

### LETTERS FOUND IN RESIDENCE STRENGTHEN HANDS OF CROWN

HAMILTON, May 3 .- (Special.) - Florence Kinrade has survived the ordeal of six hours' sharp inquisition at the hands of such a brilliant examiner as Geo. T. Blackstock, K.C., and if she has not emerged with flying colors, as the saying is, neither has she been led into any apparent very serious admissions, so far as the subject of the enquiry is concerned. The enquiry adjourned at 11.30 to resume at 7.30 to-morrow evening.

The crown played a trump card in the production of a number of letters-the important discovery made last week in the Kinrade residence. They brought out one sensational point-that it was not until a fortnight prior to the tragedy that Florence Kinrade wrote Jimmy Baum, terminating their love affair, because, she said, she now realized that her affections were centred on

It was brought out that there had been trouble in the Kinrade home between Florence and the others, following the discovery that a Christmas present from Baum to Florence had been inter-

It was made evident, too, that the crown's investigations in the vicinity of Richmond and Virginia Beach had been productive of considerable results. Miss Kinrade was confronted with statements that persons with whom she had been more or less intimate, according to her own story, couldn't be discovered to exist, and, most surprising of all, that she wasn't known at Manchester Presbyterian Church, in which she had said she was soloist.

Mr. Blackstock's "My instructions are" were a frequent prelude to the introduction of statements so flatly contradictory to what Miss Kinrade had sworn that the wonder was how she could bear up with such apparent unshaken composure. Time and again she was compelled to retract statements.

When Mrs. Kinrade, the first wittess was called, Mr. Lynch-Staunton formally asked that the enquiry be continued in private, imitating U. S. grand jury methods, which he thought were a desirable innovation for Canadian courts.

"As you say," replied the coroner, "there have been some misrepresentations made, and it is for that reason that I cannot grant your request. I think it will be far better if further investigations will be corrected by rublic opinion."

Later, Mr. Lynch-Staunton actually appealed to Mr. Blackstock to continue the enquiry in private, but the coroner declined to accede.

Care was also taken by counsel for the defence to secure for Florence Kinrade all the legal "protection" from answering incriminating questions that was available and once or twice was objection taken to Mr. Blackstock's line of enquiry





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
