Situation of Foreigners Desperate. A press message from Shanghai, dated yesterday at 4 p.m., embodies some later information. It says:

Chinese Have Superior Guns. 'The guns of the Chinese around Tien Tsin are superior to any thing the defending European force has or is likely to have for some time.'

7000 Chinese Killed. Two thousand three hundred Chinese bodies are alleged to have been cremated at Taku and more than 4000 said to have been killed at Tien Tsin.

Was Seymour Overwhelmed? Chinese runners who have arrived at Taku report that foreign force was engaged several days ago with an overwhelming body of Chinese 40 miles west of Tien Tsin.

Peking Foreign Settlement in Flame. The Shanghai correspondent of the Daily Express says: 'I learn from a Mandarin who stealthily left Peking on June 26, and who succeeded at great hazard in getting clear, that the Boxers are massed around Peking, and that more than half of the northern and western portions of the city, including the foreign settlement, were aflame when the mandarin left. He could tell me nothing as to the fate of the foreigners, nor even as to the general situation; but he had heard that the Empress Dowager was preparing to go to the Province of Shan Si.'

Chinese Used Machine Guns. As the Foo despatch to the Daily Mail, dated yesterday, says: 'The attack on the Tien Tsin relief force was made by 20,000 Chinese, using machine guns and modern field pieces. The allied forces were in retreating, forwarding detachments in this manner in several, and the defeats of the foreigners, even the small force, greatly aid the movement of the Boxers, which is being enormously thru the inability of the foreigners to make head against it.'

U. S. TROOPS ARE AMBUSHED NEAR TIEN TSIN—FOUR KILLED

And Several Others of Waller's Command Wounded, So Admiral Kempff Reports—Taku Will Be U. S. Headquarters in Asiatic Waters.

Washington, June 24.—The Navy Department this afternoon issued the following bulletin: 'A telegram from Admiral Kempff, dated at Taku, June 24, says: 'In ambush, near Tien Tsin, on the 21st, four of Waller's command killed, and seven wounded. Names will be furnished as soon as received. Force of 2000 going to relieve Tien Tsin to-day.'

First American Blood Shed. Admiral Kempff's despatch, the first definite news of the shedding of American blood on Chinese soil came early this morning, and was turned over to Secretary Long as soon as he arrived at the Department. With Admiral Kempff's report, the Secretary carried the despatch to the White House, where, on the President's return from church, it was laid before him. The determination thereupon was reached to order Admiral Remy, in command of the Asiatic squadron, from Manila to Taku, on board of the armored cruiser Brooklyn.

Taku is U. S. Headquarters. The Secretary and Admiral Crowlins, who returned to the Navy Department, where the orders were being issued, by courier, to Taku, that the Foreign Ministers in Peking are demanding their passports, and that the Taku li Yamen is disposed to comply with their request. 'If this news be true it would imply the correctness of the reports of the arrival of Admiral Seymour at Peking.'

Double-Header Freight Was Backing Onto a Siding and Failed to Get Clear in Time. Green Bay, Wis., June 24.—A northbound passenger train on the Chicago and North-western road, loaded with excursionists, bound for the saengerfest in this city, collided at 10.15 this morning with a freight train at Deper, 50 miles south of here. Six persons were killed, one is missing and 34 were injured.

Where the People Were Killed. When the two trains came together the first car, which was a combination, smoking and baggage, was driven thru the wreck and where the loss of life occurred. The dead were taken out of the wreck and to an undertaking establishment at Deper. The injured were first taken to the Deper High School, which was converted into a temporary hospital, and later were brought to St. Vincent's Hospital in this city. None of the trainmen were injured, the engine crews jumping in time to save themselves. Both engines were badly damaged and two coaches were broken into kindling wood.

THE ASHANTEE REBELLION Is Managed by the Aged Queen of Ofofu, Who Carries a Gun and Leads 1000 Picked Hunters.

HER CONFEDERATE A BLIND KING Cobina Faoi, Her to Adanias, is Now a Prisoner of the British.

London, June 25.—A dispatch to the Daily Express from Freetown, dated Saturday, says: "The brain and inspiration of the Ashantee rebellion is the aged Queen of Ofofu. Although old, she is full of physical energy. She carries a gun herself, and personally leads 1000 picked hunters."

"Her personal confederate is the old blind, crafty King of the Adanias, a prisoner of the British. The revolt, he says, has been simmering for a year. All the tribes, except the Baramul, accompany the British object to paying British taxes. He says the golden stool is made of wood, covered with thin gold plates."

INSTIGATED BY THE BOERS. The Ashantee uprising of the work of Dr. Muller, Political Agent of the former Free State.

London, June 25.—The Ashantee rebellion, which is assuming an exceedingly grave aspect, is now known by the British Government to have been fomented by Boer emissaries acting under the direction of Dr. Muller, the political agent of the Orange Free State of the High.

Dr. Muller resided for many years on the Gold Coast, where he has many friends among the native chiefs and traders, and through them, according to a report to the British Consul Department, aided by gold taken from British-owned mines in the district, he was able to erect an institute by which Sir Arthur Hodgson was inveigled to Commanche and Lake Umbundu. Dr. Muller's activity accounts for the natives being better armed than heretofore, and for the successful adoption of methods of warfare wholly copied from those of the Boers, whereby the British relieving force has been driven back twice.

THE ABANDONMENT OF PEDDLERS. Markets Committee Will Consider a Bylaw in Amendment to the Present One.

DUNDAS MAN'S RIG SMASHED UP. East Flamborough Township Kicking Against Assessment—General City News.

Hamilton, Ont., June 24.—(Special.)—A bylaw belonging to J. Horrigat, a Dundas bootmaker, was wrecked by a trucker car on King-street last evening. The driver pulled in front of the car to avoid striking a wagon, which had broken down.

The New Receipts Chalmers. The work of rebuilding a 200-foot chimney at the Hoopster factory, East Barton-street, is now well under way. The new chimney will be round, instead of square, like the one which collapsed, and large iron hoops will be placed at intervals to strengthen it.

A New Peddlers' Bylaw. The Markets Committee to-morrow evening will consider the draft of a bylaw, amending the present hawkers' and peddlers' bylaw. The yearly fee, under the proposed bylaw, are: To sell foreign goods from a basket, \$10; to sell produce of farm or garden, or to sell fish from basket, \$5; from one horse wagon, \$10; from two horse wagon, \$15; to sell flowers, means, etc., from basket, hand-cart or value, \$2 a year. To sell plated ware, etc., \$10. To sell coal oil, gasoline, etc., \$10; from two horse vehicle, \$15. To sell tea, etc., \$10. To sell dry goods, etc., \$10.

For a license for hawkers, who bring agents or persons not resident within the county, to sell or offer for sale, dry goods, watches, hand-carts, furniture, carpets, upholstery, millinery, jewelry, or carry such goods to be afterwards delivered within the county to any person not being a wholesale dealer in such goods, ware or merchandise, \$10.

Appeal Against Assessment. East Flamborough Township entered an appeal against its assessment for county tax purposes, as fixed by the County Council at its recent session. Last year the acreage rate was \$48; this year it has been increased to \$50, and the Township Council hopes it will have to pay over \$800 more for the county tax. The appeal is entered on the ground that the other township's assessments are properly adjusted.

Work for Hamilton Contractor. Mr. A. McDonald, the Hamilton contractor, whose able work on the Cataract power construction made him widely known throughout the county, leaves for Berlin to-morrow to lay the electric railway between that town and Preston. The work will require 100 men and 25 teams.

No confidence is expressed in Li Hung Chang, who is expected to follow whatever policy is likely to result in personal segregation. Many missionaries from the Yangtsing valley are coming to Shanghai for safety. Three Chinese gunboats recently built by the Armstrongs have arrived at the wharf from Taku, having been taken from the foreign fleet, and a captain behind in their hands. Two left and cruised at Kiang Yung fort, 50 miles up the river, are kept under steam. The forts are provided with modern artillery and are being watched for the approach of foreigners. Six American Presbyterian missionaries from Kiang Yung have arrived at Shanghai. A wealthy Chinaman who fled from Pekin on the 14th says that all the legations except the British, Austrian and Belgian had been burned, the foreigners taking refuge with those three.

Many Whites Were Killed. In the bombardment of Tien Tsin, says Frederick Brown, Presiding Elder of the District.

New York, June 25.—The Journal and Advertiser to-day prints a copyrighted advertisement to-day printed by Frederick Brown, presiding elder of the Tien Tsin district of the Methodist Episcopal Church. The dispatch is dated at Chefoo, June 22, and is as follows: "I have just got away from Tien Tsin, a German gunboat. The city has been bombarded for several days by the Chinese. All the foreign part of Tien Tsin has been destroyed. Lieutenant Wright, of our navy, and 150 others of the white residents, marines and sailors sent up to our assistance are safe and unharmed."

Germany at Work. Kiel, June 25.—A rumor is current in naval circles here that a German cruiser has forced one Chinese ship ashore and captured another, and that 50 Chinese were killed and 70 wounded.

Foreigners Concentrating at Newchwang. Chefoo, June 25.—A dispatch from Newchwang, at the head of the Gulf of Laotung, says: "Foreigners are concentrating here. The British consulate has telegraphed for a gunboat, but has received no reply. The port is apparently left under Russian protection. Russian troops are arriving from Port Arthur, and the news of the residents are safe and business is not likely to be seriously interfered with."

A REVERSE FOR AMERICANS.

Manila, June 23.—A scouting party of 40 men, drawn from the 40th Regiment, Capt. Thomas Miller commanding, left Cagayan de Misamis, Island of Mindanao, Saturday, June 23, for the purpose of scouting the route to the Philippine Islands and traps. The advance line, consequently, was under a heavy fire, and on the banks, and fell back on Cagayan. The American loss was nine men killed and two officers and 10 men wounded.

Reports have reached Manila of trouble in the Island of Samar, whence reports, however, are not confirmed. A battalion of the 20th Regiment, and a battery of artillery, were despatched to-day.

HANDSOME BOY KIDNAPPED.

New York, June 23.—Six-year-old Joseph Polito, a handsome child, and the nephew of a wealthy diamond setter, has been kidnapped, according to the police, to be held for ransom.
