

Today's official statement from Petrograd, declaring no events of impor have occurred along the Russian or Caucasus fronts is one of the laconic sort customarily issued by the war office when decisive results in pending operations are lacking. It is probable, however, that adverse weather conditions are playing an important part in shaping the course of events, hampering activities of the combatants in various fields.

Offificial reports and private despatches indicate that the falling rains are interfering with the progress of hostilities on virtually all battle fronts. In mountainous regions, such as the Alpine districts and the Caucasus, cold weather and snow add to the difficulties of the combatants.
