## TO LEAVE FRANCE ONLY BY FORCE

Miss Pankhurst Says There Is Only One Way She Will Go.

## ARSON SQUADS FORMED

But Women Say Small Boys Are Placing the Bombs Found.

Special Cable to The World. LONDON, May 20.—(Copyright.)—Reports that the arm of the British Government would reach into France after Miss Christabel Pankhurst, militant suffragette leader and daughter of Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, the commander-in-chief, and cause the young women's expulsion from the country where she has taken refuge, was officially denounced today.

But should proof arise that the young woman is using France for a haven in which to concert and plan militant acts of violence in Great Britain, a precedent clearly exists by which Great Britain might (and doubtless would) request France to expel her with every assurance that request would be promptly granted.

The case of the felons is cited, when in 1885, James Stephens and two colleagues, Eugene David and Patrick Casey, were given six hours in which to cross the frontier, the French Government acting on the request of the British Government, the representation made being that they were in France concocting crimes against Great Britain. The expelled felons sought refuge in Belgium, where they remained unmolested.

Why She Left. Miss Pankhurst's two principal reasons for leaving England were that she is the custodian of the "war chest" of the militant suffragettes and feared a possible seizure and confiscation of the organization's funds, and the other, as given by herself, was that it would be unwise to have all the leaders exposed to the fire of possible arrest and imprisonment. If all the leaders got in jail, she said, the cause might suffer greatly.

Miss Pankhurst has made a declaration that if the British Government succeeds in ordering her expulsion from France, there will be only one way in which she will leave the country and that is by force.

Mrs. Belmont, who is in constant communication with Miss Pankhurst, has announced that if Christabel is expelled, she herself will leave France forever.

Arson Squads. Meanwhile London is stirred over the belief that the suffragettes of means and station are engaging for pay women of the lower class and forming them into "arson squads" to set the torch to places that the inner councils mark for destruction. The wide discussion of this belief was started thru the arrest early today of a woman named Nellie Robinson, who was found loitering suspiciously outside the new college chapel at Hampstead, in the northwest of London. She described herself to the police as a "separatist" and on being pressed, declared that she was at the church awaiting the arrival of two suffragettes, and with them was going to set the church on fire.

In remanding her, the police magistrate announced in court that the woman "seems to be in course of training as a professional petroleum incendiary by miscreants worse than herself."

At the weekly meeting of the Women's Social and Political Union (the militants) held today, there came not denial that there has been revolt in the ranks.

No Division. "There is no division in the ranks," declared Miss Naylor, one of the foremost agitators. "We are going to tide over the present crises. We are not going to be suppressed by coercion and intimidation. If the printers are nice, we women must show that we have courage to print the newspapers ourselves."

She made reference also to the daily bomb incidents that have kept London wrought up and largely scared when the harmlessness of the bombs did not on the other hand cause laughter. She denied the responsibility of the militants for them. She said: "Most of these affairs are mere monkey tricks, the work of small boys."

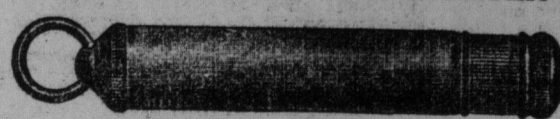

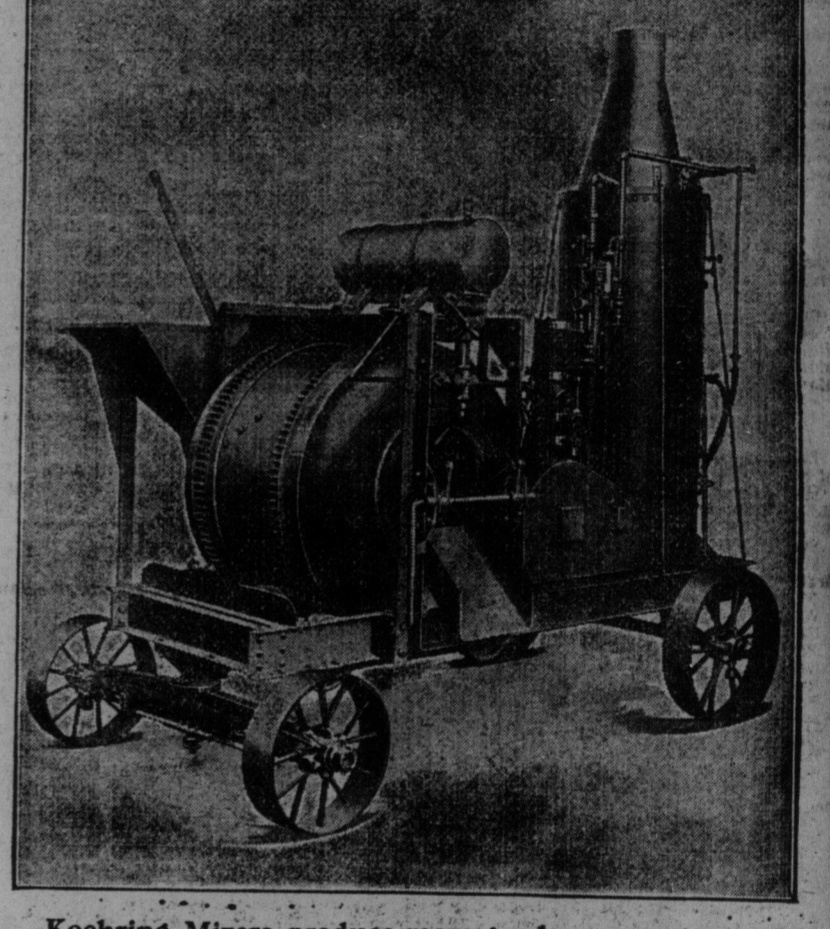

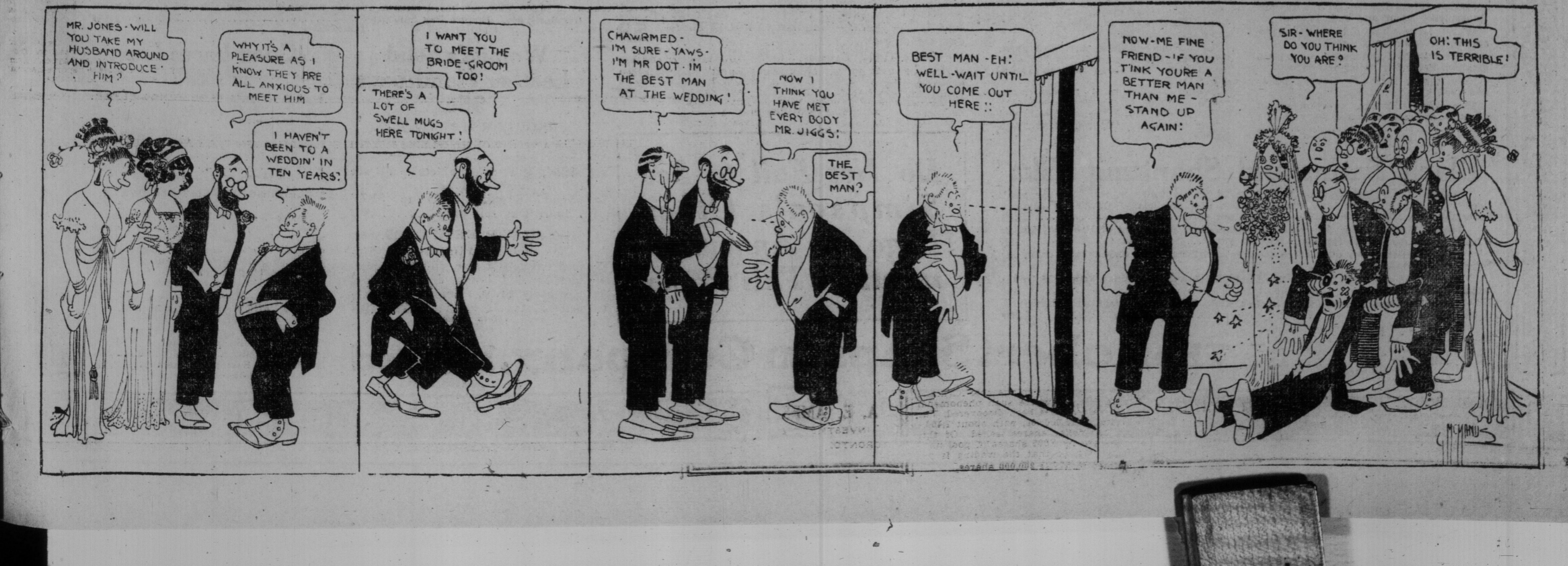
