GOT MONEY FOR THEIR VOTES TWO LONDONERS SWEAR

Sensational Evidence Confirming Collins' Story of Illegal Handling of Ballets to Check Performance of Voters Purchased.

Evidence substantiating the story of Jerry Collins as to the bribery of voters in the London by-election was given in the police court yesterday by Edgar Clark and Kenneth Clark, each of whom swore they had received \$10 each for voting for Hyman. They implicated Wiley and Mulloy. John Cox had also received an envelope from Mulloy, while Alex Milne, a deputy returning officer, swore that he had been instructed by Collins as to how to illegally fold the ballots.

So fine was the system of keeping tab on the purchased voters that when one of them, who had been promised \$10 for his vote, cast his ballot for Gray, the money was not waiting for him when he called.

MOVEMENT OF WHEAT,

Winnipeg, Man. Oct. 1.—(Special.)—Inspection returns for the first month of the present shipping year were issued to-day. During the month a total of 7141 cars of wheat, 8,161,150 bushels, were inspected, compared with cars of wheat 8,151,150 bushels, were inspected, compared with 6108 cars and 6,413,400 bushels year ago.

To form an association in a locality requires not less than forty men re-siding therein, and aged over sixteen years. Members must subscribe to the oath of allegiance to His Majesty. A captain is appointed to every associa-tion, who, with a committee of two members, manage the affairs of the association. The annual subscription as not less than \$1 per member. A member may resign on three months' notice to the captain, but must return all government property in his posession before the resignation can be

accepted. An association may be disbanded for grave irregularities or mismanageand an association maintaining less than forty members must dis-A member may be expelled by a give her addresstwo-third vote of the association to which he belongs. No man is allowed to belong to more than one associa-tion at one time. The D.O.C. in each military district is charged with the organization, after the necessary papers have been forwarded by him and approved by the minister of militia.

HUNDREDS ARE HOMELESS PROPERTY LOSS IMMENSE

Navy Yard Damaged to Extent of \$1,000,000 - L. & N. Ry. Heavy Loser.

Pensacola, Fla., Oct. 1.-Not since the Galveston disaster has such a hurricane swept the gulf coast as the one which struck this city Thursday morning with all impelling force and raged for twelve hours, the wind blowing steadily at eighty and ninety miles an hour, with occasional gusts of one hundred miles an hour. The known loss of life up to date is thirty, which will probably be increased to 75, while the property loss will exceed five millions of dollars. Hundreds of persons are homeless without food and clothing, and cared for by charity. Great steamships and

for by charity. Great steamships and ocean-going sailing vessels, which have withstood the hurricanes of oceans, are a totally mangled heap upon beaches, mingled with the wrecks of fishing schooners, the tug boats and pleasure boats, while thousands of stacks of timber and homes and wharves are intermingled with this aggregation of wreckage. From Fort McRae to Escambia Bridge, a distance of 10 miles, the

bay shore has been swept clean, except a few wharves, where floated a fleet of seventy-five large ships before the hurricane. McRae, one of the modern coast fortifications, has been swept away, and five lives lost; five other people are insane from their terrible experience. They saved them-selves by lashing to the batteries. Fort Pickens and Fort Barrancas are badly damaged, the former almost wrecked. The navy yard has suffered lars. Five war vessels were sunk and driven ashore; the floating dock crushed and other damage sustained.

The magnificent Escambia draw bridge, costing hundreds of thousands of dollars, is gone, and three lives were lost. It was more than a mile and Nashville. 



This is a fac simile of an ordinary ballot, front view, as it appears in the



INVESTIGATE HORSE INDUSTRY vince for Information.

At last session of the legislature the minister of agriculture secured an appropriation to investigate the condition of the horse industry in Ontario. The object is to obtain information to be used in deciding as to the best policy to adopt to encourage more extensive breeding of a better class of horses. The principal points which will be considered in the course of the investigation, which is about to commence, are:

(1) The number, type, quality and breeding of stallions and brood mares in the province.
