



EXPORTS OF CANADIAN LIQUOR WERE LARGER Ottawa, March 27.—(Canadian Press).—Canadian whisky and beer were exported in much larger quantity during the twelve months ended Feb-ruary than for the preceding twelve month period. Exports of whiskey for the last year amounted to 839,181 gallons, valued at \$2,698,377; for the previous year the quantity exported was 192,910 gallons, value \$892,729. Ale and beer exported during the last year amounted to 1,454,629 gal-lons, value \$2,782,622, while for the previous twelve months the amount was only 421,960 gallons, value \$754,-B54. Kim.
