The clause regulating the rate of interest to be charged was then taken up. The bill as it came back from the banking committee contained no restriction upon the rate of interest which could be charged by the banks at the time of making a loan-Finance Minister White explained that this was the legal effect of the old clause as construed by a recent decision of the privy council. While the bank could not recover more than seven per cent, interest after maturity by law, it could demand at the time of the loan and lawfully receive interest at any rate it was able to exact.

LIPTON CHALLENGE ACCEPTED BY N. Y.

Yacht Races For America's Cup to Be Sailed in Year From September.

LONDON, May 20.—The New York Yacht Club today cabled to the Royal Ulster Yacht Club definitely accepting Sir Thomas Lipton's challenge for the

America's Cup.

The races will take place in September, 1914, under the New York Yacht Club's present rules as to measurement, Club's present rules as to measurement, time allowance and racing rules. Sir Thomas considers that the conditions of acceptance of his challenge by the New York Yacht Club are a great victory for him. He says they will enable him to build a good, seaworthy boat. There are, he says, a few smail details yet to be settled, but he feels sure hat these will be arranged satisfactorily. One of these difficulties is the question whether Sir Thomas Lipton will be allowed to tow his yacht across the Atlantic. As to this, Sir Thomas says he feels sure the members of the New York Yacht Club will do everything that is right in the way of granting this concession, but he continued.

"As they have decided upon a good class of boat, it does not really matter much whether I am allowed to tow or not. Anyway, I should not want to tow, except in the case of a head-wind or a dead calm."

Asked whether he thought the defender's would meet him with a bigger boat than the challenger, Sir Thomas repiled:

"That does not give me the least worry,

Charles E. Nicholson, the yacht designer of Gosport, Eng., is already working on the plans of the boat.

The New York Yacht Club's acceptance of the challenge says:

"The challenger will be 75 feet on the waterline and built under the present New York Yacht Club rules," said Designer Nicholson. "This size was really fixed upon by Sir Thomas Lipton, because in his challenge he suggested racing under the same measurement rule as in the last contest, and thought that with the extreme type produced under that rule, having an enormous sail area, a 75-footer was large enough."





But all thru that district, contiguous to Dufferin street, hundreds of frame and stucco houses are being built. They are not the rough-and-tumble dwelling of the shacktown breed that marked Earls-court's early days, but they are neat court's early days, but they are neat roomy houses, with all the conveni-ences of city life. The area being dot-ted thickly with the lightly built house

ted thickly with the lightly built house extends now as far north as the Grand Trunk's Belt Line and in a few places, beyond—at Dufferin street notably.

Easy to Get Material.

This extension of dwellings up north of Eglinton avenue has been to some extent induced by the material-handling facilities afforded by the Belt Line. The various building supply firms on this railway are rushed with work. Cars of lumber are unloaded the same day as left, and therefore many of the firms have been able to get along for a while without the sidings which the Grand Trunk is putting in on some of the properties. The improvement work which is being done on the Belt Line which is being done on the Belt Line Railway is only part of the public and transportation work that is evident in the district. On St. Clair avenue the Bell Telephone Co. has almost completed the placing of its wires underground. Energy has recently been pu ground. 
