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THE SEIZURE OF AMERICAN FISHING VESSELS.

Last Saturday, a Court of Vice Admiralty was held in Newport, in the case of the American fishing schooner Coral, belonging to Machias, in Maine, seized by H. M. Cutter, of the U. S. Fish Commission.

The charge against the Coral is, that while she was at anchor, not more than a musket shot from the Northern Ironclad, she was fired upon by the British gunboat.

No appearance has been entered in this case, and it was intimated to the Court that Mr. Pennington, the owner, could not deny the charge against the Coral.

The Court has ordered that the Coral be released, and that the British gunboat be ordered to pay the costs of the proceedings.
