Ottawa, Oct. 13.—Particulars of the composition of the new Canadian corps troops which have been added to the two Canadian divisions at the front received by the militia department by cable this morning. They will total about 10,000 men and bring the Canadian forces at the front up to the very considerable total of nearly 60,000.

BRITISH COMMONS IN SESSION

London, Oct. 12.—The eagerly awaited statement of Sir Edward Grey, the foreign secretary, on the Balkan situation, was not made today in the house of commons. It was deferred until Thursday.

Premier Asquith also announced that he was as yet unable to give the decision of the government on the subject of recruiting, but said that would not be long delayed.

Herbert L. Samuel, the postmaster-general, advanced the abandonment of the proposal to abolish half-penny postage.

All information in possession of the British government on the subject of massacres and deportations of Armenians in Turkey was made public in the House of Commons in a speech in the house of lords, Sir Edward Grey told the house of commons this afternoon.

"There can be but one feeling, of horror and indignation about it," the foreign secretary added.

The bill authorizing the loan which had been arranged in the United States, was introduced in the house by Reginald E. Cross, chairman of the committee, and passed all stages. Mr. McKenna defended as fair and reasonable the terms of the loan arranged by the commission. He said the true value of these terms could be estimated only by comparing them with the rate of interest paid in this country.

Defecting secret interest, he remarked, the British 4 1/2 per cent loan now introduced at 2 1/2%. As the American underwriters took the loan at 8%, he argued, Great Britain was merely paying one-half of one per cent. more than the market rate.

SOLDIERS GIVEN UNEXPECTED DIP

Members of Second Canadian Division Had Adventure in Channel—Two Ships Collided

London, Sept. 24.—(Correspondence)—The crossing of the Channel by the second Canadian Division was marked by an accident in one case which was attended with amusing rather than serious results. It appears that one of our troops collided with a British vessel. For a few moments both vessels were in some danger, but both succeeded in getting away from each other unscathed.

The shock had, however, thrown a dozen Canadians overboard. These were picked up by a small craft which, instead of taking them back to the port that the ship returned to, put them ashore at a military port some miles away. The story told by the picked-up Canadians aroused the suspicions of the local authorities, which were deepened when the War Office officially intimated that they "knew nothing of the occurrence reported." A night in guard room quarters was the result, and our men were released only next day when superior officers arrived and identified them.

THE ODDFELLOWS AND THE GREAT WAR

(C. B. Allan in the Dominion Independent Oddfellow.)

The Grand Lodge of the Maritime Provinces did a splendid thing when it voted money from its funds for a motor ambulance for the Canadian contingent. Every dollar used for the comfort and help of our wounded soldiers is money well expended. More of such assistance is needed in this war than was ever dreamed of before. Canadians are doing a good deal, but they have not yet begun to measure up to the sacrifices some are making, and the duty of the British men and women but we may do better.

The Journal of the Grand Lodge of the Maritime Provinces publishes the names of 288 members of the order in this jurisdiction who have offered for service at the front and the majority of whom are now overseas.

In addition a large number of the members have enlisted since that roll was compiled, showing that the brethren are doing their share, to help the Empire out in its time of trial but there are many more who could and should offer congratulations to Past Grand Master D. S. Taylor Walker of Truro, who with a son at the front, has offered his own services, and Mr. Walker has asked that he be permitted to go as a nurse. It is a matter of deepest regret to some that they are unable to qualify. In view of the sacrifices some are making, is it not a matter of wonder that so many of the young men hold back? In years to come the greatest grief they will have to contemplate will be the fact that looking back over the years when the life of the Empire was at stake; when the safety and honor of those they loved best was menaced; when men were measured by their worth and what they were willing to do and they failed to measure up to the standard of what was expected of them and left it to other fellow to fight for them and protect their homes from disaster.

God help us all if we lose in this strife. It will not only be that we Britons who have so loudly proclaimed our independence and our superiority must submit to Treston rule, but so many will be burdened for life with that dreadful thought that they did not do their part, and that by not offering, some of them may have been influenced to do the same, and the endless chain of sacrifice and endeavor has broken and only the child dead horrible feeling of remorse left to harass and annoy until the end of life.

God grant that the young manhood of this country may be led to see its duty in this great emergency, and not fall the victim of its time need. The blood of comrades calls from the trenches. The country should be on fire with enthusiasm. Forward Odd Fellows, and show the way!

THE WAR NEWS

In yesterday's issue of this paper attention was directed to an article written two weeks ago by the military correspondent of the London Times, which set out very clearly the tremendous obstacles to be overcome before German resistance could be broken down in Belgium and France.

Let us consider now the same military expert's view of the situation in the Balkans. He declares that nothing can be gained by trying to minimize the fact that the Austro-Germans have achieved a signal initial success in the Balkan campaign.

The despatch of a small Allied force from Saloniki to Serbia is not a military operation and it is for us to take advantage of this fact to push our offensive in the west and for Russia to strive by every means in her power to build up her new armies and complete her equipment.

The Daily Mail also utters a warning against the danger of sending an insufficient force into the Balkan zone, for a very great army is required. Last night's London press cable said: "The situation is admitted to be a very serious one, not only for Serbia but for the whole allied cause."

The point to be emphasized in all this is that more men are needed in the Balkans as well as in France and Belgium. If Germany could succeed in opening the road to Turkey she could not only delay the opening of the Dardanelles but gain access to the great Turkish copper mines and to at least a partial supply of cotton.

Of course it is possible that with a smashing offensive by the British and French in the west, the Russians in the east and the Italians in the south the Austro-Germans would not be able to spare large armies to assist Bulgaria and Turkey; but are the Allies able to make such an offensive and follow it up?

There is one comforting assurance, which we hope will prove well founded. The French prime minister told the Chamber of Deputies yesterday that Russian troops would at once join with the British and French in the Balkans, and he expressed the view that ample troops were available without weakening any front.

Let us hope that the reorganization of the Canadian shell commission will bring more contracts to Canada and provide that none of them are farmed out to give a profit to middlemen.

The fine old Coffin manor and extensive grounds should be an ideal place for the recuperation of wounded soldiers. Mr. Burden's offer, referred to in detail elsewhere, is most commendable.

Whatever may be thought of the inaction of President Wilson and his cabinet, the people of the British Empire are very grateful for the warm sympathy of the great mass of the American people.

campaign. If the Italians can increase their pressure on the Austrian front it will at least help to relieve the situation for the Allies in the Balkan sphere of operations.

The British have captured another position in the Kamerun, in Western Africa, the last German colony, and are in pursuit of the enemy. Very soon there will be no German colonies.

The success of German diplomacy in the Balkans makes the task of the Allies harder. It means a prolongation of the struggle. If, as the French premier asserts, the Allies can send plenty of men to the Balkans without weakening any front, it nevertheless prevents them from strengthening the other fronts to that extent, and on no front have they been strong enough to drive the Germans back for any distance.

THE LAND QUESTION

(Chatham World)

The St. John Standard expects much of the classification that Premier Clarke promises to make of the Crown Lands. But most of the land has been handed over to lumber and pulp men for a long term at a nominal rental and a survey and valuation will simply serve to show how much the province has lost by the government's land policy. We know that some of the leases that were given for a bonus of \$100 a mile have been sold for \$1000 a mile, not far from Chatham, and it will not enrich us to learn by a survey that a great deal more of the land is equally valuable and could be leased at a big price if we had it to lease. We may learn what it is worth to the leaseholders, but that knowledge will not increase its value to the province.

We cannot hope for any settlement of the vexed question of land for settlement as the result of that classification. Government agents are sent every year to examine and report on land that is applied for by settlers and every year applicants are denied land that is good for farming and other applicants given land that is good only for timber growing. We need only a few miles up river for an illustration. A man has a good farm on the edge of the forest, where he makes a good living and has brought up a family of boys. The boys have applied for grants of land adjoining the father's farm, and the government agent who is sent to examine it, solemnly reports that the land is not fit for settlement purposes. Why? Because he is bigoted enough to think more of his theories than of the practical element of the land? Not at all, but because he has been told that the best of the soil to extend the boundaries of their native hamlets.

ANOTHER CAUTION AGAINST EXTRAVAGANCE

London, Oct. 12—The levying of still heavier duties on imports from the United States and other foreign countries is urged by the Post's financial editor, in discussing the problems of our finance. He regards this step as necessary in order to restrict further the use of luxuries and to force economy upon the common people.

On the assumption that the war will last for a long period and that our power over foreign exchange may tend to weaken rather than to become stronger," the Post says, "our whole policy should be in the direction of mobilizing all our available resources for offsetting adverse trade balances and checking all unnecessary imports from abroad. What has been done thus far in the taxation of such imports is quite insignificant. There must be an immediate further cutting of personal expenditures, which plays an important part in affecting the balance of payments to be made."

The Post quotes approvingly the financial expert who declares future war such imports is guaranteed to be subsidized by the banks but by the people themselves. Unless this is done he predicts the war will be followed by the greatest boom and the greatest collapse the world ever has seen, affecting alike Great Britain, the continent and the United States. It is estimated by this expert that Great Britain must add at least \$8,000,000,000 more before March 31.

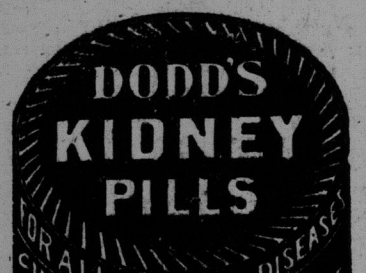

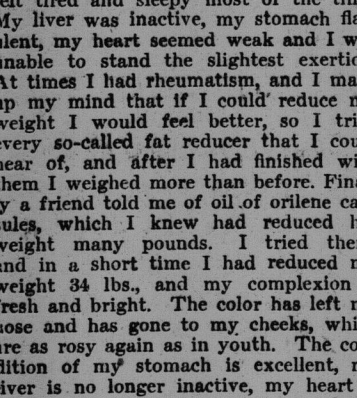

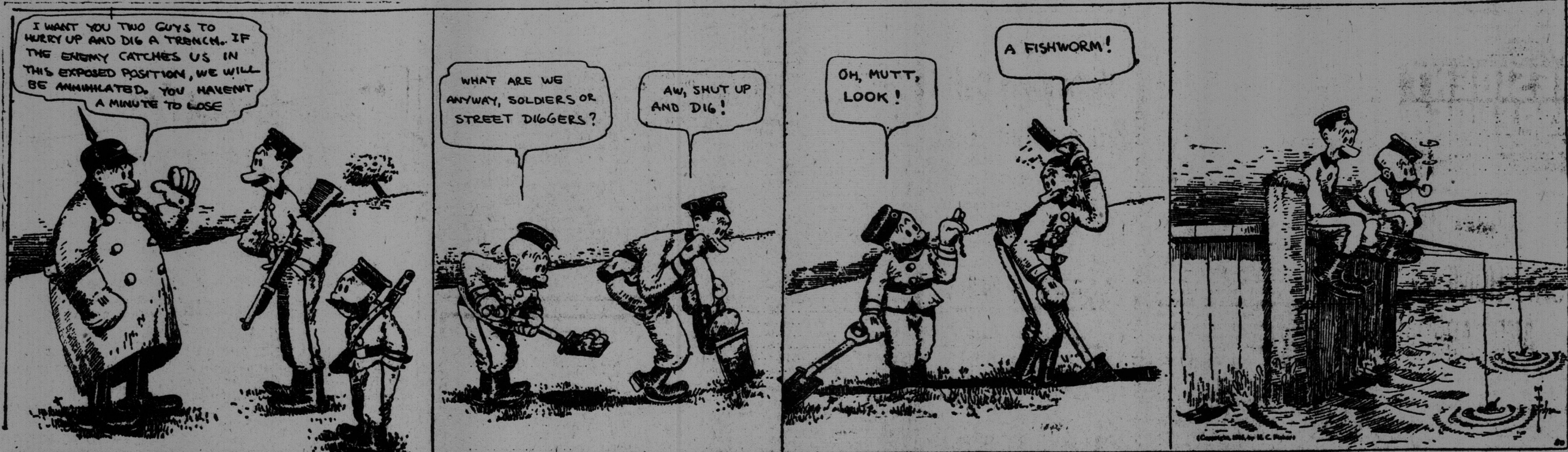

Here Is a Matter That Vitaly Affects St. John Of the 1914 Harvest 151,000,000 Bushels Went via United States Ports and Only 101,500,000 Through Dominion Ports--How About St. John?

The Shipping of Canadian Grain is the title of a very interesting article in the last issue of the New York Shipping Illustrated. Much interest, it says, has been created by the report that, in order to accelerate the movement of grain from the west to the shipping ports in Europe, the Canadian government had temporarily suspended the restrictions forbidding American vessels to carry cargo between Canadian ports. It is pointed out that this reported action was made necessary by the fact that the Canadian wheat crop this year may reach two hundred million bushels and the Dominion government is anxious that it be shipped in as great a proportion as possible through the Canadian gateway to the sea. The writer of the article goes on to say:

"The shipment of Canadian grain to Europe by way of the United States has long been a sore spot with the Canadians, but at the St. Lawrence river is closed, as navigation during the winter, it is hard to perceive how this can ever be prevented. It is true that Canada has such ice-free ports as St. John, N. B., and Halifax, N. S., but the long haul necessary to reach these ports gives the American railroads an excellent margin of competition, so that the ports of Boston, New York, Philadelphia, Baltimore and Newport News, which are served by railroads making connections with the shipping coming from the head of the lakes, draw much of their winter traffic from the Canadian farms. As to the Maine port of Portland, its location and rail connection with the Canadian Grand Trunk system make it virtually a Canadian dependence, and but for the Canadian traffic which it handles in the winter season, it would hardly rank as one of the important ports of the United States Atlantic seaboard. The importance of Canadian grain traffic to the shipping trade out of United States ports is shown by the following figures dealing with the 1914 harvest (which cover shipments from the lakes to Canadian and United States ports):"

Table with 3 columns: Commodity, To Can., To U.S. Ports. Wheat, bushels, 61,800,000; Oats, bushels, 24,800,000; Flour, bushels, 1,700,000; Barley, 5,700,000; Elevator screenings, 8,100,000. Total: 101,800,000.

Such figures as the above go very far towards justifying all the efforts that the boards of trade of the maritime provinces have been making in recent years towards securing the development of their ports, and their utilization as outlets for the great grain crop of Canada. This business belongs to Canada, so far as it is reasonably possible to do so, the ports of Canada should enjoy its benefits. How does St. John stand in relation to the grain trade of Canada? Is this port in a position to handle the share of the grain traffic of the west? Have we sufficient elevator capacity? Have we sufficient wharfage space, are our terminal facilities sufficiently ample? These are pertinent questions and they are questions that should be answered.

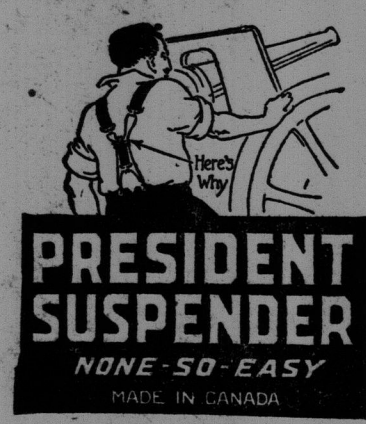

is now ready for the battlefield. The regular crew for fighting will consist of four men and an officer. Cruisers of High Power. The armored cruiser aeroplanes were next put through tests high in the air. They are small biplanes of high power. Each is armed with a cannon, and is capable of rising almost vertically from the ground at a speed of ninety miles an hour. Captain Frantz and Operator Monnell and Mallard made successive flights in cruisers, rising from the ground at an angle of sixty degrees. The steady roar of the three-inch rifles continued as the cruisers circled far above. Mallard was the most daring operator. He fired his big gun while plunging from side to side and dropping rapidly, imitating the manoeuvres carried out while engaging an enemy.

A large number of these cruisers is now ready. Several recently carried out a night bombardment far back in the German line. During the Champagne engagement these cruisers hit a German balloon, which exploded in a mass of flames. This, however, was only the initial trial. The battle planes and cruisers soon to begin movements in large squadrons, both defensive and offensive. They are to attack the German lines of communication, particularly the railway junctions, with the object of cutting off supplies and spreading demoralization in the rear of the Germans.

Each squadron will consist of nine aeroplanes of all types, including one battle plane, two battle cruisers and six scout planes. The complement for a squadron will be upward of fifty officers and men for the operation of the aeroplanes and their transportation on motor lorries with which each squadron will be equipped.

During the visit of the correspondents to the aviation school, it was learned from the Commander, Captain Pegoud, that about 100 military aviators were under instruction. This is only one of a large number of these schools which are turning out trained aviators.

Captain Pegoud said non-commissioned officers and privates were making capable operators of fighting machines.

France now has an aerial army. It is formed in divisions and squadrons, with battle aeroplanes, cruiser aeroplanes, scouts and torpedo planes, all armored heavily and carrying three-inch cannon and rapid-fire guns.

The government the other day permitted the first inspection of its new air fleet. Large and small types of the new battle planes manoeuvred high in the air, firing round after round from their three inch rifles while they soared, looped and darted about.

Minister of War Millerand assigned two military experts of the aviation service to conduct the newspaper correspondents to where 100 military aviators were learning to navigate the new war craft.

130 Feet Across Wings. The aviation field is a vast enclosure ten times the size of Belmont Park. Entering the field a monster battle aeroplane loomed up thirty feet high, with a number of planes stretching 130 feet across. Further back was ranged the feet of battle cruisers and scout planes. Their huge wings made a front half a mile wide.

The battle planes and all the cruisers were armed heavily. Each carried both three inch cannon and the rapid-fire gun.

The huge battle plane was the chief center of attention. The engineer who constructed it explained it was the first actual realization of the battle plane, other aerial dreadnoughts having proved impractical. This monster actually flies, carrying a crew of twelve men, with two cannon on the wings throwing three-inch steel projectiles.

Three trial flights have been made, demonstrating that it has the steadiness of an ordinary biplane. The huge craft

FRANCE NOW HAS AERIAL ARMY Fleet of Armored Craft Said to be Ready, Each Carrying Two Three-inch Guns and Rapid Firers as Well

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after one month's instruction. In the aggregate, these schools are equipping many thousands for the work of the new and terrible aerial warfare.

Sunday closing of saloons in Chicago for the first time in forty-four years resulted in Sunday passing with the lowest crime record in the history of the police department. So Chief of Police Healy announced.

Out of the 7182 saloons in the city, only twenty-eight were found to have violated Mayor Thompson's closing order, which became effective at midnight on Saturday. Most of the violators were of a minor character and only one saloon-keeper was arrested.

There were only sixteen arrests made for drunkenness on Sunday, and forty-seven on Saturday, as compared with an average of 248 for the two days during several months past. Saloon-keepers estimated that they lost \$400,000 as a result of being obliged to close.

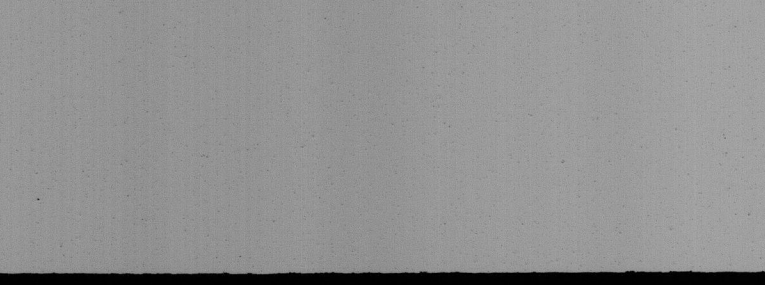

COFFIN MANOR FOR THE USE OF THE WOUNDED

Magnificent Offer is Made By R. M. Burden

FINE OLD HOUSE AND EXTENSIVE GROUNDS

Place Built Hundred Years Ago by General Coffin When Soldiers Were Stationed Here--Inspection and Report by Dr. Skinner

A generous patriotic offer has been made to the militia department at Ottawa by a former St. John man, R. M. Burden, now of Boston, though in reality still an active citizen of this city because of his co-operation and aid in local movement for a deserving cause. The dwelling house is the fine old manor house built originally by General Coffin nearly 100 years ago when the militia were stationed in St. John, with materials imported direct from the old country. It is still in the very best of condition, and its furnishings in walls, floors, fire-places and other appurtenances are most superior. Several of the doors in the house are of mahogany. There is a spacious veranda nicely located in present enclosed in glass and this should make an ideal sun-parlor for wounded men.

The buildings and grounds are in excellent condition, for a keeper and staff have been kept employed throughout the year by Mr. Burden and he himself with his wife make more or less frequent visits to the beautiful place, spending much of the summer there. There is a lodge for a keeper and his wife upon the farm. The grounds cover so large an acreage that it is not possible from any one point upon them to see their borders. In one part of the orchard alone, to give an idea of how large the grounds are, there are 1,500 apple trees planted. There is also a wide area of farm land tillable for potatoes and other vegetables, more reserved for hay, oats and other purposes, and a pleasant shore boundary on the Nepesee where bathing and fishing would be popular, and boating as well for included in his offer he has given his boats.

Dr. Skinner yesterday visited the place and has made measurements of the rooms and inspected the general environment, will report to Ottawa. The presumption is that his recommendation will be entirely favorable. Mr. Burden would like also to furnish some of the rooms, and has offered to do so. The proposed offer is regarded as one of the most practical and generous which has been given by any Canadian and Mr. Burden is being warmly commended for his fine showing of patriotic big-heartedness which must to a great extent be tinged with the spirit of self-sacrifice. More than once he has manifested his patriotic spirit since the breaking out of war and the Red Cross Society and other similar bodies have reason to be most thankful to him for large contributions, with even more reason now because of his latest endeavor.

HE IS THE LAST OF 100 BANDSMEN

Brother of St. John Woman Only One of Queen's Own Cameron Highlanders Band Left

A thrilling story of the havoc wrought in the first few weeks of the war among those regiments which were among the pioneers in the field can be well imagined from a letter received yesterday by Mrs. J. Allan Shields of Broad street, from her brother, Thomas, in France since last fall. When war was declared he was a member of the Queen's Own Cameron Highlanders Band which numbered 100 pieces, and would have filled his period of service by Christmas.

The regiment was ordered to the front and the band went with it. The duties of the bandmen on the field of battle was to look after the wounded as stretcher bearers, and the letter says that they did so, and performed their duties nobly and heroically. One after one the bandmen were shot down. The conflict was terrible and few who were wounded lingered beyond a short few hours. Ninety and nine have passed away and of the 100 in the band he alone is left. He took his chances with the rest and was about the firing line with the stretcher-bearing corps, expecting any moment would be his last. Now the lone survivor of the hundred bandmen has been promoted to the headquarters band where his duties will not be quite so exciting but still hazardous.

THE 64TH AND ST. JOHN

Despite the twice repeated announcements from Ottawa that the 64th Battalion was to be wintered in St. John there are some about the city who are still speculating as to whether this unit or the 88th will be here. It is fully believed that one battery will be stationed here for the winter. If the 64th goes to Halifax, as rumored yesterday, it would mean a very large force of men being stationed there for the winter.

Already at that port there are 1,100 men with the composite battalion; there will be the same number with the 88th, some 400 or 500 in the reinforcement of the R. C. R., and a new artillery unit is being raised. Placing this estimate roughly at 2,700 men should the 64th go as a double unit to Halifax, it would mean the quartering of 4,700 soldiers there aside from the many sailors from the navy. Many citizens who heard this report yesterday were skeptical and are of the opinion that the 64th will come to St. John before very long.

HOME AFTER GAME

Some local sport fans who went to Boston on Saturday night to see the baseball game in the world's series returned home today. Almost all were of the opinion that Boston would win the pennant. They said that the two games yesterday and Monday were well worth the trip as they were fast and exciting. Among those returning today were Robert Carson, Vernon Sharpe, H. F. Black, H. J. Sheehan, LeB. Hastings and J. C. Chesley.

BOTH THE ESTEY BOYS AND GERALD NORTHRUP SEND LETTERS HOME

A letter received by George Estey, of the staff of M. R. A. Ltd., from his brother William and a friend, Gerald Northrup, told of their being in good health and of their experiences since going to France with the Army Service Corps. They were at the time engaged in building a dugout for themselves for the winter, and expected soon to be "as snug as a bug in a rug." They said that the members of the Army Service Corps were doing well and would soon be giving a good account of themselves at the front. They were located near enough to hear the roaring of the heavy guns along the first line, and at night could see the sky illuminated by the star-bells. They asked to be remembered to their friends in the city.

Bomb. Arthur T. Estey, who is a brother of George and William is now in the Canadian Convalescent Home at Bromley Hill, Kent, England. He was thrown from his horse a short time ago and had two broken ribs. In a letter to his mother, Mrs. George Estey of Kennedy street, he says he is doing well, and expects to go back to France soon with the artillery.
