Another Sensational Feature to Asselin Libel Case-Jury Disagrees.

QUEBEC, June 2 .-- (Special.)-The Lower lakes and Georgian Baydisagreement of the jury in the Asse-Light to moderate winds, mostly southerly; fair, with a little higher lin libel case Saturday and their immediate dismissal by the judge was no surprise, for as the judge himself declared in addressing the jury, the case had assumed quite a political character for some time past, or ever since the correspondence concerning subscriptions to an alleged electoral fund came out in evidence. The government and its friends

claim that the jury stood nine for conviction and three for acquittal. Asselin's friends assume to know that the twelve jurymen were equally di-vided in opinion. The defence consider the disagreement to be a sprcess, and Asselin's friends in court crowded around him after the jury had been dismissed to shake hands and congratulate him. Sensational Incident.

The most sensational incident of the day was the court's statement that it had received threatening letters during the trial. Judge Bosse did not relate this fact to the jury, but only after the latter had retired to consider its verdict and when the judge proceeded to take up the case against the Soleil newspaper for contempt of court in intervening in the case and attack-ing lawyers and witnesses. For this offence Mr. Dhellencourt, the responsible editor, was fined \$50, tho friends declared publicly, after the court adjourned, that Premier Gouin, Attorney-General, who was in court himself during the proceedings, had assured them that the fine would be immediately remitted by his departin ent.
