take their places there.

To-day the position in the West is much the same as was the position in the East from fifteen to twenty years ago—large numbers of Home Mission fields, whose growth has placed them in the position of congregations, ready for settlement. Many of them, to say the least, would make rapid progress if accorded the full status and privileges of congregations. Last year's results show this very fully. Every mission taken on the list, at once made large advance beyond its former contributions. At least four of them received such an impetus that within one year they became self-sustaining. Is it not certain that the field in which the Augmentation Scheme may henceforth render increasing service to the Church is in that great West where Home Mission work has been so grandly done during the last twenty years? Otherwise, what aim shall the Church set before herself? Shall we rest content with fostering Missions to a certain point and offer them no prospect of reaching further? Surely consolidation is the natural result of expansion. And it is certain that if the Church shall from year to year make more ample provision for the work of Augmentation in the West, then she shall reap an abundant harvest; garnered in from the Home Mission field that has been so carefully cultivated in the past.

THE NECESSITY IN ORDER TO PROGRESS.

The income of the Scheme has always been too small. But this year there has been a forward movement and that all along the line. If this indicates that the Church is awakening to the importance of consolidation, it is well. We believe that there has been an awakening and venture to point out the way forward. This year we have had \$25,000. Let us aim at a gradual increase, of say \$2,000 or \$3,000 a

year, until the recognized revenue shall be at least \$32,000, and the certainty almost is that within ten years there will be 300 self-sustaining charges in the West. We cannot expect that on our present basis. We are losing precious time. We are losing ground that we have wrought and should retain. There is everything to be gained by pressing forward now.

MATTERS TO BE NOTED BY ASSEMBLY.

1. The Committee adopted the recommendation of the Toronto and Kingston Synodical Committee: "That in cases where the annual reduction of \$50 on the grant would be too heavy to some congregations, and where yet a reduction may be reasonably expected, the grant be made on a sliding scale for a period of two or more years."

2. It was agreed to change the date of the annual meeting from the fall to the spring, beginning with 1900; the Executive only to meet in October, 1899; Synodical Committees to meet prior to the Executive meeting in October, and also prior to Committee meeting in March next.

3. The Remnant Synodical Home Mission Committee was considered: "It was agreed that while Synodical Augmentation Committees have been found advantageous, the Executive express no opinion on the remit."

4. Rev. Dr. Warden, so long the efficient Secretary of the Committee, whilst deeply regretting his determination, report the matter to the Assembly for action.

5. The Committee resolved to unite with the Home Mission Committee in recommending to the Assembly, that Dr. Robertson be relieved of the greater portion of his present duties in the superintending of fields in Manitoba, the North-West and British Columbia, and that he be appointed Superintendent and General Secretary for Augmentation, as well as Home Missions, giving his time mainly to awakening and deepening the interest of the Church in the work of both Committees, and also in co-operating with Presbyteries in securing, in Augmented charges, systematic plans of raising money for ministerial support.

6. The Executive expressed "cordial appreciation of the services of Rev. Dr. Kellock in visiting a large number of congregations in the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa in the interest of the fund." The good results of such visitation justify the wisdom of the Assembly's recommendation of last year that deputies should be sent to visit congregations to urge the claims of the Scheme.

7. It was resolved to ask the Assembly's sanction for an expenditure, not exceeding \$28,000, for the year 1899-90.

The reports of Synodical Committees, with many interesting details of the work in various fields, are herewith presented:

SYNOD OF MONTREAL AND OTTAWA.

Dr. Kellock, the Synodical Convener, who had also visited a large number of the congregations as the representative of the Assembly's Committee, reports a growing interest in the scheme. Everywhere there has been cordial co-operation on the part of pastors and Sessions, and as a result, a signal increase in contributions, the advance reaching \$1171, and the year's operations showing that this Synod, that in the past received more than it contributed, has given \$900 more than it has drawn from the Fund. Such results accentuate the value of information given to the people and the wisdom of the Assembly in sending out such a man as Dr. Kellock to supply the information.

SYNOPSIS OF THE WORK IN PRESBYTERIES.

1. *Presbytery of Quebec*—The Scheme is indispensable in the interests of evangelical religion, and has been signally blessed for the maintenance of spiritual life in a region where there is much spiritual death. Seven congregations, all struggling hard to maintain ordinances, have been sustained during the year, and notwithstanding the strain of a continual exodus, they are holding their own well.

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2. *Presbytery of Montreal*—There are nine charges receiving grants, two being at present vacant. The Presbytery has shown its interest in the Scheme by increased contributions, and through visitation of congregations grants asked have been considerably reduced.

3. *Presbytery of Glengarry*—Summerstown is now settled, a small charge, not much hope of growth. Apple Hill and Gravel Hill remain much in same condition. Glen Sandfield and E. Hawkesbury is expected to improve and grant to be reduced. Dr. Kellock's visits have given a decided impetus to the interest in the Scheme.

4. *Presbytery of Ottawa*—There are eight aid-receiving congregations enjoying somewhat large grants. There is the prospect that in some cases the drafts on the Fund may be lightened. Considerable increase in contributions.

5. *Presbytery of Lanark and Fenfrew*—There are four augmented charges, each of which illustrates some feature of the service rendered by the Scheme. (1) Elmsley, unheard of when Augmentation began, is now a well equipped congregation. Removals have checked growth but it is plucky and progressive. (2) Dalhousie was one-half of an augmented charge. The other half is now a self-sustaining congregation and the hardy settlers in rocky Dalhousie are carrying it on to the same point. (3) Eganville was carved out of a broad Mission field for progress' sake and it is progressive. (4) Douglas and Scotch Bush, carved out of the same field as Eganville is, and will likely continue to be the little one of the flock, but is doing well.

6. *Presbytery of Brockville*—The work has been varied and trying. Dunbar has been settled and is hopeful. Merrickville lost its pastor under sad circumstances and is weak. Bishop's Mills, formerly self-sustaining, has been much weakened and needs help. Athens, etc., and Westport are in good heart and both moving towards increase of contributions. Presbytery increased its contribution to Scheme.

SYNOD OF TORONTO AND KINGSTON.

Rev. Dr. Somerville, Synodical Convener, reports the following recommendations: "That it be recommended to the Assembly's Committee that in cases where the annual reduction of fifty dollars in the grant would bear too heavily on some congregations and where yet a reduction may be reasonably expected the grant be made on a sliding scale for a period of two or more years." It is further suggested "that Presbyteries and the Assembly's Committee should make more definite efforts to carry out the regulation anent small congregations by fixing the maximum stipend in such cases at \$650 and that the same should be done when a horse is not required."

SYNOPSIS OF REPORTS OF PRESBYTERIES.

1. *Presbytery of Kingston*—The Presbytery's Committee on Augmentation has pleasure in reporting substantial progress made during the year that has just closed. The following figures show results of a most gratifying kind. In the year ending March 31, 1898, there were nine congregations on the Augmentation list, and the grants paid them aggregated \$1,347. In the year ending March 31, 1899, there were seven congregations on the Augmentation list, and the grants paid them aggregated \$1,010.50. Here is a reduction in one year of \$336.50. It is not to be expected, however, that further reduction in that ratio is to be looked for, for in several cases, at least in the meantime, the maximum ability to contribute has been reached. The Presbytery's Committee would have been glad to report increased contributions on the part of the stronger congregations. Here the growth is all too slow.

2. *Presbytery of Peterboro*—There have been no changes in augmented congregations in the Presbytery of Peterboro during the past year. The work has made steady progress, and the interest has increased, as shown in more money being raised by the Presbytery than in any former year. Good results were obtained by the issue of a circular for local distribution by the Presbytery's Committee.

3. *Presbytery of Whitby*--No augmented congregation.

4. *Presbytery of Lindsay*--Good progress has been made during the past year. Sunderland and Vroomanton have been able to endure a decrease of \$50 in the grant. Cambray and Oakwood are raising \$100 more than previously. One of the Mission fields, Mindou and Haliburton, is asking to be raised to the status of an augmented charge.

5. *Presbytery of Toronto*--The work is in a fairly satisfactory condition. Contributions for the support of the Fund have been quite general, and, on the whole, reasonably liberal. We have been doing missionary work in the interest of the Augmentation Scheme wherever an opening presented itself. Last year we had eleven congregations on the Fund. Of these two have been removed to the Home Mission list; two have become self-sustaining (St. Paul's and Church of the Covenant); one has become vacant, and it is expected will not require a grant when settled; one, it is hoped, will become self-sustaining during the summer, when the present grant ceases. There are only five congregations now on the augmented list in our bounds. Two of these, Laskay and Eglinton, are preparing to make a reduction in amount asked in October next. The amount required for Dovercourt will certainly be largely decreased in October. The congregations are being visited by the Presbytery's convener, and it is confidently expected that the amount required from the Fund will be diminished one-half.

6. *Presbytery of Orangeville*--Maxwell, McIntyre, and Feversham settled since last report. Grant at present \$150. Excellent work is being done, and they expect to be self-sustaining in the near future. Laurel and Black's Corners began with a grant of \$250; it is now \$125, and the prospects are that in a year or two this charge will be self-sustaining. During that time also a manse has been built and is now nearly free from debt. Waldemar receives \$50, but hopes to be self-sustaining in a short time. Good work is being done here also.

7. *Presbytery of Barrie*--Seven charges have been receiving aid from the Fund during the year. One of these, Bracebridge, goes off the Fund in June. Two have become vacant. One of these, Banks, etc., a most important charge, which was making splendid progress under the fostering care of the Scheme, has had a bad setback by the minister accepting a call to another field after only two years' service. Last October, Angus and New Lowell, an old settled field, which had suffered greatly from removals, was put on the Fund with a small grant for one year, the Presbytery meanwhile putting forth every effort to make some rearrangement whereby it may again be made self-sustaining. All have been visited. In all cases the reports are encouraging. We hope to be able to make slight reductions in the grants asked for next October. Special care has been taken to interest all the charges to contribute to the Schemes. The convener corresponded twice with all the fields, urging liberality to the Schemes, and especially that of Augmentation. As a result better things in this direction are promised for every field in the future. Altogether, the Scheme has proved an untold blessing to many congregations in our Presbytery, and they could never have become what they are to-day but for its help.

8. *Presbytery of Owen Sound*--During the year: (1) Knox, Sydenham and Holland Centre has been settled with a grant of \$50 less than formerly. The Presbytery hopes to see an annual reduction of the grant. (2) Hepworth and Shallow Lake has also been settled, and there is a good prospect of the congregation being able to reduce the grant required. (3) Markdale and Berkeley has been doing excellent work, and the grant has been reduced from April 1st of this year by \$50 annually.

9. *Presbytery of Sauguen*--There are two augmented congregations in this Presbytery: (1) Moorefield and Drayton. Rev. Crawford Tate was settled in this charge in September, 1896. Since that time a comfortable manse has been built. The people feel greatly encouraged by the help they have received from the Augmentation Fund. (2) Beitel and East Normanby were only for a short time a mission station. Encouraged by the prospect of help from the Augmentation Fund, they called Rev. J. Gray Reid, who was ordained and inducted in December, 1898. It is expected that they will soon become self-sustaining.

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10. *Presbytery of Guelph*—Hawksville and Linwood is the only augmented charge; very weak, but being well wrought by Mr. Cunningham. Assisted by Young People's Societies of the Presbytery. Efforts being made to secure a manse.

11. *Presbytery of Algona*—We report this year, as last, four congregations receiving aid from this fund, as follows: (1) Thessalon. Under Mr. W. G. Armstrong this congregation made an advance last year. We hope they will continue in this direction, leading, by another year, to a further decrease in the amount required from the fund. (2) Webbwood. This congregation has suffered a double loss during the year—first, from the departure of very many of our families, brought about by the closing of the lumber industry for the time being, and the removal of the divisional point on the railroad. The second loss is that of their late pastor, Mr. G. E. Loughheed, who for a few years did excellent service here. The Presbytery has adopted the same plan here as in the case of Sudbury last year. They have united this congregation with the neighboring station of Massey, which, though it disarranges our mission field somewhat, produces the greater good of strengthening this settled charge. We hope to see these united congregations settled soon. (3) Tarbutt. On the 19th December last this congregation became a settled charge, under Mr. A. Y. Hartley, who had been ordained missionary on the field for a little over a year previously. (4) Sudbury and Copper Cliff. These congregations called Mr. W. J. McBean, a graduate of Knox College, '98, who was settled early in November last. Excellent work is being done in this field by both pastor and people. At Copper Cliff our people are engaged in the erection of a church, as the school house has proved too small.

12. *Presbytery of North Bay*—In this new Presbytery there are three congregations at present on the list of augmented charges. (1) Mattawa. This is one of those places that have suffered from the development of the country. A large amount of trade was formerly done here which has gone from the place through the construction of the Temiscamingue branch of the C.P.R. This has made a great change in the business of the place, many of our families being forced to leave, and none have come to take their places. This accounts for this congregation being on the fund. (2) Burk's Falls. This congregation has become for the first time a settled charge, Mr. R. J. Sturgeon being settled here in January last. There is room for development both in the village and country stations. (3) Powassan, the third congregation within the Presbytery of North Bay depending on the fund, is still a vacancy. We hope, however, to have a settlement here soon. Of the four self-supporting congregations in this Presbytery, three have enjoyed in their day the benefit of this fund. This must, except under very exceptional circumstances, as in the case of Byng Inlet, be the history of every mission field that will reach the status of a self-supporting congregation in all the mission fields throughout Northern Ontario.

SYNOD OF HAMILTON AND LONDON.

Rev. J. C. Tolmie, Synodical Convener, reports:—

That Presbyteries are increasingly careful in visiting fields before recommending grants, but that there is found to be much lack of method in the management of the temporal affairs of many of the augmented charges. To remedy this evil, it is suggested that visiting committees, and even delegates from Synodical or Assembly's Committee should suggest and set afoot proper business methods.

The number of fields under the care of the Committee is now thirty, and no great change will be made next year. But for the assistance of the Fund many of these, and even of those that are now self-sustaining, would have dwindled or died outright. As it is, many are growing stronger, and more able and willing to reach onward to self-support.

SYNOPSIS OF REPORTS OF PRESBYTERIES.

1. *Presbytery of Hamilton*—There are nine augmented congregations in the Presbytery, one of which is vacant. No decided change has taken place during the year, none of the congregations having gathered sufficient strength to stand alone. This Fund has been of untold value to us in this Presbytery, as it has enabled us to put our fields to the best possible advantage.

2. *Presbytery of Paris*—Very gratifying progress has been made during the year. Mount Pleasant and Burford were on the 31st of March removed from the list, having become self-sustaining. The grant to Delhi and Windham Centre has been reduced to \$175.

3. *Presbytery of London*—There are at present five congregations on the Fund. Application is made to have a sixth, South Delaware and Tempo, put on the list. This will come before the Synodical Committee in the fall. The fields are needy, and could not exist but for the assistance they receive from the fund.

4. *Presbytery of Chatham*—The augmented are making very encouraging progress. A year ago, Dresden became self-sustaining; the other two were reduced \$50. Last October there was another cut of \$50. It is expected that soon these will be able to stand alone.

5. *Presbytery of Sarnia*—There are at present four charges in this Presbytery receiving aid from the fund. Of these, (1) Napier and Brooke was replaced on the Fund with a grant of \$50 for one year at the annual meeting in October. It is expected that it will be unnecessary to continue this grant beyond the present year. (2) Point Edward is passing through trying circumstances, and there is no likelihood of their being able to do anything more for self-support. They will do well to hold their own. (3) Guthrie, Plum Creek and Black Creek, constitute a charge which, under energetic pastoral care, is rising from the somewhat discouraged mood into which it has fallen. A debt upon the manse property hampers somewhat, but steps have been taken during the year to have it extinguished. When this has been accomplished, a substantial reduction in the grant should be possible. (4) Marthaville, Inwood and 10th Line. This is one of the most laborious fields in the province. Three services with a drive of 34 miles over roads which at some seasons are well nigh impassible—such is the Sunday's work. There is a Church debt here also, but so admirable is the work which is being done that it ought to be possible in the near future to begin the reduction of the grant on the principle of the sliding scale. Your Committee hopes to be able to apply for a reduced grant in the case of Numbers 3 and 4 after the next annual visitation.

6. *Presbytery of Huron*—There are three augmented congregations. The changes during the year are: 1st. In the case of Leeburn and Union Church, Goderich township. Union Church has increased their part of the stipend by \$30. The grant they receive now is \$150. Arrears have been removed in the case of Leeburn. 2nd. In the case of Grand Bend, they have agreed to increase the stipend by the sum of \$50, beginning with April, 1899, so the grant asked for now by them is \$200 instead of \$250, as in the past. The 3rd congregation, Bayfield and Bethany, do well to hold their own. There is little or no opportunity for growth.

7. *Presbytery of Stratford*—Tavistock has been placed on the Fund and receives a grant of \$150. Application is made for a grant of \$200, for Moncton. This will come before the Synodical meeting in September.

8. *Presbytery of Maitland*—Three augmented congregations. Walton and Pine River have made no progress during the past year. The former has decreased somewhat through removals, and there is no present prospect of increased strength. Pine River is not likely to do more than hold its own. North Kinloss, etc., is on the point of being self-sustaining, and will, it is expected, be removed from the list after this year. The needs and value of the Scheme have been urged upon the attention of ministers and elders.

9. *Presbytery of Bruce*—There are two Stations in this Presbytery that have received aid from the Augmentation fund during the past year, viz: North Brant and West Bentinck; and Southampton. Southampton has only drawn from the Fund for the past six months and at the time a grant was sought for it, hope was expressed that at the end of two years this field would be self-supporting. The present pastor was only ordained and settled over the charge in September last; it remains yet to be seen whether these hopes shall be realized. So far as the other charge is concerned, there is little hope of its ever becoming stronger than at present. The tendency is rather to weaken owing to the frequent removal of families.

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WESTERN CANADA.

Rev. Dr. Robertson, Superintendent of Missions, reports :

In Western Canada, the Augmentation Fund is a half-way house for Missions moving upwards towards the goal of self-support. Congregations value it because it enables them to have pastors of their choice ; Ministers, because it enables them to settle down and organize for effective service ; and Presbyteries and Synods, because ensuring continuity in the personnel of Courts, and guaranteeing advancement and consolidation in the work of the Church ; and the West speaks from experience, for its 79 self-supporting charges, with few exceptions, have all been helped by the Augmentation Fund.

CONGREGATIONS VISITED.

During the past year congregations have been visited and the nature and needs of the work explained afresh. That 13 congregations, one-third of the number on the list, became self-supporting, is evidence that these visits were not in vain. The saving to the Fund effected by these removals and the lowering of other grants amounted to \$1,725 for the year. It is in getting congregations to increase the amount for stipend and so reduce the claims of the Fund, or in getting them to be self-sustaining, rather than in getting collections (although the obligation of contributing to the Fund is always urged) which may fluctuate from year to year, that western Presbyteries try most to help the fund. They impress on the people that the fund is an emergency hospital, rather than a hospital for incurables. Considering that the country is new, that people are beginning life, that Churches and Manses require to be built, it is creditable to the liberality of the people that the average per communicant for stipend is 35 per cent. in advance of that in the Presbyteries of the Eastern Synods.

RECORD FOR THE YEAR.

Last spring there were thirty-four augmented congregations in the two Synods; during the year twelve more were added ; and thirteen became self-sustaining, leaving thirty-three congregations still on the lists. In addition to the twelve put on the list, at least forty more missions were prepared to qualify under the regulations of the Committee, and assume the status of congregations, but their admission would bankrupt the Fund, and hence they must wait. To keep them waiting indefinitely is to discourage—hope deferred maketh the heart sick—arrest development and retard the growth of the Church. When will our people generally understand that Augmentation is the Senior Department of Home Mission work, and that the duly qualified pupil must be promoted if satisfactory progress is to be looked for.

HOW SETTLEMENTS EFFECTED.

Owing to distance and expense, the Ontario probationer's scheme is not practicable. To distant and isolated congregations suitable men are appointed for certain definite periods, from two to six months. Should a call result, well ; if not, a change is made till ministers and congregations are suited. With such young congregations, and so fluctuating a population, the presence of a minister in a charge is a necessity. The system, judiciously administered, works well. Where practicable, appointments are made for shorter periods.

SYNOD OF MANITOBA AND THE NORTH-WEST TERRITORIES.

In April, 1898, twenty-five augmented charges in the Synod, seven of which were vacant ; during the year eight were added and eleven removed, because self-supporting, leaving on the list twenty-two, of which eight are vacant. The removals and reductions in grants effected a saving of about \$1500 a year. Two missions, Shoal Lake and Oxbow, are calling pastors immediately, and others will follow. The average grant to congregations is \$168, and the average contribution per communicant for salary \$9.28, more than double the minimum figure required by the General Assembly. The average, last year, for the two, respectively, was \$180 and \$8.11.

SYNOPSIS OF REPORTS OF PRESBYTERIES.

1. *Presbytery of Superior*—No augmented congregations.

2. *Presbytery of Winnipeg*—Has five augmented charges. Morris and Victoria became self-sustaining last year. (1) Selkirk—Not growing, settlement stationary, spiritual life low, forty families, but only twenty-eight communicants. (2) Milbrook—Congregation vacant; good faithful work done by Mr. Dewar; reduction of \$100 in grant; soon self-supporting. (3) Dominion City—Growth encouraging, one out-station building church; congregation becomes self-sustaining in October. (4) Gretna—Situated in midst of a Mennonite community, conditions not favorable for rapid growth, but steady advance made; some seven or eight denominations represented in congregation, and yet all work harmoniously together—common sense. (5) Meadow Lea—Has just had a pastor settled, house bought for manse; all stations helping to meet cost, outlook promising.

3. *Presbytery of Rock Lake*—Has three congregations all settled. Roland and Killarney became self-sustaining last year. Killarney built a handsome and commodious stone church, costing \$5000. Finished and renovated manse. (1) Thornhill—Is growing in strength; manse costing \$1300, bought, and satisfactory payment made. (2) Crystal City—Circumscribed in territory, growth slow, good work done; debt on churches and manse being reduced, and congregation unable to advance in contributions for stipend. (3) La Riviere—Has just called a pastor, outlook favorable.

4. *Presbytery of Glenboro*—Has three augmented charges, two of which are vacant. St. Luke's became self-sustaining last year. (1) Hilton—Because a Crofter settlement, which lies near the town, requires a Gaelic speaking minister. Mr. Gollan accepted a call to Glengarry Presbytery, and congregation vacant; a Gaelic speaking graduate in charge. (2) Treherne—Prospered under Mr. Robertson, and he was called and settled, advanced from \$600 to \$800 this year; probably self-sustaining next year. (3) Cypress River—Recently placed on the list, average strength, but generous; wiped off nearly \$600 debt last autumn; good congregation for earnest pastor.

5. *Presbytery of Portage la Prairie*—The three congregations belonging to this Presbytery became self-sustaining. Rosedale, Spring-hill Station, built neat church, no debt; manse built at Rosedale; interesting congregation. Dauphin—Building a church, town growing. Franklin, Glendale Station—Moved church to central site, pastor settled, prospects bright. Macdonald, Mekiwin, Arden and Bagot should be on the list.

6. *Presbytery of Brandon*—Two augmented congregations both vacant. Douglas became self-sustaining last year. (1) Elkhorn—Owing to an unsatisfactory crop declined financially; lack of harmony in carrying on work and financial complications caused pastor's resignation; graduate in charge. (2) Bredalbane—Recently placed on list; church destroyed by a tornado in 1897; new church built; prospects good. Hoping to be a self-sustaining Presbytery soon.

7. *Presbytery of Melita*—Two congregations in this Presbytery, both vacant. By a different grouping of stations, Napinka was united to Melita, and Elva and Broomhill went to form other charges. To facilitate the carrying out of the change, Mr. Omand resigned, both Melita and Elva are now contending as to who shall secure him as pastor. (1) Melita—Greatly prospered under Mr. Omand, is steadily reducing its debt, but was kept back financially last year by a short crop. (2) Elva—A strong charge, should not remain on the list long. Arrangements made to build a handsome church.

8. *Presbytery of Minnedosa*—The two augmented charges, Birtle and Shanks, in this Presbytery were vacant at the time of the last report. Both are settled and self-supporting. Newdale, Yorkton, Binsearth and Fairmount, formerly Missions, placed on list, two have called pastors and two are vacant. (1) Newdale—Promising charge, with numbers and territory to make future sure; a happy settlement was effected last autumn. (2) Yorkton—Present terminus of the M. and N.W. Ry.,

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town growing, congregation prospering; Mr. Stirling, missionary in charge last summer deserves much credit for bringing up the congregation to a higher financial level. (3) Fairmount—Next congregation west of Minnedosa, one of the oldest settlements along the Little Saskatchewan; needs only an energetic pastor to have it speedily become self-supporting; built comfortable church last year. (4) Bins-earth—A promising congregation with room and numbers, expected to call shortly, placed on list only in March. Scheme in great favor and induces much effort on the part of the people so that they may have a settlement.

9. *Presbytery of Regina*—Three congregations on the list last year continue to increase in strength and influence. (1) Whitewood—Reduced numerically by surrendering one of its stations to form a new Mission, occupying neglected territory instead; congregation reducing debt on church and will soon stand alone; grant reduced in October. (2) Wolsley—The Moffat Station finished its stone church last year, congregation healthy, grant reduced in October. (3) Lumsden—Built comfortable brick manse and is prospering; somewhat against congregation that principal station is distant seven or eight miles from railway station.

SYNOD OF BRITISH COLUMBIA.

In the Synod of British Columbia there were nine congregations on the list last year, three of which were vacant. During the year four were added; two were removed, Revelstoke and Cumberland, because self-sustaining, leaving eleven on the list; of these five are vacant—four of the number having been put on the list only at the last meeting of the Committee. These congregations contribute at the rate of \$11.84 per communicant and require an average grant of \$213 per congregation.

SYNOPSIS OF REPORTS OF PRESBYTERIES.

1. *Presbytery of Calgary*—Has one congregation, MacLeod, and Mr. Jaffay who supplied for a time was unanimously called and settled.

2. *Presbytery of Edmonton*—Has two charges put on the list in March. (1) Innisfail—Mission organized into congregation, calling missionary who supplied previously; steady though not rapid growth; district important. (2) South Edmonton—Town growing and congregation with it; Mr. Gallup, missionary, to be called immediately; future hopeful.

3. *Presbytery of Kamloops*—Has four charges—one, Trail, recently put on the list—Revelstoke, much to its credit, became self-supporting after being on the list three months. (1) Vernon—Removed heavy debt last winter, is in good heart and hopes to bid the Fund good-bye in October. (2) Spallumcheen—Is not growing, village and settlement stationary; congregation built comfortable manse at Armstrong, cost largely provided for; no change in grant. (3) Kaslo—Congregation becoming consolidated and prospects improving; grant reduced \$50 last March and \$50 more in October. (4) Trail—Port of Rossland on the Columbia River, congregation not strong but spirited; has church and manse; vacant. The effect of having settled ministers is that congregations are strengthened and more interest is taken in the general work of the Church.

4. *Presbytery of Westminster*—Has three augmented charges, one of which was recently placed on the list. (1) Chilliwack—Recovers but slowly from effects of the disastrous flood a few years since; faithful service rendered, and improvement expected. (2) Sapperton—Congregation suffered from calamitous fire in New Westminster last autumn, reduced in numbers and financial strength; now vacant. (3) Delta—Recently placed on list; district along the Fraser near mouth; charge promising though spiritual life not active.

5. *Presbytery of Victoria*—Cumberland has become self-sustaining, leaving only one congregation on the list. St. Paul's, Victoria—Victoria has a slow growth, Vancouver capturing much of the mainland trade; this affects congregation; St. Paul's situated in Victoria West, not closely connected with rest of city, hence stagnation; faithful work done, increase in numbers and contributions; church debt being gradually removed; grant lowered about \$50 annually.

REPORT OF THE AUGMENTATION COMMITTEE, (EASTERN SECTION), 1898-99.

To the Venerable the General Assembly:—

Your Committee on the Augmentation Fund for the Eastern Section of the Church begs leave to present a statement of the work done during the year ending March 31st last, and the promises made for the current year:—

When the Committee went before the Synod of the Maritime Provinces last October to present the claims of the fund it had found, after carefully considering all applications for aid, that the sum of \$11,500.00 would be required to pay the grants in full, and cover necessary expenses of administration. It asked the Synod to endeavor to raise this amount, and that court responded as usual, by dividing the sum among the Presbyteries, to be collected from their congregations. The results were as follows:—

The Presbytery of Wallace secured a contribution from every one of its congregations, and raised more than was allotted. The same cannot be said of any other Presbytery. The number of congregations that failed to do anything is twenty-three, and those that did only partial duty number eighty-seven. This is regrettable, not only because it cut short the fund, but especially because, in the judgment of the Committee it indicates a lack of the spirit of brotherly love and helpfulness that lies at the very foundation of the scheme, and which, if thoughtfully and vigorously exercised, would make it a signal success. The Committee is constrained to lay much of the blame of this state of matters on the ministers, whose duty and privilege it is to imbue the minds of their people with a sense of the obligations under which they lie to the whole body of Christ. With very few exceptions, when ministers are deeply interested in this scheme of brotherhood, their people catch the enthusiasm, and contribute worthily to aid the weak charges to support ordinances and enjoy the privileges of a settled ministry.

The total receipts for the fund were \$9,826.83—less than asked for by \$1,673.17. But all the congregation were not settled the whole year. Thirteen were vacant a part of the time, so that the full amount was not required. Still there was a deficit, and, to make expenditure tally with receipts, twelve dollars had to be taken from every charge settled during all of the year, and a proportionate amount from each settled during a fraction of the year. The Committee deeply deplors the necessity of making this reduction, but they had no alternative. It paid out \$9,844.17, being \$17.34 more than the receipts, and therefore a reduction of the reserve or working balance to that extent.

The applications for aid during the current year number fifty-five: The Committee agreed to give grants to forty-eight aggregating \$8,695.00, and deferred the remainder in order to get more information concerning them, and thus be in a better position to deal with them in the fall; for which permission is hereby asked of Assembly.

There are a few cases presented in the schedules that must be classed as special, but the Committee is convinced that they deserve the grant, and therefore asks Assembly to confirm the Committee's action.

Four congregations that last year sought aid have now become self-supporting, viz., Habror Grace and Elmsdale and Nine Mile River, in the Presbytery of Halifax; Pughwash, in the Presbytery of Wallace; and Loggieville, in the Presbytery of Miramichi. These added to the twenty-eight reported last year make thirty-two congregations that have been nursed to a degree of strength sufficient to stand alone by the generous help of this fund. Thus the Church grows by wisely caring for the weak members of the flock.

The aided congregations have also advanced in their self-support during the past year to the extent of \$495. This is a fruit of faithful visitation by Presbyteries, whom the Committee commends for their diligence, and urges to increased activity in the same line in the future. If Presbyteries can show their strong congregations that the aided ones are yearly increasing in payment of stipend, the Committee believes there will be a cheerful response to a call for a reasonable sum to help them, and few congregations will then begrudge the amount asked for this fund.

It is hoped that \$10,500 will cover the demands this year, and surely our section of the Church can be depended on for this amount.

The Committee while regretting that it has not been able to pay grants in full, yet upon the whole after taking everything into consideration has reasons for thankfulness and encouragement to go forward in its efforts to efficiently maintain this department of the Church's work. Considering, however, that neither the Home Mission nor the Augmentation Fund has reached high water mark—that the total sum raised for both schemes falls short of the amount raised for the Foreign Mission Fund, we cannot help but call attention to the disproportion, and sound a note of warning, lest the structure which we are building become top heavy. We must enlarge our basis or the outside responsibilities will become too burdensome.

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HURON PRESBYTERY.

The French work is encouraging. Mr. Carriere reports "regular attendance of Roman Catholics at the Sunday services and of their children at the S. S. and Y. P. S. C. E. Others have done the same and are now members of our Church, and we hope to see their example followed in the near future."

PRESBYTERY OF ALGOMA.

The field is vast and instead of one French missionary who has to give part of his time to English work, there should be two or three. Mr. Pelletier writes:—"French-Canadians are coming in by the thousand, not only from Quebec but from Michigan and New England. It was a great disappointment that no French student could be got this year to help push our work as vigorously as possible."

PRESBYTERY OF GLENGARRY.

Mr. J. E. Charles, whose faithful labors were so successful in this field, resigned in September in order to take charge of a mission among his Belgian compatriots in Pennsylvania. Mr. J. H. Paradis, late of Lowell and formerly a minister of our Church, has been appointed and begun work at Cornwall with every prospect of success.

PRESBYTERY OF NORTH BAY.

Ville-Marie (Lake Temiscamingue)—This growing French colony is on the Quebec side of the lake. Mr. H. Joliat, student, was well received by the people and distributed religious literature and many copies of the Scriptures. Some of the priests called on him at the house of one of the settlers but would enter into no discussion. They began at once to denounce him as "a wolf" and ordered the people to put him out if he offered any of his bad books for sale. As a result the doors were closed against him and for two days he had to live on blueberries and sleep outside, when a family took him in. He discovered later that many New Testaments had been burned, but not all, "for," said some of the people, "We still have them because we said nothing about them."

PRESBYTERY OF OTTAWA.

St. Marks, Ottawa.—The faithful preaching of the Word finds willing hearers. There is progress. Additions from Rome are more than offset by removals of Protestant families. The pastor says, "The congregation continues generous, and spiritual life and power are developing among our families. The finances are improving and satisfactory. The S. S. shows a decrease."

Hull—Mr. J. Demole, student, labored during the summer but with small success. It is a hard field.

Masham—Mr. St. Germain's faithful labor is producing good results. The school was taught by Miss Alice Doyle, who was also very helpful in the work of the mission.

L'Ange Gardien and Perkin's Mills—By patience and fidelity, Mr. J. B. Sincennes has established himself and his work in the confidence of the community. The future is promising. The school at Perkins' Mills was taught by Miss J. Condie (now Mrs. J. Sincennes), an English speaking young lady of high educational and missionary qualifications, and with excellent results.

Namur and G. Lac—Mr. J. E. Cote continues to be encouraged in his work especially at Namur, where a new church is being erected for which the people are doing liberally. The Namur school was taught most successfully during the summer by Miss A. Steele, B. A., an English speaking young lady of superior qualifications. She was succeeded by Mme. C. A. Favler. The Grand Lac school was conducted by Mlle. E. Drainville, a Pointe-aux-Trembles scholar.

Monte Bello—Mr. C. Lapointe, student, labored faithfully, overtaking as best he could work at Monte Bello, Papineauville, N. Nation, Gore, Ripon, Portage and St. Andre, as so many missionary centres in this large district.

Desert—Mr. N. McLaren ministers to English and French scattered over an immense area. He is supported by the H. M., B. of F. E. and the Lumberman's Mission. In the lumber shanties his visits are appreciated by hundreds of French Canadians to whom he preaches the gospel.

PRESBYTERY OF MONTREAL.

L'eglise St. Jean—The debt which one year ago threatened to crush this congregation, has happily been greatly reduced by the efforts of the pastor and people and assistance of friends. Dr. Amaron's energies have been taxed to the uttermost. He reports more Roman Catholic doors open to him than he can possibly enter. The Sunday and week evening meetings are largely attended. The W. M. S. is active and the S. S. and Y. P. S. C. E. growing.

The Mission school was in charge of Mme. Chabassol, who labored faithfully in the school and the homes of the pupils.

Lacroix—Mr. Ducloux has been encouraged by growth in numbers and in spiritual earnestness among the people in spite of great fluctuation of families. The S. S. is prosperous and the prayer meeting well attended. Better organization has been effected and the outlook is cheering. Mr. J. H. Watier has done satisfactory work in the mission school and good missionary work outside.

St. Jean Baptiste (Dufferin St.)—Substantial progress has been made. Mr. Brunan has been encouraged by increase in attendance and number of families. Steps have been taken towards better organization which will be helpful. In the mission school excellent work has been done by Miss Perside Bourgoin.

St. Henri—Mr. C. F. Cruchon, student, worked diligently in this field without being able to gather many into the Mission Hall. It was largely a house to house work. The missionary was well received on every hand but here as in many other places the fear of man keeps the people away from the gospel.

The mission school was closed because of fluctuation of the pupils.

St. Charles St. Mission—Is supported conjointly by St. Paul's church, Montreal, and the Board of F. E. Mr. Doudiet conducts services in English and French on Sabbath and during the week. Mr. D. reports 45 French families open to him for Scripture instruction and prayer. This is most important missionary work. The S. S. is large and the French classes are taught by the missionary and the missionary teacher, Miss C. Gatignol, whose zeal and devotion are taxed to their limit in the mission school.

St. Hyacinthe—There has been marked progress. The debt on the manse has been reduced. If it were not for this and \$300 raised by the people, apart from \$600 taxes, for the support of the school, this congregation would be self-supporting. Mr. Boudreau has gathered and trained a band of good workers.

Chambly Canton—Mr. Boy is missionary and teacher and his house is both church and school. Until a suitable building is provided the results of Mr. Boy's work will not be seen. A site has been secured and about \$400 collected for a building but an additional \$400 at least will be required.

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New Glasgow—The work has been pushed with energy and wisdom and Mr. Vernier is giving visibility to evangelical christianity and winning for it general respect.

Belle Riviere—In this large field where the Protestant families are widely scattered, Mr. Menard is quietly winning over to the truth of the gospel many of his former co-religionists.

Lachute—Mr. I. Matthieu, the oldest missionary on the field and one of the few remaining pioneers, has been greatly cheered by the number of Roman Catholics attending his meetings, some of whom have accepted the truth.

Grenville—The union of the English congregation in the village with this field has proved satisfactory. Good work has been done and Mr. Lods has already won the confidence of the community. The mission school was taught up till July by Mlle. C. Lamert and then transferred to the Board of School Commissioners.

Arundel and Desalaberry—Last year the French and English work were united and Mr. Beuchamp, ordained missionary, placed in charge. French Protestantism has been cheered and encouraged and a fresh hope and activity imparted to English Presbyterianism throughout the district. The French mission school was transferred to the Board of School Commissioners.

Lachine—Mr. L. Bonnenfant, missionary colporteur, did excellent work on the canal and in the district. Cottage meetings were held with good results. He received valuable assistance from Mr. C. B. Ross, pastor of St Andrew's church, and from members of Session and Y. P. S. C. E. It is hoped that very soon a suitable place for meetings and a reading room will be provided.

St. Jerome—Mr. Pelletier, student, visited all the settlements along the C. P. R. as far as Labelle and beyond to La Lievre. On the whole he was well received and often gladly. He sold many copies of the Scriptures and distributed much literature.

Vaudreuil—Mr. W. Touchette and J. A. E. Dubuc, students, colported both sides of the Ottawa river as far west as Pt. Fortune. They held many meetings and sold a large number of copies of the Scriptures.

St. Philomene—Mr. Ag. H. Tanner, student, worked in the district and held meetings regularly at Ormstown, St. Louis and latterly at Valleyfield, where he went to assist Mr. J. E. Duclos, pastor of the Presbyterian church, in the French services begun by him. The outlook is bright.

Joliette—Ours is the only Protestant church in the town. The services are in English and French. A new church is to be built next summer for which the people have contributed liberally. The balance required is being collected by the pastor, Mr. L. R. Giroux. St. Elizabeth and St. Gabriel are supplied from Joliette at present. J. H. Watier labored as colporteur for part of the summer at St. Gabriel.

Italian Mission (Montreal)—Mr. V. di Genova, a native of Italy and educated at Pointe aux Trembles and the Presbyterian College, Montreal, has labored as ordained missionary among his fellow countrymen whose numbers are increasing, faithfully and successfully. The services and S. S. are held in the basement of St. John's church (French). During the winter he had charge of a day school and also a night school for young men.

QUEBEC PRESBYTERY.

Quebec City—Progress has been made and the outlook much improved. The work suffered somewhat during the winter in Mr. Rondeau's absence, he having accepted an appointment from the Board to visit congregations in Ontario in order to present the claims of the work. The supply given by Messrs. P. Boudreau and Mosseau was most satisfactory. Mr. Rondeau supplied Lorette and also Bourg St. Louis occasionally during the year.

Bible Woman—Miss Ratti has been very active and devoted in her efforts among the people especially the poor. She has brought cheer and comfort to many suffering in body and soul.

La Jeune Lorette—The results of Mr. Tsiegei's work among his people the Huron Indians, of whom he is a sub-chief, are being seen. The meetings held in his house have been largely attended and a mission school has been asked for by the people.

Ste. Sophie—The removal of three Protestant families has been sorely felt by the missionary, Mr. E. Curdy, and the two families that remain as well as by others whose sympathies and convictions are on the side of evangelical truth. The ingathering apparently so near is thus deferred. The worker toils on assured that "in due season" he will reap.

Kinnear's Mills congregation, (Mr. J. M. Whitelaw, pastor), continued its practical interest by paying one half of the missionary's salary as in past years.

Ditchfield—Mr. M. W. Byron, student, did good work during the summer. The future is promising. A second school has been opened and it is to be hoped that both will be self-supporting.

Ham Nord—The work of Mr. Jean Rey, student, was appreciated both as missionary and teacher. A large family from Rome united with the Mission. The church has been paid for. The coming summer the field will be worked with St. Sophie and a teacher provided for the school.

St. Francis District—Mr. T. Charbonnel worked with much energy and supplied six places regularly during the summer. In the fall he removed to the United States. A colporteur continues work in the field.

Port au Persil, etc—Little change in this field. The young people leave as they grow up. The majority of the Protestants speak only French while they bear Scotch and English names. The field was occupied last year by Mr. J. E. Menancon, Licentiate. Miss Janeway, of New York, and other summer residents at Murray Bay, aided the people of Port au Persil and the work by contributing about \$120 to help put up a mission building. The school at Port au Persil was taught by Miss Lillie McLaren and that at Riviere aux Canards by the missionary for part of the summer.

Lac St. Jean—Many settlers have gone into this district which is promising for the work of evangelization. Mr. Menancon did good work here.

Chicoutimi—Mr. J. L. Campbell, B. D., is missionary and teacher. The small Protestant community is English and French. The Board makes a small grant to school. The work and influence of Mr. and Mrs. Campbell are telling immensely for evangelical Christianity.

Cacouna—Mr. L. Abram, student, was supported in this field by the Students' Missionary Society of the Presbyterian College, Montreal. The following extract is taken from its annual report:—"In the beginning of May I began work at Cacouna, intending to continue there until the roads would be passable; but I was invited by the Catholics of St. Cyprien, thirty miles away, to come over and help them. After a whole night's journey in the forest, I arrived at the place, and found the people in a turmoil over a difficulty they had with their Bishop, a difficulty which had existed for six years. They had asked for a church, but had not obtained their request. The people were now in a position to study, or at least to read the Bibles that Mr. Brandt and myself had left there some years before. The priest had ordered them to burn all the books they had received from us. A few, however, escaped the fire, and had been as a candle in that dark place. It was my work to try to increase and intensify that light. Forty men were present at my first meeting. Three of these took copies of the Scriptures which I gave them. Gradually the women, reassured that I was not an infidel, or a railer at the priests, began to attend the meetings too. The work advanced apace. Rev. Mr. Brandt and myself

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built a small chapel, and we were assisted in our meetings by Rev. Mr. Bourgoïn, Principal of Point-aux-Trembles schools. It was gratifying to see the eagerness with which they were seeking the light, yet we cannot expect them to become models of light and truth, seeing these precious boons had been denied them so long. One case will illustrate the integrity of converts to the Gospel from those whom Rome has made her tools and slaves. A farmer, with eight children, had received us five years before, and for his hospitality the priests instigated his creditors to demand payment of his debts. As a result the poor man was driven from his home. We are glad to state, however, that he started again, and is succeeding well. The poor man said to me, 'Who will ever know how much I have cried over my bitter lot, knowing it was only because I had received the missionaries of Jesus Christ into my house?' The people are astonished at our spirit—the spirit of charity for even our enemies, the priests—and are constrained thereby to question the veracity of their priests, who compelled them to accept teachings which neither our Bible nor their own contained. A certain priest was offered ten dollars to meet me publicly in discussion, but declined. This same priest compelled a man of St. Cyprien to throw his Bible into the fire, promising to give him another. When the man compared this Bible (edition of Baillargeon) with one he still kept in secret, he found they were alike, and was convinced that the priests are deceivers, or ignorant of what they affirm. It is difficult to imagine how deeply the principles of Jesuitic morality are rooted in some of those hearts. One man said to me: 'When a man has to lie, he has only to make the sign of the cross, and there is no sin in the lie.' It is gratifying to note that three boys from St. Cyprien and two young people from Cacouna came with me to the schools at Point-aux-Trembles, and also that the people sent a vote of thanks to the French Board for the services of their missionaries, and requested that another be sent to them for the winter. Accordingly, Mr. Menancon was sent. They subscribed \$36 to his salary, and offered to subscribe toward the salary of a lady teacher. At Cacouna, at the Communion service, twelve persons were present, seven of whom partook of the Lord's Supper."

St. Cyprien—Occupied regularly for the first time last summer by Mr. Abram. Mr. Menancon succeeded him, and has continued a most interesting and promising work.

Nicolet—Mr. J. A. E. Dubuc, student, a native of the parish, and a former scholar in the Roman Catholic College of the place, has been laboring here with remarkable success since last January. A fellow-worker will be sent to help him soon.

MIRAMICHI PRESBYTERY.

Rev. E. Brandt did a colportage work four months around the Baie de Chaleur. Mr. Brandt states that nowhere in the Province of Quebec has he met French Canadians so unenlightened and so attached to their clergy as in the county of Bonaventure. "I tried to preach the Gospel of grace, and when one does speak of that in its simplicity and beauty, one is always listened to. . . . It was my experience also, that the persons whom I found most accessible to the influence of the Gospel were those I met in the humblest and poorest dwellings. Always under the roof of the poor man could I read a chapter of that Gospel, which would remain as an influence after the missionary had gone. . . . Never before did I understand so well how Jesus was always the friend of the poor and was not ashamed of his lowly birth. . . . The few scattered English speaking Protestants are as pillars of truth and exemplify the truth, that the Gospel brings peace and joy and prosperity even in this lifetime."

PRESBYTERY OF. ST JOHN.

Edmundson, Grand' Isle, Ste. Agathe and St. Leonards have been regularly supplied by Mr. L. R. Bonchard whose work and influence are felt and appreciated. Apart from some twenty English Protestant families at Edmundston, representing several denominations, the field is French and Roman Catholic.

Connors, etc.—This field was supplied for four months and a half by Mr. A. G. Rondeau, student, who worked with much encouragement until sickness forced him to leave. The Board paid one half of the salary.

FIELD REPORTS.

A few random extracts from recent reports of workers will give some idea of their methods and surroundings :—

OPEN DOORS.

“During the month I visited ninety-two Protestant, thirty French and forty-eight English Roman Catholic families. The visits were in all instances but one thankfully received. The exception was when the landlady (Irish Roman Catholic) of a sick Protestant tenant walked in at the close of the visit to scold her tenant for admitting a Protestant minister into her house.”

THE GOSPEL FOR THE POOR.

“This month I visited the above mentioned districts and met with much encouragement on the part of the colonists, many of whom are very willing to accept the word of God. It is especially these poor people who are settling in the bush without money and without sufficient food that have greatest need of consolation and encouragement. How many times I have gone into a wretched little shanty to buy a loaf of bread and the almost unvariable answer has been, ‘We have no bread.’ Ah, it is especially in these humble homes that I like to rest, in order to revive their hopes and courage at the fountain of living water, and to soothe their wounds with oil and wine of the Gospel.”

THE PEOPLE WILLING.

“I have had many conversations with Roman Catholics this month and could speak the truth to them in all liberty and freedom. In one house we were five, and for four hours I unfolded to them the Gospel. In another house we were twenty-five, and from 8 to 11 p.m. we were comparing the Bible with their Romish doctrines, and they have invited me to come again. I have in my visits discovered that poverty keeps many from our services.”

A PERVERSE PARISHONER.

“I visited some of the families who bought Bibles from our colporteur, who passed this way, and are reading them. One man who had bought a New Testament was soon afterward visited by the priest and told to burn that ‘Protestant book.’ ‘Sir,’ said B—, ‘I bought and paid for that volume and I mean to read every word of it or my name is not B—.’ The good priest flattered and threatened, but my man is still reading and is seemingly not far from the Kingdom.”

EVIDENCES OF ENLIGHTENMENT.

“It is a pleasure to note in these parts that the people are becoming more and more enlightened respecting the Word of God. We were visiting a family living at V—, and they told us that their priest had preached against us, and told the people to put us out without delay and not to read our bad books. ‘But,’ said the lady of the house, ‘so long as a man comes in here, explaining his business and seems honest, I will listen to him and encourage him.’ I have been encouraged also by hearing so many Roman Catholics here say that the Protestants have a good faith and must surely be saved. . . . How careful we Protestants should be as representatives of the true faith!

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"As we go from place to place and village to village, it is a pleasure to see how gladly some receive the Gospel promising to read it attentively, although they know their priest forbids it. Others are indifferent, and others say they have no need of these books. In the evenings we have often chances to sing and read and pray with the people."

INQUIRERS NOT ENCOURAGED.

"I have been able to have some meetings with several Roman Catholics who are well disposed and will listen to me. A work of emancipation is going on in these people and many of them are seeking light regarding the truths of the Gospel. . . . During my conversations with them some of them proposed that we should go to the priest to talk the matter over with him. Having been very well received at first, I was shown the door after the few first words of discussion and my poor Roman Catholic friends withdrew, very much ashamed for having brought me to be treated in this way by their good pastor."

THE TEACHERS TAUGHT.

"During this month I have had some hard discussions with women who were school-teachers before their marriage. They are of course regarded as the learned people, as you know, in our Canadian parishes. So their husbands, who are usually not learned at all, leave everything in their hands, and when they want to know any question they refer to their wives.

"After explaining a point to one of these ladies, she answered that it was not the same in her Catechism. 'Oh,' I exclaimed, I know it, but your Catechism is not the word of God, it is only the word of man and made by the bishops.' She became furious at once, and seizing a chair and directing it at me, exclaimed, 'Get out, pagan!' I said, 'Please wait a moment, madam, and let me explain, don't get excited, you might become ill.' Her husband sat looking on without saying a word. 'Remember, dear madam, that the difference between a pagan and you and me is very great; but, it is greater between him and me than between you and him. I worship and adore God only, whilst you worship and pray to the Virgin, the Saints and things called 'Relics,' and God says that He is the only one that must be worshipped and adored. Think of it, madam, and please accept this book from your best friend and read it every day. In it you will find the laws of God and our Saviour, Jesus Christ.' She accepted the book and I went on my way. Another woman, who had been a teacher also, said during a discussion: 'The Protestants do not have these Sacraments (Baptism and Lord's Supper).' 'How is that, Madam,' I replied, 'you are learned and you say things like that. The Protestants have them and they observe them as directed by the Saviour.' I sold her a New Testament.

"The most regrettable and saddest thing is, this lack of enlightenment on the part of the people. The aim of true Christians must be to teach these people."

MISSION SCHOOLS.

The open Bible and the Public School must ever be the safeguards of civil and religious freedom. The established policy of the Board is to open Mission Schools in localities where French protestants are too few or too poor to organize themselves according to the School Code of the Province. In many places these schools are a great benefit to scattered English Protestant families, and in almost every one of them a large proportion of Roman Catholic children are to be found. The funds of the Board are altogether inadequate to provide either buildings or furniture, so that these are often about as unsuitable and primitive as it is possible for them to be. The teachers as a rule come from the central mission schools at Pointe Aux Trembles, and carry with them the missionary spirit and methods of that institution, which in return often receives the most advanced and intelligent pupils of the rural mission schools. The Board has aimed at helping these schools reach the status of self support so as to become permanent educational forces. The result of its work in this respect is attested by the following list of schools at one time aided by it, but now under the control of the school Commissioners or Trustees of the several municipalities, viz., St. Hyacinthe, Joliette, Monte Bello, L'Ange Gardien, A.agers No. 2, St. Anne, East Templeton, Grenville No. 10, Ditchfield, Perkins, Harrington.

POINTE-AUX-TREMBLES MISSION SCHOOLS.

THE PRINCIPAL'S REPORT OF SESSION 1898-99.

It is with a feeling of deep gratitude towards our Heavenly Father that we come to draw the attention of the supporters of our Schools to the encouraging results of the past session.

Two hundred and fifty-one applications for admission were sent to us last fall. Ninety-seven boys and seventy-three girls have been admitted into the school. Among them ninety were children of Roman Catholic parents.

The attendance has been as large as can be desired, considering the accommodation, and this session has certainly been one of the most successful ever held.

The conduct of the more advanced pupils has been remarkably good. All those of the fifth class have obtained one hundred marks out of one hundred for their good behavior.

The influence of such a class of young christians over their younger companions is very great and contributes largely to their moral progress as well as to the general discipline of the school.

The religious progress of our pupils has been most encouraging. Long cherished errors and superstitions have been given up for ever. Broader views take the place of their wrong or narrow conception of things, and gradually they come out of the night of ignorance and with joy they smile at the pure light of the truth shining on their path.

Twenty-six of our young men and women have given their hearts to Jesus, and have joined the Church after confessing openly His name. On the 26th of March, when the Lord's Supper was dispensed, seventy members of the Church sat at the Lord's table in our chapel.

Among those who were converted to Christ was an intelligent young girl who came to school last fall for the first time. N. D. belongs to a Roman Catholic family, but one of her sisters was converted at Pointe-aux-Trembles a few years ago. This sister, in spite of the hostility of her parents, used to write to them frequently inviting them to read the Bible, and to compare its teachings with those of the priest. The mother read her letters secretly to her father but carefully concealed them from the children. During the absence of her parents, N. D., having found her sister's letters, read them all with the greatest surprise, and she felt since that day a great desire to go to see her. At her first opportunity she came to Pointe-aux-Trembles and during three days she used every means in her power to bring her back to the Church of Rome. All her efforts were in vain, and at last she began to read the Bible in the absence of her sister. She had been told that the Bible is a most dangerous book, the source of heresy and infidelity, and great was her surprise when she found in its pages the teachings of Jesus and the story of the Cross.

A few months after she was going home when a friend warned her that her parents, informed of her relations with her sister, had taken steps in order to lock her up in a convent. Our young friend took refuge in a Protestant family, where she continued to read the Bible, and last fall she came to school and accepted Jesus as her only Saviour.

The intellectual development of our pupils has never been pushed on more vigorously than this year, and the result of our teachers' work has been most gratifying as well among the beginners as among the more advanced.

Thirty-three pupils who came to us last fall unable to read, could read fluently and write pretty well when they left the school.

The activity and the ambition of our pupils have been greatly stimulated by the monthly examination of every class by a committee appointed by the Board of

French Evangelization, and also by the encouragements given by the Association of the former pupils to those who distinguished themselves in their studies. This year the Association has contributed \$40.00 for prizes and \$50.00 for books.

Seven of our pupils have left lately to go and work in various parts of our missionary field as colporteurs and teachers, and eight of our young men are studying with a view to the ministry of the Church.

Last fall it was decided to replace river water by well water. A well was sunk which has proved far superior for abundance and quality to all that could be expected.

Our staff of teachers was composed of Miss L. Haddow, Directress of the Girls' School, who was ably assisted by the Misses A. Betrix, E. Bourgoïn and A. Molleur, all former pupils of Pointe-aux-Trembles. In the Boys' School, Mr. Brandt, who continues to take charge of the more advanced classes, was seconded by Mr. H. Chodat, a young teacher from Switzerland.

The session was closed, as usual, at the end of April, by a public examination, at which were present a large number of friends of the Schools who expressed their high satisfaction at the results of the work accomplished this year.

We could not close this brief report without expressing our heartfelt gratitude to all the supporters of our Mission Schools who individually or collectively have provided for our material wants so generously that we have been able to end this session free from debt.

MISCELLANEOUS.

DEATH OF FATHER CHINIQUY.

In the month of January last, in his 90th year, the Rev. Charles Chiniquy, D.D., passed to his reward. Rich, intellectual endowments, rare eloquence, childlike simplicity, strong sympathy, and indomitable will, combined to make him the unique and outstanding personality he was. For twenty-five of his fifty years lived in the Church of Rome he was an active and honored priest, having received special marks of distinction from the Pope and the Government of his country.

His forty years in the Presbyterian Church were marked by burning zeal and apostolic labors for the dissemination of the Bible among his French fellow-Canadians, and their emancipation from the bondage of Rome, which by experience he knew so well. Throughout America, Britain and Australia he has been heard as the powerful exponent and valiant champion of personal and religious freedom. His many literary works have been translated into several European languages. He rests from his labors and his works follow him.

TRANSFER OF THE CHINIQUY MISSION.

In his last will and testament the late Rev. C. Chiniquy, D.D., directed his son-in-law and sole executor (Rev. J. L. Morin, M.A.) "to employ all his energy, piety and wisdom in maintaining the advance post of our Christian forces in the parish of St Roch des Aulnets, L'Islet County, District of Quebec. . . . That after the decease of my son-in-law this work be placed under the direction of a committee composed of the Principal of the Presbyterian College, Montreal, the Pastor of Erskine Church, Montreal and the Pastor of L'Eglise St. Jean, Montreal."

After consultation with the parties interested and concerned, Mr. Morin came to the conclusion that the will of the late Dr. Chiniquy could be best carried out by the Board of French Evangelization, and proposed to transfer the Mission to the

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Board. The proposition was carefully considered and afterwards accepted. The transfer has been legally executed, and the following joint circular to the public issued:—

In the name of the Executor of the late Father Chiniquy and of the Board of French Evangelization of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, we hereby inform the public, and especially the friends of Father Chiniquy, that all the missions carried on by him during his lifetime have been transferred to said Board, and will be continued under its management.

It is deemed most important that there should be continued and strenuous effort in furthering the aims of this great man's life, and, therefore, it is earnestly requested that all contributions and bequests for the support of said missions be forwarded to the treasurer of the Board, the Rev. Dr. Robt. H. Warden, Confederation Life Building, Toronto, Ontario, Canada.

MISSIONARY INFORMATION.

During the year there were no special appeals. Active workers and the public press were made use of to inform the Church, as far as possible, regarding the nature and requirements of this great mission. The results have been gratifying.

A large number of congregations, Sabbath Schools, and Christian Endeavor Societies in the Presbytery of Hamilton, were addressed by the Rev. Dr. Amaron, of Montreal; and in the Presbyteries of Toronto, Paris and London, by the Rev. S. Rondeau, of Quebec.

Four papers were published during the year, and had a very wide circulation through the columns of the *Presbyterian Record*, and in pamphlet form. The first, *A Missionary's Reasons*, was prepared by the Rev. M. F. Boudreau, of St. Hyacinthe; the second, *French Evangelization*, by the Rev. E. F. Seylaz, of Ottawa and Hull; the third, *The Pointe-aux-Trembles Schools*, by the Rev. S. Rondeau, B.A., of Quebec; and the fourth, *The French Protestant Movement*, by the Rev. C. E. Amaron, D.D., of Montreal.

FINANCES.

The receipts for the year for the Ordinary Fund were \$5,207 in excess of those of the preceding year. This was owing mainly to bequests. There was also received from the Estate of the late Mr. Robert Anderson, Montreal, \$2,250, which was put into a special fund, because, according to the terms of the will, only the interest is available from year to year. As will be seen from the accompanying financial statement, \$3,330 were received from Britain. The revenue for the Pointe-aux-Trembles Schools is also considerably in excess of that of the preceding year. Cordial thanks are tendered to the friends in Britain as well as to the Congregations, Sabbath Schools, and Christian Endeavor Societies, etc., in connection with our own Church for liberal support on behalf of the work.

SUMMARY.

Moral and spiritual results cannot be tabulated. It is upon them, however, that stress must be laid, and not upon figures, however instructive and encouraging.

During the year 36 mission fields, with 95 preaching stations and 13 colportage districts were occupied by 29 ordained missionaries and licentiates, 17 colporteurs, evangelists and students, and 18 missionary teachers, a total staff of 64. The average Sabbath attendance was 2314; the number of families 1019, and single persons 267; Sabbath school scholars, 10,91; attending prayer meeting, 896. 1653 copies of the Scriptures and 32050 religious tracts and publications were distributed. The total contributions from fields for salaries and expenses, \$5835; school fees, \$1,454; making a total of \$7,289.

There were 21 mission schools and 2 evening schools, with an attendance of 744 of whom 306 came from Roman Catholic homes.

I.—NEW HEBRIDES.

The year has been uneventful, but not unfruitful. Faithful work has been done and God's blessing given.

On Erromanga, Rev. H. A. Robertson has labored with unabated ardor, and his wife and daughter who assist him are equally zealous. Their work is multiform. They are evangelists, pastors, teachers, patterns of economic industry, in short bishops of the whole life of that island. Heathenism has well nigh disappeared but the process of building up the nominally Christian people into a strong, well balanced, self reliant, self governed and self supporting Church is necessarily slow. Great patience must be had with a race low in the intellectual scale, and sunk into the deepest pit of immorality. But the Gospel is raising them up. Mr. Robertson has at work with him sixteen elders and thirty-four teachers, the most of whom are supported by their fellow Christians out of their very meager earnings. Over two hundred communicants profess a personal interest in our common Saviour. They build their own school houses and places of worship; and pay for the printing of the Scriptures and other books translated into their language. The only industry, so far, that enables them to cover these expenses is the preparation of arrow-root, which has become almost a drug upon the market and therefore involves an immense amount of labor, and consumes a great deal of time to secure enough to meet the demands of each year. In the light of this fact, their giving may well put to shame many in our Christian land who scarcely give the product of one day's labor to uphold the cause of Christ.

Measured by the standards of liberality, according to their circumstances, of sincerity and fidelity the Erromangan Christians, according to Missionary Robertson's testimony, are not behind those of old Christianized lands. Years must elapse before much intellectual vigor and organized force can show themselves.

Mr. Robertson reports:—We have had another year of solid work on this island and with good success, and in a few months we shall have been *twenty-seven* years in full charge of the Mission of the Canadian Church on Erromanga, and during all those eventful years the good hand of God has been upon us, guiding and blessing ourselves and our people so that now this may be regarded as a Christian island. What the Sandal-wood traffic in its palmy days here *could not, and did not do*, nor yet "The Queensland Labor traffic," (so called) with its presents (?) of guns, etc.; nor even the visits of many of H. M.'s ships of our excellent and noble Navy, nor of so many highly cultured gentlemen of science—what none of all these influences, nor all combined, did *not do*, however just and good may have been their intentions, the simple message of the gospel of God's grace *has done*. Had the work been *ours* it would have come to naught years ago.

SCHOOLS AT DILLON'S BAY.

There are classes daily, Saturday excepted, for old and young at our principal station, and these several classes are remarkably well attended, and have been throughout the year. Our two daughters, with us, assist in all this teaching and each day in the week they teach a class in English. There are two schools for children also in Cook's Bay and Portinia Bay. Morning schools have been conducted as usual at all the districts where we have teachers; also, Wednesday prayer meeting and Sunday services and Sunday schools. Sunday at Dillon's Bay is a busy day, with ordinary service, Sunday school, infant classes and Bible classes. We have now 40 children at Dillon's Bay in classes and in general training. Really the work among young people here at this head station is the hope of the island. I have a large class of candidates on Thursday morning myself.

The Sacrament of the Supper has been dispensed *four times* this year (1898), and each time at a different place. The gatherings on these occasions

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ranged from 300 to 800. We had grand and most encouraging times at all. Alas, severe influenza and other sickness carried off over 70 of our best people during the three last months of the year, including 4 teachers, who were also elders. But this sickness seems over for the time and the people are enjoying good health and are busy with their Mission work and their gardens, and those on East Erromanga are building a gospel tent for the Sacrament to be held there, 30th April, 1899. We have received from our people this year, £35 towards paying the teachers and we have prepared no less than 5000 lbs of superior arrowroot towards paying for the printing of the complete *New Testament* in Erromanga, which if health and strength be continued, I hope to have ready by the end of this year. The great difficulty now is to get *sale* for arrowroot, and we have nothing else.

RESUME, 27 YEARS:—

Teachers trained and employed on Erromanga 111; of these, 18 are *not* now employed, and 65 are dead, and 33 are employed at the present time.

Teachers and general helpers sent out to different islands to assist other Missionaries 62. Number so employed at present time with other Missionaries: 2 teachers and their wives and 3 single persons. Elders ordained 37; of these 17 are still with us and constitute our Session, and 19 are dead. Marriages celebrated 35⁶ (Note: I have baptised and married a young woman, baptised her child; married *that* child when she was grown up, and I expect to baptise *her* child now *three* months old, at the Sacrament in April next).

Population of Erromanga in 1877, 2700; in 1882, 2200; in 1893, 1745; in 1898, 1400; males and females about equal in number. Books: Genesis, the Gospels and Acts of the Apostles, Hymnal and Catechism and short Bible History. Boating and travelling performed and other manual labor including house building, endless.

REPORTS FROM EFATE.

Mr. McKenzie reports from Efate:—On our return from meeting of Synod last year we were not a little surprised to find that during our absence a very bitter feeling had sprung up between two of our villages, Mele and Erakor, which, had it not been for the Christian spirit manifested by some from the latter village, might have ended in bloodshed.

A young man from Mele wished to marry an Erakor girl and she gave her consent without consulting. (In heathen times she would have been given away without her consent, but now they have gone to the other extreme.) When her friends heard of it they at once put a stop to it, which gave offence to the young man's friends. Messages of an unfriendly nature then passed between the two villages, increasing the ill feeling. Then one day in presence of a third party, and one friendly to Mele, an Erakor young man in a spirit of bravado, said that he was not afraid of anyone at Mele. His remark was carried to that village, and magnified into a challenge to fight, which aroused their old nature, for they had always been a fighting people, and afraid of no other tribe on the island. They came up towards Erakor in a body, many of them armed, and finding an Erakor man on the path, a friend of the girl gave him a severe bruising. A party of Erakor people then, headed by their chief, went up to them and instead of trying to have any revenge began in a kindly manner to reason with them about their conduct. This quite disarmed the Mele people and made them feel ashamed of what they had done, and the following day, the day we arrived home, they came up again, but this time with a present of mats and figs for the Erakor people as a peace offering.

We endeavor to induce the villages to intermarry, and in some cases we succeed; but they do not like to see their village decreasing, hence their aversion to giving up their women. They gladly give them away not only to men of another village, but of another island, if they come and live among them.

The most important event connected with our work during the past year has been the erecting of a new Church at Fila. It is of colonial wood, weather boarded, and has the roof covered with corrugated iron. The advantage of having iron on the roof will be noticed further on. The entire cost of the material and of the services of the Mission carpenter in erecting it has been defrayed by the natives, partly in money and partly from the proceeds of arrowroot. Their own labor in carrying stones from a distance for the foundation, preparing two kilns of lime, wattleing and plastering, was of course given gratis. They are very proud of their Church and worked at it with a hearty good will. It is a conspicuous landmark in the harbor, the site being a very fine one. At the opening we had a very interesting service, between 400 and 500 natives being present.

After the opening service we had an entertainment for them, something like a tea meeting, the first of the kind we ever held, and did good in fostering a kindly feeling between the villages. It also let them see that in giving up their heathen feasts, they have not to give up innocent pleasures. Mrs. Mackenzie and her maids made a large quantity of bread, and the women of the village made a large number of small puddings from yams, taro, etc., seasoned with cocoanut cream, which were sold at 1d. each, or along with a bun and a pannikin of tea for 3d., making a fairly good meal. During the afternoon the young people, the young men in one part of the grounds, and the young women in another, had a number of games, into which they entered very heartily. My feelings, as I contrasted that scene with others I have witnessed at this same village in years gone by, I shall not attempt to describe. My heart was full. To God be all the glory! We realized about £6 sterling, and the following day the Fila natives added £5 more, towards cost of seats.

The Sunday collections during another year have sufficed to pay the salaries of our native teachers. I am sorry to say that there has been a falling off at some of the villages, but this can, to some extent, be accounted for, and I am hoping that, as they realize their duty in the matter of giving, they will come up again. A quantity of arrowroot was prepared as a contribution to the Mission, but rather less than usual, owing to there being a poorer crop. The sum given below as realized from it is larger than usual, but this includes some of the contributions of the year before last that was unsold.

In last year's report I referred to the great difficulty our people have in preparing arrowroot, in having to go so far for fresh water, and being obliged to erect temporary huts, and these not being weatherproof their health is thereby injured.

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In future we shall be able to remedy this to a considerable extent, as now having iron on the roof of our church, we can collect sufficient rain water. We now have two 800 gal. tanks, and we purpose getting more. Of course this will be additional expense, and must be defrayed out of the Arrowroot Fund. Our great difficulty now, however, is to get a market for the arrowroot. For several years Mr. Hn. Barnett, of Glasgow, very kindly disposed of it for us, but last year he wrote saying not to send any more, as he is overstocked, besides, Mr. Robertson, Erronunga, has a prior claim on his kindness. We have succeeded in getting four casks of last year's disposed of in South Australia, but three or four more casks are still on hand. We have written to several firms in Australia about taking some, but the price they offer will scarcely pay us for the trouble of making it. A cheap article, they say, is made in Queensland and other places, and the public not knowing the difference in quality, are not disposed to give a higher price for Mission arrowroot.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was dispensed twice, in May, and again in November. On the former occasion two were baptized and admitted to the Church, and six on the latter. One of these was an old man, who in his younger days was a man of fine physique, but a proud, dark-hearted man, and very much opposed to us in the earlier years of our work. For a considerable time he attended the candidates' class. Some two years ago I thought of baptizing him, and told him he must remove his turban, which no one, Sunday nor week day, for many years had seen him without. He demurred somewhat, so I let him alone. He could not make up his mind to submit to the humiliation of the whole congregation gazing on his bald pate. On the Friday previous to our last Communion, he came along with the rest of the people, although a cripple and his village a good way off, hoping I would baptize him. I had decided, however, to leave for another six months, so when service was over, he went to the house of one of our elders and began weeping, seeming to be in great distress. He asked the elder to come and see if I would not baptize him. I sent for him and told him I was pleased to hear he was so anxious to join the Church. But, said I, what about the turban? He did not reply, so I knew there was a struggle in his breast with his pride. To any one not understanding native character this may seem a very trifling matter, but to him it was a severe test. I repeated my question, and he replied "Yes, I'll remove it," and he did, and was baptized on the following Lord's Day, in the presence of over 400 persons. I believe he is a changed man, changed by God's grace.

During the latter part of the year the work at Mele has been especially encouraging, as a number of young men joined the candidates' class. The teacher there, Solomon, baptized in infancy by Mr. Morrison, and his wife Mel, are worthy of especial mention in a report of this station. They are a most exemplary couple, and are exerting a good influence on the people of that village, by whom they are highly respected. Their house is a modest native teacher's house, being neat and comfortable. It consists of three rooms, the walls being wattled and plastered, and the ground floor covered with fine coral, worn smooth by the action of the waves, over which mats are spread giving the house a tidy appearance. Both front and back there is a nice verandah four or five feet wide.

The Mele natives seem altogether superior to the rest of the Efatese. I have seen nowhere in the group such interesting looking young people. At all the villages there has been on Sundays, prayer meeting shortly after sunrise, service at 9.30, at the close of which there is a catechumen's class, Sunday School at 2 p.m., Bible Class at 3.30. Then on week days, prayer meeting on Wednesday mornings, on the other four days of the week early morning school for adults, and about 8.30 for children.

I spend a Sunday once a month at Mele, another here at Fila, and a third between Erakor and Pango, and occasionally one at Eratap. Every third Sunday I hold a service across the harbor for the English residents. Here I attend both schools, conduct the weekly prayer meeting, and hold a class for teachers every Friday. A good portion of my time is devoted to translating, as Mr. Milne, Dr. Macdonald and I have decided to give our people the whole Bible, and I may here mention that in future proceeds of arrowroot will go towards defraying cost of printing the same.

During part of the year Mrs. Mackenzie held a weekly sewing class for the grown up girls of several villages, and to encourage them to do something for themselves, she got the English Company here to supply her with material for dresses and shirts, which they made up, the payment being divided among them; she also had the smaller girls of this village once a week. Then, as usual, she taught the two daughters of one of the settlers, a Portuguese, and took a class in the early morning school.

The conduct of the Fila natives since we moved here has been most satisfactory. Supplemented by occasional presents of yams from the other villages, they supplied all the native food we required, and they kept the fences around our premises in repair gratis.

Some time ago several of the young people of Erakor and Pango gave us much pain by their indifference to the worship. They were led on by a young man who had returned from Queensland, and for a time we feared that *drink* would be the ruin of many of them. This young man, however, has since become very ill, and this seems to have had a salutary effect on the rest.

Two teachers and their wives, and a third couple as servants, were sent out to other missionaries during the year. My own health, and that of my family has been good, a matter for gratitude.

NEW HEBRIDES COLLEGE.

Our missionary, Dr. Annand, is tireless and enthusiastic in his work as Principal of the Training Institute. He is assisted by Mrs. Annand, Mr. Lang and Miss Symonds.

He reports:—Our work is in a very hopeful state. Students and teachers are enjoying good health. Duties are cheerfully performed, and a fine spirit now prevails.

Last month we had to expel two students, one for trying to unsettle the minds of his fellows, the other for persistent disobedience. The discipline has had a very beneficial influence upon the whole of the students. Doubtless the near approach of the Christmas holidays also helps to put some of our lads on their good behavior; as they know that favors will not come to those who do not conduct themselves in a becoming manner. The anticipation of two weeks' release from routine toil gladdens the hearts of all. The Christmas season has thus far been our only vacation in the year, hence it is very highly appreciated. We believe, however, that a more powerful reason, than either, or both of those given above, is influencing our students. The Spirit of God is working among them.

On the 11th Dec. we had our half-yearly communion service, which was to us all a soul refreshing season. We were much pleased with the becoming conduct of our people. Nearly all of them seemed to realize the solemnity of the occasion.

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Nicodemus-like, many of them came by night to enquire more perfectly concerning the way. Several asked me to write appropriate prayers for them to use in preparation for the Supper. One lad came in one evening, after the curfew bell had rung, to confess that some time previously he had, when angry about something, killed one of our chickens, and thrown it away out of sight. Little things like that indicated the feeling prevailing among them. The only two lads, who were not Church members, were at this time received into fellowship. About ninety of us sat down at the Lord's table. A few bushmen, who had never seen a baptism, or a communion service, were present as spectators. They were deeply interested in all that was done. The contrast between our feast and their heathen festivals must have left its impression upon their minds.

Early yesterday morning the "Victoria," a 1250 tons steamer, came in, bringing to us Miss Symonds, B.A. She will be a most valuable helper in the work of training our students. We are very glad and thankful that she has arrived, as assistance was much needed here.

Lately there has been some trouble among the people attending our vegetable market. There have been two murders, and last week a number of those usually at the market were away cooking a man. This last murder has prevented one section of the bushmen from coming to the market place, as their enemies also appear there. The cause of this murder is the old story, stealing a woman. Some years ago this latest victim stole a woman and cleared out to another village, where he was allowed to live for years in peace. At a festival an opportunity for revenge came, and the usual bush custom was followed, and the man was not only killed but devoured.

However, this custom is gradually withdrawing from the districts where the gospel is proclaimed. The light is beginning to penetrate the gloom of Santo's hill country. Teachers are now asked for by a number of villages, and we trust that before long even these bushmen may be found clothed, and in their right minds, sitting at the feet of our blessed Redeemer.

Towards the end of the year Mrs. Annand's health gave way; and early in January she was seized with a severe attack of "Angina Pectoris," which utterly prostrated her; but we are thankful that her life has been spared, and February advices show that she was able to be about again with good prospects of rapid recovery.

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II.—TRINIDAD.

GENERAL REVIEW FOR 1898.

Acting on medical advice Mrs. Grant left for Canada in May and Dr. Grant followed in November on furlough.

During the year the Mission Staff suffered considerably from illness—particularly Mr. Thompson and his family, which after much consideration, led to the removal of the Couva manse to a more healthy location.

On account of illness, due to unseasonable weather, the attendance of our schools has been somewhat reduced. Statistics, however, show a steady advance in nearly every particular, the contributions of the native Church being £160.5. above those of last year.

The Mission Council reports with extreme regret that intemperance is steadily increasing among the East Indian people and is convinced that the licensing of rum shops by the Government in every corner of the Colony is largely responsible for the increase of pauperism and idleness among the people.

The cordial thanks of the Council are hereby tendered to Mr. George Cadbury for his handsome donation of £100, to Mr. Wm. Cadbury for £50, to Mr. Wm. Archibald for his valuable contribution of land at Bahmain and to all other friends of our Mission for their courtesy and aid.

Rev. John Morton, D. D. reports:—

During the year a severe cold kept me idle one Sabbath, for the first time since my furlough in 1894. My two ordained assistants, Revs. Paul Bhukhan and Andrew Gayadeen, have labored with vigor and faithfulness.

Sabbath services have been conducted regularly in twenty-three places, and occasionally in many others.

In nine of the above stations the Lord's Supper is regularly dispensed. Except occasionally, and within a limited area, we find it undesirable to gather the people to central Communion. The more primitive mode of celebrating the ordinance wherever the people meet for worship has many advantages. It avoids what is closely allied to Sabbath desecration. It is a great advantage to the aged and to mothers, and it is a quiet protest against the undue importance that is so commonly attached to sacred places.

Fifteen week-day schools, fifteen Sabbath schools, regular Sabbath services and prayer meetings, Gospel teaching and visitation, indicate in brief the chief agencies employed in our work.

The prayer meeting at Tunapuna has been more than usually interesting and successful. The attendance and attention has been good. As the young people, who largely form the audience, understand English, we draw upon every visitor for an address. In this way Dr. Whittier, Rev. Mr. Fraser, and Mr. Clark of the Training school have helped us.

Though not musical, the Hindus are fond of music, and the prayer meeting is utilized in improving the service of praise to which, in Mission work, very special attention should be given.

Religious instruction is given daily in our schools.

With our Sabbath schools we have considerable difficulty. The first day of the week being our chief opportunity for the adults, it is not easy to spare our best agents for Sabbath school work, and to some extent we have been obliged to do Sabbath school work on week days. From the first of the year we will be using the lessons and helps provided by our own Canadian church, and we hope for improved results.

Early in the year I spent three weeks in St. Lucia, assisting the work there, and in September, along with Dr. Grant, I visited Demerara in the interest of our Mission in that Colony. Special reports of these visits have already been furnished.

Miss Blackadder reports another year of successful school work. At her annual examination she took rank as "Very Good."

Temperance work has been kept up, as a most important preventive branch of Christian effort. Licensed rum shops are planted nearer to the people than any other agency, and even Mohammedans and better class Hindus who do not drink in India, not infrequently yield to the temptation. When they become Christians the temptation is increased by the evil example of Christians. Total abstinence we practice and teach as the only safe and consistent course. In this branch the entire work of getting up meetings, with suitable recitations and magic lantern pictures, is borne by Mrs. Morton.

During the year 71 new members were enrolled and the Blue Ribbon Band now numbers 650. The benefit of this work, not only in safe-guarding individuals, but in creating a "tribal conscience" on the subject of strong drink, among our Christians, is plainly apparent.

Mrs. Morton, whose health during the latter part of the year has been unusually good, has taught a Bible class of the more advanced children in Tunapuna school, taught the sewing in that school, bore all the care of the service of praise, managed the work of the sewing teachers and Bible women, and visited in the homes of the people. This has been an immense help to me and benefit to my field.

With regard to the extension of the work, I have to report that in Maracas valley, where work began in 1894, we are now fairly well equipped, thanks largely to the liberality of the Messrs. Cadbury Bros. Our thanks are again accorded to Mr. George Cadbury for a contribution of £100, and to Mr. Wm. A. Cadbury for £50, to our funds.

At Las Lomas, a cocoa settlement, the people determined to erect a place of worship. They cut and carried native wood, gave contributions and work, and the place was finished at a cost of over \$200, of which our funds only contributed

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\$56. A notable feature of this movement was the fact that two Christian women stripped themselves of their silver ornaments to the value of over \$18, and gave them to the work.

At Guaico, on the new railway, a building has been erected and a school established.

In the Santa Cruz valley Mr. Charles Fourier Stollmeyer has kindly given to this Mission half an acre of land, which gives us a land-footing where formerly we were entirely dependent upon courtesy for a place to meet our people, or bury our dead. But we have no building in the valley, and in St. Juan, the village at its mouth, we are dependent on a small rented room.

At Chaguanas, at risk to health and influence, our catechist occupies hired rooms in a crowded village. I wish to secure a more healthy spot by purchase, and to build a suitable house.

At Sangre Grande the people have opened a subscription list, and are justly urging the great need of a suitable school house in place of our present rented hut. This, with their help, should be carried out during the coming dry season.

I visited Cumuto, a cocoa settlement towards the centre of the island, last dry season, and only want of means and the precedence of other districts kept me from occupying that field. Another year should not be lost, for the place is large and growing.

It is a question how long a man 59 years of age, can be expected to overtake such an ever-extending field, besides bearing a considerable share of the work of a college. I propose just to go on as enabled of God. But I ask the moderate addition of £50 for this field for 1899, that I may be able to meet in some measure, this demand for enlargement.

There is no room left on my paper for reflections. I trust the readers of this report will find ample room for them in their own minds.

Dr. Grant of San Fernando says:—

Another year of service, without interruption or absence from our field, save a week in Demerara in the service of our Church, is about closed.

As a family, we have had good health, with the exception of Mrs. Grant. For quite two years she suffered almost daily, at times intensely, and finding that remedies prescribed gave only temporary relief, her medical adviser recommended a change. In June she went to Nova Scotia, and the climate appears to have done for her what medicines failed to do.

It was with great reluctance she left Trinidad; as year by year her attachment to the women and girls of our mission was greatly strengthened; and to this I can truly add, unity of spirit and heartiness of co-operation with Mrs. Fraser and Miss Archibald, who were engaged in the same work.

In consultation with the brethren it was thought advisable that I should go home to spend the winter—as I prefer my furlough in the cold season—and decide if possible, Mrs. Grant's future relation to the mission. We leave on Monday.

As set forth in my last year's report, my work was more particularly in the town of San Fernando. In congregational work we use the English and Hindustani languages; the former with those taught in our schools, the latter with adults, most of whom were born in India.

The Sabbath School work has been strengthened by written examinations, which have been, on the whole, most satisfactory. We aim at having the young grounded in Bible truth. At our last examination, out of a possible 100, the highest made was 96, several above 80, and few under 50.

The Christian Endeavor Society secures most of the young. It is a valuable auxiliary. A convention held during the year did much to stimulate.

The contributions of this Central Church, including Sunday School collections, were about \$100 a month. This sum does not include the sums received by Mr. Fraser from the many country stations.

The training-school work is well sustained. As formerly I gave a portion of time to it daily. Mr. Harold Clarke has proved a most diligent and successful

teacher, exercising over the young men a moral and religious influence of the happiest character, an influence that will not fail to tell on the young people who come under his care. I may here state that Mr. Clarke has done everything in his power to advance the best interests of the mission. Evidently the love of Christ constrains.

As Miss Archibald's school is the practising school for the students of the training school, and as it is immediately identified with the working of the Church I will refer to it briefly. It is carried on in Oriental Hall, the building we acquired last year. The building is in every way suited to the grand educational work carried on within its walls. It is completely enclosed by a neat iron fence set up this year. The examination of the school was on the 1st November. The Roll showed 230 pupils, of these 181 were present for examination. The percentage of the passes in standard numbering 105 were as follows: (1) Reading 100; (2) Writing 98.71; (3) Arithmetic 96.66; (4) English Grammar 100; (5) Geography 100. The infants examined were 76, and in Reading, Writing, Arithmetic, Object Lessons, and Needlework, were classed as "Very Good;" in Singing and Drill "Good." Miss Archibald has labored beyond her strength. She was aided by one teacher who obtained his certificate after a course of study in the training school, and by several young people who were formerly pupils in the Central school. An advanced class, taught by our eldest daughter, were presented at the Inspector's examination, and all passed.

When the college was in session I taught three days weekly. This work is carried on chiefly in Hindustani, but as a full report will be given by the President, I need not here go into details.

Early in the summer Mr. Norman Lamont and his sister were here on a visit to their estates, and were accompanied by Lord Cassillis. All of these paid us a visit, and it was quite refreshing to have the pupils examined in the Shorter Catechism, and in Bible knowledge, by these distinguished visitors, and to listen to the suitable counsel given to the pupils of the schools and the students of the college.

Our financial returns show our continued obligations to the Colonial Company (limited), Sir Charles Tenant, Hon. W. S. Robertson, and others.

This year has been one of peace, good will and hearty co-operation, with results fitted to encourage hope and inspire gratitude.

Rev. Wm. Macrae reports:—

In looking over the work of the past year one can see unmistakable evidence of the Gospel leaven being at work, although not so effectively as we had hoped and prayed for.

At Princetown the Lord's Supper is dispensed quarterly, and half-yearly at Riversdale. This year, however, a Communion service has been held in four other districts for the first time—Mt. Stewart, Lengua, Piparo, and Tabaquite. For some weeks preceding each service, evening meetings were held, in which, special instruction was given to both old and intending communicants. This effort to bring all our Church members to understand more clearly the meaning of the ordinance, and to observe it more intelligently and reverently has not been without good results. Seventeen have been received on profession of faith, and so far all are proving faithful.

Not much change has been made in our catechist staff. Mr. Soodeen has lost none of his well-known sincerity and faithfulness. The majority of the others are inexperienced, and therefore, fully half their time is spent under training. This accounts for the number being larger than that of the other fields. Our weekly class, which was regularly held, is intended to supplement the training of the College, and assist in preparing for the Sunday's work.

The schools were regularly visited by Mr. Soodeen and myself. Perhaps no phase of our work takes up so much time and gives so much anxiety and worry as the school work. It is so hard, particularly on estates and scattered districts, to retain children in school whose parents care for none of these things.

Miss Sinclair has completed another year of very faithful service. Her school is steadily improving in tone and efficiency, as well as in numbers. It is fortunate

for herself and the other lady teachers that they have now a few weeks' rest, which they so very much need.

Sabbath School work has also been vigorously pushed forward. Quarterly written examinations were held for those able to write, while the younger children were examined orally. This necessitates considerable work, but we find it pays to look well after the children. No part of our work is more promising than that of our Sunday schools.

There are also four C. E. Societies in this district. The central one in Princetown is gradually growing in membership and influence. Our books show a membership of 44, and for the last six months the average attendance has been 40. The others in the country are smaller but hopeful.

At the beginning of the year a Boys' Brigade was formed, with the hope of reaching boys on whom we have little hold. The strength of the brigade is now 47, and the average attendance 28. In connection with the drill exercises a portion of Bunyon's "Holy War" was given, in short simple lectures, on which an examination was held at the close of the term, where suitable rewards, contributed by friends, were given to those showing the clearest grasp of the subject. Much credit is due to Major Ferrera for the success of this organization.

A night class was held in the Central School, which was at times attended by fifteen adults. Both Hindi and English were taught, the majority beginning with the alphabet in both languages. Evening classes were also held in the other sections of the field, although somewhat irregularly.

Three Bible women have given their evenings and Sabbaths to special work among women. In addition to regular meetings in the Central Church these women visit from house to house; sometimes gathering a few women in a room or gallery or under the shade of a tree, they then to the best of their ability teach a practical lesson.

Our old enemies—strong drink and a desecrated Sabbath—still exist, and are working no end of mischief. It is exceedingly annoying and discouraging to find now and again one or more of our Christian people drawn into the saloon, or forced by circumstances into Sunday trading. Temptations are strong, and human nature, unaided by Divine grace, too readily gives way before it. On the other hand, there is much to encourage and brighten hope. Our methods of work are constantly being revised and improved. Our native agents, although lacking in enthusiasm and soul-thirst, are nevertheless, for the most part earnest and faithful. The lives of our Christian people with very few exceptions, are sober and exemplary, and one and all are ready and willing to help in every good work. Hence the future prospects, while leaning on Divine promise, were never brighter or more encouraging.

Rev. A. W. Thompson reports:—

From Exchange Village as the centre, the work of the Couva District has been pushed out in all directions year by year, as funds and men were available, until at last the limit of extension has been reached. The erection of buildings at Mount Pleasant and Arena, and the opening of a school at the latter place, fill up the last gaps and leave us no more ground to occupy, unless new villages spring up. With the close of the year the last stations have been occupied, so that from the San Fernando district on the south to the Tunapuna district on the north, and from the Gulf on the west to Montserrat on the east, there is not a village or settlement without a day school, Sunday school or Sunday service either in its midst or within very easy reach of it.

Henceforth, all effort must be directed to make our occupation effective.

During nine months of the year, ten-week day schools,—besides three Government schools,—to which were gathered East Indian children,—nineteen Sunday schools, twenty-four Sunday services and ten weekly prayer meetings were regularly carried on.

The programme for 1899, adopted since October 1st, provides for eleven schools, twenty-four Sunday schools, thirty regular Sunday services and ten weekly prayer meetings.

Our aim is to avoid multiplying services—not one more meeting is held than is necessary. Whenever possible, groups are gathered at convenient centres; but this cannot always be done; and at this stage of our work, in fulfillment of the Great Commission we must go to the people, not wait for them to come to us. “Go” does not mean “stay” or “wait.”

The test of a successful year's work is not the number of meetings held nor the number of people who attended these meetings; but the number of men and women and children who have grown in Christian character. Not meetings nor crowds, but Christ being formed in believers, men and women becoming Christ-like, is the true test.

All through the year this was ever kept in view before our people and catechists as the thing to aim after—the one thing worth attaining unto; and there are evidences of “quickenings” among us; but we plead for the “showers of blessing.”

Some painful cases of discipline proved very trying, but have turned out for good to all and were real means of grace to those immediately concerned.

Our Bible women acquitted themselves well during the whole year, laboring with zeal and much tact. This important work gains in interest yearly, and is full of promise. Perhaps only now are we coming to realize what the real problem of the work among the women is.

Miss Fisher has completed another year of work that needs no commendation. It speaks for itself. Besides her day school labors she gives much attention to Sunday School and Temperance work.

Mrs. Arbuckle, our valued Sunday-school helper, was absent in Scotland during eight months of the year. We miss her greatly, and will rejoice when she returns to us again.

The year has been a very trying one. Rains, frequent and long-continued, not only made travelling difficult but also caused much sickness. Repeated attacks of fever reduced the efficiency of our workers during the latter part of the year, and lowered the results of several school examinations. Schools were with difficulty kept agoing, and teachers were for a time hardly to be had.

The manse family suffered severely, and the Mission Council, after long and careful deliberation, and after consultation with leading planters of the district, and after obtaining the approval of the Foreign Mission Committee, decided to remove the manse from Exchange Village to higher ground two miles eastward. This involves the forming of a new centre, but it seems to be necessary as the only way to preserve health in this district.

While the manse is being taken down, and removed to its new site, we are enjoying the hospitality of James Arbuckle, Esq, a Scotch planter, to whom we are deeply indebted for many kindnesses which cannot be specified here.

The year has placed us under obligations to many whom we cannot mention in a report but who have our warmest thanks.

The contributions of the native Church show an increase of £65 stg.

Rev. S. A. Fraser reviews 1898 as follows:—

Another year with its ups and downs, successes and failures, joys and sorrows, has passed away, and I must now steal away into some quiet corner from the people and try to give our Christian friends at home, in a few words, some general idea of what has been done in 365 days packed full of work.

I am pleased to report that we have lost none from the ranks of our workers by death, and the majority have enjoyed fairly good health.

Assisted by twelve regular catechists, and four others who give but a portion of their time, the Gospel has been preached every Sabbath at twenty-eight regular stations, and at a number of places where we have no schools or churches.

There are nine hospitals in this district accessible to all our agents, in some of which may be found at times as many as from thirty to sixty people who listen attentively to the Gospel.

During the week the catechists visit and teach the Christian people in their homes, go from door to door of the barracks on the estates, and from house to

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house in the jungle. They come to San Fernando regularly on Fridays for instruction and to report on their week's work.

It is encouraging to see how attentively they listen to the Word of God, and how eagerly the most of them seek to know more of the truth.

Their reports are copied by Rev. Babu Lal Behari into a book for reference when we visit their particular district. The missionary's time is so occupied by administrative work, and the field and work are so extensive that he must depend largely on his catechists and assistants to direct him to those who wish to see him and to whom he can be of most service when he has an hour or two to visit any district.

The Presbyterian Church of Jamaica, early in the year, earnestly appealed to our Council to send them a good man to work among the Indians in that island. We sent D. Cheddami, a catechist of this district, and a student of the College. In this way our College is training men not only for the work in Trinidad, but for missionaries to preach the Gospel in other lands.

School work has been carried on as usual in seventeen schools by forty-eight teachers and assistants. Twelve schools are Government assisted, and we expect to get assistance for two more from the first of January, which will be a relief financially, and enable us to wipe out our existing debt more quickly. Our Training School is gradually supplying a long-felt need for efficient native teachers, so that our schools are year by year improving in efficiency. The test of the progress made in secular work is the Government Inspector's written examination, and our schools have received a high merit mark. San Fernando school, under Miss Archibald's faithful labors, was exceptionally good. The number of pupils on the Roll in our schools is 1,366—boys 936, girls 430; daily average 757. The average is a little below last year, because of Tabaquite school being handed over to Princetown district, and the prevalence of sickness among the children. Three quarters of an hour every day is given to religious instruction by the teachers or catechists, which is very important, as many of the children cannot be got into the Sabbath school. Some of our teachers are very much in earnest in teaching the children Scripture truth. As a result, a number of bright boys are anxious to be baptized, but they are kept back by their heathen parents.

I am pleased to find that three of our teachers are anxious to become catechists, and are now preparing themselves, as far as possible, for that work, although they know their salary will be less than at present. This is hopeful. We will, after a time, no doubt, want a class of catechists better educated in English than most of our present men.

Closely linked with the week day school is the Sabbath school. We follow the International lesson in all our Sunday schools, which are attended by about 800 children.

They have done good work. Last Sabbath in two of our country schools 45 little children, 40 of whom were from heathen homes, gave the Titles and Golden Texts verbatim for the quarter. Five children in the Central school, under six years of age, correctly repeated the Titles and Golden Texts for the whole year—one hundred and four distinct propositions.

A number of our people go out from the Central Church regularly to take charge of Sabbath school work in the country. Miss Archibald, with her accustomed zeal and faithfulness, has, in addition to her laborious work in a school of upwards of 200 children, taken charge of two Sabbath schools in the country, taught a class in the Central school, and assisted in other services of the Church.

Mr. Clark also took charge of two country Sabbath schools, and has made his influence felt for good in all the services of the Central church. He has been a great help to the C. E. Society, which has made substantial progress during the year.

Dr. Grant's departure for Canada the end of November has greatly increased my work. If the good friends at home were here for a few days they would know the reason why they don't get letters from their missionaries.

Dr. Grant will report on the work of the Town Church, Training School, etc.

In the first part of the year two new churches were built, one at Mayo towards which the people of that district contributed \$100. We are especially indebted to Mr. Ramdeen for the assistance he rendered. The other church is at Monkeytown.

We also erected one new school-house on Siparia road, enlarged Bonnaventure school-house to accommodate the people on Sabbath, and put up two teachers' houses for which we draw rent from the Government—one at Bonnaventure, the other at Rusilac.

The number of baptisms for the year is not very large. Many who applied for baptism were refused, and are now under observation. We think it better that they should be well tried and grounded in the truth before they are baptized, even if some drift away and we see them no more.

The good seed of the Kingdom has been sown in many places and in many ways; we look to God for the increase.

Large numbers of the more intelligent and most influential Hindoos are convinced of the truths of Christianity, and have no faith in their own gods, but they have not the courage to forsake their father's religion and endure the jeers and sneers and persecutions of their countrymen.

A short time ago a Hindu priest, with a large number of his disciples, sold a number of his gods to me for a trifle, saying they were only stones. When asked why he did not become a Christian, he asked, "If I do who will feed me, as my disciples do." Another priest told me yesterday that when his god does not feed him he puts him in the fire as punishment, showing that he is losing respect for his gods.

Oh! for the spirit of God to arouse the many who are intelligently convinced of the truth and bring them to decision. With thankfulness to God for the mercies of the past year, and hopefulness for the future, we go forward to the New Year.

Rev. Lal Behari says of his work for 1898 :—

By God's mercy I am spared in life and health to submit another Annual Report. Much of my work has been as in former years. In San Fernando I aided Dr. Grant in visiting Christians, Mohammedans, and Hindoos, but was rarely with him on Sabbath. In the country I generally accompanied Rev Mr. Fraser during the week and on Sabbath. Sometimes we would spend the whole day together. He always sings the Bhajans (Hymns), and generally reads, and often relieves me in addressing the people. This mode of work is mutually helpful going two and two.

At other times Mr. Fraser would go in one direction and I in another, separating like Paul and Barnabas, without their quarrel. In these visits we visit every house whether Christian, Hindoo, or Mohammedan. The manner of reception varies, but we always come home feeling that we are serving the best of Masters. On Friday all the Catechists come up about midday. It falls to me to receive their reports for the week, a synopsis of which is submitted to the Missionary before they part, and words of approval or reproof are not withheld. The International Sunday School Lessons are closely followed, and the subject for the week is taken up and discussed. Usually three papers are read on the Lesson every week by the Catechists, and on Sabbath the same subject forms a part of the services at all the stations. Catechists are, however, free to choose their subjects if they prefer doing so.

The books imported from India are put in my care. The prices charged for these religious books and tracts are from one to fifty cents. Total value for the year, \$133. The prices charged and paid for the books allow us, without loss, to distribute tracts gratuitously to a considerable extent. We also import religious papers, some fortnightly, some weekly. From the Canadian press at Rutlam we get fifty copies of Gyan Patrika, from the Rajputana Mission twenty, from Methodist Press, Lucknow, twenty, and from Agralaw 10, at a cost of \$30. This tells favorably in many ways. I make free use of a book in Hindi called "Sat Mat Nirupan," or the true religion established. This book deals with attributes of God,

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Creation, Heaven, Hell, and so on, as set forth by each of these systems. In this the students show an encouraging interest.

Report concerning the Presbyterian College, Trinidad, for 1898 :—

At the end of 1897 a number of this class for that year retired from the College to give their whole time to Mission work. Others were drafted in from the different fields to fill their places, and made up a class of 11, of whom 10 attended regularly during the three terms. Our terms are marked off by the Easter, Midsummer and Christmas holidays, as in the primary schools, but our vacations are longer. The students came into residence from Monday till Friday each alternate week, and were at Mission work in their respective districts during the rest of their time. The subjects were those of the first year's course. The President and Dr. Grant taught two days each in the week, and Lal Behari one, taking their respective subjects as in former years. The conduct of the students was good. Their capacity and industry varied. Some, notably two of the Writer caste, and two others who had been educated in India, kept with ease abreast of all the work, and if they cultivate their Christian graces in like measure, will be heard of later as very valuable workers. One whose advantages had been small, and who passed through the fires of persecution when he became a Christian, gave full proof of his diligence, and made excellent progress. One or two suffered either from indolence or undeveloped mental faculties. When competition with others and the discipline of regular teaching fails to awaken and develop a student, he must give place to others. In the class this year there has been an evident earnestness and depth of religious feeling which, on several occasions, and in all classes, was manifested in the tears running down some of the students' cheeks.

The accounts for the year show a credit balance of \$305.99. This is the result of severe economy, as we wish ere long to replace the present worn out residence, without drawing more heavily from the Church in Canada. We estimate the amount required for the College in 1899 at £125, the same as in past years.

DEMARARA.

Rev. J. B. Cropper reports :—

The past year has brought no relief from the burden of depression which has weighed so heavily on the Colony for some years past. Circumstances, however, seem to justify the hopefulness of the optimists as to the future of the Colony.

As a result of the Report of the Royal Commission and of the agitation in Britain over the West Indian problem, the needs of the Colonies have been brought before the British public, and although the relief may not be in the direction desired by many, nor as speedy and hearty as hoped for by others, yet the prospect of improvement in the agricultural condition of these Colonies is decidedly brightening. In this Colony during the year there have been some changes in the ownership of properties, but there has been no diminution in cultivation or withdrawal of capital. This has a very important bearing on our work in this Mission, and particularly the branch in this colony. For with the success of the sugar industry there will not only be the prosperity of the people in whom we are interested, but also the continued introduction from India of the people among whom our work lies.

WEST INDIAN SECTION.

This division of the work—a division that does not exist in Trinidad—does not exhibit much growth. The attendance on the Sabbath Services, however, continues to improve, and that on the midweek services has maintained the improvement gained over that of the previous year. There have been a great many wet Sabbaths, and on these the attendance has been small. There is a great lack of earnestness on the part of the people, and a painful absence of any sense of

responsibility. The spiritual tone is low and the moral sense is blunted. This is the condition of practically the whole people of the colony.

The Sabbath School department, as reported last year, is very weak; the attendance of children has continued to fall off. The amount of the weekly offerings was \$10 less than that of the previous year, but the congregation paid a small sum towards the work of the mission, besides sending aid to the sufferers by the hurricane in the islands, and providing themselves with copies of the Book of Praise. Many might contribute more than they do; but a few give of their poverty liberally. One poor old woman who gets sixteen cents a day for such light work as she is able to do, and who is dependent on her earnings for support, contributed not far short of the tenth.

The statistics are as follows:—Baptisms, 6; marriages, 4; Communicants on roll January 1st, 68; added 7; under suspension, 1; removed, 1; died, 1; on roll December 31st, 73; Sabbath Schools, 2; day school, on roll Dec. 31st, 54; average daily attendance, 32; contributions of congregation and Sabbath School, \$151.40.

EAST INDIAN SECTION.

The work of the past year has been encouraging. The statistics are as follows:—Missionary, 1; catechists 3; Bible woman, 1; baptisms, adults, 9, children, 18, total 27; marriages, 8; week day schools, 2; on roll Dec. 31st, 172; average daily attendance, 106; Communicants on roll Jan. 1st, 24; added 5; under suspension, 1; left the Colony, 1; on roll Dec. 31st, 27; Sabbath Schools, 3; contributed by the native church, \$33.36.

At the Better Hope Station, which includes the adjoining village and estates, work has been carried on steadily by two catechists and a Bible woman. Among the converts were a man and his wife, whose case is interesting. The step-father of the man, in whose name the family property was held, opposed his becoming a Christian and threatened to turn the young people out of doors and to disinherit his step-son. Nohra and Mangri maintained their resolution, and cheerfully accepted the situation. They were first married according to Christian rites, and a few weeks after, on public profession of faith, were baptized. Many of their friends, Hindi as well as Christian, had offered them a home, and after their baptism, a sister of the young man, not a Christian, gave them the use of her house. The separation, however, did not last long, for the father missed the services of his daughter-in-law, his wife being dead, and shortly after asked the young people to return. They did so, and friendship was restored. The father, having since married, has built the young people a neat little house on the land. Nohra is now one of our catechists, and gives promise of being successful.

At Helena there has been a large measure of satisfaction in the work. Untoward circumstances militated against the success of the settlement; and much suffering has been endured by some of the settlers. This has given opportunity for the practical exhibition of the Christianity we were preaching, and that opportunity has not been lost.

Our catechists have been faithful, and their efforts have not been ineffectual, for the work has taken a hold on the people, and its influence is perceptible. As the settlement grows the leaven will spread.

It is of much consequence to the work of the future, that we should be in a position to plant an agency in every settlement at the time of its foundation. Unless this is done, opposing influences become entrenched, and can only be dislodged by a much greater outlay of energy and means than would be required were the work taken up at the outset.

A catechist is now in permanent residence at Helena, and regular Sabbath services are conducted. A day school and Sabbath School are also in operation.

Mr. Alexander Crum Ewing, of Scotland, visited his estates during the year. It was a very great pleasure to meet him. He spent one Sabbath in the Colony, and, in accordance with his unfailing custom, attended Divine service in Better Hope Church. The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was dispensed, and he partook

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with the congregation. It was the first visit he had paid since the Church was handed over to us, and the first time he had joined in worship with a congregation of a Church in Canada. The season was much enjoyed by everyone.

He was also present at the Hindi services, and addressed the people encouragingly through an interpreter. It was gladdening to hear a proprietor and an employer of imported labor say to his people that, while they had been introduced to work in the cane fields, yet he recognized as a Christian it was his duty to do something more for them than simply see to their worldly interests.

There must also be chronicled the visit, in the fall of the year, of Drs. Morton and Grant. They came as a deputation from the Foreign Mission Committee to see the ground and report on the application for a second missionary, and as to his location. It is earnestly hoped that the second laborer will be sent shortly.

The deputation referred to in Mr. Cropper's report consisting of Drs. Morton and Grant, emphasized the earnest appeal often made by Mr. Cropper for another Missionary to Demerara, and showed that there is now a most inviting opening on the west coast, where Mr. Gibson formerly labored, and the assurance of the active co-operation of the Presbyterian ministers in that locality. The Committee seriously considered the whole situation and unanimously agreed to send a man to occupy this field, as a fellow laborer of Mr. Cropper. The man has been found in the person of the Rev. Geo. E. Ross, for two years pastor of Rockingham and the North West Arm, Halifax. The Committee believe that he is called of God, and will prove himself as he has done already in another sphere a workman not needing to be ashamed.

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III.—KOREA.

The three missionaries reported to Assembly last year, as under appointment to Korea, are now in their field of labor. They have the two northeast provinces, covering a large area and having a million or more inhabitants, as their territory. Their brief reports give all needed information.

Rev. Wm. Foote writes:—

Your missionaries to Korea arrived at Fusan, September 4, 1898, and from there proceeded to Seoul where we studied the language and mission methods until the 7th of November.

The "Council of Missions in Korea holding the Presbyterian form of Government" held several sessions in Seoul between Oct. 18th and Nov. 1st. We accepted the invitation given by the council and became members. This council now consists of all the male missionaries of the different Presbyterian churches represented here.

When we presented our position to this council and asked advice as to where we should establish a mission, the members of the council unanimously decided that we would do well to work in the two northeastern provinces of Korea. We accepted this advice, and Mrs. Foote and I arrived here November 12th, and have already begun work.

Churches are planted in several cities and villages in these provinces and work is being carried forward almost entirely by the Koreans at their own expense.

Han Hung, a city of about forty thousand inhabitants, should be the centre of northern work, and Wonsan, a city of fifty thousand, a centre of southern work.

I have seen none of the work outside of Wonsan. Here there is a Church of sixty-four members and a much larger number of catechumens. The Church formerly worshipped in was too small and it has been sold. The Koreans have eight hundred dollars in silver now collected and are waiting our decision as to site.

This Church supports a school which is attended by the boys of Christian parents and others who desire to become Christians. The teacher is one of the best educated men in Korea and with eleven others preaches in Wonsan and neighboring villages every Sunday.

The prayer meeting on Wednesday is held in the school building which is owned by the Church. This meeting is largely attended and the time is mostly occupied with prayer.

Rev. Robert Grierson, M. D., says:—

The first days of July found me concluding the tour of Prince Edward Island which the Board had assigned me, and holding a few additional meetings in Pietou and Tatamagouche.

The next fortnight was spent in hurried preparation for departure, during which time I purchased and packed my medical and surgical outfit.

After a farewell meeting in Halifax 15th of July, my wife and I went to Amherst where I addressed the St. Stephen's Presbyterian Church on the subject "Korea." July 18th and 19th were spent in Truro and St. John in formal farewell, and then we crossed the continent to catch the Empress of India on August 1st.

A peaceful passage to Yokohama landed us in Japan, and for ten days we waited in that busy commercial port until the Korean boat should leave. During these days I successfully vaccinated our whole party, getting a typical pustole in each case, and a good deal of fever and prostration in the case of myself and wife.

Reaching Nagasaki on August 29th we had again to change steamers, and finally on Sept. 3rd we embarked for Chemulpo, Korea, which was reached on Sept. 7th, after a call at Fusan.

We at once went up to Seoul and were most kindly given entertainment by Dr. Underwood, missionary of the Presbyterian Church U. S. A., until we could make other arrangements. Then we had the use of Dr. Avison's summer residence from Sept. 14th to Nov. 11th. At the very first I engaged a teacher of the language for my wife and myself.

On Sept. 23rd I started on a ten days' itinerating trip with Dr. Underwood, in which I had the benefit of his most valuable instruction in mission methods and saw large gatherings of souls into some of the Churches under his care.

From Oct. 19th to Nov. 4th I attended daily the meetings of the annual Session of the American Presbyterian Church (North) and the three Sessions of the Presbyterian Mission Council of Korea; also met several times with Messrs. Foote and McRae to organize our mission, discuss future movements, mission policy, etc., and together we agreed in deciding upon Ham Kyong Do as the scene of our future labors.

On November 11th it was again my privilege to take a trip with the oldest and perhaps the most successful of all the missionaries in this land, Dr. Underwood. This time Sorai was included in the places visited, and my wife and Mr. Maerne formed part of the missionary band.

We were away from Seoul for five weeks. We spent about five days in Sorai, our eyes gladdened by a sight of the luxuriant soul harvest which has followed McKenzie's labors, and it was my privilege to administer the rite of baptism to ten new communicants.

About sixteen days were spent at Hui Ju training a theological class of 20 leaders in Christian work, who came from country villages and towns, including seven men from Sorai, and daily evangelistic meetings were held in public parts of the city. I was enabled to assist in the musical training of the class, and in the public and open air services by leading the singing with my cornet.

We reached Seoul again on Dec. 17th and spent the remainder of the year in preparing to go to Wonsan, and in language study.

On both of the trips above mentioned, as well as during my first residence in Seoul, I was able to do some small amount of medical and surgical work, treating in all about fifty.

My main labor in Korea has been language study, and medical work has only been done when it could not be refused. The trips into the country have not interfered with acquisition of the tongue, but have rather contributed to more rapid advancement, especially as they gave me the benefit of Dr. Underwood's help and advice.

I feel also, that as it was necessary to show ourselves to the Sorai Church, and necessary to learn the ways of itinerating which in Korea is considered the most useful mission method, our long tour will commend itself to the approval of the Board.

Rev. D. Macrae reports:—

I am glad to say that my health has been good since coming here. I have spent seven weeks out of three months itinerating. I had the pleasure of accompanying Dr. Underwood on one of his missionary tours for five weeks, and I trust profitably.

I have seen a great deal of the province of Whang-Hai, up as far as Sorai. To me it represents a province that will in a few years be wholly self supporting and under settled pastors.

It is an ideal country, with the richest soil I ever saw. You might turn your garden shovel in almost anywhere, and without labor sow your garden seed; strong, rich, mellow soil.

So rapidly is the Christian work spreading of itself that the present force of missionaries is unable to overtake it. The natives carry on the work, build Churches, and go out preaching and evangelizing without one cent of remuneration.

The scene of McKenzie's labors is, I venture to say, one of the brightest spots in the heathen world, and stands to-day as the banner province in Korea, and is the shining star in the darkness of this land.

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As you know, after prayerful consideration, and after receiving the opinion of the Advisory Council, we decided to take up work on the virgin soil of Ham Kyong Do, to the north. Mr. and Mrs. Foote are there at present, and Dr. and Mrs. Grierson and myself expect soon to join them.

We have had delightful weather all along. Since December has come in we have had a little snow, just enough to throw a mantle of white over the mountains, the ground is frozen, but not deep.

We had two heavy earthquakes this week. Dr. Allan told me that one was the heaviest he has felt since coming here fifteen years ago.

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IV.—INDIAN MISSIONS IN MANITOBA AND THE NORTH-WEST TERRITORIES.

There has been a slight extension of the area covered by these missions on account of the undertaking of work among the Valley River Indians, a small band in the north-western part of Manitoba, and at Long Plain among three small bands in the central part of the province. Neither of these missions will involve any considerable expenditure of money. The reports, which are summarized herewith, show the usual gradations of light and shade, but the limitations of space, which allow the giving of little more than statistics, made it impossible for the report to set forth as one might do the bitter need of these cold and hungry Indians, the haunting fears which their superstitions and their medicine men foster, the material comforts, the cheerful outlook upon life, and the calm confidence with respect to the future which the missionary brings within their reach, and not least, the lonely but strenuous and consecrated lives lived by the men and women who have given themselves to Christ's work among the Indians. Most of them are young, but some have grown gray in the service, and all ask for our encouragement and our prayers.

The rigid limitation of building appropriations during the past two years has made it necessary for some of our missionaries to carry on their work under much discomfort, and especially at Crowstand and Lizard Point, at the cost of no little suffering. It is hoped that the Assembly, before which this comes, will under the leadership of its Foreign Mission Committee authorize the expenditure of the buildings asked for in the estimates at Crowstand, Lizard Point and Birtle.

REGINA INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL.

Rev. A. S. McLeod, principal.—The number of pupils on the roll is one hundred and eighteen, and the average attendance for the last quarter was one hundred and three, a number somewhat less than last year, because the very large graduating class of last spring, which numbered thirty-five, has not been entirely replaced by new pupils. It is not the intention to have any graduation ceremony this spring, but simply to give certificates of honorable discharge to the small number of pupils who have completed their course. There are twenty-nine Indian communicants, of whom sixteen were added during the year. There were twenty-four removals, two of them by death, but chiefly by graduation from the school. There were eight adult baptisms. Forty-four dollars was contributed to the missionary schemes of the Church. The school sustained a severe loss in the death of Mrs. Moffat, who for four years had given faithful and eager service to the interests of the boys and girls under her care.

Miss Nicoll, who had rendered excellent service as teacher, gave up her position in the course of the year, but the Committee hopes to see her in the work again after a period of rest.

Mr. McLeod says:—Our out-pupils are having varying success. In many cases sympathy and inspiration for better things have failed them where both might have been looked for. Justice is sometimes meted out by officials in a fair enough way, but unsympathetically. On the whole, considering everything, the conduct of very many of our former pupils very greatly cheers us. Two of our graduates are now employed in the school under regular wages. A number of the other graduates have remained away from the reserves, and some of these already have bank accounts exceeding \$100 each, and they have besides the prospect of steady employment. At Hurricane Hills, Birtle and Crowstand other graduates are employed. On different reserves we have ex-pupils who are now married and living in homes of their own. These homes have been very highly spoken of. We are trying to fol-

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low up all ex-pupils as best we can. Many letters are sent to them, and a book is kept in the office in which is preserved a record of all reading and study books forwarded to them. These are gifts, and may in some cases become the nucleus of a little library. *Progress* is also forwarded to every ex-pupil and out-pupil; it keeps absent pupils in touch with the school, and fosters their *esprit de corps*. We are doing everything in our power for the up-lifting of the character of our Indian children, and we firmly believe that Divine Grace has taken hold of many of them. That the power and love of God may be wonderfully revealed in their lives is our unceasing prayer."

MAKOCE WASTE (*Prince Albert*.)

Miss L. M. Baker, missionary teacher.—Miss Baker is now our senior missionary. It is twenty years since she went as a missionary teacher to Prince Albert, and she had the hardship a few years ago of breaking new ground and beginning a new work among the Sioux refugees in the neighborhood of that town.

The school has twenty-two names on the roll, fifteen Sioux and seven non-treaty Cree. The Sioux girls, who have been a little more than a year in school, are making good progress in all the branches taught, are good knitters, which gives them employment at home and adds much to the family comfort. The boys too are doing well. Truancy is a thing of the past. The larger ones are always present unless obliged to remain at home to work. Our severe winter has often prevented the smaller ones from coming. Willie (a lad of twelve years) when kept at home usually sends us a note explaining the reason of his absence. Our daily readings, we believe, are doing much to mould the minds of these children from pagan homes. We have taken in two little girls to live with us, one six years old, the other nine years old. Both are bright girls, and they are very happy and contented.

Sabbath services have been held regularly every Sabbath morning throughout the year, with an average attendance of twenty. Since the New Year we have had also an evening service. We also tried to have the children come alone at 2 p.m., but as the weather was so severe it had to be given up until spring; however, they all come in the morning. The men now attend quite regularly. As yet we have had no baptisms, but we can hardly call all pagans. Few can realize how difficult it is for an Indian to come out alone and face the opposition of the old medicine men. Poor Jocky's death was evidence that there may be many silent Christians among them; we will rejoice when we see them take a firm stand for Christ, but we are willing to work and pray and patiently wait until they shall be so moved by the Holy Spirit that they shall make a complete surrender and become faithful, earnest Christians.

An addition was made to the mission building during the year, at a cost of \$230. The ground floor is used as a reception room for the Indians, and it is here the meetings are held. The upper storey affords the additional accommodation which makes it possible to take in the two little girls mentioned above.

MISTAWASIS.

Rev. W. S. Moore, missionary.—Services are held each Sabbath morning in the church at Mistawasis with an attendance of seventy, and monthly at Mount Nebo with an attendance of twenty-three. There are fifty-five communicants on the roll, of whom nineteen were added during the year. There were four removals, two of them by death. There were ten baptisms of infants and one of an adult. Thirty-one dollars was contributed to the Schemes of the Church, ten dollars being given by the local Women's Foreign Mission Society.

Mr. Moore writes:—The past year has been one of the most successful in the history of our mission, there being a goodly number enquiring the way to eternal life. The communion of the Lord's Supper was held on the first Sabbath of April, and no less than thirteen enquirers presented themselves. Six were accepted, and the others, though generally acceptable, were not so clear in their knowledge of

things spiritual as to warrant us in declaring that we considered them to be genuinely converted. And the Spirit's work has not been among the young alone, even the aged have been stirred to confess their negligence in the past.

At the date of the last report there was trouble about the Indian agent. Since then a new agent has been appointed, and the change has been a very pleasant one for the missionary and his family. Mr. Goodfellow, the present agent, is married to a daughter of the late missionary here, the Rev. John McKay, and no better agent could be asked for.

Miss Gillespie, the teacher, reports that the school has twenty treaty Indian pupils on the roll and ten others. The average attendance for the quarter ending with the 31st March was a little less than ten. "Owing to the very severe weather and to sickness among the children, this has been, so far as attendance goes, the most discouraging quarter we have experienced since my coming here. Those who did attend have made good progress, and their conduct has been very good. Their Christian zeal is still conspicuous."

LAKESIDE.

Mr. Campbell H. Monro, missionary.—This mission was without regular supply for a year and a half, at first because of a shortage in Foreign Mission Funds, and latterly for three or four months because of the difficulty of finding a suitable missionary. The position was offered in succession to five young men, four of whom had volunteered for foreign mission work, but it was declined by each. It was only in the autumn of last year that the vacancy was filled by the appointment of Mr. Monro, a young Englishman, who has shown no little devotion and readiness to face difficulties in taking up once more a work which had fallen into a very disorganized condition. We have by no means recovered even yet the ground that was lost during the interregnum, but what can be done is being done, and we hope once more to see the work on these reserves on a good footing. During the vacancy occasional services were held by Mr. Jacob Bear, assistant missionary from Round Lake.

FILE HILLS.

Mr. Alex. Skene, principal.—Mr. Skene says: Work has moved forward quietly during the past year. Six of our pupils were out with farmers for from three to seven months, and received for their work per month from five to sixteen dollars and board. The reports received each month from their employers regarding their general deportment and the quality of service given were, without exception, most encouraging. All were in Christian homes and attended Sabbath school and services regularly. The conduct of all at the school has been, on the whole, up to the average. We have our Sabbath school on the Sabbath, and during the summer months the services are held in a little church about four miles from the school. The larger pupils show much interest in these services.

The general health of the children during the year has been good. The number now on the roll is twenty-one, an increase of four during the year.

On the reserve there are signs of improvement. Many have now comfortable houses, which they keep very neat and clean. Pictures illustrating the Sabbath school lessons, furnished by the school, are pasted on the walls, and are made the subjects of a talk when the houses are visited. Though they still adhere to their old religion, many of the old customs are not observed, and they are more ready to listen to the Gospel message than formerly. Still there is much darkness. The reserve was visited for over two weeks by Mr. Jacob Bear, from Round Lake. He held services in one of the Indian houses on the Sabbath, and visited the people in their homes during the week. They expressed themselves as glad to see him, and thankful for what he told them.

The long strain of service on Mrs. Skene as matron and the increasing attendance at the school made it necessary to relieve her somewhat, and in the course of last autumn Miss Jennie Webster was appointed assistant matron.

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ROUND LAKE.

Rev. Hugh McKay, missionary.—“There are thirty-three names on the school roll, and the average attendance for the year was twenty-eight. Four have united with the Church on profession of faith, and five others have asked for baptism. They will be received at the communion in June.” The teacher is Mr. D. A. McKay, who is doing good work, but he finds the confinement of the school room severe upon him, and is about to send in his resignation. Two boys discharged from the school last year have been doing well, and have given satisfaction in filling positions of comparative responsibility. One of the girls who left the school last year has been married to an industrial school graduate. There are three big boys belonging to the school who hire out during the spring and summer months.

Religious services on the Reserves have been kept up as formerly, in spite of the extraordinarily severe weather of last winter. Morning and evening services on Sabbath are held at the Mission House—these are held by Mr. D. A. McKay or by Mr. Jacob Bear in the absence of the missionary. Fortnightly services are held at Gaddie's and at Goose Lake: Kewistahaw's and Kennie's monthly. The circuit of these places covers 60 miles, and the attendance varies from an average of 50 at the mission to an average of 10 at Goose Lake. When services are held at the far western reserve it is necessary for the missionary to leave home on Saturday. At the Indian Agency Mr. Sutherland, the farm instructor, conducts a Sabbath School and is a great help to the missionary. The number of Indian communicants is 24, but in addition to these there are not a few who, while not professed Christians, give assent to all the missionary says and co-operate heartily with him in school and charitable work. There are some, however, especially on the Reserves most removed from the Mission, who are irreconcilably opposed to the white man, his religion, his schools and all his ways.

A small house of the nature of a cottage hospital has been provided in the neighborhood of the Mission for some old people who were homeless and helpless. It has been constantly occupied for the past seven months, and, at a cost of about \$50 for maintenance, has been the means of relieving much suffering.

HUPRICANE HILLS.

Rev. Ewen Mackenzie, missionary.—Mr. Mackenzie reports:—Our work is in every respect more successful this year. The Roman Catholic priests have made the greatest efforts to get children for their school at Fort Qu'Appelle and to get a Church established here; yet, notwithstanding, our work has only prospered the more. Members of some families hitherto identified with the Roman Catholic Church have attended our services regularly, and at one time or another during the year there have been at our service representatives from every family on the Reserve. Permission has been given by the Indian Department to the Roman Catholic Church to erect a Church building on the Reserve, as the result of a so-called poll, at which it was said the Indians requested the establishment of such a Church. As soon as it was known on the Reserve that such permission had been granted, the Chief and head-men sent a protest to the Commissioner. Two of these head-men, in the presence of the Agent and missionary, declared that the Agency interpreter had misinterpreted them in the matter of the poll.

Morning and evening services are conducted every Sabbath. The morning service has an average attendance of 12 and the evening an average attendance of 35. I have continued the class for young men which I began last year. It is largely of the nature of a Bible Class and has been conducted almost every week day during the winter. The average attendance is 16. Three made good progress. Two can read almost everything in Sioux, and have gone over Matthew's Gospel and the small Sioux Catechism. The other, who began with the alphabet at the beginning of the winter, made wonderful progress and is able to read Sioux fairly. The others have been irregular in attendance and have made only small progress. Mrs. Mackenzie

has given the women instruction in baking, dressmaking and other branches of household economy. For the use of these classes the house which was formerly used by the interpreter has been fitted up, partly at the expense of the Indians themselves. We cannot yet speak of decided converts, but we are thankful for the opportunities we have of instilling the truths of the Gospel into the minds of our Indians, and for the tokens of better things.

THE CROWSTAND.

Rev. Neil Gilmour, missionary.—Services are held on Sabbath morning at the Church on the Reserve, with an attendance of 30; at Two Creeks in the afternoon, in the house of an Indian, with an attendance of 15; and at the Mission in the evening, with an attendance of 40. The number of Indian communicants is 22. There have been three additions during the year and one removal. There were ten baptisms of infants, and \$60 was contributed to the Schemes of the Church. There has been very little using of liquor on the Reserve during the winter, in which respect there is a marked improvement compared with a year ago. The improvement is largely due to the removal of a bad half-breed element. The attendance at the class for women, which is in charge of Miss Petch, and is held in different homes on the Reserve, has been good and much interest is taken in it. The difficulty is to furnish material for work. A week night prayer meeting is held from house to house on the Reserve. The comfort of teachers and pupils has been seriously interfered with by the unsatisfactory condition of the buildings, which were very cold during the winter; but plans are being prepared with a view to the remedy of this difficulty before another winter comes on. The number of pupils enrolled in the school is 35 and the average attendance 31. The attendance during the past winter was very regular, and the quarterly examination held during the last week in March showed that good work is being done. The conduct of the children has been very satisfactory, and the school has been almost entirely free from sickness, for which we are very thankful.

BIRTLE.

Mr. W. J. Small, B. A., principal.—The number on the school roll for the quarter ending March 31st was 46, and the average attendance was 44. Two boys and two girls have been transferred from this school to Regina, and four (one girl and three boys) were discharged. The girl is in service in Winnipeg and giving good satisfaction. Two of the boys are working for farmers—both at the same place as last year—and one is at home at Lizard Point helping his father. Hugh McKay, a graduate of the Regina school, continues to be in charge of outdoor work at the school, and his services are very well spoken of. On several occasions last summer he was employed in mission work, and he gives promise of being a very useful Christian man. The pressure upon the school accommodation, which led the Committee to ask for an addition to the building last year, is increasingly felt, and it is of prime necessity that measures should be taken in the course of this summer to provide additional room. A sum of money for that purpose is included in the estimates.

BIRD TAIL.

Rev. John McArthur, missionary.—The attendance at the Sabbath service is 30 and at the week night prayer meeting 14. In addition to these services conducted by the missionary, the Indian men carry on weekly meetings under the auspices of the Young Men's Christian Association, and the women meet weekly as an auxiliary of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society. There are 27 Indian communicants. There were seven additions to the roll during the year and three removals—one by death and two by certificate. There were two baptisms of adults and four of infants. The contributions to the Schemes of the Church amounted to \$41.

The small log Church building which was erected when the Mission was first organized has survived its usefulness, and its place was taken last summer by a neat

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and comfortable frame structure, which cost \$900. The Indian congregation took a great interest in the erection of this structure and out of their poverty contributed with great self-denial and liberality to the work. Their money gifts amounted to \$57, and, placing a moderate valuation upon the amount of work the men did in the drawing of stone and lumber, they gave in all about \$200.

LIZARD POINT.

Mr. John Black, missionary.—Services are held not only on the Reserve, but at another place in the neighborhood of the Reserve, where there are some half-breed families. The average attendance at these services is 24. There are five Indian communicants, of whom four were added to the roll during the year. The number of deaths on the Reserve was eight. There were four baptisms of adults and six of children. Chief Astakesis professed his faith in Christ in the course of the year, received baptism and was married in Christian fashion. His change of attitude is telling in a very conspicuous manner upon the band, and the prospects for the advancement of Christian truth are much better than they were.

The only building connected with this mission is a small structure erected some seven or eight years ago, at a cost of a little over a hundred dollars, as a shelter for the Rev. George Flett, who used to pay occasional visits to Lizard Point. It is high time that a new building should be erected to serve in part as a residence for the missionary and in part as a place for holding religious services. A sum for this has been inserted in the estimates.

About two years ago the Church Missionary Society gave up the Mission which it had carried on for some time among the Valley River Indians about thirty-five miles north of Lizard Point, and the Indian Mission Committee of the Church of England has expressed its willingness that our Church should, if possible, take up this work; and this we hope to do by uniting the Mission to Lizard Point and providing services partly by the agency of Mr. Black and partly through the neighboring Home Missionary.

OKANASE.

Mr. R. C. McPherson, missionary and teacher.—Services are held on Sabbath morning, with an average attendance of 65, and in the afternoon, with an average attendance of 40. The number of Indian communicants is 40. There were two additions to the roll during the year and there were five infant baptisms.

Mr. McPherson reports:—The attendance of our people at Divine service on Sabbath is very good, and is the most encouraging part of our work. They take pleasure in attending Church and join very heartily in singing praises to God. They are earnest listeners and it is very encouraging to address them, because many seem to be benefitted and instructed. In the case of some it is quite evident that they have accepted Jesus as their Saviour and are trusting him alone for salvation. There are others whose attendance at Church is also very regular, but it is very difficult to know what their feelings and beliefs are, for they do not readily give one their confidence.

Members of this band have purchased farms outside of the Reserve—one of 320, the other of 160 acres—for which they paid cash. Several of them are in quite prosperous circumstances.

The school continues to give satisfaction. The attendance has been regular (two of the pupils had not been absent a day in eight months) and the progress is good.

ROLLING RIVER.

Mr. W. J. Wright, missionary.—Services are held in the house of an Indian on the Reserve every Sabbath morning, with an attendance of 15, and in the afternoon there is a service at the Mission House, with an attendance of 5. There have been several cases of Indians who have braved the public opinion of the Reserve and

have declared their faith in Christ ; but upon the whole the progress is slow, and many of the Indians are bitterly opposed to the proposal that their children should be removed for education to any of the Industrial Schools. There is very considerable improvement in the manner of life and material comforts of the Indians. Several new houses have been built under the supervision of the missionary, who is competent not only to advise, but to render practical assistance in such matters.

PORTAGE LA PRAIRIE.

Miss Annie Fraser, matron.—Services are held in the Mission Church at the Indian village, which is about two miles distant from the school, on Sabbath and on a week evening. The average attendance is thirty. There are fourteen communicants, of whom nine are adults belonging to the Reserve and five are pupils in the school. There were three additions to the roll during the year, and there were two adult baptisms.

The report says : We believe that there has been less drinking and quarreling among the Indians than in former years. Most of the men and women have worked well, and have in every way shown more of a disposition to depend upon themselves. There is truly a decided improvement in their manner of living. The services have not been on the whole as well attended as last year. A few of those who were in the habit of attending occasionally, have dropped off, owing chiefly, we have reason to believe, to the influence of the medicine men, who are putting forth their efforts, not perhaps as openly as formerly, but in a quiet way of their own. At the same time we are glad to find that the greater part of the Indians are taking a deeper interest than ever in the work, as shown by their regularity of attendance and in other ways. In the course of the year two young men have joined the Church, and others expressed their desire to join soon. The work of the school goes on in the usual way, and on the whole, with much to encourage us. There are thirty-one pupils on the roll : five were in the course of the year transferred to Regina.

PIPESTONE.

Mr. John Thunder, missionary.—Two services are held each Sabbath, with an average attendance of eighteen and twenty-two respectively. There are seven Indian communicants, including the native missionary and his wife, and there was one infant baptism.

The Committee regrets the departure of the Rev. A. N. McQuarrie, the minister of the neighboring Home Mission field, who gave a very considerable amount of time and trouble to the oversight of the affairs of this Mission. His place has been worthily taken by the Rev. David Spear, who succeeded him as Home Missionary.

The Indians of this Reserve in proportion to their means contribute very liberally to Christian work. They gave last year \$43 to the Schemes of the Church, and contributed also towards the building of the new church on the Bird Tail Reserve, from which many of them originally came. Mrs. Thunder conducts a very successful sewing class, which makes up into garments the supplies sent by the Women's Foreign Mission Society.

MOOSE MOUNTAIN.

Mr. F. T. Dodds, missionary. A daily morning service is held in the mission house, with an average attendance of ten ; and the attitude of the Indians, many of whom were hostile to the establishment of the Mission, has become much more friendly. It is not possible yet, however, to gather any considerable number of them for a religious service, and the greater part of Dr. Dodds' missionary work is conducted by visiting from house to house and tent to tent.

NEW MISSIONS.

In addition to the proposal to add the Valley River Reserve already mentioned to the list of missions carried on by our Church, definite steps have already been taken to inaugurate work on three Reserves in the neighborhood of Portage la Prairie. The largest of these is at Long Plain, and the others are at Indianford and Swan Lake. The mission is to be called the Long Plain Mission, and for this work the Committee has been fortunate in securing the services of Mr. Robert McKay, a son of the late missionary at Mistawasis, who has given clear proof of a devoted Christian life, and who, during the absence of the Rev. W. S. Moore on furlough last year, conducted the services at Mistawasis with acceptance. It is expected that Mr. McKay, who speaks the Cree language fluently, will spend the greater part of his time in itinerating among these three bands.

For the last two years the Committee has been desirous of opening a Mission among the Indians on the west side of the Lake of the Woods, who to the number of five hundred are pagan, and without either schools or regular Christian ministrations. We have not yet succeeded in securing the Church's permission to undertake this work, but we hope that at an early date we may be permitted to enter into what is clearly a needy field.

The assistance of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society has during the past year, as in former years, been invaluable. Not only do the members of this society provide quantities of clothing and other supplies, which reduce the cost of maintaining schools and relieve a great deal of the suffering which would otherwise mark our severe winter, but they keep in touch with the missionaries by correspondence, and do much to encourage their efforts. It is with pleasure that the Committee hears of the proposal that Mrs. Jeffery, the secretary for Indian work, should visit the North-West again in the course of the coming summer.

The Committee has to express its deep regret at the loss of the Rev. Principal King, who had been a member of the Winnipeg Executive Committee ever since it was established upon its present basis, who amid his many pressing duties took a deep interest in the welfare of the Indians, and whose advice and sympathy as a member of the Committee were of the highest value.

SUMMARY.

Exclusive of the Indian missions in British Columbia, which are reported elsewhere, the Presbyterian Church has sixteen missions among the Indians of Manitoba and the North-West Territories; and in addition to the work at those sixteen centres, religious services are regularly carried on at nineteen out-stations. There are two hundred and thirty-one communicants, exclusive of Lakesend. Sixty-six were added during the year, and thirty-eight were removed. Two-thirds of the removals were from the Regina Industrial School, and represent, no doubt, cases where the communicants are either beyond the reach of congregational facilities or have connected themselves with congregations of white people. There were twenty-four baptisms of adults and forty-six of infants. The number of Industrial and Boarding Schools is six, and they have an enrolment of two hundred and eighty-four, with an average attendance of two hundred and fifty-seven, a slight falling off in the case of each school except File Hills. There are three day schools with an enrolment of sixty-eight, and an average attendance for the past quarter of thirty-four.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

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V.—MISSION TO JAPAN.

FORMOSA.

During the greater part of last year (1898) armed bandits continued their harassing work, and it was a great relief when we began to hear less of their depredations. Typhoons raged, and storms swept over the island, destroying crops, boats and buildings. Two chapels were completely carried away, three utterly destroyed by the rushing floods, and sixteen greatly damaged by winds and rains. To rebuild and repair will require three times as many dollars as would be necessary six years ago. Rice, labor and materials are fully three times as dear as in the past.

Merchants have been shipping rice for several months into this port, and yet it continues dear. Without this supply the famine would stare the natives in the face. Even now many Pe-po-loan are on the verge of poverty.

Two Buddhist sects here have been active with their usual tactics. Individuals are sent round villages, districts and cities to enroll the people, with the assurance of protection. Apparently the Japanese priests are in ignorant bliss of what masses think of such shallow proceedings. The whole business is ludicrous and contemptible. The influence of Japanese non-Christians generally is not on the side of morality. Profligate women exert a baleful influence amongst their countrymen in this island.

There is no visible decrease in the demoralizing habit of opium smoking, though under Government control.

Despite these and many other hindrances, the Lord's work is reviving and spreading. At Sin-tiam a preacher has taken the place of our departed friend, Rev. Tan He, and the work is prospering. In the cities, Tek-chham and Toa-tiu-tia, there are full houses every Sabbath. In Bang-kah I held thirty-nine evangelistic services during the year, and every time had anxious, eager hearers. The Christians contributed \$185 towards the mission. That is not a large sum; but think of it being given by Bang-kah people! The triumph of the Gospel in that once proud city cannot appear so great to others as to one who passed through all the changes from bitter persecution to liberal contribution. In one family the mother became a Christian, the son persecuted her and his wife, now both are Christians; not only so, but the whole household, consisting of fourteen persons. Praise the Lord!

OXFORD COLLEGE.

Though I visited our entire field in North Formosa, and preached every Sabbath in some chapel, still Oxford College engaged my closest attention. When here at Tamsui I met, as usual, with all the students, Bible women, and girls from the Girls' School, in College Hall for drill on various subjects every evening, and never saw them lose interest.

MACKAY HOSPITAL.

The Japanese have established a hospital not only at Tamsui, but at every important place in the north. Of course such work must reduce the numbers availing themselves of treatment in our hospital. An increase in steam launch fares also prevents many from attending. Besides, Dr. Wilkinson has opened a hospital up the Tamsui River, at Toa-tiu-tia. Still there were 1010 new and 4120 old patients last year. Dr. Wilkinson was seldom present, so with native students I carried on the whole of the hospital work.

Rev. Wm. Gauld held services on Sabbaths at all the stations except those in Kap-tsu-lan.

Rev. Giam Chheng Hoa visited Kap-tsu-lan and all the chapels on this side of the island.

Koa Kau rendered most faithful and valuable assistance to me both here at Tamsui and in the country. Indeed, without such aid my personal work would not be what it is.

Mr. Ishibashi, a Japanese unordained preacher, is employed to labor amongst his countrymen. He is to receive about \$30 per month—\$10 for house rent and \$10 per month travelling expenses. So the Church in Canada will note this for future guidance.

Heavy work lies before us for this year and next. Buildings have to be rebuilt and repaired. Stations have to be occupied, and students trained to enter the field. We have been preparing, however, for this, especially by giving so much time to College work. So we go forth fearlessly, in the strength of our God, to do battle against the devil's legions,—yes, under the glorious banner of our glorified Saviour we go forth confident of victory—confident that He will be with us even to the end. Amen.

VI.—CHINA.

HONAN.

The Honan mission has completed the tenth year of its history. The early struggles were severe, but as this report shows the Chinese are becoming more and more friendly and the fruits of these years of seed sowing are beginning to appear, yet the Chinese problem has not been solved. Nobody can predict what the next move will be. Should the Chinese Government collapse, as it threatens to do, the brigandage and chaos that will follow, humanly speaking, are likely to bring danger to all unprotected Europeans, and especially the Missionaries, whose names are associated with a foreign and hated religion. The prayers of the Church should constantly ascend in behalf of that mighty empire, in so interesting and critical a condition.

CH'U-WANG STATION. (*Prefecture of Chang-te*).

Station Work:—The work, in all its branches, has been carried on uninterruptedly during the year. While many persons were listening to the Gospel daily in the street Chapel, in-patients and their friends were hearing it in the Hospital wards. In this way the number hearing the good tidings was considerable. The sale of copies of the Gospels, in addition to Christian books of various kinds, though not so large as in some former years, was also encouraging. A pleasing feature of the work was to hear patients enquiring as to the meaning of the doctrines taught in these books and a few endeavoring to learn to read.

While work on the usual lines was steadily kept up, an effort was also made to reach those attending the small fairs held so often in the town. A well stocked table of Christian literature invited the attention of passers-by, and there some of those not ordinarily seen in the Chapel heard the Gospel.

Chinese morning prayers for both men and women were conducted by the missionaries as in former years, also the services on the forenoon and afternoon of each Lord's day. The natives take charge of the services held on Sabbath and Wednesday evenings.

The Sacrament of Baptism was administered three times, and that of the Lord's Supper observed twice during the year. Seven men and five women—four of these five belonging to Ch'u Wang—were received into the Church on profession of their faith in Jesus Christ. Twenty-seven persons—twenty-five men and two women—were carefully examined as to their knowledge of Scripture truth and the reality of their spiritual experience, and then enrolled as catechumens.

Station Classes:—Two classes for the instruction of catechumens and enquirers were held, the first from January 26 to February 6; the second from November 29 to December 11. Twenty-nine men representing eight villages attended the former, and twenty-eight from eight villages the latter. They were divided into five classes and instructed by the missionaries and Christian teachers, out of the Gospels of Mark and Luke, the Chen Tao Wen Ta, and Dr. Griffith John's catechism. A series of evening meetings was also held at which addresses on "Adam," "Noah," "Abraham," "Moses," "The Holy Spirit," and "Helping the Church" were given, as well as a stereopticon exhibition of scenes from the Old and New Testaments. Twenty of the men were able to read, the majority of them having learned to do so since becoming enquirers.

Helpers:—Our Mission has again been favored by the presence of two helpers from the American Presbyterian Mission in Shantung. These brethren took their full share of all the work done at the Station and on the field and were well reported of in the districts visited by them.

Field Work:—It is our aim to follow up each opening given in any village and to aid in strengthening those already entered on the Christian course. With this in view frequent tours were made to all the districts in which there are interested persons and we are thus kept in touch with the life and work of the various little Churches. Messrs. Grant and Mackenzie with four natives from the out-stations attended the Hsun Hsien fair in February, taking part in preaching and selling Christian literature to the large crowds which were present. That work grows in interest and in importance year by year and already the results are such as to make us hopeful for the gathering in of many precious souls in coming days. Mr. Grant, with one of the helpers, took part in declaring the tidings of salvation at smaller fairs in other towns as opportunity offered.

Building:—Hitherto the members of our Mission have occupied native buildings. Although these were changed and repaired experience is teaching us that their continued use is fraught with danger to health and usefulness. Through the generosity of the congregation of Crescent St. Church, Montreal, a sum sufficient to erect a new house and also a Dispensary and Hospital for Dr. McClure was guaranteed. The erection of the house was begun in the spring making it possible to occupy the new building during the "rainy season." Other houses will be called for in the immediate future, and we cherish the hope that there are congregations in Canada prepared to follow the good example set them in Montreal.

Health:—The health of our workers has for the most part been good during the year. On three occasions however, Dr. Dow has been laid aside by attacks of illness. From the last of these she is now rapidly recovering and we look forward to her taking her part in the work ere long. Mr. Grant, who has spent five years on the field without a health change, paid a visit this year to the island of Formosa, visiting while away many Mission centres on the mainland of China as well as seeing some of the results of twenty-five years of heroic service by Dr. George Leslie MacKay.

Roman Catholics:—The Pope's agents have been as watchful and aggressive as usual. They endeavored to gain a foot hold in two of our out-stations during the summer and opened a day school in Ch'u Wang. Questions have frequently been asked in the Chapel as to the differences between Protestantism and Romanism and, often unsolicited by us, information was given as to the tactics pursued by Priests and people. How professed servants of the Lord Jesus Christ can, in loyalty to Him, leave multitudes to live and die in heathen darkness while no effort is spared to win over to Rome those already professing Christ, is a problem we are unable to solve. Loyalty to Christ compels us to pursue a different method and believing that in the truth of God we have the only antidote for this and every form of error, we desire to acquaint all men with the Saviour who is the Truth.

Outlook:—China's condition grows more critical each year. Events which have recently drawn the attention of all civilized lands to this Empire do not seem to be generally known as yet in this part of Honan. Changes are, however, noted in the attitude assumed toward us by the official classes. Eight years ago they were so decidedly hostile that we have good reason for believing that the looting of our Mission premises, which occurred in 1890, was undertaken at the instigation of officials assembled here to meet the Provincial Governor in passing. This year while visiting Ch'u Wang on a similar errand the magistrates of the three surrounding *hsien* districts, as well as several minor officials, called upon us in the most friendly manner. While many persons are and probably will always remain hostile, the friendliness of others is increasing. In touring many persons are met with who are not ashamed to own that they were kindly dealt with at the Mission station and they make known the work. We have now six baptized Christians and one catechumen in Ch'u Wang while a number of the townspeople called at times during the year and held long conversations on Christian themes with some of the workers. The native Church is slowly but steadily growing and the older Christians are giving evidence of a keener interest in the more spiritual side of the work. With gratitude to our Heavenly Father for all the grace and goodness of which He has made us recipients in the past we close the year looking forward and waiting for fuller manifestations of His saving and sanctifying power.

WOMAN'S WORK. (*Ch'u Wang*).

Work for women has, during the past twelve months, been carried on along the old lines, with results that cannot reasonably tempt anyone to be "exalted above measure." The heart of the women of Ch'u Wang still sleeps its sleep of death, though life has been offered to not a few. Some, too, have hardened their hearts; but we give God thanks for the handful to whom He hath spoken, not in vain, and wait—wait, not doubting, for the richer manifestations of the mighty power that is able to work greater wonders than we have seen.

At the station morning worship has been conducted in each compound. On Sabbath mornings it has been good to see a group of women, neatly attired, in regular attendance at public worship, and to note the improvement in their behavior during service. One of our new members tells us that on Sabbath evening the women of the families in her compound gather in her landlady's house for singing and prayer. In the afternoon have been held a class for new women, another for more advanced women, and one for girls. From the advanced class four women were baptized in November. The training class for catechumens begun last year has been continued twice weekly up to the present time with an average attendance of seven. Thirty-one visits have been made in the town.

Village Work:—Eleven villages have been visited, all with one exception, within walking distance. In none of these near villages have we any Christians or even enquirers; still there are a few who are somewhat interested and to these we must go with the Bread of Life knowing that the promise is sure "My word shall not return to me void."

Station Class:—Early in the year two classes were held, attended respectively by three and six women. The results were gratifying; two were recorded as catechumens, and another after a probation period of over two years was baptized.

Medical Work:—As in other years hospital patients have been taught daily. There is reason to hope that a permanent impression was made upon some, but their homes are beyond our reach and we have no means of ascertaining the result of their stay with us. An effort was also made to reach the out-patients through Gospel talks by the missionaries and dispensary assistant. Cases treated:—

MEDICAL WORK. (*Ch'u Wang*).

This year for some unaccountable reason the number of patients treated is considerably less than during last year, still the attitude of those who come is in no way changed except it be that an increasing proportion of them are willing to listen to the preaching of the Gospel. There seems to be the same confidence in our treatment as formerly.

It was hoped that a new and more sanitary dispensary and waiting room could have been built, and for which money is already provided, but lack of building material prevented. During the rainy season part of the walls of the old dispensary and waiting room caved in, but providentially causing no damage to person and with the loss of only a few cents' worth of property.

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OUT STATIONS—(In connection with Ch'u-Wang.)

Tou-Kung.—Steady growth continues to characterize the Church here, services are held regularly on the Lord's Day, and a harmonious spirit prevails. Two children of one of the Church members have been baptized. A movement to erect a little Church was voluntarily set on foot by the Christians, and elicited such a hearty response from both Church members and catechumens that we hope to see it completed and used for the public worship of God during the ensuing year. To the natives themselves belongs all the credit for this onward move, and we trust it may be crowned with success.

Hsin-Ts'un.—The Church here has suffered from a variety of reverses, which have been noted in former reports. This year, death has taken away Wang Fu Lin, whose service to the cause of Christ in Chang-Te-Fu has frequently been mentioned. Some of the backsliding members have come under Romish influences, and are prepared to rent premises to the priests. A small number still remain faithful, and, as one of our strongest Christians is leader here, and some good men from neighboring villages join them in worship on the Sabbath, we still hope to see the cause of Christ revive. Two children were baptized and one Christian marriage celebrated here this year.

Hui-Lung.—The outlook in this town is hopeful. Two women have been recorded as catechumens, one of whom has suffered not a little personal violence for her devotion to Christ. Services are held regularly on the Lord's Day, and harmony prevails. During a large fair held in the town preaching and selling Christian literature were carried on for several days, and in this way many persons previously unreached heard the Gospel.

Fu-en.—A member of the Church in Hsin-Ts'un moved into this village some two years ago, and began at once to witness for his Saviour. The good seed sown has sprung up and promises to yield a fruitful harvest. There are now three baptized Christians and four catechumens in the village; also some interested men whose names are not yet recorded. The man who began the work is still faithfully testifying for Jesus, and very few among the Christians bear a more honored name or does his duty with such joy and loyalty as he.

Shih-P'an.—This is a town about five miles distant from Ch'u-Wang, in which, largely through the teaching and example of the brethren from Tou-Kung, the nucleus of a little Christian community has been formed this year. There are now five catechumens recorded, and these with others who are interested, meet for worship on the Lord's Day. Judging from present indications we look for the development of an aggressive Church here ere long.

All of these out-stations have been frequently visited by the missionaries and native helpers, and the interest evinced by the members of these little Christian centres encourages us all. Thus far there are no elders in any of these places, and the men designated as leaders are those who are regarded as such by their brethren. It will be necessary to instruct these more fully, and thus aid in fitting them to bear the responsibility devolving upon them, and enable them to become true leaders in aggressive Christian work at these and other centres.

HSIN-CHEN STATION.—(Prefecture of Wei Hui.)

Members:—Mr. Rob. A. Mitchell, Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Slimmon, Dr. and Mrs. Malcolm.

Owing to Dr. Malcolm's absence on sick leave, the dispensary work was in the hands of native assistants under the supervision of the foreign pastors, for nine months, the other three months there being no medical work. The attendance ranged from fifteen to forty a day, and all had the Gospel preached to them. A large number of Gospels and tracts were sold in connection with this work.

One station class of seven members was held for ten days.

One of the pastors and two natives helped in the work at the Hsun-Hsien Fair for fourteen days.

Several visits of from one day to a week were paid to the out-stations Hsiao-Chai, Ho-Tao, Pai-Mao, and Wang-P'an Cai.

During the two months of Mr. Mitchell's absence, helping with the work at Chang-Te-Fu, no station work was carried on, the helper being away touring in the Hwai-Ch'ing-Fu-region.

During the year some have been added to the number interested in the truth, but none have been examined for catechumens or for baptism.

The attitude of the people is, perhaps, slightly more friendly than formerly.

CHANG-TE STATION.—(*Prefectural City.*)

Members:—Mr. and Mrs. Goforth, Dr. and Mrs. J. Menzies, Mr. J. Griffith, Miss M. A. Pyke, Miss M. S. Wallace, M.D.

Station Work:—We record with thankfulness that we have been permitted to dwell in this city in peace for upwards of three years. Throughout this period nothing worse has occurred than some ugly threats and rumors, but during the past year even these have ceased.

The chapel, as usual, has been open all day the year round. The numbers in attendance have not been great except on special occasions, such as the official examinations and fairs. Many interesting cases have been met with, some among those who have visited the chapel several times, others among those who have heard for the first time. Some have been met with who could repeat several chapters of the Bible, or parts of the catechism, or the Ten Commandments, or some prayers. Some would answer almost any questions about the way of salvation, and had abolished idols from their homes, but had not gone so far as to openly take up the cross and follow Jesus. Among the patients in the hospital there have been some cheering conversions in the course of the year. At one time there were as many as six or seven who seemed to sincerely believe, among them being a wealthy landowner.

During part of February and all of March we were very busy receiving the military and literary students, and as it was the triennial examinations, most of the graduates in the prefecture were also in the city. It was not unusual to have several hundred students visit our compound in the course of a single day. During one day upwards of eighteen hundred men were received, and allowed to pass through the missionaries' house. When the crowd was not too great in the front yard we brought the students in, in bands of twenty or thirty at a time, we showed them through the house and then gave a short address in the study, after which we distributed literature among them and let them out at the back gate. The *hsien* official sent his brother out to see us, saying he was anxious lest so many students coming to the compound might create a disturbance, but when he heard that we were careful not to allow too great crowds in the front yard, and saw several bands of students pass through apparently well pleased with their reception, he went away, saying he would cease being anxious at the *yamen*. There was not the slightest rudeness shown by any of the literary students, and the behavior of the military students also, with one or two exceptions, was all that could be desired. By means of a globe, maps and astronomical charts we could always gain attention, and lead their minds up to the one true God. These young men seemed to heartily appreciate what was being done to entertain and instruct them. Confucian pride for the time being, as they were brought face to face with the creative energy of the Omnipotent, seemed to forsake them. Our hope in thus receiving the students, besides avoiding the danger of present disturbance, was to make friends throughout the prefecture, so that we might reap the benefit in future tours. So far we have not been disappointed, for wherever we have gone in visiting the different *hsiens* we have met with friendly advances from students and teachers whom we had received while at the examinations.

On account of the Emperor's efforts at reform the scholars of the city and district became unusually friendly. They came and sought our advice about the

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books necessary for the "new learning." We hear also that they clubbed together and sent away for two thousand taels worth (\$1450) of books on western science. Then came the Empress Dowager's retrogressive decrees, and immediately the desire for things western dropped about ninety per cent. But Mr. Ma a Hanlin, son of the late Governor of Kuengtung, said, "Unless the heavens fall reform must come." However, for the present the anti-reformers, with Li Ping Hung, ex-Governor of Shantung, at their head, seem to be in the ascendant.

A station class for men was held for eighteen days, beginning January 25th. Seventy men were in attendance, some for part and others for the whole of the time. Another class, practically self-supporting, was held for three weeks in December, with about thirty men in attendance.

Field Work.—There are now in connection with this mission centre fifty-one towns and villages, in each of which there are one or more interested enquirers; this is an increase of about twenty-five places during the year. We can make special mention of only a few of them.

P'eng-Ch'eng, the pottery centre, ninety *li* (three *li* equal one mile) to the northwest, has in the course of the year been visited several times by the Chinese evangelists. We have the names of thirteen men who believe, most of whom were interested when we held services there for eleven days two years ago. Only two of these have been recorded as catechumens. A believing mother there has sent a request that prayer be made for her boy, who is addicted to gambling. This woman has arranged for the little company of believers to hold their meetings at her home.

Liu-Chang-Hsien, ninety *li* to the north-east, up to the present has had no recorded believers, though some were interested during former visits there. Again during the autumn we spent ten days in the city, preaching on an average about twelve hours daily. A good many seemed deeply impressed, and some gave in their names as enquirers.

Mr. and Mrs. Chang, of *Liang-Kung*, eighteen *li* to the northeast, are earnestly testifying for Christ in their own and neighboring villages. Several men are now studying the doctrine with them.

We spent three days at *Hung-Hwa-T'un*, eighteen *li* to the north-west. One day we preached for several hours in Mr. Chao's yard to the neighbors, who crowded in. Since then several of them gather at Mr. Chao's every evening to hear more of the Gospel.

At *Liu-Hsien*, one hundred and ten *li* to the west, we stayed eleven days in an inn, telling out the Gospel story to all who came. We were kept talking from ten to twelve hours a day, the number of our hearers varying from one to about one hundred. At times the Holy Spirit's power was very manifest. About twenty men from different parts of the *hsien* district declared their purpose to forsake idolatry and seek the only true God and Saviour. Up to the time of our recent visit to this city there was only one place in the whole district where there were any professing faith in Christ.

In the *Hoa-Pei* region, fifty or sixty *li* to the south-west, there are eight villages, in each of which one or more believers bear their witness against the surrounding heathenism.

Yuan-Ts'un, a village three *li* to the east, reports thirty Christians, nine of whom are baptized, and seven are recorded as catechumens. Persecution there has ceased, and the persecutors are becoming friendly. Several of the Christians have been helping us to preach the Gospel in surrounding villages.

There is a hopeful work going on at *Ta-Han*, a village twenty-five *li* east of the city. A poor carpenter of that place heard the Gospel here about a year and a half ago, and has since been daily testifying. We spent two days there about the end of November, and found an unusual interest among women as well as men. During the second day the inn-keeper, annoyed at the numbers coming, refused to let us stay at his inn, but an interested listener provided a table, chair and tea on the street in front of his house, and we preached there until sundown. Then we went to spend the night with the carpenter, who lives in a room in the compound of the temple of Buddha. After supper the people came and filled the room until

about midnight, attentively listening to the Gospel story. Next day it was discovered after we had gone away to another place, that something had been forgotten. One of the Christians was sent back for it. He found the carpenter surrounded by the interested ones, who prevailed on our messenger to stay over night, and that evening the room was again filled; before they separated all knelt down to pray. Since then the carpenter has sent for some one to go and help him teach the enquirers.

Ta-Kwan-Chwang, twenty-five li to the south-east, leads in being the place of greatest interest. In the village it is estimated that there are upwards of a hundred who have forsaken idolatry and are praying; of these two are baptized and twenty-four are recorded as catechumens. The leader, Wang I., is a well-to-do farmer. He is warm-hearted, enthusiastic and, believes with the simplicity of a child. He has great faith in the efficacy of prayer, indeed prayer is his remedy for almost anything. Last summer a bitter persecution arose which threatened to destroy all the growing grain of the Christians, but Wang I. called them all together and they prayed about it and went about their work with happy faces. The persecutors, seeing the undisturbed demeanor of the Christians took alarm, and sent men to make peace. "The wicked flee when no man pursueth." Wang I. has also come to realize step by step the duty of propagating the faith, of contributing to its support, and of Sabbath observance. When we went on a preaching tour to Lin-Chang, he accompanied us at his own expense. Recently we spent six days at his home, going out to the neighboring villages day by day. His heart is set on having them all know the Gospel which has been such a revelation to himself. The very fact of a man of his standing and influence making such a bold and joyous testimony among the neighboring villages is making a profound impression, and we should not be surprised to find hundreds in that district forsaking idolatry during the next few years.

Bands of Christians have accompanied us in preaching the Gospel in sixty-seven villages surrounding the city. In every village we recognized one or more who have been listeners at the chapel. As a rule we have been well received by the villagers. The village work is important on account of the numbers of women who are reached. They sometimes form the larger part of our audience. It is also important in that it gives courage to those who may be secretly believing, to face the opposition. In this village work the native Christians help cheerfully, bearing their own expenses. It is not the least cheering and hopeful part of the work to see the way in which the Christians respond both in time and money for the work of evangelizing. The salary and travelling expenses of a native evangelist are borne by the Chang-te-fu Church, some of the native Christians even tithing their income for this purpose.

Wang Fu Lin, after a long, lingering illness, passed away in August. We deeply feel the loss of such a man. He was a brand snatched from the burning, and became a chosen vessel of the Lord. He was a preacher with powers very much above the average, and was always ready to work beyond his strength.

During the year the Sacrament of Baptism was administered to twenty-three adults and three infants, while fifty-six were recorded as catechumens.

During the hot season, while Mr. Goforth and family were absent at the coast, Mr. R. A. Mitchell rendered valuable assistance in the work at this station. Our staff here was greatly strengthened in December by the return of Rev. D. MacGillivray from furlough.

WOMAN'S WORK. (*Chang-Te-Fu*).

Visitors :—During the first four months of the year hundreds of women were received into the missionaries' homes, and with few exceptions, all had the Gospel preached to them. Many of these women came to the city along with the students during the third month examinations, and were, as a rule, most willing to listen to the truth. Throughout the remainder of the year, though visitors have continued to come, yet the numbers have been few. We have noticed, with thankfulness, that a much larger proportion than in former years have come *purposely* to hear the Gospel.

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Bible Classes :—These have been held on Sunday afternoons, without a break throughout the year, the attendance at the women's class averaging thirteen. These women come to the morning service bringing a lunch with them, and remain till after Bible class. During the absence of Mrs. Goforth for the summer months Miss Pyke took charge of this class, in addition to her own class of native girls.

Hospital Visiting :—For about four months of the year visits were made to the hospital during dispensary time, when out-patients as well as in-patients could be reached, but at the beginning of the hot weather this work, we regret to say, was dropped. We hope to take it up again shortly, and if native help can be obtained, to continue it winter and summer. It is one of the most important branches of our work.

Outside Work :—Most of this branch of the work has been carried on by Mr. Goforth and the native helpers, for in their preaching tours many women are reached. A few visits have been paid to the villages by the foreign ladies, the most noticeable one being a three days' visit to an out-station, nine miles to the south-east, when Mrs. Goforth and Miss Pyke in responding to the earnest request of the Christians, met with a most enthusiastic welcome. Fully twenty women believers gathered at the evening meetings for women, and most of these helped in the day time at out-door meetings for preaching to the heathen women. The work in this place gives cause for deepest thankfulness.

Station Classes :—Two classes have been held, the first in February for ten days. At this, as was the general custom of our mission, the food was provided for those who were invited. A contribution box was provided, and the members of the class were invited to contribute towards the expense of the class, but as none had come prepared, only a small sum was contributed. At this class the attendance was twenty-six, besides several small children. In November a second class was held, and an effort was made towards having it on a self-supporting basis. Only those who could bring their own food were invited, the mission supplying kindling, vegetables, etc. The class lasted eleven days, the total attendance being fifteen adults and eight children over seven years of age, several of the latter being regular scholars. The total contributions received from the women amounted to 3386 large cash (one cash equals one-sixteenth of a cent), and the total expense incurred was 1867 large cash; thus we had a balance of 1499 cash to give to our native helper fund. We are truly thankful that this our first real effort among the women towards self-support has met with such success. One old woman of seventy-five, who earns a little by spinning raw cotton, decided to give to the Lord twelve cash out of every one hundred and twelve she earned for each pound of cotton spun. When in this way she had saved up a thousand cash, she brought it as a thank-offering for God's goodness to her and her son. We are glad to be able to say that something has been done this year towards starting an anti-foot binding movement. Four women and two girls have already unbound, and others are preparing to follow their example. During the last women's station class one evening was devoted to this subject, and we trust a good impression was made. Most of those present went the next morning to one who had unbound, for patterns of shoes and socks.

One encouraging fact, which must not be omitted, is that a much larger number of books have been bought by women than in any previous years. In January alone more books were sold to women than during the whole of 1897.

It gives us the greatest pleasure to record the arrival of a new lady worker for this needy field, in the person of Dr. Margaret S. Wallace, who arrived here in November.

MEDICAL WORK. (*Chang-Te-Fu*).

The hospital and dispensary have been open during the whole year, with the exception of three weeks in October, when the doctor was absent on a holiday to Ch'u-Wang. The total number of treatments for old and new patients was 10,575, or an average for the year of thirty-six per day, the largest number of patients treated in one day being one hundred and twelve.

During the early part of the year several patients were visited in their homes in the city, but latterly those visits have been discontinued, as in almost every case

the doctor was called in only after native doctors had given up the case as hopeless, and the patient was at the point of death. Each such visit, of necessity, wasted a good deal of time, and little or no good was done. So now all patients who can be brought are treated in the dispensary. We have had all classes and conditions of men and women among our patients; beggars who would like free meals between treatments; farmers, mechanics and tradesmen, (these being the most satisfactory of patients); also gentlemen of leisure and officials.

During the year quite a number of patients came requiring surgical operation, but when they learned that nothing but an operation could help them, their courage failed.

A number of men came to break off the opium habit. Of these several seemed to be in earnest about the matter, and looked to Christ for help in overcoming this terrible, blighting sin, and most of these ere leaving gave evidence of being freed from the habit. We have as yet no place where we can control these patients when the craving for opium is upon them, and so several others who came, after staying a while went away slaves of opium still.

Perhaps the most interesting case we have had (I think it is the saddest), is that of a boy thirteen years of age, named Chang. Last winter, when away from home at a large town not many miles from here, he was attacked on the street one night by a wolf, which bit him three times on the face before it was driven off. When he reached the dispensary three months later the poor lad presented a sight not easily forgotten. From brow to mouth, and from ear to ear, the whole face was torn off, leaving nothing but the periosteum covering the bones. One eye was completely gouged out, and the other closed up; the nose was completely gone, and one ear torn and closed up, while the upper lip was completely divided, the two segments being fully three inches apart. Plastic operations were performed for formation of an upper lip, the remaining eye and injured ear were operated on, so that now he has sight and hearing, though he is still very sadly disfigured. Both he and his mother have become Christians while they have been here.

Our hearts have often been gladdened by seeing others, who came here for healing for bodily diseases, give evidence of having found healing for their souls. Eighty-six operations in all were performed.

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VII.—CENTRAL INDIA.

The mission in Central India has been chiefly characterized by continuous seed sowing, and an increasing willingness in some districts to hear Christian truth. The missionaries have been discouraged by their inability to expand the work as opportunity offers, on account of the limited resources at their disposal.

They have also had to mourn the death of Dr. J. J. Thompson, who gave promise of becoming an effective worker.

After serious illness both Miss Chase and Miss Ptolemy have been compelled to return home, but they will, it is expected, after a short period of rest, be able to resume their work fully restored. The Committee have appointed Mr. J. T. Taylor, B.A., Mr. Alex. Nugent, M.D., and Miss Bella Goodfellow to India. Mr. Taylor is a graduate of Knox College, Dr. Nugent of Queen's College, and Miss Goodfellow of the Ewart Training School. All are highly approved and will greatly strengthen the hands of our staff there.

As the staff increases, the numbers at home on regular furlough from year to year will increase. That, along with occasional absences on account of sickness, makes it all the more important that there should be frequent additions in order to take up and maintain expanding work when others are compelled to lay it down.

The annual report received from India is interesting but too long to be given as a whole. The following abstracts will, it is hoped, give a bird's eye view of the whole field.

MEN'S WORK.

RUTLAM.

1. *Work Among Indian Christians.*—Besides ordinary Sabbath and midweek services, Christian Endeavor Society and Sabbath School, instruction is given in the Printing house, Dispensary and both orphanages, and also classes for catechumens are conducted.

There are thirty-four communicants, 102 baptized adherents and forty-eight unbaptized adherents. Of the communicants about one-half contribute one-tenth their income. The total number baptized during the year was, thirty-seven on profession of faith, and two infants.

2. *Evangelistic.*—There are two out-stations, Jaora and Khachraod, that are regularly visited by Dr. Campbell and his native assistants, and also occasional visits are made to other surrounding villages.

3. *Amongst the Young.*—There are at this station over one hundred famine widows and children. The need was so great that the missionaries found it extremely difficult to refrain from taking in much larger numbers than their resources seemed to justify. Dr. Campbell writes "To the glory of God's grace he it said, that on the whole such a change has passed over them that they have caused wonderfully little trouble, and the joy we have had in them has far exceeded the trouble. On profession of their faith, repentance and love, thirty-six of them have been baptized during the year, and about a score who have applied for baptism have been kept back for further instruction and observation."

They all attend school three hours a day. The boys and girls take turns at cooking, etc., and the girls grind, spin, and sew, whilst the boys learn gardening, house-work, sewing, bed-tape and cotton carpet weaving, carpentering, type-setting and book-binding. The boys delight to visit villages with older Christians and aid in singing and tract distribution.

The Raja granted a site on which were built school, dormitory, workshops, cookhouse, etc., for about fifty of them.

4. *Medical.*—In the Dispensary, the native agent, Ramlah, reports 9,256 treatments.



exceptions, to the College for so many years, has this year been broken. The Principal of the College, who was head of the Senate, has been taken from us. His work, so laboriously and faithfully done, is at an end, and he rests from his labors. Long will his works follow him. To him the class-room was a delight, the interests of the students were his supreme thought; and his devotion to duty, his thorough preparation for the work of the day, and his enthusiasm in the many subjects which he was called on to teach, will long remain an inspiration to succeeding bands of students.

The Work in Arts and Theology has been conducted with great regularity. The number of students in the theological classes, which this year opened in April, has reached thirty-nine—thirteen in the third year, twelve in the second year, and twelve in the first year, and two special, the largest attendance in theology ever reported to the General Assembly from the College. The number enrolled in Arts was 155, a larger number in the University classes than ever before reported, though a few less in the preparatory department. The aggregate attendance in arts and theology has thus been 194.

I. THEOLOGY.

Last report gave the names of eight in the graduating year. Of these, since last meeting of the General Assembly, two have been settled in important charges in the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West Territories, four are missionaries in British Columbia, one is pursuing a post graduate course in Edinburgh (of six applicants for the first half of the B.D. course he alone passed), and one is a probationer.

In the session of 1897-8, Dr. King lectured in Greek and Hebrew Exegesis, as well as in Systematic and Biblical Theology. Professor Baird took the classes in Hebrew, Church History and Introduction. Professor Falconer of Pine Hill College, Halifax, relieved Dr. King of Greek Exegesis during the latter part of the session, and Professor Ross of Montreal Presbyterian College for the second time lectured on Homiletics and Church Government.

classes in the previous year.

The Senate took immediate action in the line of the legislation of the General Assembly for the abolition of the literary course for students proceeding to the ministry. No new students were allowed to enter on this course and four students in the third year of the course finished their preparation, so that this course is now abolished in Manitoba College. A change in the curriculum is now being made in the University of Manitoba, which it is hoped will facilitate the carrying out of the plan laid down by the General Assembly.

The Senate heartily approves of the course for preparatory students outlined by the General Assembly, but would suggest the addition of New Testament Greek in the third year.

During the present summer session the course began on April 18th and will continue till September 19th. The general interests of the College have been well upheld during the past year, and the College Societies—Missionary, Literary and Athletic—as well as the College Journal, have been well maintained. ...seven joined the rank of contributing members during the year, while collections fell off somewhat, we note with satisfaction the revenue from rates was \$200 in excess of the previous year. Your Committee feels warranted in saying that a larger number of young ministers are interested in the fund than at any previous time in its history. 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REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE AGED AND
INFIRM MINISTERS' FUND (EASTERN SECTION)
FOR THE YEAR ENDING MARCH 31st, 1899.

To the Venerable the General Assembly:

The Committee on the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund (Eastern Section) desires to report as directed by the last General Assembly (minutes p. 40) on Report of Special Committee.

The Committee on the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund (Eastern Section) met in St. Matthew's church, Halifax, on October 5th, 1898, and was constituted.

The Board voted assistance to build at Saakatoon, Caron, Elva, Tynthead, but lack of harmony among the people or financial difficulties delayed building till this season. During the coming summer building promises to be fairly active.

RECORD OF SEVENTEEN YEARS.

In 1882, at the time of the inception of this Fund, there were only eighteen churches and three manse in all the country between Lake Superior and the Pacific. Since that time the Board has assisted to erect 324 churches and sixty-eight manses, which are worth in all, exclusive of the land on which they stand or the improvements and enlargements subsequently made, \$517,060. Where the Board helped to erect primitive log or unpretentious frame buildings, growing congregations have since replaced them with substantial brick or stately stone churches, worth five, if not in some instances, ten times the value of the original buildings.

MANSER.

Only one-fifth of the capital under the control of the Board has been employed in the erection of manses, and yet the rent saved by the manses would pay ten per cent. interest on the total capital entrusted to the Board.

The Board has encouraged Congregations and Missions to build manses with the view of stopping the heavy drains on missionary funds by high rents, and with the view of providing the conditions under which Christian work can be more comfortably and satisfactorily conducted.

THE ROBERT ANDERSON LEGACY.

During the past year the Board received from the executors of the late Robert Anderson, Montreal, the sum of \$2,000 less succession duties, or a net sum of \$1,800; for this timely legacy, the Board is most grateful. Why should not others, in disposing of their property, remember this helpful method of Church extension?

DETAILED STATEMENT.

As in other years, a detailed statement is here presented to enable the General Assembly to understand more clearly the assistance rendered by the Fund and the districts receiving aid.

PROVINCE OF MANITOBA.

Holland—A thriving village in the Cypress River District, surrounded by a good farming community; brick Manse costing \$1,500; loan \$500.

Olive—A station connected with Treherne; good wheat farming locality; church costing \$800; loan \$400.

Breadalbane is a farming and ranching district north of the Assiniboine river, and about 180 miles west of Winnipeg. A tornado wrecked the church, necessitating the erection of a new one. Frame, cost \$1,600, loan \$700.

Solsgrith—A station north of Birtle, on the M. and N. W. Railway, surrounded by a good farming and grazing country. Church, frame, cost \$900, loan \$400.

Austin—A village on the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway, about eighty-four miles west of Winnipeg; congregation became recently self-sustaining; frame manse worth \$1,200, loan \$600.

Inter Alia.—The Committee proceeded to consider the proposed changes in the regulations of the Fund recommended by a Special Committee of the General Assembly.

No opinion was expressed regarding the 1st and 2nd recommendations, for the reason that they concern the Western Section of the Church solely.

The 3rd recommendation is, That Rule 10 be changed to read as follows:—*A Minister who has not paid the annual rate into the Fund shall not be entitled to make any claim upon the Fund as a matter of right, but his case may be made the subject of special consideration by the General Assembly.*

The Committee was unanimous in rejecting this proposed change, on the ground that almost every case might be made the subject of special consideration by the Assembly. It was felt that the proposed change would be a hardship on the

Goshen.—A farming and ranching district, northwest of Edmonton about 20 miles; log church, cost \$300, grant \$50.

Willowbank.—A rural district west of the Calgary and Edmonton Railway, near Olds; church, frame, cost \$500, grant \$100.

Mountain View—is a ranching district in Southern Alberta, close to the Rocky Mountains, and in the Mormon settlement; log church worth \$450, grant \$150.

PROVINCE OF BRITISH COLUMBIA.

Fort Steele.—A trading village in the Upper Columbia valley, surrounded by mines, connected with Cranbrook, a divisional point on the C. P. R. Crow's Nest Pass branch; church \$800, grant \$150.

Salmon Arm.—A farming settlement on the main line of the C. P. Railway, about 60 miles east of Kamloops. People in straitened circumstances, but willing; frame church, cost \$1,000, loan \$300. Congregations of Windsor and St. Andrew's, London, helped congregation complete church.

Rossland.—Great mining town west of Columbia River. Congregation prosperous and progressive; frame church costing \$4,000, loan \$700.

Sandon.—A typical mining town in the mountains between Kootenay and Slooan lakes, pushing and progressive; frame church costing \$1,500, loan \$180. Mr. Harris—American—gave five valuable lots, and Mr. Tomlinson, another American, gave \$500 to help the congregation to build. Both belong to the Episcopal Church.

IV. NEW WESTMINSTER.

Work along usual lines, was carried on by Lo Cheung, assisted by a few Christian workers in New Westminster and Sapperton; with occasional visits from Mr. Colman, Mr. Ng, or Mr. Winchester until the great fire when we were left without habitation. Work has been suspended sine die.

V. CANNERIES.

Our Missionaries were again guests in the Methodist Mission house, so far as room accommodation was concerned. Their relations and fellowship with their Methodist brethren were most close and cordial, and their dwelling together in some respects of assistance to the work as a whole; nevertheless we hope that this season we may be able to secure a small Mission house of our own at Steveston. The number of Chinese at the canneries in the past season was a little larger than in former years; the work is increasing, encouraging and important.

Mr. Colman, Mr. Ng, and Mr. Winchester, each spent some time in this work. They were never received so kindly before, and had many opportunities of preaching and exhorting,—sometimes to white people.

VI. INTERIOR TOURS.

Mr. Colman and Mr. Winchester spent forty days from the 27th of May to the 6th of July visiting the principal points in the interior of the province, where Chinese in numbers are found. Eighteen places were visited, and large numbers of Chinese, many of whom had never heard the Gospel of the grace of God before, listened for the most part with curious, and not infrequently, with intelligent and deep interest. By day or by night, on the street or in stores; in the foul atmosphere and frenzy of the gaming den, in the quiet of the miners or the gardener's cabin, or by the picturesque riverside, no opportunity for the proclamation of their message was allowed to pass unimproved. In addition to Chinese addresses, one of the Missionaries gave fourteen missionary talks and preached fourteen sermons to congregations of our own people and to some audiences of white men on the street.

With the exception of some points of lesser importance, the same ground was covered by Mr. Colman and Mr. Ng, in November. This trip was even more successful than the former. Besides giving the Gospel by the living agent, tracts and Scripture portions in the Chinese language, were liberally yet carefully distributed in every place. The Missionaries were most kindly received by the ministers of our Church and some of the Church members with whom they came in contact. Some in each of the larger centres are quite in sympathy with our work, but feel the obstacle of the language to be so great that without someone able to speak Chinese co-operating with them, their labor must be in vain. *We ought to have a Chinese Evangelist itinerating among the cities and towns of the Kootenays, and north as far as the main line of the C. P. R.*

*General Remarks—*The three Christian Endeavor societies of Vancouver, in addition to supplying teachers for two hundred and forty-two evenings, contributed \$103 for the support of the school in that city.

The three Christian Endeavor societies of Victoria have given much appreciated help in teaching, and the Christian Endeavor, senior and junior, of First Presbyterian Church contributed \$42, for special work. It ought to be stated that the burden of this work falls upon a very few and the faithfulness of some of these is beyond all praise. Notwithstanding the great difficulty of working through the medium of English alone, we are persuaded, that congregations in towns where we have no Mission, would be gainers in spiritual power and blessing, and accomplish no small amount of good, by a loving persistent effort to gather and teach a Chinese class. Revelstoke has set a good example in this and others are making an effort. Let it be mentioned to the glory of God that when they were planning for the first interior tour with no funds in sight, He put it into the hearts of one in China, and another in India, and others at home, to voluntarily send their contributions at the right moment, and sufficient for more than two tours. On the whole, the workers believe the past year to have been the best in the history of the Mission. Even where no profession of christianity is made, we see the old forces waning, and the waxing of the new.

The following are the recommendations :

1. That the grant for a site and building in Victoria be renewed.
2. That the attention of the General Assembly's Foreign Mission Class be again respectfully called to the urgent need for a lady worker in Victoria.
3. That a Chinese Evangelist be appointed for work in the interior of the province, salary not to exceed \$40 per month.

IX.—INDIANS IN BRITISH COLUMBIA.

ALBERNI.

Home:—There are eleven girls and fourteen boys in the Home. Some of the boys are so large that they must soon be dismissed, unless some kind of industrial instruction is provided. There is a decided conviction amongst the teachers and others in the community, that without industrial training, especially in farming, the children will have no other alternative when they leave the Home than to fall back into their old habits or associations. There are in connection with the Home sixteen acres of land, a large part of which is good and fit for cultivation. There is already a vegetable garden of considerable size, which provides largely for the Home. The land is exceedingly difficult to clear, but notwithstanding that the garden is being annually extended, and it is proposed to give more attention to that part of the work in the future. It is interesting to note that one of the boys of the school, now grown to be a man, is in charge of the outside work, and gives good satisfaction. He is intelligent, industrious, and judicious in the management of the smaller boys, who assist him in clearing, stumping, woodcutting, fencing, stock-feeding, etc. The girls in the home are good bread-makers and general house-keepers. The teachers are encouraged by evidences of effort on the part of the pupils to subdue their own natures, and live in obedience to the Saviour of whom they are daily taught. It is also interesting to find the children taking home Sabbath School pictures, etc., and imparting to their friends at home the lessons received in the school. There are regular Sabbath School and other services conducted on the Sabbath and other days of the week, and Harry, who is in charge of outside work, is useful in playing the organ, and not only in interpreting, but in expounding the Scriptures to the older people in their own language. There were twelve deaths during the year, and in some instances at least, there is hope that the truth which gives peace has been received into the heart.

Day School:—There is beside the Home a neat, commodious school-house, in which the children are taught the usual branches of an English education by Mrs. K. Cameron. The year closed with twenty-four children in the school, six being in the fourth standard, fourteen in the third, and four in the second. The children are apt to learn when memory or imitation is chiefly involved, but are not as capable in processes of reasoning. It is possible, however, that deficiency in the use of the English language accounts for that in part. They memorize poetical selections, draw maps, write, etc., with pleasure and satisfactory neatness and accuracy.

INDIANS OF BARCLAY SOUND.

Tribes, six; number 600; missionary, M. Swartout; teacher, Miss E. M. Armstrong; stations, Ucluelet and Dodger's Cove; enquirers, not baptised, three.

Itinerating:—The year just closed has been a trying one. Itinerating work has been carried on under the usual difficulties, about nine hundred miles having been covered in open boat or canoe, besides several trips in coasting steamer, visiting O-hi-ahts, U-clul-ahts, How-chuck-les-ahts, and a few visits to the O-pitch-es-ahts and Shesh-ahts. A month was also spent at Steveston, on the Fraser River, where a larger number than usual of our Indians congregated this year for fishing. The hindrances to the spiritual progress of the Indians are so many and strong that itinerating seems an absolute necessity to counteract the special influences for evil and keep in touch with them, and yet the danger of losing ground at the central points during continued absences is great. The Indians themselves recognize this, and plead for us to remain constantly with them; or, if we must go, to return as quickly as possible, both of which have been hitherto impossible, owing to their scattered position and the lack of help.

UCLUELET.

We have to record an irreparable loss to our mission in the death of the one baptised convert, whose influence and active assistance were for two years a wonderful help to the Lord's work, not only amongst his own tribe's people, but generally on this field. The revival of evil, which began about the time of his death at Ucluelet, has continued with only a short break, until the present. Two only of our enquirers at this point have stood firm, and even these are weaker, though we hope that in their case victory will the more speedily come through apparent defeat.

An epidemic of measles broke out during the year, carrying off several children of the two tribes, Ucluelets and Ohiahts, and disturbing the school at Ucluelet, which had to be closed for three weeks in consequence. Besides this, the observance for some weeks of the great heathen festival called *Klo-Rwan-na*, or wolf-dance, not only caused a revival of superstition, but materially affected the attendance at school, as many of the children were taken away to be initiated into the mysteries of their faith. And yet, despite these discouragements, and also that little or no help can be expected from the parents in keeping the children at school, we have to record our gratitude for the way in which the school has been kept up, the average for the year being over ten, while at present writing the attendance is more than double that number.

At Ucluelet also there has been much liquor drinking and gambling. Several Indians have engaged in the sale of whiskey, and others have learned to make home brewed beer. A constable has been appointed by the Provincial Government for this point, and there has been much excitement and trouble owing to numerous arrests.

DODGER'S COVE.

At this point events have moved more smoothly. The Ohiahts have preserved their reputation for sobriety and loyalty to our mission as a tribe, but beyond this little can be said. The enquirers have made little advance in spiritual life, in fact owing to the peculiar circumstances of our work they have been left much to themselves. The Ohiahts have been contemplating a removal from Dodger's Cove, and the time seems opportune for establishing them in a civilized settlement, with practical industries, which would operate both as an industrial school and be a means of livelihood for many of them. The difficulty is the lack of necessary capital to start such a settlement.

Results :—Mr. Swartout writes : "When I first came to the coast, knowing the difficulties, I thought that if we could count converts in ten years we would do well. I have been here five years, and at Ucluelet we had for a year and a half as bright an example of Christian devotion as ever was given under such circumstances. He is now gone. Despite overwhelming odds at Ucluelet, not infrequent amongst Indians, there is there a little band of praying enquirers, the pathos of whose pleadings is rarely seen. At my last visit a young man who had been wandering away, said on his knees : "I have sinned, I have gone astray, might I come back to God." At Dodger's Cove, where the Indians have been left quite alone for half the time and consequently have had excuses for backsliding, there is an anxiety to hear, a spirit of enquiry that is refreshing. At a meeting the other night about fourteen young men and adults (including one old man and his wife) declared in favor of being Christians, and that with knowledge; and their lives will compare favorably with the members of our churches. With a less rigid system of receiving members than we think it wise to follow, we would enroll them as members of the Church.

AHUSAHT.

This village, about thirty-eight miles north of Ucluelet, has at the present time a population of two hundred and eighty. The death rate was high last year, owing to a scourge of measles, besides scrofula, consumption, the improper care of infants,

and especially the practices of native doctors. The measles epidemic was not so fatal as is usually the case, because of better nursing and treatment under the direction of the missionary. A small hospital, the missionary thinks, would be of great value and be appreciated by the Indians themselves.

Mr. Russell writes:—"The Indians to-day are not the same as they were one year ago. The change is quite distinct. We recognize it in their appearance, conversation, and lives. During the year the village was thoroughly cleaned up, and has been in a much better sanitary condition than ever before. The houses as a rule are cleaner and better kept. Several men have partitions in their houses, thereby separating their sleeping rooms from the general living room. There was a great increase in the number of gardens, and in the variety of vegetables raised. The school children had a beautiful garden of potatoes, turnips, carrots and beans. During the summer months there is always a dearth of water. This is one of the problems we have to face in the future."

With few exceptions the dead now receive Christian burial; the old custom of placing their dead in trees is disappearing. A graveyard has been selected, but they have not yet overcome the superstitious dread of fencing it in.

As to moral reform, "The advance is very great. Formerly the Ahousahts were noted far and wide for gambling. They have now decided unanimously to prohibit all gambling games and cards from their village for a period of three years at least. All the cards in the store were secured, and those in possession of the Indians were brought out upon the beach and publicly burned. Speeches were delivered during the burning against the evils of gambling. About thirty little boys, all expert gamblers, applied the torches to the cards. From that day to the present there has been no gambling of any kind at Ahousaht. Several young men have publicly renounced gambling, cards, liquor, and impurity during services on the Sabbath. The feeling for moral reform is very strong." In order to provide a substitute for these vices Mr. Russell has fitted up a gymnasium, which he says will soon compare favorably with any in British Columbia, and is much enjoyed by the Indians.

There were fifty-eight children enrolled in the school during the year, with an average attendance of twenty-three, which is a great improvement on the previous year, when the average was only twelve. The Indians so frequently remove to their fishing stations that not more than one-half of them are in the village at one time, except during the winter months, which causes irregularity in the school. When the attendance is very large Mr. Russell finds it necessary to have one-half in school in the forenoon, and the other half in the afternoon.

The following scheme is proposed for industrial work: "Convert the upstairs of the school-room (where we live) into four rooms, one for sewing, tailoring, knitting, etc.; another for carpentry, shoemaking, etc.; the third for modelling, drawing, geography, etc.; and the fourth into a kitchen for instruction in cooking and general housekeeping. Moreover, any one of these could be used for Scripture instruction, where the closest possible contact with the pupil is necessary. The advantage would be that each pupil would be under instruction six hours in the day instead of three. It could be carried out with the aid of one assistant, and the building of a small cottage for us to live in."

The religious services are conducted with increasing interest—the seating capacity of the school being often taxed to the utmost. Many who formerly came for amusement now give earnest attention. The population is dividing itself into those interested and those opposed to the Gospel. "One of the difficulties is their intense reserve as to what they believe. The manner of worship of the father is secretly communicated to the child, and there are very few families who hold the same belief, or who know the belief of other families."

"One young man is a professing Christian, and notwithstanding severe persecution has remained firm. Others are earnest enquirers, and the whole tribe has decided for moral reform. The Spirit of God is visibly working."

Mr. Russell sends an earnest plea in behalf of Claoquaht, which is becoming a mining centre, and the Indians are becoming demoralized. There are four tribes in Nootka Sound asking for a missionary, and there is no missionary at Chicklesaht and Quatsino Sound. The call is loud for more workers.

X.—CHINESE IN ONTARIO AND QUEBEC.

We have to report progress and a number of favoring indications, though untoward influences have been quite active and considerable attention has been given during the year to making it "hard to do wrong, as well as easy to do right." Effective suppression of evils has been obtained, however, and even the impediments of a strange tongue, with some Oriental habits of life and thought, are passing with many who are being brought into touch with Christianity, and opportunities are opening and widening all along the line. A very successful Chinese New Year festival was held upon Jan. 24, at the American Presbyterian Church, closely identified with and a generous helper of this work. A similar and very interesting gathering occurred later in honor of the General Assembly, when about two hundred Chinese scholars were present, to the gratification of many members of the Assembly, to whom it was a novel sight, and who remarked the importance and promise of this feature of foreign missions at home. Among prominent individuals present the Rev. D. McGillivray of Honan, China, was among those who took part. The open session of the large Knox Church Sabbath school the evening before was also of special interest, as showing so many representatives of China's millions under such direct gospel influences. Among the prominent members to address the large company was the moderator of the General Assembly, the Rev. Dr. Torrance, who had himself visited Canton, to which place also the Rev. W. C. Burns went some fifty years before, burdened for the souls of these same people, after preaching a time in Knox Church, when as yet no Chinese was found in North America.

Two Chinese died during the year and were given Christian burial as usual, there having been no heathen funeral since the inception of this work, though such are features of cities of the United States and the far west of Canada. But death is no respecter of persons, and this work mourns the loss, on March 4, of the Rev. John Nichols, ever the friend and often the earnest teacher of Chinese in St. Mark's school; also the very faithful superintendent of St. Giles' school; Elder John Mackie and several teachers of different schools.

The Chinese are taught in Sabbath and week-night schools, and a few privately; but four are now found in the public schools, three being in Westmount, and all giving a good account of themselves. Others are desirous of acquiring a knowledge of mechanical arts, as they are able to do elsewhere, that they may return to aid China, whose abundant mineral resources and cheap labor offer such great opportunities, and whose day of probable rapid development has already dawned.

A number have been drawn out in several directions, particularly domestic service, while in August was announced the "first Chinese bicycle race ever held in America," at which there were a number of contestants.

Several days later there occurred the most brutal attack of the year upon an old Chinaman, who was taken to the hospital bleeding and unconscious, from his laundry on St. James street. Though like instances are less frequent now, there have been half a dozen or so, and ways of imposing upon the, for the most part, unoffending Chinese, are all too common. But in these directions, and those in which some of the Chinese are their own worst enemies, our thanks are due to Judges Wurtele, Demontigny, and Lafontaine, especially, and to Chief Detective Carpenter. The most effective move against evil tendencies was by the latter on August 7, when some thirty were locked up for gambling, all thereafter, however, allowed to pay the fine, except the chief offender, who spent a term in prison. This case caused the first exhibition in Montreal of the severest form of Chinese oath, that of cutting off a cock's head. An interesting closing event of the year was the celebration at Chalmers Church on Dec. 25th of their Christmas festival. The wide interest was shown by there being upwards of a dozen ministers upon the platform, representative of the several denominations.

As to the work of the seventeen Presbyterian classes or schools, while the average attendance of teachers and scholars is not quite up to that of the previous

year, it is show
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year, it may be remarked that for the past several months an increased attendance is shown in most cases, and that the shortage is due chiefly to lack of teachers. Quite a number of profitable teachers' meetings have been held, and the Chinese service has been well sustained and much helped by the Chinese Christians. Four were received into Knox Church during the year, though there were a number more probationers, and a number professedly Christian, two being women, whose highest welfare several lady teachers are earnestly seeking. The night school, under the efficient and faithful conduct of Miss Woodington has enjoyed a successful year, and there is abundant evidence of much gospel seed having been sown here also. Its thanks are due to a number of earnest voluntary helpers, and our grateful acknowledgments are also extended to the faithful corps of superintendents and the large body of earnest self-denying teachers, quite a number of whom in the different schools zealously come from Churches of other denominations. And while giving paramount thanks to God for any good accomplished, it also becomes us to thank the pastors and Churches, too, of the various denominations for prayerful sympathy and interest.

For the "Chinese question," or any other in Canada or beyond, the gospel is the only answer, and that which we must give these "messengers of the nation," where now are many eyes longing for the light.

Out of the shadow of night,
The world moves into light;
It is daybreak everywhere!

It is thus seen that the total receipts are nearly \$1300 greater than the receipts of last year.

GENERAL.

3. The Ewart Training Home is making gratifying progress. Last year the Home opened with one student, soon two more were added, and the session closed with four students. This year began with five taking the full course, at the New Year another was added, making six, and the capacity of the small house was taxed to the utmost. Two students, Miss Hattie Fraser and Miss Bella Goodfellow, completed the two years' course and received diplomas. It is much regretted that Mrs. Ross, who was in charge of the Home, and proved herself to be admirably fitted for such duties, has accepted another appointment and consequently has sent in her resignation.

4. A call has been extended to the Rev. D. MacGillivray, B.D., by the "Society for the Diffusion of Christian and General Knowledge among the Chinese," and

the following resolution has been adopted by the Foreign Mission Committee: "The Committee having considered the call to Rev. Donald McGillivray, of Honan Mission, from the 'Society for the Diffusion of Christian and General Knowledge among the Chinese,' to remove to Shanghai, and take part in the work of preparing Christian literature for the Chinese people, agree, subject to the sanction of the General Assembly, to approve of Mr. MacGillivray accepting the call and devoting himself to the important work to which he has been invited, and that in the meantime Mr. MacGillivray's salary and expenses shall be paid by the Church, and he thus shall continue to be a member of the Presbytery of Honan."

5. The Rev. Wm. Gauld, who returns on furlough from Formosa this year, has been asked to visit, on his way home, the Maceo Mission, and report to the Committee. Six teachers are supported in the Maceo Mission by friends in Montreal, in order to maintain connection between Chinese in Montreal and their friends at home. These teachers are under the care of the American Presbyterian missionaries laboring at Canton.

6. The Rev. A. B. Winchester, who for six years labored so faithfully amongst the Chinese in British Columbia, has tendered his resignation. The Committee has asked Mr. Winchester to reconsider his resignation, and continue in the work so important to our own country and to the land from which so many of these foreigners come, and to which so many of them return.

FINANCES.

The Eastern Division of the Committee reported last year a debt of \$4,541.11 against the ordinary fund, and a balance on hand for Korea of \$3,161.40, leaving a net debt of \$1,379.71. This year they report a debt of \$2,138.26 against the ordinary fund, and a balance of \$2,638.52 in favor of Korea, giving a net balance in favor of the missions of \$500.26. While a larger amount was last year received from legacies than during the previous one, yet not all the improvement is due to this source of revenue. The people gave more liberally also, and encourage the hope that necessary yearly expansion will evoke a response of growing generosity on the part of those who are enjoying the fat things of the Gospel at home.

The total receipts for the year for the Western section were \$138,462. This is the largest revenue in any one year in the history of the Church. The Committee have for some time felt the importance of having a special fund, apart from the ordinary one, as a working balance. Their expenditure every month is in the neighborhood of \$10,000, and yet for the first seven or eight months of the year very little money comes in, thus rendering it necessary to borrow large sums during the year, for which interest has to be paid. A year ago the Committee instructed the treasurer to place all legacies in a special fund. At the end of the year these amounted to the exceptionally large sum of \$39,047. From this amount there was transferred to the Ordinary Fund \$9,047, leaving to the credit of this special working balance \$30,000. It is well to state in this connection that a very large portion of this money was left as a bequest to the Foreign Mission Fund, and according to the terms of the will, only the annual interest can be used in the furtherance of the work. At its meeting last month the Committee largely increased their obligations by the appointment of several additional missionaries, necessitating increased liberality on the part of the Church in the maintenance of this department of its work.

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REPORT OF THE BOARD OF THE PRESBYTERIAN COLLEGE, HALIFAX, 1898-99.

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To the Venerable the General Assembly,

The Board of the Presbyterian College, Halifax, respectfully reports as follows :

Receipts from interest on investments were \$7,049.57, and from gifts and one hundred and eighty-five congregations \$4,363.50, making a total of \$11,413.07. There is a gratifying increase in the number and amount of congregational contributions. The expenditure was, for salaries of four professors and one lecturer in the Presbyterian College, and one professor in Dalhousie College \$10,000. ; for furnishing and repairs \$533.47 ; and for all other expenses \$1,280.03, making a total of \$11,813.50, or \$400.43 above receipts. There was a balance on hand at the beginning of the year of \$611.95, which is now reduced to \$211.52. This should be noted and additional liberality shown in the future to prevent the recurrence of debt.

The fund for Bursaries shows \$520.59 from interest, and \$364.09 from collections and gifts. There were bestowed eight special Bursaries and two prizes, amounting to \$258.00 ; and aid was given in the boarding department to the amount of \$600.

The Library Fund received \$152.49. The small sum of \$70.49 was expended for magazines and a few recent important books.

The capital invested for the College is over \$115,000, and for Bursaries about \$10,000,—particulars are given in the report of the Finance Committee. In addition to this the Board holds in trust for Dalhousie College, investments amounting to over \$25,000.

The old building and premises have been carefully kept in good repair.

The new building which now becomes *The College*, inasmuch as it affords three large class rooms, and a room for the Library, as well as a spacious gymnasium in the basement, is now completed and was very successfully opened at the closing of the late session. It is a handsome structure built of fire-proof material, and costing about \$21,000, of which over two thirds are already subscribed, and more than one half paid. The Board has made arrangements for securing the remainder of the cost at an early day, and have no doubt that success will crown their efforts. The old building will henceforth be the students' home with dormitories, reception and reading rooms ; but the Senate will reserve its room there for its own special use.

On looking back over the year, the Board is much gratified, because of the hearty generosity of our people, and the success that has marked the past session of study.

The Senate's report is herewith submitted, and special attention is called to the facts therein presented, bearing as they do upon the training for the ministry which this College supplies.

The Board devoutly thanks the Great King and Head of the Church for the manifest tokens of His favor ; and affectionately entreats our people to respond to His goodness, by an adequate support of the institution that supplies most of the ministers, who as pastors and preachers, are their guides in spiritual things.

It is with much sorrow that we drop the name of one from the second year, Mr. J. D. Noble, B.A., who died after a short but painful illness on April 3rd, 1899. Mr. Noble was a man of fine character with a reserve of strength and spiritual conviction which, with his lovable disposition and faithful devotion to work, gave promise of an excellent ministry. He who calleth laborers into His vineyard knoweth how long and where they will serve Him best. In recording this event the Senate would express its sympathy with his widowed mother and her family in their bereavement, as well as the sense of its own loss.

The ordinary work of the Session calls for no special remark, the students having given good evidence of their attendance on and diligence in their studies. The work in the various departments was as follows:

I. CHURCH HISTORY AND HOMILETICS.

In the class of Church History, the general history of the Christian Church from the Reformation to the present time, was studied by means of examinations on two days of each week. On two other days lectures were delivered upon Scottish Church History from the fifth to the seventeenth century. During the first part of this course the history of the early Celtic Church down to the reign of Malcolm and Margaret in the eleventh century, and afterwards from the beginning of the Reformation to the close of the Covenanting age formed the subject of lecture. It was only by great economy of time and by condensation, wherever that was possible, that the history of such periods could be overtaken in one session. Upon all these studies two written examinations were held, one in January and the other in April. In the class of Homiletics, lectures were given twice a week in which, under the usual heads of matter, form and expression, the various topics commonly considered in sacred rhetoric were discussed. In connection with this class a written examination was held in the month of April. The Thursday of each week was employed in the hearing of the discourses prescribed according to the law of the Church; in which exercise it was required of each student, not only to read a sermon or lecture, but also to read a Scripture lesson and the prayers usually offered in any regular public service.

As it was necessary that so many as twenty-six discourses should be heard this winter, a few of these were heard and criticised in some of the other classes. The work in these departments of Church History and Homiletics has been performed by the students with most exemplary diligence and regularity.

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II. HEBREW AND OLD TESTAMENT EXEGETICS.

The Junior Hebrew Class was attended by six students of the first year, all of whom, with one exception, had graduated in Arts. This class met five times a week. Davidson's Hebrew Grammar with exercises formed the subject of study. Two written examinations were held with excellent results.

The class in Senior Hebrew and Old Testament Exegetics consisted of twenty-six students, fifteen being of the second year and eleven of the third. It met four times a week. Once a week selections from difficult portions of the Hebrew Bible were read, in connection with the LXX. and the Vulgate. Occasionally the class hour was devoted to Aramaic, the sight-reading of Hebrew, and the explanation of Massoretic notes. Once a week a text book on Hermeneutics was used, supplemented by lectures on the exposition of prophesy, types and parables; twice a week a lecture was given on several of the books of the Old Testament Canon, including Daniel and several of the Minor Prophets. A Hebrew critical exercise was prepared by each of the third year students. Two written examinations were held, one mid-session, and the other at the close of the term, and the averages attained were, in general, higher than usual.

III. APOLOGETICS AND SYSTEMATIC THEOLOGY.

In the Department of Apologetics and Systematic Theology the work of the first year is confined to Apologetics, the subjects considered being the Grounds of Theistic Belief, Anti-Theistic Theories, Miracles, the Credibility of the Gospels, Christian Evidences, and Comparative Religion,

During the past session sixteen students attended the class of Apologetics. In addition to *viva voce* and written examinations on the subject of class lectures, each student submitted two essays, the subjects being, "Why am I Religious?" and "Prayer in Relation to Natural Law."

In the class of Systematic Theology, which is taken by all regular students of the second and third years, the subjects considered included the Sources of Dogmatics, the Reality of Revelation, the Nature of God, the Doctrine of the Trinity, and the Work of the Holy Spirit.

In the department of Biblical Theology, which occupies a portion of each week, the subject of study was "The Teaching of Christ in the Gospels." Twenty-six students were in attendance upon this class. In addition to the *viva voce* and written examinations, two essays were written by each student, the subjects being, "The Supreme Authority in Religion," and "Our Lord's Use of the Old Testament Scriptures."

IV. NEW TESTAMENT EXEGETICS.

In this department, the work of which extends over three years, there are two classes. The Junior Class, attended by seventeen students, was occupied mainly with studies in the gospels. A large portion of the Gospel of John was read, and selections from Luke, chiefly from the first nine chapters, the last few weeks of the session being devoted to the closing scenes of the life of Christ, as recorded in all four evangelists. In addition to this, weekly lectures were given on Introduction to the Gospels, and the political and religious condition of the Jewish people in the time of Christ. One day a week was spent on the language of the New Testament and Textual criticism.

The Senior Class attended by twenty-six students read exegetically nearly four chapters each of the Epistles to the Galatians and Ephesians; one day a week was devoted to the discussion of written paraphrases of the Epistles of II. Peter and Jude. The second half of the history of the Apostolic age, concluding with a short course on Introduction to some of the disputed Epistles, and the history of the New Testament Canon, occupied another day of the week. Greek critical exercises were prepared by students in the second year.

In an advanced class meeting once a week, attendance on which was optional, the first six chapters of II. Corinthians were read and treated somewhat minutely.

V. ELOCUTION.

The students of the third year met on two days of each week during the course. Special attention was given to the reading of Forms of Service in Public Worship. For the development of public speaking, and at the same time to gain an acquaintance with the work of the Church Courts, discussions were held as frequently as time would permit.

Lectures were also given on the Public Statutes of Canada, so far as these relate to ministerial work, such as registration of births, deaths and marriages; each province having its own separate Acts, all differing from another.

The text books used were, The Directory for the Public Worship of God, Confession of Faith, Rules and Forms of Procedure, and the Public Statutes relating to the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

The students of the second year attended on four days of each week. The work in this class consisted chiefly in reading from the Scriptures, and selections from The Book of Praise. Attention was also given to the principles of Modulation, Expressive Delivery, the Uses of the Imagination, and Gesture.

On Friday of each week lectures were given on the Sources of Power in Delivery. At the close of the term the students passed a satisfactory examination, written and oral, and the prize for the best reading of the Scriptures was awarded to Mr. D. C. Ross.

Three hours each day were devoted to the students of the first year. The lengthening of the course made it possible to devote more time to individual work with the students, instead of in class. On one day in the week a lecture was given on the Principles of Elocution, special attention being paid to Respiration, Vocalization and Vocal Culture in general. At the close of the term this class passed a very creditable written examination, and a prize was given to Mr. J. W. A. Nicholson for the highest marks in the examination.

The Senate is pleased to be able to grant diplomas to such a goodly number, who for character and ability and attainment take a worthy place in the ranks of those who have graduated from this College in former years. It is a matter for congratulation that every member of the graduating year possesses the degree of B.A. It gives us special pleasure to state that one member of the class, Mr. D. G. Cock, is on his way as a missionary to the Klondike, so that our College now has her representative along with other Colleges of our Church in a work for our own great Dominion, which in its demands on endurance, spiritual power, self reliance and wisdom, is unsurpassed in any field, home or foreign.

Five students presented themselves for examination for the degree of B.D., four of whom underwent examinations in the first part only. All these were successful, and on the Rev. S. J. MacArthur, M.A., who took both parts, the degree was conferred.

The Senate also has conferred the degree of Doctor of Divinity on the Rev. John MacMillan, B.D., of Chalmers Church, Halifax, on account of his eminent services to the Church.

Though the management of the new College building does not come within the scope of the Senate's powers, we would express our thankfulness that the Church has provided so amply for the needs of the College in its erection, and confidently anticipate with our increased class-room accommodation and facilities for a proper use of the Library, much greater advantages for instruction, and we hope also a higher standard of ministerial attainment.

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GOVERNORS' REPORT OF MORRIN COLLEGE FOR THE SESSION OF 1898-99.

A very brief statement will cover all that it seems necessary to report to the Venerable Assembly on behalf of this institution.

Of undergraduates in the Arts Classes, the attendance was largest of special students, somewhat smaller than last year. Only three of the undergraduates pursued their studies with a view to the Ministry. Three others, however, attended the College for the sake of obtaining instruction in the various subjects prescribed for students in Divinity. With the aid afforded by the Reverend Messrs. Tait and Love, lectures were given to these in Systematic Divinity, Church History and Apologetics, and to a limited extent in Greek Exegesis, and Homiletics and Pastoral Theology. Three students, including two in Divinity Course, and one in Arts Course, were instructed in Hebrew.

The whole number of students, including regular undergraduates and special students, reported to McGill University at Christmas was fifty-six. This report did not include the students in Divinity, nor those in some additional classes, which were established during the winter, and were well attended.

No steps having been taken to add to the financial resources of the College, the Governors have resolved, for the present, to suspend the Department of Divinity.

And further, in view of the insufficiency of the funds at their disposal to enable them to comply with the terms of their affiliation with McGill University, or to meet the requirements of that corporation, in view, also, of the comparatively small number of students whose attendance may be reckoned upon, it is seriously contemplated, at the end of another session to wind up the institution. This course will almost certainly be taken unless the General Assembly should deem it advisable to come to the rescue.

The situation is this :—There are, at the service of the Church, should she regard it as wise to take the requisite action :—(1). A number of buildings, including the College building itself, and five indwelling houses, all of which are in excellent condition; (2). Money in possession to the amount of \$90,000, and in prospect of \$20,000 additional. But it will be obvious that the interest accruing from these sums, even if all were in hand, is quite inadequate to defray upon the most modest scale the salaries of a sufficient professorial staff for the Arts course alone to say nothing of any other department, and of incidental expenses.

The Governors beg to submit the foregoing with regret. An institution that has continued to exist for thirty-eight years, in the interests of Presbyterianism, without expense of any sort to the Church at large, and which has confessedly been of some service, during that period, valuable alike to the Church and to the world, would appear to merit a different fate.

But the present position of its affairs is as has been described, and except some movement should be made to avert the step indicated, they see no course available other than to bring the College to a close.

In view of the foregoing, no detailed financial statement appears to be necessary.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT OF THE PRESBYTERIAN COLLEGE, MONTREAL, FOR THE YEAR 1898-99.

To the Venerable the General Assembly :—

The past session has been one of the most satisfactory in the history of the College. The health of Professors and students was good, and the work accomplished all that could be desired.

Fourteen students completed their course, many of whom have already entered upon fields of labor and are actively engaged in their life work.

The Board of Management have pleasure in reporting that, notwithstanding extensive repairs, necessitating an exceptional outlay of nearly \$2,000, the year has ended without debt in the Ordinary Fund. This was largely owing to special subscriptions received from a few of the friends of the College immediately before the close of the year.

It will be noted from the accompanying financial statement that the generous friend who has supported one of the Chairs of the College for the last six years continued to do so last year. It will also be observed that the Endowment Fund has been increased by a legacy of \$22,500, received from the estate of the late Mr. Robert Anderson, Montreal, towards the maintenance of the French Theological Department of the College. The Scholarship Endowment Fund has also been enriched by a legacy of \$1,800 from the same estate.

The rapid decline in the rate of interest is hereafter seriously to affect the revenue of the College. Many of the present investments mature at an early date, and these can only be renewed at the reduced rate. It is a matter of regret that the congregational contributions do not increase, but remain practically stationary. Now that there is so decided an improvement in the business of the country, it is hoped that these will materially increase, and especially that the Endowment Fund of the College will have large additions made to it in the next year or two.

The Board are gratified to report that the investments of the College are all in a most satisfactory condition. There are no arrears of interest, nor has the College ever had to foreclose a mortgage.

From the appended statement of the Treasurer, it will be seen that the Profit and Loss account has been increased during the year by the sum of \$200, a profit realized upon the sale of an investment.

Of the foregoing students, Mr. H. Ferguson must pass supplemental examinations in Hebrew Exegesis and Biblical Theology, Mr. J. T. Reid in Hebrew Exegesis, and Mr. W. O. Tanner in Biblical Theology. Also Messrs. Cruchon, Demole and Swinton must be re-examined in Latin, and Messrs. Rondeau and Walker in Greek.

A gratifying feature of the March examinations was the appearance of the Rev. Robert Johnston, B.D., M.A., as the first graduate of the College to present himself for the degree of D.D. by examination in the department of Ecclesiology. This examination, conducted by Professor Ross, D.D., and nine other specialists from various parts of the Dominion, Mr. Johnston successfully passed, taking over eighty-four per cent. of the entire work. At the Convocation on the 5th of April, the degree of D.D. was conferred upon him, and that of B.D. upon Messrs. W. T. B. Crombie, M.A., Rev. R. P. Byers, M.A., and J. C. Robertson, B.A. The degree of D.D. *causa honoris* was conferred upon the Revs. A. Falconer, M.A., of Pictou, N.S., and W. T. Herridge, B.D., M.A., of Ottawa. During the past session the classes have been taught as follows: Those in Systematic Theology by the Rev. Principal MacVicar, D.D., LL.D.; those in Biblical History, Church History and Apologetics by the Rev. Professor Campbell, LL.D.; those in the French Department by the Rev. Professor Coussirat, D.D., B.A., Officer d'Academie; those in Introduction and Greek and Hebrew Exegesis by the Rev. Prof. Scrimger, D.D., M.A.; and those in Homiletics, Pastoral and Biblical Theology, and Church Government by the Rev. Professor Ross, D.D., M.A. The College is indebted to A. T. Taylor, Esq., F.R.I.B.A. and R.C.A., for his gratuitous delivery of an exceedingly interesting and instructive course of lectures in Ecclesiastical Architecture. Mr. J. C. Robertson, B.A., lectured to the preparatory classes in Mathematics, and Mr. D. M. MacLeod, B.A., in Classics, while Mr. J. P. Stephen taught a class in Elocution. Besides the special examiners associated with Professor Ross in the ten examinations in Ecclesiology, the Revs. A. B. MacKay, D.D., James Barclay, D.D., M.A., C. B. Ross, B.D., and P. H. Hutchinson, M.A., gave valuable assistance in the preparation and examination of Honor and B.D. papers.

The following is an extract minute of Senate concerning a remit from the General Assembly:

"In regard to the matter of the Preparatory Course referred by the Assembly to the Colleges for their earnest consideration, with a view to securing uniformity, the Senate expresses its full sympathy with the desire to maintain the standard of literary training for candidates for the ministry; but, owing to the fact that as yet there is no school where French students can be sufficiently trained for matriculation in the University, and owing further to the transition state of McGill University at the present time, cannot now recommend the abolition of the Preparatory Course.

"In order, however, to furnish an additional guarantee for the character of the examinations, it is resolved that hereafter Associate Examiners be appointed to act with the tutors in Classics and Mathematics at the sessional examinations, and that an average of fifty per cent. be required to pass."

The Alumni Association of the Presbyterian College, Montreal, having elected Revs. J. F. MacLaren, B.D., A. Russell, B.A., and G. Woodside, M.A., to represent it, the Senate recommend that their names be included in the Senate of 1899-1900.

QUEEN'S UNIVERSITY AND COLLEGE

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES.

The Trustees respectfully submit the following Report of the Fifty-eighth Session of the University :

I.—ATTENDANCE.

The number of students was 449 in Arts, 34 in Practical Science, 42 in Theology, and 126 in Medicine, or allowing for double registration, 635 in all—an increase of 46 over the previous Session. Last year we had reached our limit of accommodation and consequently this Session one of the classes had to be divided and taught in different rooms by the Professor and his assistant. This initial waste of strength is the best proof of our need for an additional building, with two or three large class rooms, and increased accommodation in other respects.

II.—FINANCIAL STATEMENT.

We have had no deficit for three years past. On the contrary, thanks to the Congregations which send to us the whole or part of their collections, on behalf of the General Assembly's College Fund, and which during the past year have sent over four hundred dollars more than ever before, our old accumulated deficit has been somewhat lessened. The minimum of \$4,000 from the Church, long aimed at, is now in sight. With a little effort on the part of those who appreciate the importance of the work done by Queen's, we shall reach it, and as the desired addition to our Theological staff depends in part on this, we earnestly appeal to them to make the effort. Convinced that this appeal will not be made in vain, and considering it indispensable that the additional Professor repeatedly authorized and urged by the General Assembly should be appointed not later than at the next annual meeting of the Board, a committee has this day been appointed to take all needed action in the matter. Subscriptions to the amount of \$20,000 will still be required for endowment, and the Committee is instructed to secure these, and to make enquiries with regard to suitable men for the Chair, and to submit a list of names, from which one may be selected for the approval of the next General Assembly. The subject to be taught by the new Professor may be either Church History or Biblical and Historical Theology. The names of the Committee are Rev. Dr. Barclay, Dr. Milligan, Dr. R. Campbell (Renfrew), Dr. Herridge, Rev. John Mackie, Rev. M. McGillivray with the Chancellor and the Principal.

III.—CHAIR OF ORIENTALS AND OLD TESTAMENT EXEGESIS.

In view of the increasing importance of the subjects embraced in this Chair, and the advanced years of Dr. Mowat, who has faithfully filled it for forty-two years, the Board decided that the time had come, when the interests of the University, and especially of the Theological Faculty, required the appointment of an assistant and successor to Professor Mowat. They have appointed the Rev. W. G. Jordan, B.A., D.D., minister of Strathroy, to this position, subject to the approval of the Assembly, and they submit his name with confidence that the Assembly will cordially sustain their action. Dr. Jordan has been minister of Strathroy for nine years and has won the esteem of the community and the confidence of his brethren, especially in the West of Ontario, where he is best known. For two Sessions past he has given special courses in Old Testament Exegesis in Queen's, and has proved that he possesses the scholarship demanded by the position, as well as other qualities required to gain the esteem and confidence of students and to make a Professor a power for good in the University.

IV.—ALUMNI CONFERENCE.

The attendance and the interest increase from year to year. February still seems to be the best month for the Annual Meeting. Those who wish to prepare for it should subscribe for *Queen's Quarterly*, the price of which is only \$1.00 a year. The managing editor is N. R. Carmichael, M.A., and his address, "The University, Kingston."

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KNOX COLLEGE.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT FOR THE YEAR 1898-1899.

The Board of Management begs to present to the General Assembly its fifty-fifth annual report, and to transmit with it, the report by the Senate, of the academic work of the College for the past session.

The number of students enrolled in the Theological classes during the past session was seventy-one. The Graduating class numbered twenty, and of those comprising it, the Board observes with pleasure that sixteen held University degrees. The students in the Preparatory Department numbered twenty. This Course exists now only for those already in it at the time at which the new regulations were adopted, or who may be admitted to the Second Year. There will be no further admissions to the First Year. A modified University Course, approved by the Assembly at its last meeting, will in future take the place of the Preparatory Course. The Board will, however, continue to impress on students the desirability of taking a full University Course, and that the modifications now permitted are intended to provide only for exceptional cases.

The resignation of Rev. Professor Robinson, Ph.D., recorded in last Report, necessitated the appointment of a new professor. It will be remembered that the Board, after conference with the Senate, reported that it was found impossible, from the want of information, to nominate anyone for the position. By a supplementary report the Board craved leave, with the concurrence of the Senate, to make an appointment, should it be found possible to do so, before the beginning of last Session, in order that a Chair so important, should not remain vacant during the Session. The Assembly, under the very special circumstances, granted the required authority, and the Board and Senate having carefully considered the very high testimonials which were afterwards sent to them from many quarters in favor of the Reverend John E. McFadyen, B.A., (Oxon), B.D., of Glasgow, Scotland, resolved to appoint him, should a personal interview with him by Rev. Principal Caven and Rev. Dr. Maclaren prove satisfactory to them, and in the event of this being the case, authorized these gentlemen to communicate to him his appointment. The gentlemen deputed visited Glasgow, and after full conference with Mr. McFadyen, which proved entirely satisfactory, communicated to him the decision of the Board and Senate.

Mr. McFadyen was ordained a Minister of the Presbyterian Church in Canada on 8th October, 1898, in St. Andrew's Church, Toronto, and was then inducted into his office as Professor of Old Testament Literature and Exegesis. He entered on the discharge of his duties at the beginning of last session, and the Board has every reason to congratulate the Church on an appointment which has amply justified the action of the Assembly in granting exceptional authority to the Board and Senate.

From the Treasurer's statement, hereto appended, it will be seen that a balance of \$64.42 stood at the credit of the Revenue Fund at the closing of the books for the past year. A legacy of \$1,000 for the general purposes of the College, and several special donations, have produced this favorable result. Had it not been for these exceptional receipts, there would have been a considerable deficit in the revenue account.

The continued fall in the rate of interest on investments, will require more liberal contributions from the congregations to maintain the revenue at its present amount.

It is to be regretted that a considerable deficiency has to be reported in the Scholarship Fund. A balance of \$676.60 appears at the debit of this account, and unless this be made up by special contributions, the Scholarships for 1899-1900 must be reduced in amount.

The Treasurer's statement shows that, up to 1st. of April, 1899, only \$257.31 had been received on account of the Fellowship Fund of \$400.00. The Board, however, believes that the deficiency will be provided for this Scholarship by the liberality of friends. This Fellowship, which is provided to enable meritorious students to avail

themselves of the benefit of post graduate studies at foreign Colleges, merits the heartiest support of the friends of the College and of Theological education.

The Board, having had under its careful consideration the matter of Theological education, and having also had the advantage of advising with Committees of the Senate and Alumni appointed to confer with it on the subject, is of opinion that it is desirable that the Session of the College be somewhat lengthened. It therefore recommends the Assembly to take such action as it may deem expedient, to have the Theological Session extended to a period of seven months, instead of six months, as at present.

The Board in connection with the subject of Theological education, has also considered the matter of the duties of the various members of the Faculty. It is of opinion that Professor Ballantyne be relieved, as speedily as possible, of teaching in one of the departments now entrusted to him, as the duties of his Chair are too onerous to be performed by one instructor. The Board recommends the appointment of an additional Professor as soon as the financial position of the College will permit of this being done, and trusts that it will be possible for it to present to the Assembly of 1900 a name of another Professor for election. The expressed approval of the Assembly would strengthen the Board in any action it may take towards securing the establishment of another Chair.

The necessity for provision being made for instruction in Theology and other subjects useful for the missionary life of ladies who contemplate work in our Home and Foreign Mission Fields having been felt for some time by the Missionary Committees of the Church, arrangements were made by which a regular course of lectures, adapted to the purpose contemplated, and extending over the whole session, was delivered in the College by the Professors and others. Principal Caven lectured on New Testament Introduction, Professor McFadyen on Old Testament Introduction, Professor MacLaren on Systematic Theology, Professor Ballantyne on Apologetics, Rev. Alexander McMillan on Church History, Rev. James W. Rae on Pedagogy, and Dr. P. H. Bryce on Sanitation. These lectures were well attended and much appreciated, not only by the residents in the Ewart Missionary Training Home, for whom they were specially intended, but by many other ladies.

A number of ladies, resident in Toronto, continue to look after the arrangements for the comfort of the students in the Residence, and have contributed by their liberality and attention to enhance the advantages of the rooms. The Board desires to express its thanks to these kind friends.

Messrs. McAlpine, Whillans and W. G. Wilson have taken part of the work of the First Year, under the system of University Options.

The following is a summary of the Class Reports :—

Dr. Caven conducted the classes in New Testament Literature and Exegesis, and in Biblical Criticism. In the former of these subjects the Senior Class (Second and Third Years) heard lectures on the I. Epistle to Timothy. Lectures in Introduction to the Four Gospels, the Acts of the Apostles and the Revelations were also delivered to this class. The Greek Critical Exercises of the Second Year were examined and criticised. The Class also prepared the II. Epistle of Timothy and the Epistle of Titus for examination in Translation and Grammar.

The Junior Class heard lectures on the first five chapters of the Acts of the Apostles, and prepared for Translation and Grammar the first twelve chapters. A series of lectures on Hermeneutics was given to this Class. Every Monday the Class was occupied in the study of Biblical Criticism. The Senior Class met with *Dr. Caven* three hours weekly, and the Junior Class five hours weekly.

Dr. MacLaren conducted, as in other sessions, two classes in Systematic Theology. The Senior Class, (Second and Third Years) met four hours weekly, and heard lectures on the State of the Soul after Death, the Second Advent, the Resurrection, the General Judgment, Future Punishments and Rewards, the Sacraments, and the Doctrine of the Trinity. This Class also studied the Confession of Faith, Chs. i.-vii. and xxix.-xxxiii, and read A. A. Hodge's Outlines of Theology, pp. 548-650.

The Junior Class (First Year), met three hours each week, and heard lectures on Inspiration, the Rule of Faith, the Attributes of God and the Doctrine of the Trinity. The Class also studied chs. i.-ix. of the Confession of Faith. Hodge's Outlines of Theology, pp. 65-199, was prescribed for careful reading.

Dr. Proudfoot delivered forty lectures in Systematic Homiletics to the students of the Second and Third Years. He criticised twenty discourses by students of the Third Year, and twenty-four discourses by students of the Second Year. These discourses were all studied in private and heard and criticised in the classes to which the students respectively belonged. Texts for next Session were prescribed to the students of the First and Second Years.

Professor Ballantyne reports that in *Apologetics* the Junior Class read Flint's "Theism" and "Anti-Theistic Theories." Lectures were given and discussions held in the class-room on the leading topics of these works. In the Senior Class the Evidences of Revealed Religion formed the subject of study. The method was the same as in the Junior Class. The text-book used was Fisher's "Grounds of Theistic and Christian Belief."

In *Church History* the Junior Class studied the history of the Church during the first eight centuries of the Christian Era.

In the Senior Class attention was given to the history of the Church in the Middle Ages, and to the Reformation on the Continent of Europe. In addition to lectures on this subject, Fisher's "History of the Christian Church" was used as a text-book.

Professor McFadyen conducted the Junior and Senior Classes in Old Testament Literature and Exegesis. The Junior Class met three times a week. Its work consisted of the study of Davidson's Hebrew Grammar, with weekly written exercises; Introduction to the Psalter; and the exegetical reading of certain selected Psalms. A written examination on Grammar and Psalms was held in December.

The Senior Class met twice a week. Its work was:—Introduction to the Pentateuch; the reading of Exodus, chs. i.-iii., Lectures on the Book of Amos; the reading of Amos, chs. iii.-iv. A written examination on Exodus was held in January. The students of the Third Year prepared, each, a Critical Exercise on a prescribed passage of the Old Testament.

Elocution was taught to all the students in Theology, and to as many in their Arts course as chose to attend lectures, by Mr. J. W. Bengough. Mr. Bengough met with his class twice a week, and the students were much interested in the instruction received. In addition to the lectures given, the students had much practice in reading

and in delivering brief addresses of various kinds. Mr. Bengough, like preceding teachers in the department of elocution, insists upon the importance of giving this subject a more prominent place in the College curriculum.

All the Professors bear testimony to the good conduct of the students and their attention to the work of their classes.

A. Roebuck attended for a short period the classes of the Second Year, but afterward went to Home Mission work.

The Classes in Greek were conducted, as last year, by Mr. Edward A. Wicher, M.A. The Classes in Latin were taught by Mr. Walter A. Findlay, B.A., and the Classes in English and Mathematics were again conducted by the Rev. George A. Fasken, B.A.

Mr. Wicher reports that the entire work in Greek prescribed in the Calendar was covered. Most of the Class work was directed to the study of Elementary Grammar and the construction of Greek sentences involving a knowledge of the common principles of Syntax. Mr. Wicher frequently urged the younger students of his Classes to take a full University Course, and several of those who would be in next year's Senior Class, should they continue in their present Course, have intimated their intention of taking up the new Course prescribed by last General Assembly.

In Latin, all the work prescribed in the Calendar was overtaken: viz., Grammar, (Robertson and Carruthers, Pts. I., III.), Composition (R. and C. Pt. II.), both Junior and Senior Classes. The Junior Class read Virgil, *Aeneid* I., *Bellum Gallicum*, V, VI., and the Senior Class (II. and III. years) read Cicero in *Catilinam*, and Horace, *Odes*, Bk. III. Mr. Findlay met fifty-four times with each Class.

Mr. Fasken states that the work in English prescribed in the Calendar was dealt with, and each student, in addition, wrote eight essays as term work. Mr. Fasken taught Mathematics to Messrs. Bennett, McClintock and McLean, of the First year; Messrs. Nelles and Wood, on the ground of their attainments in this subject, were exempted from attendance. Mr. Russell took Mathematics in the University of Toronto.

Special examinations are held in University College and the University of Toronto, in the subjects which students in the Preparatory Course are required to take in the University and College, respectively. The results of these examinations are reported to Knox College, in order that the standing of students in the entire work of the Session may be determined.

THE LIBRARY.

The Rev. William McWilliam, LL.D., Librarian, reports that the privileges of the library are being more appreciated than in previous years, not only by the students of the College, but by many of the Ministers of the Church.

During the past twelve months about 600 volumes have been added to the library. Nearly 200 of these were presented to the College by Miss Jean Robertson, being from the library of her father, the late Rev. William Robertson, M.A., of Chesterfield. Thirty volumes were presented by the Rev. W. H. Ness, B.D., Portapique, N.S. A number of works, in admirable condition, were presented by Mr. David Fotheringham. As the College already possessed copies of these it was thought well to bestow these volumes as prizes for excellence in examinations. To this destination of the books Mr. Fotheringham gave his hearty consent. A few other books have also been presented to the library, for all of which gifts the College is very grateful to the friends who have thus remembered it.

A considerable sum was spent during the year in repairing volumes injured by long usage.

COLLEGE SOCIETIES.

The Library and Theological Society, of which Mr. Thomas Eakin, M.A., was President, met weekly during the Session for literary and elocutionary cultivation. Mr. N. H. McGillivray is elected President for next year.

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Mr. J. T. Taylor, B.A., was President of the *College Missionary Society*. The operations of the Society during last summer were specially successful. Twenty-seven missionaries labored in the fields appropriated to the Society. An equal number are appointed for the coming season. The following are the officers of the Society for 1899-1900: viz., J. W. Macnamara, President; Wm. Beattie, A. C. Wishart, Vice-Presidents; W. A. Bremner, Recording Secretary; N. R. D. Sinclair, B.A., Corresponding Secretary; Malcolm McArthur, Treasurer; A. L. Burch, Financial Secretary; and J. H. Bruce, B.A., Secretary of Committees.

The Saturday Conferences of Professors and students were held as in previous Sessions, their main purpose being to direct special attention to pastoral qualifications and to deepen spiritual life. The thanks of the Senate are due to the ministerial brethren in Toronto who rendered valuable aid in conducting these Conferences.

The Senate has pleasure in reporting that nine candidates for the degree of Bachelor of Divinity will write on the First Department of the work in May. The Rev. J. McD. Duncan has completed his examinations, and the degree of B.D. has been conferred upon him.

The degree of Doctor of Divinity has been conferred upon the Rev. T. B. Porteous, M.A., of Harrismith, O.F.S., South Africa.

The Senate desires to record its great satisfaction with the action of last General Assembly, in granting permission to the Board and Senate of the College to make an appointment to the Chair of Old Testament Literature and Exegesis, then vacant by the removal of Professor Robinson to McCormick Seminary, Chicago. The Senate has gladly welcomed the Rev. John E. McFadyen, M.A., B.D., of Glasgow, Scotland, who was unanimously appointed to the Old Testament Chair.

REPORT

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MANITOBA COLLEGE.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT OF MANITOBA COLLEGE, FOR THE YEAR 1898-1899.

The Board of Management of Manitoba College begs to submit to the General Assembly its report for the past year, and to transmit the report of the Senate.

The event of greatest consequence to the College in the course of the year has been the death of its beloved and revered principal, the Rev. Dr. King, whose work in connection with this Board, as its treasurer, was not the least heavy of the many burdens he carried for the sake of the college he loved. The oversight which he exercised over all departments of the college work was so minute, and the amount of labor he performed himself was so great, that his removal leaves a tremendous gap in the life and work of the institution.

The Board has had before it the task of nominating a successor to Dr. King, as principal and professor of theology. The matter is now in the hands of a committee, and it is hoped that the Board may yet be able to submit a name to the General Assembly for appointment to the vacancy.

The report laid before the last General Assembly stated that steps had been taken with a view to the submission this year of a name for the new professorship in theology, for the establishment of which the Assembly had given its consent. It is proposed that the new member of the staff should be professor of systematic theology and apologetics in the Department of Theology, and joint lecturer on philosophy in the Arts Department. For this position the Board unanimously recommend the Rev. Thomas B. Kilpatrick, D.D., minister of Ferryhill Free Church, Aberdeen, Scotland, and the General Assembly is asked to appoint him to the position. Dr. Kilpatrick is not only highly recommended by competent judges in Scotland, with whom correspondence has been held, but at the invitation of the Board he visited Canada last summer, and delivered a series of lectures in the College, which have excited high expectations with respect to his future usefulness. Dr. Kilpatrick has signified his willingness to accept the position if he is appointed by the General Assembly.

A detailed statement of the accounts and funds, duly audited, is presented herewith.

The gifts from transatlantic sources include £100 from the Presbyterian Church in Ireland, a continuance of their generous donation; £50 from the Church of Scotland, and £20 to the Scholarship Fund from Mrs. Barbour, of Bonskeid, Scotland, for which gifts the hearty thanks of the Board are due.

The Presbyterian Church in the Maritime Provinces has continued to lay the North-West under obligation by its annual contribution of \$500. Two of these sums are acknowledged in this report, one received in May, 1898, and the other in April, 1899. Congregational contributions from the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec amount to \$2,432.90, an increase of more than \$400 over last year, but considerably short of the giving of previous years. This increase, however, is offset by a falling off in the personal contributions for the summer session, which a year ago stood at \$1,575, and this year fell to \$1,090. This money has been mainly due to the personal solicitations of the Rev. Dr. Robertson, and the Board relies with confidence on the hope he has expressed that the deficiency may yet be made up.

The amount contributed by the Synods of Manitoba and the North-West and of British Columbia was \$3,800, the same amount as last year.

The amounts received from interest on investments was \$4,340.95, an increase of \$160 over the previous year.

The total receipts for the ordinary fund, including a balance in hand of \$804.04, was \$22,496.32, as compared with \$22,757.86 of the previous year. This includes \$8,010.13 for fees of students in arts and board of resident students. The expenditure has been

\$22,413.70, leaving a balance on hand of \$82.62. The total balance on hand amounts to \$3,354.88, of which, in addition to the sum already specified, \$727.59 belongs to the Scholarship Fund, \$1,302.67 to the Endowment Fund awaiting investment, and \$1,242 to the Contingent Fund. This Fund, in accordance with the resolution of the Board, consists in the income from interest on investments above a given rate to provide for any possible loss in the capital of any of these investments. Four hundred and twenty dollars has been added to the fund this year.

A considerable addition has been made to the library, especially in the department of English Literature which hitherto had been meagrely represented. The number of volumes now in the library is 6,350.

The Board contemplates with much regret the removal of its chairman, Sir Thomas Taylor, from the city. He has occupied this position for the past ten years and has given much time and thought to the advancement of its interests. The Board follows him with its good wishes to the city of Toronto, where he has taken up his residence.

The death of Dr. King left vacant the position of principal and that of treasurer. The duties of these officers are, by appointment of the Board, filled respectively by the Rev. Dr. Bryce as acting principal, and by the Rev. Professor Baird as Treasurer.

REPORT OF THE SENATE OF MANITOBA COLLEGE FOR THE YEAR 1898-9.

The Senate of Manitoba College presents to the General Assembly the following report for the year 1898-9. The record of remarkable health vouchsafed, with a few exceptions, to the College for so many years, has this year been broken. The Principal of the College, who was head of the Senate, has been taken from us. His work, so laboriously and faithfully done, is at an end, and he rests from his labors. Long will his works follow him. To him the class-room was a delight, the interests of the students were his supreme thought; and his devotion to duty, his thorough preparation for the work of the day, and his enthusiasm in the many subjects which he was called on to teach, will long remain an inspiration to succeeding bands of students.

The Work in Arts and Theology has been conducted with great regularity. The number of students in the theological classes, which this year opened in April, has reached thirty-nine—thirteen in the third year, twelve in the second year, and twelve in the first year, and two special, the largest attendance in theology ever reported to the General Assembly from the College. The number enrolled in Arts was 155, a larger number in the University classes than ever before reported, though a few less in the preparatory department. The aggregate attendance in arts and theology has thus been 194.

I. THEOLOGY.

Last report gave the names of eight in the graduating year. Of these, since last meeting of the General Assembly, two have been settled in important charges in the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West Territories, four are missionaries in British Columbia, one is pursuing a post graduate course in Edinburgh (of six applicants for the first half of the B.D. course he alone passed), and one is a probationer.

In the session of 1897-8, Dr. King lectured in Greek and Hebrew Exegesis, as well as in Systematic and Biblical Theology. Professor Baird took the classes in Hebrew, Church History and Introduction. Professor Falconer of Pine Hill College, Halifax, relieved Dr. King of Greek Exegesis during the latter part of the session, and Professor Ross of Montreal Presbyterian College for the second time lectured on Homiletics and Church Government.

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The College was exceedingly fortunate in obtaining a course of lectures in "Christianity and Philosophy" from Rev. T. B. Kilpatrick, pastor of Ferryhill Free Church, Aberdeen. Mr. Kilpatrick, who has lately received the degree of D.D. from Glasgow University, made a deep impression both as a lecturer and preacher in Winnipeg, and this led to the desire to have him added to the permanent staff of the College.

The warmest thanks are expressed by the Senate for the assistance so cheerfully and efficiently rendered by the gentlemen named, as coming to aid the regular staff.

Training in voice culture was given to the students of the graduating year by Mr. David Ross, Professor of Music in Winnipeg.

During the session now in progress Professor Baird is taking his usual subjects in Church History, Introduction, and Hebrew. The Board has to be congratulated on securing large assistance from friends of the College. No doubt the sad circumstances in which the College was placed by the death of Dr. King made the response of those who came so willingly even more hearty and cordial. For this the Senate is grateful. Rev. Principal MacVicar of Montreal has taken, up to the time of the Assembly, the subjects of Systematic Theology and Homiletics; Dr. Scrimger for the third time has come to the assistance of the College in the important subjects of Greek and Hebrew Exegesis, and will remain till the end of June, and has laid the College under deep obligation by giving instruction in elocution. From the time of the General Assembly till the end of the session, Rev. Dr. Gordon, of Pinehill, Halifax, and formerly pastor of Knox Church, Winnipeg, will give a course of lectures in Biblical Theology and Apologetics. In the month of May the Rev. Dr. Iverach, a well known professor of Free College, Aberdeen, who had just given a course of lectures on theism in New York gave fifteen lectures on the same subject in the College. These lectures which were in the Convocation Hall of the College, were largely attended, not only by students but by citizens of Winnipeg. The reception given Dr. Iverach was most hearty and appreciative.

Arrangements have been made for a short course of four lectures on "Missionary Problems and Methods," by Rev. John C. Gibson, D.D., a missionary of the English Presbyterian Church at Swatow, China, who will visit Winnipeg on his way from Britain to China.

A considerable Irish element among the Presbyterian people of Manitoba has desired to have a visit from a representative of the Irish Church, which has been a liberal friend of the North-West. Prof. Hamill of Belfast College, and the Convener of the Irish Church Colonial Committee has been secured to lecture on a Theological topic during the month of August. It is hoped that Prof. Hamill may become much interested in the vast Home Mission field of the North-West.

II. ARTS.

The annual examinations of the University of Manitoba are now proceeding, and ninety-nine students from Manitoba College are engaged in writing in the several University years. The preparatory classes of between fifty and sixty students have done excellent work during the year, and act as a feeder to the regular Arts course. The Preparatory examinations take place about the end of May.

The students who are writing for their B.A. degrees for this year are nineteen in number and are as follows :

Dr. Bryce has taken the classes in Honor and General Pass English in the College; and has conducted the Department of Biology in the joint lectures arranged by the University of Manitoba.

Prof. Hart has conducted the Honor Classics and French, as well as a part of the Pass Classics.

Prof. Baird took the classes in Political Economy in the Mental and Moral Science Course, and from the time of the beginning of Dr. King's illness till the end of the session, the class in Calderwood's Ethics, and a part of the German in the several years.

Up to the time of his illness, Dr. King had the classes in German, as well as those in Sidgwick and Calderwood. Mr. W. E. James, B.A., as in former years took the mathematics in the different years, and his time was fully occupied in this department. He also acted as resident tutor in the College.

Mr. Frederick W. Clark, B.A., conducted the junior classes in Latin and Greek as well as part of the Honor Classics and rendered excellent service to the College.

Dr. W. Manahan, M.A., Ph.D., who had taken his post graduate course with distinction in Cornell University, bore the burden of the Mental and Moral Science of the course.

Mr. G. H. Davis, B.A., had charge of the English and French of the junior students, and gave his full time to this work. It is gratifying to the Senate to be able to state that Dr. Manahan and Messrs. Clark and Davis, all excellent teachers, are alumni of Manitoba College.

During the year action was taken in accordance with the permission of the General Assembly towards making an addition to the permanent staff of the College. Rev. T. B. Kilpatrick, D.D., of Aberdeen, was unanimously selected by the Board, and has expressed a willingness to accept the invitation should the General Assembly approve. Dr. Kilpatrick will be Professor in Systematic Theology and Apologetics, and lecturer in Philosophy.

During the year the intercollegiate work between Manitoba and Wesley Colleges has been continued. Manitoba College has given instruction to the joint classes in mental and moral science, while Wesley College has taught, for the students of both Colleges, higher mathematics, and ever since the illness of Dr. King, higher German and some classes in the previous year.

The Senate took immediate action in the line of the legislation of the General Assembly for the abolition of the literary course for students proceeding to the ministry. No new students were allowed to enter on this course and four students in the third year of the course finished their preparation, so that this course is now abolished in Manitoba College. A change in the curriculum is now being made in the University of Manitoba, which it is hoped will facilitate the carrying out of the plan laid down by the General Assembly.

The Senate heartily approves of the course for preparatory students outlined by the General Assembly, but would suggest the addition of New Testament Greek in the third year.

During the present summer session the course began on April 18th and will continue till September 19th. The general interests of the College have been well upheld during the past year, and the College Societies—Missionary, Literary and Athletic—as well as the College Journal, have been well maintained. The Senate returns to God, though in the time of its sorrow for the death of Dr. King, its thanks for many mercies vouchsafed to the College during the year, and its remembrance of many blessings bestowed upon the wide field served by the College.

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PRESBYTERIAN LADIES' COLLEGE, OTTAWA.

The Board of Management of the Presbyterian Ladies' College, Ottawa, have pleasure in presenting to the Assembly their annual report.

It is gratifying to be able to state that the past year has seen considerable development in the various departments of the College, and a hopeful increase in the number of pupils and in revenue.

The total number of pupils in attendance was one hundred and eight. Of these thirty-two were in residence.

The general work of the College has been carried on efficiently by Miss McBratney, the lady principal, and an able staff of teachers, whilst the Music Department has received a fresh impetus under the inspiration and guidance of the new director, Mr. Puddicombe.

The total expected revenue of the College is \$10,068, and the total expenditure \$9,560.

These figures do not embrace the interest on the debt which for this and next year is covered by the guarantee fund.

Over \$300 have been spent in furnishings, and a similar amount will be needed to complete the work.

The Board regret that they find themselves unable to take over the debt upon the College. The Board, in accepting the trust laid upon them by the General Assembly, did so on the understanding that the debt was to remain as at present for three years, its interest being covered by the guarantee fund. This was perhaps a misapprehension of the intent of the Assembly, but certainly the Board would not have accepted the trust on any other condition. It is confidently expected that at the close of next year when the term expires, arrangements will be made entirely satisfactory to the Assembly. It is hoped that a scheme will be set on foot for the entire removal of the debt.

The Board have pleasure in reporting that a committee of ladies has been appointed who have already taken very kindly and helpful interest in the College and its welfare.

They are also glad to be able to announce that Mrs. Anna Ross, Superintendent of the Ewart Training Home has been engaged in the capacity of House-Mother and religious instructor.

Mrs. Ross will be a valuable addition to the staff. As "house-mother" her presence will add much to the home comfort of the pupils, and her experience, knowledge and piety will secure for them the best possible religious influence.

A college so fully equipped as this is becomes an educational home to which parents may send their daughters with the utmost confidence.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE
BRANTFORD YOUNG LADIES' COLLEGE FOR
1898-99.

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To the Venerable the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada :

The Directors of the Brantford Presbyterian Ladies' College respectfully present their annual report as to the progress of the institution during the year ending June 30th, 1899. The attendance during the year between regular boarders and day pupils has been 102. It is expected that nine students will complete their course in the Literary, Musical and Art departments.

During the year the College has been visited and the classes examined by Rev. Neil McPherson, B.D., on behalf of the Synod of Hamilton and London; and Rev. J. A. Grant, Richmond Hill, on behalf of the Synod of Toronto and Kingston. Their reports will testify as to the character of the work done in the College, the qualifications of the teachers and the proficiency of the students. Every effort has been made to preserve and ensure a high standard in the different departments so that the graduates of the College may be well fitted either for University work, for teaching or as instructors in Music or Art.

The Conservatory of Music connected with the College, has during the past year been an unqualified success, both as to the number of students and the results attained. The musical department is, as last year, in charge of Mr. W. Norman Andrews, F.G.C.M., London and Leipzig, and affiliated with the Toronto College of Music. Last year the Brantford College passed twenty-four students in the examinations of the Toronto College, four of these taking the artist's diploma (A.T.C.M.) This year Mr. Andrews expects to send up an equal number, and that five will take the artist's diploma. These examinations are conclusive proof that the musical instruction in the Brantford College is fully equal to the work done in the Toronto Conservatories.

The teachers and governesses under the direction of Miss Phillpotts, the Lady Principal, have continued to do excellent work, being not only conscientious in the discharge of their academic duties, but watchful of the conduct and social life of the pupils committed to their care. The Art department also attracts considerable interest, and commendable progress has been exhibited under the direction of Mr. J. R. Seavey, although he has been but a very short time in charge.

As to the future, the Rev. W. R. Cruikshank, B.A., of St. Matthew's Presbyterian Church, Montreal, has accepted the position of Principal and Governor of the College. From Mr. Cruikshank's well known ability and scholarly attainments, and his familiarity with educational work both here and in the old land, there is every confidence that under his guidance the college will renew its strength, and with the ensuing year enter upon a still more useful and prosperous career.

The Directors would repeat as in former reports, that no College offers greater attractions to studious young women, for home-like social comfort, for beauty and healthfulness of location, for excellence of teaching or for the moral and religious atmosphere which surrounds it. For these reasons, as well as for the work it has done as the pioneer Presbyterian College for now twenty-five years, and for its fidelity to Presbyterian and Evangelical truth, they claim for it even more cordial sympathy and greater patronage from the ministers, elders and members of the Presbyterian Church.

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**CHURCH AND MANSE BUILDING BOARD FOR
MANITOBA AND THE NORTH-WEST
TERRITORIES FOR 1898-9.**

To the Venerable the General Assembly:

Your Board begs respectfully to report that building operations have been fairly active during the past year among Missions and young congregations, which it was intended the Church and Manse Fund should more especially help. Assistance was given to erect nineteen new churches and five new manses, and to complete or renovate five other churches and one manse previously erected. The value of the new buildings is estimated at \$24,960, and the help extended amounted in all to \$9,120—the latter figures include the help given to buildings completed, enlarged or renovated. Twelve congregations received assistance by free grants, and to eighteen loans were made. The former footed up to \$1,235 and the latter \$7,885. Adding the value of the improvements on buildings previously erected to that of the new buildings the aid given was less than one-third of the total expenditure.

WHERE THE BUILDINGS ARE.

Of the new buildings seven are in Manitoba, three in Assiniboia, six in Alberta, seven in British Columbia, and one in the distant Yukon.

At Summerside, Assa.; Vancouver (Fairview Mission), B.C.; Dawson, Yukon, churches were also built; and manses purchased at Pincher Creek, Alta.; Maple Creek, Assa.; and at Thornhill, Man.; and help will be asked to meet the cost in part. A very comfortable manse was also built at Armstrong, B.C. These are referred to because connected with Missions or Augmented Charges.

The Board voted assistance to build at Saskatoon, Caron, Elva, Tynehead, but lack of harmony among the people or financial difficulties delayed building till this season. During the coming summer building promises to be fairly active.

RECORD OF SEVENTEEN YEARS.

In 1882, at the time of the inception of this Fund, there were only eighteen churches and three manses in all the country between Lake Superior and the Pacific. Since that time the Board has assisted to erect 324 churches and sixty-eight manses, which are worth in all, exclusive of the land on which they stand or the improvements and enlargements subsequently made, \$517,060. Where the Board helped to erect primitive log or unpretentious frame buildings, growing congregations have since replaced them with substantial brick or stately stone churches, worth five, if not in some instances, ten times the value of the original buildings.

MANSES.

Only one-fifth of the capital under the control of the Board has been employed in the erection of manses, and yet the rent saved by the manses would pay ten per cent. interest on the total capital entrusted to the Board.

The Board has encouraged Congregations and Missions to build manses with the view of stopping the heavy drains on missionary funds by high rents, and with the view of providing the conditions under which Christian work can be more comfortably and satisfactorily conducted.

THE ROBERT ANDERSON LEGACY.

During the past year the Board received from the executors of the late Robert Anderson, Montreal, the sum of \$2,000 less succession duties, or a net sum of \$1,800; for this timely legacy, the Board is most grateful. Why should not others, in disposing of their property, remember this helpful method of Church extension?

THE NISBET ACADEMY.

The Board is informed that the trustees of the Nisbet Academy at Prince Albert and the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West Territories are applying to the Parliament of Canada for their sanction to the diversion of the moneys belonging to the Nisbet Academy, and to have the larger share of the money handed over to your Board to further its work. Your Board would assure the Assembly of its readiness to receive and administer any amount entrusted to it in such way as the Assembly may direct.

LARGER FUND NEEDED.

For the needs of the growing West the fund at the disposal of the Board is wholly inadequate. The free grants the Board can offer weak Congregations to enable them to undertake the erection of a church home is too small to be of much value. The ten congregations that erected churches last year, through the help of grants, received only \$1195 in all, or \$119.50 each. The average grant of the Presbyterian Church (North), in the United States was \$470.61 for 1898; our average loan to erect new churches and manse was only \$445. Congregations lacking suitable accommodation for public worship and the exercises of a Sabbath School are retarded in growth and not fulfilling their mission in full measure. Or if, by a sanguine Congregation, an attempt is made to build, not unfrequently the contractor worries the Congregation with a lien, or bills for labor, glass or hardware are left unsettled for months, to the injury of good name of the Church and the hindrance of the cause of true religion. And yet, unless the Fund is to be dissipated, the grants now made can scarcely be increased.

USES TO WHICH CHURCHES ARE PUT.

Churches are employed not only for the services of the Sabbath, for Sabbath School and Bible Class exercises, for prayer and other congregational meetings, but also, not unfrequently, for the purposes of the public school, and, in mining districts, for reading rooms.

Where homes are few, where men are separated from the associations and companions of former years, where the sense of loneliness and homesickness is apt to settle down on them, where restraints are feeble or absent, where the saloon and gambling hell, the dance hall and the brothel study to entice and ensnare, it is vain to expect the bulk of men to continue temperate and honest and clean. A reading room, well lighted and well heated, with clean, strong, bracing books is a wonderful help to the man who prizes a healthy body and an unsullied conscience.

DETAILED STATEMENT.

As in other years, a detailed statement is here presented to enable the General Assembly to understand more clearly the assistance rendered by the Fund and the districts receiving aid.

PROVINCE OF MANITOBA.

Holland—A thriving village in the Cypress River District, surrounded by a good farming community; brick Manse costing \$1,500; loan \$500.

Olive—A station connected with Treherne; good wheat farming locality; church costing \$800; loan \$400.

Breadalbane is a farming and ranching district north of the Assiniboine river, and about 180 miles west of Winnipeg. A tornado wrecked the church, necessitating the erection of a new one. Frame, cost \$1,600, loan \$700.

Solsgrith—A station north of Birtle, on the M. and N.W. Railway, surrounded by a good farming and grazing country. Church, frame, cost \$900, loan \$400.

Austin—A village on the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway, about eighty-four miles west of Winnipeg; congregation became recently self-sustaining; frame manse worth \$1,200, loan \$600.

Silver Plains.—A farming district on the west side of the Red River, and about thirty-two miles south of Winnipeg; neat frame church, worth \$1,000, loan \$400.

St. Luke's or Elgin.—A prosperous farming district south of the town of Souris; through the district a branch of the N. P. Railway was built last season. Elgin is a village on the new line; manse, frame, cost \$1,000, loan \$400.

Killarney.—A thriving village on the Deloraine branch of the C. P. Railway, 165 miles southwest of Winnipeg; surrounded by a good country, loan of \$300 to complete a brick veneered manse worth \$1,500.

Hamiota.—A town on the Great N. W. Central Railway, surrounded by a good country; loan to repair and strengthen a church worth \$2,000, loan \$400.

These congregations are all in the Province of Manitoba, and it will be noticed that the help rendered in every case is by way of loan, not grant, showing a gratifying change in the circumstances of the people during the past few years.

PROVINCE OF ASSINIBOIA.

Glen Adelaide is a station situated in the district north of Moose Mt. A grant of \$40 was made to help complete a neat log church worth about \$450.

North Portal.—A station on the "Soo Line," on the International boundary; frame church costing \$600, grant \$125. Population mixed. Presbyterian Church the only one in the place; no Church in South Portal on United States side.

Lumsden.—A prosperous farming district northwest of Regina; manse, brick, cost \$800, loan \$400.

Osbow.—A town on the Estevan branch of the C. P. Railway, about 250 miles southwest from Winnipeg. Brick manse costing \$1,500, loan \$600.

PROVINCE OF ALBERTA.

Clearwater.—A farming and ranching district south of Edmonton, settlement new, people beginning life; church worth \$500, grant \$100.

Powaka.—A station on the Calgary and Edmonton branch of the C. P. Railway, 130 miles north of Calgary; grant of \$35 to purchase glass and hardware to finish small log church worth \$200.

Leduc.—A station on the Calgary and Edmonton branch of the C. P. Railway, 18 miles south of Edmonton, district peopled by thrifty settlers beginning life; church, frame, worth \$600, grant \$100.

Homewood.—A farming and ranching district north of the North Saskatchewan, not far from Edmonton; promising settlement; church, value \$400, grant \$75.

Goshen.—A farming and ranching district, northwest of Edmonton about 20 miles; log church, cost \$300, grant \$50.

Willowbank.—A rural district west of the Calgary and Edmonton Railway, near Olds; church, frame, cost \$500, grant \$100.

Mountain View—is a ranching district in Southern Alberta, close to the Rocky Mountains, and in the Mormon settlement; log church worth \$450, grant \$150.

PROVINCE OF BRITISH COLUMBIA.

Fort Steele.—A trading village in the Upper Columbia valley, surrounded by mines, connected with Cranbrook, a divisional point on the C. P. R. Crow's Nest Pass branch; church \$800, grant \$150.

Salmon Arm.—A farming settlement on the main line of the C. P. Railway, about 66 miles east of Kamloops. People in straitened circumstances, but willing; frame church, cost \$1,000, loan \$300. Congregations of Windsor and St. Andrew's, London, helped congregation complete church.

Rosslund.—Great mining town west of Columbia River. Congregation prosperous and progressive; frame church costing \$4,000, loan \$700.

Sandon.—A typical mining town in the mountains between Kootenay and Slocan lakes, pushing and progressive; frame church costing \$1,500, loan \$180. Mr. Harris—American—gave five valuable lots, and Mr. Tomlinson, another American, gave \$500 to help the congregation to build. Both belong to the Episcopal Church.

Nelson.—A prosperous and enterprising town, situated at the outlet of Kootenay Lake, smelter in town, Silver King Mine near, wholesale centre for the Kootenay district; loan of \$700 to fit up frame church worth \$3,500.

Cranbrook.—Divisional point, Crow's Nest Pass Railway, west side Kootenay river; promising railway and mining town; church, cost \$1,500, loan, \$500. People did well for themselves.

Langley Prairie.—Farming district south of the Fraser River, old settlement, fairly prosperous; frame church, worth \$1,300, loan of \$255 to repair and renovate.

Colwood.—Farming district on Vancouver Island, near Victoria; frame church worth \$500, grant \$60.

Sooke.—Farming district, Vancouver Island, near Victoria; frame church, worth \$500, grant \$100.

Eldorado—is situated on the Klondike river, some distance above Dawson; the town is growing and promises well as a trading centre. Log building purchased and fitted up for a church at a cost of \$1,500. Grant of \$300 made. After the wash-up remaining debt on building likely to be cleared off.

Dawson.—Leading town in the Yukon; church costing \$8,000 built; no help asked from Board; balance of cost will be met after the wash-up.

Bennett—situated on boundary between Yukon and Alaska; town springing up; custom house; mounted police station. Log church and manse, covered with tenting; no help asked, no debt.

Atlin Lake.—Pine City, frame building bought and fitted up for manse. Tent, 20x50, walls 8 feet high, floored with sawdust and seated with rough lumber, constitutes the church. Aid of the Board expected here.

In regard to the Ordinary Fund, comparison with the previous statement affords ground for congratulation inasmuch as congregational contributions show an increase of \$1525.84, over that in last report, and in interest an increase of \$885.35; but it will be necessary to bear in mind that the previous report only included a period of eleven months, while the present report covers the full twelve months. In Ministers' Rates there is a falling off as compared with last report of \$436.15. This last affords something of a key to the apparent unpopularity of this scheme in some parts of the Church, and the scheme is likely to continue to be unpopular where ministers fail to connect themselves with the fund and exhibit shame or fear in pleading its claims.

ANNUITANTS AND ANNUITIES.

The Committee, while thankful that the funds were sufficient to pay the annuitants on the modified scale, venture to express the hope that increased liberality on the part of both ministers and members will, at no distant date, make it possible to pay the full annuities as provided under the rules. It should be borne in mind that great injustice is being done those ministers who have served longest in the ministry. Many of the fathers in our Church, who gave long and faithful service amid much hardship, have passed away to their better reward; but there are still many more who ought to be placed in the enjoyment of the full annuity and who would thereby have increased comfort during the time they remain with us.

Eighty-three annuitants have drawn benefit from the Fund during the year, calling for a total sum of \$15,967.21. It may be of interest to mention that had the funds permitted full payment under the rule, the total sum would have been increased to nearly, if not quite, nineteen thousand dollars.

The Master's summons, calling from the home on earth to the home in the "many mansions," removes eleven annuitants from the list. The following have gone home: W. C. Young, W. R. Sutherland, James Cleland, John Stuart, Archibald Currie, Robt. Wallace, David Mitchell, Simon McDonald, John Gallagher, Geo. Bell, L.L.D. and W. M. McKibbon. The death of the two last named, though in the year covered by this report, was mentioned in the report for the previous year.

Special grants of \$50 to the Rev. John McNabb, and of \$30 to the Rev. W. C. Young, were, as for some years past, made by the Committee.

THE ENDOWMENT FUND.

While but little has been done in the way of addition to the subscriptions previously reported, a very considerable amount of good work has been done in the matter of organizing in the different Presbyteries for a canvass in compliance with the decision

reached by the last Assembly. Communication has been had with the Clerk in each Presbytery in the Western Section of the Church in the interest both of the Endowment and Ordinary Funds, with the special object of securing some person in each Presbytery to take up the work of canvassing for the Endowment. In a number of Presbyteries the matter has been considered, and in some cases a minister has been named for the work, but, as a rule, the matter has been left open with some one suggested for the work. The full Committee gave the matter great consideration and appointed a sub-committee to follow up the work of organization in each Presbytery. This Sub-Committee has had before it the replies sent in from the Presbytery Clerks, most of whom responded sooner or later. The Committee exercised its judgment in the cases where parties were not named, and selected one in the Presbytery deemed suitable for the work, directing correspondence to be had with them. This was done with the result that some have been able to see their way to undertake the work, but in a number of cases the matter is indefinite. On the whole the Committee is hopeful that during the next two months the organization will be fairly complete, and propose that a general and vigorous effort be made in the early autumn to have the whole closed by the end of the year, or at least by the close of the Church's year. It is proper to state that the task given to your Committee is rendered much more difficult from the fact that so many of the ministers are not themselves connected with the Fund, and also far too many seem to suffer from a false feeling as to the necessity for and claims of the fund. The Committee has a strong conviction that the real trouble is not with the people, but that it really lies with the ministers in the way in which the claims of the Fund are presented. The noble response now being made by Mission Stations to an appeal sent out by the Treasurer to aid in wiping off the adverse balance at the close of our year is an indication of what could be done on a proper presentation of the case. Some of the larger and wealthier congregations might well take pattern from what the poorer places are doing.

A special effort has been made to get in the balance of the subscribed but unpaid subscriptions, but only partial success can be reported, still the effort is being continued. It is evident, however, that some of the subscriptions will not be paid, therefore in all probability it will be wise to make a fairly liberal discount, and in the effort now being made through the Presbyteries, it will be as well to ask for not less than fifty thousand dollars. The twenty thousand dollars promised by Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal will be forthcoming when the two hundred thousand shall have been reached in *bona fide* subscriptions.

The Committee would press upon Presbyteries the necessity for hearty co-operation in this matter, and ask them to see that the different pulpits will be open to the agent appointed to make the canvass. Furthermore, if the ministers themselves will set an example of liberality, as they may be able, it cannot fail to be most helpful in the canvass of the people.

The Committee proposes, except in a few special instances in which it may be found desirable to give more than one Presbytery to the person, to pay travelling expenses and pulpit supply when absent. It is also proposed that subscriptions be paid either in cash or in one, or at most, one and two years. The hearty co-operation of all ministers in the effort will ensure success. Should a minister feel any delicacy in addressing his own congregation on the claims of the Fund an exchange with another minister for a day is suggested.

CENTURY FUND.

The Committee has had under consideration the matter of the proposed Century Fund, and after full discussion came to the unanimous decision that the proposed movement was one which should commend itself to the members of our Church, and should therefore be proceeded with. In the opinion of the Committee it will afford a suitable opportunity to our people to manifest, by means of a thank offering, their gratitude and thankfulness to God for his manifold mercies and blessings bestowed on our Church during the century now closing.

The Committee recommends that the following be allowed to retire from the active duties of the ministry and go on the Fund for benefit: Reverends John Mackie, Robert Knowles, A. D. McDonald, D.D., A. T. Colter, Archibald Stewart, J. M. Munro, and William Peattie.

In the cases of the Rev. Alexander MacKay, D.D., and Rev. Norman McPhie, in the opinion of the Committee the medical examination is insufficient to prove that measure of infirmity which would justify the Committee in recommending that their applications be granted.

In the case of Rev. A. T. Colter, he was allowed to retire by the Assembly in the year 1893, but some time afterwards, having improved in health, he took pastoral work at Comber, and now comes forward again. Not having paid rates he is only entitled to half benefit.

In the case of Rev. William Peattie, he was allowed to retire by the Assembly in 1885, and was placed upon the list of beneficiaries, but, before drawing benefit, his health being apparently improved and having entered into an engagement with the late Rev. Dr. Reid in the office of the Church, he made no claim for benefit. As, however, he has now practically retired from that position, he makes application for reinstatement on the Fund, and the Committee has recommended accordingly.

APPLICATION FOR LEAVE TO CONNECT WITH THE FUND.

Application for leave to connect with the Fund has been received from the Rev. Dr. Campbell, of Victoria, B.C., Rev. P. J. McLaren, of Belwood, Rev. Gavin Hamilton, of Cardston, N.W.T., and Rev. W. L. H. Rowand, Fort William, and the Committee recommends that their applications be granted.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE'S REPORT OF 1898.

The Committee in obedience to the direction of the Assembly gave careful consideration to the report of the Special Committee presented at the last Assembly and report as follows:

For the convenience of Commissioners the different clauses of the Special Report are given and the reply of your Committee follows each clause and is given in *italics*.

1. That in the administration of the Fund the Committee (Western Section) be instructed to give the fullest effect possible to the provisions of Rule 15, in relation to the short term annuitants who are on the list, when a large reduction was made in the allowance to such annuitants, by a change in Rule 9.

The Committee deems the recommendation unnecessary as it is in line with the policy which the standing Committee has followed in the past.

2. That as it was not intended, when the late Rev. Wm. Burns was appointed by the Committee in 1888, to burden this Fund with a permanent Agent or Secretary.

your Committee recommend that the office of Agent and Secretary be abolished; but in the event of the Assembly deciding that a canvass of the congregations of the Church shall be continued for the purpose of bringing the Endowment up to the minimum of \$200,000, a minister or layman who has special gifts for such service be appointed for a limited period, and that the Secretarial work of the Committee and the collection of all moneys in connection with the Fund be placed in charge of the General Agent of the Church (Western Section.)

The Committee finds it is disposed of by the action of the Assembly.

3. That Rule 10 be changed to read as follows:—A minister who has not paid the annual rate into the Fund shall not be entitled to make any claim upon the Fund as a matter of right, but his cause may be made the subject of special consideration by the General Assembly.

The Committee after mature deliberation decided to recommend the Assembly to repeal the Rule adopted in 1895, which reads: "That every minister on being ordained be obliged to connect himself with the Aged and Infirm Minister's Fund and pay the fixed rate or lose all benefit in the Fund," and to substitute therefore the original Rule as follows: "A minister who has not paid the annual rate into the Fund shall receive only one-half the amount to which he would otherwise have been entitled."

4. That every minister, on being ordained, be required by Presbytery to connect himself with the Fund and pay the fixed rate.

The Committee while considering that it is probably the duty of all ministers and highly desirable that they should become connected with the Fund at the date of ordination, deems it unwise under the circumstances of the Church to make a fixed rule making this a requirement.

5. That Rule 14 be changed to read as follows:—When a minister who has paid rates to the Fund attains the age of sixty-seven years, he may claim the privilege of retiring from the active duties of the ministry, and of being placed upon the Fund.

The judgment of the Committee in regard to this recommendation is, that "later merit there might be in lowering the age from seventy to sixty-five, (not sixty-seven, as proposed,) the condition of the Fund at the present time will not allow of such a change being made."

6. That a first charge on the Fund be the definite yearly allowance promised to such retired ministers as have paid their rates and complied with the rules of the Fund; and that there be a surplus Fund, made up of all moneys, not belonging to capital, in the control of the Committee over and above the amount requisite for the definite allowance to such ministers as have paid their rates and have a claim on the Fund, and that such surplus Fund be administered for the benefit of any special cases recommended by the Assembly.

What is first recommended has been the unvaried practice of the Committee in paying annuities in the past, and in regard to the recommendation respecting a special Fund, in the opinion of the Committee it is impracticable under existing circumstances and would be dangerous in application.

7. That in the event of the changes recommended in 3 and 6 being approved and adopted they be not applied to non-rate-paying ministers who have been permitted to retire and are already on the Fund.

Inasmuch as the Committee cannot recommend approval of Recommendations 3 and 6, no action is required.

8. That the ministerial rate be sufficiently increased to place the Fund on a more satisfactory basis.

The Committee while anxious to see all reasonable steps taken to increase the efficiency of the Fund, fear that to adopt the recommendation might entail a measure of hardship on ministers, and at any rate are of opinion that it will be wise to give the present Rule regarding rates a further trial before a further change.

9. That Presbyteries be instructed to have the claims of both the Ordinary and Endowment branches of the Fund effectively presented to all the congregations within their bounds.

As the object aimed at in this recommendation is covered by the General Assembly's resolution, the Committee deems it sufficient to say that it has always adopted the means at its disposal for presenting the claims of both the Ordinary and Endowment branches of the Fund to the congregations throughout the Western Section of the Church.

The year's work closed with a balance due Treasurer of \$132. But for the grant from the Hymnal Committee, the adverse balance would have been considerably larger. For the timely assistance thus rendered the Committee desires to record its sense of gratitude.

During the year, 151 congregations contributed \$1360.99, as against \$1436 by 165 congregations during the previous year. The number of contributing congregations fluctuates somewhat, hence we may hope for improvement next year. Including only settled charges, every third congregation contributed nothing to the fund. The same remark is true of settled ministers, and deserves more than a passing notice. The number of ministers who paid rates during the year was 140; number in arrears, six. That is to say, out of 217 settled charges in the Maritime Synod, 140 ministers and 151 congregations supported the fund. That there are ministers who secure collections, although not contributing rates themselves, we gratefully acknowledge. We need not be slow to recognize the fact that there are brethren whose reasons for not joining are altogether worthy. But the one word that explains why so many do not pay rates is NEGLECT. We have it on the confession of the men themselves that they overlooked the fund, or hoped to pay a lump sum, and hence delayed until arrears have grown beyond their power to grapple with.

Eleven joined the fund as contributing members during the year. While collections fell off somewhat, we note with satisfaction the revenue from rates was \$200 in excess of the previous year. Your Committee feels warranted in saying that a larger number of young ministers are interested in the fund than at any previous time in its history. This we believe to be directly due to the regulation requiring every minister on being ordained to connect himself with the fund, or lose benefit.

The number of annuitants at present is 23. During the year, one beneficiary, the Rev. James Gray, was removed by death.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS' FUND (EASTERN SECTION), ON REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE OF GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

To the Venerable the General Assembly:

The Committee on the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund (Eastern Section) desires to report as directed by the last General Assembly (minutes p. 40) on Report of Special Committee.

The Committee on the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund (Eastern Section) met in St. Matthew's church, Halifax, on October 5th, 1898, and was constituted.

Inter Alia.—The Committee proceeded to consider the proposed changes in the regulations of the Fund recommended by a Special Committee of the General Assembly.

No opinion was expressed regarding the 1st and 2nd recommendations, for the reason that they concern the Western Section of the Church solely.

The 3rd recommendation is, That Rule 10 be changed to read as follows:—*A Minister who has not paid the annual rate into the Fund shall not be entitled to make any claim upon the Fund as a matter of right, but his case may be made the subject of special consideration by the General Assembly.*

The Committee was unanimous in rejecting this proposed change, on the ground that almost every case might be made the subject of special consideration by the Assembly. It was felt that the proposed change would tend to weaken the present position of the Fund.

4th recommendation:—*That every Minister, on being ordained, be required by Presbytery to connect himself with the Fund and pay the fixed rate.*

The Committee prefers that the rule should remain as adopted by the General Assembly in 1895, viz.:

EVERY MINISTER HENCEFORTH ON BEING ORDAINED IS OBLIGED TO CONNECT HIMSELF WITH THE FUND AND PAY THE FIXED RATE OR LOSE ALL BENEFIT IN THE FUND. A

5th proposed change, viz., That Rule 14 be changed to read as follows:—*When a Minister who has paid rates to the Fund attains the age of 67 years he may claim the privilege of retiring from the active duties of the ministry, and of being placed upon the Fund.*

The Committee agreed to offer no opposition.

6th recommendation:—*That a first charge on the Fund be the definite yearly allowance promised to such retired Ministers as have paid their rates and complied with the rules of the Fund; and that there be a surplus Fund, made up of all moneys, not belonging to capital, in the control of the Committee over and above the amount requisite for the definite allowance to such Ministers as have paid their rates and have a claim on the Fund, and that such surplus Fund be administered for the benefit of any special cases recommended by the Assembly.*

This proposal was strongly disapproved of, the present arrangement being regarded as every way preferable.

7th recommendation:—*That in the event of the changes recommended in 3 and 6 being approved and adopted, they be not applied to non-rate-paying Ministers who have been permitted to retire and are already on the Fund.*

To this the Committee agreed.

8th recommendation:—*That the ministerial rate be sufficiently increased to place the Fund on a more satisfactory basis.*

The Committee did not deem it advisable to increase the rate at present.

9th recommendation:—*That Presbyteries be instructed to have the claims of both the Ordinary and Endowment branches of the Fund effectively presented to all the Congregations within their bounds.*

This was agreed to.

St. Matthew's Church, Halifax, October 6th, 1898. The Committee on the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund (Eastern Section) met and was constituted.

Inter Alia.—Further consideration was given the proposed changes in the regulations of the Fund. The conclusions differed in no particular from those of October 5th, above recited.

The Committee on the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund (Eastern Section) met in Chalmers Hall, Halifax, April 25th, 1899, and was constituted.

Inter Alia.—The Committee took into consideration the motion made at the last General Assembly, and referred to said Committee to report (minutes p. 40) viz.:—*Ministers who are not connected with the Fund by the payment of rates, shall, on being permitted to retire, receive only half benefit from it.*

The object of this motion was to rescind the regulation passed in 1895, obliging all Ministers henceforth on being ordained to connect themselves with the Fund or lose all benefit. After discussion the Committee agreed to the following:—*Forasmuch as the regulation of 1895 has been found to work well we prefer that it should remain as it is.*

MINISTERS' WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND, (WESTERN SECTION).

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To the Venerable the General Assembly:

Your Committee have to mourn the death, during the year, of the late Mr. Thomas Kirkland, who for the last five years has acted as Convener of the Committee, and who, with great assiduity and patience, sought by every means within his power to further the interests of the Fund. Mr. Kirkland's services were of exceeding value, and were ever given with cheerfulness and often at great self-denial, and his death will be a great loss to the work of the Church.

Your Committee are gratified to report that the revenue of the year was sufficient to meet the expenditure. This, however, was owing to special contributions from the *Presbyterian Record* of \$1,500.00 and from the Hymnal Committee of \$375.00. To these Committees most cordial thanks are given. Had your Committee been dependent last year on the ordinary sources of revenue, they would have been compelled to reduce the already small annuity paid to widows or to report a considerable deficit to the General Assembly. Owing to the exceptionally large number of deaths in the ministry during the year, the annuities paid were fully \$2,000.00 in excess of those of last year, and for the year to come will exceed \$17,500.00. The regular sources of revenue are interest from investments, ministers' rates, and congregational contributions. As stated in last year's report, the amount of interest that can be relied upon regularly from year to year will be about \$5,000.00, and the rates from ministers \$2,500.00, leaving \$11,000.00 to be obtained from the congregations of the Church. The amount received from congregations last year was \$6,222.26, so that if the annuities are to be continued on the present scale, the congregational contributions must increase eighty per cent. Your Committee desire to call the special attention of the Assembly to this fact. In allocating their missionary money, a large number of congregations do not apportion to this Fund anything like the fair proportion it should get, according to the requirements of the several schemes, and quite a number of other congregations fail to contribute anything at all to the Fund. The good faith and honor of the Church are at stake in this matter. The earlier ministers of the Church, who labored in season and out of season, and bore the burden and heat of the day, when comforts were few and salaries small, contributed their personal rate from year to year to this Fund in the confident assurance that the Church would minister to the comfort of their widows in their declining years. The annuity from the Fund is the chief source of income of many of these widows, and to reduce the amount would not be to the credit of the Church, and yet the Committee are face to face with the necessity of reducing the annuity by twenty-five or thirty per cent., unless the contributions from the congregations of the Church are more than double that of last year. It is earnestly hoped that such action will be taken by the Assembly as to render this unnecessary. The Committee have no authority to draw upon the capital or to involve the Fund in debt, so that they are shut up to expend only the amount placed at their disposal by the Church. The annual rates from Ministers are now well paid up, only two or three being in arrears for the past year. The action of the Assembly of 1896 and 1897 has been productive of good and all now realize that the payment of the annual rate regularly each year is necessary to continue connection with the Fund.

to be added to capital. The assets of the Fund amount at date to \$108,334.62 as against \$104,754.96 last year, shewing an increase of \$3,580.56, mostly due to excess of income over expenditure; a result which cannot fail to be gratifying to the Assembly and to all interested in the Fund.

Two annuitants have died during the year, namely, Mrs. J. McCurdy and Mrs. G. Patterson. The number of widows in receipt of annuity is 18 and of orphans 12.

The Committee are glad to report that during the year they have been enabled to increase the annuities payable to widows and orphans—this being the second increase since the date of amalgamation in 1883—the annual rates during the same period having been reduced as well. Should the Fund continue to prosper—as the Committee believe it will—a further increase of annuities or reduction of rates may be confidently anticipated.

During the past eighteen months, sixteen ministers have connected themselves with the Fund. The Committee rejoice to be able so to report, and trust they are not mistaken in regarding this considerable addition to the number of beneficiaries as evidence of an increased interest taken in the Fund by the younger ministers. There is, however, still much room for improvement in this respect, and the Committee are sure of the Assembly's sympathy and support in continuing to urge upon all who are in a position to avail themselves of the advantages which the Fund offers, to do so without delay.

A new edition of the Rules for the Management of the Fund has been issued since last Assembly, copies of which can be had by applying to the Secretary.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE DISTRIBUTION OF PROBATIONERS.

*To the Venerable the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada met in
Hamilton June, 1899, for the year 1898-99:*

It appears only fitting that the Committee should introduce their report by reference to the break in their numbers made by the death of Dr. Cochrane, who was for so many years connected with the work entrusted to them by the General Assembly; who, it may be said, was at no time absent from any of their meetings, who took a warm interest in the business brought up, and whose keenness of perception and promptitude of decision were so helpful in the effectiveness of their administration. The last meeting he attended was in September, 1898, and before the following one in December he had been gathered to those who have passed from time into eternity, and been called home to the Father's house of many mansions, and to the reward which is assured to all those who are faithful to death in the service of Christ. His name will never be forgotten by those associated with him in Distribution work, and his influence will never cease to be felt by them. In him those men who placed themselves under the Committee for appointments had a friend; and the vacancies which were reported for supply by Presbyteries, one who tenderly and earnestly consulted their interests. A resolution expressive of their sense of the loss they had sustained through his removal, and of condolence with the widow and other members of his family under their bereavement was adopted by the Committee at their meeting in December, and a copy sent to the immediate relatives.

Your Committee do not know that they can add much, if any, important information to that contained in Appendix No. I. and No. II. to this report. The complaint of former years may be repeated, that in several instances, although not in so many as on some former occasions, Presbyteries have failed to recognize the duty laid upon them by the Supreme Court of the Church, whose injunction should be regarded as obligatory, and whose recommendations even should elicit respect, to report all the vacancies in their bounds prepared to call, for full or partial supply. On the other hand instances can be given, and they will at once be seen by those who examine Appendix I., in which there has been faithful compliance with the will of the Assembly. It may be that some of the Presbyteries not reporting had no vacancies, and that they considered that circumstance sufficient justification for their silence, but it is submitted that respect for the Committee, and the principle of propriety should have prompted them to acknowledge the receipt of the circular which was regularly issued to all Presbyteries in the territory with which they have to do.

One feature has presented itself in the reports of some Presbyteries common to former years as well as to the one with which this report deals, namely, the occurrence of a vacancy through the dismissal or translation of its minister, but left in such a state that it cannot call, and has to be placed under the care of a student to be brought up to the status from which it had been reduced under a settled pastor. The fact is a suggestive one, and appears not to speak well of the active interest which Presbyteries are bound to take in the welfare of the charges intrusted to their oversight, but further remarks must be withheld, for they branch out in more directions than one. Then the common procedure is to forward the name of the minister who has resigned to the Committee for appointment to other vacancies through the Presbyteries in whose bounds they exist.

On looking at Appendix I., it will be seen that there are still some vacancies in which Gaelic is indispensable although the number of these is comparatively small. Your Committee, however, are of opinion that they have not got the names of all such, for the reason, probably, that for a considerable time they had no probationers at their disposal who could officiate in that language, and while it is true that there has been one on the roll lately, yet he has not been chosen for such a field.

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From Appendix I. it appears that 72 vacancies were reported for supply during the year. Settlement for mission or regular pastoral services took place in 21 of these, so that at the time of compiling this report there were 50 remaining. The Presbyteries from which vacancies were not reported were Huron, Maitland and Algoma. Those of Toronto and Guelph reported the largest number, nine and seven. In some cases it was stated that the vacancy reported was not in circumstances to call, and in some that it was under stated supply, either by a student or some other. Unless in instances in which a greater number was asked, the Committee confined themselves in their distribution to four Sabbaths as a general principle for each vacancy each quarter.

While Zion Church, Brantford, appears among the vacancies reported by Paris Presbytery, it excused itself, and was excused by the Presbytery on the ground that it had engaged for pastoral work since the death of their late pastor, a man whose name was on the probationers' roll. The argument or excuse must be viewed in the light of the fact that it was not by the appointment of the Committee he was thus engaged, nor after consultation with them. The whole was a matter of private arrangement, but to meet this the probationer was given his full proportion of appointments in Paris Presbytery for the quarter just ending.

The 72 vacancies above mentioned were reported by the following Presbyteries :

These vacancies were reported by 24 Presbyteries, three Presbyteries either not reporting or reporting no vacancies.

Although the Committee, since the meeting of Assembly in Toronto, have discretionary power as to admission to the roll of names certified by Presbyteries, yet they exercise it with considerable caution, and it is only under a strong sense of duty to the interests of vacancies that any are refused. But in one instance they found themselves obliged to do so, and they are of the opinion that the Presbytery forwarding the name should approve of their action, although on this being made known to them they have recorded their disapproval and repeated their request to have the name accepted. There are Presbyteries still who seem to think that the interests of the minister to whom they give their certificate, and not those of the Church, are the matter to be first regarded. Let it be repeated that the probationers' roll, in the view of your Committee, for the sake of vacancies should be composed only of men who are acceptable as preachers and likely to be called.

Your Committee were under the disagreeable necessity of withdrawing appointments from one because of representations sent in as to his physical inability for the work. Due notice was given to him and the Presbytery by which he had been certified.

One name was omitted because other engagements interfered with his fulfilment of probationary work, another because appointments had not been kept and no reason sent for not doing so, another through expiry of time; four withdrew their names.

Your Committee began their year with 22 names on the roll. To these, eight were added at their meeting in September, three in December, three in March, and one since, making a total of 37. Of these, 11 had settlements either in Mission Fields or regular pastoral charges, four have withdrawn, five have been removed for one cause or another, and there are now 17 on.

Of the full list three names were sent in by the Presbytery of Hamilton; six by that of Barrie; the same by Toronto; 2 each by the Presbyteries of Brockville, Peterborough, London, Kingston and Sarnia, and one each by Stratford, Guelph, Orangeville, Portage la Prairie, Calgary, Melita, Ottawa, Maitland, Halifax, Lindsay and Saugeen, one name not yet certified. From these figures it will be seen that the Presbyteries in the Western Section are largely represented in forwarding the names of men for

work ; and, also, that there are some both in the far east and far west who send names to the roll, but cannot take appointments. Were the roll composed only of men belonging to the section a greater proportion of appointments could be given in the Quarterly distribution.

It may well be supposed that the thoughts of your Committee have been directed at every one of their meetings to the character of the scheme under which it has been sought by the Assembly to keep in touch with Licentiates and Ministers who have no stated work and yet are desirous of obtaining it ; and with those charges in Presbyteries that do not enjoy the privilege of stated ordinances. Every year this has been impressed upon the Committee, as will appear from the reports that have been presented, and recommendations and changes that have been proposed. Circumstances which there is no need to specify have brought the subject afresh and with greater power before your Committee now reporting. And they trust they will be pardoned in laying before your Assembly the following scheme, which has engaged their consideration, and the adoption of which, either as submitted or with some modifications, would, they humbly think, be followed by satisfactory results. It will be remembered that it was with it the Interim Act which was so long in force as such and which was permanently had its inception in its early stages. From them have proceeded the amendments which have been made from time to time. It will not then be regarded as out of place if they propose the following scheme, which may be discussed in connection with the returns that are received from Presbyteries to the Remit of last Assembly *re* Supply of Vacancies :

I. COMMITTEE.

1. That a Committee on the supply of vacancies be appointed for the Western Section of the Church, including the Provinces of Quebec and Ontario, it not being possible to include the districts of the Maritime Provinces, Manitoba and British Columbia on account of the extent of territory over which they spread, and other geographical considerations.
2. That this Committee shall consist of five members appointed annually by the General Assembly, so chosen as to entail the least expense consistent with efficiency.
3. That it shall be the duty of this Committee to meet at least Quarterly for preparing and publishing a Quarterly scheme of distribution and the discharge of other competent business.
4. That they shall call for and receive from Presbyteries in the Section reports of the names of all vacancies in their bounds prepared to call, and the names of Licentiates and Ministers without charges desirous of employment among these vacancies.
5. That in preparing the roll of Licentiates and Ministers without charge applying for appointments, care shall be exercised to have it composed only of such as are likely to be called, and for this purpose it shall be competent for them to decline the immediate insertion of any name that may be forwarded if, in their judgment, there is good reason for doing so ; but that they communicate to the Presbytery their reasons for their action, and on reply from them may reconsider their decision and either change or reaffirm it — all such cases to be reported to the Assembly.
6. That each Licentiate or Minister may have his name continued for appointments two years from the date of its insertion on the roll, when it shall be dropped, unless satisfactory reasons can be assigned for its being retained for a longer period.
7. That in making distribution the Committee shall observe such order as is most likely to secure a hearing for the probationers in all the vacancies, thus giving the opportunity of mutual acquaintance.

II. PROBATIONERS.

1. That the roll of probationers shall consist of all Licentiates and Ministers without charge, certified by Presbyteries and accepted by the Committee.
2. That in the order of names a distinction shall be made between licentiates and ministers, the first place being assigned the latter.
3. Probationers will be expected to fulfil the appointments given them, unless relieved by the Presbytery to whose bounds they are sent, notice of such relief to be at once sent to the Committee who may appoint others in their places.

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4. Probationers against whom complaints may be lodged for not fulfilling their appointments, for inefficiency or unacceptableness, shall have their appointments withheld or withdrawn, intimation of this to be sent to them and to the Presbytery certifying them.

5. Probationers are required to acknowledge the receipt of the list of appointments for the Quarter by the first Post, and to apply at once to the Conveners in charge of vacancies in Presbyteries for their appointments in the bounds.

6. In accepting a call probationers shall at once give notice to the Convener of the Committee, and to the Presbytery's Convener in charge of vacancies to whose bounds he has been assigned.

7. Unless in exceptional cases probationers are to remain in the vacancy through the week, and undertake such pastoral work as may be required by the Session.

III. PRESBYTERIES.

1. Three weeks before the close of each Quarter Presbyteries shall, through the Convener of their Committee on the supply of vacancies, report to the Convener of the Assembly's Committee vacancies in their bounds prepared to call for at least one-half supply, or seven Sabbaths of the Quarter.

2. That they report the names of all Licentiates open to appointments at the time of licensing them, and the names of Ministers applying for work, but these shall be only of such as have had stated charge of congregations in their bounds for a period of not less than four years, unless in some special cases.

3. That a name which has once appeared on the roll shall not be admitted a second time unless the person has withdrawn to engage in Mission work under a Presbytery, or the Home Mission Committee, or from some special reason.

4. Presbyteries shall look after the supply of vacant pulpits in their bounds, and require a report at each regular meeting of the supply that has been provided since their previous meeting.

5. Except in very particular cases students shall not be admitted to the pulpits of vacant charges, neither settled ministers, to the exclusion of those sent by the Committee.

6. That in making application for supply each quarter Presbyteries shall have opportunity of stating objections to the appointment of any probationer on the list, and shall send the same to the Committee for their consideration.

IV. REMUNERATION.

That the following rate of remuneration be required for the services of each probationer per week :

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REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH LIFE AND WORK.—JUNE, 1899.

Your Committee on Church Life and Work begs to report to the venerable the General Assembly as follows:—

In order to learn, as far as it is possible by such means, the views of the Sessions and Presbyteries on the life and work in the Church as seen by them, questions framed by the Committee were sent to Presbyteries for distribution, in the latter part of November. The Committee regrets that in a few cases these did not reach the Conveners at as early a day as they should have done, but notwithstanding this, they were received by all the Conveners in sufficient time to enable a report to be sent in. The returns from the more distant parts of the Church, both East and West, were received in good time. But with two exceptions, those from the central portion of the Church were received at so late a period as to interfere somewhat with the preparation of the report at the required time.

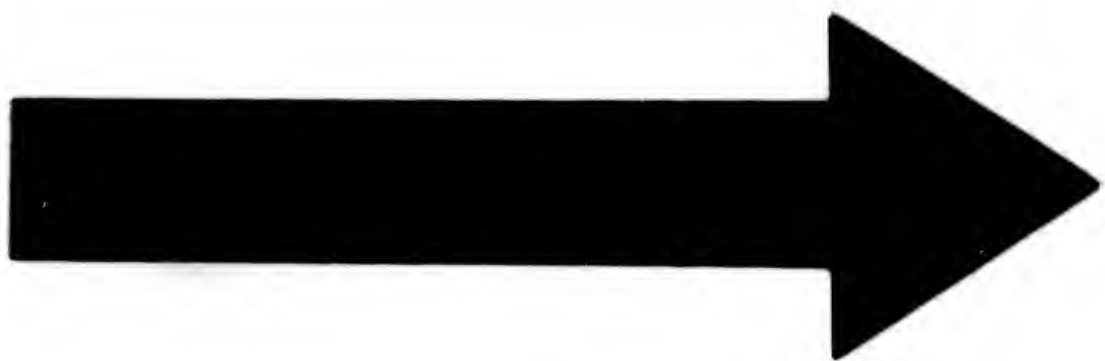
THE QUESTIONS.

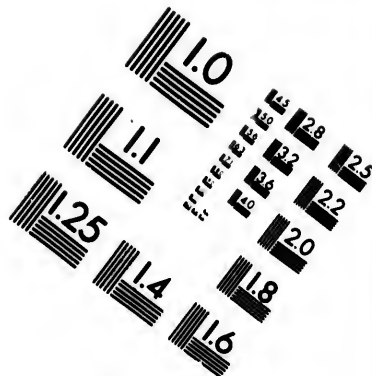
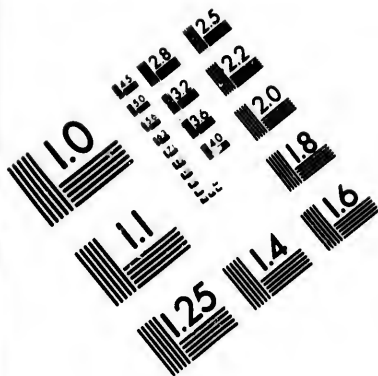
It will be observed that in framing the questions for this year, the lines followed in the queries of last year have again to some extent been made the subject of inquiry; also that some aspects of the Church's work not referred to in these have been introduced. It is the hope of the Committee that the discussion awakened and the information elicited by these investigations may lead to practical results beneficial to the whole Church.

It is no doubt of importance that the attention of every session should be called by such inquiries to the ends for which the Church exists, and the directions in which her influence should be felt. But more is to be desired than this. Important questions in the spiritual work of the Church are before every congregation for solution. It would be a satisfactory and reasonable result of these investigations, if we should discover effective means of dealing with these questions and could secure united action and unity of method in respect to them. Your Committee would hope and pray, that by the blessing of God on the action of the Assembly upon the important subjects dealt with in this report, the whole Church may be lifted to a higher level of aspiration and attainment.

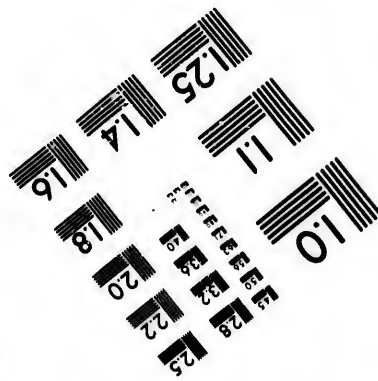
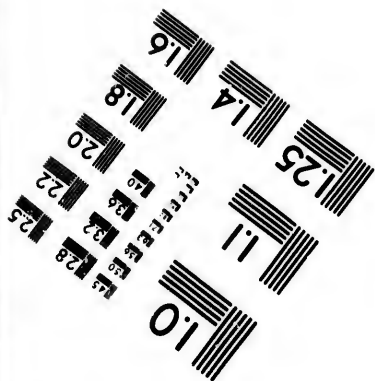
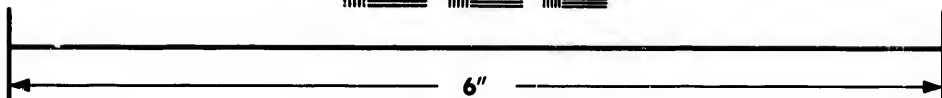
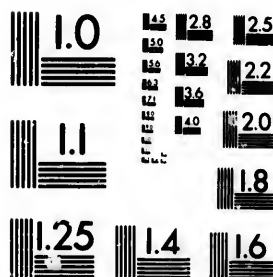
THE CHARACTER OF THE REPORTS.

All of the reports received from the Presbyteries, with the exception of not more than three or four, have evidently been prepared with much care, and in manifest sympathy with the subjects. Not a few of them are of superior excellence. These no doubt would be much appreciated, and render good service in the respective Presbyteries in which they were discussed. They testify not only to the zeal of the Conveners, but to the conscientious consideration which the subjects received in the Presbyteries. The reports cover a very wide field, a field extending from ocean to ocean, and while we consider them, we should bear in mind the work which sister Churches are doing within the same territory. Our report is necessarily confined to estimating, as justly as possible, the contribution which our own Church is making to the building up of the moral and religious life of our country. But in regard to such questions as the Sabbath, Temperance, Education, and some





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other factors in the religious and social life of the people, agencies alongside our own Church are working, and contributing their powerful influence to the same ends.

The reports from Presbyteries express satisfaction with the number of replies which have been received from the Sessions. There are always a few Sessions from which replies are not received, either because the Charge is without a Pastor, or the duty is neglected. The absence of these does not affect the conclusions arrived at. While there are, as usual, a few complaints that Sessions have not answered the questions so carefully as they should have done, the reports speak with decided satisfaction both of the number and quality of the returns from the Sessions. Your Committee would congratulate the Presbyteries on this condition of affairs, and respectfully remind them, that the whole value of our report depends on the fidelity and intelligence with which the Sessions respond to the queries submitted. The reports cover very fully the ground occupied by our Church. They are as a rule a credit to the Presbyteries, and are a fair and valuable estimate of the life and work of the Church. They extenuate nothing that is objectionable, but speak with studied carefulness and discrimination. There is no self congratulation in them, as if the condition of the Church was in all things as they should like it to be. Far from that, they indicate a very keen eye, perhaps too keen in some cases, for the defects, laxities, and evil proclivities discernible or supposed to be.

They show further that the Pastors are setting a high standard before them, that the Church is awake to her weaknesses, and to the true sources of her strength. All this is in itself, apart from the contents of these documents, an encouraging feature in the life and work of the Church.

The review of a field so extensive, and containing so great a variety of conditions, even in its conclusions, reach only an approximate valuation of the religious condition of the people and of the work which is being done. The imagination must be allowed some scope in filling up the details, which in a summary of so many pages, require to be left out. In the following statement submitted, we have, so far as we are able, endeavored to present a just epitome of the full and admirable compilations received from all parts of the Church.

The information asked for from the Presbyteries has relation to four principal subjects, namely:—"The Home Life of the People;" "The Congregational Life;" "The Observance of the Sabbath;" and "The Social Life."

The first question submitted is as follows:—

- I. TO WHAT EXTENT ARE THE MEMBERS OF YOUR CONGREGATION RESPONDING TO THE CLAIMS OF CHRIST, AS SHOWN IN HOME LIFE.
1. By fidelity in the domestic sphere, as the Religious Instruction of the Children, and in daily or stated Family Devotions?
 2. Is the attention of the people directed in any specific manner to the Home as "The True Nursery of Christian Life?"
 3. Are parents in the congregation sollicitious for the religious training of their children?
 4. Does the admitted decline of family worship arise from changed conditions of social life or is it due to a lower religious temperature in the Church?
 5. Could you suggest any means by which to aid heads of families in reviving and keeping up the godly custom of family worship?

This question, with its several particulars as given above, covers the home life of our people. In all the reports it is gratifying to observe, that the place and power of the Home in its relation to the religious life of the community is adequately appreciated. Pastors are directing their efforts to maintain in them a due sense of parental responsibility. The importance of the home is recognized in all the reports; that it is a divine institution prior to the Church, and the true nursery of Christian life. In it the beginnings of character are formed. In it are

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spent the years in which the deepest and most lasting impressions are made. "Here it is that chastity, modesty, temperance, industry, truth, all the virtues that give beauty and worth and majesty to character get their root." From the Christian home the Church receives her choicest recruits, and the State her best citizens. The character of a people in its moral and religious aspect is determined by the kind of homes from which they come. Hence every wise people, and those who are concerned for the building up of Christ's Kingdom, will cast every possible defence around the home. These positions, and others of a kindred nature, are eloquently set forth in the reports, showing how fully alive the Church is on this subject.

FAMILY WORSHIP.

Some apparently are disposed to think that parental responsibility is not recognized to the same extent in the families of our Church to-day as it was in a former day. To some extent this may be the case. In earlier days, Presbyterian parents were zealous for the education of their children, and they especially recognised their duty to instruct them in religion. Such was the mind of the better part of the Church wherever Presbyterianism had a home. Your Committee is happy to believe, from the evidence submitted, that such is the mind of the better part of our Church still. It is necessary to discriminate on this subject. 1. It is quite manifest from the testimony given, that family worship and family instruction in the old form, or with modifications, are maintained in very many families of our Church. In great part, these are families in which these duties have been learned from Christian parents who have gone before. The godly custom has been handed down to them, and they have cherished it. Their own principles, and their Church training and tradition, have preserved this ancient service in the midst of new conditions. These families are found for the most part, in the older sections of the country, and probably more largely in our rural congregations. These have maintained their religious customs more tenaciously than families in other localities. They have not felt the pressure, nor the disruptive forces of the times, so much as those have which have been thrust into more exposed and populous communities. It is also most gratifying to learn, that while it is true, that family religion flourishes more widely in the quiet and shelter of the older fields, yet many Sessions in the newer districts of the west testify that in these also, the godly custom of family worship is maintained to an encouraging extent. Some of these assert, that within their bounds they do not consider that there is any decline in the observance of it. Some qualification must also be made in respect to family life in towns and cities. In these the pressure of disturbing forces is most keenly felt—yet in these, also, are large numbers of homes, in which family life is daily put under the care of God in some form of worship. 2. It is also manifest from the evidence, that there are a large number of homes in which worship in the old accustomed form is not maintained. But though it is not, parental duty in these homes is not neglected. The parents are solicitous for the religious instruction of their children. The children are taught in religious knowledge, they are trained in the fear of God, are the subject of their parents' prayers and grow up in Christian lives. Parents in these homes have not been trained in the old ways. The old ways so many of us venerate are not the only ways by which family religion may be maintained. There may be no better way. But there are other ways. Those to whom the old ways are not familiar cannot be expected to make use of them. Besides, there was sometimes a tendency to be satisfied with a service merely formal. Worship became an uninteresting observance. "It stood alone in the house and had nothing put in agreement with it." It was often dissociated from a loving, gentle and Christ like spirit, and was discerned by intelligent young people to be but a form. The observance of it was so mechanical as to make it a burden. In such cases when the new generation came into houses of their own, it had no savoury memories or associations connected with it, to cause it to be cherished. The important thing is, that a Christian atmosphere be maintained in the home. Any form of worship or teaching which produces this, and maintains it, is sufficient. Many families, which are not in the habit of

morning and evening worship, are yet diligent in cultivating a Christian spirit in the home, and use such means as they think wise to secure that. 3. It is equally clear from the evidence that there are a large number of families connected with the Church in which the religious training of the young at home is not maintained as it should be. There are many complaints on this head. This state of things has always been found in the Church. It is found also in older lands, and other Churches than our own. The question is, does the number of these families increase? It would require a much more accurate investigation than has been made either to affirm or deny that their number is increasing.

If the number is increasing to what is it owing? Some ascribe the increasing number of such families to the changed conditions of social life. The family life is broken in upon in such a way, as to render worship morning and evening difficult, if not impossible. We must not judge the homes of the working people in this particular, by the standard we apply to the homes of leisure. The hard pressed parents, worn with heavy toil, are solicitous for their children's religious training and do the best they can. With more time and less weariness they would attend to the duty with greater regularity. The reports undoubtedly testify, that the changed conditions of social life press hard upon many homes and account for much neglect in this duty.

Some who believe there is a decline in the observance of family worship, ascribe it to a lower religious temperature in the Church. This is a subject for further investigation. There is no unanimity upon it. The preponderance of testimony goes to show that both of these causes are at work, affecting the religious life of our families.

In regard to the means by which this duty may be revived in the homes in which it is falling into disuse, or in which it is being neglected, many suggestions are made. Of these there are two, which practically embrace them all. 1. There is suggested every form of pastoral appeal, a mode of action already in operation. The pastors need no further direction, except it may be, that some have not had their attention sufficiently kept alive on the subject. 2. There are many of the reports in favor of a manual of family devotion. A few conservative minds are timid as to its introduction. Some do not regard it as an effective remedy.

The General Assembly has already taken steps towards the preparation of such a manual. The success of such a book will depend on its adaptability to the purpose it is prepared for. But no book or form will be a substitute for a "new heart and a new spirit." Summing up the testimony on this subject, it is evident that our church in many of our congregations and families is loyal to her training and traditions in respect to the worship of God in the home. "What scene of family dignity is more to be admired? The highest splendors of wealth and show have but a feeble glow-worm look in the comparison—a pale, faint glimmer of light, a phosphorescent halo, enveloping what is only a worm. Even the poor laboring man, thanking God at his table, for the food he earned by the toil of yesterday, singing still each morning in his family hymn of the glorious rest at hand, moving on thitherward with his children, by single days journeys of prayer and praise, teaching them, even as the eagles do their young, to spread their wings with him and rise—this man, I say, is the prince of God in his house, and the poor garb in which he kneels outshines the robes of palaces." Parents are generally solicitous to train up their children in the nurture and admonition of the Lord. From our homes there are continually going out a young generation, worthy and willing to take the place of those who have gone before them in all Christian duty. They give evidence of their training in the work which they are doing for the Church, and the honorable positions they take in the work of the world. And although in some localities the conditions are not so pleasing, yet even in these the Church is alive, and is educating the people to higher standards of home life. The General Assembly has great reason to thank God for the character of the homes of the people under its care. And all the testimony on the subject makes it manifest, that there is ever increasing reason that these homes should be made, with continual emphasis, the subject of the prayers and sympathies of the Church.

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II. AS SHOWN IN THE LIFE AND WORK OF THE CONGREGATION.

1. By attending on Sabbath services, prayer meetings, and observance of The Lord's Supper?
2. By their readiness to devote time and gifts to such *Home Mission* work as
 - (a) Teaching in the Sabbath school. (b) Visiting the sick and strangers.
 - (c) In efforts to reach lapsed Presbyterians, and the careless and criminal in the community.
3. By Christian example in social life and business relations.
4. By a liberal response to the claims of the various schemes of the Church.
 - (a) Are the schemes commended according to their relative claims upon the people, and the contributions promptly applied to the objects for which they have been contributed? (b) Do the methods employed to collect for the schemes reach effectively all the members and adherents of the congregation, and which method do you consider best?

ATTENDANCE.

The response of the people to the claims of Christ in the matter of attending upon His ordinances, is in the judgment of Sessions and Presbyteries, encouraging. In every part of the Church, from east to west, our people are found in the house of God on Sabbath, with commendable regularity. The Lord's Supper is also observed by increasing numbers. It is gratifying to learn this: that in the face of the many temptations besetting the people to draw them from the worship of the sanctuary, or to break in upon the regularity of their attendance, a high standard of attendance is maintained. Some reports complain that a portion of the people are inclining to the habit of a half day attendance. Some preferring the morning, and some the evening. This is not a healthy sign. A vigorous and growing religious life is not shown in diminishing attendance on divine worship. It rather manifests itself in an increase of duties discharged. The view that a half-day attendance is all that is required of us, and a practice in accordance with this, is countenanced and justified even by members of the Church. This is not the place to discuss the question. But it may be observed, that a diminishing attendance on the public worship of God, where it is found in an individual, or in a congregation, indicates a declining religious life. It does not indicate growth either in spiritual intelligence or strength. The piety that is so sound, that it can dispense with one service, could on the same ground dispense with both. Punctuality and regularity in this duty are essential to the building up of Christian character. The Church has always found it necessary that there should be two diets of public worship, not only that all the people may have an opportunity of worshipping God, but because they require this for their religious instruction. These are the only opportunities they have to receive it. The two services afford brief enough time for that purpose in the course of a week. There are many of the people for whom a second service must be maintained. These members of the Church then, who being able, neglect the worship of God on one part of the Sabbath, are giving indications of a decline in their religious vitality, are setting an injurious example to their families, and to their neighbors, are hindering and discouraging their pastor in his work, are not "walking in His steps," "who as His custom was went in to the synagogue on the Sabbath day."

PRAYER MEETING.

In regard to attendance at the prayer meeting, much complaint is made throughout the reports. If this ordinance is essential to congregational life, as ministers generally hold it to be, if it is of divine sanction, then it should be better observed. Some reports speak of a large and encouraging attendance. This possibly indicates that the fault is not wholly with the people. Prayer meetings have

often been known to be exceedingly dull and unprofitable. It may be that many of us pastors have not found out, or sought to find out, how to make it an acceptable service. In many localities, especially in rural districts, it is not possible to have a weekly prayer meeting. In others, it is not possible to have a large attendance. But where the localities are favorable, and a good attendance is possible, the reports show that largely attended prayer meetings are the exception, and not the rule. If by the claims of Christ in this regard, we mean, that He claims that there should be a large and regular attendance of men and women of our congregations at the weekly prayer meeting, then the claims of Christ are not being responded to as they should be, so far as this duty is concerned, in the majority of our congregations. The meetings appear to be frequently more of a discouragement than a help. This also your Committee regards as an unhealthy sign. It goes along with irregular attendance on the sanctuary. These are two points, which in the judgment of your Committee, require the constant, prayerful consideration of all our Sessions.

HOME MISSION WORK.

It is apparent that Home Mission work is often conceived of in too narrow a sense. To many it means no more than one of the schemes of our Church, a work done in outlying regions of our country by unknown agents under the orders of the Home Mission committee. Your Committee desired by the use of this term in the question, to respectfully call the attention of Sessions to wider and more scriptural meanings of what Home Missions mean. It includes the whole work of the Church or congregation in its own field. Every congregation is an organization for doing Home Mission work, and, as a number of the reports show, many pastors and congregations are alive to this fact, and are doing splendid Home Mission work. The need of directing attention to this view of the subject is attested by two facts, which should come under our cognizance in reviewing the life and work of the Church. First, that in not a few districts and towns, while the population has increased, and other denominations have increased in numbers, our own Church has remained stationary. In the census returns some years ago, a fact was revealed that has never been explained, that there were a large number of Presbyterians in the country, who were not accounted for in the statistics of our Church. Second, in the neighborhood of many of our congregations, other agencies are at work to bring to the knowledge of the truth, and into fellowship with Christ, the people who are not connected with any Church, and who are living in entire neglect of religion. When each congregation becomes a centre of mission effort in its own district, the life of the Church will be revived. Your Committee would submit, that there is no reason for our glorying in the fact that, in comparison with a few years ago, our numbers have increased. Only some calamity or disruption could have prevented this. It would be a matter to thank God for, if we could show that some at least of the increase was the result of enlarged activity and zeal in bringing the people under the power of the gospel. The reports upon this head indicate that much loving willing service is rendered in all our fields, by the members of the Church, in Sabbath school, and in visiting the afflicted and the stranger within our gates. Also, they show that upon the willing and already busy pastor, the larger part of the visiting that may be called mission visiting is thrown. They also indicate that in many Sessions, this part of their work has received no attention whatever.

LAPSED PRESBYTERIANS.

This subject does not lie heavily on the conscience of the Church, as shown in the reports. These do not indicate that any special attention is being paid to the gathering in of our outlying people. There are many who were brought up in our church, but are now attached to no Church. Rural congregations are constantly sending young people, and families as well, to town and city. These sometimes remain unvisited and undiscovered, and falling into careless habits, become lost to the Church. It appears also, that the careless and criminal classes, the former on

the streets and the latter in the jails, except in a few cases, receive no special attention. These classes appear to be left largely to other agencies to be dealt with. At the same time it is manifest that when attention is called to any required service for them, the pastors and members of the Church willingly respond. In the cities of Montreal and Toronto, and no doubt in other cities, though mention is not made of it, these classes engage the sympathy of the Church, and valuable mission work is done among them by its devoted and earnest members.

In the judgment of your Committee, there is room for greater attention being given to this uncared for section of our population, and for the cultivation of a mission spirit which will find work within the bounds of every congregation. The heathen at home are as much in need of the gospel, as the heathen abroad, and though it is at their door require to have it pressed upon them. Reason as well as scripture teaches us, to expand our sympathy and benevolence first upon those within our borders who have not been brought under the teaching of the gospel.

SOCIAL AND COMMERCIAL LIFE.

So far as the walk and conversation of the members of the Church is concerned, in social and commercial life, the reports testify that our people maintain their character for integrity and uprightness. It is still happily the belief of our Church, that keeping the commandments of God at home, and in the market place is the best homage we can pay to Christ, and the best testimony we can render to our faith.

SCHEMES OF THE CHURCH.

In regard to these, it is manifest, that while the whole amount contributed by our people to them looks large, it is not so large as the Presbyteries think it might be. There is yet room for a great advance in the grace of liberality in the support and extension of the gospel. When we consider the doles and dribblets meted out by those to whom God has given so much, for the upholding of the gospel at home, and the sending of it abroad, the view is discouraging. Your Committee has in mind, and it is necessary that we should, the large expenditures in many fields, in building operations, in the payment of debts, in the support of local and general charities, and philanthropies, which are generally undertaken by the liberal and willing workers of the Church. But there is a large residuum of stagnant membership from which the streams of benevolence flow scantily, or not at all. The testimony is, that while many do well, and liberally in their contributions, and the sum total raised is creditable to the Church, yet that we are very far from having reached the maximum in this field of Christian effort. The claims of Christ, as set forth in the schemes of the Church, are not so generously responded to as they should be.

RELATIVE CLAIMS.

So far as the reports show, the relative claims, which the schemes have upon the people for support, have not been discussed before them. This discussion could scarcely be avoided, if each of the schemes were brought under review, as it should be. It is recognised, that contributing money without an intelligent idea of the work in which it is to be expended, and of how much is required, is an unsatisfactory proceeding. It will not be done willingly. Yet it appears that a large part of our contributions is given without an intelligent understanding of the relative claims of the various schemes.

We should not separate in the regard of the people one part of the Church's operations from another. Each congregation is a partner in the whole work. But there is a divine order in which these schemes stand in relation to one another, and in relation to their claim upon the people. It seems to be indicated in the Apostle's words: "If any provide not for his own, and especially for those of his own house, he hath denied the faith, and is worse than an infidel." After

these home claims such as widows and orphans, and aged and infirm ministers, comes every outlying enterprise. According to all the reports, with three exceptions, the contributions were forwarded promptly to the Treasurer of the Church. To the correctness of this statement, the Treasurer will no doubt willingly testify. This question was brought before Sessions in order to call their attention to the necessity of promptitude and punctuality in this matter.

METHODS.

As to the methods employed in gathering in the offerings of the people, there is manifestly a great variety in use. There is no part of the Church's work in which there is less unity, and less of principle, and greater unwisdom exhibited than in this part of it. In many congregations most careful attention appears to be given to this subject, and no member or adherent is left unreached by the methods employed; while in many other congregations, the means used for this end are clumsy and ineffective. It is evident that large numbers of the members and adherents of the Church are not asked for contributions to the schemes, or are asked in such a way that they easily escape contributing. These congregations go on from year to year contented with their small contribution for their own support, and largely oblivious of all the work which is being done outside of their own borders. The pastor is often powerless to prevent or improve upon this state of affairs, however much dissatisfied with it he may be.

The reports do not show that the Presbyteries have considered which is the best means to be used to this end, or that they have recommended any particular methods. It would serve no purpose to enumerate here all the methods which are in use. It is obvious that methods must be adapted to the localities in which they are employed. Your Committee is of opinion that this subject should receive very much more attention from the Presbyteries. It is not a matter of how much the people ought to give, but how best to secure that every member and adherent shall have an opportunity of contributing to each of the schemes. The Church will never do all that she could do, in maintaining the Gospel, at home, and abroad, until she adopts some adequate and suitable means, by which to gather into her treasury the resources of the people. This has been often said. Why should the work not be attempted? In saying these things in regard to the defect in liberality which the reports point to, your Committee recognizes, as has been already indicated, the large and widely influential work done by the congregations. The people, outside of those who carry their economies in religious duties too far, and even some of these in other ways than direct giving of their means, are doing generous work for Christ in all the land. It is only just to recognise with gratitude to God and with warm commendation, their willing co-operations, their kindly and multitudinous minor services, their large hospitalities, their thoughtful gifts with all which, done in the Master's name, they cheer the Pastors and Missionaries of the Church and attest their own genuine sympathy with the Kingdom.

III. AS SHOWN IN THE OBSERVANCE OF THE SABBATH.

1. Kindly report any tendency in your locality towards greater or less fidelity in keeping sacred the Lord's day with probable causes.
2. Do the members of the Church, as a rule, refrain from travelling on Sabbath?
3. Are any of your people compelled to engage in their occupations on the Sabbath?
4. Have any efforts been made, or are they necessary, to secure the better observance of the Sabbath in your neighborhood?
5. Does the street car service in cities and towns, other railway traffic, or other modes of travelling on Sabbath, influence injuriously the religious life of the people and lead to the desecration of the day?

On this supremely important subject of Sabbath Observance the tone of the reports from all parts of the country is cheering. In every part of the Church faithful testimony has been borne by the Pastors to the sacredness of the day and its claims. The reports show, that while in some parts of the Church, the tendency is toward a better observance of the day, in other parts the tendency is in the opposite direction. In several of the Western Presbyteries such as Rock Lake, Melita, Calgary, Edmonton, Kamloops, it is noted, that in this respect, an improvement is going on. This is particularly gratifying, as an indication of the influence of the Gospel in those localities, which have only for a short time enjoyed religious ordinances with regularity, and in which, formerly, the Sabbath was not well observed. In many parts of the Church the Lord's day is enjoyed in peace and quietness; while complaints come from other places, in rural parts, as well as from towns and cities, of the desecration of the day. The love of pleasure, and the greed of gain are setting in motion various new modes of accomplishing this. The reports show that the old and perpetual battle is going on; that here, in the very centre of the field, the enemy presses most persistently. They also show that God's people are in some measure alive to the situation, and are doing all in their power to protect the day from the assaults that are being made upon it. The members of the Church as a rule, so far as the reports indicate, abstain from travelling on Sabbath. It appears that a considerable number of the members of the Church are in the difficult position of having to work on the Sabbath or lose their positions. These have a special claim upon the sympathy of the Church. The street car, the railways, the bicycle, and other modes of travel, made use of for purposes of pleasure and of gain, are complained of as having an injurious influence on the religious life of the people in many parts of the country.

It is clear, then, from the reports: 1st, That the Sabbath is well observed by our people. 2nd, That in different parts of the country attempts are being made to break down the sacredness of it, and turn it to uses of pleasure or of gain. 3rd, That in several localities in which such attempts have been made, they were successfully resisted by the Christian people. 4th, That at this present time there is particular need for renewed energy in defence of the Lord's Day. 5th, That pastors and sessions are putting forth efforts to preserve it, and to guard it against the attacks that are being made upon it.

The following statement by Principal Caven, which he kindly prepared for this report, puts before the General Assembly the situation as it exists at present, in respect to the legal aspect of the subject, and the work of the Ontario Lord's Day Alliance.

"The Ontario Lord's Day Alliance seeks to preserve the Lord's Day for the whole Province, so that all classes of the community may have opportunity for rest and worship on the day set apart by divine authority, and that the Sabbath may be placed on a firm foundation as a national institution.

"Violations of the Lord's Day Act in various quarters and the expressed determination of many to work for the introduction of a 'Continental Sunday,' make the existence of such a body as the Alliance very necessary; but its success will depend in a large measure on the sympathy and support accorded to it by the Churches. Though the Sabbath is seriously threatened not only in Ontario but in other Provinces of the Dominion, it is too apparent that the great majority of the Christian people do not realize the seriousness of the crisis which is upon us. Ontario courts have decided that any person using street cars on the Lord's Day is a 'traveller' in the sense of the Act, that the Act does not apply to corporations, that servants of corporations are also exempted from the operation of the Act, and that no classes of persons except those specified in the Lord's Day Act, are subject to its provisions. It is needless to point out that unless these decisions are reversed the Act ceases to be of much value as a barrier against Sabbath desecration. At the instance of the Alliance, the Government of Ontario has promised to submit to the Court of Appeal a special case for the double purpose of removing all ambiguities in the Lord's Day Act and of determining the validity of Provincial legislation regarding the Sabbath.

This latter object becomes necessary in view of the decision of the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia that all Provincial legislation on the Lord's Day is incompetent.

"The Alliance gladly co-operated with the friends of the Lord's Day in Caledonia in securing the removal from the Bill regarding the construction of the Hamilton and Caledonia Radial Line, a clause enabling the company to operate their line on the Lord's Day. The Alliance also—but without success—united with friends of the Sabbath in Ottawa in opposing a like provision in 'An Act Respecting the City of Ottawa.' The decision of the Queen's Bench in the Midland elevator case exempting an employee of the Grand Trunk Railway, a Dominion corporation, from all penalty for violation of the Lord's Day is under appeal and the appeal will be prosecuted by the Lord's Day Alliance of Ontario in conjunction with the branch in Midland."

IV. AS SHOWN IN RELATION TO SOCIAL QUESTIONS.

1. To what extent does intemperance interfere with the work of the Gospel in your parish, and are any means employed to educate the young in temperance as inculcated in the Word of God? (a) Is the sin of intemperance increasing or diminishing in your community? (b) What is the chief hindrance to the work of the Gospel in your neighborhood? Is it intemperance?
2. Is any effort made by the Church to exert a religious influence upon the public schools, and to see that the law in regard to the teaching of religion is carried out?
3. Is any effort made by the Church on behalf of the poor and the unemployed?
4. Have you any suggestion on the influence which the Press, the reading of the people, or the amusements of the people have upon their religious life?

The Church is accused of neglecting social questions, and this not only by her enemies. There is being formed under her very shadow, and in the midst of her operations, a civilization marked by vices, oppressions and degradations, as alien to Christianity, as fatal to the well being of human society, as those which are found among the heathen. The Church appears to be confined within limits of operation, outside of which a world of iniquity lies untouched by her influence. This state of things is more apparent in older lands, but it is beginning to be realized in some directions in our new country also; hence your committee regards this sphere of the Church's work as of very special importance. The question submitted under this head means, does the Church respond to the claims of Christ, in dealing with those conditions in society which are evil, with the demoralizing forces which are creating these evil conditions, and make use of the means which God has put into her hands to resist and overcome them.

INTEMPERANCE.

It is asked, how far intemperance interferes with the work of the gospel in the parish. Some reports in reply, speak in very strong terms of the sin of intemperance in its general aspects. On this it is not necessary to dwell. We know that the word of God regards the drunkard to be as much a sinner as the thief, or even as the covetous man, or the extortioner. It is very gratifying to learn that the overwhelming testimony of the reports is to the effect, that intemperance does not interfere to any serious extent with the work of the gospel within the bounds of our congregations. The reports from a number of districts state, that within them there is no intemperance existing. While in many others, it is said that it is not so prevalent as to interfere with the work of the congregation. Some of these reports are from localities in which there is no opportunity in the immediate neighborhood to purchase intoxicants. But a like testimony is borne by others from

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districts in which such opportunities do exist. Even in those communities in which complaint is made, that intemperance does interfere to some extent with the work of the gospel, it is acknowledged that it is kept within narrower bounds than formerly. The reports are with a few exceptions unanimous in testifying that in the neighborhoods represented intemperance is diminishing. It is, however, reported that in some districts the conditions are not so favorable. The situation is more difficult. The population is of mixed nationality and training. The environment is not conducive to a high standard. In some of the newer settlements of the country particularly, loud complaint is made of the prevalence of intemperance, and of the evil influences of the saloon. Yet taking into account the conditions in these localities, the variety of national character, the hardships encountered, the past habits of life under which the people are found; also the fact that religious ordinances may not have been enjoyed except at long intervals, and that the moral and religious forces have been but a brief period in operation, it is most encouraging to learn that the evil of intemperance, with its baleful attendants, is decidedly diminishing. It is manifest also from the replies made, that the rising generation in the Church is being diligently taught by parents, pastors, and Sabbath school teachers, on the subject of "Temperance." The reports do not refer to the difference between the meaning attached to this term as commonly understood, and that which it bears in the Word of God. Your Committee is of opinion, that in training the young, self control requires to be as strenuously insisted upon in regard to other sinful tendencies, as it does in regard to the inclination to use intoxicants. Multitudes of the youth of the land, have neither inclination nor temptation to be intemperate in the use of intoxicating drink, who are every day exposed to temptation to sin of a more deadly character.

But from the reports it appears that attention has been given to shield the youth principally from the sin of drunkenness. The testimony on this whole subject of the Church's condition in relation to intemperance, is such as the Church should recognize with thankfulness to God. As one report states "our congregations are composed of temperate people, and to a large extent of total abstainers." This is in a large measure true of all the congregations of the Church. The efforts made by the Church to inculcate the duty of temperance have not been put forth in vain. Should the same rate of progress maintained in recent years be continued, the day is not far distant we may hope, when our country, already conspicuous for the temperance of its population, will not depend on the favor of governments to protect the people from this great evil. Its defence will be found, as it is now found, in an enlightened public conscience. This will in respect to this social condition, as in respect to other social questions, inevitably find expression in such wise and righteous law as the country requires.

The following statement has been kindly forwarded by the Rev. D. S. Fraser for insertion in the report :

"THE PLAN OF WORK."

"Since last Assembly, two extremes have been reached. The extreme of action, during the great Plebiscite campaign; and the extreme of inaction, since that campaign ended. Until the end of September, there was more than the usual demand for the Pledge Cards, Manuals, and Pledge Books, supplied in connection with the 'Plan of Work' for promoting the cause of Temperance within the congregations of the Church. But since that time very little has been done in this line. The lull after the storm has been marked, not alone in connection with the Assembly's 'Plan of Work,' but in all branches of Temperance work. This reaction was not unexpected, and need not be discouraging.

"Now, that there has been time to consider the situation pretty fully, there should be a steady and well directed return to action—action, more vigorous and determined than that of former years. Whether the Temperance cause has suffered a real, or only an apparent, defeat, there should be no backward movement on the part of the country, neither should there be any looking back on the part of the

Church, which has strongly set her hand to the Temperance plough. Let the watchword of the country and of the church be 'Forward! FORWARD!!'

"In this Forward Movement, the work of Education must ever hold first place. The sphere of this work, this work of hopeful promise, must be amongst the children and youth of the land, and it should be carried on unceasingly. Where can the Church most effectively carry on this educative work? In her Sabbath Schools, and Young People's Societies. The 'Plan of Work' has been adopted, and recommended by the church, as a simple and effective method of doing this work where it can be most effectively done.

"The 'Plan of Work' is in charge of Rev. D. Stiles Fraser, Upper Stewiacke, N.S., from whom necessary information and supplies can be obtained.

"This work demands attention. It deserves earnest, prayerful attention, for it is far-reaching in its results. Work done now will bear fruit long after this. Neglect of the work will also be far-reaching, but the fruits of neglect are bitter fruits. May their reaping not be to us."

THE CHIEF HINDRANCE.

The answers to the question : What is the chief hindrance to the work of the gospel in your neighborhood? are such as to awaken deep solicitude, and to suggest inquiry. The testimony is unanimously to the effect that the chief hindrance is no one vice, or no one form of sin. The chief hindrance to the carrying on of the work of Christ with success is stated in the reports, with striking unanimity, to be a spirit of indifference to divine things.

A long list of hindrances, such as all are familiar with, might be gathered from the reports, but this is the evil which is deplored by all of them as the most prominent, and the most baffling. It is a condition of spiritual stupor, a mind and temper which makes no response to earnest appeals, which is unconcerned for the kingdom of God, which is not in sympathy with earnest spiritual life. It is a condition which consists with attendance on religious ordinances, with the most complete total abstinence, and with perfect outward decorum. The descriptions given of it identify it with what has been appropriately called "evangelical modernism." This is a Laodicean condition, neither cold nor hot.

But while this is the temper and attitude in respect to religion, it is not so in respect to the life of the world. The lust of gain, and the love of pleasure are intoxicating many. This is the most dangerous kind of intoxication. By this the people's hearts are turned away from religious duty, and hardened against religious impressions. This confessed condition is a surprise, in view of the wave of Christian Endeavorism that has been sweeping through the Church, and of all the beneficent work the Church has been doing. Still there is no mistaking the testimony. It would be sinful to disregard it. There is something lacking in the life of the Church. This is what the reports certify, that there is lacking that conscience of duty, that sense of responsibility to Christ, that apprehension of the Christian calling, which should be found in a healthy, religious condition. The strong testimony to this effect is an evidence that the Presbyteries are anxious that there should be an awakening of the Church from this comatose state. And no doubt measures will be taken in all of them to inquire into the cause of it, and to endeavor to have taken out of the way this discouraging hindrance to the work of the Gospel. While saying this it should be borne in mind that there is a great living body of devoted members who have no part nor lot in this indictment.

EDUCATION.

It is evident from the answers to the questions on this subject, that no direct effort has been made, or is being made by the Church to exert a religious influence upon the public schools. The one exception to this state of things is found in the Province of Quebec. The report of the Montreal Presbytery, which may be taken as representative, says in regard to this question : "The following statement may

be taken as an example of all the ers. The schools are visited by pastors, who keep in close touch with the instruction of the children in religious knowledge." It is added, "the returns from the country indicate a condition of things hardly less satisfactory." If this much could be said of the relation of pastors to the public schools throughout the country, we would then be assured, that the Church was exercising in a very effective way, a religious influence upon them. But in only a very few other instances do the schools appear to be recognized as institutions with which the Church has any relation.

If the public schools exert no religious influence upon the rising generation, it is not only because of the state of the law on the subject. There is nothing in that, at least in several of the Provinces, to prevent ministers, trustees and parents exerting such an influence, as to secure that the schools shall be pervaded by a Christian atmosphere, and that the small amount of recognition that our religion is permitted to receive in them, is accorded to it. There is nothing in the law to prevent the trustees giving teachers to understand, not only that they desire the regulations to be carried out fully, but that they desire the teacher to impress at every opportunity, on the young minds under his care, the authority of that divine law which he is required to teach them. There is provision in the law, giving to ministers the opportunity of seeing that this is done. It is of no use, in the divided state of the Church, and of public sentiment, to look to the government to take any steps to guard further the moral welfare of the rising generation, by providing for a more adequate teaching of religion in the public schools. The Church should recognize her own responsibility. Can Churches which carry on their work alongside of the public schools, as our own Church does, and as the other Protestant Churches do, be fully discharging their responsibility, if they fail to exert any influence, and do not attempt to exert any, in moulding to some extent the educational work of the country, as that is carried on in its public schools.

Many, even of those who are members of the Church, and deeply interested in the religious training of the young, are opposed to this being done in the common schools by any formal instruction.

Without touching on that question at all, there remains a wide sphere in which the Church can wield an influence which might make itself felt in all the school houses of the land. This question is a new one to be dealt with here. The schools in relation to the teaching of total abstinence have been dealt with. But your Committee respectfully submits, that the Presbyterian Church should not cease to make prominent in her regard, and strengthen with her discerning sympathy the vastly influential schools of the people. A strong religious life can only be based upon a foundation of intelligence and sound instruction.

THE POOR AND UNEMPLOYED.

The question on this subject has more particular reference to large centres of population. In these the problem of the poor and of those who, through no fault of their own, are out of employment, is more keenly felt. The reports indicate that the relation of the Church to these classes of the people, has not been before the minds of the Sessions as a subject which they should concern themselves with. From a number of districts the reply comes, that there are no poor within the bounds of the congregations who require assistance. But the majority of the reports have nothing special to contribute upon the subject. Both pastors and people give all the aid in their power in such cases as come under their notice. They also seek out those who are in need of help and sympathy, and minister to them. The report from Montreal says, "It is evident that the work of the Church in the city is most satisfactory with regard to this matter." Possibly the same may be said in regard to other cities also. Yet between these classes and the Church the gulf appears to be widening. Systematic effort on their behalf is very much left to other agencies which recognize their claim on Christian benevolence. Our Lord carried on His work very largely among the poor. The Church cannot err in following in His steps, in her relations and dealings with the forgotten and

neely. If the lowest stratum of society be instructed in the gospel and be elevated by the sympathy and the purifying influences which accompany it, then the whole fabric of society will be lifted up along with it. The Church which only labors for those, and among those who have means and are able to sustain ordinances for themselves, is not possessed by a missionary spirit.

The influence which the press, reading of the people, the amusements of the people have upon their religious life.

THE PRESS.

1. On these questions the reports, with few exceptions, are not as full and clear as might be desired. Certain positions, however, are clearly taken. The great influence which the Press exerts upon the moral life of the community is recognized. That portion of it which is read in the homes of the people, other than directly religious publications, is regarded as maintaining a high moral tone, and being distinctly friendly to religion. Some publications are mentioned of which this could not be said so strongly. It is objected that the minute delineation of crimes and the details given of the lives of criminals is decidedly unhealthy in its effect upon the moral life of the community. This is undoubtedly true. The regrettable fact is, that the newspapers should have so many readers who relish these minutia of iniquity. They are certainly distasteful to a large number of their most intelligent patrons. It is possible that the Press is mistaken in its estimate of the number of those who enjoy those objectionable features.

2. It is objected that the constant detraction of public men, the continual ascription of base motives to those who serve the people in positions of authority, is injurious to the moral character of the community. The Press which indulges in this course is justly regarded as not being used to educate the people in political questions, so important at this stage in our country's life. Such a use of it tends rather to blind and pervert the judgment, and deaden the conscience of the people. The assaults which are made on the character of public men, dare not be made except from behind the shield of the writer's anonymity. This stream of accusation, which has no basis in fact, is one of the causes which tend to produce that political corruption among the people in recent times which has been unfortunately conspicuous. Notwithstanding these features which are objected to, it is recognized that throughout the whole country, our people are highly favored in having so large an amount of good and useful reading provided for them by the newspapers, and at so cheap a rate. Compared with former times their advantages in this respect are great. While earnestly desiring that this powerful agent of civilization were even more largely inspired by the Christian spirit, the Church cannot but recognize with thankfulness, her great indebtedness to the Press for its continual unpurchased service, which is of the highest value in the prosecution of her work, and is an evidence of the good spirit by which it is impelled.

3. Special mention is made in some of the reports, and high commendation given to the religious publications of our own Church. These, however, it is regretted, are not found in so many of the homes of the people as they should be. Their influence is recognized to be in the highest degree beneficial wherever they are read. Your Committee is of opinion that this subject of the reading of the people is worthy of much greater attention from the Presbyteries and Sessions than it receives. It is widely indicated in the reports, that it is very desirable that a larger amount of religious reading of a healthy kind should be found in the homes of the people. For a considerable time there has been a growing devotion to literature of a light and superficial nature among all classes. It is cheering to note that there are slight indications of a reaction from this unhealthy tendency appearing from time to time. Books, which are interesting as well as instructive, should be earnestly sought after, and put into the hands of the young people. Several reports recommended that libraries should be provided for the use of the congregation, as well as the Sabbath School. Also, that in outlying districts colporteurs should be employed to carry to the households a supply of cheap

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and attractive evangelical literature. In many sections of the country, not only in remote parts, but in more populous districts as well, such an agency would be a valuable supplement to the labors of the Church. The services of the Religious Tract and Book Society might be with great benefit, much more largely made use of than it is, for supplying the people with wholesome reading.

AMUSEMENTS.

In regard to the influence which the amusements of the people have upon their religious life, there is not much said in the reports. It is recognized that amusements and recreation have their legitimate place in life, and contribute much when properly guided, to a healthy moral condition. As far as the matter has come under cognisance the recreations of the people are of an unexceptionable character. It is evident from the spirit of the reports, that in this sphere much is left, and wisely left, to the guidance of the individual conscience, and to that sense of responsibility which religion creates. The Church has no need for self-appointed makers of moral laws, who are disposed to tie up everyone within their own conceptions of Christian liberty. Nor has she for those who, on their own authority, would set loose the conscience and the life from restraints which divine authority has placed upon them. There is a tendency in some ecclesiastical circles to multiply sins, which is the work of a pharisaical spirit and injurious to the conscience. There is also a tendency outside of these circles to enlarge the bounds of conduct into ways that are sinful. They who walk in these ways seek shelter from an accusing conscience, in the fact that so many Christian people see no harm in them. These tendencies show the need of directing the energies of the Church against sin in the heart, rather than spending them upon some one or two forms of conduct which lie outside of our measure, it may be, but upon which the stamp of divine condemnation has not been placed. Complaint is made in a few reports, of excessive devotion to dancing and card playing, and in other reports of a like spirit towards outdoor sports. But these references are much too vague to permit of any pronouncement. What is harmless amusement and refreshment to one, is weariness and wickedness to another. If anyone has not principle enough and grace enough to guide himself in his amusements, as well as in his more serious duties, then he has not enough to enable him to lead a Christian life. He needs to have grace ministered to him. There are two points on which the reports agree. 1st. That recreation should be confined to legitimate times. 2nd. That they ought not to be carried to excess but kept within reasonable bounds. It is felt that there is a tendency at present to devote altogether too much time to amusements on the part of many young people. This excessive pursuit of pleasure is highly injurious to character and very fatal to the religious life. Possibly this too great enthusiasm in this direction at the present day is the inevitable reaction from the hardness of a former period that was too much absorbed in oppressive and monotonous toil. Time given to rational amusement is not wasted time. It is a needed relaxation and protest against the sordid spirit which makes life dreary with unending labor. While deprecating the time wasted in games, it should be borne in mind, that while some may have too much recreation, many, even of our young people, have too little. If the adult population would recreate more, and join to a larger extent in the amusements of the younger people, both in the family circle and in the open air, much would be done to keep amusements within proper bounds, and so promote the physical and moral well being of society. Your Committee has laid some emphasis upon this point, though it is loosely treated in most of the reports, because although it may seem of subordinate importance, it is one upon which much that is misleading is being taught and one, the right understanding of which, is very helpful to those who are trying to lead a Christian life. It is well therefore that the Church should give some attention to it.

SUMMARY OF SYNODICAL REPORTS.

It is not necessary to quote at length from these reports, excellent as they are. Their interpretation of the situation is in agreement with that of the Presbyteries. They were received at too late a period to be made use of in preparing the report of your Committee, yet the conclusions arrived at in them are very much in harmony with those set forth in it.

SYNOD OF MONTREAL AND OTTAWA.

"In summing up, your Committee find much in the reports they have studied, for gratitude to God and hopefulness for the future, in the deep interest taken by many parents in the moral and religious training of their children; and in the zeal and efforts of Sabbath Schools and young people's societies, to promote the highest interests of our youth; seen also in the well-sustained interest of our people at large in the services of the sanctuary, and their faithful observance of the Lord's supper; in their reverence for God's holy day, and in their indignation at its wanton desecration; at the progress being made in temperance and other reforms; and in the testimony borne to the general excellence of the Canadian press, both secular and religious. On the other hand:

"Your Committee find ground for concern in the neglect of family worship in many homes, due largely to social and economical conditions; and ground for alarm in the increasing perils that beset the Holy Sabbath, as well from within as without; and in the extravagant lengths to which amusements are carried by many, and engrossment in mere worldly affairs."

SYNOD OF TORONTO AND KINGSTON.

The report from this synod does not present any new features. It is summarized as follows by the Convener:—

"In conclusion, an attempt has been made to faithfully present the salient features of the reports which have come into the hands of your Convener. There is much that is encouraging in these reports. Our Church is a mighty power in the land, and is making her influence felt in the home, in society, and even in the government of our country. It is of the utmost importance that we who have been placed as watchmen on the walls of our Zion, should be on the alert and be quick to notice and warn the people against those things which would undermine and destroy the spiritual life, and on the other hand be quick to notice and encourage every movement which we believe will be helpful to that life. And above all let us faithfully hold forth the Word of life, which maketh wise unto salvation."

SYNOD OF HAMILTON AND LONDON.

The following condensed statement of the contents of the report is taken from it. The report was ordered by the Synod to be printed and to be sent out with the minutes. The Convener places at the head of his report the text: I Tim. vi., 10— "The love of money is a root of all kinds of evil." The longer your Committee pondered the replies sent in and the facts thus brought to light the more convinced were they that our text for to-day, "The love of money is a root of all kinds of evil," indicates the points of weakness and of special danger, but also points the direction of great possibility for Church life and work in our Synod.

1. (Condensed.)

"Summarizing the replies it would seem that as regards (1) The Home Religious Life. While the majority refuse to admit decline, family worship is at the best irregular and by no means universal, and the teaching of the children is too much delegated to Sunday School and strangers.

(2) The Congregation, Sabbath and communion services are well attended, but prayer meetings are very slimly attended; workers can be readily secured; giving for the Schemes is not yet up to the mark; Presbyterians take high rank for integrity in business, and good behaviour in social relationship.

(3) The Sabbath. Well kept, but with a tendency decidedly strong against its reverent observance, owing to the bicycle, the love of pleasure and the hope of gain.

(4) Social Questions. We rejoice in a clean, high-toned press, in the main on the side of morality and religion, but with a tendency, for money's sake, to the sensational and culpably prying. The amusements of the people we leave strictly alone, trusting to the educated conscience of our people, as we ought to guide them as to the influence for good or evil which their example will exert, and the indulgence which is therefore legitimate.

It is cheering to know that everywhere intemperance is decreasing. In one village a former bar is now a circulating library. And yet when one remembers that there is probably not a single congregation within our bounds in which the sin of intemperance is not a decided hindrance to Christian work; that there is far more than one Session of which the same is true; that Church members on every hand are giving money over the bar for drink, which our reports show is needed to carry forward our mission work at home, or to evangelize the heathen abroad, surely there comes a loud call for sustained vigorous fight until this giant evil is cast out—root and branch.

(e) But in the midst of hopefulness and just thankfulness for large success from end to end of the Synod, if you listen attentively you hear an undertone of dissatisfaction and apprehension. In an attempted interpreting of this the balance of our report will consist.

Brethren, there is not a Presbytery; there are only a few congregations in all our bounds, in which these reports do not prove that we have not imbibed and imparted such a controlling sense of stewardship as will lay upon the altar all needed monies. The love of money *overcome* would offer our Church her grandest possibility.

Your Committee would humbly suggest that the time has come when our theological colleges should have at least this much of a course in Applied Christianity that some level-headed, practical, consecrated business man, lay or clerical, should give a short course of lectures on the Christian meaning and purpose and use of money or other possession; the Schemes of our Church, their number, origin, purpose and accomplishment; the missionary activity at home and abroad; how much money we expend; how and at what cost; so that when our young men go out into harness they may know whereof they speak, and may have a sympathy for our Church's work as distinguished from merely parish congregational effort.

Failing such a course some, if not all the young men, and old, would do well either before or after, preferably before, advocating the Schemes or other money matters to consult with some sympathetic but shrewd Christian business man who, with his hard-headedness, and good sense, will point out the weakness or sentimentality or worse of our attempts in finance, and thus give to our utterance both sound and sense.

(d) Social Questions. Under the fourth head nothing need be said more than to emphasize the same thought. If we had in our hotels men who wished to minister merely to a legitimate social instinct and would therefore refuse to sell to the incapable and undeserving; if the love of money did not determine the whole affair, we might rest easy about the whole temperance question. But when we know that to most in the business love of money is more than love of souls, sense of honesty, comfort of homes or rights of helpless wives and children, we must arm ourselves for a continued, long hard, fight till this giant evil is worsted and cast out."

SYNOD OF BRITISH COLUMBIA.

The report from this Synod covers the whole ground referred to in the questions submitted very fully.

"The Sessions and missionaries have endeavored to give a true statement of the religious life of the congregations. Much active and aggressive congregational life has been manifest. It is a cause for thankfulness to God that notwithstanding the sin and iniquity which abound He has not withheld His Holy Spirit, at once the source and preserver of all our spiritual life. The settled purpose of the Church is to possess the land, to carry the Gospel into every part, and before the most indifferent, and to claim the land in all its life for Christ, whose it is by right of His redeeming sacrifice."

The report indicates that the conditions under which the Church carries on her work in some parts of the Synod are specially difficult, yet progress is being made. The gospel is faithfully ministered. Its power is being increasingly felt. The report is encouraging, but shows very plainly that in that Synod, as elsewhere, there is a very strenuous battle to be fought for righteousness, and for the cause of our Lord Jesus Christ.

CONCLUDING REMARKS.

The above statement contains, as far as we have been able to gather and express it, the substance of the testimony borne by the reports, on the subjects submitted to the Sessions and the Presbyteries. To quote from the report of the Presbytery of Calgary, which aptly expresses the situation in the wider field of the Church, as well as within its own bounds: "They bear evidence to the fact that in home life, in the life and work of the congregations, in social relationships, and the observance of the Sabbath, the claims of Christ are being more distinctly recognized." While this is correct there are two facts which stand out prominently in these documents to which your Committee would call attention. One is, that in every form of Christian activity, a large amount of fruitful work has been done during the past year, in connection with our congregations. Consecrated pastors, enduring hardness in many fields as good soldiers of Jesus Christ, have been laboring earnestly for his cause. The gospel has been preached with earnestness and power throughout the land. It has been carried into the homes of the people. It has been proclaimed amid the arctic rigors of the Yukon. It has ministered in every form to the healing and saving of humanity. It has been carried by devoted missionaries beyond the bounds of the Dominion, into heathen lands and heathen homes. Sacrifices have been made, and gifts given on its behalf, of which no record is kept. And while the defects and infirmities of human nature obtrude at times in the work, yet the fact remains, that much has been accomplished that is worthy to be recorded, and to call forth a becoming Ebenezer on the part of the whole Church. The divine blessing has been abundantly bestowed upon all her ministries. And in the power of the Holy Spirit the Church has borne witness for Christ. It is admitted that neither the homes nor the congregations of the Church are all that they might be, but they are aiming at higher ideals. Nor is the Sabbath everywhere observed as it should be. Nor will it ever be in the existing state of society. Nor is our social life as pure as we hope it will become. But notwithstanding these admitted shortcomings, the Church is anxiously directing her attention to these spheres of her operations. And her abundant labor under the divine blessing will be felt in her homes and congregations, in her Sabbaths and in her social life. For this past year of earnest and fruitful labor with all its precious results it becomes the Assembly to give thanks to God.

The second fact is, that while the above statement is true, the Church manifestly longs for a larger volume of spiritual life, for a deeper earnestness in her membership, and for a more thorough realization by the people of their responsibilities. She is conscious of the wide open doors that the Master has set before her.

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She longs to enter in at them. She longs for freedom from her captivities. Her ministers are anxious to do more and see more to be done than they are getting done. From every quarter comes the acknowledgment that present attainments are not sufficient, that there is need and room for higher endeavor and higher accomplishment. There is a confessed defect in her life and work. It is felt, notwithstanding her activities, that the claims of Christ lie too lightly on the hearts and consciences of the people.

The reality and sincerity of this confession of shortcoming ought to be seen, and will no doubt be seen in the effort that will be made in the coming year through all the Presbyteries, to dissipate this indifference and awaken the people to a deeper interest in divine things. Whatever may be the explanation of this spiritual apathy of which complaint is made in all the reports, and which is at all times a cause of complaint in the Church to the earnest-minded people of God, there are certain lines of action indicated as necessary, in order that the life and work of the Church may be revived and successfully carried forward. There is needed in the first place very evidently greater thoroughness in every department of the work. There is a tendency to superficialism from which the Church, as well as other spheres of labor, suffers. There has been also both within and without her borders a certain amount of immature teaching. Sometimes also a superficial evangelism has abounded, which, making a momentary impression, ultimately causes divine things to be regarded with less reverence. There has been likewise prevailing a spirit of impatience, a desire to bring about results in our own appointed times, an impatience with the tried methods that have been blessed in the past for the evangelizing of the world. A craving also for novelties and sensationalisms has diverted attention from the real spiritual agencies which are blessed of God. These with other causes combined, have induced the state of mind complained of. The recovery of the Church is very much in her own hands. The divine promises of revival will be realized when the Church does her work faithfully, when all false confidences are renounced, and the Church no longer "says to the work of her hands, ye are our gods." This revival of thoroughness must begin with the pastors. Indeed from the reports it appears already to have begun. It must begin in the study. It should be visible in the pulpit and the administration of congregational affairs. A little well done is more effective than much badly done. But it must extend also to the pew. The elders and managers can do much to help it forward. It is too much forgotten that the work of the managers is spiritual work. It should be done as prayerfully as all other Church work. The members of the Church must be more diligent in religious duty. Then, and only then, may we call upon God with the expectation of blessing. It is easy to deplore in orthodox terms the absence of the Divine Spirit, and to express a pious wish for His life-giving presence. But the Divine Spirit has taught us that He does not come to make up for our idleness and neglect. He will not come to idle pastors or to an idle people. Let us, then, not merely express our pious wishes. It is the kind of people and the character of the Church which speaks, that determines the answer she receives, and not the prayers that are offered.

There is further to be desired a larger measure of enthusiasm both in the ministry and in the membership on behalf of all the operations of the Church. Such a spirit would lift us out of our localisms and hobbyisms, and make all parts of the Church, and all her enterprises and schemes, equally the object of our care and sympathy. There is needed further an increase in our faith in God. It is His work we are engaged in. He will supply the means for accomplishing it. He will honor a large faith. It will be unto us, as it ever is, according to our faith. He will send the means for generous undertakings. Let us cast ourselves wholly on Him and attempt and expect greater things. Thoroughness, enthusiasm, faith, these are a trinity of great power. And when with these the tide of divine grace and blessing flows in upon the Church, she will be lifted out of her worldliness and unbelief into a spirit more worthy of her high calling, and will go forward with new power on her mission of divine beneficence, throughout all the regions of this wide Dominion, and to the uttermost parts of the earth.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

The General Assembly recognizes, with profound thankfulness to God, the abundant blessing which has been enjoyed throughout the Church at home and abroad in all her operations, and

RECOMMENDS :

1. That Presbyteries and Sessions continue their efforts to maintain religious worship and instruction in the families of the Church, and afford all possible guidance and encouragement to the heads of households, in the performance of this duty.
2. That Presbyteries and Sessions make use of such means as they deem wise, to revive the religious life of congregations and especially take steps to secure a deeper interest on their part, in all the enterprises of the Church and in all the schemes; that they consider the best methods of securing for these the financial support of all the people, and put these methods in operation.
3. That the observance of the Lord's Day be made the subject of instruction from the pulpit as occasion requires and that continuous and determined effort be put forth to preserve it in its entirety from the encroachments that are being made upon it.
4. That Presbyteries take such measures as they deem effective, for the removal of the chief hindrances of the work of the Gospel, of which complaint is made by them; especially that they warn the people against the blinding love of money, which is "a root of all kinds of evils;" and against that worship of Mammon which displaces the worship of God, which would rob the Church of her Sabbaths, which cripples all her schemes, which is the source of every demoralizing traffic, and of every form of oppression from which the people suffer.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SABBATH SCHOOLS, 1898-99.

I.—STATISTICS.

REV. J. W. RAE, *Vice-Convenor.*

The statistical section of your Committee's report does not vary much from year to year. Reports have been received from 2,324 schools, being 180 more than in 1897, which recorded an increase of 227 more than in 1896.

Synod and Presbytery conveners have reported very promptly, thus lessening very much the work of your Committee, and in more cases than is usual, recommendations are appended.

The annexed tabulated statement has been prepared with much care, and, it is believed, is as accurate as in a large territory consisting of city, town and country schools including mission stations in sparsely settled districts can well be expected to be.

1.—ATTENDANCE.

18,991 teachers and officers, a gain of 172, have charge of 160,150 scholars, an increase of 5,851; of these 107,775 are present every Sabbath, or nearly 66 per cent.

2.—RECITATIONS.

51,413 scholars are memorizing verses of Scripture, and slightly over 61,000 are studying the Shorter Catechism, 2,737 have committed the whole book to memory, and in this very desirable work the Synod of the Maritime Provinces has a decided lead. The number studying their lessons at home is 66,959, or 210 fewer than last year. The whole number of teachers' meetings for lesson study is still far too small, there being but 272 in the whole Church.

3.—CHURCH RELATIONS.

2,706 elders are engaged in Sabbath School work, 65,704 pupils attend public worship in the sanctuary each Sabbath, 3,847 became communicants in 1898, which 20,106 scholars all told are in full communion with the church.

4.—CONTRIBUTIONS.

\$84,983 was raised by the Sabbath Schools, of which \$58,537 was expended on the schools themselves. The amount contributed by the congregations to the support of the Sabbath Schools, \$13,758, being \$1,802 more than last year. The amount contributed to the Schemes of the Church was \$23,995, a decrease of 546, while the amount contributed to other objects decreased from \$9,821 to 9,806.

If the amounts raised in Sabbath Schools be added to that given by congregations to their support, their total revenue becomes \$98,741, while the expenditure on themselves, to the Schemes of the Church and for benevolent objects, is but \$92,238, leaving \$6,403 to be accounted for, and which must either be in the hands of the Treasurers unapportioned, or else the figures reveal the fact that the accounts have not been accurately kept in all the schools.

II.—HIGHER RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION.

In response to the resolution of the Assembly of last year demanding that the department of H. R. I. be made self-sustaining, the Committee dropped the work in the Essay and Historical departments and took steps to lessen the cost in this department remaining. The precipitate action thus forced on the Committee has had the effect of, to some degree, lessening the interest in the Scheme, as is shown in a slightly diminished number of candidates entering for the examinations. It is, however, gratifying that in the face of all discouragements there were 358 entries for parts of the work, of whom 140 honorably passed. Of these, forty-one are prize winners and five are medallists. The

department of Catechism recitation shows an increased popularity, as during the year there have been issued for repeating correctly answers to all the questions in the Shorter Catechism at one recitation, 464 diplomas as compared with 350 for the past year.

Taking a retrospective survey of the past we find that since 1890, when the first report from the H.R.I department was presented to the Assembly, a total of 4,419 entries have been made for examination, of these 2,763 have been successful in passing, and of these again 734 were honored as prize winners and 175 as holders of medals. While since 1893, when diplomas were first given for repeating the answers to all the questions in the Shorter Catechism at one recitation, 2,169 such diplomas have been issued.

That the Scheme is not perfect its most enthusiastic supporters admit, but it is at least an honest attempt to encourage our young people to a more thorough and systematic study of God's word. That some modification of the Scheme is desirable, your Committee is fully aware, but what these modifications should be depends so much on the support that the Assembly is willing to give it that your Committee hesitate to make definite recommendations. One thing, however, is certain, that if the Assembly's resolution of last year that "the S.S. Committee be recommended to make the department of H.R.I. self-sustaining or abolish it" is intended to mean that the Committee is no longer to solicit aid from the Church through Children's Day Collections or otherwise, but is to make the Scheme depend for its support on fees imposed on Schools participating in its benefits, then by that action the Committee can only understand that the Assembly intends to take the responsibility of saying that the Scheme shall be abolished. Your Committee hesitate to believe that this was the intention of the Assembly.

SYLLABUS FOR 1899.

With regard to the work of the present year, your Committee recommend that in the Biblical Department in all the grades the work be the International S.S. lessons for 1899; that the work in the Doctrinal Department be Dr. Salmond on the Shorter Catechism Questions, 39-81; that the work in the Teacher's Training Course be "A Primer in Christian Evidence," by R. A. Redford, Professor of Systematic Theology and Apologetics, New College, London. and that the Historical and Essay Departments in the meantime be discontinued.

It is also recommended that the Assembly continue to give a diploma to those duly certified as having repeated all the answers to the questions in the Shorter Catechism at one recitation. The names of those thus certified are required to be sent in to Rev. W. Farquharson, Claude, Ont., before April 1st, 1900.

Appended to this report will be found copies of the papers set at the annual examination, as well as a list of the successful candidates.

III.—PUBLICATIONS.

The contract for the publishing of the Assembly's series of class and school registers having expired, the Committee are preparing a carefully revised and simplified form which they hope to have ready in time for the orders for schools next year. There are still a number of copies in stock of the "Sabbath School Manual." This useful handbook should be in the hands of all our teachers.

IV.—FINANCE.

Your Committee have much pleasure in announcing that the floating liability incurred in establishing the "Home Study Lesson Helps" has been paid, and the gentlemen who so kindly assisted in carrying it for the past two years are released from all obligations in connection with it. The net deficit has been reduced from \$2,686.88 to the almost nominal sum of \$21.96. The contributions from Sabbath Schools and individuals amount to \$4,194.37, which is \$547.07 more than last year. A careful analysis of the returns shows that 1,120 schools have responded to our appeals, which is 260 more than last year, and nearly one-half of the total number of schools in the Church. Of these 520 are new contributors, and nearly all of the 260 which did not repeat their last year's donations used the Children's Day Programmes and are in hearty sympathy with the Committee's efforts. The largest contribution came from Bloor Street S.S., Toronto, and amounted to \$115.49, of which \$100 was a special donation for Higher Religious Instruction. The two next largest amounts were from St. James' Square, Toronto (\$54.05), and Central Church S.S., Hamilton (\$45.00). Full financial statements will be found in Appendix I.

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Notwithstanding the explanations given to last Assembly by the Convener in regard to the course pursued by him in connection with the payment of the floating liability of 1897, it came to his knowledge that he was still charged by certain parties with "not keeping faith" with the guarantors, Drs. Robertson, Fletcher and Thompson, and "not doing as he was ordered by the Assembly." He therefore requested your Committee to investigate the matter and either censure or approve as it saw fit. A Sub-Committee was appointed, consisting of Messrs. A. S. Macgregor and Geo. Rutherford with Revs. Dr. M. Fraser, Dr. Abraham, J. Young and R. W. Ross, to whom the Convener submitted his books, and who reported as follows:—

"Your Committee beg to report that they met in Knox Church Session Room in Hamilton on April 5th, and your convener submitted his books for examination.

"They find that the amount of the S.S. Committee's liability in June, 1897, was reported to the Assembly as \$5,528.15, but before the guarantee note was given by Drs. Robertson, Thompson and Fletcher, the amount had been reduced to \$4,209.73 from the proceeds of the 'Children's Day' collections. This was the amount for which these gentlemen became responsible in November, 1897, and the amount was reduced by payments each three months as the renewals matured till in January, 1899, it was fully paid off.

"They find that during the interval between the meeting of Assembly in June, 1897, at Winnipeg, and that in June, 1898, in Montreal, the Committee's liability has been reduced by the sum of \$2,483.01.

"They find that your Convener paid on the liability as the note matured *only the net proceeds* of 'Children's Day' collections (having no other fund to meet the necessary expenses thereof), but they consider he was justified in doing this, though not *expressly* so instructed by the Assembly. The Assembly at Montreal apparently held this view in forming their resolution on this matter.

"They also find that your Convener paid on the liability not only the net receipts from 'Children's Day,' as directed, but also receipts of every kind from Sunday Schools and private individuals, except the payments for Lesson Helps."

This report was unanimously adopted by the Committee, and it is hoped that this statement of facts will satisfy the Assembly and all parties interested that the Committee and its convener have done their utmost to discharge the obligations resting upon them and have acted in the fullest "good faith" throughout.

Your Committee has submitted the Children's Catechism, published by Rev. Geo. S. Carson to a very careful examination and will be prepared to lay a recommendation before the Assembly regarding it.

ADDENDUM.

1. That whereas the General Assembly of 1897 deprived the Sabbath School Committee of the control of the Sabbath School publications which had been inaugurated by them, and, whereas, the Assembly of 1898 intensified that position by appointing a Special Committee to elect and appoint an editor and manager and to take the supervision of the work of publication, which was thereafter accordingly carried out:

Resolved, that this Committee emphatically protest against the further continuance of this extraordinary and unparalled position, and therefore respectfully recommend the General Assembly to restore to them the control of the Sabbath School publications so that their responsibilities over this important branch of the Church's work be no longer impaired.

2. The Sabbath School Committee have heard with deep regret the proposed resignation of Rev. T. F. Fotheringham, Convener of the Committee, and they desire to place on record their highest appreciation of the boundless labors, self-sacrifice, ability and devotion of purpose manifested by him. They call to mind the fact that through his heroic efforts a broad national Canadian and Presbyterian system of Sabbath School helps was inaugurated and placed upon a lasting basis. They feel that the future work of our Church among the young will permanently reflect the foundation laid by our Convener along distinctly Presbyterian and national lines. They would recommend that the Assembly do in some substantial way recognize the faithful services rendered by him.

3. That the contribution of Children's Day be devoted to the prosecution of the work of the Sabbath School Committee and the furthering of the general interests of our Sabbath Schools.

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REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON YOUNG PEOPLE'S SOCIETIES, 1898-99.

To the Venerable the General Assembly :

Your Committee feel the duty of presenting their report to be, this year, one of unusual gravity.

The Church is face to face with an apparent decline of interest in the Young People's Societies, with consequent discouragement.

It is well that the situation should be fairly faced, and the Committee therefore present the information at their disposal from the reports of Presbyteries and Synods under the three heads, Decreases ; Encouragements ; Problems. Attention is called first to :

DECREASES.

As will be observed from the Statistical Table appended, there has been a decrease in the totals in every item except four.

In the total number of members the falling off is serious, viz., 2,954 from a total of 36,721, whilst the number of societies reporting is only 17 less than the preceding year.

The decrease in contributions is not so marked, being indeed, only \$34.00, on a total last year of \$12,861.00 for the Schemes of the Church, and \$407.00 on a total for all purposes of \$29,298.00.

The decreases have been owing, in a number of cases, to the disbanding of societies ; more generally, however, to a falling away in the membership and interest. It is particularly discouraging to observe that there has been even a larger proportionate decrease in the number of young men and boys than of young women and girls.

It is clear from the report that besides the loss in numbers and contributions there has been in many places a disheartening decline of interest on the part of the young people in organizations which were lately full of promise. This is the dark side of the picture.

ENCOURAGEMENTS.

The decreases, whilst general, have not been universal. In some of the Synods indeed, there have been gratifying increases, as will be seen from the following table, (The decreases are marked with a minus sign.)

Notwithstanding the falling off in some places, there is still a strong and solid body of organized young people eager to be of service in the work of the Church and seeking diligently to prepare themselves for even greater usefulness by and by.

It must be patent to all that the working force of the Church has been largely increased during the past few years through the various young people's organizations. A considerable number of their members, of course, had already been enlisted in other forms of effort, such as the Sabbath school, etc., but very many new recruits have been brought into active co-operation in the work of the Church and the Divine Master through young people's societies.

The testimonies from the various Presbyteries as to the spirit and work of the young people are most gratifying. A few are taken almost at random. They fairly represent the whole:

Presbytery of Sydney—"There is one sweet, tender touch in the junior reports, where we are told that the children visit sick children, carrying flowers and delicacies. They are also engaged in preparing Mission boxes. Fain would we hear of more of such beautiful, almost angelic ministries."

Presbytery of Inverness—The contributions to the Schemes of the Church are far ahead of last year.

Presbytery of Halifax—"Whilst a few societies have lost their zeal, throughout the Presbytery in general the interest is well sustained. There is nothing yet in sight that can take the place of the Y.P.S.C.E., with its strict and solemn pledge and pliable organization."

Presbytery of Prince Edward Island—An increase in membership, and about one-half are in full communion with the Church. Of the total number of members, 816 are young men and 1088 are young women, the number of young men being much above the average.

Presbytery of Miranichi—The organization of young people's societies in Mission stations has proved very helpful to people who are deprived of regular sanctuary services.

Presbytery of Montreal—The Presbytery's Committee held a conference with all the Presbyterian societies in the city in order, if possible, to arrive at the causes of discouragement. After discussing the subject from every point of view, it was almost unanimously decided that "although Christian Endeavor is not at present gaining numerically, and whilst perhaps, there has been somewhat of a reflex action, which is inevitable after the young enthusiasm of a new movement has spent itself, we believe that the Christian Endeavor movement is on a solid basis, and is doing as good work as ever before, if not better." Warm and enthusiastic were the words of loyalty expressed towards the movement, especially by the pastors present.

Presbytery of Glengarry—"Steady progress and along the right lines. At first the giving of the societies was of rather a spasmodic character and devoted largely to objects good in themselves, but outside of our own Church work. The reports of the past two years particularly indicate a change in these respects. They show that the giving has become more systematic and that the young people are realizing the relation in which they ought to stand to their own Church's work and see the wisdom of sending their contributions to Missions through the regular channels of their own Church."

Presbytery of Ottawa—The young people have given away more than six-sevenths of their entire contributions.

Presbytery of Lanark and Renfrew—In the very front rank as to the givings to Home Missions. The Presbytery has fostered its societies carefully. One thousand nine hundred and ninety dollars has been contributed for home, foreign and evangelization work, an increase of \$309 over last year.

Presbytery of Kingston—“It is pleasing to observe that the growth this year is largely due to the ingathering of young men.”

Presbytery of Peterborough—Gratifying increase both as to membership and contributions. Nearly all the societies have adopted the General Assembly's Plan of Study.

Presbytery of Toronto—The Presbyterian Young People's Union has done much in the way of fostering the societies. The three district conventions at as many separate points outside the city have been enthusiastic gatherings.

Presbytery of Orangeville—“One minister reports that when he first took charge of the field there was no Endeavor society, no prayer meeting, hardly any one could be induced to take part in prayer, and the whole burden rested on the pastor. Now it is different. The young people are enthusiastic and are willing to take part in prayer or whatever they are called upon to do in order to make the meeting a success. If this can be done in one society, why not in more?”

Presbytery of Barrie—Decrease in membership, increase in the total contributions for the Schemes of \$108, and for all purposes of \$129. Three hundred dollars have been raised for Home Missions.

Presbytery of Hamilton—The report offers an explanation for the marked falling off in membership and in givings.

Presbytery of Sarnia—Six new societies. Some societies disbanded; but, “the disbanding of a society is not a proof of mistaken policy in organizing it, but that the energies of the young people are finding some other channel.”

Presbytery of Winnipeg—The work amongst the young people seems to have gone steadily, if quietly, forward during the past year. “The givings show a very gratifying increase, as they amount to \$871 for all purposes, as against \$304, the preceding year. The total givings for the Schemes of the Church have increased from \$144 to \$296.”

Presbytery of Portage La Prairie—In the recommendation adopted, the Presbytery “gives unqualified approval of young people's societies for spiritual culture and practical work, and would heartily encourage the formation of one in every congregation and Mission station within the bounds, either on the exact lines of the Y. P. S. C. E. constitution or with such changes or omissions as Sessions may deem for edification.”

Presbytery of Westminster—“The outside work is a special feature of the societies, and one to be warmly commended. No less than six of the Endeavor societies are engaged in the Chinese and Japanese Mission schools, on which they have expended the sum of \$60. This is an indication of the foreign Mission spirit, with the right ring about it. In addition, they do hospital visiting, and charitable work among the families of the poor, send literature to logging camps and such like.”

PROBLEMS.

1. The standing problem, which was with us before the recent phenomenal multiplication of young people's societies began, and is with us still, viz., how the young people are to be fully enlisted in the cause of Christ and the Church, and in a practical way.
2. The adaptation of the forms of organization and methods of work to actual conditions, as these have become evident by experience.
3. How to "strengthen the things that remain" in societies that, from whatever cause, have been discouraged.
4. How, especially to interest the boys and young men in [the Church and its great enterprises.

On the latter point some of the Presbytery reports speak. For example, the Convener of the Winnipeg Presbytery's Committee says: "After studying the matter for some years past, I am convinced that the weak point in the great work of reaching the young and saving them for actual Christian service lies, not so much in an indisposition for such a life on the part of the young themselves, as in the failure of the older people to take a proper interest in this the greatest department of the Church's work. The weakest point is undoubtedly the home." The Convener of the London Presbytery's Committee says: "Where a society has something to live for, something to do, worthy of young men and women, it thrives. The societies which are doing most work for Missions—these we find living societies." The Presbytery of Sydney: "We suspect the cause of failure to reach the young men to be not in the constitution but in the conduct of the meetings. Young men admire strength and if there is a lack of virility, the effort to win them will fail."

But does not the solution of the question really lie a little further back? In many congregations there are Mission Bands connected with the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society. The young girls are thoroughly trained to an interest in Missions and carry this same interest with them into womanhood. If, in some way, whether through the Sabbath school, or junior organizations of some sort, the boys of from ten to fourteen or fifteen years of age could be interested in the great work of Missions which our Lord and Master has given to the Church as its very reason for existence, would not the problem of the young men be on a fair way to its solution? Boys of the age mentioned will take up almost anything that is put before them by those they trust, and the interest in it will remain when they have grown older. The cadet corps may be relied upon to train recruits.

Whatever the details of the solution of the problem may be, these two things, at any rate, should be clearly realized by the Church: First, the vital importance of holding the young men, as they grow up, in close connection with the Church's activities; and second, the need of earnest and general practical effort to this end.

ADDITIONAL MATTERS :—JUNIOR ORGANIZATION.

A comparatively small number of junior organizations are reported, but many of these are, under wise and enthusiastic leadership, doing capital work.

PLAN OF STUDY.

As instructed by the last General Assembly the Plan of Study has been continued on the same general basis as heretofore, viz., a question each week from the Shorter Catechism and special topics on the polity, history and work of our Church, as follows:

FOR WEEK BEGINNING

January	8—Our Missions on the Pacific Slope.
February	12—The Marks of a Good Hymn, with illustrations from the Book of Praise.
March	12—Our Work in the West Indies.
April	9—Presbyterianism in Ireland; its origin, struggles, characteristics, influence.
May	14—Church Membership; definition, privileges, duties.
June	11—Thomas Chalmers and his times.
July	9—The Work of our Woman's Missionary Societies.
August	13—A Great Scottish Hymn Writer, Horatius Bonar, and his Hymns in the Book of Praise.
September	10—Our Own Society; the deepening of its life, the strengthening of its work.
October	8—What our College Students do for Home Missions.
November	12—Duff and Missions in India.
December	10—Our Own Church; the Old Century and the New.

The total number of societies reported as having adopted the Plan of Study is 372, an increase of 23 over last year.

In this connection it should be stated that the articles in the *Record* are being continued for the present year, and, in addition, a series of articles suitable for children has been published in the *Children's Record*, it is trusted, with advantage.

Thanks are due to the various writers who, at the request of the Convener, have contributed the articles above mentioned, and the Committee feel under special obligation to the Rev. James Bonar, of Greenock, Scotland, for his valuable paper on his uncle, the late Dr. Horatius Bonar, and his hymns, which is to appear in the July *Record*.

Y.P.S.C.E. TOPIC CARDS AND BOOKLETS.

The publication of the Y.P.S.C.E. topic cards and booklets for the year embracing the Plan of Study was undertaken by the Convener at the request of the Committee.

The total number of topic cards sold up to the 25th of May is 12,178, and of booklets 15,527, a total of 27,705, being a considerable advance on previous years, and showing an increase of interest in this effort to lead the young people to a closer study of the doctrine, history, polity, and work of their own Church.

STATISTICS.

The statistical table appended is in most cases fairly complete. It includes, however, only summaries. Valuable details for each society are found in the tables of the General Assembly's Committee on Statistics. Should any readjustment of these tables be made it is extremely desirable, in view of the dimensions which the young people's organizations have attained, and their importance to the future welfare of the Church, that at least a column for the number of members and a column for contributions to the Schemes of the Church should be allowed them.

EXPENSES.

As last year, by instruction of the General Assembly, the necessary expenses of the Committee have been met by a percentage upon the contributions of the young people's societies to the Schemes of the Church. These expenses include printing of schedules for reports, circulars, postage, literature furnished student missionaries for the organization of new societies, clerical assistance, etc.

CONVENERSHIP.

The Convener of your Committee, finding that his other duties occupy him fully, is constrained to ask the Assembly to be relieved of the Convenership, which, through their kindness, he has held for the past four years. In making this request he would bear testimony to the cordial and effective co-operation of Conveners of Synod and Presbytery Committees, of the officers of Presbyterian Societies and of many throughout the Church both of the older and younger people who have not been officially connected with this work, but have assisted by counsel and encouragement. The young people may rest assured that there is deep and genuine sympathy with them and with the work of their organizations. The Church feels, and very properly, that her future prosperity depends very largely on enthusiasm for the Lord's work on the part of her young people, and the practical forms which that enthusiasm may take.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

The Committee respectfully offer the following recommendations for adoption by the General Assembly.

1. The General Assembly would express its hearty sympathy with the young people in their efforts to advance their own spiritual life, to win their companions to the service of the Heavenly Lord and Master and generally to forward the work of Christ and His Church. The Assembly recognizes the important results which have already accrued from the young people's organizations, and looks forward hopefully to still greater fruits in the years to come.

2. The General Assembly would repeat the commendation given by previous Assemblies to the Plan of Study in its general features, and, in view of the demand from several quarters for a more systematic study of the Scriptures in the young people's meetings, would suggest to the Committee to consider whether this may not be arranged for in the Plan of Study, in addition to the ground already covered by it.

3. That ministers, Sessions and young people's societies be again reminded of the urgent need of seeking to bring the young men into the membership of the societies and an active interest in the work of the Church; and also of providing for some systematic instruction of the children in the great Missionary enterprises; and that the General Assembly's Committee consider and propose to the Church such means as may seem fitted to forward these desirable ends.

4. The General Assembly would gratefully acknowledge the large amount of useful, practical work within the congregations done by the young people, and their considerable contributions towards religious and benevolent objects, and would express the hope that in the allotment of their monies, the Schemes of the Church shall be given the first place.

THE "RECORDS" AND S. S. HELPS FOR 1898.

In the circulation of the *Presbyterian Record* there has been little change from the previous year. The congregations in the older provinces, that are its chief constituency, are in many cases not increasing, while in the new and growing sections, made up in some measure of strangers, there is not yet the interest in the history, traditions, or work of our Church, which creates a demand for her literature. The ever increasing number of newspapers and magazines, home and foreign, has also its effect in limiting the circulation. It cannot be too strongly emphasized that the *Record* is the medium established by the Church for the express purpose of bringing her work before her membership. That it may fulfil its purpose two things are necessary and are earnestly requested.

(1) That missionaries, home and foreign, also conveners and secretaries, (all who have charge of, and are familiar with, the different lines of Church work) should use this medium to let the Church see and know that work, otherwise the *Record* must fail of its purpose, and the work must, in some measure, suffer loss.

(2) Whatever other publications may be taken there should be earnest effort on the part of ministers and people to have the *Record* in every home.

With the beginning of 1899 a colored cover has been added, increasing the reading matter by four pages, and the annual cost by nearly a thousand dollars; while the new postal law will make an additional item of some four hundred dollars to the yearly expenditure.

From the *Record* and *Children's Record* the Committee has voted \$4000 to the funds of the Church; \$3000 to the West, divided equally between the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund and that of the Widows' and Orphans; and \$1000 to the East, to the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund. The Widows' and Orphans' Fund, East, being a mutual insurance scheme, is supported by its own membership.

THE CHILDREN'S RECORD.

The *Children's Record* has also continued about the same as in 1897. In its sphere, more than in that of the *Record*, is felt the effect of competition. The influx from the South, of papers for the young, is increasing and persistent, and the demand of our Sabbath schools for weekly publications, which many of these periodicals supply, interferes in some measure with a monthly such as the *Children's Record*.

For such papers, in so far as they have supplied a need, we should be thankful, but history and story, learned through their medium, are often not fitted to build up the best and most loyal British and Canadian citizenship; and the more fully the needs of our young people can be supplied at home, the better for our Church and Country.

In accordance with permission given by the General Assembly of 1897, steps were taken to try and meet in larger measure the needs of our young people by the publication of an additional paper, somewhat after the style of the *Children's Record*. Towards the end of 1898 was issued the *Youth's Record* for Jan., 1899. But as subscriptions began to come in it was found that about three-fourths of them were substitutes for the *Children's Record*. It was not desirable to build up one paper at the expense of another, and *Youth's Record* was discontinued.

The best method of meeting the need would be a graded series of papers, Presbyterian and Canadian, in connection with the S. S. Helps. These might be made a powerful factor in moulding national and religious sentiment, and if properly conducted and managed should be a financial success.

S. S. LESSON HELPS.

These have been issued from the office of the *Record* during the year, and with some measure of success, the total circulation of the various publications increasing about twenty-five per cent.—from about sixty thousand in 1897 to seventy-five thousand in 1898. After paying all expenditures there remains to the credit of the Sabbath School Publications a balance of one thousand dollars, which your Committee has agreed to transfer to the Committee now in charge of the publication of these Helps.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SABBATH SCHOOL PUBLICATIONS.

To the Venerable the General Assembly :

The Committee appointed by the last General Assembly "to select and appoint an Editor and Manager of Sabbath School Publications, and to take the supervision of the work" beg to report that they met on July 15th, and by a unanimous vote appointed as

EDITOR AND BUSINESS MANAGER

the Rev. R. Douglas Fraser, M.A., formerly of Bowmanville, Ont., the appointment to date from August 1st.

The appointment, which was accepted by Mr. Fraser, appears to have given general satisfaction, and Presbyteries and Synods throughout the Church have heartily commended the publications to the continued confidence of our people.

PUBLICATIONS.

As instructed by the General Assembly, the Home Study Series of Lesson Helps has been issued as follows :—

- THE TEACHER'S MONTHLY, for Teachers and Bible Classes ;
- THE HOME STUDY QUARTERLY, for Junior and Senior Scholars, and the Home Department ;
- THE PRIMARY QUARTERLY, for the Little Ones ;
- THE HOME STUDY LEAFLET, and
- THE PRIMARY LEAFLET ; corresponding to the Quarterlies.

The thanks of the Committee are due and are hereby given to a number of ministers and Sabbath School teachers, who have contributed valuable matter to the pages of the Publications and thus materially aided the Editor in his work.

CIRCULATION.

The circulation continues to grow. It is at date 93,969, an increase of 18,900 from last year. This is most gratifying ; but there is room for still further increase, and the Committee confidently look for the hearty co-operation of all concerned, in order that the expressed desire of the General Assembly may be realized, and our own Lesson Helps be found in all our Sabbath Schools, and in the homes where the Sabbath School Lessons are followed from week to week.

FINANCE.

The receipts for 1898 went to the Committee on the *Presbyterian Record*, who had charge of the Publications for that year.

The present Committee's revenue began with the orders for 1899, and, as the appointment of the Editor and Manager dated from August 1st, 1898, it was necessary that seventeen months' outlay should be met by twelve months' income.

This will be done, and with a balance on the right side. The utmost economy has been exercised, and it was only after fully satisfying themselves, by a minute and careful estimate of receipts and expenditures, that the publications are on a self-supporting basis, that the Committee arranged, as they did at the beginning of May, for permanent offices for the carrying on of the business.

As only four and one-half months of the year have elapsed, it is not possible to give a financial statement in detail at present. Hereafter an audited statement will be submitted to the General Assembly each year.

OTHER SABBATH SCHOOL SUPPLIES.

A large number of orders have been received for Catechisms, Class Registers, Illustrated Papers, Colored Picture Cards and Rolls, etc. These have been promptly filled and at a profit. Sabbath Schools are advised that *all requisites for their Schools or for the Home Department*, whether published by this Committee or elsewhere, may be ordered from the BUSINESS MANAGER, CONFEDERATION LIFE BUILDING, TORONTO.

In order to meet the large demand for it, the Committee have published an edition of the Shorter Catechism, without proofs, which is now on sale. An edition, with proofs, will be ready soon.

It is hoped, also, that arrangements may be made whereby they may be able to furnish a suitable series of Class Registers, etc., for the schools, bearing the imprimatur of the General Assembly.

Very many inquiries have been made, and from various quarters of the field, for weekly illustrated papers published by our own Church. The supply comes now entirely from the United States. The Committee propose issuing a weekly illustrated paper for Primary Classes, to begin with January, 1900. This will involve additional expense; but if the schools respond generally to this effort to provide attractive reading matter of our own for the very little ones, the paper should be self-supporting even from the beginning.

Both the initial expenses and the cost of carrying it on successfully would be much greater in the case of a similar paper for more advanced scholars. On this account, and because the ground is already in part occupied by the *Children's Record*, the Committee have not reached any conclusion as to undertaking such publication. If it is to be undertaken, and, indeed, if there is to be any increase of our present financial responsibilities, it is extremely desirable that the Committee should be provided with a working balance, to be drawn upon in case the need should arise.

REPORT OF HYMNAL COMMITTEE, 1898-99.

The Hymnal Committee beg to report that during the past year the whole number of copies of the Book of Praise sold by the Oxford Press, and for which royalty was paid, was 60,621. The following is a list of the copies sold :—

The royalty received was \$1,569.83. From this amount and a balance remaining in the Treasurer's hands last year, the sum of \$1,800 has been placed in the hands of the Agent of the Church. Of this sum the Committee recommend that \$1,200 be devoted to the ordinary Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund, and \$600 to the Widows' and Orphans' Fund.

The Committee further recommend that in future the funds placed by the Committee in the hands of the Agent of the Church should be devoted to the same objects and in the same proportion as recommended for the present year; and also that they be used at once without waiting further sanction by the Assembly.

During the past year a booklet has been prepared under the direction of the Music Committee for the purpose of indicating the speed at which the tunes in the Book of Praise should be sung. This booklet is the result of a careful examination by the Music Committee of the views of the masters of music, and in keeping with the structure of the tunes and the character of the words in the Book of Praise. It is intended to furnish a copy of this help to the service of song to each congregation or choir of our Church.

The Committee are unable to report any progress made during the past year by the joint Committee appointed to prepare a new revised metrical version of the Book of Psalms.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE FORM OF PERMANENT RECORDS OF CHURCH COURTS.

To the Venerable the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada,

The Committee on the Form of Permanent Records of Church Courts beg leave to report as follows :—

The action of the General Assembly of last year appointing this Committee, as set forth on page 54 of the printed minutes, may here be recited :—

"The Committee on the Record of the General Assembly having brought before the Court the question whether it is necessary to have the manuscript records of the Assembly and of the several Synods brought to the Assembly for review, and whether it would not suffice to have a properly attested printed copy of the same presented, it was moved by Dr. Sedgwick, seconded by Principal Caven, and agreed to : That it be remitted to a committee to enquire and report to the next Assembly, whether it is necessary in the case of the Synods and the General Assembly, whose Records are printed, that these Records should also be engrossed, and whether some method may not be devised whereby the printed Record, duly authenticated, may not be regarded as the Record of the said Synods and General Assembly."

The Committee have carefully considered the matter remitted to them, and would recommend as follows :—

1. That the engrossing of the Record of the General Assembly be henceforth discontinued.
2. That a special copy of the Record of each General Assembly be printed, and that this copy, duly authenticated as heretofore, be regarded as the permanent and official Record of that Assembly.
3. That this special copy of the Assembly Record be printed upon paper of superior quality, and of foolscap, post or demy size, as may seem best to the Assembly clerks ; but the size chosen in the first instance shall not in after years be departed from.
4. That these Records be bound together from time to time as may be found necessary.
5. That liberty be given to Synods to adopt *mutatis mutandis*, the foregoing regulations.

The Committee are assured that these recommendations, if adopted, will give, *in law*, a Record of the General Assembly and of the Synods of the Church as valid in every way as the present engrossed Records of these Courts, and, they are persuaded, will give as great, if not greater, security for their preservation as the method presently employed.

They can assure the Assembly, too, that the printed Record, which they propose as a substitute, can be produced at very little expense.

It is hardly necessary to point out the saving of time and labor which the proposed change will bring to the Assembly and Synod clerks, and the increased facility with which the Records of the Assembly and of the several Synods can be reviewed and consulted.

It may be interesting to the Assembly to know that the changes herein recommended have, in substance, been adopted for many years by the Presbyterian Church of the United States of America.

A specimen minute is appended to this Report.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON LEGISLATION.

To the Venerable the General Assembly:—

At the meeting of the General Assembly, in 1898, the Committee on Legislation appointed the preceding year was, with the addition of Rev. Dr. Morrison and Judge Forbes, reappointed, and instructed to obtain from the Legislatures of the various provinces and the Parliament of Canada, an Act respecting the Property of the Church, in terms of the draft bill which had been prepared, with such modifications as they might deem expedient. The Moderator of the Assembly was also instructed and authorized to sign in the name and on behalf of the Church, any petitions which might be required to be presented to the various Legislatures and the Parliament of Canada. The trustees under the proposed Act of Incorporation were also appointed by the General Assembly.

The Committee on Legislation consists of Hon. Mr. Justice MacLennan, Judge Forbes, Messrs. Wm. Mortimer Clark, Q.C., Adam R. Creelman, Q.C., Hamilton Cassels and Rev. Dr. P. M. Morrison, Rev. Professor McLaren, Rev. Dr. Robt. Campbell, Rev. Dr. Moore and Rev. Dr. Warden.

The Committee have held several meetings, and the draft bill which had been already submitted to those most largely interested in the matter and approved, was subjected to further revision to meet possible cases brought under the notice of the Committee. While the bill was under consideration, the Committee received a communication from the Synod of the Maritime Provinces to the effect that that section of the Church was not prepared to accept a General Board, and that it would seek incorporation for a Board to hold the funds in its possession as a consolidated fund, in which each of the schemes would hold an interest in proportion to its capital.

In view of this action of the Synod, the Committee have thought it best to delay further proceedings, and to refer the matter to the Assembly for further instruction.

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AIDS FOR SOCIAL WORSHIP—REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE.

In 1898 the General Assembly upon motion of the Rev. Dr. Laing, in connection with his report on Uniformity of Worship, resolved to appoint a Special Committee "to consult with Sir Sanford Fleming, regarding a Manual entitled 'Short Sunday Services for Travellers' and to aid in revising it, if that be deemed desirable, also to send a copy to all ministers of the Church for their information, and to report to next Assembly. Anything done by this Committee is not to be held as in any way committing the Assembly thereto."

The Moderator subsequently named a committee, which does not appear in the minutes, but composed of the following gentlemen:—Rev. Dr. Moore, Convener, Ottawa, Rev. Dr. Pollok, Rev. Dr. Gordon, and Rev. Robert Murray, Halifax, Rev. Dr. Armstrong, Dr. John Thorburn and Sir Sanford Fleming, Ottawa.

This Special Committee beg leave to report that as soon as practicable the members of the Committee resident in Ottawa, met with Sir Sanford Fleming, and had repeated consultation with him regarding the Manual named in the Assembly's minute, namely, "Short Sunday Services for Travellers."

After much careful consideration, and correspondence with the members resident in Halifax, it was resolved to prepare a brief Manual entitled "Aids for Social Worship."

The aim of the Committee and the purpose to be served by the Manual are plainly set out on the title page, namely, to provide short services of prayer and praise for the use of Christians upon the Lord's day when they are at a distance from regular Church services.

An edition of fifteen hundred copies was printed and distributed to the ministers and elders of the Church. Along with the Manual there was sent a circular letter with a view generally to obtain the opinion of the Church as to its suitability for the purpose designed, and more particularly to elicit information as to whether one complete service with other material which might be used to give variety according to the taste and judgment of the reader, or a few services, each complete in itself would, on the whole, be considered preferable.

Up to this date, May 27th, only twenty-five replies have been received, three of which came from elders.

Of those who answer, five are opposed to the use of such a Manual. The remaining twenty warmly approve, while two of those opposed to the use of such a book in worship speak highly of the quality of the prayers. General approval of the form given by the Committee is expressed by all who favor the use of the book, except three who prefer five or more complete services for both morning and evening.

Several of those heard from, while generally approving, suggest slight emendations in detail, and nearly half of the whole who have sent replies express a wish to have a burial service added, for the reason that in out-lying portions of the country funerals have frequently to be conducted in the absence of a minister.

The Committee, having fully considered the facts and circumstances, beg leave respectfully to recommend as follows:

1. Seeing that the draft of proposed Aids for Social Worship has been placed in the hands of every minister and many of the elders of the Church, that it has been received with favor, and that few objections have been raised to its form and substance, the Committee be now instructed to submit the Manual to Presbyteries, and that Presbyteries be requested to express their views to the Committee not later than February 15, 1900, and that the Committee report to next General Assembly.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STATISTICAL FORMS.

To the Venerable the General Assembly:—

As the result of several conferences on the part of your Committee, wide correspondence with experienced representatives of most of the evangelical Churches in Canada, the United States and Great Britain, and the preparation of draft Schedules which were mailed to all the Presbyteries of our Church last December, your Committee feel now warranted in presenting their final report. It may be stated that the revised Statistical Forms, herewith annexed, embody the fruit of three years of diligent inquiry and thoughtful sifting of the information secured,—first, for twelve months, under the Convener'ship of Rev. R. Douglas Fraser, M.A., and latterly, for two years, under the direction of the present Convener.

The pains devoted to collecting statistics, and the Schedules which have been employed to tabulate these returns during the past twenty-four years, have put our Church under a debt of profoundest obligation to Rev. Dr. Torrance, who in this work, for almost a generation, has placed at the disposal of his brethren the benefit of his experience, patience and indefatigable toil. But, while joining most heartily in this expression of deserved appreciation, your Committee believe that something may now be done,—in the way of classification, compression and comprehensiveness,—that would not only mark an advance upon our present useful system, but which would effect a great saving as regards the cost of printing and the labor of compilation. Your Committee, accordingly, submit for adoption the accompanying Schedules, and hope that they may meet with the approval of the Supreme Court of our Church.

Of the Presbyteries to which, in terms of the instructions of the General Assembly (minutes, 1898, p. 65), the draft Schedules were sent down for examination and report, 45 (out of a total of 54) have forwarded their findings in response to the request of your Committee. This result cannot be interpreted otherwise than as showing that a wide-spread interest is taken in the endeavor which is now being made to secure the best possible Statistical Forms which thought and experience can devise. Moreover, an analysis of the vote brings out some valuable particulars. Only one Presbytery declares itself to be opposed to your Committee's new Schedules: it states that it "could not recommend the changes proposed: the present system is entirely satisfactory." Twenty-one Presbyteries express approval *simpliciter*. Nine Presbyteries express approval, coupled with recommendations looking in the direction of yet further changes. Nine Presbyteries express hearty approval, either with or without suggestions of additional alterations. Five Presbyteries report that, for varying reasons, they arrived at no finding. Nine Presbyteries have not been heard from. And it should be added that, of the foregoing Presbyteries, two (*viz.* Truro and Owen Sound) deserve special commendation, inasmuch as they offered suggestions which revealed a careful consideration of the whole subject, and which have furnished material assistance to your Committee in framing this Report.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

1. That the Statistical Forms A to I inclusive, which have been sent down to the Presbyteries for examination and review,—and, in addition, Forms J and K,* as shown herewith,—be formally approved and adopted by this General Assembly.

* Form J ought properly to come after Form A, and Form K should immediately precede Form I. But, as the present naming of the Forms has become widely known through the Church, it has been deemed wiser not to alter their order and designation in the meantime.

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Toronto,

2. That these Statistical Forms as a whole, eleven in number, herewith annexed, be substituted for those which have hitherto been in use; and that they be employed, for the first time, in tabulating the statistics of the year 1900.

3. That the Clerks of Presbytery, when filling up Form A, shall insert the names of theological Professors, Church Agents, Missionary and other Secretaries, and Ministers-without-charge,—together with date of ordination in each case, stipend or salary, and (in the case of the three classes first named) date of undertaking the duties of their present office.

4. That all returns from Congregations, Mission Stations, etc., shall be made in duplicate, viz., one copy for the Presbytery, and one copy to be retained by the Congregation, Mission Station, etc., that has prepared it. And when a Clerk of Presbytery, in answer to repeated inquiries, receives no return from a Congregation, Mission Station, etc., he shall fill up his report out of the return of the preceding year,—with a note to that effect. Clerks of Presbytery, further, upon completing their Presbytery return, shall immediately forward a copy of it to the Church Offices.

5. That a Committee be appointed annually,—as heretofore, but consisting of not more than half a dozen members,—to collect, compile, complete, compute necessary summations for Synods and Presbyteries (see minutes, 1898, p. 484 ff), and prepare for the General Assembly's Blue Book all such statistics as these new Schedules call for. To this Committee the Assembly's Clerks, all Clerks of Presbyteries, Church Agents, Missionary and other Secretaries, etc., shall send such returns as they are now to be asked to obtain and tabulate; and this is to be done not later than March 31st in each year. This Committee shall be expected, moreover, to make suitable recommendations from time to time, either as regards further improvement in the form of the Schedules, or as touching any other kindred matter to which it may seem wise that the attention of the General Assembly should be drawn.

6. That, since difficulties confront such a reform, the desire of your Committee to make the close of the calendar year (December 31st) and the close of the ecclesiastical year (March 31st, immediately following) synchronize, be not resolutely pressed at the present time. Nevertheless your Committee feel constrained to point out that the financial statements in Form A and Form B can never be made to agree, and so serve as mutual checks and correctives, until this easy and very reasonable change be authorized and effected. And the same lack of agreement presents itself in enumerations other than financial. It is scarcely congruous that the information which is to be laboriously collected and tabulated should in several cases, as will be observed, represent periods which lie between different termini. Hence your Committee recommend that (in view of numerous advantages which would be secured by making the ecclesiastical year terminate in every instance on December 31st), it be ordered by this Assembly that that change be inaugurated with the beginning of the year 1900, and that it be ordered meanwhile that "all monies which reach the Church Agents (East or West) by February 28th, 1900, accompanied by an intimation that they are to be credited to the year 1899, shall be entered among the receipts of that year at the Church Offices." [See draft blank, herewith attached and entitled "Proposed blank STATISTICAL RETURN, to be issued by Clerks of Presbyteries."]

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REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON STATISTICS FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31st DECEMBER, 1898.

*To the Venerable the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, met in
Hamilton, June, 1899 :*

Your Committee would begin their report, and they think it proper that the facts about to be mentioned should have the prominence of an early statement, by expressing the inconvenience to which they have been put in consequence of the lateness of the returns received from two Presbyteries, namely Minnedosa and Kamloops. From correspondence with the present Clerk of the former they are led to suppose, although there is no satisfactory authority, that a report was forwarded, but it did not reach the Convener, and it would appear that no papers have been left by his predecessor in office from which he could compile a second copy. With regard to the latter, no reply was received to any communication that was sent to the Clerk whose name is given in the Rolls of Presbyteries as printed in the Assembly's Record for last year, till the 11th of May, nearly a fortnight after this report should have been in the hands of the printer. The usual blank sheet was mailed to him at the same time they were mailed to other Clerks. Application was made more than once for its return properly filled. Other communications were addressed to him. But to none of these had any reply come, nor had any of them come back from the Dead Letter Office. It was surmised that a change in the Clerkship of the Presbytery had been made, but even, if so, it is strange that instructions were not left by him with his postmaster as to the disposal of any documents that might come to his address. The Committee had resolved to reprint the returns for the preceding year; although well aware that this would not be satisfactory, because not giving the present state of the congregations in their bounds, nor the opportunity of ascertaining what progress has been made. And not only the congregations and Presbyteries immediately concerned would be affected, but so would the Church at large; and the results of the fault or failure referred to would be permanent, being handed down in the printed report of the Assembly. However, the sheets at last came to hand, they appear in their proper place, and the results are embodied in this general report, although entailing no small amount of labor for the compiler.

In this connection it may be stated that the report from the Presbytery of St. JOHN did not come to hand for much more than a month after the date when it, in common with others, was expected, namely, in the early part of March. Correspondence with the Clerk elicited the fact that he had mailed it in the beginning of April, so that it evidently had miscarried in the Post-office. But on being informed of this, the Clerk, with praiseworthy promptitude and trouble, prepared and forwarded another copy, which arrived just in time to be despatched with those from other Presbyteries to the printer.

Another point which may be mentioned, and it is hoped it will receive the attention of the congregations and Presbyteries, is "Delayed Returns." Some such appear every year, and there should be none any year. As the congregational year closes with the 31st December, and as the schedules issued show in their introduction or heading, the report of the congregation or station is for the year closing with that date, there should be no difficulty in having the return in the hands of the Presbytery Clerk early in February, as requested, nor for the Presbytery Clerk to have his in the hands of the Committee in the beginning of March. But Sessions and Boards of Management, in many instances, delay till after the date for the Presbytery Clerk to make his report, and if he is not at the trouble, which there is no reason to call upon him to take, of adding to and altering the entries he has made, they appear as "Delayed Returns." Instances have occurred in which such returns have reached the Clerk, and been sent on by him to the Committee, and reached them, before the Presbytery sheet, the explanation, it is presumed, lying in the fact that the one was sent in a sealed envelope and was thus forwarded by the mail with the despatch due to a letter, and the Presbytery document was not so treated.

While on this subject your Committee would remind the Assembly that last year they called attention to the fact that one of the largest congregations in the City of Montreal had not sent in its report to the Clerk of the Presbytery in time to be engrossed in the sheet he had to prepare for the Assembly, and the injustice done in more quarters than one by this omission or neglect. This year the same congregation was chargeable with the same thing.

The Committee, however, were at the trouble of embodying the returns, and making all the alterations necessary. It is respectfully submitted that such a burden should not be imposed upon them. All returns should be promptly and faithfully made. A delay of even a few hours, or, as is known, of even a few minutes, will do injustice to a Presbytery, may lead to think that the Clerk has not been sufficiently urgent in his duties, and must entail a greater or less amount of unnecessary labor upon the compiler of the Report for the Assembly.

One of the instructions of the Committee to the Presbytery Clerks is that all the columns in both the Statistical and Financial departments should be correctly filled and added. In not a few instances both these instructions are violated—columns are not correctly filled nor correctly added. In illustration, it may be mentioned, that in the report from one large Presbytery, several entries which should have been made in column 6 of Finances were omitted, but the Committee had no difficulty in filling them in, because made up of the items in columns 2, 4, and 5; and the result was that the total contributions for strictly congregational purposes in the bounds were less by upwards of twelve thousand dollars than they should have been. It is supposed that the entries which should have appeared in column 6 were made in column 7, but your Committee did not interfere with these. And a remark may be added, that while the Committees' additions and corrections made the total expenditure for congregational purposes more than twelve thousand dollars more than of the Clerk's entries as in the sheet, the expenditure for all purposes was reduced by more than five thousand dollars—making a discrepancy between the reported and the corrected of upwards of seventeen thousand dollars. It is not without reason that the request is made for accuracy in entering and in adding. From the occurrence of such errors, and there are many of them, although the case referred to is an aggravated and exceptional one, there is ground for thinking that Clerks do not read the instructions printed on each sheet. If they did, and acted upon them, such mistakes would be impossible.

Your Committee need not refer to the importance of the Report which it has been their province to prepare and now submit. It may be said to cover the whole field of the Church's operations. It brings up, not in detail, like those concerned with special departments, such as Home Missions and Foreign Missions, but in a very concise and suggestive form, an account of what God has been doing in the Dominion of Canada, and to some extent elsewhere, by the action of the Church represented in this Assembly in the progressive carrying out of that great purpose of grace which He formed in Christ Jesus before the world began, which is to have its gradual unfolding in the ages of time, and its full development in the endlessness of the approaching eternity. Every agency connected with it should acknowledge His authority and grace in His Redeeming character. Every act should be performed with an eye to his glory in Christ. And every one should regard it as a matter of Christian obligation, privilege and honor, to do with all good fidelity and as unto the Lord, whatever service he is called upon to render, and by which he can make himself useful to any extent in working in the vineyard.

As in years past, Your Committee now proceed to present the state of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, as learned from the reports received from all parts of the Dominion, and to compare it with the year immediately preceding, so that its relative standing may be ascertained, and those lessons gathered which the figures teach.

STATISTICS.

SYNOD OF THE MARITIME PROVINCES.

Beginning, as it appears natural, with the East, and taking the Presbyteries in the Synod of the Maritime Provinces in the order previously followed, there is first:

TRURO, which has 64 Churches and stations supplied as pastoral charges, a decrease of 3 on the foregoing year. In these there are 16,710 sittings, an increase of 494, with a total number of families of 2,670, an increase of 292; with 459 single persons, 119 of a decrease, and 5,416 communicants, a decrease of 101. During the year there were added 158 on their own profession, 47 of an increase, and 92 on certificate, 41 of a decrease. The removals were—by death 83, a decrease of 25, by certificate 112, an increase of 111; without certificate 60, an increase of 28; and by discipline 2, the same as in the former year. Baptism was administered to 281 persons, an increase of 47, of whom 243 were infants, increase 30, and 38 adults, increase 17. In the Eldership there was an increase of 9, making the number 189, and in other office bearers a decrease of 5, the number being reduced to 211.

There was a falling off of 47 in the number attending weekly prayer meetings, 2,445; of 218 in those in Sabbath-school and Bible-class, 4,127, and of 8 in those engaged in Sabbath-school work, making the number 512. There was an increase of 1 in Missionary Associations—whole number 10; no change in the number of Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies, 31; with an increase of 2 on the former, 51 Home Mission, Christian Endeavor, and Young Peoples' Societies connected with the congregations, with a membership of 1684; a decrease of 243. Manses, 20, had increased in number by 1. In each of the years 1 church was built.

SYDNEY.—In this Presbytery there was the same number, 41, of Churches and connected stations in both years, but there was a decrease of 450 in the accommodation for worshippers provided in these, namely, 14,178, of 14 in the number of single persons, 100; but an increase of 20, in families, 2,559; and of 103 in communicants, 2,736.

There were decreases in the additions both on profession and by certificate, 306 of the former, the whole number being 192; and 21 of the latter, making the number 35. The entire number of removals was 51, and of these 15 were by death, 39; the same number without certificate, 29; while there was an increase of 17 in those removed without certificate, 78, and of 4 in those removed by discipline, 4.

Baptism was administered to 297 infants, a decrease of 16, and to 13 adults, a decrease of 36. The Eldership was filled by 146, a decrease of 9; other office-bearers numbered 162, a decrease of 24; weekly prayer meetings were attended by 2,060, a decrease of 332; and Sabbath school and Bible class, by 2,758, a decrease of 317, while those engaged in Sabbath school work had fallen off from 269 to 230.

Missionary Associations were 3, an increase of 1; Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies 6, a decrease of 2; Christian Endeavor Societies 9, show an increase of 1, with an increase of 17 in the membership, 562. Manses are provided in 13 charges, one fewer than for the previous year, and 1 church was built, the previous year none.

INVERNESS.—In this Presbytery the number of Churches and connected stations has risen from 24 to 30; of sittings from 7,540 to 8,515; of families from 1,506 to 1,624, and of communicants from 1,533 to 1,732, while the number of single persons was the same, 32. The additions to communicant membership was 149, of whom 129 were on profession of personal faith, 36 of an increase, and 20 on certificate, 3 of an increase. On the other hand, the removals were 45, of whom 27 were by death, a decrease of 13; 11 by certificate, a decrease of 32; and 7 without certificate, a decrease of 4. No removals by discipline.

Of the 206 persons baptized 180 were infants, an increase of 11; and 26 adults, a decrease of 9.

In the Eldership there were 102 persons, an increase of 13; there was 117 other office-bearers, a decrease of 4; and those at weekly prayer meetings were 1,280, a decrease of 157.

There was an increase of 8 in the number attending Sabbath school and Bible class, 1,254; but a decrease of 11 in those more actively interesting themselves in the conducting of the classes, 162.

There were no missionary associations in either year; 13 Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies, being 1 of an increase; Christian Endeavor Societies were without change, 18; but the membership in these had fallen off from 564 to 460.

Manses were the same in number, but there was 1 rented house in 1898, whereas there were 0 in 1897, and 1 church was built the former year, 1898, none in 1897.

HALIFAX.—Churches and stations under pastoral oversight in this Presbytery rose from 67 to 75; the number of sittings from 17,025 to 17,635; of families from 2,547 to 2,573, and of single persons from 803 to 809, but communicants had decreased by 48, making an aggregate of 5,274.

Additions on profession were 165, a decrease of 159, and on certificate 117, also a decrease amounting to 13. The removals aggregated 374, of whom 70 were by death, 3 of a decrease; 131 by certificate, 8 of an increase; 60 without certificate, a decrease of 8; and 3 by discipline, no cases of this being reported for the previous year.

In Baptism there were decreases of 18 in infants, 233; and of 38 in adults, 32.

In the Eldership there were 179, an increase of 3; and in other office-bearers, 276, of 7. Weekly prayer meetings were attended by 2,159, an increase of 43; Sabbath schools and Bible classes by 3,706, a decrease of 8; and there was also a decrease of 5 in those engaged in Sabbath school work, making the total 527.

Missionary Associations stood at the same figure each year; Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies, 27, had increased by 1; there were 41 Christian Endeavor Societies, an increase of 3, with 4 Young People's Societies, in which the membership was 1,573, being 323 of an increase.

Manses had risen in number from 20 to 23; and 2 churches and 1 manse were built during the year, the same as in the previous one.

In the Presbytery of WALLIS there was a decrease of Churches and stations of 2, leaving the total at 51; of 230 in sittings, 10,610; of 63 in families, 1,400; with an increase of 27 on those formerly reported 186 single persons; and of 90 on the roll of communicants, raising them to 2,692.

There were increases in additions both on profession and by certificate, in the former case by 47, giving a total of 201, and on the latter by 14, making an aggregate of 53. Removals, on the other hand, summed up to 130, of whom 36, a decrease of 17, were by death; 69, an increase of 4, by certificate, and 25, a decrease of 17, without certificate. No cases of discipline.

Of the 151 persons baptized 115 were infants, a decrease of 28, and 36 adults, an increase

of 7. In the offices of Ruling Elder there were 110, a decrease of 5; other office bearers numbered 91, an increase of 3; while there was an increase of 25 on those attending the weekly prayer meeting, 1,392, and of 3 in Sabbath school and Bible class, 2,190; and of 8 in those engaged in Sabbath school work, 275.

There were 3 Missionary Associations in the bounds, an increase of 1; 15 Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies, the same as in 1897; but Christian Endeavor Societies, 20, had decreased by 5, and their members, 632, by 140.

Mansees were reported the same in number, 11; Churches built, 2; against 1, and 2 mansees the previous year.

In Pictou there was a decrease of 3 in the number of Churches and Stations enjoying pastoral oversight, leaving the total at 49; of 1,150 in the number of sittings, now standing at 20,950; of 38 in families, 3,507; of 406 in single persons, 431; and of 592 in communicants, 6,576. Communicants added numbered 283, of whom 188, a decrease of 81, were on profession, and 95, a decrease of 52 on certificate.

Over against the additions are to be set the removals which, summed up, make 333, of whom 171 were by death, 24 of an increase; 113 by certificate, 45 of a decrease; 44 without certificate, 13 of an increase; and 5 by discipline, 1 of an increase.

Baptism was administered to 301 infants, a decrease of 50; and 25 adults, an increase of 6.

There were 243 ruling elders, a decrease of 10; of other office-bearers 219, a decrease of 17. On the number attending weekly prayer meetings, 2,787, there was a decrease of 428; Sabbath school and Bible class, 3,756, of 332; and of those engaged in Sabbath school work, 486, of 68.

In Missionary Associations, 4, there was an increase of 2; of Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies, 35, also of 2; with a decrease of 1 in Christian Endeavor Societies, 41, but an increase of 11 in the membership, 1,253.

There was a decrease of 1 in mansees, 17; with 2 rented houses; 1 Church was built in 1898, and 1 Manse in 1897.

The Presbytery of PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND stands only second to St. John in this Synod, and next higher to that of Halifax. It contained 76 Churches and Stations, 2 of a falling off; with 22,165 sittings, a decrease of 690; and 3,431 families, increase of 96; of 284 single persons, an increase of 26; and 6,303 communicants, an increase of 499.

The additions on profession were 209, a decrease of 68; and on certificate 63, an increase of 11.

The removals by death were 97, a decrease of 14; by certificate 54, a decrease of 88; without certificate 30, a decrease of 22, while there were no cases of discipline, whereas there were 3 the previous year.

Of the 366 persons baptized 346 were infants, a decrease of 96, and 20 adults, a decrease of 20.

In the staff of ruling Elders, who numbered 236, there was an increase of 4; and in the number of other office-bearers, 268, of 12.

There were 3,313 in attendance at weekly prayer meetings, a decrease of 43; but Sabbath school and Bible class show a gain of 416, making the total 5,046, with 150 of an increase in those engaged in Sabbath school work, 594.

Missionary Associations 7, have increased by 1; Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies, 18, by 3; Christian Endeavor Societies, 36, are 1 fewer, and their members, 687, are 28 fewer.

Mansees, 31, are the same each year; 1 Church was built in 1898, none in 1897.

LUNENBURG and YARMOUTH has 38 Churches and connected Stations, being 1 fewer than for the previous year, and these contained sitting accommodation for 7,340 persons, an increase of 390, with 876 families, 97 of an increase; 218 single persons, 282 of a decrease, and 1,450 communicant members, 13 of a decrease.

The additions to the communicants' roll were 72, and of these 66 were on personal profession, an increase of 17, and 6 on certificate, a decrease of 6. The removals by death were 26, a decrease of 7; by certificate 29, an increase of 5; without certificate 29 an increase of 19, and 0 by discipline, the former year there was 1.

Seventy-seven persons were baptized; of these 72 were infants, a decrease of 6, and 5 adults, the same as in the foregoing year. In the Eldership there was an increase of 5, making the total 58, and in other office-bearers of 15, making a total of 77.

There was an increase of 150 on attendance at weekly prayer meeting, giving an aggregate of 635; of 203 in those in Sabbath School and Bible Class, aggregating 917; but a decrease of 11 in those engaged in Sabbath School work, 111.

The number of Missionary Associations was the same each year, 2; Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies, 5, increased by 1; Christian Endeavor Societies, 9, remained the same, but there was an increase in the membership of 36, making in all 310.

There are 2 Mansees fewer reported than in 1897, namely 8; 1 Church was built, none the preceding year.

St. JOHN is considerably larger than any other Presbytery in the Synod of the Maritime Provinces, having 127 Churches or Stations, showing an increase of 2; with seating accommodation for 23,180 worshippers, 520 of an increase; 3,174 families, 171 of an increase; 1,227 single persons, 105 of a decrease; and 5,567 communicants, 347 of an increase.

The additions were 277, an increase of 61, on profession; and 79, a decrease of 8, on certificate. The removals were 80 by death, decrease 11; 70 by certificate, increase 4; and 52 without certificate, a decrease of 96. No cases of discipline either year.

Baptism was administered to 342 infants, increase 19, and to 27 adults, decrease 1.

In the Eldership there were 206 persons, giving 3 of an increase; other office-bearers numbered 327, being 21 of an increase.

In the attendance at weekly prayer meeting there was a falling off of 184, the total being 2,138; in Sabbath School and Bible Class, 5,292, an increase of 96; with an increase of those engaged in Sabbath School work, 704, of 34. Missionary Associations remained the same, 6; but Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies rose from 28 to 33. Christian Endeavor Societies, 27, were the same, and the same may be said of Young People's Societies; but there was an increase of 66 in the membership, which gave a total of 1,430, which gives an average of more than 50 to each. Mansees were the same, 20; but 5 Churches were built in 1898, against none the previous year.

The Presbytery of MIRAMICHI contained 62 Churches or Stations, a decrease of 2; with seating accommodation for 12,141, an increase of 995; and 2,218 families, being 336 of an increase; 214 single persons, 43 of a decrease; and 3,495 communicants, 332 of an increase.

Additions to rolls of membership amounted to 351; of these, 215, an increase of 96, being on profession; and 36, an increase of 10, on certificate.

The removals were 68 by death, 6 of an increase; 47 by certificate, 3 of a decrease; 40 without certificate, 13 of a decrease; and 4 by discipline, 1 of an increase.

Baptism was administered to 354 infants, 65 of an increase; and 7 adults, 21 of a decrease.

The number in the Eldership was 126, an increase of 1; other office-bearers numbered 210, an increase of 30.

In attendance on weekly prayer meetings there were 1,982, an increase of 85; in Sabbath School and Bible Class, 2,932, an increase of 326; and 383, an increase of 45, were engaged looking after their interests.

Missionary Associations, 2, had decreased by 3; Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies, 12, remained the same. There were 28 Christian Endeavor organizations, an increase of 8; with an increase of 351 in the membership, amounting to 877.

Mansees, 19, increased in number by 2. No Church or Manse was built in 1898; in 1897 there was 1 Manse.

SYNOD OF MONTREAL AND OTTAWA.

QUEBEC, the most easterly Presbytery of this Synod, had 1 Church or Station fewer in 1898 than in 1897, reducing the total to 24. In these there was a falling off of 575; in the number of sittings, 7,566; of 40 in the number of families, 1,341; and of 55 in that of communicants, 2,303; whereas there was a gain of 15 in that of single persons, making the total 339.

Additions amounted to 127, being 70 fewer than for the former year; 85 being added on profession, 57 of a decrease; and 42 on certificate, 13 of a decrease. The removals were 127, just the same as the additions, being 51 fewer than in 1897; of whom 43, a decrease of 22, were by death; 42, a decrease of 42, by certificate; and 42, an increase of 13, without certificate. There were no cases of discipline in either year.

There was an increase of 29 in the number of persons baptized, 203; of whom 196 were infants, an increase of 24; and 7 adults, an increase of 5. But in the Eldership there was a falling off of 1, the total being 87; in other office-bearers of 4, total 138; of 80 in that of those attending the weekly prayer meetings, 837; of 364 in Sabbath School and Bible Class, 2,000; and of 35 in those engaged in Sabbath School work, 203.

Missionary Associations had been reduced from 8 to 6; Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies continued the same, 2; Christian Endeavor Societies, 8, show a decrease of 4; and their membership, 308, of 125. There was 1 Manse less in 1898 than in 1897; and neither Church nor Manse was built in either year.

MONTREAL.—In most of the entries, in almost all those of chief importance, this Presbytery affords tokens of progress. Its number of Churches or Stations has grown from 67 to 73, and sittings in these from 19,373 to 20,049, a gain of 676. Its families, 4,607, are an increase of 547; its single persons, 1,641, of 36; and its communicants, 10,349, of 628.

Its additions on profession, 445, show the gratifying increase of 63; and on certificate, 413, of 49; giving in these two items a total of 111. Its removals by death, 121, give a decrease of 28; by certificate, 246, of 26; without certificate, 137, of 68; with an increase of 6 in those removed by discipline, 17.

Decreases, 34, are marked in the number of infants baptized, and of 9 in that of adults,

17. Elders had increased by 56, giving a total of 347; and other office-bearers by 53, a total of 404.

In the attendance at weekly prayer meeting, 1,365, there was a decrease of 171; but in Sabbath School and Bible Class, 6,885, there was an increase of 47; with an increase of 52 in those engaged in Sabbath School work, 902.

Missionary Associations had risen from 16 to 18; and Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies from 21 to 23. On the other hand, Christian Endeavor Societies had fallen from 24 to 22, and their membership from 988 to 683. The Manses are reported the same in number, 22, and neither Church nor Manse was built in either year.

In the Presbytery of GLENGARRY the Churches, or Stations supplied in connection with them, 32, had decreased by 6; while the sittings in these, 12,940, had increased by 713; the families, 2,253, by 79; and the communicants, 7,096, by 362; whereas there was a decrease of 105 single persons, leaving their number at 334.

On the members added, 310, there was an increase of 58; of whom 210 were on their own profession and 29 on certificate, 100. The removals were, by death, 81, an increase of 28; by certificate, 63, and increase of 4; without certificate, 22, a decrease of 4; and by discipline, 1, a decrease of 3.

On infants baptized, 298, there was an increase of 97; and on adults, 8, a decrease of 2. There were 174 persons in the Eldership, an increase of 7; and 201 other office-bearers, a decrease of 1. The weekly prayer meetings in the bounds were attended by 1,618, a decrease of 122; Sabbath School and Bible Class by 2,326, a decrease of 375; while there was an increase in those engaged in Sabbath School work, 360, of 36.

Missionary Associations have fallen from 6 to 2; Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies have risen from 20 to 25; Christian Endeavor Societies from 19 to 21; and the membership of these from 824 to 883. There was an increase of 1 in the number of Manses, 20.

Next to Montreal the Presbytery of OTTAWA is the second largest in the Synod to which they belong. The number of Churches and Stations connected with them, 73, shows an increase of 2; with an increase of 110 on the 17,088 sittings; of 28 on the families, 3,102; and of 86 on the communicants, 6,361; with a decrease of 75 among single persons, 853.

Of the 448 members added, 232 were on profession, a decrease of 76; and 216 on certificate, an increase of 1.

By death 81 were removed, a decrease of 2; by certificate, 130, a decrease of 51; without certificate the numbers were the same each year, 114; while by discipline, 2, showed a decrease of 13.

Baptism was administered to 396 persons; and of these 386 were infants, a decrease of 10; and 10 adults, a decrease of 4.

The number of Elders was 233, an increase of 14; of other office-bearers, 381, an increase of 17; attending weekly prayer meetings, 1,713, a decrease of 74; Sabbath School and Bible Class, 4,120, an increase of 157; while those engaged in Sabbath School work, 553, had decreased by 14.

Missionary Associations had fallen from 8 to 6; but Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies rose from 24 to 25. Christian Endeavor or kindred organizations had fallen off from 14 to 12, and the membership from 617 to 543. The Manses are reported the same for each year, 23; and one Church was built each year.

In the Presbytery of LANARK AND RENFREW there were 54 Churches or Stations each year; while the sitting accommodation for 15,422 has increased by 40; the number of families, 3282 by 62; of single persons, 839, by 140; and of communicants, 7,087 by 209.

The additions were 270 on profession, an increase of 84; and 164 on certificate, being 20 of an increase. The removals by death, 83, gives a decrease of 15; by certificate, 167, an increase of 7; without certificate, 43, a decrease of 45; and by discipline, 0; a decrease of 5.

Of 385 persons baptized 349 were infants, an increase of 14; and 36 adults, of 21. In the Eldership there were 6 fewer, making the number 217, and other office bearers were 352, an increase of 8. There were 2,082 in attendance at weekly prayer meeting, a decrease of 138; while in the Sabbath School and Bible Class there was an increase of 192, making a total of 4951, and of 39 of those engaged in Sabbath School work, making a total of 532.

Missionary Associations were the same, 8; Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies, 33, had increased by 1; no Christian Endeavor Societies are reported for 1898, probably an oversight, as there were 16 the previous year; and there is a membership of 914, as against 1,098. Each year reports 30 Manses. In 1897 there were 2 Churches built; in 1898 none.

BROCKVILLE Presbytery reported 36 Churches or Stations in 1897, and only 27 in 1898, a decrease of 9. Although a decrease in these there is an increase of 547 in sitting accommodation, making it 8755; but a decrease of 338 in families, which have a total of 1470; a decrease of 455 on single persons 258, and of 107 on communicants, leaving the total of these 2824.

The additions on profession, 88, show a decrease of 1; on certificate, 76, an increase of 17, while the removals were 36 by deaths, 14 of a decrease; 56 by certificate, 11 of a decrease; 20 without certificate, 14 of a decrease; and none by discipline, 4 of a decrease.

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One hundred and eleven infants were baptized, a decrease of 28, and 14 adults, an increase of 12.

There was a falling off of 24 in the Eldership, bringing the number down to 90; of 6 among other office-bearers, leaving a total of 153; of 58 attending weekly prayer meetings, whole number 565; of 450 in Sabbath School and Bible Class, leaving 1,616; and of 24 among those engaged in Sabbath School work, leaving 221.

Missionary Associations, 2, had diminished by 1; Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies, 22, had increased by 10; Christian Endeavor Societies, 13, had fallen off by 1, and the membership, 450, had increased by 7. No Manse are reported for 1898, there were 13 the previous year. Most likely there has been an oversight. Neither Church nor Manse was built in either years.

SYNOD OF TORONTO AND KINGSTON.

In the Presbytery of KINGSTON there were 44 Churches or Stations, an increase of 2; with 13,515 sittings, an increase of 220; 2,394 families, 192 of an increase; 593 single persons, 140 of an increase, and 4,811 communicants, 422 of an increase. It will be seen from these figures that the Presbytery has made a marked step in advance on the previous year.

The additions on profession were 218, giving 7 of an increase, and on certificates, 198, being 60 of an increase, or altogether 70, while it will be observed that the reported increase of communicants was upwards of two thousand. The removals were 65 by death, 8 of an increase; 147 by certificate, 22 of an increase; 54 without certificate, 14 of an increase, and 12 by discipline or 7 of an increase. Thus while there were 76 additions to the rolls of Sessions there were 278 removals.

Of the 288 persons baptized, a decrease of 44, were infants, and 20, an increase of 2, were adults.

In the Eldership there was an increase of 15, making the total 157. Other office-bearers numbered 290, an increase of 30; and there were 1209, a decrease of 137 attending weekly prayer meetings; and 3,394, an increase of 292, in Sabbath School and Bible Class, under the supervision of 491 teachers and others, giving an increase of 10.

There were 5 Missionary Associations, 2 of an increase, and 22 Woman's Missionary Societies, 10 of an increase, with 13 Christian Endeavor Societies, one of an increase, having a membership of 776, or an increase of 125. Manse, 18, were 1 less. No Church or Manse was built, but a Sabbath School room was erected.

PETERBOROUGH Presbytery had the same number of Churches or Stations each year, 38; but the seating accommodation for 12,390 had increased by 826, and the communicants, 5,378, by 343; while there was a decrease of the families, 2,543, by 13, and of single persons, 417, by 117.

Communicants' rolls in the different Sessions were increased by 411, of whom 249 were admitted on their own profession, an increase of 6, and 162 on certificate, likewise an increase of 6. The removals were 70 by death, 5 of an increase; 129 by certificate, 19 of an increase; 93 without certificate, 45 of a decrease, and 3 by discipline, being 3 of an increase as compared with 1897.

Baptism was administered to 176 infants, a decrease of 33, and to 19 adults, an increase of 7.

The Eldership numbered 176, an increase of 8; other office-bearers, 240, an increase of 14, with 1,096, or 240 of an increase, attending the weekly prayer meeting; and 3,382, an increase of 7, were in Sabbath School and Bible Class, under 402 Teachers and others actively interested in Sabbath School work, an increase of 7.

Each year there were 13 Missionary Associations; Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies had grown to 32, an increase of 12; but Christian Endeavor Societies, 22, had decreased by 4; and their membership, 595, by 337. Manse remained the same, 13; but 1 Church and Manse were built during 1898, in 1897 there was none.

In the Presbytery of WHITBY there were 20 Churches or Stations, 1 of a decrease, 6,650 sittings in these, 400 of an increase; 1,072 families, 121 of an increase; 246 single persons, 11 of an increase; and 2,176 communicants, an increase of 81.

The additions were 165 on profession, and 53 on certificate, increase of 50 and 23 respectively. In the removals by death, 47, there was an increase of 23; by certificate, 59, a decrease of 21; without certificate, 11, of 21, and by discipline 0, a decrease of 1.

Of 96 persons baptized 80 were infants, 5 of a decrease, and 16 adults, 2 of an increase.

The Elders had no change in their numbers, 78, either of the years; other office-bearers, 150, increased by 12; but there were a falling off of 84 in those attending weekly prayer meetings, 476; with an increase of 63 in Sabbath School and Bible Class students, 1584; and of 24 in those engaged in Sabbath School work, 159.

Missionary Associations were reported at 4, a decrease of 1; Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies at 17, an increase of 1; while Christian Endeavor Societies remained without

change, 12, with a decrease of 28 in their membership, 331. Manses remained the same each year, 9. No Church or Manse was built either year.

LINDSAY had 5 more Churches or Stations in 1898 than in 1897, making a total of 29. In these there were sittings for 10,150 worshippers, 1,600 of an increase, and connected with them 1719 families, an increase of 306, with 495 single persons, an increase of 119; and 3,059 communicants, 347 of an increase.

There were 137 additions on profession, a decrease of 41; and 88 on certificate, an increase of 8. But there were increases in each of the items of removals, namely, of 14 by death, the whole numbering 53; of 31 by certificate, the total being 101; of 27 without certificate, whole number 55, and 6 by discipline, whole number of cases 7.

On the number of infants baptized, 96, there was a decrease of 25, and on adults, 17, an increase of 2.

There were 2 Elders fewer, 114; but 18 more other office-bearers, 151; with a decrease of 66 in those attending the weekly meeting for prayer, 879, and of 67 in the attendance on Sabbath School and Bible Class, 2144, but an increase of 38 on the 291 engaged in Sabbath School work.

Missionary Associations, 4, has increased by 2; Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies were without change, 19; Christian Endeavor Societies, 9, had fallen off by 2, and their membership, 235, by 90. Manses continued at 14 each year. No Church or Manse was built either year.

The Presbytery of TORONTO ranks high, although not the highest among those of the Synod, in the number of its Churches or Stations, 74; but these show a decrease of 5 on the preceding year. In sitting accommodation, however, there has been an increase of 988, making now a total of 34,374, which is largely in excess of any other Presbytery in the bounds; with an increase of 568 on communicants, now numbering 16,988; but a decrease of 88 on the families formerly reported, namely 6,800; and of 571 on single persons, bringing them down to 3,571.

The additions on profession were 838, a falling off of 92; and on certificate 1,083, a falling off of 82. The removals were as follows:—By death, 194, increase 3; by certificate, 776, a decrease of 98; without certificate, 581, an increase of 10; and by discipline, 6, an increase of 2.

Baptism was administered to 563 persons; 516 of these being infants, a decrease of 4; and 47 adults, an increase of 9. In the following items there were decreases:—Number of Elders, 466, of 5; other office-bearers, 634, of 114; attending weekly prayer meetings, 2,876, of 196; Sabbath School and Bible Class, 12,935, of 1,257; and of those engaged in Sabbath School work, 1,484, of 32.

There was an increase of 5 in Missionary Associations, raising the total to 25; of 2 in Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies, the total being 51; and of 3 in Christian Endeavor Societies, 33; with a decrease of 589 in the membership of these, reducing this to 2,346.

In 1897 there were 15 Manses, the following year 17; and 2 Churches were built in the latter year, 2 partly in the former.

ORANGEVILLE Presbytery reports 42 Churches or Stations each of the years, with 9,610 sittings for the past year, a decrease of 40; 1,899 families, 119 of a decrease; 413 single persons, 370 of a decrease; and 4,008 communicants, 152 of a decrease.

The total additions were 383; of whom 296 were on profession, a decrease of 99; and 87 on certificate, a decrease of 50. The removals aggregated 309; of whom 71 were by death, 2 increase; and 119 without certificate, 8 of an increase; with 118 by certificate and 1 by discipline, being a decrease of 40 in the former and 2 in the latter.

Baptism was administered to 186 infants, an increase of 16; and to 42 adults, a decrease of 15.

In the Eldership there were 157 persons, 3 of a decrease; other office-bearers numbered 286, an increase of 15. In those reported as attending weekly prayer meeting, 1,232, there is a decrease of 266; with an increase of 143 on Sabbath School and Bible Class attendance, 2,796; but a decrease of 31 on those actively engaged in these means of grace, 327.

Missionary Associations, 5, had increased by 1; Women's Foreign Missionary Societies, 15, had decreased by 2; Christian Endeavor Societies, 26, had increased by 3; but their membership, 883, only by 4.

There were 18 Manses in 1897 and 13 in 1898. A Church was built last year, none the previous one, nor a Manse in either.

BARRIE Presbytery was one of those affected by the erection of the New Presbytery of North Bay. This will account for the falling off in several of the items reported. The number of Churches or Stations was reduced by 17, bringing the number down to 70; the sittings in these by 2,885, making the aggregate 17,235; the families by 462, leaving the total at 2,896; the single persons by 153, last number 1095; and the communicants by 1,085, leaving them at 5,211.

There were additions amounting to 786; and of these 353 were on profession, a decrease of 173; and 233 on certificate, 19 of a decrease.

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In all the items of removals there were decreases; 3 in those by death, 84; in those by certificate, 30, the total being 280; and of 46 in those without certificate, 111; while 4 cases of discipline are reported for 1898, against 3 in 1897.

Baptism was administered to 367; and of these 336 were infants, a decrease of 53; and 31 adults, a decrease of 29. There were 224 Elders, being 43 of a decrease; 422 other office-bearers, 99 of a decrease; 1,777 attending weekly prayer meetings, a decrease of 491; 4,798 in Sabbath School and Bible Class, 742 of a decrease; and 690 engaged in Sabbath School work, 111 of a decrease.

Missionary Associations had risen from 9 to 10; Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies from 27 to 28. There is some uncertainty whether Christian Endeavor Societies should be reckoned as 39; if so, there is a falling off of 7; with a decrease of 335 in the membership of these, 975. In 1897 there were 23 Manse reported, in 1898 only 18; one Church was built each of the years.

ALGOMA was also to some extent affected by the organization of the Presbytery of North Bay. Its Churches and Stations were reduced from 97 to 93; and yet its sittings have increased by 404, to 7,532. The number of families, 1,284, show a decrease of 75; single persons, 388, of 206; and communicants, 1,646, of 8.

There were decreases in the number added on profession, 79, of 71; and on certificate, 55, of 17. Removals show increases as follows:—2 on those by death, 12; 31 on those by certificate, 78; and 15 on those without certificate, 49. There were no cases of discipline. One hundred and eight infants were baptised and 4 adults, decreases of 50 and 15. There was an increase of 3 in the Eldership, standing at 73; but a decrease of 57 in other office-bearers, 129; of 180 in those attending weekly prayer meeting, 754; of 183 in Sabbath School and Bible Class, 1,911; with an increase of 14 in those engaged in Sabbath School work, 274.

Missionary Associations rose from 2 to 7. There are no Woman's Missionary Societies reported. Christian Endeavor organizations, 13, have increased by 1, but the membership, 227, has fallen off by 94.

There is 1 Manse fewer, 5, reported for 1898 than for 1897. In this last year there were 3 Churches and 2 Manses built; in the year covered by this report, 1 Church.

NORTH BAY.—This Presbytery was erected in the course of the year, and your Committee refer to the printed tables for information regarding its state. Of course, there is no opportunity for comparison. It extends over an interesting tract of country. It has begun its work with zeal and energy. Its operations were much needed. It will be very successful in carrying the Kingdom of Christ to the regions beyond.

In the Presbytery of OWEN SOUND there were 30 Churches or Stations each of the years; but there was an increase of sittings to the number of 600, making the total 9,445; of families, 70, total, 1,755; and of single persons, 50, giving an aggregate of 383; with a decrease of 20 communicants, leaving 3,933.

In the additions on profession, 196, there was a decrease of 22; and on those on certificate, 123, an increase of 19. The removals by death, 73, gave an increase of 10; on certificate, 128, a decrease of 41; without certificate, 65, an increase of 17; and by discipline, 7, an increase of 6. Of 199 persons baptized, 180 were infants, 4 of an increase; and 19 were adults, 7 of a decrease. There were 139 Elders, an increase of 4; 230 other office-bearers, an increase of 11; while there were decreases of 61 in the number attending the weekly prayer meeting, 1,077; and of 112 in Sabbath School and Bible Class; with an increase of 36 in those engaged in Sabbath School work, 317.

There were 13 Missionary Associations, 4 of an increase; 17 Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies, a decrease of 1; 17 Christian Endeavor Societies, an increase of 2; and 674 members, an increase of 55. Each of the years report 10 Manses.

SAUGEEN Presbytery contained 1 Church or Station fewer in 1898 than in 1897, the number reported being 24; but in the sittings, 8,500, there was an increase of 50; and in single persons, 331, of 38; but a decrease in families, 1,731, amounting to 72; and in communicants, 3,457, to 145.

On their own profession of faith 191 were added to those previously on the communion roll, a decrease of 20; and on certificate, 115, an increase of 31. The removals were:—By death, 49, an increase of 10; on certificate, 133, an increase of 26; without certificate, 92, an increase of 47; while there were no removals by discipline; in the foregoing year there were 22.

There is a falling off in the baptisms by 4 in the case of infants, 163; and by 14 in that of adults, 14. The number of Elders was the same, 108, each year; other office-bearers, 187, decreased by 21; the attendance at the weekly prayer meeting, 930, had increased by 5; while that in the Sabbath School and Bible Class had decreased by 52; with a decrease of 12 in those actively interested in Sabbath School work, 254. Missionary Associations had fallen from 5 to 3; Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies from 16 to 13; Christian Endeavor Societies from 19 to 18; while there was an increase of 92 in membership, 971. For each of the years 7 Manses were reported. A Manse was built in the former, a Church in the latter year.

GUELPH Presbytery had the same number of Churches or Stations each year, but the sittings, 14,297, had increased by 248, and the number of single persons, 841, by 99; while the families, 3,143, had fallen off by 18; and the communicants, 7645, by 62.

The additions were 286 on profession, 23 of an increase; and 263 on certificate, 2 of a decrease; while the removals were:—By death, 87, a decrease of 17; on certificate, 260, an increase of 4; without certificate, 263, an increase of 197; and by discipline, 2, the increase being 2. Of the 240 baptisms, 210 were infants, a decrease of 8; and 30 adults, an increase of 6.

There were 253 reported as in the Eldership each year; 277 other office-bearers, 8 of a decrease; 1,531 attending weekly prayer meetings, 212 of a decrease; 4,615, Sabbath School and Bible Class, 155 of an increase; and 545 engaged in Sabbath School work, 26 of an increase.

There was one of an increase in Missionary Associations, 19; Woman's Foreign Missionary and Christian Endeavor Societies remained unchanged, 25 and 17, with an increase of 35 in the latter, 957.

In 1897 there were 17 Manses, and 16 in 1898. In the latter year 1 Manse was built.

SYNOD OF HAMILTON AND LONDON.

The Presbytery of HAMILTON contained 60 Churches or Stations, being 1 fewer than in the previous year, and these had sittings for 22,715 worshippers, 150 of an increase; the families numbered 4475, a decrease of 69; single persons, 1,289, a decrease of 181; and communicants, 9,836, being 781 of an increase.

The additions on profession were 485, a falling off of 12, and on certificate, 359, a gain of 20. In the removals by death, 144, there was an increase of 7; on certificate, 401, of 41; without certificate, 123, of 34; and by discipline, 15, of 10.

Infants baptized numbered 205, a decrease of 93, and adults 50, a decrease of 19.

There were in the Eldership 326, an increase of 1; other office-bearers, 563, of 66; while 1823 attended the weekly prayer meeting, a decrease of 161; in the Sabbath School and Bible Class 7935, a decrease of 131; and 935 were actively engaged in Sabbath School work, giving a decrease of 53.

Missionary Associations continued without change; Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies, 39, decreased by 2; Christian Endeavor Societies, 39, by 5, and the membership in these, 1,577, by 462.

There was the same number of Manses, 27 each year. One Church was built—1 Manse the previous year.

PARIS with 27 Churches or Stations gives a decrease of 1; in the sitting accommodation for 11,024, there is a decrease of 350; in the families connected, 2,392, of 330; in single persons, 546, of 248, and in communicants 5,592 of 169.

On their own profession, 259 were added, and on certificate, 232, decrease of 18 and 42 respectively. The removals show an increase of 1 by death, 83; and of 53 without certificate, 126; but those by certificate, 203, a decrease of 1. There was 1 removal by discipline each year.

Of 200 baptisms, 148 were infants, 23 of a decrease, and 52 were adults, 10 of an increase.

In the Eldership, 180 in all, there was a decrease of 7; in other office-bearers, 202 of 6; in the attendance at weekly prayer meeting, 1,262, of 211; Sabbath School and Bible Class, 3,616, of 193; and Teachers and others actively interested in Sabbath School work, 461, of 1. There were 11 Missionary Associations, and 18 Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies each of the years; Christian Endeavor Societies, 17, decreased by 2; and their membership, 856, by 340.

There were 15 Manses in 1898, against 13 the year before, and 1 Church was built, none in the former year nor Manse.

LONDON had 54 Churches or Stations each year; the sittings in these, 18,784, had increased by 131; the families 3,906, by 391; the communicants, 7,917, by 262, while single persons, 675, had decreased by 79.

Altogether 773 were added to the rolls of communicants, of whom 437, an increase of 2 were on profession, and 336, a decrease of 10, on certificate. The removals were 90 by death, 22 of a decrease; 245 by certificate, 4 of a decrease, and 49 without certificate, decrease 114. No removals by discipline.

The baptisms were 265 infants, an increase of 26; and 62 adults, the same as in the previous year. In the Eldership there were 277, a decrease of 4; other office-bearers, 426, show an increase of 12; the weekly prayer meeting was attended by 2,111, an increase of 12; Sabbath Schools and Bible Classes by 3,730, a decrease of 320, and there was also a decrease of those engaged in Sabbath School work, 680, of 13.

Missionary Associations, 16, had decreased by 6; Women's Foreign Missionary Societies, 32, had increased by 1; Christian Endeavor Societies remained at 18; while their members, 1,298, had fallen off by 25. In 1897 there were 32 Manses reported, in 1898 there were only 29. In the former year 1 Manse was built, in the latter 3.

In CHATHAM Presbytery the Churches or connected Stations had fallen from 39 to 37—

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the sitting accommodation from 10,790 to 10,510; the families from 2,054 to 2,045; single persons from 432 to 410, and communicants from 4,174 to 4,135. There were also decreases in the additions on profession, numbering 186, of 34; on certificate, 99, of 20. The removals by death were 51, or 11 less than in the foregoing year; by certificate, 146, being 31 fewer; without certificate, 96, an increase of 49, and by discipline, 1, an increase of 1.

The baptisms were 120 infants, 13 of an increase, and 18 adults, 16 of a decrease.

The Eldership in the bounds was filled by 129 persons, 8 of a decrease; other office-bearers were 245, a decrease of 4; those attending weekly prayer meetings, 775, being 74 of a decrease; Sabbath School and Bible Class, 2825, or 48 of a decrease; and Sabbath School workers, 355, a decrease of 13.

There were 20 Missionary Associations, an increase of 10; 19 Women's Foreign Missionary Societies, a decrease of 3; with 24 Christian Endeavor Societies, an increase of 1; and 810 members, an increase of 95. Manses were 17, an increase of 2; built during the year, 1 Church and 2 Manses, during the preceding year 1 Manse was built.

STRATFORD Presbytery had a decrease of 1 in its Churches or Stations, which numbered 33; and of 11 in single persons, 271; but increases of 545 in its sittings, 11,323, of 191 in its families, 2,601, and of 142 in its communicants, 5,309.

The additions on profession, 253, show an increase of 27, and on certificate, 163, a decrease of 13. The removals were by death, 72, an increase of 17; by certificate, 162, the same as in foregoing year, without certificate, 11, a decrease of 83; and by discipline 0, a decrease of 1.

The baptisms of infants, 177, were 1 fewer, and of adults, 24, or 4 more.

In the Eldership there was an increase of 5, and other office-bearers of 4, the numbers respectively being 139 and 217. At weekly prayer meetings there was an attendance of 1,091, a decrease of 170; at Sabbath School and Bible Class of 3,158, an increase of 918, with an increase of 4 in Sabbath School workers, 344.

Missionary Associations have been reduced from 8 to 6; Christian Endeavor Societies from 15 to 13, and the membership from 606 to 602; but Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies, 25, had an increase of 1.

Sixteen Manses were reported, 1 of an increase; 3 Churches and 1 Manse were built; in the foregoing year 1 Manse.

In the Presbytery of HURON there was no change in the number of Churches or Stations, 27; but there was an increase in that of sittings, 9,690, by 135; and of communicants, 4,620, by 57; but families, 1,782, had decreased by 12, and single persons, 266, by 142.

The additions on profession were 245, an increase of 79, and by certificate, 97, a decrease of 54. There was an increase of 21 in the removals by death, 78; and of 17 without certificate, 39; but a decrease of 6 in those by certificates, 134. No cases of discipline ending in removal are reported for either of the years.

The baptisms were 191 infants, increase 54, and 22 adults, increase 9.

There were increases in other office-bearers, 202, in those attending Sabbath School and Bible Class, 3,326, and in Sabbath School workers, 424, of 2, 76, and 22, respectively; but a decrease of 7 in the Eldership, 133.

Missionary Associations 8, had increased by 4; Women's Foreign Missionary Societies, 17, remained the same; Christian Endeavor Societies had fallen from 22 to 18, and their membership from 1,163 to 993.

Each of the years 13 Manses are reported, 1 Church was built in 1898, neither Church nor Manse the previous year.

The number of Churches or Stations in MAITLAND Presbytery has increased from 30 to 31, with increases of 395 in the sittings, 11,745; of 7 in the families, 2,359; of 8 in single persons, 181, and of 38 in communicants, 4,563.

In the additions on profession, 212, there was a decrease of 6; on certificate, 148, of 6. There were also decreases in the removals by death, 78, of 6; by certificate, 167, of 8, but an increase of 24 in those without certificate; while the cases of discipline were one each year.

The baptisms were 222 infants, a decrease of 28, and 18 adults, of 6. There was a decrease of 1 in the Eldership, 150; of 205 in the number attending weekly prayer meetings, 1,422; of 159 in the attendance in Sabbath School and Bible Class, 3,115; but an increase of 5 in other office-bearers, 260, and of 25 in Sabbath School worker, 358.

Missionary Associations, 8, show a decrease of 1; Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies, 24, on increase of 1; Christian Endeavor Societies, 17, a decrease of 6, with a decrease in the membership, 576, of 124. There were 20 Manses each year, 1 Church and 1 Manse were built in 1898, 1 Church in 1897.

The Presbytery of BRUCE reports 24 Churches or Stations for each year, with decreases of 1,112 in the sittings, 7,365; of 82 in the families, 1,612; and of 346 in the communicants, 3,225; but an increase of 34 in the single persons, 201. In the additions on profession, 120, there was an increase of 5, and on certificate, 106, of 8. In the removals there were the following increases:—By death, 39, of 1; by certificate, 111, of 13; without certificate, 65, of 20; and by discipline 1.

Baptism was administered to 131 infants, 9 of an increase; and 13 adults, 7 of an increase. There were decreases in the number of Elders, 106, by 16; of other office-bearers,

182, by 5; in attendance at weekly prayer meetings, 817, by 92; and in those engaged in Sabbath School work, 227, by 26; while the attendance at Sabbath School and Bible Class, 1,900, shows an increase of 5.

Missionary Associations had increased from 3 to 4; Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies from 9 to 10; but Christian Endeavor Societies had fallen from 13 to 11, and their members from 580 to 531. Manses, 13, had increased by 3. One Church was built in 1898.

The number of Churches and Stations in SARNIA Presbytery has increased from 36 to 47; with increases of 1,751 in the sittings, 12,307; of 355 in the families, 2,482; of 378 in the communicants, 4,498; but a decrease of 25 in single persons, 532.

The additions on profession, 205, were 2 fewer; on certificates, 128, they were 14 fewer. The removals by death, 48, show a decrease of 21; but there are increases in those by certificate, 121, and without, 45, of 7 and 22 respectively. No removals by discipline either year.

Increases in baptism of infants, 204, were 26, and of adults, 37, were 10.

The number of Elders was 175, an increase of 34; of other office-bearers, 328, of 58; of those attending weekly prayer-meetings, 1,144, of 90; of those in Sabbath School and Bible Class, 3,439, of 218; and of those engaged in Sabbath School work, 430, of 1.

Missionary Associations had fallen from 15 to 7; Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies, 17, had increased by 2; Christian Endeavor Societies, 30, by 10; and their membership, 950, by 31. There was an increase of 3 in the Manses reported, 19; but there is no report of congregations having built Manse or Church either of the years.

SYNOD OF MANITOBA AND THE NORTH-WEST TERRITORIES.

The Presbytery of SUPERIOR shows a decrease of 1 in the number of Churches and connected Stations, 46; and of 7 in that of single persons; but an increase of 175 in sittings, now numbering 2,625; of 66 in families, 647; and of 74 in communicants, 808.

The additions were 23 on profession, 27 of a decrease; and 64 on certificate, 24 of a decrease; while the removals were:—3 by death, the same as foregoing year; 28 by certificate, 4 of an increase; and 32 without certificate, 5 of a decrease. There were no removals by discipline either year. There was a decrease of 63 in the number of baptisms, 57 on that of infants, 66, and there were no cases of adult baptism; while the previous year there were 6.

In the Eldership there had been a decrease from 16 to 15; while other office-bearers, 66, had increased by 25; the number attending weekly prayer meeting, 250, by 32; and those engaged in Sabbath School work, 100, by 17; while the attendance on Sabbath School and Bible Class, 936, had diminished by 46.

There were 6 Missionary Associations, 3 of an increase; 1 Woman's Foreign Missionary Society each of the years; Christian Endeavor Societies, 7, had decreased by 1, and the members, 138, by 108. Manses had increased from 2 to 3. One Church and 1 Manse were built; the former year 1 Church.

In the Presbytery of WINNIPEG there was a decrease of 3 in the Churches and Stations, 79; of 426 in the sittings, 9,403; and of 75 in the families, 2,139; while there were increases of 114 in single persons and of 46 in communicants, the actual numbers being 1,049 and 4,078.

Increases are also noted in the additions of 47 on the 247 received on profession and 45 on the 245 admitted on certificate. The removals by death were 43, an increase of 18; by certificate, 155, an increase of 6; without certificate, 94 of a decrease, the number being 95; while by discipline none were removed; in the former year, 8.

Decreases are reported in the baptism of infants and adults, of 63 in the former, 267, and 11 in the latter, 12. While the number of other office-bearers, 293, gave an increase of 10, there were decreases of 8 in the Eldership, 126; of 103 in those attending weekly prayer meetings, 953; of 94 in Sabbath School and Bible Class, 3,839; and of 6 on Sabbath School workers, 15.

Missionary Associations had risen from 9 to 15; Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies, 13, remained without change; Christian Endeavor Societies had increased from 13 to 19, with an increase of 145 on their membership, 633.

There is a decrease of 1 in the Manses reported, 10. No Church nor Manse was built during the year; 1 Church and 1 Manse the previous year.

In ROCK LAKE Presbytery the Churches and Stations had risen from 58 to 62, and the sittings, 5,309, had increased by 65; the families, 1,036, by 15; single persons, 315, by 37; and communicants, 1,691, by 72.

Of the 156 additions, 63 were on profession, a decrease of 12, and 93 on certificate, an increase of 32. The removals were:—3 by death, 7 of a decrease; 54 by certificate, 21 of an increase; while in those without certificate and by discipline the numbers were equal, 24 and 1.

In the baptisms of infants, 120, there was an increase of 13, and of adults, 3, of 1.

There were also increases of those in Eldership, 57, by 3; other office-bearers, 133, by 2; but decreases in attendance on weekly prayer meetings, 347, of 37; Sabbath School and Bible Class, 1,646, of 51; with an increase of 45 in Sabbath School workers, 189.

Missionary Associations and Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies remained the same, 2

and 1. Christian Endeavor Societies had diminished from 7 to 3, and their membership from 230 to 209. Each year 6 Manses were reported; 1 Church was built in 1897; neither Church nor Manse in 1898.

GLENBORO Presbytery had 31 Churches and Stations each of the years, with increases in the number of sittings, 3,050, of 450; families, 666, of 5; single persons, 351, of 4; with a falling off of 15 in the communicants, 943.

In the additions there were increases on those by profession, 59, of 22; and by certificate, 71, of the same number; and there were also increases in the removals, as follows:—By death, 9, of 3; certificate, 28, of 16; without certificate, 25, of 23; and by discipline, 2, of 2. Infants to the number of 82 were baptized, 7 increase; and one adult, none the previous year.

Elders, 40, had increased by 1, and Sabbath School workers, 125, by 1; but other office-bearers, 105, had fallen off by 9; attending weekly prayer meetings, 254, by 1, and Sabbath School and Bible Class, 1,073, by 18.

There were no Missionary Associations; Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies were unchanged, 6; Christian Endeavor Societies had fallen from 7 to 2, and their membership, 107, showed a decrease of 62.

Each of the years 6 Manses were reported, with 1 Church built in 1897; in 1898 there were none.

The Presbytery of **PORTAGE LA PRAIRIE**, as reported, shows a decrease of 12 in Churches and Stations, 42; of 1,525 in the sittings, 4,360; of 169 in the families, 917; and of 104 in communicants, 1,662; but an increase of 20 in single persons.

There are decreases of 62 and 5 in the additions on profession and certificate respectively, the totals being 67 and 99; with removals as follows:—By death, 16, an increase of 5; by certificate, 45, and without certificate, 24, decreases of 4 and 16. There were 40 infants and 6 adults fewer baptized in 1898 than in 1897, the actual numbers being 133 and 5.

There was a decrease of 5 in the Elders, 39; of 49 in other office-bearers, 121; and of 42 in attendance on weekly prayer meetings, 299; with an increase of 60 in those in Sabbath School and Bible Class, 1,543, and of 66 in those engaged in Sabbath School work, 173. Missionary Associations, 5, remained the same; Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies decreased from 7 to 6; Christian Endeavor Societies from 11 to 9, the membership remaining the same, 242.

There was an increase of 2 in the Manses, numbering 8; in each year 1 Church was built, with 2 Manses in 1898, an increase of 1.

BRANDON increased its Churches and Stations, 48, by 2, with increases in sittings, 4,950, of 170; in families, 1,205, of 44; single persons, 416, of 49, and communicants, 2,026, of 146.

Additions on profession were 99, a decrease of 10, and on certificate, 146, an increase of 57. Removals were:—15 by death, 88 by certificate, decreases of 9 and 1; without certificate, 24, an increase of 4; and by discipline, 0, the former year 1. In baptisms there was a decrease of 4 on infants, 147; but an increase of 1 on adults, 4.

In the Eldership there were 77, an increase of 12; other office-bearers, 197, an increase of 27; attending weekly prayer meetings, 568, a decrease of 32; Sabbath School and Bible Class, 2,107, an increase of 160; and Sabbath School workers, 266, an increase of 24.

Missionary Associations had decreased from 4 to 2; Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies had increased from 4 to 11; Christian Endeavor Societies from 15 to 16, with 151 increased membership, 488. In 1898 2 Manses were erected, 1 in 1897; 2 Churches and 1 Manse in the later year, 1 Church in the former.

The Presbytery of **MINNEBOSA**, whose return came to hand after your Committee had despaired of receiving it, and had proceeded to the compilation of this report to your Assembly, gives the same number of Churches and Stations for each year, namely—81, with a decrease of 305 in the sittings they contain 5,170; of 13, in the number of single persons, 397; of 209 in that of communicants, 1,460, but an increase of 134 in families, raising them to 1,138.

The additions were in all 117, of whom 71, an increase of 29, were on profession, and 56, an increase of 22, on certificate. There were increases in the removal: by death, 11, and by certificate, 19, of 2 each, but decreases in those without certificate, 16, and by discipline, none, of 20 and 4, respectively.

The baptisms were 156 infants and 16 adults, increases of 29 and 6.

Decreases present themselves in those in the Eldership, other office-bearers, and the attendants on weekly prayer meetings, of 31, 2, and of 107, respectively, the full numbers being 63, 177, 438; but those in Sabbath School and Bible Class, 1,625, and engaged in Sabbath School work, 207, give increases of 83 and 16.

Missionary Associations, 4, and Women's Foreign Missionary Societies, 3, increased each by 1, but Christian Endeavor Societies fell off by 7, while there were 4 Young People's Societies reported in 1898, none in 1897. The membership has fallen from 323 to 285. In 1897 there were 5 Manses, in 1898 there were 6; in each year 2 Churches and 1 Manse were built.

MELITA has increased its Churches and Stations from 39 to 46, with an increase of 300 in sittings, 2,600; of 58 in the families, 461, and of 268, in the communicants, 864; but a falling off of 30 in single persons, 173.

Additions on profession, 43, show a decrease of 8, but on certificate, 63, an increase of 7.

The removals by death, 6, give an increase of 2; by certificate, 18, a decrease of 2, and without certificate, 29, of 1. No removals by discipline in either year. The baptisms of infants, 53, had an increase of 15, of adults the same number, 5.

Increases in the Eldership, 53, amounts to 26; in other office-bearers, 126, to 28; in those attending weekly prayer meetings, 161, to 9; Sabbath School and Bible Class, 621, to 172, and engaged in Sabbath School work, 88 to 22. There were no Missionary Associations, nor Women's Foreign Missionary Societies either year, but there was an increase of 2 in Christian Endeavor Societies, but there was no information from which the relative membership can be ascertained. Manses were reported as 5, an increase of 2. In 1898 1 Manse was built.

REGINA with 126 Churches and Stations show 2 of an increase; but the sittings, 6,448, are 22 fewer than in the former report, with an increase of 164 in the families, 1,1811; of 121 in single persons, 891; and of 82 in communicants, 2,135.

The additions were 135 on profession, 28 of a decrease, and 92 on certificate, 29 of a decrease. The removals were, by death, 22, by certificate, 79, without certificate, 34, and by discipline, 0, showing respective decreases of 3, 28, 6, and 7.

There was an increase in the number of baptisms of infants and adults, respectively, of 21 and 14, raising the numbers in each case to 219, and 23.

In the Eldership, 219, there were an increase of 25, other office-bearers, 317, of 64; attendance on weekly prayer meetings, 670, of 62; in Sabbath School and Bible Class, 2,118, of 59, and Sabbath School workers, 252, of 11.

Missionary Associations, 6, had decreased by 1; Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies, 3, by 2; Christian Endeavor Societies, 9, by 5; and membership, 160, by 146. There was 1 Manse more in 1898 than in 1897, making a total of 14; but a decrease in the number of Manses and Churches built, 1 of each, compared with 5 in all, the preceding year.

SYNOD OF BRITISH COLUMBIA.

In this Synod of 5 Presbyteries, that of CALGARY must come first under notice. Its Churches and Stations had declined from 79 to 31, a decrease of 48, for which most satisfactory reasons can be given, which your Committee will not detain you by relating. The number of sittings, 2,150, has decreased by 509; families, 535, by 150; single persons, 3,347, by 3,007, and communicants, 592, by 13.

On their own profession 41 persons were added to communion rolls, 18 of a decrease; and 75 on certificate, 25 of an increase. The removals by death were the same each year, 7; by certificate, 53, an increase of 15, and without certificate, 9, a decrease of 2. No cases of discipline ending in removal are reported for either year.

Baptism was administered to 90 persons, 88 of these being infants, 49 of a decrease, and 2 adults, 8 of a decrease.

There was an increase of the Elders, 36, by 8; and other office-bearers, 75, by 16; but there were decreases of 39 in those attending weekly prayer meetings, 134, of 80 in Sabbath School and Bible Class attendance, and of 4 in Sabbath School workers, 76.

Missionary Associations continued the same, 1; Woman's Foreign Missionary and Christian Endeavor Societies, 3, and 5, increased by 1 each, while the membership of the latter, 176, rose by 52. In 1898 4 Manses were reported, an increase of 1, and 1 Church was built.

In EDMONTON Presbytery there was an increase of 16 in the Churches and Stations, 60; of 345 in the sittings in these, 2,660; of 141 in the families, 602; of 1 in the single persons, 167; and of 99 in the communicants, 634.

On profession only 5 were added, a decrease of 37; and on certificate, 93, an increase of 42. By death 11 were removed, by certificate, 18, and discipline, 3, increases of 9, 3, and 3, respectively; while without certificate, 3, a decrease of 13.

One hundred and eighteen infants, increase 51, and 6 adults, no change in the number of the previous year, were baptized.

There were increases in the Eldership, 22, of 4; in other office-bearers, 106, of 16; in attendants on weekly prayer meetings, 118, of 14; in Sabbath School and Bible Class, 661, of 267, and of those engaged in Sabbath School work, 67 of 5. In the Presbytery there was 1 Missionary Association each year; no Woman's Foreign Missionary, and 4 Christian Endeavor Societies, with a decrease of members from 98 to 95. Manses continued the same, 5; in 1898 3 Churches were built, 0 in 1897.

KAMLOOPS reports 61 Churches and Stations, 1 of an increase; 3,787 sittings, 1,087 of an increase; 952 families, 331 of an increase; 1,049 single persons, 523 of an increase; and 670 communicants, 133 of an increase.

The additions were 37 on profession, and 117 on certificate, in the former 1 of an increase, and in the latter 16 of a decrease. There were the following removals, by death 4, by certificate 62, without certificate 33, being increases respectively of 3, 42 and 17. No cases of discipline either year.

In 1897 baptism was administered to 66 infants, in 1898 to 184; and to 8 adults in the former year, to 5 in the latter. In the eldership numbering 31, and in other office bearers,

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129, there were increases of 6 and 30. The attendance at weekly prayer meetings, 227, had decreased by 1; at Sabbath School and Bible Class, 1,367 had increased by 337; and there was an increase of 50 in Sabbath School workers, 178.

Missionary Associations, 3, had increased by 1; but there was no Woman's Foreign Missionary Society either year. Christian Endeavor Societies, 8, had fallen off by 1; and the membership, 120, by 78.

Manse were reported the same each year, 8; in 1897, 2 manse were built, in 1898, 1 manse and 7 churches.

WESTMINSTER with 47 Churches and Stations gives an increase of 2; 1,312 families, of 176; 742, single persons, of 156; and 1,696 communicants, of 133, with a decrease of 725 in sitting accommodation provided for 6,525 worshippers.

During the year 241 persons were added, 33 of these being on profession, an increase of 1, and 148 on certificate, 13 of a decrease. The removals by death were the same each year, 12; by certificate, 51, and without certificate, 18, decreases of 53 and 27, respectively. No removals by discipline in either of the years.

One hundred and nineteen persons were baptized, of whom 107 were infants, 33 of a decrease, and 12 adults, 10 of an increase. In the Eldership there was an increase of 18, making a total of 78; to other office-bearers, 36, total 166; to attendants on weekly prayer meetings, 38, total, 522, and on Sabbath School and Bible Class, 298, total, 1,841; whereas there was a decrease of 43 in Sabbath School workers, 218.

Missionary Associations decreased from 4 to 2, and Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies increased from 2 to 4; and Christian Endeavor Societies from 8 to 11, with a falling off in the membership by 8, making the total 270.

In 1898 there were 2 Manse reported fewer than in 1897, the numbers being 4 and 6, respectively. One Church was built in the later year; neither Church nor Manse was reported as erected the earlier one.

VICTORIA Presbytery had increased its Churches and Stations from 24 to 25, and there were increases in the sittings in these, 5,045, of 115; in the families, 964, of 40; in communicants, 1,158, of 100, with a decrease of 186 in single persons, 479.

On profession 104 were admitted to full communion, 28 of an increase; and on certificate, 80, being 32 of an increase. On the removals by death, 12, there was an increase of 4; while there were decreases in those by certificate, 49, without certificate, 16, and by discipline, 0, of 12, 74, and 1, respectively.

One hundred and forty-five persons were baptized, 129 of these infants, 3 of a decrease, and 16 adults, 14 of an increase.

Ruling Elders numbered 51, and other office-bearers, 100, increases of 4 and 9, respectively. While there was a falling off of 14 in those attending the weekly prayer meetings, 330, there was an increase of 257 in the attendance on Sabbath School and Bible Class, 1,587; and 27 in Sabbath School workers, 174.

Missionary Associations remained at 2. No Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies have been reported for either year; the Christian Endeavor Societies have dropped from 8 to 6, with an increase of 26 in the membership, 231.

For each year 3 Manse are reported, and 2 Churches were built in 1898, in the preceding year 0.

FINANCES.

(For average contribution reference is made to p. 349.)

SYNOD OF THE MARITIME PROVINCES.

Presbytery of TRURO.—The 64 Churches and Stations, with their 5,416 communicants, contributed \$17,380 by way of stipend to those ministering to them in the Gospel, \$216 less than the previous year; \$28,434 for all strictly congregational purposes, including expenditures on Church and Manse property, \$364 more; \$9,428 to the Schemes of the Church, \$717 more; and \$39,697 to ALL purposes, being \$564 less.

SYDNEY had 41 Churches, with 2,736 communicants, and their payments were: \$13,326 towards stipend, \$341 more; \$23,438, or \$5,229 less, to strictly congregational objects; \$3,093, \$115 less, to the Schemes of the Church, and \$27,605 to ALL purposes, \$5,660 less.

In INVERNESS there were 30 Churches and connected Stations, and 1,732 communicants, and their contributions to stipends were \$7,671, an increase of \$1,153; to strictly congregational purposes, \$11,946, an increase of \$2,115; to Schemes, \$2,340, a decrease of \$1,802, and to ALL purposes, \$14,661, an increase of \$2,916.

The Presbytery of HALIFAX has in its bounds 75 Churches and Stations, with 5,274 communicant members, whose payments to stipend were \$29,693, an increase of \$307; to all congregational expenditures, \$64,382, an increase of \$3,055; to the Schemes, \$16,632, an increase of \$12,924, and to all purposes, \$86,153, an increase of \$4,344.

WALLACE, with 51 Churches and Stations and 2,692 members in full communion, paid \$9,443 as stipend, an increase of \$549; \$18,153 to all congregational outlay, \$1,669 of an increase, \$4,336 to the Schemes, \$466 of an increase, and \$23,271 to all purposes, \$1,728 of an increase.

PICOU had 49 Churches and Stations, with 6,576 communicants, and there were paid by them \$23,541 in stipend, a decrease of \$1,271; \$38,119, a decrease of \$1,953, to all congregational objects; \$9,915, a decrease of \$990, to the Schemes, and \$50,856 to all purposes, a decrease of \$4,880.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND, which had 76 Churches and Stations and 6,303 communicants, raised \$22,000 in payment for stipend to the several Ministers officiating, being an increase of \$420 on the year before; \$32,763 for strictly congregational purposes, a decrease of \$13; \$10,005, an increase of \$3,076, to the Schemes, and \$45,301 for all purposes, being an increase of \$3,317.

LUNENBERG AND YARMOUTH, with 38 Churches and Stations and 1,450 communicants, paid \$6,286 toward stipend, \$118 of an increase; \$9,919 towards all congregational objects, \$369 of a decrease; \$2,268 to the Schemes, \$554 of an increase, and \$12,533, a decrease of \$1,257, for all purposes.

St. JOHN had 127 Churches and Stations and 5,567 communicants, and its payments for stipend were \$29,422, an increase of \$1,608; for all congregational purposes, \$61,821, an increase of \$9,926; for the Schemes, \$8,162, an increase of \$1,322, and for all purposes, \$73,667, being \$9,629 of an increase.

MIRAMICHI had 62 Churches and Stations and 3,495 communicants, whose contributions were as follows:—To stipend, \$12,782, an increase of \$530; to strictly congregational objects, \$21,122, an increase of \$1,519; to the Schemes, \$3,604, an increase of \$460, and to all purposes, \$26,502, an increase of \$1,360.

SYNOD OF MONTREAL AND OTTAWA.

QUEBEC Presbytery, with 24 Churches and Stations and 2,303 communicants, contributed \$13,120 for stipend, a decrease of \$536; \$31,716, an increase of \$8,323, to strictly congregational expenditure; \$4,956, a decrease of \$266, to the Schemes of the Church, and \$38,923, an increase of \$7,628, to all purposes.

MONTREAL had 73 Churches and Stations and 10,349 communicants, who raised \$52,947, an increase of \$2,882, for stipend; \$127,977 for congregational expenditure, \$29,419 of an increase; \$31,328 for the Schemes, \$1,357 of an increase, and \$177,519, an increase of \$32,732, for all purposes.

The Presbytery of GLENGARRY had 32 Churches and Stations and 4,096 communicants, who contributed \$17,299, an increase of \$573, to stipend; \$28,193, a decrease of \$1,872, to all congregational expenditures; \$9,522, an increase of \$820, to the Schemes, and \$40,413 to all purposes, a decrease of \$2,448.

OTTAWA Presbytery has 73 Churches and Stations and 6,361 communicants, whose payments to stipend were \$31,100, an increase of \$1,174; to total congregational outlay, \$73,490, an increase of \$11,793; to the Schemes, \$8,694, a decrease of \$126, and to all purposes, \$87,377, an increase of \$9,758.

LANARK AND RENFREW had 54 Churches and Stations and 7,087 communicants, whose contributions were:—\$26,146 for stipend, a decrease of \$32; \$58,170 for strictly congregational objects, a decrease of \$4,831; \$15,278, an increase of \$1,190, to the Schemes, and \$77,830 to all purposes, being a decrease of \$3,026.

BROCKVILLE, with 27 Churches and Stations and 2,824 communicants, paid \$12,658, a decrease of \$1,454, for stipend; \$26,085, a decrease of \$4,176, to strictly congregational purposes; \$4,879, a decrease of \$897, to the Schemes, and \$31,611, a decrease of \$4,273, to all purposes.

SYNOD OF TORONTO AND KINGSTON.

In this Synod the Presbytery of KINGSTON, with 44 Churches and Stations and 6,511 communicants, paid \$23,150 as stipend, \$2,003 of an increase; \$52,781, an increase of \$12,695, for congregational outlay; \$6,809, a decrease of \$325, to the Schemes, and \$64,052, an increase of \$10,784, to all purposes.

PERERBORO had 38 Churches and Stations and 5,378 communicants. These raised for stipend \$19,453, an increase of \$157; for congregational expenditure, \$44,648, an increase of \$11,160; for the Schemes, \$7,601, an increase of \$60, and for all purposes, \$54,104, an increase of \$11,511.

In WHITBY there were 20 Churches and Stations and 2,176 communicants, whose contributions for stipend were \$10,586, an increase of \$789; for congregational objects, \$15,884,

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being \$1,663 of an increase; for the Schemes, \$3,539, or \$457 of an increase, and for all purposes, \$19,683, an increase of \$1,867.

LINDSAY Presbytery had 29 Churches and Stations, with 3,059 communicants, who paid \$11,840 for stipend, an increase of \$215; \$20,600 for congregational objects, a decrease of \$188; \$4,318, a decrease of \$473, for the Schemes, and \$25,398, a decrease of \$959, for all purposes.

TORONTO, with 74 Churches and Stations and 16,988 communicants, contributed \$68,228 to stipend, being \$1,597 of a decrease; \$162,918 to congregational demands, being \$11,517 of a decrease; to the Schemes, \$34,836, a decrease of \$6,337, and to all purposes, \$211,990, a decrease of \$18,749.

ORANGEVILLE.—The Churches and Stations in this Presbytery were 42 and the communicants 4,008. These contributed \$13,029 for stipend, \$1,814 of a decrease; \$19,786 for congregational demands, \$2,840 of a decrease; \$2,305 for the Schemes, \$314 of a decrease, and \$22,671 for all purposes, \$3,196 of a decrease.

*BARRIE had 70 Churches and Stations, and in these 5,211 communicants. The payments by these for stipend were \$22,639, a decrease of \$4,514; for congregational objects, \$41,822, a decrease of \$10,627; for the Schemes, \$5,067, a decrease of \$306, and for all purposes, \$48,245, a decrease of \$10,406.

ALGOMA, with 93 Churches and Stations and 1,646 communicants, raised \$7,180 for stipend, \$208 of a decrease; \$10,217 for congregational outlay, a decrease of \$837; \$644 for the Schemes, \$7 of an increase, and \$11,246 for all purposes, \$558 of an increase.

NORTH BAY Presbytery was erected only in July, 1898, so that its name appears on the roll in the Synod for the first time. There is no opportunity, therefore, of comparing it with any preceding period, while the reports from the congregations and mission stations in its bounds have been duly received, so that these are *commencing data*.

The Churches and Stations in OWEN SOUND Presbytery numbered 30, and the communicants, 3,933. The payments by these were \$12,663 for stipend, \$314 of an increase; \$22,271 for congregational objects, \$1,731 increase; \$3,313 for Schemes, \$297 of an increase, and \$27,151 for all purposes, \$2,232 of an increase.

In SAUGEEN Presbytery, with 24 Churches and Stations and 3,457 communicants, the payments were to stipend, \$12,007, a decrease of \$172; to congregational purposes, \$20,768, an increase of \$340; to the Schemes, \$2,893, a decrease of 151; and to all purposes, \$24,120, a decrease of \$44.

GUELPH Presbytery had 30 Churches and Stations, and 7,645 communicants whose contributions for stipend were \$24,493, an increase of \$925; for congregational purposes, \$47,202, an increase of \$1,537; for the Schemes, \$9,752, an increase of \$1,001, and for all purposes, \$60,991, an increase of \$1,835.

SYNOD OF HAMILTON AND LONDON.

Of the 9 Presbyteries in this Synod, that of HAMILTON has 60 Churches and Stations, and 9,836 communicants. The contributions of these to stipend were \$46,635, being \$778 of an increase; to purely congregational objects, \$85,200, a decrease of \$204; to the Schemes of the Church, \$14,253, a decrease of \$2,178; and to all purposes, \$106,112, a decrease of \$1,795.

PARIS had 27 Churches and Stations, and 5,592 communicants, whose contribution to stipend \$19,315, was a decrease of \$675; to congregational liabilities, \$44,352, a decrease of \$34,287; to the Schemes, \$7,695, a decrease of \$680; and to all purposes, \$54,437, a decrease of \$36,478.

LONDON with 54 Churches and Stations, and 7,917 communicants, paid \$32,277 to stipend, an increase of 324; \$68,568 to congregational obligations, \$6,331 of an increase; to the Schemes, \$14,478, a decrease of \$3,368; and to all purposes, \$85,995, a decrease of \$10,649.

CHATHAM had 37 Churches and Stations, and 4,135 communicants. The contributions were \$16,936 to stipend, \$631 of a decrease; \$33,842 to congregational objects, a decrease of \$2,359; \$3,675 to Schemes, a decrease of \$476; and \$38,453 to all purposes, \$3,068 of a decrease.

STRATFORD with 33 Churches and Stations, and 5,800 communicants paid \$19,440 to stipend, \$1,471 of an increase; \$46,705 to congregational expenditures, \$14,456 of an increase; \$6,111 to the Schemes, an increase of \$34; and \$54,363 to all purposes, an increase of \$14,499.

HURON Presbytery had 27 Churches and Stations, and 4,620 communicants. The contributions of these were to stipend \$16,126, an increase of \$319; to all congregational purposes \$26,940, a decrease of \$7,912; to the Schemes of the Church, \$6,744, a decrease of \$523; and to all purposes \$35,075, a decrease of \$6,235.

In MAITLAND Presbytery there were 31 Churches and Stations, and 4,563 communicants who paid \$17,666 as stipend, \$734 of an increase; \$34,119 for congregational obligations, \$6,485 of an increase; \$4,893 to the Schemes, \$69 of a decrease, and \$39,823 to all purposes, \$6,235 of an increase.

*This Presbytery suffered severely through the formation of the Presbytery of North Bay.

BRUCE had 24 Churches and Stations, and 3,325 communicants, who contributed \$12,429 for stipend, \$173 of an increase; \$20,353 for congregational purposes, \$1,787 of an increase; \$3,002 to Schemes, \$171 of a decrease; and \$23,850, an increase of \$1,482, to all purposes.

SARNIA with 47 Churches and Stations, and 4,489 communicants paid \$10,780, an increase of \$1,998 to stipend; \$37,122, an increase of \$2,803, to congregational objects; \$4,907, a decrease of \$350, to the Schemes; and \$43,126, an increase of \$1,524, for all purposes.

SYNOD OF MANITOBA AND THE NORTH-WEST TERRITORIES.

The Presbytery of SUPERIOR had 46 Churches and Stations, with 808 communicants, and the contributions of these were \$5,654 for stipend, \$4 of a decrease; \$12,754 for strictly congregational purposes, \$1,835 of an increase; \$831 for the Schemes, \$183 of an increase; and \$13,796 for all purposes, \$1,923 of an increase.

WINNIPEG had 70 Churches and Stations, and 1,049 communicants, whose contributions were \$25,450 to stipend; \$410 of an increase; \$50,513 to congregational objects, \$1,681 of a decrease; \$6,716 to the Schemes of the Church, \$95 of a decrease; and \$60,319 to all purposes, \$2,337 of a decrease.

ROCK LAKE had 62 Churches and Stations, and 1,691 communicants, and their payments to stipend were \$11,388, an increase of \$540; to congregational expenditure, \$17,966, an increase of \$360; to the Schemes of the Church, \$1,301, an increase of \$44; and to all purposes, \$19,707, an increase of \$61.

In the Presbytery of GLENORA there were 31 Churches and Stations, and 943 communicants, and these raised \$8,361 for stipend, a decrease of \$517; \$17,576 for congregational purposes, \$2,699 increase; \$958 for the Schemes, an increase of \$86; and \$18,970 for all purposes, \$2,958 of an increase.

PORTAGE LA PRAIRIE reported 42 Churches and Stations, and 1,662 communicants, whose contributions to the objects named were as follows:—Stipend, \$9,599, a decrease of 640; all congregational objects, \$21,826, a decrease of \$16,943; Schemes of the Church, \$2,076, a decrease of \$14; all purposes, \$24,562, a decrease of \$17,382.

The Presbytery of BRANDON with 48 Churches and Stations, and 2,026 communicants, reported \$13,238 paid as stipend, \$1,330 of an increase; \$23,233 as congregational expenditure, \$956 increase; \$2,675, an increase of \$322, to the Schemes; and \$26,193, increase \$1,191, all purposes.

MINNESOTA had 81 Churches and Stations, with 1,460 communicants, and these contributed \$10,186 as stipend, \$1,815 increase; \$14,661 for all strictly congregational purposes, \$850 of an increase; \$1,168 to the Schemes, the same amount as the pre-ceeding year; and \$16,138 to all purposes, \$593 of an increase.

In the Presbytery of MELITA there were 46 Churches and Stations, with 864 communicants, whose contributions were \$5,482 to stipend, \$956 of an increase; \$9,472 to strictly congregational objects, \$1,931 of an increase; \$407 to the Schemes, a decrease of \$6; and \$10,121 to all purposes, \$1,897 of an increase.

REGINA had 126 Churches and Stations, with 2,136 communicants, whose payments were \$13,973, an increase of \$2,305, to stipend; \$21,207, an increase of \$1,033, to all congregational expenditure; \$1,252 to the Schemes, \$339 of a decrease; and \$22,702 to all purposes, \$221 of an increase.

SYNOD OF BRITISH COLUMBIA.

The Presbytery of CALGARY, with 31 Churches and Stations, and 592 communicants contributed \$6,071 to stipend, \$414 of an increase; \$11,579 to strictly congregational objects, an increase of \$1,316; to the Schemes, \$575, a decrease of \$10; and to all purposes, \$12,777, an increase of \$1,516.

EDMONTON with 60 Churches and Stations, and 634 communicants contributed \$3,179 as stipend, \$484 increase; \$7,142 to strictly congregational objects, \$2,662 of an increase; \$357, \$112 of an increase, on the Schemes; and \$7,628, an increase of \$2,756, on all purposes.

KAMLOOPS, with 61 Churches and Stations, and 670 communicants, raised \$11,954 for stipend, an increase of \$2,723; \$26,799 for strictly congregational objects, \$12,981 of an increase; \$1,132 for the Schemes, and \$28,312 for all purposes, increases of \$565 and \$13,642 respectively.

WESTMINSTER Presbytery had 47 Churches and Stations, and 1,696 communicants. The contributions of these were \$10,633 to stipend, \$873 of an increase; \$22,423 to strictly congregational objects, \$1,056 of an increase; \$1,626 to the Schemes, a decrease of \$191; and \$24,471 for all purposes, an increase of \$321.

VICTORIA with 25 Churches and Stations, and 1,158 communicants, contributed \$10,071 to stipend, \$151 of an increase; \$21,352 to strictly congregational objects, \$53 of a decrease; \$1,009 to the Schemes, \$334 of an increase; and \$24,303 to all purposes, \$1,049 of a decrease.

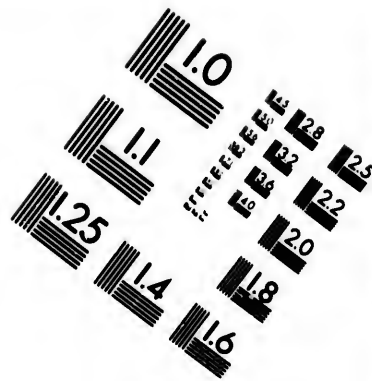
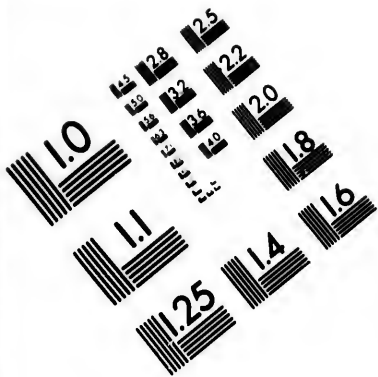

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The average payment to stipend by congregation alone was \$8.52 nearly, an increase upon last year's of \$0.45; and per communicant for the same purpose, \$4.30, a decrease of 5 cents.

For strictly congregational purposes the average payment per family was \$17 nearly, a decrease of 4 cents; and per communicant, \$8.75, a decrease of 9 cents.

Towards the Schemes of the Church each family paid on an average \$2.96 nearly, a decrease of 8 cents; and each communicant, \$1.52, a decrease of 5 cents.

For ALL purposes the average payment per family was \$20.99, a decrease of 36 cents; and per communicant, \$10.81, a decrease of 27 cents.

From the following table the Assembly will learn the payments that have been for all purposes each year since the union, and a comparison with the one immediately preceding:—

Your Committee have not thought it necessary to embody in this report the returns of Mission Stations. For these they would refer to the reports from Presbyteries in which such exist, and they are found on pages 490-493, or to the summary so far as they have been dealt with separately from pastoral charges, which will be found in its proper place. A feature to which attention has been frequently called is the imperfection in these reports. Of course the same fullness cannot be expected in many of these that can be secured in the case of regular charges. Several of them are only in process of formation and consolidation. Some of them may be in no more than the experimental stage, and the future will have to determine whether they shall be continued or not.

No further information is in the possession of your Committee as to the work and equipment of Colleges than what is contained in the Statistical and Financial Reports of the Presbyteries within whose bounds the Colleges are located.

As in former years, for some time past a supplementary schedule was issued to Presbytery Clerks for information on some particulars not embraced in the forms that have been so long in use, and for greater accuracy on some other particulars which were so included. From the 51 Clerks to which these were sent, and in some instances a second copy had to be despatched before a reply came, 2 have not reported, Winnipeg and Glenboro. From the 49 replying it is learned that there are in them 1,000 pastoral charges; 80 vacancies at the close of the calendar year; that 93 have made no statistical reports to their Presbyteries, some of these vacancies and some Mission Stations; that there are 1,096 ministers whose names are on Presbytery rolls and 144 that are not, of whom Toronto has 47, and Ottawa 10, Hamilton 7, Truro 6; in fact there are only about 11 Presbyteries in which there are none. In the course of the year there were 56 demissions, 7 of these being in the Presbytery of Toronto, 4 in London, and so down; there were 22 translations from one charge to another in the same bounds, and 28 to charges in other bounds. The deaths were 22, of whom 2 were in each of the Presbyteries of Picton, Montreal, Kingston (appendix to the roll) and Toronto.

Students to the number of 60 were licensed in 21 Presbyteries, Montreal having the greatest number, 13; Halifax and Kingston coming next, with 9 each; Barrie had 6, Toronto 5, and so down to 1 in each of 13.

Mission Stations reckon up to more than 349; Ottawa Presbytery reports 14, including mission charges with ordained missionaries, and Lanark and Renfrew 6, with 3 having ordained missionaries; Regina has 30, with 8 Indian missions; Kamloops 29, North Bay 22, Algoma 20, Kingston 17, thus calling our thoughts to the districts in which there is greatest need of missionary operations, and in which they are carried on.

A very large proportion of the congregations close their year with the calendar year. Only six report distinctly that they do not. In some instances reports of contributors to the Schemes of the Church are held over till the early months of the year following.

In 36 of the Presbyteries there are Statistical Committees, whose province it is to apply

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for, receive and tabulate the returns from congregations and Stations; 6 have none; 6 the Clerk does the work and 1 the Finance Committee.

In 37 some time is spent in considering the reports sent in, but a judgment cannot be positively formed as to the number that compare them with those of the previous year, a most profitable and, it might be supposed, faithfully performed part of the Presbytery's duty; as charged with the welfare of the congregations and Stations in the bounds; as called to consideration and enquiry as to the cause; where are any indications of declension; and to gratitude and acknowledgment of instances of progress. It is humbly thought that the Statistical Report, as it comes in once a year, is not, at least should not be, a forbidding subject, and it will be found to be far from a barren one when properly submitted and examined. Instances could be adduced of pastors making use of it for the instruction of their people and of the benefit resulting from doing so.

Through the courtesy of its Clerk it has been learned that the Presbytery of QUEBEC has prepared and published a synopsis of its Statistical and Financial Report for 1898, giving the names of congregations and their minister; of Mission Stations and their supply; with the numbers of families, communicants, and in Sabbath School and Bible Class in each; with contributions for stipend and congregational purposes, for six of the Schemes (Woman's Foreign Missionary and Assembly Fund being omitted), and the averages per family for Schemes, stipend and all purposes, with the totals for the last. Such a practice must be useful, and it would be advantageous if it were universally adopted, although some changes might be made.

Your Committee have had communications from only 2 of the Foreign Fields in which they have missionaries, Honan in China and Dhar in the Presbytery of Indore.

From the former it appears that the number of Churches or Stations supplied is 3; of sittings 200; of families 76; of single persons 15 and of communicants on the roll 70. During the year ending 30th November last 35 were admitted on their own profession. There was 1 removal by death; 6 infants and 3 adults were baptized. There are 3 Ruling Elders and 25 attending weekly prayer meeting. On the mission staff there are 7 ordained persons, 6 physicians, 4 of whom are men and 2 women, and 2 single women and 6 wives, giving a total of 21. There were 14 native helpers, 7 of whom were unordained preachers and 7 medical assistants. Outstations numbered 18, catechumens 152 and 83 catechumens were added during the year. In the year 1893 there were 5 communicants and 21 catechumens; in 1898 there were 70 of the former and 152 of the latter.

In the communication from Dhar, at which Mr. F. H. Russell is missionary, 2 Stations are reported, with sittings for 94. The number of families is 11 and of communicants 25. There was 1 addition, and that on profession; 1 infant was baptized; 88 attended weekly prayer meeting. There were 200 in Sabbath School and Bible Class, and 12 engaged among those. There is a Christian Endeavor Society with 29 in membership. A Church site was bought during the year.

Mr. Russell adds that strictly speaking there is no congregation yet, so that the statistics given are those of the Christian community simply, of which he is overseer.

In concluding, your Committee would remark that it is monotonous and wearisome to be repeating the same complaint from year to year of the dilatoriness of Presbyteries in sending in their reports, of so many delayed returns and of the want of care and accuracy in the great majority of the reports. If past injunctions of the Supreme Court have had some, it has been only partial, success. Earnestly is it pressed on Presbytery Clerks to read the instructions printed on the covers of each sheet before beginning their tabulation of returns and to act upon them when carrying on the work.

At a meeting of your Committee to agree upon this report, there was presented and briefly examined a copy of the new Statistical Forms which will be submitted to this Assembly. It might appear gratuitous on their part to pronounce any judgment upon them, but they were unanimously of opinion that, if adopted, their use should be held in abeyance till the first year of the century, now so near its commencement. That will be an epoch in the history of the world and of the Church. Already there is the heralding of great movements to date from it. The inauguration of a change in collecting statistical information might appropriately be delayed till its arrival. It will measure half a decade from the last decade comparison and be the commencement of a fresh decennial period.

Your Committee cannot conclude without expressing their own gratitude to God for His kindness to them, and for the working of His hand so clearly seen in the history of His Kingdom of grace coming within the circuit of their observation, and asking the Assembly by solemn prayer and thanksgiving to give to Him the glory due to His name as the Head of the Church, the Governor among the nations and the disposer of all events from His throne in Heaven.

REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE, 1898-99.
(WESTERN SECTION).

To the Venerable the General Assembly :--

It is with feelings of devout gratitude to God that your Committee are enabled to report that the receipts for the Western Section, upon behalf of the schemes for the past year, were the largest in the history of the Church. The following are the amounts :—

Including interest on invested Funds, repayment of loans, etc., the total amount received for the year by Rev. Dr. Warden at the Toronto office was \$548,262.72.

It will be observed, upon reference to the accompanying financial statements, that the year closed without debt in all the Funds of the Church, with two exceptions. Since the books were closed the shortage in these two has largely been reduced, and will probably be entirely removed before the date of the meeting of Assembly.

The question is sometimes asked "What is the cost of administering the missionary and other schemes of the Church?" and every now and then the most exaggerated statements appear in the press and elsewhere.

Your Committee think it well to authoritatively state that the actual cost of administering the missionary and benevolent schemes of our Church last year was 3.40 or less than 3½ per cent. This includes salary of Agent, Secretaries, expenses of Committees, office rent, office staff, printing, stationery, postage, and everything that pertains to administration. Your committee can, without hesitation, affirm that no business in the country involving an annual turn over of upwards of half a million dollars, is carried on at anything like the same ratio of expense.

A considerable number of congregations every year fail to contribute to one or more of the schemes. Your Committee repeat the recommendation of last year, that Presbyteries be requested, at their first meeting after the Assembly rises, to consider this matter, with a view to securing the organization of an efficient committee in every congregation and mission station within their bounds, so that a contribution may annually be obtained for every scheme.

An increasing number of congregations are now forwarding their contributions quarterly or half-yearly, apportioning the amount to the several schemes at the end of the year. In this way the use of the money is obtained by the agent of the Church, and a considerable saving in interest effected. A very large proportion of the total revenue of the year for the principal schemes comes in during the last month or two. As several of the mission committees and boards meet in the middle of March, it is of great importance that the total revenue of the year should be received prior to these meetings, so that the committees may know how the funds stand, and whether they are in a position to expand the work, or otherwise, for the following year.

Your Committee recommend that the Assembly instruct congregations to forward their contributions prior to the 28th of February annually.

Your Committee further recommend that the General Assembly instruct congregations, in allocating their missionary contributions, to have respect to the requirements of the several schemes, so that every department of the work of the Church may receive its fair share of the amount to be allocated by individual congregations.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON UNION.

The Committee on Union with other Churches was not convened during the past year; nor was any special action taken in the matter of co-operation with the Methodist Church of Canada, in connection with the objects specified in the resolutions of the Methodist Quadrennial Conference submitted to a previous General Assembly. The very cordial reception accorded to your delegates to the Quadrennial Conference which met in Toronto in September last, as well as lengthened conversations had by the convener of your Committee with the General Superintendent of the Methodist Church, give assurance that that Church still earnestly desires not only to reciprocate courtesies with the Presbyterian Church, but also to have some scheme or arrangement established by which the united moral force of these Churches may the more effectually be brought to bear in the promotion of the moral and religious welfare of the country. This is certainly an end of very great importance, and one that may well be sought apart from any question as to Incorporate Union. It is therefore respectfully recommended that the General Assembly reappoint its Committee on Union, with instructions to give its attention to the subject here indicated, as it may have opportunity.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION IN SCHOOLS.

The Rev. Herbert Symonds, B.A., Convener of the Committee of the Provincial Synod of the Church of England on Religious Instruction in Schools, entered into correspondence with the Convener of your Committee, with the view of securing common action in the matter entrusted to these Committees. Mr. Symonds gave a summary of what the Committee of the Church of England would desire to have established in the Public Schools of our several provinces in the way of religious instruction, and requested that he might be favored with the opinion of your Committee, or such members of it as could readily be convened, on the proposals of his Committee.

A meeting of the members of your Committee who reside in Toronto was called for the 30th of December, when the following attended, viz.:—Rev. Dr. MacLaren, Messrs. J. K. Macdonald and R. Kilgour and the Convener.

After careful consideration of the proposals of the Committee of the Church of England and of the whole question concerned, your Committee indicated its views in these propositions:—

1. We approve of the daily reading of the Scriptures in the Public Schools, as now authorized.
2. Religious Instruction should be given twice weekly; not more than half an hour each time being devoted to this exercise.
3. Such instruction should be based on Scripture, and should aim at giving an intelligent view of the passage of Scripture read, but no sectarian or denominational element shall enter into the instruction given.

4. Selected passages of Scripture should be memorized by the pupils.
5. Religious Instruction should be given by the teacher, except where trustees deem it desirable to have a different arrangement.

6. School regulations should contain a conscience clause, as at present.

The scheme approved by the members of your Committee who met in Toronto was found to be in substantial accord with the proposals submitted to them, and has been definitely accepted by the Committee of the Church of England; the Convener of which is endeavoring to arrange a meeting of representatives of the Churches referred to in this report, and of other Churches, with the view of considering still more fully the proposals which have met the approval of the two Committees, and of adopting measures by which, if possible, effect may be given to the conclusions arrived at.

The Rev. J. C. Herdman, Vice-Convener of the Committee on Religious Instruction in Schools, writes, that in the North-West Territories, the Presbyteries of Regina, Edmonton and Calgary all approved of having a place given to religion in the Public Schools, and for this end accepted the propositions which were drawn up by a Committee in Calgary, consisting of representatives of the Anglican, Methodist, Baptist and Presbyterian Churches. These propositions are, in substance, as follows:—That the use of the Lord's Prayer at the opening of schools in the North-West Territories be made compulsory; that the Ten Commandments be printed in a form easily legible and hung in a conspicuous place in schools; that the curriculum of studies shall include the use of some text-book on Christian Ethics; that the daily programme in all Public Schools shall embrace the reading of a passage of Scripture, without note or comment, immediately after the use of the Lord's Prayer; that it be a recommendation that the greatest vigilance be exercised in maintaining the highest possible standard of Christian character of teachers and inspectors.

The Rev. J. A. Carmichael approached the Legislative Assembly of the Territories on behalf of the three Presbyteries above named and was accorded a respectful hearing, but the leader of the Government told him that he was not in favor of the propositions submitted and would oppose any steps being taken in the direction of giving them legal effect.

The Presbytery of Calgary, in February last, concluded that the best way would be to interview members of the Legislative Assembly personally, and make it clear to them that there is no wish to introduce denominational teaching into the schools,

The strong point urged in favor of the present system is that clergymen have at present permission to give instruction in religion before the schools close in the afternoon; but it does not seem that advantage is taken, or can well be taken, in any general way of this permission, so as effectively to accomplish the important end in view.

All of which is respectfully submitted.
